



2024 WIMBLEDON DAY 3 MEN'S NOTES Wednesday 3 July

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On court today...

- After fulfilling the tradition of opening Centre Court play for the Championships on Monday, defending champion Carlos Alcaraz switches to No. 1 court today. On the other side of the net is Aleksandar Vukic, a man who defeated him in their only previous meeting in qualifying at 2020 Roland Garros, when Alcaraz was just 17 years old, ranked No. 193 in the world, and with spectators barred from attending due to Covid-19. Today's match will be a whole different prospect for Vukic, with Alcaraz now a 3-time Grand Slam champion and the world No. 3. But the Australian has been in good form of late, having reached the semifinals at Eastbourne last week, and will hope to carry that momentum into today's clash.

- There are 2 all-Italian match-ups in the 2nd round here this year – and the first to take to court will be a blockbuster duel between world No. 1 Jannik Sinner and 2021 Wimbledon runner-up Matteo Berrettini, with the match scheduled 3rd on Centre Court today. Berrettini has never defeated a world No. 1 before in his 4 previous attempts and lost to Sinner in their only previous meeting in the 2nd round at Toronto-1000 last year. Moreover, Sinner has never lost to a fellow Italian at Tour-level, holding a perfect 13-0 win-loss record against his compatriots. The duo are 2 of the 7 Italian men to have reached the 2nd round at Wimbledon this year, a new Open Era record. Fabio Fognini and Lorenzo Sonego are also contesting 2nd round matches today, before Flavio Cobolli, Luciano Darderi and Lorenzo Musetti play their 2nd round matches on Thursday – the latter 2 facing off against one another.

- On No. 2 Court, veterans Stan Wawrinka and Gael Monfils face each other in a clash of the 2 oldest men to play the men's singles draw here this year. With a combined age of more than 77 years old, this showdown has the 3rd-oldest combined age in the Open Era – after 2 matches contested by 40-something Bob Howe in 1969 and 1971. Should Wawrinka win, he will become just the 6th man in the Open Era to reach the 3rd round here aged 39 or older, matching the achievement of his compatriot Roger Federer in 2021. Victory for Monfils, at the age of 37 years 221 days, will see him become the oldest Frenchman in the Open Era to reach the round of 16 at Wimbledon.

NO. 1 JANNIK SINNER (ITA) v MATTEO BERRETTINI (ITA)

Head-to-head: Sinner leads 1-0

2023 Toronto-1000 Hard (O) R32 Sinner 64 63

A 2nd meeting for Sinner and Berrettini – but their first at a Grand Slam or on grass.

Sinner has lost Grand Slam matches to players ranked as low as No. 59 Berrettini twice before – to No. 67 Marton Fucsovics in the 2nd round at the 2020 Australian Open and to No. 79 Daniel Altmaier in the 2nd round at 2023 Roland Garros. The lowest-ranked player to have defeated Sinner at Wimbledon is No. 48 Fucsovics in the 1st round in 2021.

Berrettini is bidding to defeat a world No. 1 for the first time on his 5th attempt. He has lost all 4 of his previous matches against No. 1-ranked players – to Novak Djokovic in the quarterfinals at 2021 Roland Garros, in the final at 2021 Wimbledon and in the quarterfinals at the 2021 US Open, and to Carlos Alcaraz in the round of 16 here last year. The highest-ranked players he has defeated are No. 3 Dominic Thiem at the 2021 ATP Cup and No. 3 Casper Ruud at the 2023 United Cup.

Sinner and Berrettini are 2 of the 7 Italian players who have reached the men's singles 2nd round here – the most Italian men to reach the 2nd round at Wimbledon in the Open Era. The previous highest-number of Italian men in the 2nd round here in the Open Era was 6 in 2018. The most Italian men to reach the 3rd round at Wimbledon in the Open Era is 3 – which has happened on 3 occasions, in 2019, 2021 and 2023.

Sinner and Berrettini are in 5th and 6th place, respectively, on the all-time list for most Grand Slam men's singles matches won by an Italian player.

This is the 7th all-Italian men's singles match at Wimbledon in the Open Era – and the 2nd in consecutive years, after Berrettini defeated Lorenzo Sonego in the 1st round here last year. It is the 22nd all-Italian men's singles match at the Grand Slams in the Open Era – and the first since the 2023 US Open, when Sinner defeated Sonego in the 2nd round. (NB Lorenzo Musetti and Luciano Darderi will contest the 2nd all-Italian men's singles match here this year on Thursday)

Sinner is bidding to maintain his perfect record against Italian players at Tour-level. He has won all 13 Tour-level matches he has contested against Italian players, including both of his previous matches against Italian players at the Grand Slams – against Gianluca Mager in the 2nd round at 2021 Roland Garros and against Sonego in the 2nd round at the 2023 US Open. (NB Sinner gave a walkover to Musetti due to illness in the quarterfinals at 2023 Barcelona)

Berrettini has a 9-5 win-loss record against Italian players at Tour-level and has won the 2 matches he has contested against Italian players this season, having defeated Sonego in the quarterfinals at Marrakech and Musetti in the semifinals at Stuttgart. He won his only previous match against an Italian player at the Grand Slams, against Sonego in the 1st round here last year.

Sinner and Berrettini have played Davis Cup for Italy since 2021 and 2019, respectively. Sinner has an 11-4 win-loss record in the competition, while Berrettini has a 5-4 Davis Cup win-loss record. Sinner led Italy to their 2nd Davis Cup title in 2023, winning all 5 matches he played across singles and doubles at the Final 8 Knockout Stage in Malaga, while Berrettini missed the event due to injury. As defending champions, Italy qualified automatically for the 2024 Davis Cup Finals Group Stage in September and will compete in Group A in Bologna alongside Netherlands, Belgium and Brazil.

- **SINNER** is bidding to reach the 3rd round here for the 3rd straight year. This is his 4th Wimbledon appearance and his 19th Grand Slam overall.
- Sinner advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Yannick Hanfmann 63 64 36 63 in the 1st round on Monday.
- Last year here, Sinner recorded his **best Wimbledon result** by reaching the semifinals (l. Novak Djokovic). It was his first appearance in a Grand Slam semifinal, having previously reached the quarterfinals at all 4 Grand Slam tournaments, including at Wimbledon in 2022 (l. Djokovic).
- Sinner won his **first Grand Slam title** at the 2024 Australian Open, recovering from 0-2 down to defeat Daniil Medvedev in 5 sets in the final. He became the 3rd Italian man to win a Grand Slam title – after Nicola Pietrangeli (1959, 1960 Roland Garros) and Adriano Panatta (1976 Roland Garros) – and the first Italian player to win an Australian Open singles title.
- Sinner is bidding to become the **2nd Italian player to win multiple Grand Slam singles titles**, after Pietrangeli. He is also bidding to become the first Italian player to win a Wimbledon singles title and the 2nd Italian player to reach a singles final here, after 2021 men's singles runner-up Matteo Berrettini.
- Sinner is bidding to become the **6th active player to win multiple Grand Slam men's singles titles** – after Alcaraz, Djokovic, Andy Murray, Rafael Nadal and Stan Wawrinka. He would also become the 32nd player in the Open Era to win multiple Grand Slam men's singles titles.
- If Sinner wins his 2nd Grand Slam title on his 2nd Grand Slam appearance since winning his first, he will equal the **Open Era record for fewest attempts before winning a 2nd Grand Slam men's singles title**. In the Open Era, 7 players have won their 2nd Grand Slam singles titles on their 2nd appearances after winning their first – Alcaraz, Sergi Bruguera, Roger Federer, Jan Kodes, Murray, Stan Smith and Guillermo Vilas. No player has won their 2nd Grand Slam men's singles title on their first Grand Slam appearance after winning their first.
- **Elsewhere in Grand Slam play this year**, Sinner reached the semifinals at Roland Garros for the first time, falling to Carlos Alcaraz in 5 sets.
- Sinner is bidding to record his **52nd Grand Slam match-win**. By defeating Grigor Dimitrov in the quarterfinals at Roland Garros last month for his 50th Grand Slam match-win, he became the 5th Italian man to record 50 match-wins at the Grand Slams – after Pietrangeli (94 Grand Slam match-wins), Fabio Fognini (who is bidding to record his 71st Grand Slam match-win today), Andreas Seppi (63) and Panatta (62).
- Prior to Wimbledon this year, Sinner won his **first grass court title** at Halle (d. Hubert Hurkacz). He became the 4th Italian man in history to win a Tour-level title on grass – after Berrettini (4 grass court titles), and Andreas Seppi and Lorenzo Sonego (both one).
- Sinner has won 4 Tour-level titles this season and leads the Tour for **most singles titles won in 2024**. In addition to his titles at the Australian Open and Halle, he also won the titles at Rotterdam (d. Alex de Minaur) and Miami-1000 (d. Grigor Dimitrov). He also reached the semifinals at Indian Wells-1000 (l. Alcaraz) and Monte Carlo-1000 (l. Stefanos Tsitsipas) and the quarterfinals at Madrid-1000, where he gave a walkover to Felix Auger-Aliassime due to a right hip injury.
- Sinner is bidding to record his **40th Tour-level match-win this season**. He is in 2nd place on the list for most Tour-level matches won in 2024, behind Casper Ruud (40-10).

