On court today...

- Seven-time Wimbledon champion Novak Djokovic is the first men's action on Centre Court today as he takes on qualifier Vit Kopriva. As the world No. 2 seeks an all-time record-extending 371st Grand Slam match-win, 27-year-old Kopriva is seeking his first as he makes his main draw debut at SW19. He made his Grand Slam debut at the Australian Open earlier this year, and has only ever played professional tennis on grass at Wimbledon qualifying in Roehampton in 2022 and 2023 prior to today. He will be looking to inflict a 50th career Grand Slam defeat for Djokovic, but the 24-time Grand Slam champion has never lost in the 1st round here in his 18 previous appearances.
- British No. 1 Jack Draper headlines the action on Centre Court today, with his match against qualifier Elias Ymer having been moved from No. 2 Court following Andy Murray's withdrawal on Tuesday morning. Draper has enjoyed his best grass court season to date – he won his first Tour-level title at Stuttgart before recording a career-best victory against world No. 2 Carlos Alcaraz in the 2nd round at Queen's. The Brit now plays here at a career-high ranking of No. 28 – and he will be the heavy favourite to defeat Ymer this afternoon. Ymer is bidding to record his first Tour-level match-win on grass and just his 2nd Tour-level match-win of the season today.
- On No. 1 Court, Roland Garros runner-up Alexander Zverev faces Roberto Carballes Baena, with the world No. 4 aiming for a solid start in his latest quest for a first Grand Slam title. Should he win his first major title here on his 34th appearance at a Grand Slam, he will go joint-3rd on the Open Era list for most attempts before winning a first Grand Slam men's singles title. Zverev has been in fine form this season, but he will take nothing for granted on the grass, with Wimbledon historically being his weakest Grand Slam event. He has lost to players ranked lower than world No. 64 Carballes Baena on 3 occasions here – against No. 105 Denis Kudla in the 2nd round in 2015, No. 138 Ernests Gulbis in the 3rd round in 2018 and No. 124 Jiri Vesely in the 1st round in 2019.

NO. 2 NOVAK DJOKOVIC (SRB) v (Q) VIT KOPRIVA (CZE)

Head-to-head: first meeting

Djokovic has never lost a Grand Slam match to a player ranked as low as No. 123 Kopriva. The lowest-ranked player to have defeated Djokovic at the Grand Slams is No. 117 Denis Istomin in the 2nd round at the 2017 Australian Open. The lowest-ranked player to have defeated Djokovic at Wimbledon is No. 75 Marat Safin in the 2nd round in 2008.

Djokovic has won all 25 matches he has played against qualifiers at the Grand Slams – including all 4 matches he has played against qualifiers at Wimbledon. He has dropped a set against a qualifier at Wimbledon just once before, when he defeated qualifier Bernard Tomic in 4 sets in the quarterfinals in 2011. He has a 91-7 win-loss record against qualifiers at Tour-level overall.

- Seven-time Wimbledon champion **DJOKOVIC** is bidding to maintain his record of always reaching the 2nd round here.
- Djokovic has lost in the **1st round at a Grand Slam on 2 occasions** – at the Australian Open in 2005 (l. Marat Safin) and 2006 (l. Paul Goldstein).
- Last year here, Djokovic reached his **9th Wimbledon final**, falling to Carlos Alcaraz in 5 sets. On his 8 other appearances in Wimbledon final, he won the title in 2011 (d. Rafael Nadal), 2014 (d. Roger Federer), 2015 (d. Federer), 2018 (d. Kevin Anderson), 2019 (d. Federer), 2021 (d. Matteo Berrettini) and 2022 (d. Nick Kyrgios) and finished runner-up in 2013 (l. Andy Murray).
- Djokovic is bidding to win his **8th Wimbledon title** and equal Federer's all-time record for the most Wimbledon men's singles titles won. He is also bidding to equal Federer and Helen Wills Moody in 2nd place on the list for most Wimbledon singles titles won among men and women, behind 9-time Wimbledon champion Martina Navratilova.
- Djokovic won his **22nd, 23rd and 24th Grand Slam titles in 2024** – he equalled Nadal's all-time record for most Grand Slam men's singles titles at the Australian Open (d. Stefanos Tsitsipas), claimed sole ownership of the record at Roland Garros (d. Casper Ruud) and equalled Margaret Court's all-time record for most Grand Slam singles titles among men and women at the US Open (d. Daniil Medvedev).
- Djokovic is bidding to win his **25th Grand Slam title** and claim sole ownership of the all-time record for most Grand Slam singles titles won among men and women.
- At 37 years 53 days, Djokovic is bidding to become the **oldest man in the Open Era to win the Wimbledon title** and the first player in the Open Era to win multiple Wimbledon titles after turning 35. In 2022, aged 35 years 49 days, Djokovic became the 2nd player in the Open Era to win the Wimbledon aged 35 or older – after Federer, who won the title here in 2017 aged 35 years 342 days. (NB ages calculated at the end of the tournament)
- Djokovic is bidding to win his **5th Grand Slam title since turning 35** and extend his Open Era record for most Grand Slam singles titles won aged 35 or older. He is also bidding to win his 13th Grand Slam title since turning 30 and extend his record for most Grand Slam singles titles won after the age of 30 in the Open Era.

- Djokovic is bidding to record his 371st Grand Slam match-win. By defeating Francisco Cerundolo in the round of 16 at Roland Garros this year for his 370th Grand Slam match-win, he claimed sole ownership of the **all-time record for most Grand Slam singles matches won among men and women**, ahead of Federer.
- Djokovic is bidding to record his **93rd Wimbledon match-win**. He is in 6th place on the all-time list for most Wimbledon singles matches won among men and women – behind Martina Navratilova (120 Wimbledon match-wins), Federer (105), Serena Williams (98), Chris Evert (96) and Billie Jean King (95).
- Djokovic has **won 34 of his last 35 matches at Wimbledon and 34 of his last 35 Tour-level matches on grass**. His defeat to Alcaraz in the final last year ended a 34-match winning streak at Wimbledon – he had previously not lost here since retiring due to a right elbow injury in his quarterfinal match against Tomas Berdych in 2017. The defeat to Alcaraz also ended a 34-match Tour-level winning streak on grass – he had previously not lost a grass court match since falling to Marin Cilic in the final at 2018 Queen's.
- Djokovic is making his **19th consecutive Wimbledon appearance and contesting his 75th Grand Slam overall**. He is in joint-4th place on the Open Era list for most Wimbledon men's singles appearances alongside Fernando Verdasco – behind Federer (22 Wimbledon appearances), and Jimmy Connors and Feliciano Lopez (both 20). He is in 3rd place on the Open Era list for most Grand Slam men's singles appearances – behind Federer and Lopez (both 81).
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Djokovic reached the semifinals at the Australian Open (l. Jannik Sinner) and the quarterfinals at Roland Garros, where he gave a walkover to Casper Ruud due to a knee injury.
- Djokovic's **other highlights in 2024** are reaching the semifinals at Monte Carlo-1000 (l. Ruud) and Geneva (l. Tomas Machac). He has contested just 7 events prior to Wimbledon this season.
- Djokovic **did not contest a grass court tournament prior to Wimbledon this year**. He is one of just 7 men in the Open Era to have won the title here without playing a warm-up event on grass, achieving the feat in 2011, 2014, 2015, 2019, 2021 and 2022. He is one of 15 players in the men's singles who has not competed on grass this season prior to Wimbledon.
- Djokovic is bidding to win his **99th Tour-level title**. He is in 3rd place on the Open Era list for most Tour-level titles won – behind Jimmy Connors (109 Tour-level titles) and Federer (103). Of Djokovic's 98 Tour-level singles titles, 8 have come on grass – in addition to his 7 Wimbledon titles, he also won the title on grass at 2017 Eastbourne (d. Gael Monfils). He has won 71 titles on hard courts and 19 titles on clay.
- Djokovic has a 10-2 win-loss record in **5-set matches** at Wimbledon, with his only defeats in 5-set matches here coming against Mario Ancic in the round of 16 in 2006 and against Alcaraz in the final last year. He holds the record for most 5-set matches won at the Grand Slams (38-9) and has a 40-11 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Djokovic **holds the record for most weeks ranked No. 1**, having held the top ranking for a total of 428 weeks. His most-recent spell as world No. 1 ended last month, when he dropped to No. 3 following his withdrawal from Roland Garros. He rose to No. 2 last week and plays here at the same ranking.
- Djokovic has played **Davis Cup** for Serbia since 2004, has a 44-16 win-loss record in the competition and led Serbia to their only title in the competition to date in 2010. Serbia will host Greece in a World Group I tie in September.
- Djokovic is currently without a permanent coach.
- Qualifier **KOPRIVA** is bidding to record his first Grand Slam match-win on his Wimbledon debut. This is his 2nd Grand Slam main draw appearance overall.
- As No. 16 seed in **Wimbledon qualifying last week**, Kopriva defeated Henri Squire (GER) 46 76(1) 64, Hugo Dellien (BOL) 64 36 61 and No. 20 seed Richard Gasquet (FRA) 36 63 62 64 to advance to the main draw. It was the first time he has successfully qualified here on his 3rd attempt and the 2nd time he has successfully qualified at a Grand Slam on his 11th attempt.
- **Last year here**, Kopriva fell in the 1st round of qualifying (l. Lukas Klein). On his only other appearance in qualifying here, in 2022, he reached the 2nd round of qualifying (d. Ramkumar Ramanathan, l. Sebastian Ofner).

