On court today...

- Carlos Alcaraz begins the proceedings on Centre Court this afternoon, with the defending champion taking on Estonian qualifier Mark Lajal. Having won his 2nd major title here last year, Alcaraz added to his Grand Slam title tally at Roland Garros last month, and should he retain his title here this fortnight he will become the 4th man in the Open Era to win 4 Grand Slam titles aged 21 or under. Lajal, who is exactly one week younger than Alcaraz, is making his Grand Slam debut today and is bidding to become the 3rd man in history to defeat the defending champion in the 1st round at Wimbledon. He would also become the 2nd Estonian player in history to reach the men's singles 2nd round here.
- Jannik Sinner has enjoyed a successful start to his reign as world No. 1, with the Italian having won the title at Halle 2 weeks ago. While he is guaranteed to remain as the top player in the world regardless of his result at Wimbledon, he will be determined to claim a 2nd major title here – should he do so, he will become just the 2nd Italian player to win multiple Grand Slam singles titles after 2-time major winner Nicola Pietrangeli. Sinner's opponent today is Germany's Yannick Hanfmann – and the world No. 110 will hope for a better showing than in the pair's only previous meeting. Hanfmann managed to win just 5 games when the pair met in the 1st round at the 2023 US Open.
- On No. 2 Court, Stan Wawrinka begins his latest quest to complete the career Grand Slam with a match-up against British wild card Charles Broom. At 39 years old, Wawrinka is the oldest man to begin the men's singles draw here this year – and a victory today would see him become just the 10th man in the Open Era to win a Wimbledon singles match aged 39 or older. Broom, meanwhile, is aiming to continue the momentum from a successful grass court season which has seen him rise to a new career-high ranking and record his first 2 match-wins against Top 100 players.
- Australia's Alex Bolt has already enjoyed great success in London in recent days, and will hope for further success when he faces No. 8 seed Casper Ruud on No. 3 Court today. As an alternate into qualifying last week, Bolt recorded 2 straight-sets victories before recovering from 0-2 down to defeat Leandro Riedi in 5 sets to reach the main draw. He will be optimistic of recording a win against Ruud too – the 3-time Grand Slam finalist has won just 2 matches in 4 Wimbledon appearances.

NO. 1 JANNIK SINNER (ITA) v YANNICK HANFMANN (GER)

Head-to-head: Sinner leads 1-0

A 2nd meeting for Sinner and Hanfmann. Their previous meeting also came in the 1st round at a Grand Slam, with Sinner dropping just 5 games in their match at the US Open last year.

Sinner has never lost to a player ranked as low as No. 110 Hanfmann at a Grand Slam. The lowest-ranked player to have defeated Sinner at a Grand Slam is No. 67 Marton Fucsovics in the 2nd round at the 2020 Australian Open. The lowest-ranked player to have defeated Sinner at Wimbledon is No. 48 Fucsovics in the 1st round in 2021.

Sinner has lost Tour-level matches to players ranked as low as Hanfmann on 5 occasions – most recently at 2021 Stockholm, when he fell to No. 143 Andy Murray in the 2nd round.

- **SINNER** is bidding to reach the 2nd round here for the 3rd straight year. This is his 4th Wimbledon appearance and his 19th Grand Slam overall.
- Sinner has **lost in the 1st round at a Grand Slam on 4 occasions** – including once at Wimbledon, on his debut here in 2021 (l. Marton Fucsovics). He also lost in the 1st round as a qualifier on his Grand Slam debut at the 2019 US Open (l. Stan Wawrinka), and at the 2020 US Open (l. Karen Khachanov) and the 2021 Australian Open (l. Denis Shapovalov).
- Last year here, Sinner recorded his **best Wimbledon result** by reaching the semifinals (l. Novak Djokovic). It was his first appearance in a Grand Slam semifinal, having previously reached the quarterfinals at all 4 Grand Slam tournaments, including at Wimbledon in 2022 (l. Djokovic).
- Sinner won his **first Grand Slam title** at the 2024 Australian Open, recovering from 0-2 down to defeat Daniil Medvedev in 5 sets in the final. He became the 3rd Italian man to win a Grand Slam title – after Nicola Pietrangeli (1959, 1960 Roland Garros) and Adriano Panatta (1976 Roland Garros) – and the first Italian player to win an Australian Open singles title.
- Sinner is bidding to become the **2nd Italian player to win multiple Grand Slam singles titles**, after Pietrangeli. He is also bidding to become the first Italian player to win a Wimbledon singles title and the 2nd Italian player to reach a singles final here, after 2021 men's singles runner-up Matteo Berrettini.
- Sinner is bidding to become the **6th active player to win multiple Grand Slam men's singles titles** – after Carlos Alcaraz, Djokovic, Andy Murray, Rafael Nadal and Wawrinka. He would also become the 32nd player in the Open Era to win multiple Grand Slam men's singles titles.
- If Sinner wins his 2nd Grand Slam title on his 2nd Grand Slam appearance since winning his first, he will equal the **Open Era record for fewest attempts before winning a 2nd Grand Slam men's singles title**. In the Open Era, 7 players have won their 2nd Grand Slam singles titles on their 2nd appearances after winning their first – Alcaraz, Sergi Bruguera, Roger Federer, Jan Kodes, Murray, Stan Smith and Guillermo Vilas. No player has won their 2nd Grand Slam men's singles title on their first Grand Slam appearance after winning their first.

- **Elsewhere in Grand Slam play this year**, Sinner reached the semifinals at Roland Garros for the first time, falling to Carlos Alcaraz in 5 sets.
- Sinner is bidding to record his **51st Grand Slam match-win**. By defeating Grigor Dimitrov in the quarterfinals at Roland Garros last month for his 50th Grand Slam match-win, he became the 5th Italian man to record 50 match-wins at the Grand Slams – after Pietrangeli (94 Grand Slam match-wins), Fabio Fognini (who is bidding to record his 70th Grand Slam match-win today), Andreas Seppi (63) and Panatta (62).
- Prior to Wimbledon this year, Sinner won his **first grass court title** at Halle (d. Hubert Hurkacz). He became the 4th Italian man in history to win a Tour-level title on grass – after Berrettini (4 grass court titles), and Andreas Seppi and Lorenzo Sonog (both one).
- Sinner has won 4 Tour-level titles this season and leads the Tour for **most singles titles won in 2024**. In addition to his titles at the Australian Open and Halle, he also won the titles at Rotterdam (d. Alex de Minaur) and Miami-1000 (d. Grigor Dimitrov). He also reached the semifinals at Indian Wells-1000 (l. Alcaraz) and Monte Carlo-1000 (l. Stefanos Tsitsipas) and the quarterfinals at Madrid-1000, where he gave a walkover to Felix Auger-Aliassime due to a right hip injury.
- Sinner has won one of the last 5 **five-set matches** he has contested, with his only victory in a 5-set match in that time coming against Medvedev in the final at the Australian Open this year. He lost the only 5-set match he has contested at Wimbledon – in the quarterfinals in 2022, when he lost to Djokovic in 5 sets despite holding a 2-0 lead. He has a 6-7 win-loss record in 5-set matches overall.
- Sinner became the **first Italian player to reach the singles world No. 1 ranking** last month and plays here at the same ranking. By winning the title at Halle, he became the 8th man to win the title in his first event as world No. 1 since the ATP rankings were introduced in 1973. He is guaranteed to remain at No. 1 the week on Monday 15 July regardless of the outcome of this tournament.
- Sinner reached a **career-high junior ranking of No. 133** and did not contest the boys' singles events at any of the Grand Slam tournaments. His best result as a junior was reaching the quarterfinals as a wild card at the Grade A Trofeo Bonfiglio event in Milan in 2018 (l. Naoki Tajima).
- Sinner **led Italy to their 2nd Davis Cup title in 2023**, winning all 5 matches he played across singles and doubles at the Final 8 Knockout Stage in Malaga. He made his Davis Cup debut in 2021 and has an 11-4 overall win-loss record in the competition. As defending champions, Italy qualified automatically for the 2024 Davis Cup Finals Group Stage in September and will compete in Group A in Bologna alongside Netherlands, Belgium and Brazil.
- Sinner is coached by Simone Vagnozzi and Darren Cahill.
- **HANFMANN** is bidding to reach the 2nd round here for the first time and equal his best Grand Slam result. This is his 3rd Wimbledon appearance and his 14th Grand Slam overall.
- Hanfmann has **lost in the 1st round here on both his previous Wimbledon main draw appearances** – on his debut here in 2021 (l. Jiri Vesely) and last year, when he lost to Taylor Fritz in 5 sets. He also lost in qualifying here in 2017-19 and 2022.
- Hanfmann is bidding to **equal his best Grand Slam result**. He has reached the 2nd round at a Grand Slam on 2 occasions, as a qualifier at the 2022 Australian Open (d. Thanasi Kokkinakis, l. Rafael Nadal), and as a lucky loser at 2023 Roland Garros (d. Thiago Monteiro, l. Francisco Cerundolo).
- Hanfmann is bidding to end a **5-match Grand Slam losing streak**, having not recorded a Grand Slam match-win since his 2nd round finish at Roland Garros last year. He fell to Gael Monfils in the 1st round at the Australian Open and to Francisco Cerundolo in the 1st round at Roland Garros this year.
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Hanfmann reached the 2nd round at Stuttgart (d. Henri Squire, l. Frances Tiafoe) but lost in the 1st round at Mallorca (l. Adam Walton) and fell in qualifying at Halle, defeating Walton before falling to Alex Michelsen in the final round of qualifying.
- Hanfmann's **best results in 2024** are reaching the quarterfinals at Cordoba (l. Luciano Darderi) and the 3rd round at Miami-1000 (l. Grigor Dimitrov). They are only occasions where he has recorded back-to-back match-wins, at any level, this season.
- Hanfmann's **best Tour-level grass court result** is reaching the semifinals at 2023 Mallorca (l. Adrian Mannarino).

- Hanfmann is bidding to **defeat a Top 5 player for the 2nd time**. He has a 1-6 win-loss record against Top 5 players, with his only victory coming against No. 5 Stefanos Tsitsipas in the 2nd round at 2023 Mallorca. He has lost the only previous match he has played against a world No. 1 – to Novak Djokovic in the 2nd round at Geneva earlier this year.
- Hanfmann has lost the only **5-set match** he has contested at Wimbledon, falling to Fritz in the 1st round here last year. In the 2 other 5-set matches Hanfmann has contested, he lost to Rinky Hijikata in the 1st round at the 2023 Australian Open, despite holding a 2-0 lead, but defeated Monteiro in the 1st round at 2023 Roland Garros.
- Hanfmann reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 45 in July 2023. He plays here at No. 110.
- Hanfmann **made his Davis Cup debut for Germany** in 2017, but only made his 2nd appearance in a World Group I tie against Bosnia and Herzegovina in September last year. He holds a 1-1 win-loss record overall in the competition. Germany will compete in Zhuhai alongside Chile, Slovakia and USA in Group C at the 2024 Davis Cup Finals.
- Hanfmann is coached by Juan Pablo Brzezicki.