- Sinner has won one of the last 5 **five-set matches** he has contested, with his only victory in a 5-set match in that time coming against Medvedev in the final at the Australian Open this year. He lost the only 5-set match he has contested at Wimbledon – in the quarterfinals in 2022, when he lost to Djokovic in 5 sets despite holding a 2-0 lead. He has a 6-8 win-loss record in 5-set matches overall.
- Sinner became the **first Italian player to reach the singles world No. 1 ranking** last month and plays here at the same ranking. By winning the title at Halle, he became the 8th man to win the title in his first event as world No. 1 since the ATP rankings were introduced in 1973. He is guaranteed to remain at No. 1 the week on Monday 15 July regardless of the outcome of this tournament.
- Sinner reached a **career-high junior ranking of No. 133** and did not contest the boys' singles events at any of the Grand Slam tournaments. His best result as a junior was reaching the quarterfinals as a wild card at the Grade A Trofeo Bonfiglio event in Milan in 2018 (l. Naoki Tajima).
- Sinner is coached by Simone Vagnozzi and Darren Cahill.
- **BERRETTINI** is bidding to reach the 3rd round here for the 4th time. This is his 5th Wimbledon appearance and his 21st Grand Slam overall.
- Berrettini advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Marton Fucsovics 76(3) 62 36 61 in the 1st round on Monday.
- **Last year here**, Berrettini reached the round of 16, defeating Lorenzo Sonego, Alex de Minaur and Alexander Zverev, before falling to Carlos Alcaraz.
- Berrettini's became the **first Italian man in history to contest the final at Wimbledon in 2021**, falling to Novak Djokovic in 4 sets. He also became the first Italian man to reach a Grand Slam final since Adriano Panatta at 1976 Roland Garros.
- Berrettini **did not contest a Grand Slam event prior to Wimbledon this year**, having withdrawn from the Australian Open due to a right foot injury and from Roland Garros in order to prepare for the grass court season.
- Prior to Wimbledon, Berrettini reached his **6th Tour-level final on grass** at Stuttgart (l. Jack Draper). He also reached the 2nd round at Halle (d. Alex Michelsen, l. Marcos Giron).
- Berrettini's best Tour-level result in 2024 is winning his **8th Tour-level title**, and first since 2022, at Marrakech (d. Roberto Carballes Baena). He also reached the final at the Phoenix Challenger (USA) (l. Nuno Borges).
- Berrettini has **won 4 Tour-level titles on grass** – at Stuttgart in 2019 (d. Felix Auger-Aliassime) and 2022 (d. Andy Murray), and at Queen's in 2021 (d. Cameron Norrie) and 2022 (d. Filip Krajinovic). He is one of 7 players competing here this year to have won multiple Tour-level titles on grass. His 4 other titles have come on clay.
- Berrettini has won 7 of the 9 **five-set matches** he has contested – including both 5-set matches he has contested at Wimbledon, defeating Jack Sock in the 1st round in 2018 and Diego Schwartzman in the 3rd round in 2019. His only defeats in 5-set matches came at the Australian Open – against Tennys Sandgren in the 2nd round in 2020 and against Murray in the 1st round in 2023.
- Berrettini reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 6 in January 2022 after reaching the semifinals at the Australian Open. He fell outside the Top 100 for the first time since May 2018 in January this year, before returning to the Top 100 in April. He plays here at No. 59.
- Berrettini is coached by Francisco Roig and Umberto Rianna.

NO. 3 CARLOS ALCARAZ (ESP) v ALEKSANDAR VUKIC (AUS)

Tour-level head-to-head: first meeting

2020 Roland Garros Qualifying Draw Clay (O) R128 Vukic 46 76(5) 63

A first Tour-level meeting for Alcaraz and Vukic. Their only previous meeting came below Tour-level, in qualifying at 2020 Roland Garros, when Alcaraz was 17 years old and ranked at No. 193.

Alcaraz has lost a Grand Slam match to a player ranked as low as No. 69 Vukic once before – against No. 95 Mikael Ymer in the 2nd round at the 2021 Australian Open.

- Defending champion **ALCARAZ** is bidding to reach the 3rd round here for the 3rd straight year. This is his 4th Wimbledon appearance and his 14th Grand Slam overall.
- Alcaraz advanced to the 2nd round after defeating qualifier Mark Lajal 76(3) 75 62 in the 1st round on Monday.
- Last year here, Alcaraz won his **first Wimbledon title**, defeating Novak Djokovic in 5 sets in the final. He became the 3rd Spanish man to win the title here – after Manuel Santana (1966) and Rafael Nadal (2008, 2010) – and, aged 20 years 72 days, became the 3rd-youngest player in the Open Era to win the men's singles title here, after Boris Becker (who won his first 2 Wimbledon titles aged 17 years 227 days in 1985 and aged 18 years 226 days in 1986) and Bjorn Borg (who won his first Wimbledon title aged 20 years 27 days in 1976).
- Alcaraz has **won 3 Grand Slam titles on 3 different surfaces**. He won his first Grand Slam title at the 2022 US Open (d. Casper Ruud) and won his most-recent Grand Slam title at 2024 Roland Garros (d. Alexander Zverev). He became the first man in the Open Era to win his first 3 Grand Slam titles on different surfaces and, aged 21 years 36 days, became the youngest man in the Open Era to win 3 Grand Slam titles on different surfaces.
- Alcaraz is bidding to become the **9th man in the Open Era to retain the Wimbledon title** – after Rod Laver, John Newcombe, Borg, John McEnroe, Becker, Pete Sampras, Roger Federer and Djokovic.
- Aged 21 years 70 days, Alcaraz is bidding to become the **3rd player in the Open Era to win multiple Wimbledon men's singles titles aged 21 or under** – after Becker and Borg. (NB ages calculated at the end of the tournament)
- Alcaraz is also bidding to win his **4th Grand Slam title and equal the Open Era record for most Grand Slam men's singles titles won aged 21 or under** – alongside Becker, Borg and Mats Wilander.
- Elsewhere in Grand Slam play this year**, Alcaraz reached the quarterfinals at the Australian Open (l. Zverev).
- Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Alcaraz reached the 2nd round as defending champion at Queen's (d. Francisco Cerundolo, l. Jack Draper). The defeat to Draper ended Alcaraz's 13-match winning streak on grass, with his last defeat on grass having come in the quarterfinals at 2022 Wimbledon, when he fell to Jannik Sinner.
- Alcaraz's **other highlights in 2024** are winning the title at Indian Wells-1000 (d. Medvedev) and reaching the semifinals at Buenos Aires (l. Nicolas Jarry) and the quarterfinals at Miami-1000 (l. Grigor Dimitrov) and Madrid-1000 (l. Andrey Rublev). He is one of 10 players to have won multiple Tour-level titles prior to Wimbledon this season.

- Alcaraz has won 9 of the 10 **five-set matches** he has contested, with his only defeat in a 5-set match coming against Matteo Berrettini in the 3rd round at the 2022 Australian Open. He became the first man in the Open Era to win the Roland Garros title after winning 5-set matches in both the semifinals and the final, defeating Sinner in the semifinals before defeating Zverev in the final. He has won all 3 five-set matches he has contested at Wimbledon.
- Aged 19 years 130 days, Alcaraz became the **youngest world No. 1 in history** after winning the title at the 2022 US Open. He has been ranked as world No. 1 for 36 weeks, most recently between June and September 2023. He plays here at No. 3.
- Alcaraz **led Spain to victory at the 2018 Junior Davis Cup Finals in Budapest**, defeating France in the title match. He reached a career-high junior ranking of No. 22 in January 2020 and his best performance in the junior events at the Grand Slams was his quarterfinal finish in the boys' singles here in 2019.
- Alcaraz has played **Davis Cup** for Spain since 2022 and has won 2 of the 3 matches he has contested in the competition. Spain were awarded a wild card for the 2024 Davis Cup Finals Group Stage and will compete in Group B in Valencia alongside Australia, Czechia and France.
- Alcaraz is coached by former world No. 1 Juan Carlos Ferrero, who reached the quarterfinals here in 2007 and 2009.
- **VUKIC** is bidding to reach the 3rd round at a Grand Slam for the first time. This is his 2nd Wimbledon appearance and his 9th Grand Slam overall.
- Vukic advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Sebastian Ofner 67(9) 64 64 36 76(10) in the 1st round on Monday, saving a match point in the final set. It was his **first victory in a 5-set match** – he had lost both 5-set matches he had previously contested.
- By reaching the 2nd round here, Vukic has equalled his **best Grand Slam result**. He also reached the 2nd round as a wild card at the 2022 Australian Open (d. Lloyd Harris, I. Radu Albot) and as a direct acceptance on his Wimbledon debut last year (d. Daniel Altmaier, I. Quentin Halys).
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Vukic fell in the 1st round at both the Australian Open (I. Jordan Thompson) and Roland Garros (I. Zhang Zhizhen). His victory in the 1st round here ended a 4-match Grand Slam losing streak, having previously not recorded a Grand Slam match-win since reaching the 2nd round here last year.
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Vukic reached the semifinals as a lucky loser at Eastbourne (I. Taylor Fritz). He also reached the quarterfinals at 's-Hertogenbosch (I. Tallon Griekspoor), fell to Giovanni Mpetshi Perricard in the 1st round of qualifying at Queen's and reached the 2nd round at the Surbiton Challenger (GBR) (d. Denis Shapovalov, I. Lloyd Harris).
- Vukic is bidding to record his **9th Tour-level match-win on grass**. Prior to this season, he had recorded just 2 Tour-level match-wins on grass – in 2nd round finishes at 2023 Eastbourne (d. Brandon Nakashima, I. Miomir Kecmanovic) and 2023 Wimbledon.
- Vukic's **other Tour-level highlight in 2024** are reaching the quarterfinals at Marrakech (I. Mariano Navone). He also reached the semifinals at the Phoenix Challenger (USA) (I. Matteo Berrettini).
- Vukic is **bidding to defeat a Top 5 player for the first time on his 3rd attempt**. He lost both of his previous matches against Top 5 players, both of which have come this year – against No. 1 Novak Djokovic in the 2nd round at Indian Wells-1000 and against No. 5 Alexander Zverev in the 2nd round at Rome-1000. The highest-ranked player he has defeated is No. 15 Borna Coric in the 2nd round at 2023 Toronto-1000.
- Vukic reached a **career-high ranking** of No 48 in August 2023. He plays here at No. 69.
- Vukic played **college tennis**. He represented the University of Illinois from 2015 to 2018 and was named a 3-time All-American and 2017 Big Ten Athlete of the Year.
- Vukic is coached by Nuno Lencastre and Jay Gooding.

NO. 5 DANIIL MEDVEDEV v ALEXANDRE MULLER (FRA)

Tour-level head-to-head: first meeting

2016 St Remy Challenger (FRA) Hard (O) QF Medvedev 60 60

A first Tour-level meeting for Medvedev and Muller. Medvedev won without dropping a game on their only meeting below Tour-level, at the 2016 St Remy Challenger (FRA).

Medvedev has lost Grand Slam matches to players ranked as low as No. 102 Muller on 4 occasions. His first 3 Grand Slam defeats came against players ranked outside the Top 100 – to No. 131 Ernesto Escobedo in the 1st round at the 2017 Australian Open, to No. 266 Benjamin Bonzi in the 1st round at 2017 Roland Garros and to No. 124 Ruben Bemelmans in the 2nd round at 2017 Wimbledon. Since then, his only defeat to a player ranked as low as Muller at the Grand Slams came against No. 172 Thiago Seyboth Wild in the 1st round at 2023 Roland Garros.

