On court today...

- First up on Centre Court, Novak Djokovic takes on British wild card Jacob Fearnley – one of 3 British men to feature on the main arena here today, with Andy and Jamie Murray set to face Australians Rinky Hijikata and John Peers in a men's doubles 1st round clash later on. While No. 2 seed Djokovic bids to notch up a record-extending 372nd Grand Slam match-win this afternoon, Fearnley is fresh off recording his first Grand Slam match-win on Tuesday. While Djokovic may have to contend with a home crowd backing the Brit, he will be more than comfortable with the situation, having won 31 of the 32 matches he has played against players at their home Grand Slam tournaments – with his only defeat coming to Murray in the final here in 2013.
- Two all-British battles grace No. 1 Court today, with British No. 1 woman Katie Boulter's match against British No. 2 woman Harriet Dart followed by British No. 1 man Jack Draper's clash with British No. 2 man Cameron Norrie. Draper replaced Norrie as British No. 1 last month, and this will be the pair's first meeting since then – Norrie has won both of the pair's previous encounters, including their only previous grass court match at Queen's in 2021. This will be the first time for more than 20 years that the 2 highest-ranked British men have faced each other in a Grand Slam, since then-world No. 8 Tim Henman defeated then-world No. 25 Greg Rusedski in the 3rd round at the 2002 Australian Open.
- Grigor Dimitrov's match against Shang Juncheng is one of the matches which was cancelled on Wednesday, and the pair are now scheduled to play on Court 12 this afternoon. Dimitrov, who reached the semifinals here 10 years ago, is aiming to advance to the 3rd round at Wimbledon for the 6th time in his career. But should 19-year-old Shang – who is the youngest man remaining in the draw here – manage an upset win over the world No. 10, he will become the 3rd Chinese player in history to reach the men's singles 3rd round at Wimbledon, and the first since Kho Sin-Khie in 1946.

NO. 2 NOVAK DJOKOVIC (GBR) v (WC) JACOB FEARNLEY (GBR)

Head-to-head: first meeting

Djokovic has lost a Tour-level match to a player ranked as low as No. 277 Fearnley once before, against No. 319 Filip Krajinovic in the quarterfinals at 2010 Belgrade in 2010, when he retired due to illness while trailing 46 0-0.

The lowest-ranked player to have defeated Djokovic at the Grand Slams is No. 117 Denis Istomin in the 2nd round at the 2017 Australian Open. The lowest-ranked player to have defeated Djokovic at Wimbledon is No. 75 Marat Safin in the 2nd round in 2008.

Djokovic has won 14 of the 15 matches he has played against wild cards at the Grand Slams – including all 3 matches he has played against wild cards at Wimbledon. His only loss to a wild card at a Grand Slam came against Istomin at the 2017 Australian Open.

Fearnley is bidding to become the 2nd British player to defeat Djokovic at a Grand Slam. Djokovic has a 13-2 win-loss record against British players at the Grand Slams, with both of his defeats coming against Andy Murray, in the finals at the 2012 US Open and 2013 Wimbledon. Djokovic has won his other 4 matches against British players at Wimbledon.

Fearnley is also bidding to become the 4th British player to defeat Djokovic at Tour-level. Djokovic has a 42-13 win-loss record against British players at Tour-level – Murray has recorded 11 victories against Djokovic, while Kyle Edmund and Daniel Evans have recorded one each.

Djokovic has won 31 of the 32 matches he has contested against players at their home Grand Slam tournaments – with his only defeat coming against Murray in the final at 2013 Wimbledon. In addition to his 4-1 win-loss record against British players at Wimbledon, he has a 4-0 win-loss record against Australian players here, a 10-0 win-loss record against French players at Roland Garros and a 13-0 win-loss record against American players at the US Open.

Djokovic (37 years 53 days) is 14 years 52 days older than Fearnley (22 years 365 days). This is the largest age gap between players in the 2nd round of the men's singles here this year. (NB ages calculated at the end of the tournament)

- **DJOKOVIC** is bidding to reach the 3rd round here for the 18th time.
- Djokovic has **lost in the 2nd round at Wimbledon once before** – in 2008, when he fell to Marat Safin. It remains his earliest defeat at Wimbledon.
- Djokovic advanced to the 2nd round here after defeating qualifier Vit Kopriva 61 62 62 in the 1st round on Tuesday.
- Last year here, Djokovic reached his **9th Wimbledon final**, falling to Carlos Alcaraz in 5 sets. On his 8 other appearances in Wimbledon final, he won the title in 2011 (d. Rafael Nadal), 2014 (d. Roger Federer), 2015 (d. Federer), 2018 (d. Kevin Anderson), 2019 (d. Federer), 2021 (d. Matteo Berrettini) and 2022 (d. Nick Kyrgios) and finished runner-up in 2013 (l. Andy Murray).
- Djokovic is bidding to win his **8th Wimbledon title** and equal Federer's all-time record for the most Wimbledon men's singles titles won. He is also bidding to equal Federer and Helen Wills Moody in 2nd place on the list for

most Wimbledon singles titles won among men and women, behind 9-time Wimbledon champion Martina Navratilova.

- Djokovic won his **22nd, 23rd and 24th Grand Slam titles in 2024** – he equalled Nadal’s all-time record for most Grand Slam men’s singles titles at the Australian Open (d. Stefanos Tsitsipas), claimed sole ownership of the record at Roland Garros (d. Casper Ruud) and equalled Margaret Court’s all-time record for most Grand Slam singles titles among men and women at the US Open (d. Daniil Medvedev).
- Djokovic is bidding to win his **25th Grand Slam title** and claim sole ownership of the all-time record for most Grand Slam singles titles won among men and women.
- At 37 years 53 days, Djokovic is bidding to become the **oldest man in the Open Era to win the Wimbledon title** and the first player in the Open Era to win multiple Wimbledon titles after turning 35. In 2022, aged 35 years 49 days, Djokovic became the 2nd player in the Open Era to win the Wimbledon aged 35 or older – after Federer, who won the title here in 2017 aged 35 years 342 days. (NB ages calculated at the end of the tournament)
- Djokovic is bidding to win his **5th Grand Slam title since turning 35** and extend his Open Era record for most Grand Slam singles titles won aged 35 or older. He is also bidding to win his 13th Grand Slam title since turning 30 and extend his record for most Grand Slam singles titles won after the age of 30 in the Open Era.
- Djokovic is bidding to record his 372nd Grand Slam match-win. By defeating Francisco Cerundolo in the round of 16 at Roland Garros this year for his 370th Grand Slam match-win, he claimed sole ownership of the **all-time record for most Grand Slam singles matches won among men and women**, ahead of Federer.
- Djokovic is bidding to record his **94th Wimbledon match-win**. He is in 6th place on the all-time list for most Wimbledon singles matches won among men and women – behind Martina Navratilova (120 Wimbledon match-wins), Federer (105), Serena Williams (98), Chris Evert (96) and Billie Jean King (95).
- Djokovic has **won 35 of his last 36 matches at Wimbledon and 35 of his last 36 Tour-level matches on grass**. His defeat to Alcaraz in the final last year ended a 34-match winning streak at Wimbledon – he had previously not lost here since retiring due to a right elbow injury in his quarterfinal match against Tomas Berdych in 2017. The defeat to Alcaraz also ended a 34-match Tour-level winning streak on grass – he had previously not lost a grass court match since falling to Marin Cilic in the final at 2018 Queen’s.
- Djokovic is making his **19th consecutive Wimbledon appearance and contesting his 75th Grand Slam overall**. He is in joint-4th place on the Open Era list for most Wimbledon men’s singles appearances alongside Fernando Verdasco – behind Federer (22 Wimbledon appearances) and Jimmy Connors and Feliciano Lopez (both 20). He is in 3rd place on the Open Era list for most Grand Slam men’s singles appearances – behind Federer and Lopez (both 81).
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Djokovic reached the semifinals at the Australian Open (l. Jannik Sinner) and the quarterfinals at Roland Garros, where he gave a walkover to Casper Ruud due to a knee injury.
- Djokovic’s **other highlights in 2024** are reaching the semifinals at Monte Carlo-1000 (l. Ruud) and Geneva (l. Tomas Machac). He has contested just 7 events prior to Wimbledon this season.
- Djokovic **did not contest a grass court tournament prior to Wimbledon this year**. He is one of just 7 men in the Open Era to have won the title here without playing a warm-up event on grass, achieving the feat in 2011, 2014, 2015, 2019, 2021 and 2022. He is one of 16 players who began the men’s singles here who had not competed on grass this season prior to Wimbledon.
- Djokovic is bidding to win his **99th Tour-level title**. He is in 3rd place on the Open Era list for most Tour-level titles won – behind Jimmy Connors (109 Tour-level titles) and Federer (103). Of Djokovic’s 98 Tour-level singles titles, 8 have come on grass – in addition to his 7 Wimbledon titles, he also won the title on grass at 2017 Eastbourne (d. Gael Monfils). He has won 71 titles on hard courts and 19 titles on clay.
- Djokovic has a 10-2 win-loss record in **5-set matches** at Wimbledon, with his only defeats in 5-set matches here coming against Mario Ancic in the round of 16 in 2006 and against Alcaraz in the final last year. He holds the record for most 5-set matches won at the Grand Slams (38-9) and has a 40-11 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Djokovic **holds the record for most weeks ranked No. 1**, having held the top ranking for a total of 428 weeks. His most-recent spell as world No. 1 ended last month, when he dropped to No. 3 following his withdrawal from Roland Garros. He rose to No. 2 last week and plays here at the same ranking.