NO. 3 CARLOS ALCARAZ (ESP) v (Q) MARK LAJAL (EST)

Head-to-head: first meeting

Lajal (21 years 63 days) and Alcaraz (21 years 70 days) are, respectively, the 7th and 8th youngest players to start the men's singles main draw here this year. Despite being so close in age, the two men have never contested a match at either professional or junior level.

Alcaraz lost a Tour-level match to a player ranked as low as No. 269 Lajal once before – against No. 337 Alexander Erler in the 1st round at 2021 Kitzbuhel. The lowest-ranked player to have defeated Alcaraz at a Grand Slam is No. 95 Mikael Ymer in the 2nd round at the 2021 Australian Open.

Alcaraz is facing a qualifier at Wimbledon for the first time. He is bidding to maintain his perfect record against qualifiers at the Grand Slams, having won all 6 matches he has contested against qualifiers at the majors. He has an 18-4 win-loss record against qualifiers at Tour-level overall, with his last defeat to a qualifier coming against Roman Safiullin in the 2nd round at 2023 Paris-1000.

- Defending champion **ALCARAZ** is bidding to reach the 2nd round here for the 4th straight year. This is his 4th Wimbledon appearance and his 14th Grand Slam overall.
- Alcaraz is bidding to maintain his **record of always reaching the 2nd round at the Grand Slam tournaments**. His earliest defeats at the Grand Slams are 2nd round finishes on 2 occasions – as a qualifier on his Grand Slam debut at the 2021 Australian Open (d. Botic van de Zandschulp, l. Mikael Ymer) and as a wild card on his Wimbledon debut in 2021 (d. Yasutaka Uchiyama, l. Daniil Medvedev).
- Last year here, Alcaraz won his **first Wimbledon title**, defeating Novak Djokovic in 5 sets in the final. He became the 3rd Spanish man to win the title here – after Manuel Santana (1966) and Rafael Nadal (2008, 2010) – and, aged 20 years 72 days, became the 3rd-youngest player in the Open Era to win the men's singles title here, after Boris Becker (who won his first 2 Wimbledon titles aged 17 years 227 days in 1985 and aged 18 years 226 days in 1986) and Bjorn Borg (who won his first Wimbledon title aged 20 years 27 days in 1976).
- Alcaraz has **won 3 Grand Slam titles on 3 different surfaces**. He won his first Grand Slam title at the 2022 US Open (d. Casper Ruud) and won his most-recent Grand Slam title at 2024 Roland Garros (d. Alexander Zverev). He became the first man in the Open Era to win his first 3 Grand Slam titles on different surfaces and, aged 21 years 36 days, became the youngest man in the Open Era to win 3 Grand Slam titles on different surfaces.
- Alcaraz is bidding to become the **9th man in the Open Era to retain the Wimbledon title** – after Rod Laver, John Newcombe, Borg, John McEnroe, Becker, Pete Sampras, Roger Federer and Djokovic.
- Aged 21 years 70 days, Alcaraz is bidding to become the **3rd player in the Open Era to win multiple Wimbledon men's singles titles aged 21 or under** – after Becker and Borg. (NB ages calculated at the end of the tournament)
- Alcaraz is also bidding to win his **4th Grand Slam title and equal the Open Era record for most Grand Slam men's singles titles won aged 21 or under** – alongside Becker, Borg and Mats Wilander.
- **Elsewhere in Grand Slam play this year**, Alcaraz reached the quarterfinals at the Australian Open (l. Zverev).

- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Alcaraz reached the 2nd round as defending champion at Queen's (d. Francisco Cerundolo, l. Jack Draper). The defeat to Draper ended Alcaraz's 13-match winning streak on grass, with his last defeat on grass having come in the quarterfinals at 2022 Wimbledon, when he fell to Jannik Sinner.
- Alcaraz's **other highlights in 2024** are winning the title at Indian Wells-1000 (d. Medvedev) and reaching the semifinals at Buenos Aires (l. Nicolas Jarry) and the quarterfinals at Miami-1000 (l. Grigor Dimitrov) and Madrid-1000 (l. Andrey Rublev). He is one of 10 players to have won multiple Tour-level titles prior to Wimbledon this season.
- Alcaraz has won 9 of the 10 **five-set matches** he has contested, with his only defeat in a 5-set match coming against Matteo Berrettini in the 3rd round at the 2022 Australian Open. He became the first man in the Open Era to win the Roland Garros title after winning 5-set matches in both the semifinals and the final, defeating Sinner in the semifinals before defeating Zverev in the final. He has won all 3 five-set matches he has contested at Wimbledon.
- Aged 19 years 130 days, Alcaraz became the **youngest world No. 1 in history** after winning the title at the 2022 US Open. He has been ranked as world No. 1 for 36 weeks, most recently between June and September 2023. He plays here at No. 3.
- Alcaraz **led Spain to victory at the 2018 Junior Davis Cup Finals in Budapest**, defeating France in the title match. He reached a career-high junior ranking of No. 22 in January 2020 and his best performance in the junior events at the Grand Slams was his quarterfinal finish in the boys' singles here in 2019.
- Alcaraz has played **Davis Cup** for Spain since 2022 and has won 2 of the 3 matches he has contested in the competition. Spain were awarded a wild card for the 2024 Davis Cup Finals Group Stage and will compete in Group B in Valencia alongside Australia, Czechia and France.
- Alcaraz is coached by former world No. 1 Juan Carlos Ferrero, who reached the quarterfinals here in 2007 and 2009.
- Qualifier **LAJAL** is making his Grand Slam debut today.
- Lajal is bidding to become the **2nd Estonian man in history to reach the 2nd round at Wimbledon** – after Toomas Leius, who reached the 2nd round here on 6 occasions between 1960 and 1967. (NB Leius was Estonian-born but represented USSR throughout his career)
- Lajal is bidding to become the **5th Estonian man in history to reach the 2nd round at a Grand Slam** – after Leius (9 Grand Slam 2nd round appearances), Jurgen Zopp (3), Andres Vysand (2) and Kristian Lasn (one). (NB Vysand represented USSR prior to 1993 and later took German citizenship)
- Lajal defeated No. 25 seed Francesco Passaro (ITA) 57 63 63, Henrique Rocha (POR), 76(3) 63 and No. 4 seed James Duckworth (AUS) 64 64 64 in the 3 rounds of **Wimbledon qualifying last week**.
- By qualifying for the main draw here, Lajal has become the **5th Estonian man in history to compete in the singles draw at Wimbledon** – and first since Zopp, who lost in the 1st round on all 3 of his men's singles appearances here in 2012-14.
- Lajal **lost in the 1st round of qualifying on his 3 previous appearances in qualifying at the Grand Slams** – at the 2023 US Open (l. Filip Misolic) and at both the Australian Open (l. Hugo Grenier) and Roland Garros (l. Joris De Loore) this year.
- Lajal was **ranked too low to compete in Wimbledon qualifying last year**. He broke the Top 300 for the first time in April last year, and broke the Top 200 for the first time in November.
- Lajal is bidding to record his **3rd Tour-level match-win**. He has a 2-4 win-loss record at Tour-level with his first Tour-level victory coming on his Davis Cup debut for Estonia in a World Group II play-off tie against Pacific Oceania in March 2022, defeating Colin Sinclair, and his 2nd Tour-level victory coming in a 2nd round finish on his ATP Tour debut as a wild card at 2023 Antwerp (d. Jaume Munar, l. Arthur Fils). His 3 other Tour-level appearances came in Davis Cup action for Estonia.
- Lajal **mainly competes at Challenger-level**. His best results at Challenger-level this season are reaching the semifinals at the Shenzhen Challenger (CHN) (l. Lloyd Harris) and the quarterfinals at the Cherbourg Challenger (FRA) (l. Michael Geerts) and the Gwangju Challenger (KOR) (l. Ricardas Berankis).

- Lajal is contesting his **first Tour-level grass court match**. His only appearances on grass as a professional have come this season – he reached the 2nd round of qualifying at both the Surbiton Challenger (GBR) (d. Daniel Little, I. Gijs Brouwer) and the Nottingham Challenger (GBR) (d. Patrick Brady, I. Jacob Fearnley) prior to competing in Wimbledon qualifying last week.
- Lajal is **facing a Top 10 player for the first time**. The highest-ranked player Lajal has previously faced, at any level, is No. 38 Fils, whom he lost to in the 2nd round at 2023 Antwerp. The highest-ranked player that Lajal has defeated, at any level, is No. 78 James Duckworth in the final round of Wimbledon qualifying last week.
- Lajal was a **good junior**, reaching a career-high junior ranking of No. 13 in August 2021. He reached the 3rd round of the boys' singles at the 2021 US Open (l. Victor Lilov). He reached the 2nd round on his only appearance in the boys' singles here in 2021 (d. Mehdi Sadaoui, I. Matthew William Donald). In his only other appearance at junior level on grass, he reached the quarterfinals at 2021 J1 Roehampton (l. Shang Juncheng).
- Lajal **broke the Top 200 for the first time** in November 2023, reaching a career-high ranking of No. 191. He plays here at No. 269.
- Lajal made his **Davis Cup** debut for Estonia in a World Group II play-off tie against Pacific Oceania in March 2022 and has a 1-3 overall win-loss record in the competition. Estonia will play away against Uzbekistan in a World Group II tie in September.
- Lajal is coached by Thomas Le Boulch.

NO. 5 DANIL MEDVEDEV v ALEKSANDAR KOVACEVIC (USA)

Head-to-head: first meeting

Medvedev has lost Grand Slam matches to players ranked as low as No. 88 Kovacevic on 4 occasions. His first 3 Grand Slam defeats came against players ranked outside the Top 100 – to No. 131 Ernesto Escobedo in the 1st round at the 2017 Australian Open, to No. 266 Benjamin Bonzi in the 1st round at 2017 Roland Garros and to No. 124 Ruben Bemelmans in the 2nd round at 2017 Wimbledon. Since then, his only defeat to a player ranked as low as Kovacevic at the Grand Slams came against No. 172 Thiago Seyboth Wild in the 1st round at 2023 Roland Garros.