- **MEDVEDEV** is bidding to reach the 3rd round here for the 5th time. This is his 6th Wimbledon appearance and his 29th Grand Slam appearance overall.
- Medvedev advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Aleksandar Kovacevic 63 64 62 in the 1st round on Monday.
- Last year here, Medvedev recorded his **best Wimbledon result** by reaching the semifinals (l. Carlos Alcaraz).
- Medvedev won his **first Grand Slam title** at the 2021 US Open, defeating Novak Djokovic in straight sets and ending both Djokovic's bid for the Grand Slam and his 27-match Grand Slam winning streak.
- Medvedev reached his **6th Grand Slam final** at the Australian Open this year, falling to Jannik Sinner in 5 sets despite holding a 2-0 lead. He has a 1-5 win-loss record in Grand Slam finals, having also finished runner-up at the US Open in 2019 (l. Rafael Nadal) and 2023 (l. Djokovic) and at the Australian Open in 2021 (l. Djokovic) and 2022 (l. Nadal).
- If Medvedev wins his 2nd major title here on his 10th Grand Slam appearance since winning his first, he will go **4th on the Open Era list for most attempts before winning a 2nd Grand Slam men's singles title** – behind Marat Safin (14 attempts before winning a 2nd Grand Slam title) and Djokovic and Gustavo Kuerten (both 12).
- **Elsewhere in Grand Slam play this year**, Medvedev reached the round of 16 at Roland Garros (l. Alex de Minaur).
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Medvedev reached the 2nd round at Halle (d. Nuno Borges, l. Zhang Zhizhen).
- Medvedev's **best results in 2024** are runner-up finishes at the Australian Open and Indian Wells-1000 (l. Alcaraz). He also reached the semifinals at Dubai (l. Ugo Humbert) and Miami-1000 (l. Sinner) and the quarterfinals at Madrid-1000, where he retired against Jiri Lehecka due to a right hip injury.
- Medvedev has **won one Tour-level grass court title** – at 2021 Mallorca (d. Sam Querrey). Of his 19 other Tour-level titles, 18 have come on hard courts, with his only clay court title to date coming at Rome-1000 this year. His 20 titles have been won at 20 different events, which is a Tour-level record.

- Medvedev has won 4 of the last 5 **five-set matches** he has contested, with his only defeat in a 5-set match in that time coming in his most-recent 5-set match, against Sinner in the final at the Australian Open. Having won 3 five-set matches en route to the final at the Australian Open this year, he became the 12th man in the Open Era to contest 4 five-set matches at a single Grand Slam tournament. He has a 2-4 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Wimbledon and a 7-10 win-loss record in 5-set matches overall.
- Medvedev **became world No. 1** on 28 February 2022, becoming the first player other than the 'Big 4' (Djokovic, Roger Federer, Andy Murray and Rafael Nadal) to hold the top ranking since Andy Roddick in February 2004. He held the No. 1 ranking for 16 weeks during 2022 but is yet to return to the No. 1 ranking. He plays here at No. 5.
- Medvedev reached a **career-high junior ranking** of No. 13 in January 2014. His best performance in the boys' singles here was reaching the 2nd round in 2013 (d. Hong Seong Chan, I. Nikola Milojevic).
- Medvedev is coached by Gilles Cervara.
- **MULLER** is bidding to reach 3rd round at a Grand Slam for the first time. This is his 2nd Wimbledon appearance and his 9th Grand Slam overall.
- Muller advanced to the 2nd round after defeating qualifier Hugo Gaston 64 76(2) 76(5) in the 1st round on Monday.
- By reaching the 2nd round here, Muller has equalled his **best Grand Slam result**. He has reached the 2nd round at the Grand Slams on 3 other occasions – including on his Wimbledon debut last year (d. Arthur Rinderknech, I. Carlos Alcaraz). He also reached the 2nd round as a lucky loser at the 2021 Australian Open (d. Juan Ignacio Londero, I. Diego Schwartzman) and as a wild card at Roland Garros this year (d. Luca Nardi, I. Matteo Arnaldi).
- **Elsewhere in Grand Slam play this year**, Muller fell to Hugo Grenier in the 1st round at the Australian Open.
- Muller's **best Tour-level results in 2024** are reaching the quarterfinals as a qualifier at Auckland (I. Taro Daniel) and the round of 16 as a qualifier at Rome-1000 (I. Nicolas Jarry).
- Muller is **one of 16 players in the men's singles draw not to compete on grass this season prior to Wimbledon**. Since reaching the 2nd round at Roland Garros, he has contested 2 Challenger-level events on clay – he reached the final at the Lyon Challenger (FRA) (I. Hugo Gaston) but fell in the 1st round at the Sassuolo Challenger (ITA) (I. Jesper de Jong).
- Muller is bidding to record his **3rd Tour-level match-win on grass, at any level**. His only Tour-level appearances on grass have come here in 2023 and this year. His only other appearances on grass, at any level, came in qualifying at 2021 Halle and in Wimbledon qualifying in 2021 and 2022.
- Muller is bidding to **defeat a Top 5 player for the first time on his 3rd attempt**. He has lost both of his previous matches against Top 5 players – against No. 1 Alcaraz in the 2nd round here last year and against No. 2 Novak Djokovic in the 1st round at the US Open last year. The highest-ranked player he has defeated is No. 6 Andrey Rublev at Rome-1000 this year.
- Muller lost both of the **5-set matches** he has contested – to Thiago Monteiro in the 1st round at 2017 Roland Garros and to Grenier in the 1st round at the Australian Open this year.
- Muller reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 71 in January this year. He plays here at No. 102.
- Muller is coached by Jean-Christophe Faurel.

- **RUUD** is bidding to reach the 3rd round here for the first time. This is his 5th Wimbledon appearance and his 23rd Grand Slam overall.
- Ruud is bidding to become the **4th Norwegian player in history to reach the 3rd round at Wimbledon** – after Sverre Lie (who reached the 3rd round of the men’s singles here in 1950), Tone Schirmer (who reached the 3rd round of the women’s singles here in 1960) and Thorvald Moe (who reached the 3rd round of the men’s singles here in 1962). No Norwegian player, man or woman, has ever advanced beyond the 3rd round here.
- Ruud advanced to the 2nd round after defeating qualifier Alex Bolt 76(2) 64 64 in the 1st round on Monday. It was his **250th Tour-level match-win**.
- By reaching the 2nd round here, Ruud has equalled his **best Wimbledon result**. He also reached the 2nd round here in 2022 (d. Albert Ramos-Vinolas, l. Ugo Humbert) and 2023 (d. Laurent Lokoli, l. Liam Broady). He lost in the 1st round on his 2 other appearances in the main draw here – in 2019 (l. John Isner) and 2021 (l. Jordan Thompson).
- Ruud is a **3-time Grand Slam finalist**. He became the first Norwegian player to reach a Grand Slam singles final at 2022 Roland Garros (l. Rafael Nadal), and also finished runner at the 2022 US Open (l. Carlos Alcaraz) and at 2023 Roland Garros (l. Novak Djokovic).
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Ruud reached the semifinals at Roland Garros (l. Alexander Zverev) but fell in the 3rd round at the Australian Open (l. Cameron Norrie).
- Ruud’s **best results in 2024** are winning the titles at Barcelona (d. Stefanos Tsitsipas) and Geneva (d. Tomas Machac). He is one of 10 players to have won multiple Tour-level titles prior to Wimbledon this season. He also finished runner-up at Los Cabos (l. Jordan Thompson), Acapulco (l. Alex de Minaur) and Monte Carlo-1000 (l. Tsitsipas) and reached the semifinals at Estoril (l. Pedro Martinez) and the quarterfinals at Indian Wells-1000 (l. Tommy Paul).
- Ruud is bidding to record his **41st Tour-level match-win this season**. He leads the Tour for most match-wins this season – ahead of Jannik Sinner (39-3) and Zverev (38-11).
- Ruud is bidding to record his **6th Tour-level match-win on grass** in his 12th Tour-level match on the surface. His only previous match-wins on grass prior to this event came in a quarterfinal finish at 2021 Mallorca, when he defeated Gilles Simon and Tennys Sandgren before falling to Daniil Medvedev in the quarterfinals, and in his 2nd round finishes at Wimbledon in 2022 and 2023. He has lost in the 1st round of the 3 other grass court events he has played at Tour-level.

- Ruud is **one of 16 players in the men's singles draw not to compete on grass this season prior to Wimbledon**.
- Ruud has lost both **5-set matches** he has contested at Wimbledon – against Thompson in the 1st round in 2021 and against Broady in the 2nd round last year. He has an 8-6 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Ruud reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 2 after his runner-up finish at the 2022 US Open last year. He plays here at No. 8.
- Ruud is a **former junior No. 1**. He reached the No. 1 ranking in January 2016 and is the only Norwegian player to have held the top junior ranking. He reached the 2nd round of the boys' singles here in 2015 (d. Jumpei Yamasaki, l. Alvaro Lopez San Martin) but fell in the 1st round of the boys' singles here in 2016 (l. Ulises Blanch).
- Ruud has played **Davis Cup** for Norway since 2015 and has a 25-9 overall win-loss record in the competition. Norway will host Portugal in a World Group I tie in September.
- Ruud is coached by his father, Christian Ruud, who lost in the 1st round on all 5 of his Wimbledon appearances in 1995-2000.
- **FOGNINI** is bidding to reach the 3rd round here for the 7th time and equal his best Wimbledon result. This is his 14th Wimbledon appearance and his 61st Grand Slam overall.
- Aged 37 years 51 days, Fognini is bidding to become the **12th man in the Open Era to reach the 3rd round here aged 37 or older**. Fellow 37-year-olds Novak Djokovic and Gael Monfils are also bidding to reach the 3rd round here, while 39-year-old Stan Wawrinka is bidding to reach the 3rd round here for the 2nd time since turning 37. (NB ages calculated at end of the tournament)
- Fognini is also bidding to become the **2nd Italian man to reach the 3rd round here aged 37 or older** – after Nicola Pietrangeli (38 years and 302) in 1972.
- Fognini advanced to the 2nd round after defeating lucky loser Luca Van Assche 61 63 75 in the 1st round on Monday.
- Fognini is one of 7 Italian players to have reached the men's singles 2nd round here – the **most Italian men to reach the 2nd round at Wimbledon in the Open Era**. The previous highest-number of Italian men in the 2nd round here in the Open Era was 6 in 2018. The most Italian men to reach the 3rd round at Wimbledon in the Open Era is 3 – which has happened on 3 occasions, in 2019, 2021 and 2023.
- Fognini **did not compete at Wimbledon last year**. On his last appearance here, in 2022, he fell to Tallon Griekspoor in the 1st round.
- Fognini **best Wimbledon result** is reaching the 3rd round on 6 occasions – in 2010 (l. Julien Benneteau), 2014 (l. Kevin Anderson), 2017 (l. Andy Murray), 2018 (l. Jiri Vesely), 2019 (l. Tennys Sandgren) and 2021 (l. Andrey Rublev).
- Fognini's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the quarterfinals at Roland Garros in 2011, where he became the first Italian man to reach the quarterfinals at a Grand Slam since Davide Sanguinetti reached the last 8 at 1998 Wimbledon. He gave a walkover to Novak Djokovic in his quarterfinal match due to a thigh strain – the first time a player had given a walkover in the quarterfinals of the men's singles at a Grand Slam since Stefan Edberg pulled out of his quarterfinal match with Thomas Muster at the 1989 Australian Open.
- **In Grand Slam play this year** Fognini reached the 2nd round at Roland Garros (d. Botić van de Zandschulp, l. Tommy Paul). He did not compete at the Australian Open, beginning his season with a 2nd round finish at the Tenerife 1 Challenger (ESP) in January instead.
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Fognini reached the 2nd round as a wild card at Mallorca (d. Gijs Brouwer, l. Jakub Mensik).
- Fognini's **best Tour-level result in 2024** is reaching the quarterfinals as a qualifier at Marrakech, where he defeated Hugo Gaston and Laslo Djere before falling to Pavel Kotov. His only other Tour-level match-wins prior to Wimbledon this season came in 2nd round finishes as a wild card at Indian Wells-1000 (d. Bernabe Zapata Miralles, l. Sebastian Baez), as a wild card at Rome-1000 (d. Daniel Evans, l. Taylor Fritz) and at Roland Garros and Mallorca.