- Kopriva made his **Grand Slam main draw debut** as a qualifier at the Australian Open this year, falling to Sebastian Korda in 5 sets in the 1st round. It was the only 5-set match he has contested to date.
- **Elsewhere in Grand Slam play this year**, Kopriva reached the 2nd round of qualifying at Roland Garros (d. Mate Valkusz, l. Denis Kudla).
- Kopriva is bidding to record his **2nd Tour-level match-win in 2024**. His only match-win at Tour-level this season came in the Davis Cup Qualifiers, when he defeated Orel Kimhi in the 4th match of Czechia's 4-0 victory against Israel. He has lost in the 1st round on his 4 other Tour-level appearances this season – as a qualifier at the Australian Open, Doha (l. Fabian Marozsan) and Miami-1000 (l. Christopher O'Connell) and as a direct acceptance at Munich (l. Jack Draper).
- Kopriva is contesting his **first Tour-level match on grass**. His only previous appearances on grass, at any level, have come at Wimbledon qualifying in 2022, 2023 and this year.
- Kopriva **won his only previous match against a Top 10 player** – he defeated No. 10 Denis Shapovalov in the 2nd round at 2021 Gstaad.
- Kopriva reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 111 in September last year. He plays here at No. 123.
- Kopriva made his **Davis Cup** debut for Czechia in 2022. He has a 1-1 win-loss record in the competition but is yet to contest a live match. Czechia defeated Israel in the Qualifiers in February to advance to the 2024 Davis Cup Finals Group Stage and will compete in Group B in Valencia alongside Australia, France and Spain in September.
- Kopriva is coached by Jaroslav Pospisil.

NO. 4 ALEXANDER ZVEREV (GER) v ROBERTO CARBALLES BAENA (ESP)

Head-to-head: Zverev leads 1-0

Zverev has lost Wimbledon matches to players ranked as low as No. 64 Carballes Baena on 3 occasions – against No. 105 Denis Kudla in the 2nd round in 2015, No. 138 Ernests Gulbis in the 3rd round in 2018 and No. 124 Jiri Vesely in the 1st round in 2019.

- **ZVEREV** is bidding to reach the 2nd round here for the 7th time. This is his 8th Wimbledon appearance and his 34th Grand Slam overall.
- Zverev has **lost in the 1st round at a Grand Slam on 4 occasions** – including at 2019 Wimbledon when he fell to Jiri Vesely. He has also lost in the 1st round at the 2015 US Open (l. Philipp Kohlschreiber), the 2016 Australian Open (l. Andy Murray) and 2017 Roland Garros (l. Fernando Verdasco).
- **Last year here**, as No. 19 seed, Zverev reached the 3rd round. He defeated Gijs Brouwer and Yosuke Watanuki before falling to Matteo Berrettini.
- Zverev's **best Wimbledon result** is reaching the round of 16 on 2 occasions – in 2017 (l. Milos Raonic) and in 2021 (l. Felix Auger-Aliassime).
- Zverev **bids to become the 3rd German man to win the Wimbledon title in the Open Era**, after Boris Becker (1985-86, 1989) and Michael Stich (1991).
- Zverev reached his **2nd Grand Slam final** at 2024 Roland Garros, falling to Carlos Alcaraz in 5 sets. He became the 2nd German man in the Open Era to reach the final at Roland Garros, after 1996 runner-up Michael Stich. He also finished runner-up at the 2020 US Open, falling to Dominic Thiem in 5 sets despite holding a 2-0 lead.
- **Elsewhere in Grand Slam play this year**, Zverev reached the semifinals at the Australian Open, where he fell to Daniil Medvedev in 5 sets despite holding a 2-0 lead.
- If Zverev wins his first title on his 34th appearance at the Grand Slams, he will go **joint-3rd on the Open Era list for most attempts before winning a first Grand Slam men's singles title** – alongside Petr Korda, who won his first Grand Slam title at the 1998 Australian Open on his 34th Grand Slam appearance. Goran Ivanisevic (who won his first Grand Slam title at 2001 Wimbledon on his 48th Grand Slam appearance) and Stan Wawrinka (who won his first Grand Slam title at the 2014 Australian Open on his 36th Grand Slam appearance) are the top 2 players on the list.
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Zverev reached the semifinals at Halle. He defeated Oscar Otte, Lorenzo Sonego and Arthur Fils before falling to Hubert Hurkacz.
- Zverev's **best result in 2024** is winning the title at Rome-1000 (d. Nicolas Jarry). His other highlights this season are reaching the semifinals at Los Cabos (l. Jordan Thompson) and Miami-1000 (l. Grigor Dimitrov) and the quarterfinals at Indian Wells-1000 (l. Alcaraz) and Munich (l. Cristian Garin).
- Zverev's **best performance on grass** is reaching finishing runner-up at Halle in 2016 (l. Florian Mayer) and 2017 (l. Roger Federer).