- **MEDVEDEV** is bidding to maintain his record of always reaching the 2nd round here. This is his 6th Wimbledon appearance and his 29th Grand Slam appearance overall.
- Last year here, Medvedev recorded his **best Wimbledon result** by reaching the semifinals (l. Carlos Alcaraz).
- Medvedev won his **first Grand Slam title** at the 2021 US Open, defeating Novak Djokovic in straight sets and ending both Djokovic's bid for the Grand Slam and his 27-match Grand Slam winning streak.
- Medvedev reached his **6th Grand Slam final** at the Australian Open this year, falling to Jannik Sinner in 5 sets despite holding a 2-0 lead. He has a 1-5 win-loss record in Grand Slam finals, having also finished runner-up at the US Open in 2019 (l. Rafael Nadal) and 2023 (l. Djokovic) and at the Australian Open in 2021 (l. Djokovic) and 2022 (l. Nadal).
- Medvedev is **bidding to win his 2nd Grand Slam title** at his 10th attempt. The longest period between winning a first and second Grand Slam title is set by Marat Safin, who took 14 attempts to win his second Grand Slam title (2005 Australian Open) after winning his first (2000 US Open).
- **Elsewhere in Grand Slam play this year**, Medvedev reached the round of 16 at Roland Garros (l. Alex de Minaur).
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Medvedev reached the 2nd round at Halle (d. Nuno Borges, l. Zhang Zhizhen).
- Medvedev's **best results in 2024** are runner-up finishes at the Australian Open and Indian Wells-1000 (l. Alcaraz). He also reached the semifinals at Dubai (l. Ugo Humbert) and Miami-1000 (l. Sinner) and the quarterfinals at Madrid-1000, where he retired against Jiri Lehecka due to a right hip injury.
- Medvedev has **won one Tour-level grass court title** – at 2021 Mallorca (d. Sam Querrey). Of his 19 other Tour-level titles, 18 have come on hard courts, with his only clay court title to date coming at Rome-1000 this year. His 20 titles have been won at 20 different events, which is a Tour-level record.
- Medvedev has won 4 of the last 5 **five-set matches** he has contested, with his only defeat in a 5-set match in that time coming in his most-recent 5-set match, against Sinner in the final at the Australian Open. Having won 3 five-set matches en route to the final at the Australian Open this year, he became the 12th man in the Open Era to contest 4 five-set matches at a single Grand Slam tournament. He has a 2-4 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Wimbledon and a 7-10 win-loss record in 5-set matches overall.

- Medvedev **became world No. 1** on 28 February 2022, becoming the first player other than the 'Big 4' (Djokovic, Roger Federer, Andy Murray and Rafael Nadal) to hold the top ranking since Andy Roddick in February 2004. He held the No. 1 ranking for 16 weeks during 2022 but is yet to return to the No. 1 ranking. He plays here at No. 5.
- Medvedev reached a career-high junior ranking of No. 13 in January 2014. His best performance in the boys' singles here was reaching the 2nd round in 2013 (d. Hong Seong Chan, I. Nikola Milojevic).
- Medvedev is coached by Gilles Cervara.
- **KOVACEVIC** is bidding to reach the 2nd round at a Grand Slam for the 2nd time on his Wimbledon debut. This is his 4th Grand Slam main draw appearance overall.
- **Last year here**, Kovacevic reached the final round of qualifying. He defeated Andrea Collarini and Jesper de Jong before falling to Enzo Couacaud. It was his first appearance in Wimbledon qualifying.
- Kovacevic's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the 2nd round as a qualifier at the Australian Open this year, where he defeated Alejandro Tabilo for his first Grand Slam match-win falling to Karen Khachanov. He lost in the 1st round on his 2 other Grand Slam main draw appearances – at Roland Garros in 2023 (I. Novak Djokovic) and this year (I. Grigor Dimitrov).
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Kovacevic fell in the 1st round of qualifying at both Queen's (I. Arthur Rinderknech) and Eastbourne (I. Henry Searle).
- Kovacevic is bidding to record his **first Tour-level match-win on grass**. He lost in the 1st round on his only previous Tour-level appearance on grass – at 2023 Newport (I. Jordan Thompson).
- Kovacevic's **best result in 2024** is reaching the quarterfinals as a qualifier at Los Cabos, where he defeated Brandon Holt and Rinky Hijikata before falling to Stefanos Tsitsipas. He has recorded 3 other Tour-level match-wins this season – in 2nd round finishes as a qualifier at the Australian Open, as a qualifier at Acapulco (d. Jordan Thompson, I. Holger Rune) and as a direct acceptance at Houston (d. Thanasi Kokkinakis, I. Thompson).
- Kovacevic is bidding to **defeat a Top 10 player for the first time on his 4th attempt**. He lost all 3 matches he has previously contested against Top 10 players – against No. 1 Djokovic in the 1st round at 2023 Roland Garros, No. 7 Rune in the 2nd round at Acapulco this year and No. 10 Dimitrov in the 1st round at Roland Garros this year. The highest-ranked player he has defeated is No. 13 Cameron Norrie in the 2nd round at 2023 Los Cabos.
- Kovacevic won the only **5-set match** he has contested, recovering from 1-2 down to defeat Tabilo in the 1st round at the Australian Open this year.
- Kovacevic reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 83 last month. He plays here at No. 86.
- Kovacevic **played college tennis**. He represented the University of Illinois from 2016 to 2021, earning All-American honours in 2019 and 2021.
- Kovacevic is coached by Dante Bottini.

NO. 8 CASPER RUUD (NOR) v (Q) ALEX BOLT (AUS)

Head-to-head: first meeting

Ruud has lost Tour-level matches to players ranked as low as No. 235 Bolt twice before, both during Davis Cup ties – to No. 983 Ugo Nastasi in 2016 and to No. 513 Fredrik Nielsen in 2017. The lowest-ranked player to have defeated Ruud at a Grand Slam is No. 142 Broady in the 2nd round here last year.

Ruud has won 6 of the 7 matches he has contested against qualifiers at the Grand Slams – including his only previous match against a qualifier at Wimbledon, in the 1st round against Laurent Lokoli last year. He has a 21-11 win-loss record against qualifiers at Tour-level overall.

Ruud has lost 2 of the 3 matches he has played against lefthanded players at Wimbledon. He defeated Albert Ramos-Vinolas in the 1st round before falling to Ugo Humbert in the 2nd round here in 2022 and also lost to Broady in the 2nd round here last year. He has a 4-6 win-loss record against lefthanded players at the Grand Slams and a 32-19 win-loss record against lefthanded players at Tour-level overall.

- **RUUD** is bidding to reach the 2nd round here for the 3rd time and equal his best Wimbledon result. This is his 5th Wimbledon appearance and his 23rd Grand Slam overall.
- **Last year here**, Ruud reached the 2nd round (d. Laurent Lokoli, l. Liam Broady). He also reached the 2nd round here in 2022 (d. Albert Ramos-Vinolas, l. Ugo Humbert) but lost in the 1st round on his 2 other appearances in the main draw here – in 2019 (l. John Isner) and 2021 (l. Jordan Thompson).
- Ruud is a **3-time Grand Slam finalist**. He became the first Norwegian player to reach a Grand Slam singles final at 2022 Roland Garros (l. Rafael Nadal), and also finished runner at the 2022 US Open (l. Carlos Alcaraz) and at 2023 Roland Garros (l. Novak Djokovic).
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Ruud reached the semifinals at Roland Garros (l. Alexander Zverev) but fell in the 3rd round at the Australian Open (l. Cameron Norrie).
- Ruud's **best results in 2024** are winning the titles at Barcelona (d. Stefanos Tsitsipas) and Geneva (d. Tomas Machac). He is one of 10 players to have won multiple Tour-level titles prior to Wimbledon this season. He also finished runner-up at Los Cabos (l. Jordan Thompson), Acapulco (l. Alex de Minaur) and Monte Carlo-1000 (l. Tsitsipas) and reached the semifinals at Estoril (l. Pedro Martinez) and the quarterfinals at Indian Wells-1000 (l. Tommy Paul).
- Ruud is bidding to record his **5th Tour-level match-win on grass** in his 11th Tour-level match on the surface. His only previous match-wins on grass came in a quarterfinal finish at 2021 Mallorca, when he defeated Gilles Simon and Tennys Sandgren before falling to Daniil Medvedev in the quarterfinals, and in his 2nd round finishes at Wimbledon in 2022 and 2023. He has lost in the 1st round of the 3 other grass court events he has played at Tour-level.
- Ruud is **one of 15 players in the men's singles draw not to compete on grass this season prior to Wimbledon**.
- Ruud has lost both **5-set matches** he has contested at Wimbledon – against Thompson in the 1st round in 2021 and against Broady in the 2nd round last year. He has a 8-6 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.