- Fognini has **won one of his last 16 matches against Top 10 players at Tour-level**. He won his most-recent match against a Top 10 player, defeating No. 10 Felix Auger-Aliassime in the 1st round at Roland Garros last year to end a 15-match Tour-level losing streak against Top 10 players. He has a 16-75 win-loss record against Top 10 players at Tour-level overall.
- Fognini is bidding to **defeat a Top 10 player at Wimbledon for the 2nd time**. He has a 1-3 win-loss record against Top 10 players at Wimbledon, with his only victory coming against No. 9 Fernando Verdasco in the 1st round here in 2010. He has a 3-13 win-loss record against Top 10 players at the Grand Slams.
- Fognini has won 5 of the 7 **five-set matches** he has contested at Wimbledon. He has a 24-15 record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Fognini has **won 9 Tour-level singles titles** – most-recently at 2019 Monte Carlo-1000 (d. Dusan Lajovic). Eight of his 9 titles have come on clay.
- Fognini is a **former Top 10 player**. He reached a career-high ranking of No. 9 in July 2019, becoming the first Italian man to be ranked in the Top 10 since Corrado Barazzutti in January 1979. He plays here at No. 94.
- Fognini has played **Davis Cup** since 2008 and has a 35-20 win-loss record in the competition. He did not appear in the competition during Italy's title-winning season in 2023, with his most-recent appearances coming at the 2022 Finals. As defending champions, Italy qualified automatically for the 2024 Davis Cup Finals Group Stage in September and will compete in Group A in Bologna alongside Netherlands, Belgium and Brazil.
- Fognini is coached by Filippo Baldi.

NO. 10 GRIGOR DIMITROV (BUL) v SHANG JUNCHENG (CHN)

Head-to-head: first meeting

Dimitrov (33 years 59 days) is 13 years 261 days older than Shang (19 years 163 days). This is the 2nd-largest age gap between players in the 2nd round of the men's singles here this year – after the age gap of 14 years 52 days between Novak Djokovic (37 years 53 days) and Jacob Fearnley (22 years 365 days). (NB ages calculated at the end of the tournament)

Dimitrov has lost to a player ranked as low as No. 91 Shang at Wimbledon on 2 occasions – to No. 224 Stan Wawrinka in the 1st round in 2018, and to No. 93 Steve Johnson in the 1st round in 2022 after retiring at 64 2-5 in the 2nd set due to a left leg injury.

Dimitrov has won 3 of the 4 matches he has played against lefthanders at Wimbledon – defeating Cedrik-Marcel Stebe in the 1st round in 2011, Federico Delbonis in the 1st round in 2015 and Fernando Verdasco in the 1st round in 2021, but falling to Corentin Moutet in the 1st round in 2019 despite holding a 2-0 lead. He has an 8-4 win-loss record against lefthanders at the Grand Slams and a 67-38 win-loss record against lefthanders at Tour-level overall.

- **DIMITROV** is bidding to reach the 3rd round here for the 6th time. This is his 14th Wimbledon appearance and his 55th Grand Slam appearance overall.
- Dimitrov is bidding to record his 21st Wimbledon singles match-win and equal Magdalena Maleeva's **all-time record for most Wimbledon match-wins by a Bulgarian player**.
- Dimitrov advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Dusan Lajovic 63 64 75 in the 1st round on Monday.
- **Last year here**, Dimitrov reached the round of 16 (l. Holger Rune) – his best result at Wimbledon since reaching the round of 16 in 2017 (l. Roger Federer).
- Dimitrov's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the semifinals on 3 occasions – including once at Wimbledon, in 2014 (l. Novak Djokovic). He also reached the semifinals at the 2017 Australian Open (l. Rafael Nadal) and the 2019 US Open (l. Daniil Medvedev).
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Dimitrov reached the quarterfinals at Roland Garros (l. Jannik Sinner) but fell in the 3rd round at the Australian Open (l. Nuno Borges). By reaching the quarterfinals at Roland Garros for the first time on his 14th attempt, he set the Open Era record for most Roland Garros men's singles appearances before reaching the quarterfinals. He also became the 54th player in the Open Era – and the 13th active player – to reach the men's singles quarterfinals at all 4 Grand Slam tournaments.
- Dimitrov is contesting **54th consecutive Grand Slam tournament** here this year, putting him in joint-6th place on the all-time list for most consecutive appearances in the men's singles at the Grand Slams, alongside Stefan Edberg. He owns the longest active streak of Grand Slam appearances, having contested the main draw at every Grand Slam tournament since the 2011 Australian Open.
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Dimitrov reached the 2nd round at Queen's (d. Adrian Panatta, l. Sebastian Korda).

- Dimitrov's best result in 2024 is winning his **9th Tour-level title** – and his first since the 2017 ATP Finals – at Brisbane (d. Rune). He also finished runner-up at Marseille (l. Ugo Humbert) and Miami-1000 (l. Sinner) and reached the semifinals at Rotterdam (l. Alex de Minaur).
- Dimitrov has lost 2 of the 3 **five-set matches** that he has contested at Wimbledon – he defeated Alexandr Dolgoplov in 5 sets in the 3rd round here in 2014, but lost 5-set matches to Grega Zemlja in the 2nd round in 2013 and to Moutet in the 1st round in 2019. He has an 11-9 win-loss record in 5-set matches overall.
- Dimitrov's **best grass court performance** is winning the title at 2014 Queen's (d. Feliciano Lopez).
- Dimitrov reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 3 after winning the title at the 2017 ATP Finals (d. David Goffin). He returned to the Top 10 for the first time since November 2018 in April this year and plays here at No. 10.
- Dimitrov is one of 3 **former Wimbledon boys' singles champions** through to the 2nd round from the 5 who started in the men's main draw here. He won the boys' singles titles here (d. Henri Kontinen) and at the US Open (d. Devin Britton) in 2008 and finished the year at No. 3 in the ITF Junior Rankings.
- Dimitrov was part of the ITF 14 & Under European Team in Europe in 2004-05 and the ITF 16 & Under European A Team in Europe in 2006, funded by the Grand Slam Player Development Programme (formerly known as the Grand Slam Development Fund).
- Dimitrov is coached by Daniel Vallverdu and Jamie Delgado.
- Lefthander **SHANG** is bidding to reach the 3rd round and equal his best Grand Slam result on his Wimbledon debut. This is his 4th Grand Slam appearance overall.
- Shang is bidding to become the **3rd Chinese player in history to reach the men's singles 3rd round at Wimbledon** – after Kho Sin-Khie (who reached the 2nd round here in 1937-38 and 1946) and Choy Wai-Chuen (1939). By both reaching the 2nd round here, Shang and Zhang Zhizhen have become the 5th and 6th Chinese players in history to reach the men's singles 2nd round at Wimbledon – and the first since Mei Fu-Chi in 1959. (NB Zhang also plays his 2nd round match today)
- Shang advanced to the 2nd round after defeating qualifier Cristian Garin 75 64 64 in the 1st round on Monday.
- **Last year here**, Shang fell to Matteo Arnaldi in the 1st round of qualifying. It was his first appearance in Wimbledon qualifying.
- Shang's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the 3rd round as a qualifier at the Australian Open this year. He defeated Mackenzie McDonald and Sumit Nagal before falling to Carlos Alcaraz in the 3rd round after retiring with a right thigh injury while trailing 16 16 0-1.
- **Elsewhere at the Grand Slams in 2024**, Shang fell in the 1st round of qualifying at Roland Garros (l. Roman Andres Burruchaga).
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Shang reached the quarterfinals at Eastbourne as a qualifier, defeating Tomas Martin Etcheverry and Emil Ruusuvuori for his first Tour-level match-wins on grass, before falling to Taylor Fritz. He reached the quarterfinals at the Nottingham Challenger (GBR) (l. Jacob Fearnley) but fell in the 1st round at the Surbiton Challenger (GBR) (l. Billy Harris).
- Shang's best Tour-level result in 2024 is reaching his **first Tour-level semifinal** as a wild card at Hong Kong (l. Andrey Rublev). His best result at Challenger-level is reaching the semifinals at the Bordeaux Challenger (FRA) (l. Pedro Martinez).
- Shang is bidding to **defeat a Top 10 player for the first time on his 4th attempt**. He lost all 3 matches he has previously contested against Top 10 players – against No. 10 Frances Tiafoe in the 3rd round at 2023 Washington, No. 5 Rublev in the semifinals at 2024 Hong Kong and No. 2 Alcaraz in the 3rd round at the 2024 Australian Open. The highest-ranked player he has defeated is No. 16 Tiafoe in the quarterfinals at Hong Kong this year.
- Shang is one of **17 lefthanders** started in the men's main draw here this year. Nadal was the last lefthander to win the title here in 2010.
- Aged 19 years 163 days, Shang is the **youngest player to reach the men's singles 2nd round here this year**. He was one of 4 teenagers to begin the men's singles here this year. (NB ages calculated at the end of the tournament)

- Shang **broke the Top 100 for the first time** in May this year, achieving a career-high ranking of No. 89. He plays here 2 places lower at No. 91.
- Shang is a **former junior world No. 1**. He reached the No. 1 ranking in July 2021 and finished runner-up in the boys' singles at the 2021 US Open (l. Daniel Rincon). He was named ITF Junior World Champion for 2021. He reached the semifinals in his only appearance in the boys' singles here in 2021 (l. Victor Lilov).
- Shang is coached by Martin Alund.