- Zverev has won 3 of the 6 **five-set matches** he has contested at Wimbledon. He has a 21-11 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Zverev rose to a **career-high ranking** of No. 2 after reaching the semifinals at 2022 Roland Garros. He re-entered the Top 5 for the first time since October 2022 in March this year and plays here at No. 4.
- Zverev **won Olympic singles gold for Germany** at the Tokyo 2020 Olympic Tennis Event in 2021, defeating Russian Olympic Committee's Karen Khachanov in the final. It was Germany's 3rd Olympic gold medal in tennis – after Steffi Graf in women's singles at Seoul 1988 and Boris Becker/Stich in men's doubles at Barcelona 1992.
- Zverev was a **successful junior**. He won the boys' singles title at the 2014 Australian Open, defeating Stefan Kozlov in the final. He also finished runner-up at 2013 Junior Roland Garros (l. Christian Garin) and was named 2013 ITF Junior World Champion. He reached the 3rd round on his only appearance in the boys' singles here in 2013 (l. Kozlov).
- Zverev has played **Davis Cup** for Germany since 2016 and has a 9-6 overall win-loss record in the competition. Germany defeated Hungary in the Qualifiers in February to reach the 2024 Davis Cup Finals and will compete in Group C in Zhuhai alongside USA, Slovakia and Chile.
- Zverev is coached by his father, Alexander Zverev Sr.
- **CARBALLES BAENA** is bidding to reach the 2nd round here for the 2nd time and equal his best Wimbledon result. This is his 6th Wimbledon appearance and his 26th Grand Slam overall.
- Last year here, Carballes Baena recorded his **best Wimbledon result** by reaching the 2nd round for the first time (d. Matteo Arnaldi, l. Holger Rune).
- Carballes Baena's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the 3rd round at 2020 Roland Garros. He defeated Steve Johnson and Denis Shapovalov before retiring due to illness during his match against Grigor Dimitrov.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Carballes Baena reached the 2nd round at Roland Garros (d. Constant Lestienne, l. Novak Djokovic) but fell in the 1st round at the Australian Open (l. Hugo Gaston).
- **Prior to Wimbledon**, Carballes Baena reached the 2nd round at Mallorca (d. Pablo Carreno Busta, l. Gael Monfils).
- Carballes Baena's **best result in 2024** is reaching his 3rd Tour-level final at Marrakech (l. Matteo Berrettini). He also reached the quarterfinals at Auckland (l. Ben Shelton) and the 3rd round at Barcelona (l. Stefanos Tsitsipas).
- Carballes Baena is bidding to record his **5th Tour-level match-win on grass**. In addition to his 2nd round finishes at Wimbledon last year and Mallorca this year, his only other Tour-level match-wins on grass have come in 2nd round finishes at 2019 Antalya (d. JC Aragone, l. Adrian Mannarino) and 2023 Mallorca (d. Ilya Ivashka, l. Corentin Moutet).
- Carballes Baena is **bidding to defeat a Top 5 player for the 2nd time**. He has a 1-9 win-loss record against Top 5 players at Tour-level with his only victory coming against No. 4 Holger Rune in the 1st round at the US Open last year.
- Carballes Baena has won 2 of the 7 **five-set matches**, with his 2 victories coming against Shapovalov in the 2nd round at 2020 Roland Garros and against Oscar Otte in the 1st round at 2022 Roland Garros. He has never contested a 5-set match at Wimbledon.
- Carballes Baena has **won 2 Tour-level titles** – on clay at both 2018 Quito (d. Albert Ramos-Vinolas) and 2023 Marrakech (d. Alexandre Muller).
- Carballes Baena reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 49 in April 2023. He plays here at No. 64.
- Carballes Baena had a **good junior career**. He reached a career-high junior ranking of No. 8 in January 2011 and reached the semifinals of the boys' singles at the Australian Open the same month (l. Luke Saville). He reached the 2nd round on his only appearance in the boys' singles here in 2011 (d. Andrew Bettles, l. Joris de Loore).
- Carballes Baena is coached by Jose Maria Garrido.

NO. 6 ANDREY RUBLEV v FRANCISCO COMESANA (ARG)

Head-to-head: first meeting

Rublev has never lost a Grand Slam match to a player ranked as low as No. 122 Comesana. The lowest-ranked player to have defeated Rublev at the Grand Slams is No. 81 Mackenzie McDonald in the 1st round at the 2019 Australian Open. The lowest-ranked player to have defeated Rublev at Wimbledon is No. 65 Sam Querrey in the 2nd round in 2019.

- **RUBLEV** is bidding to maintain his record of always reaching the 2nd round here. This is his 5th Wimbledon appearance and his 27th Grand Slam overall.
- Rublev has **lost in the 1st round at a Grand Slam on 5 occasions** – at the US Open as a qualifier on his Grand Slam debut in 2015 (l. Kevin Anderson) and as a direct acceptance in 2018 (l. Jeremy Chardy), and at Roland Garros as a lucky loser in 2017 (l. Diego Schwartzman) and as No. 7 seed in 2021 (l. Jan-Lennard Struff), and at the 2019 Australian Open (l. Mackenzie McDonald).
- Last year here, Rublev recorded his **best Wimbledon result** by reaching the quarterfinals (l. Novak Djokovic), completing the set of quarterfinal appearances at all 4 Grand Slam tournaments.
- Rublev's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the quarterfinals on 10 occasions. In addition to his quarterfinal finish here last year, he has also reached the quarterfinals at the Australian Open in 2021 (l. Daniil Medvedev), 2023 (l. Djokovic) and 2024 (l. Jannik Sinner), at Roland Garros in 2020 (l. Stefanos Tsitsipas) and 2022 (l. Marin Cilic) and at the US Open in 2017 (l. Rafael Nadal), 2020 (l. Medvedev), 2022 (l. Frances Tiafoe), and 2023 (l. Medvedev). Of the 49 men in the Open Era to have reached 10 or more Grand Slam quarterfinals, he is the only one to have never reached a Grand Slam semifinal.
- **Elsewhere at the Grand Slams this year**, Rublev reached the 3rd round at Roland Garros, defeating Taro Daniel and Pedro Martinez before falling to Matteo Arnaldi.
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Rublev fell in the 1st round at Halle (l. Marcos Giron).
- Rublev's **best results in 2024** are winning the titles at Hong Kong (d. Emil Ruusuvuori) and Madrid-1000 (d. Felix Auger-Aliassime). He is one of 10 players to have won multiple Tour-level titles prior to Wimbledon this season. He also reached the semifinals at Dubai, where he was defaulted against Alexander Bublik, and the quarterfinals at Rotterdam (l. Alex de Minaur) and Doha (l. Jakub Mensik).
- Rublev has won 2 of the 4 **five-set matches** he has contested at Wimbledon. He recorded 5-set victories against Stefano Travaglia in the 1st round in 2017 and Bublik in the round of 16 last year, but lost 5-set matches to both Albert Ramos-Vinolas in the 2nd round in 2017 and Marton Fucsovics in the round of 16 in 2021. He has a 9-8 win-loss record in 5-set matches overall.
- Rublev reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 5 in September 2021. He plays here one place lower at No. 6.
- Rublev is a former junior world No. 1 having topped the boys' rankings for the first time in June 2014 after winning the boys' singles title at 2014 Roland Garros (d. Jaume Munar). He also won two medals at the Youth Olympic Tennis Event in Nanjing later that year, winning boys' singles bronze and boys' doubles silver with Khachanov.

He was named 2014 ITF Junior World Champion. He reached the 3rd round on his only appearance in the boys' singles here in 2014 (l. Tim van Rijthoven).

- Rublev **won Olympic gold in mixed doubles** alongside Anastasia Pavlyuchenkova at Tokyo 2020, with the pair defeating Karatsev/Elena Vesnina in the final. Along with Khachanov, who won men's singles silver, he became the first tennis player to win medals at both the Youth Olympic Games and the Olympic Games.
- Rublev is coached by Fernando Vicente and Alberto Martin.
- **COMESANA** is making his Grand Slam debut today. He is one of 7 players making their Grand Slam debuts in the men's singles draw at Wimbledon this year.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Comesana reached the 2nd round of qualifying at the Australian Open (d. Yuta Shimizu, l. Mate Valkusz). He missed qualifying at Roland Garros this year due to a left calf injury. He has contested qualifying at 2 other Grand Slam tournaments – at the US Open in 2022, when he fell in the 1st round of qualifying (l. Franco Agamenone), and 2023, when he defeated Jozef Kovalik and Federico Gaio before falling to Taro Daniel in the final round of qualifying.
- Comesana is bidding to record his **first Tour-level match-win**. He has lost in the 1st round at all 3 Tour-level events he has contested, all of which have come this season – as a wild card at Cordoba (l. Thiago Tirante), as a qualifier at Rio de Janeiro (l. Francisco Cerundolo) and as a lucky loser at Santiago (l. Juan Pablo Varillas).
- Comesana **plays mainly on the Challenger Tour**. His best result in 2024 is winning his 5th title at Challenger-level at the Oeiras 3 Challenger (POR) (d. Ugo Blanchet). He also reached the semifinals at the Mauthausen Challenger (AUT), where he retired against Lucas Pouille due to a left calf injury.
- Comesana is contesting his **2nd grass court match, at any level, professional or junior**. His only previous appearance on grass came in qualifying at Eastbourne last month, when he fell to Charles Broom in the 1st round of qualifying.
- Comesana is **facing a Top 10 player for the first time**. The highest-ranked player he has previously faced, at any level, is No. 22 Cerundolo in the 1st round at Rio de Janeiro this year. The highest-ranked player he has defeated, at any level, is No. 93 Daniel Elahi Galan in the quarterfinals at the 2023 Lima 2 Challenger (PER).
- Comesana **broke the Top 100 for the first time** in April this year, reaching a career-high ranking of No. 87 in May. He plays here at No. 122.
- Comesana is coached by Sebastian Gutierrez.

