# **Junior Tournament Preview**

In 1947, the first boys' singles event was held at Roland Garros, with the first girls' singles event taking place 6 years later in 1953. The boys' doubles and girls' doubles events were introduced in 1981. This is the 81st edition of the boys' singles tournament here, the 72nd edition of the girls' singles tournament, and the 35th editions of both the boys' doubles and girls' doubles tournaments.

2024 Roland Garros is the 123rd edition of the French championships overall, which began in 1891 as a closed championship reserved for national players or players enrolled in French clubs, and the 94th tournament since the event became international in 1925. This is the 91st time that the tournament has been held at Roland Garros, which was built for the Davis Cup Final between France and USA in 1928.

### JAPAN'S SAKAMOTO CHASES MORE HISTORY

Japan's Rei Sakamoto came out on top at the 2024 Australian Open, defeating Czechia's Jan Kumstat to become the first Japanese player to win a junior singles title in Melbourne. He also reached the doubles semifinals partnering Federico Cina, falling to eventual champions Maxwell Exsted and Cooper Woestendick.

Should Sakamoto follow up his Australian triumph with a title here, he would become the first Japanese player to win a junior singles title at Roland Garros, and the first Japanese player to win multiple junior Grand Slam singles titles.

Sakamoto is also bidding to become the first boy to win the opening 2 junior Grand Slam titles of the season since Gael Monfils, who won the boys' singles titles at the Australian Open, Roland Garros and Wimbledon in 2004. He is also bidding to become the first player to win back-to-back Grand Slam boys' singles titles since Tseng Chun-Hsin, who won both Roland Garros and Wimbledon in 2018.

### JAMRICHOVA SEEKS BACK-TO-BACK CROWNS

Slovakia's Renata Jamrichova won the 2024 Australian Open girls' singles title, defeating home talent Emerson Jones in the final. She became the second player from her nation to win a junior singles title in Melbourne, after Tereza Mihalikova won the girls' singles in 2015. She is bidding to become the first Slovakian player to win multiple junior Grand Slam singles titles.

Jamrichova is bidding to become the second player in consecutive years to win 2 Grand Slam girls' singles titles, after Alina Korneeva won the Australian Open and Roland Garros girls' singles last year. If she triumphs again here, Jamrichova will become just the fifth girl to win the opening 2 junior Grand Slam titles of the season, after Robyn Ebbern in 1961, Lelsey Hunt in 1968, Magdalena Maleeva (who also won the US Open title later in the year) in 1990, and Korneeva in 2023.

## **SLAM CHAMPIONS IN THE DRAWS**

Sakamoto and Jamrichova are the only junior Grand Slam singles champions competing at the 2023 Roland Garros junior event, but Maxwell Exsted and Cooper Woestendick (2024 Australian Open boys' doubles winners), Alena Kovackova (2023 Wimbledon girls' doubles winner) and Tyra Caterina Grant and Iva Jovic (2024 Australian Open girls' doubles winners) are all competing in the junior draws here this year.

## FAUREL LEADS FRENCH HOPES

Thomas Faurel is the top-ranked French player in the junior draws here this year – and he will bid to become a third home champion in the Roland Garros boys' singles in four years, after Luca van Assche and Gabriel Debru won the boys' titles here in 2021 and 2022 respectively.

France has had a junior champion at Roland Garros for 3 of the last 4 years, only missing out in 2023, with Elsa Jacquemot having won the girls' singles title here in 2020, becoming the first home player to win the girls' singles crown since Kristina Mladenovic in 2009.

In total, there have been 14 French boys' singles champions and 15 French girls' singles champions at Roland Garros since the competitions were established.

### Home singles champions at the junior Grand Slam events

### MAKING NATIONAL HISTORY

Top juniors in both the boys' and girls' singles can make history for their nations should they win the title here. Boys' singles top seed Joel Schwaerzler could become just the second Austrian player to ever win a junior Grand Slam singles title, after his coach Jurgen Melzer won the boys' singles at 1999 Wimbledon. No. 3 seed Nicolai Budkov Kjaer could become the first Norwegian player ever to win a junior Grand Slam singles title, and No. 4 seed Luca Preda could become the first Romanian player to win a junior Grand Slam singles title since Simona Halep won here in 2008, and the first Romanian Grand Slam boys' singles champion since Florin Mergea won at 2003 Wimbledon.