- Ruud reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 2 after his runner-up finish at the 2022 US Open last year. He plays here at No. 8.
- Ruud is a **former junior No. 1**. He reached the No. 1 ranking in January 2016 and is the only Norwegian player to have held the top junior ranking. He reached the 2nd round of the boys' singles here in 2015 (d. Jumpei Yamasaki, l. Alvaro Lopez San Martin) but fell in the 1st round of the boys' singles here in 2016 (l. Ulises Blanch).
- Ruud has played **Davis Cup** for Norway since 2015 and has a 25-9 overall win-loss record in the competition. Norway will host Portugal in a World Group I tie in September.
- Ruud is coached by his father, Christian Ruud, who lost in the 1st round on all 5 of his Wimbledon appearances in 1995-2000.
- Qualifier **BOLT** is bidding to reach the 2nd round here for the 2nd time and equal his best Wimbledon result. This is his 3rd Wimbledon main draw appearance and his 9th Grand Slam overall.
- As an alternate in **Wimbledon qualifying last week**, Bolt defeated Nicolas Kicker (ARG) 61 64, Rudolf Mollerer (GER) 61 64 and No. 32 seed Leandro Riedi (SUI) 67(2) 26 76(7) 75 64. He was one of 2 alternates to gain places in qualifying following the withdrawals of Valentin Vacherot and Calvin Hemery on Monday. It is the 2nd time he has successfully qualified at Wimbledon on his 5th attempt – having also qualified here in 2018 – and the 3rd time he has successfully qualified at a Grand Slam on his 20th attempt.
- **Last year here**, Bolt fell to Rinky Hijikata in the 1st round of qualifying. He also fell in qualifying here in 2014 and 2019.
- Bolt's **best Wimbledon result** is reaching the 2nd round as a wild card in 2021 (d. Filip Krajinovic, l. Cameron Norrie). He lost in the 1st round on his only other main draw appearance here – as a qualifier in 2018 (l. Kyle Edmund).
- Bolt's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the 3rd round as a wild card at the 2019 Australian Open, where he defeated Jack Sock and Gilles Simon before falling to Alexander Zverev.
- Bolt was **ranked too low to enter qualifying at the Australian Open and Roland Garros this year**. Prior to competing in qualifying here this year, his last appearance in qualifying at a Grand Slam came at Wimbledon last year and his last appearance in the main draw at a Grand Slam came as a wild card at the 2022 Australian Open, where he fell to Alejandro Davidovich Fokina in the 1st round.
- Bolt is making his **2nd Tour-level appearance of 2024**. His only previous appearance at Tour-level this season came as a qualifier at Adelaide, where he reached the 2nd round (d. Thiago Seyboth Wild, l. Tommy Paul).
- **Prior to competing at Wimbledon qualifying this year**, Bolt qualified for the main draw at both the Surbiton Challenger (GBR) and the Nottingham Challenger (GBR). He fell in the 1st round at Surbiton (l. Mackenzie McDonald) but reached the 2nd round at Nottingham (d. Jan Choinski, l. Shang Juncheng).
- Bolt has **competed mainly on the Challenger Tour and the ITF World Tennis Tour in 2024**. His best result on the Challenger Tour is finishing runner-up at the Burnie 1 Challenger (AUS) (l. Omar Jasika). His best results on the ITF World Tennis Tour are winning the titles at M25 Mildura (AUS) (d. Luke Saville) and M25 Swan Hill (AUS) (d. Rio Noguchi) and finishing runner-up at M25 Traralgon (AUS) (l. Li Tu).
- Bolt is bidding to record his **3rd Tour-level match-win on grass**. His only previous Tour-level match-wins on grass came in 2nd round finishes as a qualifier at both 2018 's-Hertogenbosch (d. Vasek Pospisil, l. McDonald) and 2018 Wimbledon.
- Bolt is bidding to **defeat a Top 10 player for the first time on his 3rd attempt**. He has lost both matches he has previously contested against Top 10 players – against No. 4 Zverev in the 3rd round at the 2019 Australian Open and against No. 5 Dominic Thiem in the 2nd round at the 2020 Australian Open. The highest-ranked player he has defeated, at any level, is No. 30 Simon in the 2nd round at the 2019 Australian Open.
- Bolt's 5-set victory against Riedi in the final round of qualifying here was his **first successful comeback from 0-2 down, at any level**. He has a 2-2 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level, all of which have taken place at the Australian Open.

- Bolt is one of **17 lefthanders** to begin the men's main draw here. The last lefthander to win the Wimbledon men's singles title is Rafael Nadal in 2010.
- Bolt reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 125 in March 2019. He plays here at No. 235.
- Bolt is coached by Rohan Williams.

- **DIMITROV** is bidding to reach the 2nd round here for the 10th time. This is his 14th Wimbledon appearance and his 55th Grand Slam appearance overall.
- **Last year here**, Dimitrov reached the round of 16 (l. Holger Rune). He has lost in the 1st round here on 3 occasions – in 2018 (l. Stan Wawrinka), 2019 (l. Corentin Moutet) and 2022, when he retired due to a left leg injury during his 1st round match against Steve Johnson.
- Dimitrov's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the semifinals on 3 occasions – including once at Wimbledon, in 2014 (l. Novak Djokovic). He also reached the semifinals at the 2017 Australian Open (l. Rafael Nadal) and the 2019 US Open (l. Daniil Medvedev).
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Dimitrov reached the quarterfinals at Roland Garros (l. Jannik Sinner) but fell in the 3rd round at the Australian Open (l. Nuno Borges). By reaching the quarterfinals at Roland Garros for the first time on his 14th attempt, he set the Open Era record for most Roland Garros men's singles appearances before reaching the quarterfinals. He also became the 54th player in the Open Era – and the 13th active player – to reach the men's singles quarterfinals at all 4 Grand Slam tournaments.
- Dimitrov is contesting **54th consecutive Grand Slam tournament** here this year, putting him in joint-6th place on the all-time list for most consecutive appearances in the men's singles at the Grand Slams, alongside Stefan Edberg. He owns the longest active streak of Grand Slam appearances, having contested the main draw at every Grand Slam tournament since the 2011 Australian Open.
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Dimitrov reached the 2nd round at Queen's (d. Adrian Mannarino, l. Sebastian Korda).
- Dimitrov's best result in 2024 is winning his **9th Tour-level title** – and his first since the 2017 ATP Finals – at Brisbane (d. Rune). He also finished runner-up at Marseille (l. Ugo Humbert) and Miami-1000 (l. Sinner) and reached the semifinals at Rotterdam (l. Alex de Minaur).
- Dimitrov has lost 2 of the 3 **five-set matches** that he has contested at Wimbledon – he defeated Alexandr Dolgoplov in 5 sets in the 3rd round here in 2014, but lost 5-set matches to Grega Zemlja in the 2nd round in 2013 and to Moutet in the 1st round in 2019. He has an 11-9 win-loss record in 5-set matches overall.
- Dimitrov's **best grass court performance** is winning the title at 2014 Queen's (d. Feliciano Lopez).
- Dimitrov reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 3 after winning the title at the 2017 ATP Finals (d. David Goffin). He returned to the Top 10 for the first time since November 2018 in April this year and plays here at No. 10.

- Dimitrov is **one of 5 former Wimbledon boys' singles champions** to begin the men's main draw here this year. He won the boys' singles titles here (d. Henri Kontinen) and at the US Open (d. Devin Britton) in 2008 and finished the year at No. 3 in the ITF Junior Rankings.

- Dimitrov is coached by Daniel Vallverdu and Jamie Delgado.
- **LAJOVIC** is bidding to reach the 2nd round here for the 5th time and equal his best Wimbledon result. This is his 10th Wimbledon appearance and 41st Grand Slam overall.
- **Last year here**, Lajovic fell to Jan Choinski in the 1st round. He has lost in the 1st round on 5 of his 9 previous appearances at Wimbledon.
- Lajovic's **best Wimbledon result** is reaching the 2nd round on 4 occasions – in 2014 (d. Guillermo Garcia-Lopez, I. Lukasz Kubot), 2017 (d. Stefanos Tsitsipas, I. Roger Federer), 2021 (d. Gilles Simon, I. Daniel Evans) and 2022 (d. Pablo Carreno Busta, I. Alexander Bublik).
- Lajovic's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the round of 16 on 2 occasions – at 2014 Roland Garros (I. Rafael Nadal) and at the 2021 Australian Open (I. Alexander Zverev).
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Lajovic reached the 2nd round at Roland Garros (d. Roman Safiullin, I. Taylor Fritz) but fell in the 1st round at the Australian Open (I. Giulio Zeppieri). His victory against Safiullin in the 1st round at Roland Garros ended a 7-match losing streak at the Grand Slams, having not previously recorded a Grand Slam match-win since reaching the 2nd round here in 2022.
- Lajovic's **best result in 2024** is reaching the semifinals at Barcelona (I. Tsitsipas). He also reached the quarterfinals at Buenos Aires (I. Facundo Diaz Acosta) and Rio (I. Francisco Cerundolo). He is one of 15 players in the men's singles draw not to compete on grass this season, at any level, prior to Wimbledon.
- Lajovic is **bidding to defeat a Top 10 player at a Grand Slam for the first time**. He has lost all 8 matches he has contested against Top 10 players at the Grand Slams. The highest-ranked player he has defeated at a Grand Slam is No. 20 Carreno Busta, who retired due to a right leg injury in the pair's 1st round match here in 2022. He has a 10-27 win-loss record against Top 10 players at Tour-level overall.
- Lajovic has won 2 of the 3 **five-set matches** he has contested at Wimbledon – he recorded 5-set victories against both Garcia Lopez in the 1st round in 2014 and Simon in the 1st round in 2021 but fell to Dustin Brown in 5 sets in the 1st round here in 2016. He has a 5-12 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Lajovic has **won 2 Tour-level titles** – both on clay, at 2019 Umag (d. Attila Balazs) and 2023 Banja Luka (d. Andrey Rublev).
- Lajovic reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 23 in April 2019. He plays here at No. 56.
- Lajovic has played **Davis Cup** for Serbia since 2012 and has a 13-12 win-loss record in the competition. Serbia will host Greece in a 2024 World Group I tie in September.
- Lajovic is coached by Jose Perlas.

- **PAUL** is bidding to reach the 2nd round here for the 3rd consecutive year. This is his 3rd Wimbledon appearance and his 20th Grand Slam overall.
- **Last year here**, Paul reached the 3rd round. He defeated Shintaro Mochizuki and Milos Raonic before falling to Jiri Lehecka in 5 sets.
- Paul's **best Wimbledon result** is reaching the round of 16 on his debut here in 2022, when he defeated Fernando Verdasco, Adrian Mannarino and Jiri Vesely before falling to Cameron Norrie.
- Paul's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the semifinals at the 2023 Australian Open (l. Novak Djokovic). He is the only American man to have reached the semifinals at the Australian Open since Andy Roddick in 2009.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Paul reached the 3rd round at both the Australian Open (l. Miomir Kecmanovic) and Roland Garros (l. Francisco Cerundolo).
- Prior to Wimbledon this year, Paul **won his first grass court title** at Queen's, defeating Lorenzo Musetti in the final. He became the 8th American man in the Open Era to win the title at Queen's and the first since Sam Querrey in 2010. He also reached the quarterfinals at 's-Hertogenbosch (l. Sebastian Korda) but withdrew from Eastbourne due to fatigue.
- Paul is bidding to become the **9th man in the Open Era to win the title at Queen's and Wimbledon in the same year** – after John McEnroe (1981, 1984), Jimmy Connors (1982), Boris Becker (1985), Pete Sampras (1995, 1999), Lleyton Hewitt (2002), Rafael Nadal (2008), Andy Murray (2013, 2016) and Carlos Alcaraz (2023).
- Paul is bidding to become **the first American man to win multiple Tour-level titles on grass in the same year since 1999**, when Sampras won the titles at both Queen's and Wimbledon.
- Paul's **other highlights in 2024** are winning the title at Dallas (d. Marcos Giron), finishing runner-up at Delray Beach (l. Taylor Fritz), reaching the semifinals at Indian Wells-1000 (l. Daniil Medvedev) and Rome-1000 (l. Nicolas Jarry) and reaching the quarterfinals at Adelaide (l. Jack Draper). He is one of 10 players to have won multiple Tour-level titles prior to Wimbledon this season.
- Paul lost the only **5-set match** he has contested at Wimbledon, against Lehecka in the 3rd round last year. He has a 6-5 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.