- **HURKACZ** is bidding to reach the 2nd round here for the 4th time. This is his 6th Wimbledon appearance and his 25th Grand Slam overall.
- **Last year here**, Hurkacz reached the round of 16 (l. Novak Djokovic). He has lost in the 1st round here twice before – as a lucky loser on his debut here in 2018 (l. Bernard Tomic) and as No. 7 seed in 2022 (l. Alejandro Davidovich Fokina).
- Hurkacz's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the semifinals here in 2021, when he defeated Roger Federer in the quarterfinals before falling to Matteo Berrettini in the last 4. He became the 2nd Polish man in history to reach the semifinals at a Grand Slam after Jerzy Janowicz, who reached the semifinals at 2013 Wimbledon.

- Hurkacz's **best grass court performance** is winning the title at 2022 Halle (d. Daniil Medvedev), where he became the first Polish man in the Open Era to win a Tour-level title on grass. He is one of 24 players competing here this year to have won a Tour-level title on grass.
- Hurkacz has won one of the 2 **five-set matches** he has contested at Wimbledon – he defeated Medvedev in 5 sets in the round of 16 in 2021 but fell to Davidovich Fokina in 5 sets in the 1st round in 2022. He has an 8-8 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.

- Hurkacz **broke the Top 10 for the first time** in October 2021. He reached a new career-high ranking of No. 7 last week and plays here at the same ranking.
- Hurkacz has played **Davis Cup** for Poland since 2016 and has an 11-9 win-loss record in the competition. Poland will host Korea Republic in a World Group I tie in September.
- Hurkacz has received support from the Grand Slam Player Development Programme (formerly known as the Grand Slam Development Fund), having been awarded a \$25,000 grant in 2018.
- Hurkacz is coached by Craig Boynton.
- Qualifier **ALBOT** is bidding to reach the 2nd round here for the 4th time – and for the first time since 2018. This is his 8th consecutive Wimbledon appearance and his 29th Grand Slam overall.
- Albot defeated Francesco Maestrelli (ITA) 62 67(5) 62, Bu Yunchaokete (CHN) 75 67(10) 64 and No. 8 seed Daniel Elahi Galan (COL) 64 62 67(6) 63 in the 3 rounds of **Wimbledon qualifying last week**. It was the 4th time he has successfully qualified at Wimbledon on his 8th attempt – and the 3rd consecutive year he has qualified for the main draw here. It was the 9th time he has successfully qualified at a Grand Slam on his 27th attempt.
- Albot's **best Wimbledon result** is reaching the 3rd round in 2018. He defeated both Pablo Carreno Busta and Aljaz Bedene in 5 sets before falling to No. 9 seed John Isner.
- Albot's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the 3rd round on 4 occasions. In addition to his 3rd round finish here in 2018, he also reached the 3rd round at the 2017 US Open (l. Sam Querrey) and at the Australian Open in 2021 (l. Casper Ruud) and in 2022 (l. Alexander Zverev).
- Albot is bidding to end a **5-match losing streak in Wimbledon main draw matches**. Since reaching the 3rd round here in 2018, he has lost in the 1st round here as a direct acceptance in both 2019 (l. Jan-Lennard Struff) and 2021 (l. The highest ranked players he has defeated are No. 12 Carreno Busta in the 2nd round here in 2018 and No. 12 Shapovalov in the 2nd round at 2020 Sofia.
- Albot won both **5-set matches** he has contested at Wimbledon – against Carreno Busta and Bedene in 2018. He has a 7-4 record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Albot is the **only player – man or woman – from Moldova to have contested a Grand Slam**.
- Albot is a **former Top 50 player**. He reached a career-high ranking of No. 39 in August 2019. He plays here at No. 144.
- Albot has played **Davis Cup** for Moldova since 2007 and is the nation's most successful player in terms of singles wins and overall wins. He has a 30-8 win-loss record in Davis Cup singles and a 43-18 win-loss record in the competition overall. Moldova will next compete in the 2025 Europe Group III event, having failed to win promotion from Group III this season.
- Albot was a member of the ITF 16 & under Team to Europe in 2005, supported by the Grand Slam Player Development Programme.
- Albot is coached by his father Vladimir and Burghard Riehemann.

NO. 9 ALEX DE MINAUR (AUS) v (LL) JAMES DUCKWORTH (AUS)

De Minaur and Duckworth are 2 of the 11 Australian players starting the men's singles draw here this year – the most since 2015, when there were also 11 Australian men competing here. France (14) and Great Britain (12) are the only nation to have more players start the men's draw here.

This match is the only all-Australian match-up in the men's singles 1st round this year. This is the 103rd all-Australian men's singles match at Wimbledon in the Open Era, and the 498th all-Australian men's singles match at the Grand Slams in the Open Era.

De Minaur is facing an Australian at a Grand Slam for the 1st time. He has a 14-3 win-loss record against Australian players at Tour-level. Duckworth is facing an Australian at a Grand Slam for the 5th time. He has a 2-2 win-loss record against Australian players at the Grand Slams and a 7-7 win-loss record against Australian players at Tour-level.

De Minaur and Duckworth have both played Davis Cup for Australia, but have never been on the Davis Cup team at the same time. De Minaur made his Davis Cup debut in 2018 and was a member of the team which finished runners-up to Canada in 2022 and to Italy last year. He has a 15-8 win-loss record in the competition. Duckworth has played just one Davis Cup match, losing in the doubles alongside John Peers against Brazil in 2020. As runners-up last year, Australia qualified automatically for the 2024 Davis Cup Finals Group Stage in September and will compete in Group B in Valencia alongside Czechia, France and Spain.

De Minaur has lost Grand Slam matches to a player ranked as low as No. 81 Duckworth twice before – both against Marco Cecchinato, who was ranked No. 110 when he defeated De Minaur in the 1st round at 2020 Roland Garros and was ranked No. 83 when he defeated De Minaur in the 2nd round at 2021 Roland Garros. The lowest ranked player to have defeated De Minaur here is No. 71 Steve Johnson in the 2nd round in 2019.

- De Minaur's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the quarterfinals on 2 occasions – at the 2020 US Open (I. Dominic Thiem) and at Roland Garros this year (I. Alexander Zverev).

- Lucky loser **DUCKWORTH** is bidding to reach the 2nd round here for the 3rd time. This is his 7th Wimbledon appearance and his 33rd Grand Slam overall.
- As No. 4 seed in **Wimbledon qualifying last week**, Duckworth defeated Benjamin Hassan (GER) 67(8) 62 64 and Nicolas Moreno de Alboran (USA) 76(6) 64 before falling to Mark Lajal (EST) 64 64 64. He gained a place in the main draw after Corentin Moutet withdrew due to a wrist injury on Friday.
- **Last year here**, Duckworth reached the 2nd round of qualifying (d. Stuart Parker, l. Harold Mayot).
- Duckworth's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the 3rd round here in 2021, when he defeated Radu Albot and Sam Querrey before falling to Lorenzo Sonego.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Duckworth lost in the 1st round as a wild card at the Australian Open (l. Luca van Assche). He fell in the 1st round of qualifying at Roland Garros (l. Maxime Janvier).
- **Prior to Wimbledon this season**, Duckworth reached the quarterfinals as a qualifier at Stuttgart, defeating Pierre Hugues Herbert and Ben Shelton before falling to Matteo Berrettini, and reached the 2nd round as a qualifier at Halle (d. - Duckworth is coached by Wayne Arthurs, who reached the round of 16 here in 1999 and 2002.