Chile's Antonia Vergara Rivera, No. 12 seed in the girls' singles, could become the first Chilean player to win a Grand Slam girls' singles title, and the first Chilean to win a junior Grand Slam singles title since Cristian Garin won the boys' singles title here in 2013. Should she win the title here this year, Vergara Rivera would become South America's first Roland Garros girls' singles champion since Paraguay's Rossana de los Rios in 1992.

# AT THE DOUBLE

In 2022, Havlickova became the first player to win both girls' singles and doubles at Roland Garros in the same year since Agnes Szavay in 2005. Dominic Stricker is the most-recent player to win the boys' singles and boys' doubles titles here in 2020.

# **GRAND SLAM PREPARATION**

The Grand Slams are the pinnacle of the ITF World Tennis Tour Juniors, with J500 events representing the next-most prestigious level of tournament. There have been 4 events at J500-level in 2024 so far, all of which have been played on clay, with 8 different players claiming the titles.

### 2024 Grand Slam and J500 champions

The 3rd level of tournament on the ITF World Tennis Tour Juniors is J300-level, and 11 J300 clay court events have taken place in 2024. Colombia's Miguel Tobon (J300 Lima and J300 Medellin) is the only boy to have won multiple J300 titles on clay this year, while Chile's Antonia Vergara Rivera (J300 Lima and J300 Asuncion) is the only girl to have won multiple J300 titles.

J300 Charleroi-Marcinelle, which concludes on Saturday 1 June, is the last big clay court junior tournament on the tour prior to Roland Garros.

### **PROFESSIONAL TITLE WINNERS**

In addition to her victory in the girls' singles at the Australian Open, No. 1 seed Jamrichova has been forging ahead in her early professional career. The 16-year-old has won 2 singles titles on the women's ITF World Tennis Tour – at W15 Sharm El Sheikh in Egypt on hard courts in March, and on the clay at W15 Telde in Spain in April.

Five of the Top 10 seeds in the girls' singles have won at least one professional title in 2024: (in order of seeding) Jamrichova (2 titles), Laura Samson (3), Tyra Caterina Grant (one), Tereza Valentova (4), and Kaitlin Quevedo (2). Jamrichova, Samson, Valentova and Quevedo have all won multiple professional titles this year, and Czechia's Valentova is in joint-second place on the women's ITF World Tennis Tour for singles titles won in 2024 with 4.

Top seed Joel Schwaerzler won his first professional title on 26th May, with the Austrian winning the Skopje Challenger in North Macedonia. Meanwhile, Norway's Nicolai Budkov Kjaer won his first pro title at M15 Antalya in Turkey in March, following it up with another in May. The Australian Open boys' singles semifinalist is seeded No. 3 here.

# FLYING THE FLAG

Several juniors here have experienced a taste of Davis Cup or Billie Jean King Cup action. Jamrichova defeated Veronika Erjavec to seal victory for Slovakia in their Billie Jean King Cup Qualifier tie against Slovenia in April. Chile's Antonia Vergara Rivera and Norway's Emily Sartz-Lunde both competed at regional level in April also.

In Davis Cup, Norway's Budkov Kjaer claimed his first Davis Cup match win during his nation's victory against Latvia in February, while Poland's Tomasz Berkieta made his debut and claimed his first Davis Cup match win in his nation's victory against Barbados in September 2023. Preda made his debut for Romania in their defeat to Greece in February this year, and Sakamoto was nominated for Japan in their victory against Lebanon in February but did not contest a match.

### 2023 CHAMPIONS MAKE WAVES ON PROFESSIONAL TOURS

Korneeva remains eligible to compete at junior-level, but is currently focusing on her professional career and has not played any junior tournaments in 2024.