- Paul broke the Top 20 for the first time in January 2023 and reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 12 in October 2023. He plays here one place lower at No. 13.
- Paul is one of **5 seeded American men** here – USA has more seeded players in the draw than any other nation.
- Paul had a **successful junior career**. He won the 2015 Roland Garros boys' singles title (d. Fritz), finished runner-up in the boys' singles at the 2015 US Open (l. Fritz) and reached a career-high junior ranking of No. 3 in September 2015. He reached the quarterfinals on his only appearance in the boys' singles here in 2016 (l. Patrik-Niklas Salminen).
- Paul made his **Davis Cup** debut in 2020 for USA and has a 5-4 win-loss record in the competition. USA defeated Ukraine in the Qualifiers in February to reach the 2024 Davis Cup Finals and will compete in Group C in Zhuhai alongside Germany, Slovakia and Chile.
- Paul is coached by Brad Stine.
- **MARTINEZ** is bidding to reach the 2nd round here for the 2nd time. This is his 3rd Wimbledon appearance and his 16th Grand Slam overall.
- **Last year here**, Martinez lost to Hamad Medjedovic in the 1st round of qualifying. In his most-recent appearance in the main draw here in 2022 he fell to Alex Molcan in the 1st round.
- Martinez's **best Wimbledon result** is reaching the 3rd round on his debut here in 2021. He defeated Stefano Travaglia and Gael Monfils before falling to Cristian Garin.
- Martinez's best **Grand Slam result** is reaching the 3rd round on 3 occasions. In addition to his 3rd round finish here in 2021, he also reached the 3rd round at 2020 Roland Garros (l. Sebastian Korda) and the 2021 Australian Open (l. Dusan Lajovic).
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Martinez reached the 2nd round at Roland Garros (d. Thiago Tirante, l. Andrey Rublev) but fell to Francesco Passaro in the 1st round of qualifying at the Australian Open.
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Martinez fell in the 1st round at both Halle (l. Christopher Eubanks) and Mallorca (l. Luciano Darderi).
- Martinez is bidding to record his **4th Tour-level match-win on grass**. Other than his 2 victories en route to a 3rd round finish here in 2021, his only Tour-level match-win came in a 2nd round finish at 2021 Eastbourne (d. Alejandro Davidovich Fokina, l. Ryan Peniston).
- Martinez's **best Tour-level result in 2024** is finishing runner-up at Estoril (l. Hubert Hurkacz). He also reached the semifinals at Santiago (l. Sabastian Baez) and the quarterfinals at Bucharest (l. Gregoire Barrere).
- Also in 2024, Martinez **won his 6th title at Challenger-level** – at the Girona Challenger (ESP) (d. Radu Albot). He has finished runner-up at 2 other Challenger-level events this season – at the Tenerife 1 Challenger (ESP) (l. Brandon Nakashima) and the Bordeaux Challenger (FRA) (l. Arthur Fils).
- Martinez is **bidding to defeat a Top 20 player at a Grand Slam for the 2nd time**. He has a 1-7 win-loss record against Top 20 players at the Grand Slams, with his only victory coming against No. 13 Monfils in the 2nd round here in 2021.
- Martinez has **won one of the last 16 matches he has contested against Top 20 players**. His only victory against a Top 20 player in that time came against No. 8 Casper Ruud in the semifinals at Estoril this year. He has a 3-21 win-loss record against Top 20 players at Tour-level overall.
- Martinez has won 2 of the 4 **five-set matches** he has contested – against James Duckworth in the 1st round at the 2021 US Open and against Tirante in the 1st round at Roland Garros this year. He has never played a 5-set match at Wimbledon.
- Martinez has **won one Tour-level title** – on clay at 2022 Santiago (d. Baez).
- Martinez reached a career-high ranking of No. 40 in May 2022. He plays here at No. 49.

- Martinez was a **good junior**. He was a member of the Spanish team which defeated Germany to win the 2013 Junior Davis Cup and reached a career-high junior ranking of No. 16 in January 2015. He reached the 2nd round on his only appearance in the boys' singles here in 2014 (d. Hong Seongchan, l. Stefan Kozlov).
- Martinez made his **Davis Cup** debut during Spain's victory over Romania in the 2022 Qualifiers and also competed at the 2022 Davis Cup Finals Group Stage. He has a 2-2 win-loss record in the competition but is yet to contest a Davis Cup singles match. Spain were awarded a wild card for the 2024 Davis Cup Finals Group Stage and will compete in Group B in Valencia alongside Australia, Czechia and France.
- Martinez is currently without a permanent coach.

NO. 14 BEN SHELTON (USA) v (Q) MATTIA BELLUCCI (ITA)

Head-to-head: first meeting

Shelton is facing a qualifier at a Grand Slam for the 3rd time. He has a 1-1 win-loss record against qualifiers at the Grand Slams, having lost to Nuno Borges in the 1st round at the 2022 US Open on his Grand Slam debut, but defeated Nicolas Jarry in the 2nd round at the 2023 Australian Open. He has a 5-6 win-loss record against qualifiers at Tour-level overall.

Shelton has lost Tour-level matches to players ranked as low as No. 148 Bellucci on 3 occasions – to Shang Juncheng (then-ranked No. 156) in the 1st round at 2023 Atlanta, to Shang (then-ranked No. 149) in the 2nd round at 2023 Washington, and to No. 289 Paul Jubb in the quarterfinals at Mallorca last week.

Shelton and Bellucci are 2 of the 18 lefthanders to begin this year's Wimbledon men's singles main draw. This is one of 2 matches between lefthanded players in the men's singles 1st round here, alongside Cameron Norrie's match against Facundo Diaz Acosta. Rafael Nadal was the last lefthander to win the title here in 2010.

Shelton is bidding to defeat a lefthanded player at Tour-level for the 2nd time. He lost his first 5 Tour-level matches against lefthanded players before defeating Hugo Gaston in the 1st round at Roland Garros this year for his first Tour-level victory against a fellow lefthander. Bellucci is facing a lefthanded player at Tour-level for the first time.

- Shelton's father, Bryan Shelton, reached a career-high ranking of No. 55 in March 1992. He made 6 appearances at Wimbledon, reaching the round of 16 in 1994.
- Shelton is coached by his father, Bryan Shelton, and Dean Goldfine.
- Qualifier **BELLUCCI** is bidding to record his first Tour-level match-win on his Wimbledon debut.
- Bellucci defeated No. 31 seed Duje Adjukovic (CRO) 57 75 76(12), Bernabe Zapata Miralles (ESP) 76(3) 63 and No. 9 seed David Goffin (BEL) 63 26 76(4) 64 in the **3 rounds of Wimbledon qualifying last week**. It was the 3rd time he has successfully qualified at a Grand Slam on his 7th appearance in qualifying.
- **Last year here**, on his only previous appearance in Wimbledon qualifying, Bellucci reached the final round of qualifying. He defeated Ivan Gakhov and Raphael Collignon before falling to Dominic Stricker.
- Bellucci is making his **3rd Grand Slam main draw appearance**. He made his Grand Slam debut as a qualifier at the 2023 Australian Open, where he fell to Benjamin Bonzi in the 1st round of the main draw. He also qualified at Roland Garros this year, falling to Frances Tiafoe in the 1st round of the main draw. Those are his only previous Tour-level appearances.
- **Elsewhere in Grand Slam play this year**, Bellucci reached the 2nd round of qualifying at the Australian Open (d. Jozef Kovalik, l. Emilio Nava).

- Bellucci is coached by Fabio Chiappini and Paolo Moretti

- Humbert made his **Davis Cup** debut for France against Hungary in the 2023 Qualifiers, and has a 4-1 win-loss record in the competition. France will compete in Valencia alongside Australia, Czechia and Spain in Group B at the 2024 Davis Cup Finals.
- Humbert is coached by Jeremy Chardy, who reached the round of 16 at Wimbledon in 2014.
- **SHEVCHENKO** is bidding to reach the 2nd round here for the first time and equal his best Grand Slam result. This is his 2nd Wimbledon appearance and 6th Grand Slam overall.
- **Last year here**, on his Wimbledon debut, Shevchenko fell to Adrian Mannarino in the 1st round.
- Shevchenko's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the 2nd round on 2 occasions – at Roland Garros in 2023 (d. Oscar Otte, l. Lorenzo Musetti) and this year (d. Aslan Karatsev, l. Corentin Moutet).
- **Elsewhere in Grand Slam play this year**, Shevchenko fell to Jaume Munar in the 1st round at the Australian Open.
- **Prior to Wimbledon this season**, Shevchenko reached the 2nd round at Mallorca, where he defeated Constant Lestienne for his first Tour-level match-win on grass before falling to Alejandro Tabilo. He also attempted to qualify at Halle but fell to Max Purcell in the 1st round of qualifying.

- Shapovalov's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the semifinals here in 2021. He defeated 2-time champion Andy Murray and recorded 5-set victories against both Philipp Kohlschreiber and Karen Khachanov before falling to Novak Djokovic in the last 4.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Shapovalov has reached the 3rd round at Roland Garros (l. Hubert Hurkacz), but fell in the 1st round at the Australian Open (l. Jakub Mensik).

An 8th meeting for Mannarino and Monfils, their 4th at a Grand Slam and their 4th on grass. Monfils leads both the overall head-to-head (5-2) and the head-to-head at the Grand Slams (2-1), but Mannarino leads the head-to-head on grass (2-1), with both of his victories against Monfils coming on grass. The pair's first 2 meetings came at Wimbledon in 2015 and 2017.

Mannarino and Monfils are 2 of the 14 Frenchmen starting the men's main draw here this year. France has the most players of any nation in the men's singles draw at Wimbledon this year.

This match is one of 2 all-French match-ups in the men's singles 1st round here this year – alongside the match between Alexandre Muller and Hugo Gaston, which also takes place today. These are the 49th and 50th all-French men's singles matches at Wimbledon in the Open Era. They are the 210th and 211th all-French men's singles matches at the Grand Slams in the Open Era.

Mannarino is facing a Frenchman at Wimbledon for the 4th time. In addition to his 2 matches against Monfils here, he fell to Marc Gicquel in the 1st round on his debut here in 2009. He has a 2-6 win-loss record against French players at the Grand Slams and a 24-30 win-loss record against French players at Tour-level overall.

Monfils is facing a Frenchman at Wimbledon for the 7th time. He has a 2-4 win-loss record against French players here, a 17-7 win-loss record against French players at the Grand Slams and a 63-35 win-loss record against French players at Tour-level overall.