- Daniel's best result this year is reaching his **2nd Tour-level final** at Auckland (l. Alejandro Tabilo). He has recorded just 4 other Tour-level match-wins this season – in 2nd round finishes at Dallas (d. Constant Lestienne, l. Tommy Paul), Indian Wells-1000 (d. Daniel Elahi Galan, l. Alex de Minaur), Munich (d. Christopher O'Connell, l. Felix Auger-Aliassime) and Madrid-1000 (d. Aleksandar Vukic, l. Tallon Griekspoor).
- Daniel is bidding to **defeat a Top 20 player at a Grand Slam for the first time on his 10th attempt**. He has lost all 9 of his previous matches against Top 20 players at the Grand Slams, including his only previous match against a Top 20 player at Wimbledon, when he fell to No. 16 Fognini in the 1st round in 2018. The highest ranked player he has defeated at a Grand Slam is No. 45 Martin Klizan in the 1st round at 2016 Roland Garros. He has a 5-27 win-loss record against Top 20 players at Tour-level overall.
- Daniel has **won one Tour-level title** – at 2018 Istanbul (d. Malek Jaziri)
- Daniel reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 58 in January this year. He plays here at No. 84.
- Daniel has represented Japan in **Davis Cup** since 2014 and has an 8-7 win-loss record in the competition. Japan will play at home against Colombia in a World Group I tie in September.
- Daniel is currently without a coach.

- **FRITZ** is bidding to reach the 2nd round here for the 6th consecutive time. This is his 8th Wimbledon appearance and his 32nd Grand Slam overall.
- Fritz has **lost in the 1st round here twice before** – on his first 2 Wimbledon appearances in 2015 (l. Stan Wawrinka) and as a qualifier in 2016 (l. John Isner).
- **Last year here**, Fritz reached the 2nd round, defeating Yannick Hanfmann in 5 sets before falling to Mikael Ymer in 5 sets despite holding a 2-0 lead. He has a 2-3 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Wimbledon and a 10-10 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Fritz's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the quarterfinals on 3 occasions – including at 2022 Wimbledon, when he fell to Rafael Nadal in 5 sets. He also reached back-to-back Grand Slam quarterfinals at the 2023 US Open and 2024 Australian Open, falling to Novak Djokovic on both occasions.
- **Elsewhere in Grand Slam play this year**, Fritz reached the round of 16 at Roland Garros (l. Casper Ruud).
- Prior to Wimbledon this season, Fritz **won his 3rd title at Eastbourne**, defeating Max Purcell in the final to become the first 3-time champion in the tournament's history. He reached the quarterfinals at Queen's (l. Jordan Thompson). He is one of 7 players competing here this year to have won multiple Tour-level titles on grass.
- Fritz is bidding to become **the first American man to win multiple Tour-level titles on grass in the same year since 1999**, when Sampras won the titles at both Queen's and Wimbledon.
- Fritz's **other highlights in 2024** are winning the title at Delray Beach (d. Tommy Paul), finishing runner-up at Munich (l. Jan-Lennard Struff), reaching the semifinals at Madrid-1000 (l. Andrey Rublev) and reaching the quarterfinals at Rome-1000 (l. Alexander Zverev). He is one of 10 players to have won multiple Tour-level titles this season.
- Fritz is one of **5 seeded American men here** – USA has more seeded players in the draw than any other nation. Seeded at No. 13 but ranked at No. 12, Fritz is the highest-ranked American man competing at Wimbledon this year.
- Fritz reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 5 in February 2023. He plays here at No. 12.
- Fritz is a **former junior world No. 1**. He was named 2015 ITF Junior World Champion after winning the boys' singles title at the 2015 US Open (d. Paul). He also finished as runner-up in the boys' singles at 2015 Roland Garros (l. Paul). His best result in the boys' singles here was reaching the semifinals in 2015 (l. Reilly Opelka).

- Fritz made his **Davis Cup** debut in 2019 and has a 6-3 win-loss record in the competition. USA defeated Ukraine in the Qualifiers in February to reach the 2024 Davis Cup Finals and will compete in Group C in Zhuhai alongside Germany, Slovakia and Chile.
- Both of Fritz's parents were professional tennis players. His mother, Kathy May, is a former Top 10 player.
- Fritz is coached by Michael Russell and Paul Annacone.
- **O'CONNELL** is bidding to reach the 2nd round here for the 2nd time. This is his 3rd Wimbledon appearance and his 15th Grand Slam overall.
- Last year here, O'Connell equalled his **best Grand Slam result** by reaching the 3rd round. He defeated Hamad Medjedovic and Jiri Vesely for his first Wimbledon match-wins before falling to Christopher Eubanks. He also reached the 3rd round as a wild card at the 2022 Australian Open, when he defeated Hugo Gaston and Diego Schwartzman before falling to Maxime Cressy.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, O'Connell reached the 2nd round at the Australian Open (d. Cristian Garin, l. Ben Shelton). He did not compete at Roland Garros due to a shoulder injury.
- O'Connell's **best results in 2024** are reaching the quarterfinals as a wild card at Adelaide (l. Sebastian Korda) and the round of 16 as a direct acceptance at Miami-1000 (l. Jannik Sinner).
- O'Connell is **contesting his first match since Rome-1000 in May**, when he retired due to a shoulder injury during his 1st round match against Roberto Carballes Baena. He is one of 16 players competing here to have not contested an event on grass, at any level, prior to Wimbledon this year.

He lost his only previous match against a Top 20 player at Wimbledon, falling to No. 17 Gael Monfils in 5 sets in the 1st round in 2021.
- O'Connell is bidding to end a **9-match losing streak against Top 20 players at Tour-level**. He has not defeated a Top 20 player since defeating No. 16 Alexander Zverev in the 2nd round at Munich last year. He has a 2-16 win-loss record against Top 20 players at Tour-level overall.
- O'Connell lost his only previous **5-set match** at Wimbledon, against Monfils in the 1st round in 2021. He has a 1-2 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- O'Connell reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 53 in September last year. He plays here at No. 79.
- O'Connell is coached by Marinko Matosevic.

- **RUNE** is bidding to reach the 2nd round here for the 2nd time. This is his 3rd Wimbledon appearance and his 12th Grand Slam overall.
- Last year here, Rune equalled his **best Grand Slam result** by reaching the quarterfinals. He defeated George Loffhagen, Roberto Carballes Baena, Alejandro Davidovich Fokina and Grigor Dimitrov before falling to Carlos Alcaraz. He became the first Danish man to record a match-win at Wimbledon since Kenneth Carlsen in 2004. He also reached the quarterfinals at Roland Garros in both 2022 and 2023, losing to Casper Ruud on both occasions.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Rune reached the round of 16 at Roland Garros, falling to Alexander Zverev in 5 sets, but fell in the 2nd round at the Australian Open (d. Yoshihito Nishioka, l. Arthur Cazaux).
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Rune fell in the 1st round at Queen's (l. Jordan Thompson).
- Rune's **best result in 2024** is finishing runner-up at Brisbane (l. Grigor Dimitrov). He also reached the semifinals at Montpellier, where he retired due to a right arm injury against Borna Coric, Acapulco (l. Casper Ruud) and Munich (l. Jan-Lennard Struff) and reached the quarterfinals at Indian Wells-1000 (l. Daniil Medvedev) and Monte-Carlo-1000 (l. Jannik Sinner).
- Rune won the only **5-set match** he has contested at Wimbledon, against Davidovich Fokina in the 3rd round last year. He has a 2-3 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Rune **broke the Top 10 for the first time** in November 2022 after winning the title at Paris-1000. He reached a career-high ranking of No. 4 in August 2023 and plays here at No. 15 – his lowest ranking since October 2022.
- Rune is a **former junior world No. 1**. He won the boys' singles title at 2019 Roland Garros (d. Toby Kodat) and reached the top ranking in October that year. He reached the 3rd round on his only appearance in the boys' singles here in 2019 (l. Anton Matusevich).
- Rune made his **Davis Cup** debut for Denmark in 2018 and has a 7-2 win-loss record in the competition. Denmark face Kazakhstan in a World Group I tie in Kazakhstan in September.
- Rune is coached by Kenneth Carlsen and Patrick Mouratoglou.