- Djokovic has played **Davis Cup** for Serbia since 2004, has a 44-16 win-loss record in the competition and led Serbia to their only title in the competition to date in 2010. Serbia will host Greece in a World Group I tie in September.
- Djokovic is currently without a permanent coach.
- Wild card **FEARNLEY** is bidding to reach the 3rd round here for the first time on his Grand Slam debut. He had never previously competed at a Grand Slam in either qualifying or the main draw.
- Fearnley advanced to the 2nd round here after defeating qualifier Alejandro Moro Canas 75 64 76(12) for his **first Tour-level match-win** in the 1st round on Tuesday.
- Fearnley is contesting his **2nd Tour-level event**. He made his Tour-level debut as a wild card at Eastbourne last week, falling to Billy Harris in the 1st round.
- Elsewhere on grass this season, Fearnley **won his first Challenger-level title** as a qualifier at the Nottingham Challenger (GBR) (d. Charles Broom). He entered the qualifying draw as an alternate. It was just his 3rd appearance at a Challenger event, either in qualifying or the main draw – he fell in the 1st round of qualifying as a wild card at the 2018 Glasgow Challenger (GBR) (l. Daniel Brands) and fell in the 1st round of the main draw as a wild card at the 2022 Fairfield Challenger (USA) (l. Valentin Vacherot).
- Fearnley **played college tennis**. He represented Texas Christian University from for 4 seasons from 2020 to 2024 and was a 4-time ITA All-American, compiling a 155-62 overall win-loss record – 85-32 in singles and 70-30 in doubles. He did not play any professional tennis between November 2019 and October 2022.
- Fearnley took the autumn semester off college tennis in 2023-24 to **compete on the ITF World Tennis Tour**, winning the title as a qualifier at both 2023 M25 Edgbaston (GBR) (d. Kyle Edmund) and 2024 M25 Esch/Alzette (LUX) (d. Jonas Forejtek). He also finished runner-up as a qualifier at 2023 M25 Columbus (USA) (l. Learner Tien) and reached the semifinals at 2023 M25 Glasgow (GBR) (l. Anton Matusevich). He did not play any professional tennis between January and June this year.
- Fearnley is **facing a Top 50 player, at any level, for the first time**. He won the only match he has previously played against a Top 100 player, at any level, defeating No. 96 Shang Juncheng in the quarterfinals at the Nottingham Challenger last month.
- Fearnley did not have a ranking in July 2023, broke the Top 1000 for the first time in October 2023, and began the grass court season last month ranked at No. 525. He **broke the Top 300 for the first time** after winning the Nottingham Challenger, and achieved a career-high ranking of No. 271 last week. He plays here ranked 6 places lower at No. 277.
- Fearnley reached a **career-high junior ranking** of No. 27 in February 2019. His best results at junior-level were winning the titles at the 2018 Yeltsin Cup (RUS) (d. Valentin Royer) and the 2018 Torneo Internacional Junior de Sanxenxo (ESP) (d. Carlos Alcaraz). He lost in the 1st round on both of his appearances in the boys' singles here – in 2018 (l. Daniel Michalski) and 2019 (l. Nicholas David Ionel).
- Fearnley is coached by Toby Smith and Juan Martin.

NO. 4 ALEXANDER ZVEREV (GER) v MARCOS GIRON (USA)

- **ZVEREV** is bidding to reach the 3rd round here for the 6th time. This is his 8th Wimbledon appearance and his 34th Grand Slam overall.
- Zverev advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Roberto Carballes Baena 62 64 62 in the 1st round on Tuesday.
- **Last year here**, as No. 19 seed, Zverev reached the 3rd round. He defeated Gijs Brouwer and Yosuke Watanuki before falling to Matteo Berrettini.
- Zverev's **best Wimbledon result** is reaching the round of 16 on 2 occasions – in 2017 (l. Milos Raonic) and in 2021 (l. Felix Auger-Aliassime).
- Zverev reached his **2nd Grand Slam final** at 2024 Roland Garros, falling to Carlos Alcaraz in 5 sets. He became the 2nd German man in the Open Era to reach the final at Roland Garros, after 1996 runner-up Michael Stich. He also finished runner-up at the 2020 US Open, falling to Dominic Thiem in 5 sets despite holding a 2-0 lead.
- **Elsewhere in Grand Slam play this year**, Zverev reached the semifinals at the Australian Open, where he fell to Daniil Medvedev in 5 sets despite holding a 2-0 lead.
- Zverev is bidding to become the **3rd German man to win the Wimbledon title in the Open Era**, after Boris Becker (1985-86, 1989) and Michael Stich (1991).
- If Zverev wins his first title on his 34th appearance at the Grand Slams, he will go **joint-3rd on the Open Era list for most attempts before winning a first Grand Slam men's singles title** – alongside Petr Korda, who won his first Grand Slam title at the 1998 Australian Open on his 34th Grand Slam appearance. Goran Ivanisevic (who won his first Grand Slam title at 2001 Wimbledon on his 48th Grand Slam appearance) and Stan Wawrinka (who won his first Grand Slam title at the 2014 Australian Open on his 36th Grand Slam appearance) are the top 2 players on the list.
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Zverev reached the semifinals at Halle. He defeated Oscar Otte, Lorenzo Sonego and Arthur Fils before falling to Hubert Hurkacz.
- Zverev's **best result in 2024** is winning the title at Rome-1000 (d. Nicolas Jarry). His other highlights this season are reaching the semifinals at Los Cabos (l. Jordan Thompson) and Miami-1000 (l. Grigor Dimitrov) and the quarterfinals at Indian Wells-1000 (l. Alcaraz) and Munich (l. Cristian Garin).
- Zverev is bidding to record his 39th Tour-level match-win in 2024. He is **in 3rd place on the list for most Tour-level matches won this season** – behind Casper Ruud (40-11) and Jannik Sinner (40-3).
- Zverev's **best performance on grass** is reaching finishing runner-up at Halle in 2016 (l. Florian Mayer) and 2017 (l. Roger Federer).

- Zverev has won 3 of the 6 **five-set matches** he has contested at Wimbledon. He has a 23-12 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Zverev rose to a **career-high ranking** of No. 2 after reaching the semifinals at 2022 Roland Garros. He re-entered the Top 5 for the first time since October 2022 in March this year and plays here at No. 4.
- Zverev **won Olympic singles gold for Germany** at the Tokyo 2020 Olympic Tennis Event in 2021, defeating Russian Olympic Committee's Karen Khachanov in the final. It was Germany's 3rd Olympic gold medal in tennis – after Steffi Graf in women's singles at Seoul 1988 and Boris Becker/Stich in men's doubles at Barcelona 1992.
- Zverev was a **successful junior**. He won the boys' singles title at the 2014 Australian Open, defeating Stefan Kozlov in the final. He also finished runner-up at 2013 Junior Roland Garros (l. Christian Garin) and was named 2013 ITF Junior World Champion. He reached the 3rd round on his only appearance in the boys' singles here in 2013 (l. Kozlov).
- Zverev has played **Davis Cup** for Germany since 2016 and has a 9-6 overall win-loss record in the competition. Germany defeated Hungary in the Qualifiers in February to reach the 2024 Davis Cup Finals and will compete in Group C in Zhuhai alongside USA, Slovakia and Chile.
- Zverev is coached by his father, Alexander Zverev Sr.
- **GIRON** is bidding to reach the 3rd round here for the first time and equal his best Grand Slam result. This is his 5th Wimbledon appearance and his 21st Grand Slam overall.
- Giron advanced to the 2nd round after defeating wild card Henry Searle 36 63 64 64 in the 1st round on Tuesday.
- By reaching the 2nd round here, Giron has equalled his **best Wimbledon result**. He also reached the 2nd round here in 2021 (d. Emil Ruusuvuori, l. Hubert Hurkacz), 2022 (d. Holger Rune, l. Alex Molcan) and 2023 (d. Hugo Dellien, l. Marton Fucsovics).
- Giron's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the 3rd round at Roland Garros in 2021 (l. Cristian Garin) and 2023 (l. Nicolas Jarry).
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Giron fell in the 1st round at both the Australian Open (l. Jack Draper) and Roland Garros (l. Jozef Kovalik). His victory against Searle in the 1st round here on Tuesday ended a 4-match Grand Slam losing streak – he had previously not recorded a victory at the Grand Slams since reaching the 2nd round here last year.
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Giron reached the quarterfinals at Halle, where he defeated Andrey Rublev and Matteo Berrettini before falling to Hurkacz. He also reached the 2nd round at both Stuttgart (d. Andy Murray, l. Draper) and Eastbourne (d. Francisco Cerundolo, l. Yoshihito Nishioka).
- Giron's **best result in 2024** is reaching his 2nd Tour-level final at Dallas (l. Tommy Paul). He also reached the semifinals at Delray Beach (l. Taylor Fritz) and the quarterfinals at Houston (l. Luciano Darderi) and Halle.
- Giron is bidding to **defeat a Top 5 player for the first time on his 8th attempt**. He has lost all 7 matches he has contested against Top 5 players at Tour-level, all in straight sets, including his only previous match against a Top 5 player at a Grand Slam – when he fell to No. 5 Rafael Nadal in the 1st round at the 2022 Australian Open. The highest-ranked players he has defeated are No. 6 Rune in the 2nd round at 2023 Toronto-1000 and No. 6 Rublev in the 1st round at Halle this year.
- Giron has won 3 of the 4 **five-set matches** he has contested – including the only 5-set match he has contested at Wimbledon, against Ruusuvuori in the 1st round in 2021. His only defeat in a 5-set match came against Draper in the 1st round at the Australian Open this year.
- Giron played **college tennis**. He represented UCLA between 2012 and 2014, winning the 2014 NCAA singles championship title before turning professional.
- Giron reached a **career-high junior ranking** of No. 18 and won the title at the 2011 Easter Bowl (d. Mac Styslinger). He reached the 3rd round on his only appearance in the boys' singles here in 2011 (l. Jason Kubler).
- Giron is coached by Maxime Tabatruong and Karue Sell.

