On court today...

- Carlos Alcaraz takes to the grass first on Centre Court as he goes up against Frances Tiafoe, whom he defeated in an epic 5-set match in the semifinals at the 2022 US Open en route to his first Grand Slam title. The 2 men are meeting for the first time since then and for the first time on grass. Their head-to-head is split 1-1, with Tiafoe winning their only other meeting in 1st round on the clay at Barcelona in 2021, when Alcaraz was a 17-year-old wild card ranked at No. 119 in the world. Victory for Alcaraz would see him become the 7th Spanish man in the Open Era to reach the last 16 here on 3 or more occasions, while Tiafoe is one of 5 American men who have reached the 3rd round here – alongside Taylor Fritz, Brandon Nakashima, Tommy Paul and Ben Shelton – with all members of that quintet except Shelton (who is through to the 3rd round here for the first time) bidding for a 2nd appearance in the round of 16 at Wimbledon.
- World No. 1 Jannik Sinner closes the action on Centre Court as he faces Miomir Kecmanovic, whom he has defeated in all 3 of their previous meetings. This is the first time the pair are facing each other on grass and at a Grand Slam. After defeating compatriot Matteo Berrettini in the previous round on Wednesday, Sinner is bidding to join him in becoming the 3rd Italian man ever to reach the round of 16 at Wimbledon on 3 or more occasions, alongside the legendary Nicola Pietrangeli. Fellow Italian Fabio Fognini, who plays Roberto Bautista Agut today, is also bidding to reach the round of 16 today – and if both he and Sinner win their respective matches, it will be the 4th time in history that multiple Italian men have reached the last 16 at Wimbledon.
- On No. 1 Court Grigor Dimitrov and Gael Monfils face off in a battle of the former junior Wimbledon champions. Monfils won the boys' singles here in 2004, defeating Miles Kasiri in the final, and Dimitrov won boys' singles here in 2008, defeating Henri Kontinen in the final. The duo have contested 5 previous matches, but this will be their first encounter in more than 8 years. Both are now among the Tour's veteran players and Monfils could become just the 4th man in the Open Era to reach the last 16 at Wimbledon aged 37 or older if he wins today – a feat that Fognini is also aiming to accomplish.
- Ben Shelton has fought his way through 2 five-set clashes to reach the 3rd round at Wimbledon for the first time – his prize for doing so is a match-up with Denis Shapovalov on No. 3 Court this afternoon. The pair are 2 of the 5 lefthanders remaining in the men's singles here from the 17 who began the main draw – and both won their only previous meeting against a lefthanded player at Wimbledon. This will be the 28th men's singles match between an American and a Canadian at Wimbledon in the Open Era and the 79th men's singles match between an American and a Canadian at the Grand Slams in the Open Era – with American players leading the rivalry both here (17-10) and at the Grand Slams overall (49-29).

A 4th Tour-level meeting between Sinner and Kecmanovic, but their first at a Grand Slam or on grass.

Sinner has lost Grand Slam matches to players ranked as low as No. 52 Kecmanovic twice before – to No. 67 Marton Fucsovics in the 2nd round at the 2020 Australian Open and to No. 79 Daniel Altmaier in the 2nd round at 2023 Roland Garros. The lowest-ranked player to have defeated Sinner at Wimbledon is No. 48 Fucsovics in the 1st round in 2021.

- **SINNER** is bidding to reach the round of 16 here for the 3rd straight year. This is his 4th Wimbledon appearance and his 19th Grand Slam overall.
- Sinner is bidding to reach the round of 16 here for the 3rd time and become **3rd Italian man in history to reach the round of 16 at Wimbledon on 3 or more occasions** – after Nicola Pietrangeli (1955-56, 1958, 1960, 1965) and Matteo Berrettini (2019, 2021, 2023).
- Sinner is bidding to **reach the round of 16 at a Grand Slam for the 13th time**. He is in 2nd place on the all-time list for most Grand Slam round of 16 appearances by an Italian man.