- **KWON** is bidding to reach the 2nd round here for the 2nd time and equal his best Wimbledon result. This is his 4th Wimbledon appearance and his 19th Grand Slam overall.
- Kwon is bidding to become the **2nd Korean player in the Open Era to reach the 2nd round at Wimbledon on multiple occasions**, after Lee Hyung-Taik, who reached the 2nd round here on 4 occasions (2002, 2005-07).
- Kwon **missed Wimbledon last year due to a shoulder injury**. He was inactive due to the injury between February and August last year and returned to the Tour to compete at the US Open, the Istanbul Challenger (TUR) and the Davis Cup Finals Group Stage, before ending his season. He made a full return at the Australian Open this year.
- Kwon's **best Wimbledon result** is reaching the 2nd round in 2021, when he defeated Daniel Masur for his first Wimbledon match-win before falling to Dominik Koepfer. On his last appearance here, in 2022, he fell to Novak Djokovic in the 1st round.
- Kwon's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the 3rd round at 2021 Roland Garros, when he defeated Kevin Anderson and Andreas Seppi before falling to No. 9 seed Matteo Berrettini.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Kwon reached the 2nd round at Roland Garros (d. Emil Ruusuvuori, l. Sebastian Korda) but fell in the 1st round at the Australian Open (l. Lukas Klein).

- Kwon is bidding to **defeat a Top 20 player at Tour-level for the 3rd time**. He has a 2-21 win-loss record against Top 20 players at Tour-level with his 2 victories coming against No. 13 Felix Auger-Aliassime at the 2022 Davis Cup Finals Group Stage and against No. 15 Pablo Carreno Busta in the 2nd round at 2023 Adelaide 2.
- Kwon lost the only **5-set match** he has contested at Wimbledon – to Koepfer in the 2nd round in 2021. He has won one of the five in 5-set matches he has contested at Tour-level, defeating Rune in the 1st round at the 2022 Australian Open.
- Kwon has **won 2 Tour-level titles** – at 2021 Nur-Sultan in 2021 (d. James Duckworth) and as a lucky loser at 2023 Adelaide 2 (d. Roberto Bautista Agut). He is one of only 2 South Korean men to win a Tour-level title, after Lee, who won the title at 2003 Sydney.
- Kwon reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 52 in November 2021. He dropped as low as No. 865 in February this year but plays here at No. 367. He entered the tournament using a protected ranking of No. 80.
- Kwon has received support from the Grand Slam Player Development Programme (formerly known as the Grand Slam Development Fund), having been awarded a \$25,000 grant in 2018.
- Kwon has played **Davis Cup** for Korea, Rep. since 2017 and has an 11-10 win-loss record in the competition. Korea, Rep. will play away against Poland in a World Group I tie in September.
- Kwon is coached by Daniel Yoo.

- **Last year here**, Auger-Aliassime fell to Michael Mmoh in the 1st round. He also fell in the 1st round here in 2022 (l. Maxime Cressy).
- Auger-Aliassime's **best Wimbledon result** is reaching the quarterfinals in 2021, when he defeated Thiago Monteiro, Mikael Ymer, Nick Kyrgios and Alexander Zverev before falling to Matteo Berrettini.
- Auger-Aliassime's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the semifinals at the 2021 US Open (l. Daniil Medvedev). He became the first Canadian man to reach the semifinals at the US Open and the first man born in the 2000s to reach a Grand Slam semifinal.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Auger-Aliassime reached the round of 16 at Roland Garros (l. Carlos Alcaraz) and the 3rd round at the Australian Open (l. Daniil Medvedev).
- **Prior to Wimbledon this season**, Auger-Aliassime competed at Halle but retired due to a hip injury during his 1st round match against Dominik Koepfer.
- Auger-Aliassime's best result in 2024 is reaching his **first Masters-1000 final** at Madrid-1000 (l. Andrey Rublev). He has also reached the semifinals at Montpellier (l. Alexander Bublik) and the quarterfinals at Munich (l. Jan-Lennard Struff).
- Auger-Aliassime has **reached 2 Tour-level finals on grass** – finishing runner-up at Stuttgart in both 2019 (l. Matteo Berrettini) and 2021 (l. Marin Cilic).
- Auger-Aliassime won the only **5-set match** he has contested at Wimbledon – against Zverev in the round of 16 in 2021. He has a 6-3 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Auger-Aliassime broke the Top 10 for the first time in November 2021 and reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 6 in November 2022. He plays here at No. 17.
- Auger-Aliassime has **won 5 Tour-level titles**. He won his first title at 2022 Rotterdam (d. Stefanos Tsitsipas) and won 3 titles in 3 weeks in October 2022 – at Florence (d. JJ Wolf), Antwerp (d. Sebastian Korda) and Basel (d. Holger Rune). He then defended his Basel title in 2023 (d. Hubert Hurkacz).
- Auger-Aliassime was a **successful junior**. He won the boys' singles title at the 2016 US Open (d. Miomir Kecmanovic) and finished runner-up in the boys' singles at 2016 Roland Garros (l. Geoffrey Blancaneaux). He reached the quarterfinals in the boys' singles here in 2016 (l. Alex de Minaur) and also reached the final in the boys' doubles with Denis Shapovalov that year losing to Kenneth Raisma/Stefanos Tsitsipas in the final. He was

also part of Canadian teams that reached back-to-back Junior Davis Cup Finals in 2015-16, defeating Germany to win the title in 2015 but finishing runner-up to Russia in 2016.

- Auger-Aliassime **led Canada to the Davis Cup title in 2022**, defeating Australia in the final. He won 8 of the 9 matches he contested in the competition that year. He was also a member of the Canadian team which finished runners-up to Spain in 2019 and has a 9-4 win-loss record in the competition overall. Canada defeated Korea, Rep. in the Qualifiers in February to advance to the 2024 Davis Cup Finals Group Stage. They will compete in Group D in Manchester alongside Argentina, Finland and Great Britain in September.
- Auger-Aliassime is coached by Frederic Fontang and Toni Nadal.
- **KOKKINAKIS** is bidding to reach the 2nd round here for the 2nd time and equal his best Wimbledon result. This is his 4th Wimbledon appearance and 22nd Grand Slam overall.
- **Last year here**, Kokkinakis fell to Leandro Riedi in the 1st round of qualifying.
- Kokkinakis' **best Wimbledon result** is reaching the 2nd round in 2022 (d. Kamil Majchrzak, l. Novak Djokovic). He lost in the 1st round on his 2 other main draw appearance here – in 2015 (l. Leonardo Mayer) and 2017 (l. Juan Martin del Potro).
- Kokkinakis' **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the 3rd round at Roland Garros on 3 occasions – as a wild card in 2015 (l. Djokovic) and 2023 (l. Karen Khachanov), and as a direct acceptance in 2024 (l. Taylor Fritz).
- **Elsewhere in Grand Slam play this year**, Kokkinakis reached the 2nd round at the Australian Open (d. Sebastian Ofner, l. Grigor Dimitrov).
- Kokkinakis' **best Tour-level result in 2024** is reaching the quarterfinals at Los Cabos (l. Alexander Zverev).
- Also in 2024, Kokkinakis **won his 6th Challenger title** at the Sarasota Challenger (USA) (d. Zizou Bergs) and reached the quarterfinals at both the Phoenix Challenger (USA) (l. Nuno Borges) and the Bordeaux Challenger (FRA) (l. Arthur Fils).
- **Prior to Wimbledon**, Kokkinakis competed in qualifying at Queen's, defeating Luca Nardi before giving a walkover to Taro Daniel in the 2nd round of qualifying.
- Kokkinakis is bidding to record his **5th Tour-level match-win on grass**. His only Tour-level match-wins on grass have come in 2nd round finishes as a wild card at Queen's in both 2015 (d. Jeremy Chardy, l. Gilles Simon) and 2017 (d. Milos Raonic, l. Daniil Medvedev), at 2017 's-Hertogenbosch (d. Mikhail Youzhny, l. Medvedev) and at 2022 Wimbledon.
- Kokkinakis is bidding to **defeat a Top 20 player at a Grand Slam for the 2nd time on his 12th attempt**. His only victory against a Top 20 player at a Grand Slam came against No. 13 Ernests Gulbis in the 1st round at the 2015 Australian Open.
- Kokkinakis is bidding to end a **13-match losing streak against Top 20 players at Tour-level**. He has not defeated a Top 20 player since defeating No. 6 Andrey Rublev in the 2nd round at 2023 Adelaide 2. He has a 6-27 win-loss record against Top 20 players at Tour-level overall.
- Kokkinakis has won 4 of the last 5 **five-set matches** he has contested. His only loss in a 5-set match in that time came against Fritz in the 3rd round of Roland Garros this year. He has a 7-6 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level but has never contested a 5-set match at Wimbledon
- Kokkinakis has **recorded 3 successful comebacks from 0-2 down** – against Lukas Rosol in a Davis Cup tie between Australia and Czechia in 2015, against Bernard Tomic in the 2nd round at 2015 Roland Garros, and against Giulio Zeppieri in the 2nd round at the Australian Open this year.
- Kokkinakis reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 65 in November last year. He plays here at No. 93.
- Kokkinakis **won the 2022 Australian Open men's doubles title** alongside Kyrgios. The pair defeated Matthew Ebden/Max Purcell in the first all-Australian Grand Slam men's doubles final since the 1980 Australian Open. They became the first all-Australian team to win a Grand Slam men's doubles title since Todd Woodbridge/Mark Woodforde at 2000 Wimbledon.