- **HURKACZ** is bidding to reach the 3rd round here for the 4th time. This is his 6th Wimbledon appearance and his 25th Grand Slam overall.
- Hurkacz is **bidding to become the 3rd Polish man in the Open Era to reach the 3rd round at Wimbledon on 4 occasions** - after Wojtek Fibak (who reached the 3rd round here in 1977-78 and 1980-81) and Jerzy Janowicz (2012-14 and 2017).
- Hurkacz advanced to the 2nd round here after defeating qualifier Radu Albot 57 64 63 64 in the 1st round on Tuesday.
- **Last year here**, Hurkacz reached the round of 16. He defeated Albert Ramos-Vinolas, Jan Choinski and Lorenzo Musetti before falling to Novak Djokovic.
- Hurkacz's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the semifinals here in 2021, when he defeated Roger Federer in the quarterfinals before falling to Matteo Berrettini in the last 4. He became the 2nd Polish man in history to reach the semifinals at a Grand Slam after Jerzy Janowicz, who reached the semifinals at 2013 Wimbledon.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Hurkacz reached the quarterfinals at the Australian Open (l. Daniil Medvedev) and the round of 16 at Roland Garros (l. Grigor Dimitrov).
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Hurkacz reached his 2nd final at Halle, and 11th Tour-level final overall, falling to Jannik Sinner.
- Hurkacz's best result in 2024 is winning his **8th Tour-level title** at Estoril (d. Pedro Martinez). It was his first clay court title. His other highlights this season are reaching the semifinals at Marseille (l. Ugo Humbert) and the quarterfinals at Dubai (l. Humbert) and Rome-1000 (l. Tommy Paul).
- Hurkacz's **best grass court performance** is winning the title at 2022 Halle (d. Daniil Medvedev), where he became the first Polish man in the Open Era to win a Tour-level title on grass. He is one of 23 players competing here this year to have won a Tour-level title on grass.
- Hurkacz has won one of the 2 **five-set matches** he has contested at Wimbledon – he defeated Medvedev in 5 sets in the round of 16 in 2021 but fell to Alejandro Davidovich Fokina in 5 sets in the 1st round in 2022. He has a 9-8 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Hurkacz **broke the Top 10 for the first time** in October 2021. He reached a new career-high ranking of No. 7 last week and plays here at the same ranking.
- Hurkacz has played **Davis Cup** for Poland since 2016 and has an 11-9 win-loss record in the competition. Poland will host Korea, Rep. in a World Group I tie in September.

- At 20 years and 32 days, Fils is bidding to become the **youngest Frenchman to reach the 3rd round at Wimbledon since 2005**, when Richard Gasquet (19 years 15 days) and Gael Monfils (18 years 305 days) both reached the 3rd round here. (NB ages calculated at the end of the tournament)
- Fils advanced to the 2nd round here after defeating Dominic Stricker 63 62 36 64 in the 1st round on Tuesday.
- By reaching the 2nd round here, Fils has equalled his **best Grand Slam result**. He also reached the 2nd round at a Grand Slam on 3 occasions – at the 2023 US Open (d. Tallon Griekspoor, l. Matteo Arnaldi) and the Australian Open this year (d. Jiri Vesely, l. Griekspoor).
- **Last year here**, as a wild card on his Wimbledon debut, Fils lost to Alejandro Davidovich Fokina in the 1st round.
- **Elsewhere in Grand Slam play this year**, Fils lost in the 1st round at Roland Garros (l. Arnaldi).
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Fils reached the quarterfinals at Halle, where he defeated Tomas Machac and Dominik Koepfer before falling to Alexander Zverev, and the 2nd round at 's-Hertogenbosch (d. Arthur Cazaux, l. Ugo Humbert).
- Fils' **best Tour-level result in 2024** is reaching the semifinals at Auckland (l. Alejandro Tabilo). He has also reached 4 Tour-level quarterfinals this season – at Hong Kong (l. Andrey Rublev), Santiago (l. Pedro Martinez), Barcelona (l. Dusan Lajovic) and Halle. He also won the title at Bordeaux Challenger (FRA) (d. Martinez).
- Fils is bidding to **defeat a Top 10 player for the 3rd time**. He has a 2-5 win-loss record against Top 10 players at Tour-level, having defeated No. 4 Casper Ruud in the quarterfinals at 2023 Hamburg and No. 7 Stefanos Tsitsipas in the semifinals at 2023 Antwerp. He is bidding to end a 4-match losing streak against Top 10 players, having not defeated a Top 10 player since defeating Tsitsipas at Antwerp last year.
- Fils has won one of the 2 **five-set matches** he has contested, both of which came at the US Open last year. He defeated Griekspoor in the 1st round in 5 sets before falling to Arnaldi in the 2nd round, also in 5 sets.
- Fils reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 30 in May. He plays here at No. 34. He is currently the youngest player in the Top 50.
- Fils was a **successful junior**. He reached a career-high ranking of No. 3 in July 2021, a month after finishing runner-up in the boys' singles at 2021 Roland Garros (l. Luca van Assche). He also won the 2021 Roland Garros boys' doubles title alongside Giovanni Mpetshi Perricard. He reached the 2nd round on his only appearance in the boys' singles at Wimbledon in 2021 (d. Kokoro Isomura, l. Victor Lilov).
- Fils made his **Davis Cup** debut for France at the 2023 Davis Cup Finals Group Stage, falling to Daniel Evans in the only match he has contested in the competition to date. France defeated Chinese Taipei in the Qualifiers in February to advance to the 2024 Davis Cup Finals Group Stage. They will compete in Group B in Valencia alongside Australia, Czechia and Spain.
- Fils is coached by 2-time Roland Garros champion Sergi Bruguera and Sebastien Grosjean, who reached the semifinals here in 2003 and 2004.

- **DE MINAUR** is bidding to reach the 3rd round here for the 3rd time. This is his 6th Wimbledon appearance and his 28th Grand Slam overall.
- De Minaur advanced to the 2nd round after defeating lucky loser James Duckworth 76(1) 76(3) 76(4) in the 1st round on Tuesday.
- **Last year here**, De Minaur reached the 2nd round (d. Kimmer Coppejans, I. Matteo Berrettini).
- De Minaur's **best Wimbledon result** is reaching the round of 16 in 2022, when he defeated Hugo Dellien, Jack Draper and Liam Broady before falling to Cristian Garin in 5 sets, despite leading 2-0 and having 2 match points.
- De Minaur's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the quarterfinals on 2 occasions – at the 2020 US Open (l. Dominic Thiem) and at Roland Garros this year (l. Alexander Zverev).

He reached the 2nd round on his only appearance in the boys' singles here in 2014 (d. Kang Ku Keon, l. Francisco Bahamonde Nicastro).
- Munar is coached by Javier Fernandez and Miguel Sanchez.

Apart from his win in the 1st round here this year and his 2 victories en route at 2023 Mallorca, his 3 other Tour-level wins on grass came in 2nd round finishes at 2021 Halle (d. Yannick Hanfmann, l. Nikoloz Basilashvili), 2022 Stuttgart (d. Ugo Humbert, l. Benjamin Bonzi) and 2024 Stuttgart.
- Rinderknech's 5-set victory against Nishikori in the 1st round here improved his win-loss record in **5-set matches** at Wimbledon to 1-2. He lost both his previous 5-set matches here – to Otte in 2021 and to Shapovalov in 2022. He has a 3-3 record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Rinderknech is bidding to **defeat a Top 20 player at the Grand Slams for the first time on his 5th attempt**. He has lost all 4 matches he has played against Top 20 players at the Grand Slams – including his only previous match against a Top 20 player at Wimbledon, against No. 16 Shapovalov in 2022. The highest-ranked player he has defeated at the Grand Slams is No. 36 Matteo Berrettini, who retired due to an ankle injury during their 2nd round match at the US Open last year. He has a 6-16 record against Top 20 players at Tour-level overall.
- Rinderknech reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 42 in October 2022. He plays here at No. 76.
- Rinderknech played **college tennis**. He represented Texas A&M University from 2014 to 2018 and was named a 3-time All-American in singles.
- Rinderknech made his **Davis Cup** debut for France at the 2021 Davis Cup Finals, and has a 3-4 win-loss record in the competition overall. France defeated Chinese Taipei in the Qualifiers in February and will compete in Valencia alongside Australia, Czechia and Spain in Group B at the 2024 Davis Cup Finals.
- Rinderknech is currently without a permanent coach.

NO. 15 HOLGER RUNE (DEN) v THIAGO SEYBOTH WILD (BRA)

Head-to-head: first meeting

Rune has lost a Grand Slam match to a player ranked as low as No. 74 Seyboth Wild once before – when he fell to No. 122 Arthur Cazaux in the 2nd round at the Australian Open this year. The lowest-ranked player to have defeated Rune at Wimbledon is No. 65 Marcos Giron in the 1st round in 2022.

- **RUNE** is bidding to reach the 3rd round here for the 2nd time. This is his 3rd Wimbledon appearance and his 12th Grand Slam overall.
- Rune is bidding to become the **3rd Danish man in the Open Era to reach the 3rd round at Wimbledon on multiple occasions** – after Torben Ulrich (who reached the 3rd round here in 1968 and 1970), and Kenneth Carlsen (1993, 1994, 2004).
- Rune advanced to the 2nd round here after defeating Kwon Soonwoo 61 64 64 in the 1st round on Tuesday.
- Last year here, Rune equalled his **best Grand Slam result** by reaching the quarterfinals. He defeated George Loffhagen, Roberto Carballes Baena, Alejandro Davidovich Fokina and Grigor Dimitrov before falling to Carlos Alcaraz. He became the first Danish man to record a match-win at Wimbledon since Kenneth Carlsen in 2004. He also reached the quarterfinals at Roland Garros in both 2022 and 2023, losing to Casper Ruud on both occasions.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Rune reached the round of 16 at Roland Garros, falling to Alexander Zverev in 5 sets, but fell in the 2nd round at the Australian Open (d. Yoshihito Nishioka, l. Arthur Cazaux).
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Rune fell in the 1st round at Queen's (l. Jordan Thompson).
- Rune's **best result in 2024** is finishing runner-up at Brisbane (l. Grigor Dimitrov). He also reached the semifinals at Montpellier, where he retired due to a right arm injury against Borna Coric, Acapulco (l. Casper Ruud) and Munich (l. Jan-Lennard Struff) and reached the quarterfinals at Indian Wells-1000 (l. Daniil Medvedev) and Monte-Carlo-1000 (l. Jannik Sinner).
- Rune won the only **5-set match** he has contested at Wimbledon, against Davidovich Fokina in the 3rd round last year. He has a 2-3 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Rune **broke the Top 10 for the first time** in November 2022 after winning the title at Paris-1000. He reached a career-high ranking of No. 4 in August 2023 and plays here at No. 15 – his lowest ranking since October 2022.
- Rune is a **former junior world No. 1**. He won the boys' singles title at 2019 Roland Garros (d. Toby Kodat) and reached the top ranking in October that year. He reached the 3rd round on his only appearance in the boys' singles here in 2019 (l. Anton Matusevich).
- Rune made his **Davis Cup** debut for Denmark in 2018 and has a 7-2 win-loss record in the competition. Denmark play away against Kazakhstan in a World Group I tie in September.
- Rune is coached by Kenneth Carlsen and Patrick Mouratoglou.