- If Sinner and Fabio Fognini both win today and reach the round of 16, it will be the **4th time in history that multiple Italian men have reached the last 16 at Wimbledon** – after 1949 (Rolando del Bello and Giovanni Cucelli), 1955 (Giuseppe Merlo and Pietrangeli) and 2021 (Berrettini and Lorenzo Sonego). (NB if Lorenzo Musetti also reaches the round of 16 here this year it will be the first time in history that 3 Italian men have reached the last 16 at Wimbledon.)
- Sinner advanced to the 3rd round after defeating Yannick Hanfmann 63 64 36 63 and Berrettini 76(3) 76(4) 26 76(4) in the opening 2 rounds.
- Last year here, Sinner recorded his **best Wimbledon result** by reaching the semifinals (I. Novak Djokovic). It was his first appearance in a Grand Slam semifinal, having previously reached the quarterfinals at all 4 Grand Slam tournaments, including at Wimbledon in 2022 (I. Djokovic).

- Sinner won his **first Grand Slam title** at the 2024 Australian Open, recovering from 0-2 down to defeat Daniil Medvedev in 5 sets in the final. He became the 3rd Italian man to win a Grand Slam title – after Nicola Pietrangeli (1959, 1960 Roland Garros) and Adriano Panatta (1976 Roland Garros) – and the first Italian player to win an Australian Open singles title.
- Sinner is bidding to become the **2nd Italian player to win multiple Grand Slam singles titles**, after Pietrangeli. He is also bidding to become the first Italian player to win a Wimbledon singles title and the 2nd Italian player to reach a singles final here, after 2021 men's singles runner-up Matteo Berrettini.
- Sinner is bidding to become the **6th active player to win multiple Grand Slam men's singles titles** – after Alcaraz, Djokovic, Andy Murray, Rafael Nadal and Stan Wawrinka. He would also become the 32nd player in the Open Era to win multiple Grand Slam men's singles titles.
- If Sinner wins his 2nd Grand Slam title on his 2nd Grand Slam appearance since winning his first, he will equal the **Open Era record for fewest attempts before winning a 2nd Grand Slam men's singles title**. In the Open Era, 7 players have won their 2nd Grand Slam singles titles on their 2nd appearances after winning their first – Alcaraz, Sergi Bruguera, Roger Federer, Jan Kodes, Murray, Stan Smith and Guillermo Vilas. No player has won their 2nd Grand Slam men's singles title on their first Grand Slam appearance after winning their first.
- **Elsewhere in Grand Slam play this year**, Sinner reached the semifinals at Roland Garros for the first time, falling to Carlos Alcaraz in 5 sets.
- Sinner is bidding to record his **53rd Grand Slam match-win**. By defeating Grigor Dimitrov in the quarterfinals at Roland Garros last month for his 50th Grand Slam match-win, he became the 5th Italian man to record 50 match-wins at the Grand Slams – after Pietrangeli (94 Grand Slam match-wins), Fabio Fognini (who is bidding to record his 72nd Grand Slam match-win today), Andreas Seppi (63) and Panatta (62).
- Prior to Wimbledon this year, Sinner won his **first grass court title** at Halle (d. Hubert Hurkacz). He became the 4th Italian man in history to win a Tour-level title on grass – after Berrettini (4 grass court titles), and Andreas Seppi and Lorenzo Sonogo (both one).
- Sinner has won 4 Tour-level titles this season and leads the Tour for **most singles titles won in 2024**. In addition to his titles at the Australian Open and Halle, he also won the titles at Rotterdam (d. Alex de Minaur) and Miami-1000 (d. Grigor Dimitrov). He also reached the semifinals at Indian Wells-1000 (l. Alcaraz) and Monte Carlo-1000 (l. Stefanos Tsitsipas) and the quarterfinals at Madrid-1000, where he gave a walkover to Felix Auger-Aliassime due to a right hip injury.
- Sinner is bidding to record his 41st Tour-level match-win this season and claim sole ownership of **first place on the list for most Tour-level matches won in 2024** – ahead of Casper Ruud (who has a 40-10 win-loss record in 2024).
- Sinner has won one of the last 5 **five-set matches** he has contested, with his only victory in a 5-set match in that time coming against Medvedev in the final at the Australian Open this year. He lost the only 5-set match he has contested at Wimbledon – in the quarterfinals in 2022, when he lost to Djokovic in 5 sets despite holding a 2-0 lead. He has a 6-8 win-loss record in 5-set matches overall.
- Sinner became the **first Italian player to reach the singles world No. 1 ranking** last month and plays here at the same ranking. By winning the title at Halle, he became the 8th man to win the title in his first event as world No. 1 since the ATP rankings were introduced in 1973. He is guaranteed to remain at No. 1 the week on Monday 15 July regardless of the outcome of this tournament.
- Sinner reached a **career-high junior ranking of No. 133** and did not contest the boys' singles events at any of the Grand Slam tournaments. His best result as a junior was reaching the quarterfinals as a wild card at the Grade A Trofeo Bonfiglio event in Milan in 2018 (l. Naoki Tajima).
- Sinner **led Italy to their 2nd Davis Cup title in 2023**, winning all 5 matches he played across singles and doubles at the Final 8 Knockout Stage in Malaga. He made his Davis Cup debut in 2021 and has an 11-4 overall win-loss record in the competition. As defending champions, Italy qualified automatically for the 2024 Davis Cup Finals Group Stage in September and will compete in Group A in Bologna alongside Netherlands, Belgium and Brazil.
- Sinner is coached by Simone Vagnozzi and Darren Cahill.