- Kokkinakis is a **former Australian Open boys' singles finalist**, falling to Kyrgios in 2013. He also reached the boys' singles final at the 2013 US Open (l. Borna Coric) and won the boys' doubles title at 2013 Wimbledon with Kyrgios. He reached the 3rd round in his only appearance in the boys' singles here in 2013 (l. Laslo Djere).
- Kokkinakis was a member of the **Australian team which reached the Davis Cup final for the first time since 2003** in 2022. He was also a member of the team at the Finals Group Stage last year, but missed the Final 8 Knockout Stage in Malaga, where the team also finished as runners-up, due to an ankle injury. He has a 5-7 win-loss record in the competition. As runners-up in 2023, Australia have qualified automatically for the 2024 Finals Group Stage in September and will compete in Group B in Valencia alongside Czechia, France and Spain.
- Kokkinakis is coached by Todd Langman and Todd Ley.

NO. 24 ALEJANDRO TABILO (CHI) v DANIEL EVANS (GBR)

Head-to-head: first meeting

Tabilo has won the only Tour-level match he has played against a British player, defeating Cameron Norrie in the quarterfinals at Auckland this year.

Evans has won both previous matches he has played against lefthanders at Wimbledon – against Federico Delbonis in the 1st round in 2019, and against Feliciano Lopez in the 1st round in 2021. Belgium defeated Croatia in the Qualifiers in February to advance to the 2024 Davis Cup Finals Group Stage. They will compete in Group A in Bologna alongside Italy, Netherlands and Brazil in September.
- Goffin is coached by Germain Gigounon.

- **MACHAC** is bidding to reach the 2nd round here for the first time. This is his 2nd Wimbledon appearance and his 9th Grand Slam overall.
- **Last year here**, Machac qualified for the main draw to make his Wimbledon debut, falling to Cameron Norrie in 4 sets in the 1st round.
- Machac's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the 3rd round at both the Australian Open (l. Karen Khachanov) and Roland Garros (l. Daniil Medvedev) this year.
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Machac fell in the 1st round at Halle (l. Arthur Fils).
- Machac's best result in 2024 is reaching his **first Tour-level final** at Geneva (l. Casper Ruud). He also reached the quarterfinals at Marseille (l. Hubert Hurkacz) and Miami-1000 (l. Jannik Sinner).
- Machac is bidding to record his **first Tour-level match-win on grass**. His only previous match-wins on grass as a professional, at any level, have come at Wimbledon qualifying in 2021, when he defeated Tommy Robredo and Brayden Schnur before falling to Christopher O'Connell, and in 2023, when he defeated Yasutaka Uchiyama, Kaichi Uchida and Lucas Pouille to qualify for the main draw. His only previous Tour-level appearances on grass came in the 1st round here last year and in the 1st round at Halle this year.
- Machac has won one of the 3 **five-set matches** he has contested – he defeated Mariano Navone in the 2nd round at Roland Garros this year, but falling to Taylor Fritz in the 1st round at 2020 Roland Garros and Botić van de Zandschulp in the 1st round at the 2022 US Open.
- Machac reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 33 in June this year. He plays here at No. 39.
- Machac made his **Davis Cup** debut for Czechia at the 2021 Finals and has a 9-6 overall win-loss record in the competition. Czechia defeated Israel in the Qualifiers in February to advance to the 2024 Davis Cup Finals Group Stage and will compete in Group B in Valencia alongside Australia, France and Spain in September.
- Machac is coached by Daniel Vacek, who reached the round of 16 here in 1994, falling to eventual champion Pete Sampras.

- Wild card **JUBB** is bidding to record his first Grand Slam match-win. This is his 3rd Grand Slam main draw appearance, having also competed here in 2019 and 2022.
- Jubb **did not compete here in 2023** due to an ankle injury that saw him miss 6 months on Tour from January to July last year. He lost in the 1st round on his 2 previous main draw appearances here – as a wild card in 2019 (l. Joao Sousa) and 2022 (l. Nick Kyrgios).
- Jubb is bidding to record his **4th Tour-level match-win**. He recorded his first 3 Tour-level match-wins by reaching his first Tour-level semifinal as a qualifier at Mallorca last week, defeating Maximilian Marterer, Adam Walton and Ben Shelton before falling to Sebastian Ofner. He lost in the 1st round on his 4 other Tour-level appearances – in addition to his appearances here in 2019 and 2022, he also fell in the 1st round as a qualifier at 2019 Eastbourne (l. Taylor Fritz) and a qualifier at 2022 Queen's (l. Botic van de Zandschulp).
- **Elsewhere on grass this season**, Jubb reached the 2nd round as a qualifier at the Surbiton Challenger (GBR) (d. Alex Michelsen, l. Mikhail Kukushkin) and as a wild card at the Nottingham Challenger (GBR) (d. Duje Ajdukovic, l. Jacob Fearnley). He also attempted to qualify at Queen's but lost in the 1st round of qualifying (l. Mackenzie McDonald).
- Jubb was **ranked too low to compete in qualifying at the Australian Open and Roland Garros this year**. His last appearance in qualifying at a Grand Slam came at the 2023 Australian Open, when he fell to Dalibor Svrčina in the 1st round of qualifying.
- Jubb has **competed mainly at Challenger-level this season**. His best result is reaching his 2nd Challenger-level final at the Glasgow Challenger (GBR) (l. Clement Chidekh). He also reached the semifinals at the Indian Wells 1 Challenger (USA) (l. Mitchell Krueger) and the Kachreti Challenger (GEO) (l. Robin Bertrand).
- Jubb is one of the **11 British players** competing in the men's singles draw at Wimbledon this year, the most since 1999, when there were also 11. He is also one of 18 British players to compete here across the men's and women's singles, the most since 1999, when there were 19 players across the 2 draws.
- Jubb lost the only **5-set match** he has contested – against Kyrgios in the 1st round here in 2022.
- Jubb broke the Top 200 for the first time in September 2022, reaching a **career-high ranking** of No. 196. He dropped as low as No. 894 in November last year but has improved his ranking by nearly 700 places since then and plays here at No. 201.
- Jubb **played college tennis**. He represented the University of South Carolina from 2017 to 2019 and won the NCAA singles championship in 2019.
- Jubb is coached by Jaime Pulgar-Garcia.