- **SEYBOTH WILD** is bidding to reach the 3rd round at a Grand Slam for the 2nd time on his Wimbledon main draw debut. This is his 5th Grand Slam main draw appearance overall.
- Seyboth Wild is bidding to become the **10th Brazilian man in the Open Era to reach the 3rd round at Wimbledon** – and the first since Thomaz Bellucci in 2010.
- Seyboth Wild advanced to the 2nd round here after defeating wild card Paul Jubb 16 36 76(6) 64 75 in the 1st round on Tuesday to record his **first successful comeback from 0-2 down**. He has a 2-2 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level.
- **Last year here**, Seyboth Wild fell in the final round of qualifying. He defeated Jelle Sels and Pierre-Hugues Herbert before falling to Tomas Barrios Vera in 5 sets. He also fell in qualifying here in 2021 and 2022.
- Seyboth Wild's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the 3rd round as a qualifier at Roland Garros last year. He defeated Daniil Medvedev and Guido Pella for his first Grand Slam match-wins before falling to Yoshihito Nishioka.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Seyboth Wild fell in the 1st round at both the Australian Open (l. Andrey Rublev) and Roland Garros (l. Gael Monfils).
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Seyboth Wild reached the 2nd round at Eastbourne (d. James McCabe, l. Taylor Fritz). It is his only previous Tour-level appearance on grass.
- Seyboth Wild's **best result in 2024** is reaching the quarterfinals at Rio de Janeiro (l. Cameron Norrie). He also reached the 3rd round as a qualifier at both Indian Wells-1000 (l. Fabian Marozsan) and Miami-1000 (l. Nicolas Jarry) and as a direct acceptance at Madrid-1000 (l. Carlos Alcaraz).
- Seyboth Wild is bidding to **defeat a Top 20 player at a Grand Slam for the 2nd time**. He has a 1-1 win-loss record against Top 20 players at the Grand Slams, having defeated No. 2 Medvedev in the 1st round at Roland Garros last year, but fallen to No. 5 Rublev in the 1st round at Roland Garros this year. He has a 4-6 win-loss record against Top 20 players at Tour-level overall.
- Seyboth Wild reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 58 in May this year. He plays here at No. 74.
- Seyboth Wild is a **former junior world No. 8** and won the boys' singles title at the 2018 US Open, defeating Lorenzo Musetti in the final. He lost to Francesco Forti in the 1st round on his only appearance in the boys' singles at Wimbledon in 2017.
- Seyboth Wild made his **Davis Cup** debut for Brazil in 2020 and has a 1-2 win-loss record in the competition. Brazil defeated Sweden in the Qualifiers in February to advance to the Davis Cup Finals Group Stage. They will compete in Group A in Bologna alongside Italy, Netherlands and Belgium in September.
- Seyboth Wild is coached by Carlos Eduardo Matos.

NO. 21 KAREN KHACHANOV v (Q) QUENTIN HALYS (FRA)

Head-to-head: first meeting

Khachanov has never lost a Grand Slam match to a player ranked as low as No. 220 Halys. The lowest-ranked player to have defeated Khachanov at the Grand Slams is No. 216 Vasek Pospisil in the 1st round at the 2019 US Open. The lowest-ranked player to have defeated Khachanov at Wimbledon is No. 22 Roberto Bautista Agut in the 3rd round in 2019.

Khachanov has won all 8 matches he has played against qualifiers at the Grand Slams – including both matches he has played against qualifiers at Wimbledon, against Kwon Soonwoo in the 1st round in 2019 and Mackenzie McDonald in the 1st round in 2021.

Khachanov has won 15 of his last 16 matches against qualifiers at Tour-level. His 15-match Tour-level winning streak against qualifiers ended in his most-recent match against a qualifier, when he fell to Thiago Seyboth Wild in the 2nd round at Indian Wells-1000 this year. He had previously not lost to a qualifier since falling to Peter Gojowczyk in the 2nd round at 2021 Metz. He has a 34-9 win-loss record against qualifiers at Tour-level overall.

- **KHACHANOV** is bidding to maintain his record of always reaching the 3rd round here. This is his 5th Wimbledon appearance and his 29th Grand Slam overall.
- Khachanov advanced to the 2nd round after Aslan Karatsev retired with Khachanov leading 63 67(4) 76(11) 2-0 in the 1st round on Wednesday.
- Khachanov is making his **first Wimbledon appearance since 2021**. He withdrew last year due to a stress fracture and did not compete in 2022.
- Khachanov's **best Wimbledon result** is reaching the quarterfinals in 2021. He defeated Mackenzie McDonald, Egor Gerasimov, Frances Tiafoe and Sebastian Korda before falling to Denis Shapovalov in 5 sets.
- Khachanov's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the semifinals on 2 occasions – at the 2022 US Open (l. Casper Ruud) and the 2023 Australian Open (l. Stefanos Tsitsipas).
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Khachanov reached the round of 16 at the Australian Open, where he defeated Daniel Altmaier, Aleksandar Kovacevic and Tomas Machac before falling to Jannik Sinner, but fell in the 2nd round at Roland Garros (d. Sumit Nagal, l. Jozef Kovalik).
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Khachanov lost his opening match at both 's-Hertogenbosch (l. Aleksandar Vukic) and Queen's (l. Korda). - Khachanov **broke the Top 10 for the first time** in June 2019 and reached a career-high ranking of No. 8 the following month. He plays here at No. 22.
- Khachanov **won the men's singles silver medal at the Tokyo 2020 Olympic Tennis Event** in 2021, falling to Alexander Zverev in the gold medal match. Along with Andrey Rublev, who won mixed doubles gold, he became the first tennis player to win medals at both the Youth Olympic Games and the Olympic Games.
- Khachanov won the **boys' doubles silver medal** alongside Rublev at the 2014 Youth Olympic Tennis Event in Nanjing, China. The pair fell to Orlando Luz/Marcelo Zormann in the gold medal match. He reached the 2nd round in his only appearance in the boys' singles here in 2013 (d. Marcelo Zormann, I. Laslo Djere).
- Khachanov is coached by Jose Clavet and Vedran Martic.
- Qualifier **HALYS** is bidding to reach the 3rd round here for the 2nd straight year and equal his best Grand Slam result. This is his 3rd Wimbledon appearance and his 20th Grand Slam overall.
- Halys advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Christopher Eubanks 64 64 62 in the 1st round on Wednesday.
- Halys defeated No. 7 seed Gregoire Barrere (FRA) 63 64, wild card Jay Clarke (GBR) 63 36 63 and Beibit Zhukayev (KAZ) 63 64 64 in the 3 rounds of **Wimbledon qualifying last week**. It was the first time he has successfully qualified at Wimbledon on his 6th attempt and the 5th time he has successfully qualified at a Grand Slam on his 21st attempt.
- Last year here, Halys recorded his **best Grand Slam result** by reaching the 3rd round. He defeated Daniel Evans and Aleksandar Vukic before falling to Jannik Sinner.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Halys reached the 2nd round at the Australian Open (d. Lloyd Harris, I. Sebastian Korda) but fell in the final round of qualifying at Roland Garros (I. Filip Misolic).
- Halys is bidding to record his **6th Tour-level match-win on grass**. His only previous Tour-level victories on grass prior to Wimbledon this year came in 2nd round finishes here in 2022 (d. Benoit Paire, I. Nikoloz Basilashvili) and at 2022 Newport (d. Alexei Popyrin, I. James Duckworth) and in his 3rd round finish here last year. He did not compete on grass this season prior to Wimbledon qualifying.
- Halys is bidding to record his **4th Tour-level match-win of 2024**. His only Tour-level match-wins prior to Wimbledon this year came in his 2nd round finish at the Australian Open and during France's victory over Chinese Taipei in the Davis Cup Qualifiers, when he defeated Tseng Chun Hsin. He lost in the 1st round on his only other Tour-level appearance this season – as a wild card at Marseille (I. Felix Auger-Aliassime).

- Halys has lost all 6 **five-set matches** he has contested. He has never contested a 5-set match at Wimbledon.
- Halys reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 61 in January 2023. He dropped outside the Top 100 in January this year and plays here at No. 220.
- Halys had a **good junior career**, reaching a career-high junior ranking of No. 3 in March 2014. He finished runner-up in the boys' singles at the 2014 US Open (I. Omar Jasika) and won the boys' doubles title at 2014 Roland Garros alongside Benjamin Bonzi. His best result in the boys' singles here was reaching the 2nd round in 2013 (d. Jorge Brian Panta, I. Borna Coric).
- Halys made his **Davis Cup** debut for France during the victory over Chinese Taipei in the Qualifiers this year, defeating Tseng in the only match he contested. France will compete in Group B in Valencia alongside Australia, Czechia and Spain at the 2024 Davis Cup Finals Group Stage in September.
- Halys is coached by Nicolas Devilder.