Monfils is facing a lefthanded player at Wimbledon for the 5th time. In addition to his 2 matches against Mannarino here, he also fell to Jiri Vesely in the 2nd round in 2014 and to Ugo Humbert in the 1st round in 2019. He has a 17-6 win-loss record against lefthanded players at the Grand Slams – but 3 of his 6 defeats have come at Wimbledon. He has a 61-47 win-loss record against lefthanded players at Tour-level overall.

Mannarino (36 years 15 days) and Monfils (37 years 317 days) are 2 of the 7 players aged 35 or older to begin the men's singles here this year. At 73 years 332 days, this is the oldest match-up in terms of combined age in the 1st round at Wimbledon this year. (NB ages calculated at the end of the tournament).

Mannarino and Monfils have both played Davis Cup for France, but have never been on the Davis Cup team at the same time. Monfils made his Davis Cup debut in 2009, was a member of the team which finished as runners-up to Switzerland in 2014 and has a 12-3 win-loss record in the competition. His last Davis Cup appearance came at the 2019 Finals. Mannarino made his Davis Cup debut in 2018, has competed at the Davis Cup Finals for France for the last 3 years and has an 8-2 win-loss record in the competition.

- Lefthander **MANNARINO** is bidding to reach the 2nd round here for the 10th time. This is his 13th Wimbledon appearance and 57th Grand Slam overall.
- **Last year here**, Mannarino reached the 2nd round (d. Alexander Shevchenko, I. Daniil Medvedev).
- Mannarino's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the round of 16 on 5 occasions, including 3 times at Wimbledon – in 2013 (I. Lukasz Kubot), 2017 (I. Novak Djokovic) and 2018 (I. Roger Federer). He also reached the round of 16 at the Australian Open in 2022 (I. Rafael Nadal) and this year (I. Djokovic).
- **Elsewhere in Grand Slam play this year**, Mannarino fell in the 1st round at Roland Garros (I. Giulio Zeppieri).
- Mannarino is contesting his **46th consecutive Grand Slam event**. He is in 2nd place on the list of longest active streaks of Grand Slam men's singles appearances – after Grigor Dimitrov, who is contesting his 54th consecutive Grand Slam tournament here. Mannarino has competed at every Grand Slam tournament since the 2013 Australian Open.
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Mannarino reached the 2nd round at 's-Hertogenbosch (d. Stefano Napolitano, I. Gijs Brouwer) but lost his opening match at both Queen's (I. Dimitrov) and Mallorca (I. Alex Michelsen).
- Mannarino's **best result in 2024** is reaching the semifinals at Dallas, where he received a bye through the 1st round, received a walkover against Yoshihito Nishioka in the 2nd round, was leading James Duckworth 62 3-1 in the quarterfinals when Duckworth retired, and lost to Marcos Giron in the semifinals.
- Mannarino is bidding to record his **9th Tour-level match-win in 2024**. In addition to his 3 match-wins en route to the round of 16 at the Australian Open and his victory against Duckworth at Dallas, he has won just 4 other Tour-level matches this season – against Italy's Lorenzo Sonego at the United Cup, against Chinese Taipei's Wu Tung-Lin at the Davis Cup Qualifiers, against Tomas Machac in the 2nd round at Indian Wells-1000 after receiving a bye in the 1st round, and in his 2nd round finish at 's-Hertogenbosch. He has lost 10 of his last 11 matches at all levels.
- Mannarino is one of **17 lefthanders** who started the men's singles draw here this year. Nadal was the last lefthander to win the title here in 2010.
- Mannarino has won 11 of the last 12 **five-set matches** he has contested. Since falling to Andy Murray in 5 sets in the 2nd round at the 2015 US Open, his only defeat in a 5-set match came against Federer here in 2021, when he retired after the first point of the 5th set due to a right knee injury. At the Australian Open this year, he became the first player to win his opening 3 matches at the Australian Open in 5 sets since Dominik Hrbaty in 2006. He has a 5-2 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Wimbledon and a 14-4 win-loss record in 5-set matches overall.
- Mannarino has **won 5 Tour-level titles**, including 2 on grass – at 2019 's-Hertogenbosch (d. Jordan Thompson) and at 2023 Newport (d. Michelsen). He has also reached 3 further Tour-level finals on grass – at Antalya in 2017 (I. Yuichi Sugita) and 2018 (I. Damir Dzumhur) and at 2023 Mallorca (I. Christopher Eubanks).
- Mannarino **broke the Top 20 for the first time** after reaching the round of 16 at the Australian Open this year, when he rose to a career-high ranking of No. 17. He plays here at No. 24.
- Mannarino is coached by Erwann Tortuyaux.
- **MONFILS** is bidding to reach the 2nd round here for the 10th time. This is his 13th Wimbledon appearance and his 63rd Grand Slam overall.
- Monfils is making his **first appearance here since 2021**, when he reached the 2nd round (d. Christopher O'Connell, I. Pedro Martinez). He withdrew from the 2022 event with a foot injury and from the 2023 event with a wrist injury.
- Monfils has **lost in the 1st round at Wimbledon on 3 occasions** – in 2006 (I. Igor Kunitsyn), 2016 (I. Jeremy Chardy) and in 2019, when he retired due to a left ankle injury while trailing Ugo Humbert 67(6) 36 64 75 3-0 in the 1st round.
- Monfils' **best Wimbledon result** is reaching the round of 16 in 2018, when he defeated Richard Gasquet, Paolo Lorenzi and Sam Querrey before falling to Kevin Anderson.
- Monfils' **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the semifinals on 2 occasions. He reached the last 4 at 2008 Roland Garros – where, ranked No. 59, he lost to Roger Federer – and at the 2016 US Open (I. Novak Djokovic).

- Monfils is bidding to record his 123rd Grand Slam match-win and extend his **all-time record for most Grand Slam match-wins by a Frenchman**. He claimed sole ownership of the record, ahead of Jo-Wilfried Tsonga (121 Grand Slam match-wins), by defeating Thiago Seyboth Wild in the 1st round at Roland Garros this year.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Monfils reached the 2nd round at both the Australian Open (d. Yannick Hanfmann, I. Tomas Martin Etcheverry) and Roland Garros (d. Seyboth Wild, I. Lorenzo Musetti).
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Monfils reached the semifinals at Mallorca, defeating Dominic Thiem, Roberto Carballes Baena and Roberto Bautista Agut before falling to Alejandro Tabilo. It was his first grass court appearance, at any level, since 2021 Wimbledon.
- Monfils' **other highlights in 2024** are reaching the semifinals at Doha (I. Jakub Mensik) and the round of 16 at Indian Wells-1000 (I. Casper Ruud).
- Monfils has **reached one Tour-level final on grass** – finishing runner-up at 2017 Eastbourne (I. Novak Djokovic).
- Monfils has won one of the 6 **five-set matches** he has contested at Wimbledon. After losing the first 5 five-set matches he contested here, he defeated O'Connell in 5 sets in the 1st round in 2021. He has a 19-19 win-loss record in 5-set matches overall.
- Wimbledon is Monfils' **weakest Grand Slam event** in terms of matches won. He has a 17-12 win-loss record here, compared to 39-16 at Roland Garros, 34-18 at the Australian Open and 32-15 at the US Open.
- Monfils reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 6 in November 2016. He dropped out of the Top 100 for the first time since May 2013 in January 2023, before returning to the Top 100 in October last year, and then returned to the Top 50 in March this year. He plays here at No. 33.
- Monfils narrowly **missed out on achieving the Junior Grand Slam** in 2004 after winning the Australian Open, Roland Garros and Wimbledon. His preparation for the Junior US Open that year was hampered by a knee injury and he lost in the 3rd round to Viktor Troicki. He was named 2004 ITF Junior World Champion. Monfils is one of 5 former Wimbledon junior singles champions to start in the men's main draw this year.
- Monfils is coached by Mikael Tillstrom.

- **TIAFOE** is bidding to reach the 2nd round here for the 6th time. This is his 7th Wimbledon appearance and his 33rd Grand Slam overall.
- **Last year here**, Tiafoe reached the 3rd round. He defeated Wu Yibing and Dominic Stricker before falling to Grigor Dimitrov. He has lost in the 1st round on one of his previous 6 appearances here – in 2019, when he fell to Fabio Fognini in 5 sets.
- Tiafoe's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the semifinals at the 2022 US Open, where he fell to Carlos Alcaraz in 5 sets. He became the first American man to reach the semifinals at the US Open since Andy Roddick in 2009.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Tiafoe reached the 2nd round at both the Australian Open (d. Borna Coric, l. Tomas Machac) and Roland Garros (d. Mattia Bellucci, l. Denis Shapovalov).
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Tiafoe reached the quarterfinals at Stuttgart, where he received a bye through the 1st round and defeated Yannick Hanfmann in the 2nd round before falling to Jack Draper. He also competed at Queen's, where he retired due to a right hip injury during his 1st round match against Rinky Hijikata.
- Tiafoe's **best result in 2024** is finishing runner-up at Houston (l. Ben Shelton). He also reached the semifinals at Delray Beach (l. Tommy Paul) and the quarterfinals at Hong Kong (l. Shang Juncheng), Dallas (l. Marcos Giron).
- Tiafoe has lost all 3 **five-set matches** he has contested at Wimbledon – to Khachanov in the 3rd round in 2018, to Fognini in the 1st round in 2019 and to Goffin in the round of 16 in 2022. He has a 5-12 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Tiafoe reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 10 in June 2023. He plays here at No. 29.
- Tiafoe is **one of 5 seeded American men here** – USA has more seeded players in the men's singles draw here than any other nation.
- Tiafoe had a **successful junior career**. Aged just 15, he won the 2013 Orange Bowl (d. Stefan Kozlov), becoming the youngest boys' singles winner in the event's history. He also reached the boys' singles semifinals at the 2014 US Open (l. Quentin Halys) and achieved a career-high junior ranking of No. 2. He reached the 3rd round on his only appearance in the boys' singles here in 2014 (l. Noah Rubin).
- Tiafoe made his **Davis Cup** debut in September 2018 and has a 1-3 win-loss record in the competition. USA defeated Ukraine in the Qualifiers in February to reach the 2024 Davis Cup Finals and will compete in Group C in Zhuhai alongside Germany, Slovakia and Chile.
- Tiafoe is coached by Jordi Arconada.