- **KECMANOVIC** is bidding to reach the round of 16 here and equal his best Grand Slam result. This is his 5th Wimbledon appearance and his 22nd Grand Slam appearance overall.
- Kecmanovic is bidding to become the **5th Serbian man in the Open Era to reach the round of 16 at Wimbledon** – after Novak Djokovic (who is bidding to reach the round of 16 here for the 16th time this year), Slobodan Zivojinovic (4 Wimbledon round of 16 appearances) and Janko Tipsarevic and Viktor Troicki (both 2).
- Kecmanovic is also bidding to reach the round of 16 at a Grand Slam for the 3rd time and become the **5th Serbian man in the Open Era to reach the round of 16 at the Grand Slams on 3 or more occasions** – after Djokovic (who is bidding to reach the round of 16 at a Grand Slam for the 65th time this year), Tipsarevic (7 Grand Slam round of 16 appearances) and Troicki and Zivojinovic (both 5).
- Kecmanovic advanced to the 3rd round after defeating Sumit Nagal 62 36 63 64 and No. 27 seed Tallon Griekspoor 46 76(9) 16 62 63 in the opening 2 rounds. His 5-set victory against Griekspoor in the 2nd round here was his **first victory in a 5-set match at Wimbledon**. He had lost the only previous 5-set match he had contested here – to Roberto Bautista Agut in the 2nd round in 2021. He has a 5-5 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- By reaching the 3rd round here, Kecmanovic has equalled his **best Wimbledon result**. He also reached the 3rd round here in 2022, defeating John Millman and Alejandro Tabilo before falling to Djokovic.
- Kecmanovic's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the round of 16 at a Grand Slam on 2 occasions – at the Australian Open in 2022 (l. Gael Monfils) and this year (l. Carlos Alcaraz).
- **Last year here**, Kecmanovic fell to Diego Schwartzman in the 1st round.
- **Elsewhere in Grand Slam play this year**, Kecmanovic reached the 2nd round at Roland Garros, where he defeated Thiago Monteiro before retiring due to injury during his match against Daniil Medvedev.
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Kecmanovic reached the quarterfinals at Eastbourne, where he defeated Zhang Zhizhen and Sebastian Baez before falling to Max Purcell, but fell in the 1st round at 's-Hertogenbosch (l. Griekspoor) and the 1st round at Halle (l. Lorenzo Sonego).
- Kecmanovic's **other highlights in 2024** are reaching the quarterfinals at Acapulco (l. Jack Draper) and the 3rd round at Rome-1000 (l. Monteiro).
- Kecmanovic is bidding to **defeat a world No. 1 for the first time on his 4th attempt**. He has lost all 3 of his previous matches against No. 1-ranked players – to Djokovic in the quarterfinals at Belgrade in both 2021 and 2022 and to Medvedev in the semifinals at 2022 Los Cabos. The highest-ranked players he has defeated are No. 6 Alexander Zverev in the 2nd round at 2019 Cincinnati-1000, No. 6 Matteo Berrettini in the round of 16 at 2022 Indian Wells-1000 and No. 6 Holger Rune in the 2nd round at 2023 Stockholm.
- Kecmanovic reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 27 in January last year. He plays here at No. 52.
- Kecmanovic is a **former junior world No. 1**. He became the first player to win back-to-back titles at the Orange Bowl since Billy Martin in 1973-74, winning the title in both 2015 (d. Stefanos Tsitsipas) and 2016 (d. Wu Yibing). He also reached the final at the 2016 US Open (l. Felix Auger-Aliassime) and was named ITF Junior World Champion that year. His best performance in the boys' singles at Wimbledon was reaching the 3rd round in 2016 (l. Geoffrey Blancaneaux).
- Kecmanovic made his **Davis Cup** debut for Serbia at the 2021 Davis Cup Finals and was a member of the team which reached the semifinals in 2023 (l. Italy). He has a 7-6 overall win-loss record in the competition. Serbia will host Greece in a World Group I tie in September.
- Kecmanovic is coached by Ivan Cinkus.