- Tabilo advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Daniel Evans 62 75 63 for his **50th Tour-level match-win** in a 1st round match that started on Tuesday and was completed on Wednesday.
- By reaching the 2nd round here, Tabilo has equalled his **best Grand Slam result**. He has previously reached the 2nd round at a Grand Slam on 3 occasions – including at Wimbledon in 2022 here in 2022 (d. Laslo Djere, I. Miomir Kecmanovic). He also reached the 2nd round as a qualifier on his Grand Slam debut at the 2020 Australian Open (d. Daniel Galan, I. John Isner) and as a direct acceptance and at the 2022 US Open (d. Kamil Majchrzak, I. JJ Wolf).
- **Last year here**, Tabilo fell to Pierre-Hugues Herbert in the 1st round of qualifying.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Tabilo fell in the 1st round at both the Australian Open (I. Aleksandar Kovacevic) and Roland Garros (I. Zizou Bergs).
- Prior to Wimbledon this season, Tabilo **won his 2nd Tour-level title**, and first on grass, at Mallorca (d. Sebastian Ofner). He became the first Chilean man to win a Tour-level title on grass. He also reached the 2nd round at Queen's (d. Alejandro Davidovich Fokina, I. Tommy Paul). He is one of 23 players competing in the men's singles here this year to have won a Tour-level title on grass.
- Tabilo's other highlights in 2024 are winning his **first Tour-level title** at Auckland (d. Taro Daniel), finishing runner-up at Santiago (I. Sebastian Baez) and reaching the semifinals at Bucharest (I. Marton Fucsovics) and Rome-1000 (I. Alexander Zverev). He is one of 10 players to have won multiple Tour-level titles prior to Wimbledon this season.
- Tabilo won the only **5-set match** he has contested at Wimbledon, against Djere in the 1st round in 2022. He has a 2-1 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall – but lost his most-recent 5-set match, to Kovacevic in the 1st round at the Australian Open this year.
- Tabilo is one of the **8 lefthanders** who have reached the 2nd round from the 17 who began this year's Wimbledon men's singles main draw. In the Open Era, 5 lefthanded players have won the men's singles title here, most recently Rafael Nadal in 2010.
- Tabilo **broke the Top 20 for the first time** this week and plays here at a new career-high ranking of No. 19.

- Tabilo was a **good junior**. He represented Canada, the country of his birth, throughout his junior career. He reached a career-high junior ranking of No. 29 in 2015, and fell in the 1st round in his only appearance in the boys' singles here that year (l. Marc Polmans).
- Tabilo has played **Davis Cup** for Chile since 2019 and has a 9-9 overall win-loss record in the competition. After defeating Peru in the Qualifiers in February, Chile will compete in Zhuhai alongside Germany, Slovakia and USA in Group C at the 2024 Davis Cup Finals.
- Tabilo is coached by Horacio Matta.
- **COBOLLI** is bidding to reach the 3rd round on his Wimbledon debut and equal his best Grand Slam result. This is his 4th Grand Slam appearance overall.
- Cobolli advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Rinky Hijikata 75 46 64 64 for his **first Wimbledon match-win** in the 1st round on Tuesday.
- Cobolli's best **Grand Slam result** is reaching the 3rd round as a qualifier at the Australian Open this year. He defeated Nicolas Jarry and Pavel Kotov before falling to Alex de Minaur. His victory over Jarry in the 1st round was the only 5-set match he has contested to date.
- **Last year here**, Cobolli fell in the 1st round of qualifying (l. Juan Pablo Ficovich). He also fell in the 1st round of qualifying here in 2022 (l. Nicolas Kicker).
- Cobolli is one of 7 Italian players who have reached the men's singles 2nd round here – the **most Italian men to reach the 2nd round at Wimbledon in the Open Era**. The previous highest-number of Italian men in the 2nd round here in the Open Era was 6 in 2018.
- **Elsewhere in Grand Slam play this year**, Cobolli reached the 2nd round at Roland Garros (d. Hamad Medjedovic, l. Holger Rune).

- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Cobolli reached the quarterfinals at Eastbourne, where he defeated Arthur Rinderknech and Giles Hussey for his first Tour-level match-wins on grass before falling to Billy Harris. He fell in the 1st round at both Stuttgart (l. Jan-Lennard Struff) and Halle (l. Hubert Hurkacz). They are his only previous Tour-level appearances on grass.
- Cobolli's **best Tour-level result in 2024** is reaching the semifinals at Geneva (l. Casper Ruud). He also reached the quarterfinals at Montpellier (l. Borna Coric) and as a lucky loser at Delray Beach (l. Frances Tiafoe).
- Cobolli is bidding to **defeat a Top 20 player at a Grand Slam for the 2nd time**. He has a 1-3 win-loss record against Top 20 players at the Grand Slams, with his only victory coming against No. 18 Jarry in the 1st round at the Australian Open this year. He has a 2-8 win-loss record against Top 20 players overall.
- Cobolli **broke the Top 50 for the first time** last month and plays here at a career-high ranking of No. 48.
- Cobolli was a **good junior**. He reached a career-high junior ranking of No. 8 in January 2020, and finished his junior career by winning the boys' doubles title at 2020 Roland Garros alongside Dominic Stricker. He reached the 2nd round in his only appearance in the boys' singles here in 2019 (d. Sergey Fomin, l. Filip Cristian Jianu).
- Cobolli is coached by his father, Stefano Cobolli.

NO. 28 JACK DRAPER (GBR) v CAMERON NORRIE (GBR)

A 3rd Tour-level meeting for Draper and Norrie, their 2nd on grass but their first at a Grand Slam. Norrie was the higher-ranked player in both of their 2 previous meetings – with Norrie at No. 41 and Draper at No. 309 in their meeting at 2021 Queen's and Norrie at No. 12 and Draper at No. 146 in their meeting at 2022 Miami-1000.

Draper and Norrie are 2 of the 8 British players to reach the 2nd round here across men's and women's singles draws. It is the 2nd-highest number of British players to reach the 2nd round at a Grand Slam since 2000 – after 2022 Wimbledon, when 10 British players reached the 2nd round. Since 2000, the highest-number of British players to reach the 3rd round at a Grand Slam is 4 – at the US Open in 2016, 2022 and 2023, and at Wimbledon in 2017, 2021 and 2022.

This is the 20th all-British men's singles match at Wimbledon in the Open Era – and the 2nd in consecutive years, after Andy Murray's victory against Ryan Peniston in the 1st round here last year. It is the 27th all-British men's singles match at the Grand Slams in the Open Era.

Katie Boulter and Harriet Dart are scheduled to contest a women's singles 2nd round match here today. Across both men's and women's draws, these are the 58th and 59th all-British singles matches at Wimbledon in the Open Era. They are the 83rd and 84th all-British singles matches at the Grand Slams in the Open Era

Draper replaced Norrie as British No. 1 on 17 June 2024 after winning his first Tour-level title at Stuttgart. Norrie had previously been ranked as British No. 1 for 139 consecutive weeks, since 18 October 2021.

This is the first Grand Slam meeting between the men's British No. 1 and British No. 2 since the 2002 Australian Open, when Tim Henman (world No. 8) defeated Greg Rusedski (world No. 25) in the 3rd round. It is the 4th meeting between the men's British No. 1 and British No. 2 at the Grand Slams and the first meeting between the men's British No. 1 and British No. 2 at Wimbledon since the ATP rankings were introduced in 1973.

Boulter's match against Dart today is also a meeting between the women's British No. 1 and British No. 2. The 2 all-British matches are the first meetings between the Top 2 British players at the Grand Slams since the 2020 US Open, when Johanna Konta (world No. 13) defeated British No. 2 Heather Watson (world No. 54) in the 1st round.

This is the first time that multiple all-British singles matches have taken place at the same Grand Slam tournament since 2001 Wimbledon – when Barry Cowan defeated Mark Hilton in the men's singles 1st round before Tim Henman defeated Martin Lee in the men's singles 2nd round.

This is the first time that there have been all-British singles matches in both men's and women's draws at a Grand Slam tournament since 1996 Wimbledon, when there were 5 all-British singles matches – Colin Beecher defeated Nick Gould in the men's singles 1st round, while Rachel Viollet defeated Megan Miller and Claire Taylor defeated Joanne Ward in the women's singles 1st round. Henman then defeated Danny Sapsford and Luke Milligan in the men's singles 2nd and 3rd rounds, respectively.

Draper is facing a British player at a Grand Slam for the first time. He has a 3-2 win-loss record against British players at Tour-level – both of his defeats came against Norrie in his first 2 Tour-level matches against British players. Since then, he has won all 3 Tour-level matches he has contested against British players.

Norrie is facing a British player at a Grand Slam for the 2nd time, having defeated Daniel Evans in the 1st round at the 2021 Australian Open. He has a 6-2 win-loss record against British players, with his 2 defeats coming against Kyle Edmund in the 2nd round at 2019 Eastbourne and against Murray in the 2nd round at 2019 Beijing. Since then, he has won all 5 Tour-level matches he has contested against British players.

Across both men's and women's draws, this is the 3rd Grand Slam singles match between 2 British lefthanders in the Open Era – after Rusedski defeated Andrew Richardson in the 3rd round here in 1997 and Cowan defeated Hilton in the 1st round here in 2001.

Draper and Norrie are 2 of the 8 lefthanders to reach the 2nd round from the 17 who began this year's Wimbledon men's singles main draw. In the Open Era, 5 lefthanded players have won the men's singles title here: Rod Laver (1968-69), Jimmy Connors (1974, 1982), John McEnroe (1981, 1983-84), Goran Ivanisevic (2001) and Rafael Nadal (2008, 2010).

Draper is facing a lefthander at Wimbledon for the first time. He lost the only match he has played against a lefthander at the Grand Slams, to Rafael Nadal in the 1st round at the 2023 Australian Open. He won his only previous match against a lefthanded player this season – against Yoshihito Nishioka in the 2nd round at Acapulco – and has a 4-5 win-loss record against lefthanders at Tour-level overall.

Norrie is facing a lefthander for the 2nd consecutive match, having defeated Facundo Diaz Acosta in the 1st round here. He won the only other match he has played against a lefthander at Wimbledon – against Alex Bolt in the 2nd round here in 2021. He has a 3-2 win-loss record against lefthanders at the Grand Slams and a 27-16 win-loss record against lefthanders at Tour-level overall.