NO. 12 TOMMY PAUL (USA) v (Q) OTTO VIRTANEN (FIN)

Head-to-head: first meeting

Paul has never lost a Grand Slam match to a player ranked as low as No. 147 Virtanen. The lowest-ranked player to have defeated Paul at the Grand Slams is No. 121 Taro Daniel in the 1st round at the 2017 US Open. The lowest-ranked player to have defeated Paul at Wimbledon is No. 37 Jiri Lehecka in the 3rd round last year.

Paul has won all 4 of his previous Grand Slam matches against qualifiers – including his only previous match against a qualifier at Wimbledon, against Shintaro Mochizuki in the 1st round last year. He has a 16-7 win-loss record against qualifiers at Tour-level overall.

- **PAUL** is bidding to reach the 3rd round here for the 3rd consecutive year. This is his 3rd Wimbledon appearance and his 20th Grand Slam overall.
- Paul advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Pedro Martinez 62 61 46 63 in the 1st round on Monday.
- **Last year here**, Paul reached the 3rd round. He defeated Shintaro Mochizuki and Milos Raonic before falling to Jiri Lehecka in 5 sets.
- Paul's **best Wimbledon result** is reaching the round of 16 on his debut here in 2022, when he defeated Fernando Verdasco, Adrian Mannarino and Jiri Vesely before falling to Cameron Norrie.
- Paul's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the semifinals at the 2023 Australian Open (l. Novak Djokovic). He is the only American man to have reached the semifinals at the Australian Open since Andy Roddick in 2009.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Paul reached the 3rd round at both the Australian Open (l. Miomir Kecmanovic) and Roland Garros (l. Francisco Cerundolo).
- Prior to Wimbledon this year, Paul **won his first grass court title** at Queen's, defeating Lorenzo Musetti in the final. He became the 8th American man in the Open Era to win the title at Queen's and the first since Sam Querrey in 2010. He also reached the quarterfinals at 's-Hertogenbosch (l. Sebastian Korda) but withdrew from Eastbourne due to fatigue.
- Paul is bidding to become the **9th man in the Open Era to win the title at Queen's and Wimbledon in the same year** – after John McEnroe (1981, 1984), Jimmy Connors (1982), Boris Becker (1985), Pete Sampras (1995, 1999), Lleyton Hewitt (2002), Rafael Nadal (2008), Andy Murray (2013, 2016) and Carlos Alcaraz (2023).
- Paul is bidding to become **the first American man to win multiple Tour-level titles on grass in the same year since 1999**, when Sampras won the titles at both Queen's and Wimbledon.
- Paul's **other highlights in 2024** are winning the title at Dallas (d. Marcos Giron), finishing runner-up at Delray Beach (l. Taylor Fritz), reaching the semifinals at Indian Wells-1000 (l. Daniil Medvedev) and Rome-1000 (l. Nicolas Jarry) and reaching the quarterfinals at Adelaide (l. Jack Draper). He is one of 10 players to have won multiple Tour-level titles prior to Wimbledon this season.

- Paul had a **successful junior career**. He won the 2015 Roland Garros boys' singles title (d. Fritz), finished runner-up in the boys' singles at the 2015 US Open (l. Fritz) and reached a career-high junior ranking of No. 3 in September 2015. He reached the quarterfinals on his only appearance in the boys' singles here in 2016 (l. Patrik-Niklas Salminen).
- Paul made his **Davis Cup** debut in 2020 for USA and has a 5-4 win-loss record in the competition. USA defeated Ukraine in the Qualifiers in February to reach the 2024 Davis Cup Finals and will compete in Group C in Zhuhai alongside Germany, Slovakia and Chile.
- Paul is coached by Brad Stine.
- Qualifier **VIRTANEN** is bidding to reach the 3rd round at a Grand Slam for the first time on his Wimbledon debut. This is his 3rd Grand Slam main draw appearance overall.
- Virtanen is bidding to become the **6th Finnish man in history to reach the 3rd round at a Grand Slam** – after Jarkko Nieminen (14 Grand Slam 3rd round appearances), Reino Nyssönen (2), and Aki Rahunen, Pekka Salla and Veli Paloheimo (all one). (NB Emil Ruusuvuori is scheduled to complete his 1st round match here on Tuesday)
- Virtanen is also bidding to become **3rd Finnish player, man or woman, to reach the 3rd round at Wimbledon** – after Salla, who reached the 3rd round here in 1967, and Nieminen, who reached the 3rd round here in 2003, 2006 and 2007.
- Virtanen advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Max Purcell 63 62 62 for his **first Grand Slam main draw match-win** in the 1st round on Monday.
- Virtanen defeated Franco Agamenone (ITA) 67(6) 62 76(6), Alexander Ritschard (SUI) 67(1) 75 64 and Roman Andres Burruchaga (ARG) 61 62 57 76(4) in the 3 rounds of **Wimbledon qualifying last week**. It was the 2nd time he has successfully qualified at a Grand Slam on his 7th attempt.
- **Last year here**, on his first appearance in Wimbledon qualifying, Virtanen reached the final round of qualifying. He defeated Henri Laaksonen and Rio Noguchi before falling to Gijs Brouwer.
- Virtanen made his **Grand Slam debut** as a qualifier at the 2023 US Open. He fell to Tomas Martin Etcheverry in 5 sets in the 1st round of the main draw.

His only match-win at Tour-level this season prior to Wimbledon came during Finland's victory against Portugal in the Davis Cup Qualifiers, when he defeated Nuno Borges. His only other appearance at Tour-level this season came at Roland Garros.
- Virtanen plays mainly at Challenger-level. His best results in 2024 are winning his 4th and 5th Challenger titles – at Pau (FRA) (d. Leandro Riedi) and Lugano (SUI) (l. Daniel Masur). He also reached the semifinals at the Lille Challenger (FRA) (l. Arthur Rinderknech).
- Virtanen is **facing a Top 20 player for the first time**. The highest-ranked player he has previously faced, at any level, is No. 31 Francesco Cerundolo, to whom he lost during Finland's victory over Argentina in the 2023 Davis Cup Qualifiers. The highest-ranked player he has defeated, at any level, is No. 39 Mackenzie McDonald during Finland's victory over USA at the 2023 Davis Cup Finals Group Stage.

- Virtanen reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 109 in April 2023. He plays here at No. 147.
- Virtanen was a **good junior**. He reached a career-high junior ranking of No. 6 in December 2018 after winning the title at JA Plantation (USA) (also known as the Orange Bowl) (d. Zane Khan). His best result in the boys' singles at Wimbledon was reaching the 3rd round in 2018 (l. Anton Matusevich).
- Virtanen made his **Davis Cup** debut for Finland in 2020 and has a 9-5 win-loss record in the competition. He won 4 of the 6 Davis Cup singles matches he contested in 2023 as Finland reached the semifinals for the first time. Finland defeated Portugal in the Qualifiers in February to advance to the 2024 Davis Cup Finals Group Stage. They will compete in Group D in Manchester alongside Canada, Great Britain and Argentina in September.
- Virtanen is coached by Jan de Witt.

NO. 14 BEN SHELTON (USA) v (Q) LLOYD HARRIS (RSA)

Head-to-head: first meeting

Shelton is facing a qualifier for the 2nd consecutive match, having defeating Mattia Bellucci in the 1st round here. He has a 2-1 win-loss record against qualifiers at the Grand Slams, having lost to Nuno Borges in the 1st round at the 2022 US Open on his Grand Slam debut, but defeated Nicolas Jarry in the 2nd round at the 2023 Australian Open. He has a 6-6 win-loss record against qualifiers at Tour-level overall.

- Shelton is coached by his father, Bryan Shelton, and Dean Goldfine.
- Qualifier **HARRIS** is bidding to reach the 3rd round here for the first time. This is his 4th Wimbledon appearance and 20th Grand Slam overall.
- Harris advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Alex Michelsen 36 46 76(5) 62 76(9) in the 1st round on Monday. It was his **first successful comeback from 0-2 down** and extended maintained his perfect record in 5-set matches, having won all 5 five-set matches he has contested.
- As No. 5 seed in qualifying, Harris defeated Andrea Vavassori (ITA) 62 62, wild card George Loffhagen (GBR) 76(6) 76(5), and Hugo Grenier (FRA) 64 62 36 76(5) in the **3 rounds of Wimbledon qualifying last week**. It was the 4th time he has successfully qualified at a Grand Slam on his 7th appearance in qualifying.
- **Last year here**, Harris fell in the 1st round of the main draw to Gregoire Barrere having entered on a protected ranking.
- By reaching the 2nd round here, Harris has equalled his **best Wimbledon result**. He also reached the 2nd round here in 2021 (d. Ricardas Berankis, I. Andrey Rublev).

- Harris' **best Tour-level grass court result** is reaching the semifinals as a qualifier at 2023 Mallorca (I. Christopher Eubanks).
- Harris **underwent wrist surgery in the spring of 2022** and missed the final 6 months of the season before returning in January 2023. His ranking fell as low as No. 306 in May last year, but he returned to the Top 100 last month before dropping outside the Top 1000 again this week.

- Harris reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 31 in September 2021. He plays here at No. 118.
- Harris is coached by Anthony Harris (no relation).