- **ARNALDI** is bidding to reach the 2nd round here for the first time. This is his 2nd Wimbledon appearance and his 6th Grand Slam overall.
- **Last year here**, as a qualifier on his Wimbledon debut, Arnaldi fell to Roberto Carballes Baena in the 1st round of the main draw. Of his 5 Grand Slam main draw appearances, it is the only time he has failed to reach the 2nd round.
- Arnaldi's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the round of 16 on 2 occasions – at the US Open last year (l. Carlos Alcaraz) and at Roland Garros this year (l. Stefanos Tsitsipas).
- **Elsewhere in Grand Slam play this year**, Arnaldi reached the 2nd round at the Australian Open (d. Adam Walton, l. Alex de Minaur).
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Arnaldi reached the 2nd round at Queen's, where he defeated Ugo Humbert for his first Tour-level match-win on grass before falling to Rinky Hijikata.
- Arnaldi's **best results in 2024** are reaching the quarterfinals at Brisbane (l. Roman Safiullin) and Barcelona (l. Casper Ruud) and the round of 16 at Miami-1000 (l. Tomas Machac) and Roland Garros.
- Arnaldi won the only **5-set match** he has contested to date – against Arthur Fils in the 2nd round at the 2023 US Open.
- Arnaldi reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 34 in June this year and plays here one place lower at No. 35.
- Arnaldi reached a **career-high junior ranking** of No. 22 in May 2019. He lost in the 1st round on his only appearance in the boys' singles here in 2019 (l. Arthur Fery).
- Arnaldi was a member of the **Italian team which won their 2nd Davis Cup title in 2023**. He made his debut in the competition at the 2023 Finals Group Stage in September and has won 3 of the 4 Davis Cup singles matches he has contested, including a victory against Australia's Popyrin in the opening match of the final. As defending champions, Italy qualified automatically for the 2024 Davis Cup Finals Group Stage in September and will compete in Group A in Bologna alongside Netherlands, Belgium and Brazil.
- Arnaldi is coached by Alessandro Petrone.

- **BERRETTINI** is bidding to maintain his record of always reaching the 2nd round here. This is his 5th Wimbledon appearance and his 21st Grand Slam overall.
- **Last year here**, Berrettini reached the round of 16, defeating Lorenzo Sonego, Alex de Minaur, and Alexander Zverev, before falling to Carlos Alcaraz.
- Berrettini's became the **first Italian man in history to contest the final at Wimbledon in 2021**, falling to Novak Djokovic in 4 sets. He also became the first Italian man to reach a Grand Slam final since Adriano Panatta at 1976 Roland Garros.
- Berrettini has **not contested a Grand Slam event this year**, having withdrawn from the Australian Open due to a right foot injury and from Roland Garros in order to prepare for the grass court season.
- Prior to Wimbledon, Berrettini reached his **6th Tour-level final on grass** at Stuttgart (l. Jack Draper). He also reached the 2nd round at Halle (d. Alex Michelsen, l. Marcos Giron).
- Berrettini's best Tour-level result in 2024 is winning his **8th Tour-level title**, and first since 2022, at Marrakech (d. Roberto Carballes Baena). He also reached the final at the Phoenix Challenger (USA) (l. Nuno Borges).
- Berrettini has **won 4 Tour-level titles on grass** – at Stuttgart in 2019 (d. Felix Auger-Aliassime) and 2022 (d. Andy Murray), and at Queen's in 2021 Queen's (d. Cameron Norrie) and 2022 (d. Filip Krajinovic). He is one of 7 players competing here this year to have won multiple Tour-level titles on grass. His 4 other titles have come on clay.
- Berrettini has won the 7 of the 9 **five-set matches** he has contested – including both 5-set matches he has contested at Wimbledon, defeating Jack Sock in the 1st round in 2018 and Diego Schwartzman in the 3rd round in 2019. His only defeats in 5-set matches came at the Australian Open – against Tennys Sandgren in the 2nd round in 2020 and against Murray in the 1st round in 2023.
- Berrettini reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 6 in January 2022 after reaching the semifinals at the Australian Open. He fell outside the Top 100 for the first time since May 2018 in January this year, before returning to the Top 100 in April. He plays here at No. 59.

- Berrettini made his **Davis Cup** debut in 2019 and has a 5-4 overall win-loss record in the competition. Due to injury, he was not part of the Italian team that won the Davis Cup title in 2023. As defending champions, Italy qualified automatically for the 2024 Davis Cup Finals Group Stage in September and will compete in Group A in Bologna alongside Netherlands, Belgium and Brazil.
- Berrettini is coached by Francisco Roig and Umberto Rianna.
- **FUCSOVICS** is bidding to reach the 2nd round here for the 4th time. This is his 7th Wimbledon appearance and his 29th Grand Slam overall.
- **Last year here**, Fucsovics reached the 3rd round, defeating Tallon Griekspoor and Marcos Giron before falling to Daniil Medvedev. He has lost in the 1st round here on 3 occasions – in 2017 (l. Gilles Muller), 2018 (l. Julien Benneteau) and in 2022 (l. Alexander Bublik).
- Fucsovics' **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the quarterfinals here in 2021. He defeated Jannik Sinner, Jiri Vesely, Diego Schwartzman and Andrey Rublev before falling to eventual champion Novak Djokovic. He became the first Hungarian man to reach a Grand Slam quarterfinal since Balazs Taroczy at 1981 Roland Garros and the first to do so at Wimbledon since Jozsef Asboth in 1948.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Fucsovics lost in the 1st round at both the Australian Open (l. Grigor Dimitrov) and Roland Garros (l. Stefanos Tsitsipas).
- Fucsovics' best result in 2024 is winning his **2nd Tour-level title** at Bucharest (d. Mariano Navone). He also reached the quarterfinals at Estoril (l. Casper Ruud). His only other Tour-level title came at 2018 Geneva (d. Peter Gojowczyk), where he became the first Hungarian man to win a Tour-level title since Taroczy at 1982 Hilversum.
- Fucsovics is **one of 15 players in the men's singles draw not to compete on grass this season prior to Wimbledon**.
- Fucsovics has won one of the 2 **five-set matches** he has contested at Wimbledon – he defeated Rublev in 5 sets in the round of 16 in 2021 but fell to Fabio Fognini in 5 sets in the 2nd round in 2019. He has a 10-8 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Fucsovics reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 31 in March 2019. He plays here at No. 70.
- Fucsovics is **one of 5 former Wimbledon boys' singles champions** to contest the men's main draw here this year. He won the boys' singles title here in 2010 (d. Benjamin Mitchell) and also reached the semifinals of the boys' singles at the Australian Open (l. Sean Berman) and the US Open (l. Jack Sock) in the same year.
- Fucsovics has played **Davis Cup** for Hungary since 2010 and has a 33-20 overall win-loss record in the competition. Hungary will play away against Egypt in a World Group I tie in September.
- Fucsovics is coached by Adam Kellner.

STAN WAWRINKA (SUI) v (WC) CHARLES BROOM (GBR)

Head-to-head: first meeting

Wawrinka is facing a British player at Wimbledon for the 2nd time. He lost his only previous match against a British player here, falling to Andy Murray in 5 sets in the round of 16 here in 2009. He has a 6-3 win-loss record against British players at the Grand Slams and a 22-16 win-loss record against British players at Tour-level overall.

Wawrinka has a 15-5 win-loss record against players at their home Grand Slam tournaments. In addition to his 0-1 win-loss record against British players here, he has a 9-3 win-loss record against French players at Roland Garros, a 5-1 win-loss record against American players at the US Open and a 1-0 win-loss record against Australian players at the Australian Open.

Wawrinka lost a Grand Slam match to a player ranked as low as No. 228 Broom once before – when he fell to No. 239 Hugo Gaston in the 3rd round at 2020 Roland Garros. The lowest-ranked player to have defeated Wawrinka at Wimbledon is No. 165 Juan Martin del Potro in the 2nd round in 2016.

Wawrinka is facing a wild card at Wimbledon for the first time. He has a 4-4 win-loss record against wild cards at the Grand Slams.

- **WAWRINKA** is bidding to reach the 2nd round here for the 11th time.
- At 39 years 108 days, Wawrinka is bidding to become the **10th man in the Open Era to reach the 2nd round at Wimbledon aged 39 or older**. Since Cliff Drysdale reached the 2nd round here in 1980 aged 39 years 41 days, only 2 players have reached the 2nd round here aged 39 or older – Ivo Karlovic in 2018 (aged 39 years 137 days) and 2019 (aged 40 years 136 days), and Roger Federer in 2021 (aged 39 years 337 days). Wawrinka is the oldest player to begin the men's singles draw here this year. (NB ages calculated at end of the tournament)
- **Last year here**, Wawrinka reached the 3rd round (l. Novak Djokovic). He has lost in the 1st round here on 7 occasions – in 2005 (l. Fabrice Santoro), 2007 (l. Michael Llodra), 2010 (l. Denis Istomin), 2012 (l. Jurgen Melzer), 2013 (l. Lleyton Hewitt), 2017 (l. Daniil Medvedev) and 2022 (l. Jannik Sinner).
- Wawrinka's **best Wimbledon result** is reaching the quarterfinals on 2 occasions – in 2014 (l. Roger Federer) and 2015 (l. Richard Gasquet).
- Wawrinka is a **3-time Grand Slam champion**. He won his first Grand Slam title at the 2014 Australian Open (d. Rafael Nadal) and also won the titles at 2015 Roland Garros and the 2016 US Open, defeating Djokovic on both occasions. He defeated both the No. 1 and No. 2 seeds en route to his first 2 Grand Slam title victories and is the only player to have achieved the feat en route to winning a Grand Slam since Sergi Bruguera won the title at 1993 Roland Garros. He is one of 6 Grand Slam champions to start the main draw here.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Wawrinka reached the 2nd round at Roland Garros (d. Andy Murray, l. Pavel Kotov), but fell to Adrian Mannarino in 5 sets in the 1st round at the Australian Open.
- Wawrinka is making his **18th Wimbledon appearance and his 71st Grand Slam appearance overall**. He is in the Top 10 on the Open Era lists for both most Wimbledon men's singles appearances (in joint-6th place with Mikhail Youzhny) and most Grand Slam men's singles appearances (in joint-5th place with Fernando Verdasco).