A 3rd meeting for Alcaraz and Tiafoe and their 2nd at a Grand Slam – but their first on grass. Alcaraz won their only previous Grand Slam meeting in 5 sets in the semifinals at the 2022 US Open before defeating Casper Ruud in the final to win his first Grand Slam title.

- Defending champion **ALCARAZ** is bidding to reach the round of 16 here for the 3rd straight year. This is his 4th Wimbledon appearance and his 14th Grand Slam overall.
- Alcaraz is bidding to become the **7th Spanish man in the Open Era to reach the round of 16 at Wimbledon on 3 or more occasions** – after Rafael Nadal (10 Wimbledon round of 16 appearances), Feliciano Lopez (6), David Ferrer and Fernando Verdasco (both 5) and Juan Carlos Ferrero and Roberto Bautista Agut (both 4). (NB Bautista Agut is also competing in the 3rd round here today)
- Alcaraz is bidding to reach the round of 16 at a Grand Slam for the 10th time and become the **11th Spanish man in the Open Era to reach the last 16 at the Grand Slams on 10 or more occasions** – after Nadal (54 Grand Slam round of 16 appearances), Ferrer (27), Tommy Robredo (23), Verdasco (18), Juan Carlos Ferrero (15), Bautista Agut, Carlos Moya and Manuel Orantes (all 13), Lopez (12) and Emilio Sanchez (11). (NB Bautista Agut is also competing in the 3rd round here today)
- Alcaraz advanced to the 3rd round after defeating qualifier Mark Lajal 76(3) 75 62 and Aleksandar Vukic 76(5) 62 62 in the opening 2 rounds.
- Last year here, Alcaraz won his **first Wimbledon title**, defeating Novak Djokovic in 5 sets in the final. He became the 3rd Spanish man to win the title here – after Manuel Santana (1966) and Rafael Nadal (2008, 2010) – and, aged 20 years 72 days, became the 3rd-youngest player in the Open Era to win the men’s singles title here, after Boris Becker (who won his first 2 Wimbledon titles aged 17 years 227 days in 1985 and aged 18 years 226 days in 1986) and Bjorn Borg (who won his first Wimbledon title aged 20 years 27 days in 1976).
- Alcaraz has **won 3 Grand Slam titles on 3 different surfaces**. He won his first Grand Slam title at the 2022 US Open (d. Casper Ruud) and won his most-recent Grand Slam title at 2024 Roland Garros (d. Alexander Zverev). He became the first man in the Open Era to win his first 3 Grand Slam titles on different surfaces and, aged 21 years 36 days, became the youngest man in the Open Era to win 3 Grand Slam titles on different surfaces.
- Alcaraz is bidding to become the **9th man in the Open Era to retain the Wimbledon title** – after Rod Laver, John Newcombe, Borg, John McEnroe, Becker, Pete Sampras, Roger Federer and Djokovic.
- Aged 21 years 70 days, Alcaraz is bidding to become the **3rd player in the Open Era to win multiple Wimbledon men’s singles titles aged 21 or under** – after Becker and Borg. (NB ages calculated at the end of the tournament)
- Alcaraz is also bidding to win his **4th Grand Slam title and equal the Open Era record for most Grand Slam men’s singles titles won aged 21 or under** – alongside Becker, Borg and Mats Wilander.