- **CORIC** is bidding to reach the 3rd round here for the first time. This is his 6th Wimbledon appearance and his 33rd Grand Slam overall.
- Coric advanced to the 2nd round after defeating qualifier Felipe Meligeni Alves 63 76(2) 63 in the 1st round on Monday. The victory was his **2nd Wimbledon match-win** ended a 5-match losing streak here – he had previously not recorded a victory here since reaching the 2nd round on his Wimbledon debut in 2015 (d. Sergiy Stakhovsky, l. Andreas Seppi).
- Coric's victory against Meligeni Alves in the 1st round here was his **first grass court match-win, at any level, since 2019 Halle**, when he defeated Jaume Munar and Joao Sousa before retiring due to a hamstring injury during his quarterfinal match against Pierre-Hugues Herbert.
- **Last year here**, on his first Wimbledon appearance since 2018, Coric fell to Guido Pella in the 1st round. He withdrew from Wimbledon due to an abdominal injury in 2019 and due to shoulder injuries in 2021 and 2022.
- Coric's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the quarterfinals at the 2020 US Open. He defeated Pablo Andujar, Juan Ignacio Londero, Stefanos Tsitsipas and Jordan Thompson before falling to Alexander Zverev.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Coric fell in the 1st round at both the Australian Open (l. Tiafoe) and Roland Garros (l. Richard Gasquet). His victory in the 1st round here ended a 5-match losing streak at the Grand Slams – since reaching the 3rd round at Roland Garros last year, where he defeated Federico Coria and Pedro Cachin before falling to Tomas Martin Etcheverry, he had lost in the 1st round at all 4 Grand Slam tournaments.
- Coric's **best Tour-level result in 2024** is reaching the final at Montpellier (l. Alexander Bublik). He also reached the final as a wild card at the Ottignies Challenger (BEL) (l. Leandro Riedi).
- Coric is **one of 16 players in the men's singles draw not to compete on grass this season prior to Wimbledon**. Since his 1st round defeat at Roland Garros, he has contested 2 Challenger-level events on clay – he reached the 2nd round at the Perugia Challenger (ITA) (d. Giulio Zeppieri, l. Maks Kasnikowski) but fell in the 1st round at the Sassuolo Challenger (ITA) (l. Juan Pablo Ficovich).
- Coric's has **won one Tour-level title on grass** – at 2018 Halle (d. Roger Federer). His 2 other titles came on clay at 2017 Marrakech (d. Philipp Kohlschreiber) and on hard courts at 2022 Cincinnati-1000 (d. Tsitsipas), when, ranked No. 152, he became the lowest-ranked player to win a Masters-1000 title.
- Coric has won one of the 3 **five-set matches** he has contested at Wimbledon – against Stakhovsky in the 1st round in 2015. He has an 8-5 overall Tour-level record in 5-set matches.
- Coric reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 12 in November 2018. He plays here at No. 89.
- Coric is a **former junior world No. 1**. He won the boys' singles title at the 2013 US Open (d. Thanasi Kokkinakis) and reached the semifinals of the boys' singles at both the Australian Open (l. Kokkinakis) and Roland Garros (l. Cristian Garin) that year. His best result in the boys' singles at Wimbledon was a quarterfinal finish in 2013 (l. Chung Hyeon).
- Coric made his **Davis Cup** debut for Croatia in 2013 and has a 16-9 win-loss record in the competition. He won 5 of the 6 matches he played during Croatia's title-winning season in 2018. Croatia will host Lithuania in World Group I in September.
- Coric is coached by Liam Smith.

A 7th Tour-level meeting and 8th overall between Wawrinka and Monfils, nearly 20 years on from their first. With Wawrinka aged 19 years 189 days and Monfils aged 18 years 32 days on that day in 2004, they had a combined age of 37 years 221 days, younger than the individual age of either man today, with Monfils now aged 37 years 317 days and Wawrinka aged 39 years 108 days (NB ages calculated at end of the tournament).

Wawrinka and Monfils are the 2 oldest players to have started the men's singles draw here this year. With a combined age of 77 years and 60 days, it is the 3rd-oldest combined age in a Wimbledon men's singles match in the Open Era – after Luis Ayala (36 years 290 days) defeated Bob Howe (43 years 336 days) and in the 1st round in 1969 (combined age 80 years 261 days); and Rod Laver (32 years 328 days) defeated Howe (45 years 334 days) in the 1st round in 1971 (combined age 78 years 297 days).

This is a 3rd meeting between Wawrinka and Monfils at the Grand Slams, but their first at Wimbledon, with Wawrinka winning in straight sets on both of their previous Grand Slam meetings.

Wawrinka and Monfils are meeting on grass for the first time, a 4th different surface in their head-to-head, having faced each other on carpet courts in qualifying at 2004 Lyon, on hard courts on 5 occasions, and on clay at 2017 Roland Garros.

This is also a first meeting between the 2 men for more than 5 years, since Monfils defeated Wawrinka in the final at 2019 Rotterdam.

- **WAWRINKA** is bidding to reach the 3rd round here for the 7th time.
- Wawrinka advanced to the 2nd round here after defeating wild card Charles Broom 63 75 64 on Monday.
- At 39 years 108 days, Wawrinka is bidding to become the **6th man in the Open Era to reach the 3rd round at Wimbledon aged 39 or older**. Since Ken Rosewall reached the 3rd round here aged 40 years 245 days in 1975, Roger Federer is the only man to have reached the 3rd round here aged 39 or older, having been aged 39 years 337 days when he reached the 3rd round here in 2021. By reaching the 2nd round here, Wawrinka is the 10th man in the Open Era to reach the 2nd round at Wimbledon aged 39 or older. (NB ages calculated at end of the tournament)
- **Last year here**, Wawrinka reached the 3rd round (I. Novak Djokovic).
- Wawrinka's **best Wimbledon result** is reaching the quarterfinals on 2 occasions – in 2014 (I. Federer) and 2015 (I. Richard Gasquet).

- Wawrinka is a **3-time Grand Slam champion**. He won his first Grand Slam title at the 2014 Australian Open (d. Rafael Nadal) and also won the titles at 2015 Roland Garros and the 2016 US Open, defeating Djokovic on both occasions. He defeated both the No. 1 and No. 2 seeds en route to his first 2 Grand Slam title victories and is the only player to have achieved the feat en route to winning a Grand Slam since Sergi Bruguera won the title at 1993 Roland Garros. He is one of 6 Grand Slam champions to start the main draw here.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Wawrinka reached the 2nd round at Roland Garros (d. Andy Murray, l. Pavel Kotov), but fell to Adrian Mannarino in 5 sets in the 1st round at the Australian Open.
- Wawrinka is making his **18th Wimbledon appearance and his 71st Grand Slam appearance overall**. He is in the Top 10 on the Open Era lists for both most Wimbledon men's singles appearances (in joint-6th place with Mikhail Youzhny) and most Grand Slam men's singles appearances (in joint-5th place with Fernando Verdasco).
- Wawrinka is bidding to record his **5th Tour-level match-win of 2024**. His only victories at Tour-level prior to Wimbledon this season came in 2nd round finishes at Buenos Aires (d. Pedro Cachin, l. Nicolas Jarry), Marrakech (d. Albert Ramos-Vinolas, l. Mariano Navone) and Roland Garros. He has lost in the 1st round at the 5 other Tour-level events he has contested this season. His only other match-win in 2024, at any level, came in a 2nd round finish at the Bordeaux Challenger (FRA) (d. Bernabe Zapata Miralles, l. Pedro Martinez).
- Wawrinka's **best Tour-level grass court result** is finishing runner-up at 2013 's-Hertogenbosch (l. Nicolas Mahut). He is one of 16 players competing in the men's singles who did not play a grass court event this season, at any level, prior to Wimbledon this year.
- Wawrinka has won one of the 6 **five-set matches** he has contested at Wimbledon, with his only victory in a 5-set match here coming against Ivo Karlovic in the 1st round in 2006. He has a 30-27 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall and has lost 5 of the last 6 five-set matches he has contested.
- Wimbledon is Wawrinka's **least successful Grand Slam** in terms of matches won. He has a 23-17 win-loss record here, compared with 46-18 at Roland Garros, 46-15 at the US Open and 43-17 at the Australian Open.
- Wawrinka reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 3 in January 2014 after winning his first Grand Slam title at the Australian Open. He plays here at No. 95.
- Wawrinka was the 2003 **Roland Garros junior champion** (d. Brian Baker) – the only junior Grand Slam event he contested.
- Wawrinka was part of the **Switzerland team that won the Davis Cup title in 2014**, defeating France in the final. He won 5 of the 7 matches he contested in the competition that year. He returned to the Swiss Davis Cup team for the first time since 2015 in the 2023 Qualifiers and competed at the 2023 Finals Group Stage. He has a 28-30 win-loss record in the competition overall. Switzerland will face Peru in a World Group I tie in Switzerland in September.
- Wawrinka is coached by former world No. 2 Magnus Norman.
- **MONFILS** is bidding to reach the 3rd round here for the 8th time – and the first time since 2018. This is his 13th Wimbledon appearance and his 63rd Grand Slam overall.
- Aged 37 years 221 days, Monfils is bidding to become the **12th man in the Open Era to reach the 3rd round here aged 37 or older**. Fellow 37-year-olds Novak Djokovic and Fabio Fognini are also bidding to reach the 3rd round here, while 39-year-old Wawrinka is bidding to reach the 3rd round here for the 2nd time since turning 37. (NB ages calculated at end of the tournament)
- Monfils is also bidding to become the **oldest Frenchman in the Open Era to reach the 3rd round here** – breaking the record held by Richard Gasquet, who reached the 3rd round here in 2022 aged 36 years 22 days.
- Monfils advanced to the 2nd round here after defeating No. 22 seed Adrian Mannarino 64 36 75 64 on Monday.
- Monfils is making **his first appearance here since 2021**, when he reached the 2nd round (d. Christopher O'Connell, l. Pedro Martinez). He withdrew from the 2022 event with a foot injury and from the 2023 event with a wrist injury.
- Monfils' **best Wimbledon result** is reaching the round of 16 in 2018, when he defeated Gasquet, Paolo Lorenzi and Sam Querrey before falling to Kevin Anderson.