Draper and Norrie are Davis Cup teammates. Draper made his Davis Cup debut for Great Britain at the 2023 Finals Group Stage and has won one of the 2 matches he has contested in the competition. Norrie has played Davis Cup for Great Britain since 2018 and has a 7-8 win-loss record in the competition. Great Britain received a wild card for the 2024 Davis Cup Finals Group Stage and will compete in Group D in Manchester alongside Canada, Finland and Argentina in September.

- **DRAPER** is bidding to reach the 3rd round here for the first time. This is his 3rd Wimbledon appearance and his 9th Grand Slam overall.
- Draper is bidding to become the **31st British player in the Open Era to reach the men's singles 3rd round at Wimbledon**. He would become the 6th active British player to reach the 3rd round here – after Andy Murray (13 appearances in the 3rd round here), Daniel Evans (3), Liam Broady and Norrie (both 2) and Kyle Edmund (one).
- Draper advanced to the 2nd round after defeating qualifier Elias Ymer 36 63 63 46 63 in the 1st round on Tuesday. It was his **2nd victory in a 5-set match**. He has a 2-1 win-loss record in 5-set matches, having also defeated Marcos Giron in 5 sets in the 1st round at the Australian Open this year but having fallen to Jesper de Jong in 5 sets in the 1st round at Roland Garros this year.
- By reaching the 2nd round here, Draper has equalled his **best Wimbledon result**. He also reached the 2nd round here in 2022 (d. Zizou Bergs, l. Alex de Minaur). In his only other appearance here, as a wild card on his Grand Slam debut in 2021, he fell to Novak Djokovic in the 1st round. He missed the entire grass court season in 2023 with a shoulder injury.
- Draper's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the round of 16 at the 2023 US Open. He defeated Radu Albot, Hubert Hurkacz and Michael Mmoh before falling to Andrey Rublev.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Draper reached the 2nd round at the Australian Open (d. Giron, l. Tommy Paul) but fell in the 1st round at Roland Garros (l. De Jong).
- Prior to Wimbledon this season, Draper **won his first Tour-level title** at Stuttgart (d. Matteo Berrettini). He then reached the quarterfinals at Queen's, recording a career-best victory against No. 2 Carlos Alcaraz in the 2nd round, before falling to eventual champion Tommy Paul in the last 8.

- Draper's **other highlights in 2024** are finishing runner-up at Adelaide (l. Jiri Lehecka), reaching the semifinals at Acapulco (l. De Minaur) and reaching the quarterfinals at Munich (l. Taylor Fritz).
- Draper plays here at a new **career-high ranking** of No. 28, and is seeded at a Grand Slam for the first time.
- Draper finished **runner-up in the boys' singles at 2018 Wimbledon**, falling to No. 1 seed Tseng Chun-Hsin 61 67(2) 64 in the final. He had defeated Nicolas Mejia 76(5) 67(6) 19-17 in a semifinal match lasting 4 hours 23 minutes. He reached a career-high junior ranking of No. 7 in December 2018.
- Draper is coached by James Trotman and Wayne Ferreira, who reached the quarterfinals here in 1994.
- **NORRIE** is bidding to reach the 3rd round here for the 3rd time. This is his 7th Wimbledon appearance and his 27th Grand Slam overall.
- Norrie is bidding to become the **10th British player in the Open Era to reach the men's singles 3rd round at Wimbledon on 3 occasions** – after Andy Murray (13 appearances in the 3rd round here), Tim Henman (9), Mark Cox (6), Greg Rusedski (5), Chris Wilkinson (4) and Jeremy Bates, Daniel Evans, John Lloyd and Buster Mottram (all 3).
- Norrie advanced to the 3rd round after defeating Facundo Diaz Acosta 75 75 63 in the 1st round on Tuesday.
- **Last year here**, Norrie reached the 2nd round (d. Tomas Machac, l. Christopher Eubanks).
- Norrie's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the semifinals here in 2022 (l. Novak Djokovic). He became the 4th British man in the Open Era to reach the semifinals at Wimbledon – after Murray (7 Wimbledon semifinal appearances), Henman (4) and Roger Taylor (2). He also became the 7th British man in the Open Era to reach the semifinals at a Grand Slam – and the 3rd active British man to reach a Grand Slam semifinal, after Murray and Kyle Edmund.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Norrie reached the round of 16 at the Australian Open (l. Alexander Zverev) but fell in the 1st round at Roland Garros (l. Pavel Kotov).
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Norrie fell in the 1st round at both Queen's (l. Milos Raonic) and Eastbourne (l. Emil Ruusuvuori). He also competed at the Nottingham Challenger (GBR) where he reached the 2nd round (d. Sho Shimabukuro, l. Jack Pinnington Jones).
- Norrie's **best results in 2024** are reaching the semifinals at Rio de Janeiro (l. Mariano Navone), and the quarterfinals at Auckland, where he gave a walkover to Alejandro Tabilo due to a wrist injury, and at Barcelona (l. Tomas Martin Etcheverry).
- Norrie has won both **5-set matches** he has contested at Wimbledon – recording 5-set victories against Jaume Munar in the 2nd round and David Goffin in the quarterfinals here in 2022. He has a 6-7 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Norrie broke the Top 10 for the first time in April 2022, becoming the **4th British man to break the Top 10** after Greg Rusedski, Henman and Murray. He reached a career-high ranking of No. 8 in September 2022. He dropped to No. 44 last week – his lowest-ranking since June 2021, when he was ranked No. 45 – but plays here 2 places higher at No. 42.
- Norrie **played college tennis**. He represented Texas Christian University and finished his college career in 2017 as the NCAA's top-ranked male player. He compiled a 77-20 win-loss record in singles in college tennis from 2014 to 2017.
- Norrie was a **good junior**, reaching a career-high ranking of No. 10 in March 2013. He fell in the 1st round on his only appearance in the boys' singles event here in 2013 (l. Laslo Djere).
- Norrie is coached by Facundo Lugones.

NO. 10 GRIGOR DIMITROV (BUL) v SHANG JUNCHENG (CHN)

Head-to-head: first meeting

Dimitrov (33 years 59 days) is 13 years 261 days older than Shang (19 years 163 days). This is the 2nd-largest age gap between players in the 2nd round of the men's singles here this year – after the age gap of 14 years 52 days between Novak Djokovic (37 years 53 days) and Jacob Fearnley (22 years 365 days). (NB ages calculated at the end of the tournament)

Dimitrov has lost to a player ranked as low as No. 91 Shang at Wimbledon on 2 occasions – to No. 224 Stan Wawrinka in the 1st round in 2018, and to No. 93 Steve Johnson in the 1st round in 2022 after retiring at 64 2-5 in the 2nd set due to a left leg injury.

Dimitrov has won 3 of the 4 matches he has played against lefthanders at Wimbledon – defeating Cedrik-Marcel Stebe in the 1st round in 2011, Federico Delbonis in the 1st round in 2015 and Fernando Verdasco in the 1st round in 2021, but falling to Corentin Moutet in the 1st round in 2019 despite holding a 2-0 lead. He has an 8-4 win-loss record against lefthanders at the Grand Slams and a 67-38 win-loss record against lefthanders at Tour-level overall.

- **DIMITROV** is bidding to reach the 3rd round here for the 6th time. This is his 14th Wimbledon appearance and his 55th Grand Slam appearance overall.
- Dimitrov is bidding to record his 21st Wimbledon singles match-win and equal Magdalena Maleeva's **all-time record for most Wimbledon match-wins by a Bulgarian player**.
- Dimitrov advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Dusan Lajovic 63 64 75 in the 1st round on Monday.
- **Last year here**, Dimitrov reached the round of 16 (l. Holger Rune) – his best result at Wimbledon since reaching the round of 16 in 2017 (l. Roger Federer).
- Dimitrov's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the semifinals on 3 occasions – including once at Wimbledon, in 2014 (l. Novak Djokovic). He also reached the semifinals at the 2017 Australian Open (l. Rafael Nadal) and the 2019 US Open (l. Daniil Medvedev).
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Dimitrov reached the quarterfinals at Roland Garros (l. Jannik Sinner) but fell in the 3rd round at the Australian Open (l. Nuno Borges). By reaching the quarterfinals at Roland Garros for the first time on his 14th attempt, he set the Open Era record for most Roland Garros men's singles appearances before reaching the quarterfinals. He also became the 54th player in the Open Era – and the 13th active player – to reach the men's singles quarterfinals at all 4 Grand Slam tournaments.
- Dimitrov is contesting **54th consecutive Grand Slam tournament** here this year, putting him in joint-6th place on the all-time list for most consecutive appearances in the men's singles at the Grand Slams, alongside Stefan Edberg. He owns the longest active streak of Grand Slam appearances, having contested the main draw at every Grand Slam tournament since the 2011 Australian Open.
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Dimitrov reached the 2nd round at Queen's (d. Adrian Mannarino, l. Sebastian Korda).