Korneeva, 16, achieved a career-high ranking of world No. 128 at the end of February, and currently sits at No. 155. She has won 3 professional titles on the ITF World Tennis Tour, one in 2022 and 2 in 2023, winning W60 Pretoria (RSA) in March and W100 Figueira Da Foz (POR) in July, both times as a qualifier. She made her senior Grand Slam main draw debut at the Australian Open in January, coming through qualifying and defeating Sara Sorribes Tormo before falling to Beatriz Haddad Maia in the 2nd round.

18-year-old Prizmic has also improved his ATP ranking over the last 12 months, reaching a career-best No. 155 in October last year, and currently sitting at No. 204. Like Korneeva, he made his senior Grand Slam main draw debut at the Australian Open in January as a qualifier, losing to No. 1 seed and 10-time champion Novak Djokovic in 4 sets in the 1st round. He has since competed on the ATP Challenger Tour, reaching a quarterfinal at Pau (FRA). He competed in men's singles qualifying here this year but fell to Stefano Napolitano in the 1st round.

### **FUTURE GREATNESS**

Six men and six women have won both the junior singles and the men's or women's singles titles here. Stan Wawrinka and Simona Halep are the only junior champions since 2000 to go on to win the men's or women's singles title.

Four other Roland Garros girls' singles champions have gone on to win Grand Slam women's singles titles: 1984 champion Gabriela Sabatini (1990 US Open), 1993-94 champion Martina Hingis (1997-99 Australian Open; 1997 Wimbledon; 1997 US Open), 1996 champion Amelie Mauresmo (2006 Australian Open; 2006 Wimbledon), and 2018 champion Coco Gauff (2023 US Open).

### YOUNGEST AND OLDEST

The youngest players in the boys' singles and girls' singles tournaments here this year are Daniel Jade (15 years 85 days) and Nauhany Da Silva (14 years 88 days), respectively.

The oldest players in the boys' singles and girls' singles tournaments here this year are Nathan Trouve (18 years 157 days) in the boys' singles and Emily Sartz-Lunde (18 years 148 days), respectively.

In the boys' draw there are 3 fifteen-year-olds, 10 sixteen-year-olds, 31 seventeen-year-olds and 20 eighteenyear-olds. (NB ages calculated on the last day of the tournament)

In the girls' draw there are 2 fourteen-year-olds, 11 fifteen-year-olds, 17 sixteen-year-olds, 24 seventeen-year-olds and 10 eighteen-year-olds. (NB ages calculated on the last day of the tournament)

### WILD CARDS

French players received 6 of the 8 available wild cards in the girls' singles draw: Ophelie Boullay, Eleejah Inisan, Daphnee Mpetshi Perricard, Margot Phanthala, Alice Soulie, and Dune Vaissaud. Australia's Alan Subasic was awarded a reciprocal wild card through Tennis Australia, and Brazil's Nauhany Silva was also awarded a wild card through the Roland Garros Junior Series.

French players also received 7 of the 8 available wild cards in the boys' singles draw: Felix Balshaw, Pierre-Antoine Faut, Daniel Jade, Moise Kouame, Luca Marionneau, Timeo Trufelli, and Raphael Vaksmann. Brazil's Luis Miguel was also awarded a wild card through the Roland Garros Junior Series.

# **COUNTRY COUNTDOWN**

A total of 35 countries are represented in the junior singles draws at 2024 Roland Garros, with France having the most players competing in the boys' singles and in total across both draws, while Czechia have the most players competing in the girls' singles. 7 players are competing as neutral athletes.

# **ROLAND GARROS HONOUR ROLL**

There have been 74 Roland Garros boys' singles champions since the competition was first held in 1947, with 3 players – Ingo Buding, John Newcombe and Guillermo Perez-Roldan – winning the tournament twice. There have been 70 girls' singles champions here since the inaugural competition in 1953, with Martina Hingis the only female player to win 2 junior Roland Garros singles titles.
