The ITF's International Team Competition for players aged 16 and Under was launched in 1985 as the World Youth Cup. This event was re-branded in 2002 as the Junior Davis Cup by BNP Paribas and the Junior Fed Cup, then in 2005 as the Junior Davis Cup and Junior Fed Cup by BNP Paribas, and then again in 2023 as Billie Jean King Cup Juniors by Gainbridge and Davis Cup Juniors. This age bracket was chosen as a critical period in a player's development and provided an opportunity for young players to enjoy a taste of the special demands of team membership in a competitive environment. The 2023 Billie Jean King Cup Juniors and Davis Cup Juniors were held in Cordoba, Spain from 30 October – 5 November 2022.
