

2023 WIMBLEDON THE CHAMPIONSHIPS



Junior Tournament Preview

In 1947, the first junior singles events were held at Wimbledon, with Denmark's Kurt Nielsen and Belgium's Geniveve Domken winning the inaugural tournaments. The boys' doubles and girls' doubles events were introduced in 1982. This is the 76th edition of the boys' singles and girls' singles tournaments here, and the 40th editions of both the boys' doubles and girls' doubles tournaments. 2023 Wimbledon is the 136th staging of The Championships overall.

KORNEEVA AIMS FOR THREE-IN-A-ROW

Alina Korneeva has dominated the girls' singles events at the Grand Slams this season, defeating Mirra Andreeva to win the title at the Australian Open and defeating Lucciana Perez Alarcon to win the title at Roland Garros.

Victory for Korneeva at Wimbledon would see her become the first player in history to win the girls' singles titles at the opening 3 Grand Slam tournaments of the season. She would also become the 3rd player to win 3 girls' singles titles at the Grand Slams in one season – after Natasha Zvereva (who won the titles at Roland Garros, Wimbledon and the US Open in 1987) and Magdalena Maleeva (who won the titles at the Australian Open, Roland Garros and the US Open in 1990).

Korneeva is also bidding to become the 10th player in history to win 3 Grand Slam girls' singles titles (in total) – and the first since Anastasia Pavlyuchenkova, who the girls' singles titles at the Australian Open in both 2006 and 2007 and the girls' title at the 2006 US Open.

Korneeva is also bidding to become the 3rd junior player (across boys and girls) to win the opening 3 Grand Slam titles of the season – after Stefan Edberg, who went on to win the Grand Slam in boys' singles in 1983, and Gael Monfils, who won the boys' singles title at the Australian Open, Roland Garros and Wimbledon in 2004.

NEW GRAND SLAM CHAMPION GUARANTEED IN BOYS' DRAW

With neither 2023 Australian Open champion Alexander Blockx and 2023 Roland Garros champion Dino Prizmic competing at Wimbledon, a new Grand Slam champion is guaranteed in the boys' singles draw here this year.

Among the leading contenders are a pair of Latin American players – Bolivian No. 1 seed Juan Carlos Prado Angelo, who finished runner-up to Prizmic at Roland Garros, will bid to become the first player from his country to win a Grand Slam singles title in any discipline; meanwhile Mexican No. 2 seed Rodrigo Pacheco Mendez will aim to become the 3rd Mexican player to win a junior Grand Slam title, after 1985 Wimbledon boys' singles winner Leanordo Lavelle and 1986 Wimbledon boys' singles winner Eduardo Velez.

AT THE DOUBLE

The last player to win both junior singles and doubles titles at Wimbledon in the same year was Eugenie Bouchard, who won the girls' singles title and girls' doubles title (alongside Taylor Townsend) in 2012. The last player to win both boys' singles and boys' doubles titles at Wimbledon is Florin Mergea, who won the singles title and the doubles title (alongside Horia Tecau) in 2003.

HOME CHAMPIONS

In 2008, Laura Robson became the first British player to win a junior singles title at Wimbledon since Annabel Croft in 1984. Wimbledon has seen the longest wait for a home player to win the boys' singles title of the 4 Grand Slams – Stanley Matthews was the most-recent British boys' singles champion at Wimbledon – Matthews won the boys' title here 59 years ago in 1962.

In total, there have been 6 British boys' singles champions and 7 British girls' singles champions (including 2-time champion Lorna Cornell) at Wimbledon since the competitions were established in 1947.

2022 CHAMPIONS CONTINUE DEVELOPMENT

The 2022 Wimbledon junior champions, Croatia's Mili Poljicak and USA's Liv Hovde, have both enjoyed success at professional level since winning the boys' and girls' titles here last year.

Poljicak ended his junior career after Wimbledon last year and won his first professional title on the ITF World Tennis Tour at M15 Monastir (TUN) in January and has played on both the ATP Challenger Tour and the ITF World Tennis Tour this season. He broke the Top 500 of the ATP rankings for the first time and competed as a wild card at Wimbledon qualifying, falling to Johannus Monday in the 1st round.

Hovde has won 3 professional titles on the ITF World Tennis Tour since her victory in the girls' singles here in 2022, most recently at W25 Bethany Beach, DE (USA) in May. She also reached her first semifinal at W60-level last month, reaching the last 4 at W60 Sumter, SC (USA) and has competed in qualifying at 3 WTA Tour events this season. She also competed as a wild card at Wimbledon qualifying, falling to Diana Shnaider in the 1st round.

YOUNGEST AND OLDEST

The youngest players in the boys' singles and girls' singles tournaments here this year are Netherlands' Thijs Boogard (15 years 11 days) and Hannah Klugman (14 years 148 days), respectively.

The oldest players in the boys' singles and girls' singles tournaments here this year are Spain's Alejandro Melero Kretzer (18 years 196 days) and Romania's Cara Maria Mester (18 years 180 days), respectively.

In the boys' draw there are 5 fifteen-year-olds, 13 sixteen-year-olds, 24 seventeen-year-olds and 22 eighteen-year-olds. (NB all ages calculated on the last day of the tournament)

In the girls' draw there are 2 fourteen-year-olds, 9 fifteen-year-olds, 15 sixteen-year-olds, 24 seventeen-year-olds and 14 eighteen-year-olds. (NB all ages calculated on the last day of the tournament)

WILD CARDS

British players received all of the 8 available wild cards in the boys' singles draw: Freddy Blaydes, Viktor Frydrych, Benjamin Gusic Wan, Henry Jefferson, Luca Pow, Charlie Robertson, Zach Stephens and Phoenix Weir

In the girls' singles draw, one wild card went to Australia's Taylah Preston, with the remaining 7 given to British players: ouis Bowden, Patrick Brady, Viktor Frydrych, Benjamin Gusic Wan, William Jansen, Luca Pow, Henry Searle and Phoenix Weir.

GRAND SLAM PREPARATION

The Grand Slams are the pinnacle of the ITF World Tennis Tour Juniors, with J500 events representing the next-most prestigious level of tournament. There have been 4 events at J500-level in 2023 so far with 8 different players winning the titles.

GRASS COURT CHAMPIONS

The J300 tournament at Roehampton is the only junior grass court event to have taken place prior to Wimbledon this year. Slovakia's Renata Jamrichova won the girls' event by walkover after Czechia's Tereza Valentova in the final on Friday. In the boys' singles, Brazil's Joao Fonseca defeated Bulgaria's Iliyan Radulov int the title match.

PROFESSIONAL TITLE WINNERS

Seven players competing in the girls' singles event here have won at least one professional title on the ITF World Tennis Tour. Kaitlyn Quevedo won the title at three W15 events in 2022, while Korneeva and Melisa Ercan have both won 2 titles, with both of Ercan's title-victories coming in June this year.

At the age of 15 years 269 days, Korneeva's title-victory as a qualifier at W60 Pretoria (RSA) in March saw her become the 5th-youngest player to win an ITF World Tennis Tour event at W60-level or above.

FUTURE GREATNESS

2011 girls' singles champion Ashleigh Barty became the 4th player to win both the junior singles title and the women's singles titles at Wimbledon, with her victory here last year. There have also been 4 players who have won the boys' singles title and the men's singles title here – most recently 1998 boys' singles champion Roger Federer, who went on to win 8 men's singles titles here.