- Monfils' **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the semifinals on 2 occasions. He reached the last 4 at 2008 Roland Garros – where, ranked No. 59, he lost to Roger Federer – and at the 2016 US Open (l. Djokovic).
- Monfils is bidding to record his 124th Grand Slam match-win and extend his **all-time record for most Grand Slam match-wins by a Frenchman**. He claimed sole ownership of the record, ahead of Jo-Wilfried Tsonga (121 Grand Slam match-wins), by defeating Thiago Seyboth Wild in the 1st round at Roland Garros this year.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Monfils reached the 2nd round at both the Australian Open (d. Yannick Hanfmann, l. Tomas Martin Etcheverry) and Roland Garros (d. Seyboth Wild, l. Lorenzo Musetti).
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Monfils reached the semifinals at Mallorca, defeating Dominic Thiem, Roberto Carballes Baena and Roberto Bautista Agut before falling to Alejandro Tabilo. It was his first grass court appearance, at any level, since 2021 Wimbledon.
- Monfils' **other highlights in 2024** are reaching the semifinals at Doha (l. Jakub Mensik) and the round of 16 at Indian Wells-1000 (l. Casper Ruud).
- Monfils has **reached one Tour-level final on grass** – finishing runner-up at 2017 Eastbourne (l. Novak Djokovic).
- Monfils has won one of the 6 **five-set matches** he has contested at Wimbledon. After losing the first 5 five-set matches he contested here, he defeated O'Connell in 5 sets in the 1st round in 2021. He has a 19-19 win-loss record in 5-set matches overall.
- Wimbledon is Monfils' **weakest Grand Slam event** in terms of matches won. He has an 18-12 win-loss record here, compared to 39-16 at Roland Garros, 34-18 at the Australian Open and 32-15 at the US Open.
- Monfils reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 6 in November 2016. He dropped out of the Top 100 for the first time since May 2013 in January 2023, before returning to the Top 100 in October last year, and then returned to the Top 50 in March this year. He plays here at No. 33.
- Monfils narrowly **missed out on achieving the Junior Grand Slam** in 2004 after winning the Australian Open, Roland Garros and Wimbledon. His preparation for the Junior US Open that year was hampered by a knee injury and he lost in the 3rd round to Viktor Troicki. He was named 2004 ITF Junior World Champion. Monfils is one of 5 former Wimbledon junior singles champions to start in the men's main draw this year.
- Monfils is coached by Mikael Tillstrom.

NO. 17 FELIX AUGER-ALIASSIME (CAN) v THANASI KOKKINAKIS (AUS)

Auger-Aliassime has lost Grand Slam matches to players ranked as low as No. 93 Kokkinakis on 5 occasions – including once at Wimbledon, when he fell to No. 119 Michael Mmoh in the 1st round here last year.

- **AUGER-ALIASSIME** is bidding to reach the 2nd round here for the first time since 2021 and for the 3rd time overall. This is his 5th Wimbledon appearance and his 21st Grand Slam overall.
- **Last year here**, Auger-Aliassime fell to Michael Mmoh in the 1st round. He also fell in the 1st round here in 2022 (l. Maxime Cressy).
- Auger-Aliassime's **best Wimbledon result** is reaching the quarterfinals in 2021, when he defeated Thiago Monteiro, Mikael Ymer, Nick Kyrgios and Alexander Zverev before falling to Matteo Berrettini.
- Auger-Aliassime's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the semifinals at the 2021 US Open (l. Daniil Medvedev). He became the first Canadian man to reach the semifinals at the US Open and the first man born in the 2000s to reach a Grand Slam semifinal.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Auger-Aliassime reached the round of 16 at Roland Garros (l. Carlos Alcaraz) and the 3rd round at the Australian Open (l. Daniil Medvedev).
- **Prior to Wimbledon this season**, Auger-Aliassime competed at Halle but retired due to a hip injury during his 1st round match against Dominik Koepfer.
- Auger-Aliassime's best result in 2024 is reaching his **first Masters-1000 final** at Madrid-1000 (l. Andrey Rublev). He has also reached the semifinals at Montpellier (l. Alexander Bublik) and the quarterfinals at Munich (l. Jan-Lennard Struff).
- Auger-Aliassime has **reached 2 Tour-level finals on grass** – finishing runner-up at Stuttgart in both 2019 (l. Matteo Berrettini) and 2021 (l. Marin Cilic).
- Auger-Aliassime won the only **5-set match** he has contested at Wimbledon – against Zverev in the round of 16 in 2021. He has a 6-3 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Auger-Aliassime broke the Top 10 for the first time in November 2021 and reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 6 in November 2022. He plays here at No. 17.
- Auger-Aliassime has **won 5 Tour-level titles**. He won his first title at 2022 Rotterdam (d. Stefanos Tsitsipas) and won 3 titles in 3 weeks in October 2022 – at Florence (d. JJ Wolf), Antwerp (d. Sebastian Korda) and Basel (d. Holger Rune). He then defended his Basel title in 2023 (d. Hubert Hurkacz).
- Auger-Aliassime was a **successful junior**. He won the boys' singles title at the 2016 US Open (d. Miomir Kecmanovic) and finished runner-up in the boys' singles at 2016 Roland Garros (l. Geoffrey Blancaneaux). He reached the quarterfinals in the boys' singles here in 2016 (l. Alex de Minaur) and also reached the final in the boys' doubles with Denis Shapovalov that year losing to Kenneth Raisma/Stefanos Tsitsipas in the final. He was

also part of Canadian teams that reached back-to-back Junior Davis Cup Finals in 2015-16, defeating Germany to win the title in 2015 but finishing runner-up to Russia in 2016.

- Auger-Aliassime **led Canada to the Davis Cup title in 2022**, defeating Australia in the final. He won 8 of the 9 matches he contested in the competition that year. He was also a member of the Canadian team which finished runners-up to Spain in 2019 and has a 9-4 win-loss record in the competition overall. Canada defeated Korea, Rep. in the Qualifiers in February to advance to the 2024 Davis Cup Finals Group Stage. They will compete in Group D in Manchester alongside Argentina, Finland and Great Britain in September.
- Auger-Aliassime is coached by Frederic Fontang and Toni Nadal.
- **KOKKINAKIS** is bidding to reach the 2nd round here for the 2nd time and equal his best Wimbledon result. This is his 4th Wimbledon appearance and 22nd Grand Slam overall.
- **Last year here**, Kokkinakis fell to Leandro Riedi in the 1st round of qualifying.
- Kokkinakis' **best Wimbledon result** is reaching the 2nd round in 2022 (d. Kamil Majchrzak, l. Novak Djokovic). He lost in the 1st round on his 2 other main draw appearance here – in 2015 (l. Leonardo Mayer) and 2017 (l. Juan Martin del Potro).
- Kokkinakis' **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the 3rd round at Roland Garros on 3 occasions – as a wild card in 2015 (l. Djokovic) and 2023 (l. Karen Khachanov), and as a direct acceptance in 2024 (l. Taylor Fritz).
- **Elsewhere in Grand Slam play this year**, Kokkinakis reached the 2nd round at the Australian Open (d. Sebastian Ofner, l. Grigor Dimitrov).
- Kokkinakis' **best Tour-level result in 2024** is reaching the quarterfinals at Los Cabos (l. Alexander Zverev).
- Also in 2024, Kokkinakis **won his 6th Challenger title** at the Sarasota Challenger (USA) (d. Zizou Bergs) and reached the quarterfinals at both the Phoenix Challenger (USA) (l. Nuno Borges) and the Bordeaux Challenger (FRA) (l. Arthur Fils).
- **Prior to Wimbledon**, Kokkinakis competed in qualifying at Queen's, defeating Luca Nardi before giving a walkover to Taro Daniel in the 2nd round of qualifying.
- Kokkinakis is bidding to record his **5th Tour-level match-win on grass**. His only Tour-level match-wins on grass have come in 2nd round finishes as a wild card at Queen's in both 2015 (d. Jeremy Chardy, l. Gilles Simon) and 2017 (d. Milos Raonic, l. Daniil Medvedev), at 2017 's-Hertogenbosch (d. Mikhail Youzhny, l. Medvedev) and at 2022 Wimbledon.
- Kokkinakis is bidding to **defeat a Top 20 player at a Grand Slam for the 2nd time on his 12th attempt**. His only victory against a Top 20 player at a Grand Slam came against No. 13 Ernests Gulbis in the 1st round at the 2015 Australian Open.
- Kokkinakis is bidding to end a **13-match losing streak against Top 20 players at Tour-level**. He has not defeated a Top 20 player since defeating No. 6 Andrey Rublev in the 2nd round at 2023 Adelaide 2. He has a 6-27 win-loss record against Top 20 players at Tour-level overall.
- Kokkinakis has won 4 of the last 5 **five-set matches** he has contested. His only loss in a 5-set match in that time came against Fritz in the 3rd round of Roland Garros this year. He has a 7-6 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level but has never contested a 5-set match at Wimbledon
- Kokkinakis has **recorded 3 successful comebacks from 0-2 down** – against Lukas Rosol in a Davis Cup tie between Australia and Czechia in 2015, against Bernard Tomic in the 2nd round at 2015 Roland Garros, and against Giulio Zeppieri in the 2nd round at the Australian Open this year.
- Kokkinakis reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 65 in November last year. He plays here at No. 93.
- Kokkinakis **won the 2022 Australian Open men's doubles title** alongside Kyrgios. The pair defeated Matthew Ebden/Max Purcell in the first all-Australian Grand Slam men's doubles final since the 1980 Australian Open. They became the first all-Australian team to win a Grand Slam men's doubles title since Todd Woodbridge/Mark Woodforde at 2000 Wimbledon.

- Kokkinakis is a **former Australian Open boys' singles finalist**, falling to Kyrgios in 2013. He also reached the boys' singles final at the 2013 US Open (l. Borna Coric) and won the boys' doubles title at 2013 Wimbledon with Kyrgios. He reached the 3rd round in his only appearance in the boys' singles here in 2013 (l. Laslo Djere).
- Kokkinakis was a member of the **Australian team which reached the Davis Cup final for the first time since 2003** in 2022. He was also a member of the team at the Finals Group Stage last year, but missed the Final 8 Knockout Stage in Malaga, where the team also finished as runners-up, due to an ankle injury. He has a 5-7 win-loss record in the competition. As runners-up in 2023, Australia have qualified automatically for the 2024 Finals Group Stage in September and will compete in Group B in Valencia alongside Czechia, France and Spain.
- Kokkinakis is coached by Todd Langman and Todd Ley.

NO. 24 ALEJANDRO TABILO (CHI) v DANIEL EVANS (GBR)

Head-to-head: first meeting

Tabilo has won the only Tour-level match he has played against a British player, defeating Cameron Norrie in the quarterfinals at Auckland this year.

Evans has won both previous matches he has played against lefthanders at Wimbledon – against Federico Delbonis in the 1st round in 2019, and against Feliciano Lopez in the 1st round in 2021. He has a 7-5 win-loss record against lefthanders at the Grand Slams and a 24-25 win-loss record against lefthanders at Tour-level overall.