- Dimitrov's best result in 2024 is winning his **9th Tour-level title** – and his first since the 2017 ATP Finals – at Brisbane (d. Rune). He also finished runner-up at Marseille (l. Ugo Humbert) and Miami-1000 (l. Sinner) and reached the semifinals at Rotterdam (l. Alex de Minaur).
- Dimitrov has lost 2 of the 3 **five-set matches** that he has contested at Wimbledon – he defeated Alexandr Dolgoplov in 5 sets in the 3rd round here in 2014, but lost 5-set matches to Grega Zemlja in the 2nd round in 2013 and to Moutet in the 1st round in 2019. He has an 11-9 win-loss record in 5-set matches overall.
- Dimitrov's **best grass court performance** is winning the title at 2014 Queen's (d. Feliciano Lopez).
- Dimitrov reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 3 after winning the title at the 2017 ATP Finals (d. David Goffin). He returned to the Top 10 for the first time since November 2018 in April this year and plays here at No. 10.
- Dimitrov is one of 3 **former Wimbledon boys' singles champions** through to the 2nd round from the 5 who started in the men's main draw here. He won the boys' singles titles here (d. Henri Kontinen) and at the US Open (d. Devin Britton) in 2008 and finished the year at No. 3 in the ITF Junior Rankings.
- Dimitrov was part of the ITF 14 & Under European Team in Europe in 2004-05 and the ITF 16 & Under European A Team in Europe in 2006, funded by the Grand Slam Player Development Programme (formerly known as the Grand Slam Development Fund).
- Dimitrov is coached by Daniel Vallverdu and Jamie Delgado.
- Lefthander **SHANG** is bidding to reach the 3rd round and equal his best Grand Slam result on his Wimbledon debut. This is his 4th Grand Slam appearance overall.
- Shang is bidding to become the **3rd Chinese player in history to reach the men's singles 3rd round at Wimbledon** – after Kho Sin-Khie (who reached the 2nd round here in 1937-38 and 1946) and Choy Wai-Chuen (1939). By both reaching the 2nd round here, Shang and Zhang Zhizhen have become the 5th and 6th Chinese players in history to reach the men's singles 2nd round at Wimbledon – and the first since Mei Fu-Chi in 1959. (NB Zhang fell to Jan-Lennard Struff in the 2nd round on Wednesday)
- Shang advanced to the 2nd round after defeating qualifier Cristian Garin 75 64 64 in the 1st round on Monday.
- **Last year here**, Shang fell to Matteo Arnaldi in the 1st round of qualifying. It was his first appearance in Wimbledon qualifying.
- Shang's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the 3rd round as a qualifier at the Australian Open this year. He defeated Mackenzie McDonald and Sumit Nagal before falling to Carlos Alcaraz in the 3rd round after retiring with a right thigh injury while trailing 16 16 0-1.
- **Elsewhere at the Grand Slams in 2024**, Shang fell in the 1st round of qualifying at Roland Garros (l. Roman Andres Burruchaga).
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Shang reached the quarterfinals at Eastbourne as a qualifier, defeating Tomas Martin Etcheverry and Emil Ruusuvuori for his first Tour-level match-wins on grass, before falling to Taylor Fritz. He reached the quarterfinals at the Nottingham Challenger (GBR) (l. Jacob Fearnley) but fell in the 1st round at the Surbiton Challenger (GBR) (l. Billy Harris).
- Shang's best Tour-level result in 2024 is reaching his **first Tour-level semifinal** as a wild card at Hong Kong (l. Andrey Rublev). His best result at Challenger-level is reaching the semifinals at the Bordeaux Challenger (FRA) (l. Pedro Martinez).
- Shang is bidding to **defeat a Top 10 player for the first time on his 4th attempt**. He lost all 3 matches he has previously contested against Top 10 players – against No. 10 Frances Tiafoe in the 3rd round at 2023 Washington, No. 5 Rublev in the semifinals at 2024 Hong Kong and No. 2 Alcaraz in the 3rd round at the 2024 Australian Open. The highest-ranked player he has defeated is No. 16 Tiafoe in the quarterfinals at Hong Kong this year.
- Shang is one of **8 lefthanders** to reach the 2nd round here from the 17 started in the men's main draw this year. Rafael Nadal was the last lefthander to win the title here in 2010.
- Aged 19 years 163 days, Shang is the **youngest player to reach the men's singles 2nd round here this year**. He was one of 4 teenagers to begin the men's singles here this year. (NB ages calculated at the end of the tournament)

- Shang **broke the Top 100 for the first time** in May this year, achieving a career-high ranking of No. 89. He plays here 2 places lower at No. 91.
- Shang is a **former junior world No. 1**. He reached the No. 1 ranking in July 2021 and finished runner-up in the boys' singles at the 2021 US Open (l. Daniel Rincon). He was named ITF Junior World Champion for 2021. He reached the semifinals in his only appearance in the boys' singles here in 2021 (l. Victor Lilov).
- Shang is coached by Martin Alund.

NO. 14 BEN SHELTON (USA) v (Q) LLOYD HARRIS (RSA)

Head-to-head: first meeting

Shelton is facing a qualifier for the 2nd consecutive match, having defeating Mattia Bellucci in the 1st round here. He has a 2-1 win-loss record against qualifiers at the Grand Slams, having lost to Nuno Borges in the 1st round at the 2022 US Open on his Grand Slam debut, but defeated Nicolas Jarry in the 2nd round at the 2023 Australian Open. He has a 6-6 win-loss record against qualifiers at Tour-level overall.

Shelton has lost Tour-level matches to players ranked as low as No. 118 Bellucci on 3 occasions – to Shang Juncheng (then-ranked No. 156) in the 1st round at 2023 Atlanta, to Shang (then-ranked No. 149) in the 2nd round at 2023 Washington, and to No. 289 Paul Jubb in the quarterfinals at Mallorca last week.

Harris is facing a lefthanded player at Wimbledon for the first time. He has a 2-1 win-loss record against lefthanded players at the Grand Slams, having defeated Denis Shapovalov in the 3rd round at the 2021 US Open and Guido Pella in the 1st round at the 2023 US Open, but falling Cameron Norrie in the 2nd round at 2021 Roland Garros. He has a 15-8 win-loss record against lefthanded players at Tour-level overall.

- Lefthander **SHELTON** is bidding to reach the 3rd round here for the first time. This is his 2nd Wimbledon appearance and his 8th Grand Slam overall.
- Shelton advanced to the 2nd round after defeating qualifier Mattia Bellucci 46 63 36 63 64 in the 1st round in a match that began on Monday and finished on Tuesday. It was his **50th Tour-level match-win**.
- **Last year here**, on his Wimbledon debut, he reached the 2nd round. (d. Taro Daniel, I. Laslo Djere).
- Shelton's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the semifinals at the 2023 US Open (I. Novak Djokovic). Aged 20 years 336 days, he became the youngest American man to reach the semifinals at the US Open since Michael Chang (20 years 204 days) in 1992.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Shelton reached the 3rd round at both the Australian Open (I. Adrian Mannarino) and Roland Garros (I. Felix Auger-Aliassime).
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Shelton reached the quarterfinals at Mallorca, where he received a bye through the 1st round and defeated Rinky Hijikata before falling to Paul Jubb. He lost his opening match at both Stuttgart (I. James Duckworth) and Queen's (I. Giovanni Mpetshi Perricard).
- Shelton's best result in 2024 is winning his **2nd Tour-level title** at Houston (d. Frances Tiafoe). He also reached the semifinals at Auckland (I. Taro Daniel) and Dallas (I. Tommy Paul) and the quarterfinals at Acapulco (I. Casper Ruud).
- Shelton is bidding to record his **5th match-win on grass, at any level**. In addition to his win in the 1st round yesterday, his 2nd round finish here last year, and his victory against Hijikata at Mallorca last week, his only other match-win on grass came in a 2nd round finish at Queen's last year (d. JJ Wolf, I. Lorenzo Musetti).
- Shelton has won both **5-set matches** he has contested at Wimbledon, against Daniel in the 1st round last year and Bellucci in the 1st round this year. He has a 4-2 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.

- Shelton is one of **8 lefthanders** to reach the 2nd round here from the 17 started in the men's main draw this year. Rafael Nadal was the last lefthander to win the title here in 2010.
- Shelton reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 14 in April 2024 after winning his 2nd Tour-level title at Houston. He plays here at the same ranking.
- Shelton is one of **4 seeded American men** to reach the 2nd round here from the 5 who began the main draw. USA has more seeded players in the draw than any other nation.
- Shelton **played college tennis**. He represented the University of Florida for 2 seasons, compiling a 65-10 win-loss record in singles and winning the 2021 NCAA team title and the 2022 NCAA singles title.
- Shelton **contested just 4 tournaments as a junior player**, all of which came in his home country. His best result was reaching the 3rd round as a wild card at 2020 JA Plantation (USA) (also known as the Orange Bowl), falling to Jack Pinnington Jones.
- Shelton's father, Bryan Shelton, reached a career-high ranking of No. 55 in March 1992. He made 6 appearances at Wimbledon, reaching the round of 16 in 1994.
- Shelton is coached by his father, Bryan Shelton, and Dean Goldfine.
- Qualifier **HARRIS** is bidding to reach the 3rd round here for the first time. This is his 4th Wimbledon appearance and 20th Grand Slam overall.
- Harris advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Alex Michelsen 36 46 76(5) 62 76(9) in the 1st round on Monday. It was his **first successful comeback from 0-2 down** and extended maintained his perfect record in 5-set matches, having won all 5 five-set matches he has contested.
- As No. 5 seed in qualifying, Harris defeated Andrea Vavassori (ITA) 62 62, wild card George Loffhagen (GBR) 76(6) 76(5), and Hugo Grenier (FRA) 64 62 36 76(5) in the **3 rounds of Wimbledon qualifying last week**. It was the 4th time he has successfully qualified at a Grand Slam on his 7th appearance in qualifying.
- **Last year here**, Harris fell in the 1st round of the main draw to Gregoire Barrere having entered on a protected ranking.
- By reaching the 2nd round here, Harris has equalled his **best Wimbledon result**. He also reached the 2nd round here in 2021 (d. Ricardas Berankis, I. Andrey Rublev).
- Harris' **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the quarterfinals at the 2021 US Open (I. Alexander Zverev).
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Harris qualified at the Australian Open before falling in the 1st round of the main draw (I. Quentin Halys). He reached the 2nd round of qualifying at Roland Garros (d. Arthur Gea, I. Mattia Bellucci).
- **Prior to competing in Wimbledon qualifying this year**, Harris won the title Surbiton Challenger (GBR) (d. Leandro Riedi). He also reached the quarterfinals at the Ilkley Challenger (GBR) (I. Harold Mayot) and the 2nd round at the Nottingham Challenger (GBR) (d. Beibit Zhukayev, I. Charles Broom).
- Harris has competed **mainly at Challenger-level in 2024**. His best performances at Challenger-level this season are winning his 4th, 5th and 6th Challenger titles at the Gwangju Challenger (KOR) (d. Yunchaokete Bu), the Shenzhen 1 Challenger (CHN) (d. James Duckworth) and the Surbiton Challenger (GBR) respectively.
- Harris' **best Tour-level grass court result** is reaching the semifinals as a qualifier at 2023 Mallorca (I. Christopher Eubanks).
- Harris **underwent wrist surgery in the spring of 2022** and missed the final 6 months of the season before returning in January 2023. His ranking fell as low as No. 306 in May last year, but he returned to the Top 100 last month before dropping outside the Top 1000 again this week.
- Harris is bidding to **defeat a Top 20 player at Wimbledon for the first time on his 3rd attempt**. He has lost both matches he has played against Top 20 players at Wimbledon, against No. 3 Federer in the 1st round in 2019 and against No. 7 Rublev in the 2nd round in 2021. He has a 2-9 win-loss record against Top 20 players at the Grand Slams and a 9-18 win-loss record against Top 20 players at Tour-level overall.