- Wawrinka is bidding to record his **4th Tour-level match-win of 2024**. His only victories at Tour-level so far this season have come in 2nd round finishes at Buenos Aires (d. Pedro Cachin, I. Nicolas Jarry), Marrakech (d. Albert Ramos-Vinolas, I. Mariano Navone) and Roland Garros. He has lost in the 1st round at the 5 other Tour-level events he has contested this season. His only other match-win in 2024, at any level, came in a 2nd round finish at the Bordeaux Challenger (FRA) (d. Bernabe Zapata Miralles, I. Pedro Martinez).
- Wawrinka's **best Tour-level grass court result** is finishing runner-up at 2013 's-Hertogenbosch (I. Nicolas Mahut). He is one of 15 players competing in the men's singles who has not played a grass court event this season, at any level, prior to Wimbledon this year.
- Wawrinka has won one of the 6 **five-set matches** he has contested at Wimbledon, with his only victory in a 5-set match here coming against Ivo Karlovic in the 1st round in 2006. He has a 30-27 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall and has lost 5 of the last 6 five-set matches he has contested.
- Wimbledon is Wawrinka's **least successful Grand Slam** in terms of matches won. He has a 22-17 win-loss record here, compared with 46-18 at Roland Garros, 46-15 at the US Open and 43-17 at the Australian Open.
- Wawrinka reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 3 in January 2014 after winning his first Grand Slam title at the Australian Open. He plays here at No. 95.
- Wawrinka was the 2003 **Roland Garros junior champion** (d. Brian Baker) – the only junior Grand Slam event he contested.
- Wawrinka was part of the **Switzerland team that won the Davis Cup title in 2014**, defeating France in the final. He won 5 of the 7 matches he contested in the competition that year. He returned to the Swiss Davis Cup team for the first time since 2015 in the 2023 Qualifiers and competed at the 2023 Finals Group Stage. He has a 28-30 win-loss record in the competition overall. Switzerland will face Peru in a World Group I tie in Switzerland in September.
- Wawrinka is coached by former world No. 2 Magnus Norman.
- Wild card **BROOM** is making his Grand Slam debut today.
- **Last year here**, as a wild card in qualifying, Broom reached the 2nd round of qualifying (d. Alessandro Giannessi, I. Dennis Novak). He also competed as a wild card in qualifying in 2022, falling in the 1st round of qualifying (I. Dimitar Kuzmanov).
- Broom is bidding to record his **first Tour-level match-win**. He is contesting his 2nd Tour-level match, having made his Tour-level debut as a lucky loser at Eastbourne last week, losing his opening match to Billy Harris.
- Broom's best result in 2024 is reaching his **first Challenger-level final** – as a qualifier at the Nottingham Challenger (GBR) last month (I. Jacob Fearnley). Elsewhere on grass this season, he failed to qualify at Eastbourne but entered the main draw as a lucky loser, reached the 2nd round at the Ilkley Challenger (GBR) (d. Mikhail Kukushkin, I. Zachary Svajda) and lost in the 1st round of qualifying at the Surbiton Challenger (GBR) (I. Paul Jubb).
- Broom has recorded **7 match-wins at Challenger-level in 2024**. In addition to his 4 victories en route to the final at the Nottingham Challenger (GBR), he also recorded 2nd round finishes at the Glasgow Challenger (d. Aidan McHugh, I. Elmar Ejupovic), the Kachreti Challenger (GEO) (d. Roberto Cid Subervi, I. Daniil Glinka) and the Ilkley Challenger (GBR).
- Broom **won his 5th ITF World Tennis Tour title in 2024** – on hard courts at M25 Nottingham (GBR) (d. Henry Searle). He also reached the final at another M25 Nottingham (GBR) event (I. Jubb) and reached the semifinals at M25 Loughborough (GBR) (I. Kyle Edmund) and M25 Calabasas (USA) (I. Nishesh Basavareddy).
- Broom is one of **12 British players** competing in the men's singles draw at Wimbledon this year, the most since 1978, when there were 14. He is also one of 19 British players to compete here across the men's and women's singles, the most since 1999, when there were also 19 players across the 2 draws.
- Broom is bidding to **defeat a Top 100 player, at any level, for the 3rd time**. He has a 2-3 win-loss record against Top 100 players at all levels, with both of his victories coming en route to the final at the Nottingham Challenger (GBR) last month – against No. 98 Lloyd Harris in the 2nd round and against No. 62 Daniel Evans in the quarterfinals.

- Broom broke the Top 300 for the first time in May this year and plays here at a new **career-high ranking** of No. 228.
- Broom **competed in the boys' singles at Wimbledon once** – as a qualifier in 2015, when he fell to Ulises Blanch in the 1st round of the main draw. He reached a career-high junior ranking of No. 167 in January 2016.
- Broom is coached by Hamid Hegazi.

A 5th meeting for van de Zandschulp and Broady, but just their 2nd at Tour-level and first on grass. Broady won their only previous meeting at Tour-level, in the 2nd round at 2022 Tel Aviv. They had previously met twice on the ITF World Tennis Tour, with Van de Zandschulp winning on both occasions, and in qualifying at 2020 Roland Garros, with Broady winning in straight sets.

Van de Zandschulp has won one of his 2 previous matches against lefthanders at Wimbledon, having defeated Feliciano Lopez in the 1st round in 2022 before falling to Rafael Nadal in the round of 16. He has a 2-3 win-loss record against lefthanders at the Grand Slams, and a 12-15 win-loss record against lefthanders at Tour-level overall.

Van de Zandschulp is facing a British player at Wimbledon for the first time. He won his only previous Tour-level match against a British player in Great Britain – having defeated Paul Jubb in the 1st round at 2022 Queen's – and has a 2-3 win-loss record against British players at Tour-level overall.

Van de Zandschulp is facing a wild card at a Grand Slam for the first time. He has a 4-8 win-loss record against wild cards at Tour-level overall.

- **VAN DE ZANDSCHULP** is bidding to maintain his record of always reaching the 2nd round here. This is his 4th Wimbledon appearance and his 15th Grand Slam overall.
- **Last year here**, Van de Zandschulp reached the 2nd round, defeating Zhang Zhizhen in 5 sets before falling to Alejandro Davidovich Fokina.
- Van de Zandschulp's **best Wimbledon result** is reaching the round of 16 in 2022. He defeated Feliciano Lopez, Emil Ruusuvuori and Richard Gasquet before falling to Rafael Nadal.
- Van de Zandschulp's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the quarterfinals as a qualifier at the 2021 US Open. He defeated Carlos Taberner, Casper Ruud, Facundo Bagnis and Diego Schwartzman before falling to Daniil Medvedev in the last 8. He became the 3rd qualifier in the Open Era to reach the men's singles quarterfinals at the US Open – after Nicolas Escude (1999) and Gilles Muller (2008) – and the first Dutchman to reach the quarterfinals at a Grand Slam since Sjeng Schalken at 2004 Wimbledon.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Van de Zandschulp is bidding lost in the 1st round at both the Australian Open (l. Jannik Sinner) and Roland Garros (l. Fabio Fognini).
- **Prior to Wimbledon**, Van de Zandschulp fell in the 1st round as a wild card at 's-Hertogenbosch (l. Mackenzie McDonald) in the only event he has contested on grass this year.
- Van de Zandschulp has recorded **back-to-back match-wins, at any level, on one occasion this season** – at Rome-1000, when he defeated Zachary Svajda and Facundo Bagnis in qualifying and Nicolas Moreno de Alboran

in the 1st round of the main draw before falling to Felix Auger-Aliassime in the 2nd round. He has reached the 2nd round as a direct acceptance at 7 other Tour-level events this season.

- Van de Zandschulp has won 5 of the 6 **five-set matches** he has contested, with his only defeat in a 5-set match coming against Alejandro Davidovich Fokina in the 2nd round at 2021 Roland Garros. He has recorded 2 successful comebacks from 0-2 down – against Hubert Hurkacz in the 1st round at 2021 Roland Garros and against Taberner in the 1st round at the 2021 US Open.
- Van de Zandschulp achieved a **career-high ranking** of No. 22 in August 2022. He plays here at No. 97.
- Van de Zandschulp made his **Davis Cup** debut for Netherlands in 2019 and has a 9-4 win-loss record in the competition. Netherlands will compete in Bologna alongside Belgium, Brazil and defending champions Italy in Group A at the 2024 Davis Cup Finals.
- Van de Zandschulp is coached by Sven Groeneveld.
- Wild card **BROADY** is bidding to reach the 2nd round here for 4th consecutive time and for the 5th time overall. This is his 7th Wimbledon appearance and his 9th Grand Slam overall.
- Last year here, Broady equalled his **best Grand Slam result** by reaching the 3rd round. As a wild card, he defeated Constant Lestienne and No. 4 seed Casper Ruud, before falling to Denis Shapovalov. He also reached the 3rd round here in 2022 (l. Alex de Minaur).
- Broady has **not competed in Grand Slam play this year** prior to Wimbledon. He withdrew from qualifying for both the Australian Open and Roland Garros due to ankle injuries.
- **Prior to Wimbledon**, Broady fell in the 1st round as a wild card at Eastbourne (l. Yoshihito Nishioka) in the only event he has contested on grass this year.
- Broady is bidding to record his **2nd Tour-level match-win of 2024**. His only match-win at Tour-level this season came in a 2nd round finish as a qualifier at Hong Kong (d. Pedro Cachin, Andrey Rublev). He has lost in the 1st round on his only other Tour-level appearances this year – at Delray Beach (l. Rinky Hijikata) and Eastbourne.
- Broady has only **contested 6 events at all levels in 2024**. Apart from his appearances at Hong Kong, Delray Beach and Eastbourne, he has fallen in qualifying at Acapulco, Indian Wells-1000 and the Phoenix Challenger (USA).
- Broady has won all 4 **five-set matches** he has contested at Tour-level, all of which have come at Wimbledon. He recorded 5-set victories against Marinko Matosevic in the 1st round in 2015, against Lukas Klein and Diego Schwartzman in the opening 2 rounds in 2022, and against Ruud in the 2nd round here last year. He lost the only other 5-set match he has contested, falling to Gregoire Barrere in the final round of Wimbledon qualifying in 2019.
- Broady is one of **12 British players** competing in the men's singles draw at Wimbledon this year, the most since 1978, when there were 14. He is also one of 19 British players to compete here across the men's and women's singles, the most since 1999, when there were also 19 players across the 2 draws.
- Broady is one of **17 lefthanders** who started the men's singles draw here this year. Rafael Nadal was the last lefthander to win the title here in 2010.
- Broady **broke the Top 100 for the first time**, at No. 93, in September 2023, which remains his career-high ranking. He plays here at No. 156.
- Broady reached a career-high junior ranking of No. 2 in 2012. He is **one of 8 players in the men's singles draw here this year to have reached the Wimbledon boys' singles final**, having finished as boys' singles runner-up here in 2011 (l. Luke Saville). He also finished runner-up in the boys' singles at the 2012 US Open (l. Filip Peliwo). He also won the 2010 Junior Wimbledon doubles title with Tom Farquharson and the 2012 Junior Australian Open doubles title with Joshua Ward-Hibbert.
- Broady is coached by David Sammel.