- Lefthander **TABILO** is bidding to record his 50th Tour-level match-win.
- Tabilo is bidding to reach the 2nd round here for the 2nd time and equal his **best Wimbledon result**. He reached the 2nd round on his main draw debut here in 2022 (d. Laslo Djere, l. Miomir Kecmanovic). This is his 2nd Wimbledon main draw appearance and his 7th Grand Slam overall.
- **Last year here**, Tabilo fell to Pierre-Hugues Herbert in the 1st round of qualifying.
- Tabilo's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the 2nd round on 3 occasions – in addition to his 2nd round finish here in 2022, he also reached the 2nd round as a qualifier on his Grand Slam debut at the 2020 Australian Open (d. Daniel Galan, l. John Isner) and as a direct acceptance at the 2022 US Open (d. Kamil Majchrzak, l. JJ Wolf).
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Tabilo fell in the 1st round at both the Australian Open (l. Aleksandar Kovacevic) and Roland Garros (l. Zizou Bergs).
- Prior to Wimbledon this season, Tabilo **won his 2nd Tour-level title**, and first on grass, at Mallorca (d. Sebastian Ofner). He became the first Chilean man to win a Tour-level title on grass. He also reached the 2nd round at Queen's (d. Alejandro Davidovich Fokina, l. Tommy Paul).
- Tabilo's other highlights in 2024 are winning his **first Tour-level title** at Auckland (d. Taro Daniel), finishing runner-up at Santiago (l. Sebastian Baez) and reaching the semifinals at Bucharest (l. Marton Fucsovics) and Rome-1000 (l. Alexander Zverev). He is one of 10 players to have won multiple Tour-level titles prior to Wimbledon this season.
- Tabilo won the only **5-set match** he has contested at Wimbledon, against Djere in the 1st round in 2022. He has a 2-1 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall – but lost his most-recent 5-set match, to Kovacevic in the 1st round at the Australian Open this year.
- Tabilo is one of **17 lefthanders** starting in the men's singles this year. Nadal was the last lefthander to win the title here in 2010.
- Tabilo **broke the Top 20 for the first time** this week and plays here at a new career-high ranking of No. 19.
- Tabilo was a **good junior**. He represented Canada, the country of his birth, throughout his junior career. He reached a career-high junior ranking of No. 29 in 2015, and fell in the 1st round in his only appearance in the boys' singles here that year (l. Marc Polmans).

- Tabilo has played **Davis Cup** for Chile since 2019 and has a 9-9 overall win-loss record in the competition. After defeating Peru in the Qualifiers in February, Chile will compete in Zhuhai alongside Germany, Slovakia and USA in Group C at the 2024 Davis Cup Finals.
- Tabilo is coached by Horacio Matta.
- **EVANS** is bidding to record his 150th Tour-level match-win.
- Evans is bidding to **end a 3-match losing streak at Wimbledon** and reach the 2nd round here for the first time since 2021 and for the 4th time overall. This is his 9th Wimbledon appearance and his 31st Grand Slam overall.
- **Last year here**, as No. 27 seed, Evans fell to Quentin Halys in the 1st round. He also lost in the 1st round here as a wild card in 2009 (l. Nikolay Davydenko), 2011 (l. Florian Mayer) and 2014 (l. Andrey Kuznetsov), and as a direct acceptance in 2022 (l. Jason Kubler).
- Evans' **best Wimbledon result** is reaching the 3rd round on 3 occasions – in 2016 (l. Roger Federer), 2019 (l. Joao Sousa) and 2021 (l. Sebastian Korda).
- Evans' **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the round of 16 on 2 occasions – at the 2017 Australian Open (l. Jo-Wilfried Tsonga) and at the 2021 US Open (l. Daniil Medvedev).
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Evans fell in the 1st round at both the Australian Open (l. Lorenzo Sonego) and Roland Garros (l. Holger Rune).
- **Prior to Wimbledon**, Evans lost to Brandon Nakashima in the 1st round at Queen's, retiring in the final set with a right knee injury. He also reached the quarterfinals at the Nottingham 2 Challenger (GBR) (l. Charles Broom) and the 2nd round at the Surbiton Challenger (GBR) (d. Adam Walton, l. Zachary Svajda).
- Evans is bidding to record his **4th Tour-level match-win of 2024**. His only match-wins at Tour-level so far this season have come in 2nd round finishes at Adelaide (d. Rinky Hijikata, l. Alexander Bublik), Los Cabos (d. Roman Safiullin, l. Thanasi Kokkinakis) and Miami-1000 (d. Lorenzo Sonego, l. Christopher Eubanks).
- Evans is bidding to end an **8-match Tour-level losing streak**. He has not recorded a Tour-level match-win since reaching the 2nd round at Miami in March. Since then, he has lost his opening match at Marrakech (l. Roberto Carballes Baena), Monte-Carlo-1000 (l. Sebastian Ofner), Barcelona (l. Nakashima), Rome-1000 (l. Fabio Fognini), Lyon (l. Arthur Rinderknech), Roland Garros and Queen's.
- Evans is one of the **11 British players** competing in the men's singles draw at Wimbledon this year, the most since 1999, when there were also 11. He is also one of 18 British players to compete here across the men's and women's singles, the most since 1999, when there were 19 players across the 2 draws.
- Evans lost the only **5-set match** he has contested at Wimbledon, against Sousa in the 3rd round in 2019. He has a 4-6 win-loss record in 5-set matches overall.
- Evans reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 21 in August last year. He plays here at No. 60.
- Evans has played **Davis Cup** for Great Britain since 2009 and has a 16-21 win-loss record overall in the competition. Great Britain received a wild card for the 2024 Davis Cup Finals Group Stage and will compete in Group D in Manchester alongside Canada, Finland and Argentina in September.
- Evans is currently without a permanent coach.

- Lucky loser **GOFFIN** is bidding to reach the 2nd round here for the 7th time. This is his 10th Wimbledon appearance and his 44th Grand Slam overall.
- As No. 9 seed in **Wimbledon qualifying last week**, Goffin defeated Marc Polmans (AUS) 63 61 and Yasutaka Uchiyama (JPN) 76(4) 64 before falling to Mattia Bellucci (ITA) 63 26 76(4) 64 in the final round of qualifying. He entered the main draw as a lucky loser following the withdrawal of Andy Murray due to a back injury on Tuesday morning.
- **Last year here**, Goffin reached the 3rd round. He defeated Fabian Marozsan and Tomas Barrios Vera before falling to Andrey Rublev.
- Goffin's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the quarterfinals on 4 occasions – including twice at Wimbledon, in 2019 (l. Novak Djokovic) and 2022 (l. Cameron Norrie). He also reached the quarterfinals at 2016 Roland Garros (l. Dominic Thiem) and the 2017 Australian Open (l. Grigor Dimitrov).
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Goffin reached the 2nd round as a direct acceptance at Roland Garros (d. Giovanni Mpetshi Perricard, l. Alexander Zverev) but fell in the 1st round as a qualifier at the Australian Open (l. Ugo Humbert). He has competed in qualifying at 3 of the last 4 Grand Slam tournaments – but prior to the 2023 US Open, where he fell in the 1st round of qualifying, he had not appeared in qualifying at the Grand Slams since 2012 Roland Garros.
- **Prior to competing at Wimbledon qualifying**, Goffin fell in the 1st round as a wild card at 's-Hertogenbosch (l. Luca Nardi) but won the title at the Ilkley Challenger (GBR) (d. Harold Mayot).
- Goffin is bidding to record his **4th Tour-level match-win this season**. His only match-wins at Tour-level in 2024 have come in 2nd round finishes as a qualifier at both Rotterdam (d. Dino Prizmic, l. Alex de Minaur) and Marrakech (d. Arthur Rinderknech, l. Nicolas Moreno de Alboran) and as a direct acceptance at Roland Garros.
- Goffin has reached **2 Tour-level finals on grass** – at 2015 's-Hertogenbosch (l. Nicolas Mahut) and 2019 Halle (l. Roger Federer).
- Goffin has won 2 of the 4 **five-set matches** he has contested at Wimbledon. He has a 14-8 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Goffin is a **former Top 10 player**. He became the first Belgian man to break the Top 10 in February 2017 and reached a career-high ranking of No. 7 in November 2017. He plays here at No. 83.
- Goffin has played **Davis Cup** for Belgium since 2012 and has a 29-10 overall win-loss record in the competition. He has helped Belgium to runner-up finishes in the competition on 2 occasions – losing to Great Britain in the 2015 final and to France in the 2017 final. Belgium defeated Croatia in the Qualifiers in February to advance to the 2024 Davis Cup Finals Group Stage. They will compete in Group A in Bologna alongside Italy, Netherlands and Brazil in September.
- Goffin is coached by Germain Gigounon.

- **MACHAC** is bidding to reach the 2nd round here for the first time. This is his 2nd Wimbledon appearance and his 9th Grand Slam overall.
- **Last year here**, Machac qualified for the main draw to make his Wimbledon debut, falling to Cameron Norrie in 4 sets in the 1st round.
- Machac's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the 3rd round at both the Australian Open (l. Karen Khachanov) and Roland Garros (l. Daniil Medvedev) this year.
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Machac fell in the 1st round at Halle (l. Arthur Fils).
- Machac's best result in 2024 is reaching his **first Tour-level final** at Geneva (l. Casper Ruud). He also reached the quarterfinals at Marseille (l. Hubert Hurkacz) and Miami-1000 (l. Jannik Sinner).
- Machac is bidding to record his **first Tour-level match-win on grass**. His only previous match-wins on grass as a professional, at any level, have come at Wimbledon qualifying in 2021, when he defeated Tommy Robredo and Brayden Schnur before falling to Christopher O'Connell, and in 2023, when he defeated Yasutaka Uchiyama, Kaichi Uchida and Lucas Pouille to qualify for the main draw. His only previous Tour-level appearances on grass came in the 1st round here last year and in the 1st round at Halle this year.
- Machac has won one of the 3 **five-set matches** he has contested – he defeated Mariano Navone in the 2nd round at Roland Garros this year, but falling to Taylor Fritz in the 1st round at 2020 Roland Garros and Botić van de Zandschulp in the 1st round at the 2022 US Open.
- Machac reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 33 in June this year. He plays here at No. 39.
- Machac made his **Davis Cup** debut for Czechia at the 2021 Finals and has a 9-6 overall win-loss record in the competition. Czechia defeated Israel in the Qualifiers in February to advance to the 2024 Davis Cup Finals Group Stage and will compete in Group B in Valencia alongside Australia, France and Spain in September.

Machac is coached by Daniel Vacek, who reached the round of 16 here in 1994, falling to eventual champion Pete Sampras.