- Harris reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 31 in September 2021. He plays here at No. 118.
- Harris is coached by Anthony Harris (no relation).

A 7th Tour-level meeting and 8th overall between Wawrinka and Monfils, nearly 20 years on from their first. With Wawrinka aged 19 years 189 days and Monfils aged 18 years 32 days on that day in 2004, they had a combined age of 37 years 221 days, younger than the individual age of either man today, with Monfils now aged 37 years 317 days and Wawrinka aged 39 years 108 days (NB ages calculated at end of the tournament).

Wawrinka and Monfils are the 2 oldest players to have started the men's singles draw here this year. With a combined age of 77 years and 60 days, it is the 3rd-oldest combined age in a Wimbledon men's singles match in the Open Era – after Luis Ayala (36 years 290 days) defeated Bob Howe (43 years 336 days) and in the 1st round in 1969 (combined age 80 years 261 days); and Rod Laver (32 years 328 days) defeated Howe (45 years 334 days) in the 1st round in 1971 (combined age 78 years 297 days).

This is a 3rd meeting between Wawrinka and Monfils at the Grand Slams, but their first at Wimbledon, with Wawrinka winning in straight sets on both of their previous Grand Slam meetings.

Wawrinka and Monfils are meeting on grass for the first time, a 4th different surface in their head-to-head, having faced each other on carpet courts in qualifying at 2004 Lyon, on hard courts on 5 occasions, and on clay at 2017 Roland Garros.

This is also a first meeting between the 2 men for more than 5 years, since Monfils defeated Wawrinka in the final at 2019 Rotterdam.

- **WAWRINKA** is bidding to reach the 3rd round here for the 7th time.
- Wawrinka advanced to the 2nd round here after defeating wild card Charles Broom 63 75 64 on Monday.
- At 39 years 108 days, Wawrinka is bidding to become the **6th man in the Open Era to reach the 3rd round at Wimbledon aged 39 or older**. Since Ken Rosewall reached the 3rd round here aged 40 years 245 days in 1975, Roger Federer is the only man to have reached the 3rd round here aged 39 or older, having been aged 39 years 337 days when he reached the 3rd round here in 2021. By reaching the 2nd round here, Wawrinka is the 10th man in the Open Era to reach the 2nd round at Wimbledon aged 39 or older. (NB ages calculated at end of the tournament)
- **Last year here**, Wawrinka reached the 3rd round (I. Novak Djokovic).
- Wawrinka's **best Wimbledon result** is reaching the quarterfinals on 2 occasions – in 2014 (I. Federer) and 2015 (I. Richard Gasquet).

- Wawrinka is a **3-time Grand Slam champion**. He won his first Grand Slam title at the 2014 Australian Open (d. Rafael Nadal) and also won the titles at 2015 Roland Garros and the 2016 US Open, defeating Djokovic on both occasions. He defeated both the No. 1 and No. 2 seeds en route to his first 2 Grand Slam title victories and is the only player to have achieved the feat en route to winning a Grand Slam since Sergi Bruguera won the title at 1993 Roland Garros. He is one of 6 Grand Slam champions to start the main draw here.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Wawrinka reached the 2nd round at Roland Garros (d. Andy Murray, l. Pavel Kotov), but fell to Adrian Mannarino in 5 sets in the 1st round at the Australian Open.
- Wawrinka is making his **18th Wimbledon appearance and his 71st Grand Slam appearance overall**. He is in the Top 10 on the Open Era lists for both most Wimbledon men's singles appearances (in joint-6th place with Mikhail Youzhny) and most Grand Slam men's singles appearances (in joint-5th place with Fernando Verdasco).
- Wawrinka is bidding to record his **5th Tour-level match-win of 2024**. His only victories at Tour-level prior to Wimbledon this season came in 2nd round finishes at Buenos Aires (d. Pedro Cachin, l. Nicolas Jarry), Marrakech (d. Albert Ramos-Vinolas, l. Mariano Navone) and Roland Garros. He has lost in the 1st round at the 5 other Tour-level events he has contested this season. His only other match-win in 2024, at any level, came in a 2nd round finish at the Bordeaux Challenger (FRA) (d. Bernabe Zapata Miralles, l. Pedro Martinez).
- Wawrinka's **best Tour-level grass court result** is finishing runner-up at 2013 's-Hertogenbosch (l. Nicolas Mahut). He is one of 16 players competing in the men's singles who did not play a grass court event this season, at any level, prior to Wimbledon this year.
- Wawrinka has won one of the 6 **five-set matches** he has contested at Wimbledon, with his only victory in a 5-set match here coming against Ivo Karlovic in the 1st round in 2006. He has a 30-27 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall and has lost 5 of the last 6 five-set matches he has contested.
- Wimbledon is Wawrinka's **least successful Grand Slam** in terms of matches won. He has a 23-17 win-loss record here, compared with 46-18 at Roland Garros, 46-15 at the US Open and 43-17 at the Australian Open.
- Wawrinka reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 3 in January 2014 after winning his first Grand Slam title at the Australian Open. He plays here at No. 95.
- Wawrinka was the 2003 **Roland Garros junior champion** (d. Brian Baker) – the only junior Grand Slam event he contested.
- Wawrinka was part of the **Switzerland team that won the Davis Cup title in 2014**, defeating France in the final. He won 5 of the 7 matches he contested in the competition that year. He returned to the Swiss Davis Cup team for the first time since 2015 in the 2023 Qualifiers and competed at the 2023 Finals Group Stage. He has a 28-30 win-loss record in the competition overall. Switzerland will face Peru in a World Group I tie in Switzerland in September.
- Wawrinka is coached by former world No. 2 Magnus Norman.
- **MONFILS** is bidding to reach the 3rd round here for the 8th time – and the first time since 2018. This is his 13th Wimbledon appearance and his 63rd Grand Slam overall.
- Aged 37 years 221 days, Monfils is bidding to become the **12th man in the Open Era to reach the 3rd round here aged 37 or older**. Fellow 37-year-olds Novak Djokovic and Fabio Fognini are also bidding to reach the 3rd round here, while 39-year-old Wawrinka is bidding to reach the 3rd round here for the 2nd time since turning 37. (NB ages calculated at end of the tournament)
- Monfils is also bidding to become the **oldest Frenchman in the Open Era to reach the 3rd round here** – breaking the record held by Richard Gasquet, who reached the 3rd round here in 2022 aged 36 years 22 days.
- Monfils advanced to the 2nd round here after defeating No. 22 seed Adrian Mannarino 64 36 75 64 on Monday.
- Monfils is making **his first appearance here since 2021**, when he reached the 2nd round (d. Christopher O'Connell, l. Pedro Martinez). He withdrew from the 2022 event with a foot injury and from the 2023 event with a wrist injury.
- Monfils' **best Wimbledon result** is reaching the round of 16 in 2018, when he defeated Gasquet, Paolo Lorenzi and Sam Querrey before falling to Kevin Anderson.

- Monfils' **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the semifinals on 2 occasions. He reached the last 4 at 2008 Roland Garros – where, ranked No. 59, he lost to Roger Federer – and at the 2016 US Open (l. Djokovic).
- Monfils is bidding to record his 124th Grand Slam match-win and extend his **all-time record for most Grand Slam match-wins by a Frenchman**. He claimed sole ownership of the record, ahead of Jo-Wilfried Tsonga (121 Grand Slam match-wins), by defeating Thiago Seyboth Wild in the 1st round at Roland Garros this year.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Monfils reached the 2nd round at both the Australian Open (d. Yannick Hanfmann, l. Tomas Martin Etcheverry) and Roland Garros (d. Seyboth Wild, l. Lorenzo Musetti).
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Monfils reached the semifinals at Mallorca, defeating Dominic Thiem, Roberto Carballes Baena and Roberto Bautista Agut before falling to Alejandro Tabilo. It was his first grass court appearance, at any level, since 2021 Wimbledon.
- Monfils' **other highlights in 2024** are reaching the semifinals at Doha (l. Jakub Mensik) and the round of 16 at Indian Wells-1000 (l. Casper Ruud).
- Monfils has **reached one Tour-level final on grass** – finishing runner-up at 2017 Eastbourne (l. Novak Djokovic).
- Monfils has won one of the 6 **five-set matches** he has contested at Wimbledon. After losing the first 5 five-set matches he contested here, he defeated O'Connell in 5 sets in the 1st round in 2021. He has a 19-19 win-loss record in 5-set matches overall.
- Wimbledon is Monfils' **weakest Grand Slam event** in terms of matches won. He has an 18-12 win-loss record here, compared to 39-16 at Roland Garros, 34-18 at the Australian Open and 32-15 at the US Open.
- Monfils reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 6 in November 2016. He dropped out of the Top 100 for the first time since May 2013 in January 2023, before returning to the Top 100 in October last year, and then returned to the Top 50 in March this year. He plays here at No. 33.
- Monfils narrowly **missed out on achieving the Junior Grand Slam** in 2004 after winning the Australian Open, Roland Garros and Wimbledon. His preparation for the Junior US Open that year was hampered by a knee injury and he lost in the 3rd round to Viktor Troicki. He was named 2004 ITF Junior World Champion. Monfils is one of 5 former Wimbledon junior singles champions to start in the men's main draw this year.
- Monfils is coached by Mikael Tillstrom.