- **SEYBOTH WILD** is bidding to reach the 2nd round at a Grand Slam for the 2nd time on his Wimbledon main draw debut. This is his 5th Grand Slam main draw appearance overall.
- **Last year here**, Seyboth Wild fell in the final round of qualifying. He defeated Jelle Sels and Pierre-Hugues Herbert before falling to Tomas Barrios Vera in 5 sets. He also fell in qualifying here in 2021 and 2022.
- Seyboth Wild's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the 3rd round as a qualifier at Roland Garros last year. He defeated Daniil Medvedev and Guido Pella for his first Grand Slam match-wins before falling to Yoshihito Nishioka.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Seyboth Wild fell in the 1st round at both the Australian Open (l. Andrey Rublev) and Roland Garros (l. Gael Monfils).
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Seyboth Wild reached the 2nd round at Eastbourne (d. James McCabe, l. Taylor Fritz). It is his only previous Tour-level appearance on grass.
- Seyboth Wild's **best result in 2024** is reaching the quarterfinals at Rio de Janeiro (l. Cameron Norrie). He also reached the 3rd round as a qualifier at both Indian Wells-1000 (l. Fabian Marozsan) and Miami-1000 (l. Nicolas Jarry) and as a direct acceptance at Madrid-1000 (l. Carlos Alcaraz).
- Seyboth Wild has won one of the 3 **five-set matches** he has contested at Tour-level. He defeated Medvedev in 5 sets at 2023 Roland Garros before falling to Nishioka in 5 sets in the 3rd round. He also fell to Rublev in 5 sets in the 1st round at the Australian Open this year.
- Seyboth Wild reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 58 in May this year. He plays here at No. 74.
- Seyboth Wild is a **former junior world No. 8** and won the boys' singles title at the 2018 US Open, defeating Lorenzo Musetti in the final. He lost to Francesco Forti in the 1st round on his only appearance in the boys' singles at Wimbledon in 2017.
- Seyboth Wild made his **Davis Cup** debut for Brazil in 2020 and has a 1-2 win-loss record in the competition. Brazil defeated Sweden in the Qualifiers in February to advance to the Davis Cup Finals Group Stage. They will compete in Group A in Bologna alongside Italy, Netherlands and Belgium in September.
- Seyboth Wild is coached by Carlos Eduardo Matos.

NO. 14 BEN SHELTON (USA) v (Q) MATTIA BELLUCCI (ITA)

Head-to-head: first meeting

Shelton is facing a qualifier at a Grand Slam for the 3rd time. He has a 1-1 win-loss record against qualifiers at the Grand Slams, having lost to Nuno Borges in the 1st round at the 2022 US Open on his Grand Slam debut, but defeated Nicolas Jarry in the 2nd round at the 2023 Australian Open. He has a 5-6 win-loss record against qualifiers at Tour-level overall.

Shelton has lost Tour-level matches to players ranked as low as No. 148 Bellucci on 3 occasions – to Shang Juncheng (then-ranked No. 156) in the 1st round at 2023 Atlanta, to Shang (then-ranked No. 149) in the 2nd round at 2023 Washington, and to No. 289 Paul Jubb in the quarterfinals at Mallorca last week.

Shelton and Bellucci are 2 of the 18 lefthanders to begin this year's Wimbledon men's singles main draw. This is one of 2 matches between lefthanded players in the men's singles 1st round here, alongside Cameron Norrie's match against Facundo Diaz Acosta. Rafael Nadal was the last lefthander to win the title here in 2010.

Shelton is bidding to defeat a lefthanded player at Tour-level for the 2nd time. He lost his first 5 Tour-level matches against lefthanded players before defeating Hugo Gaston in the 1st round at Roland Garros this year for his first Tour-level victory against a fellow lefthander. Bellucci is facing a lefthanded player at Tour-level for the first time.

- **SHELTON** is bidding to record his 50th Tour-level match-win.
- Shelton is bidding to reach the 2nd round here for the 2nd straight year. **Last year here**, on his Wimbledon debut, he reached the 2nd round. (d. Taro Daniel, I. Laslo Djere). This is his 8th Grand Slam overall.
- Shelton's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the semifinals at the 2023 US Open (I. Novak Djokovic). Aged 20 years 336 days, he became the youngest American man to reach the semifinals at the US Open since Michael Chang (20 years 204 days) in 1992.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Shelton reached the 3rd round at both the Australian Open (I. Adrian Mannarino) and Roland Garros (I. Felix Auger-Aliassime).
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Shelton reached the quarterfinals at Mallorca, where he received a bye through the 1st round and defeated Rinky Hijikata before falling to Paul Jubb. He lost his opening match at both Stuttgart (I. James Duckworth) and Queen's (I. Giovanni Mpetshi Perricard).
- Shelton's best result in 2024 is winning his **2nd Tour-level title** at Houston (d. Frances Tiafoe). He also reached the semifinals at Auckland (I. Taro Daniel) and Dallas (I. Tommy Paul) and the quarterfinals at Acapulco (I. Casper Ruud).
- Shelton is bidding to record his **4th match-win on grass, at any level**. In addition to his 2nd round finish here last year and his victory against Hijikata at Mallorca last week, his only other match-win on grass came in a 2nd round finish at Queen's last year (d. JJ Wolf, I. Lorenzo Musetti).
- Shelton won the only **5-set match** he has contested at Wimbledon, against Daniel in the 1st round last year. He has a 3-2 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.

- Shelton reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 14 in April 2024 after winning his 2nd Tour-level title at Houston. He plays here at the same ranking.
- Shelton is one of **5 seeded American men** here – USA has more seeded players in the draw than any other nation.
- Shelton **played college tennis**. He represented the University of Florida for 2 seasons, compiling a 65-10 win-loss record in singles and winning the 2021 NCAA team title and the 2022 NCAA singles title.
- Shelton **contested just 4 tournaments as a junior player**, all of which came in his home country. His best result was reaching the 3rd round as a wild card at 2020 JA Plantation (USA) (also known as the Orange Bowl), falling to Jack Pinnington Jones.
- Shelton's father, Bryan Shelton, reached a career-high ranking of No. 55 in March 1992. He made 6 appearances at Wimbledon, reaching the round of 16 in 1994.
- Shelton is coached by his father, Bryan Shelton, and Dean Goldfine.
- Qualifier **BELLUCCI** is bidding to record his first Tour-level match-win on his Wimbledon debut.
- Bellucci defeated No. 31 seed Duje Adjukovic (CRO) 57 75 76(12), Bernabe Zapata Miralles (ESP) 76(3) 63 and No. 9 seed David Goffin (BEL) 63 26 76(4) 64 in the **3 rounds of Wimbledon qualifying last week**. It was the 3rd time he has successfully qualified at a Grand Slam on his 7th appearance in qualifying.
- **Last year here**, on his only previous appearance in Wimbledon qualifying, Bellucci reached the final round of qualifying. He defeated Ivan Gakhov and Raphael Collignon before falling to Dominic Stricker.
- Bellucci is making his **3rd Grand Slam main draw appearance**. He made his Grand Slam debut as a qualifier at the 2023 Australian Open, where he fell to Benjamin Bonzi in the 1st round of the main draw. He also qualified at Roland Garros this year, falling to Frances Tiafoe in the 1st round of the main draw. Those are his only previous Tour-level appearances.
- **Elsewhere in Grand Slam play this year**, Bellucci reached the 2nd round of qualifying at the Australian Open (d. Jozef Kovalik, I. Emilio Nava).
- **Prior to competing in Wimbledon qualifying this year**, Bellucci reached the semifinals on grass at the Nottingham Challenger (GBR) (I. Jacob Fearnley) but lost in the 1st round at both the Surbiton Challenger (GBR) (I. Brandon Nakashima) and the Ilkley Challenger (GBR) (I. Richard Gasquet).
- Bellucci **competes mainly at Challenger-level**. His best performances at Challenger-level this season are reaching the semifinals at the Nottingham Challenger (GBR) and the quarterfinals at the Pau Challenger (FRA) (I. Nakashima), the Hamburg Challenger (GER) (I. Yuta Shimizu) and the Shenzhen 1 Challenger (CHN) (I. James Duckworth).
- Bellucci has **won 3 Challenger-level titles** – at the 2022 Saint Tropez Challenger (FRA) (d. Matteo Arnaldi), the 2022 Vilnius Challenger (LTU) (d. Cem Ilkel) and the 2023 Cassis Challenger (FRA) (d. Tomas Machac).
- Bellucci is **facing a Top 20 player, at any level, for the first time**. The highest-ranked player he has previously faced, at any level, is No. 23 Matteo Berrettini, to whom he lost in the 1st round at the 2023 Phoenix Challenger (USA). The highest-ranked player he has defeated, at any level, is No. 61 Roberto Carballes Baena in the 1st round at the 2023 Malaga Challenger (ESP).
- Bellucci lost the only **5-set match** he has contested – falling to Tiafoe in 5 sets in the 1st round at Roland Garros this year.
- Bellucci reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 142 in January 2023. He plays here 6 places lower at No. 148.
- Bellucci is coached by Fabio Chiappini and Paolo Moretti