- **Elsewhere in Grand Slam play this year**, Alcaraz reached the quarterfinals at the Australian Open (l. Zverev).
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Alcaraz reached the 2nd round as defending champion at Queen's (d. Francisco Cerundolo, l. Jack Draper). The defeat to Draper ended Alcaraz's 13-match winning streak on grass, with his last defeat on grass having come in the round of 16 at 2022 Wimbledon, when he fell to Jannik Sinner.
- Alcaraz's **other highlights in 2024** are winning the title at Indian Wells-1000 (d. Medvedev) and reaching the semifinals at Buenos Aires (l. Nicolas Jarry) and the quarterfinals at Miami-1000 (l. Grigor Dimitrov) and Madrid-1000 (l. Andrey Rublev). He is one of 10 players to have won multiple Tour-level titles prior to Wimbledon this season.
- Alcaraz has won 11 of the 12 **five-set matches** he has contested, with his only defeat in a 5-set match coming against Matteo Berrettini in the 3rd round at the 2022 Australian Open. He became the first man in the Open Era to win the Roland Garros title after winning 5-set matches in both the semifinals and the final, defeating Sinner in the semifinals before defeating Zverev in the final. He has won all 3 five-set matches he has contested at Wimbledon.
- Aged 19 years 130 days, Alcaraz became the **youngest world No. 1 in history** after winning the title at the 2022 US Open. He has been ranked as world No. 1 for 36 weeks, most recently between June and September 2023. He plays here at No. 3.
- Alcaraz **led Spain to victory at the 2018 Junior Davis Cup Finals in Budapest**, defeating France in the title match. He reached a career-high junior ranking of No. 22 in January 2020 and his best performance in the junior events at the Grand Slams was his quarterfinal finish in the boys' singles here in 2019.
- Alcaraz has played **Davis Cup** for Spain since 2022 and has won 2 of the 3 matches he has contested in the competition. Spain were awarded a wild card for the 2024 Davis Cup Finals Group Stage and will compete in Group B in Valencia alongside Australia, Czechia and France.
- Alcaraz is coached by former world No. 1 Juan Carlos Ferrero, who reached the quarterfinals here in 2007 and 2009.
- **TIAFOE** is bidding to reach the round of 16 here for the 2nd time and equal his best Wimbledon result. This is his 7th Wimbledon appearance and his 33rd Grand Slam overall.
- Tiafoe is bidding to become the **38th American man in the Open Era to reach the round of 16 at Wimbledon on multiple occasions** – and the first active American man to do so. (NB fellow Americans Taylor Fritz, Brandon Nakashima and Tommy Paul are also bidding to reach the round of 16 here for the 2nd time this year)
- If Tiafoe, Fritz, Nakashima, Paul and Ben Shelton all reach the round of 16 here, it will be the **most American men to reach the round of 16 at Wimbledon since 1995** – when Andre Agassi, Michael Joyce, Aaron Krickstein, Todd Martin and Pete Sampras all reached the last 16 here. If 4 American men reach the round of 16 here, it will be the most American men to reach the round of 16 at Wimbledon since 2000 – alongside 2022, when Tiafoe, Fritz, Nakashima and Paul all reached the last 16 here.
- Tiafoe advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Matteo Arnaldi 67(5) 26 61 63 63 and Borna Coric 76(5) 61 63 in the opening 2 rounds. His 5-set victory against Arnaldi in the 1st round was his **first successful comeback from 0-2 down** and his first victory in a 5-set match at Wimbledon. He has a 1-3 win-loss record in 5-set matches here and a 6-12 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- **Last year here**, Tiafoe reached the 3rd round. He defeated Wu Yibing and Dominic Stricker before falling to Grigor Dimitrov.
- Tiafoe's **best Wimbledon result** is reaching the round of 16 in 2022. He defeated Andrea Vavassori, Maximilian Marterer and Alexander Bublik before falling to David Goffin.
- Tiafoe's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the semifinals at the 2022 US Open (l. Alcaraz). He became the first American man to reach the semifinals at the US Open since Andy Roddick in 2009.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Tiafoe reached the 2nd round at both the Australian Open (d. Coric, l. Tomas Machac) and Roland Garros (d. Mattia Bellucci, l. Denis Shapovalov).

- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Tiafoe reached the quarterfinals at Stuttgart, where he received a bye through the 1st round and defeated Yannick Hanfmann in the 2nd round before falling to Jack Draper. He also competed at Queen's, where he retired due to a right hip injury during his 1st round match against Rinky Hijikata.
- Tiafoe's **best result in 2024** is finishing runner-up at Houston (l. Ben Shelton). He also reached the semifinals at Delray Beach (l. Tommy Paul) and the quarterfinals at Hong Kong (l. Shang Juncheng), Dallas (l. Marcos Giron) and Stuttgart.
- Tiafoe is bidding to **defeat a Top 5 player at a Grand Slam for the 3rd time**. He has a 2-6 win-loss record against Top 5 players at the Grand Slams, with his 2 victories coming against No. 4 Stefanos Tsitsipas in the 1st round at 2021 Wimbledon and against No. 3 Rafael Nadal in the round of 16 at the 2022 US Open. He has a 3-16 win-loss record against Top 5 players at Tour-level overall, with his only other victory against a Top 5 player coming against No. 3 Tsitsipas in the 2nd round at 2021 Vienna.
- Tiafoe reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 10 in June 2023. He plays here at No. 29.
- Tiafoe is one of **4 seeded American men** to reach the 3rd round here from the 5 who began the main draw. USA has more seeded players in the draw than any other nation.
- Tiafoe had a **successful junior career**. Aged just 15, he won the 2013 Orange Bowl (d. Stefan Kozlov), becoming the youngest boys' singles winner in the event's history. He also reached the boys' singles semifinals at the 2014 US Open (l. Quentin Halys) and achieved a career-high junior ranking of No. 2. He reached the 3rd round on his only appearance in the boys' singles here in 2014 (l. Noah Rubin).
- Tiafoe made his **Davis Cup** debut in September 2018 and has a 1-5 win-loss record in the competition. USA defeated Ukraine in the Qualifiers in February to reach the 2024 Davis Cup Finals and will compete in Group C in Zhuhai alongside Germany, Slovakia and Chile in September.
- Tiafoe is coached by Jordi Arconada.

- **MEDVEDEV** is bidding to reach the round of 16 here for the 3rd time. This is his 6th Wimbledon appearance and his 29th Grand Slam appearance overall.
- Medvedev advanced to the 3rd round after defeating Aleksandar Kovacevic 63 64 62 and Alexandre Muller 67(3) 76(4) 64 75 in the opening 2 rounds.
- Last year here, Medvedev recorded his **best Wimbledon result** by reaching the semifinals (l. Carlos Alcaraz).
- Medvedev won his **first Grand Slam title** at the 2021 US Open, defeating Novak Djokovic in straight sets and ending both Djokovic's bid for the Grand Slam and his 27-match Grand Slam winning streak.
- Medvedev reached his **6th Grand Slam final** at the Australian Open this year, falling to Jannik Sinner in 5 sets despite holding a 2-0 lead. He has a 1-5 win-loss record in Grand Slam finals, having also finished runner-up at the US Open in 2019 (l. Rafael Nadal) and 2023 (l. Djokovic) and at the Australian Open in 2021 (l. Djokovic) and 2022 (l. Nadal).
- If Medvedev wins his 2nd major title here on his 10th Grand Slam appearance since winning his first, he will go **4th on the Open Era list for most attempts before winning a 2nd Grand Slam men's singles title** – behind Marat Safin (14 attempts before winning a 2nd Grand Slam title) and Djokovic and Gustavo Kuerten (both 12).
- **Elsewhere in Grand Slam play this year**, Medvedev reached the round of 16 at Roland Garros (l. Alex de Minaur).
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Medvedev reached the 2nd round at Halle (d. Nuno Borges, l. Zhang Zhizhen).
- Medvedev's **best results in 2024** are runner-up finishes at the Australian Open and Indian Wells-1000 (l. Alcaraz). He also reached the semifinals at Dubai (l. Ugo Humbert) and Miami-1000 (l. Sinner) and the quarterfinals at Madrid-1000, where he retired against Jiri Lehecka due to a right hip injury.

- Medvedev has **won one Tour-level grass court title** – at 2021 Mallorca (d. Sam Querrey). Of his 19 other Tour-level titles, 18 have come on hard courts, with his only clay court title to date coming at Rome-1000 this year. His 20 titles have been won at 20 different events, which is a Tour-level record.
- Medvedev has won 4 of the last 5 **five-set matches** he has contested, with his only defeat in a 5-set match in that time coming in his most-recent 5-set match, against Sinner in the final at the Australian Open. Having won 3 five-set matches en route to the final at the Australian Open this year, he became the 12th man in the Open Era to contest 4 five-set matches at a single Grand Slam tournament. He has a 2-4 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Wimbledon and a 7-10 win-loss record in 5-set matches overall.
- Medvedev **became world No. 1** on 28 February 2022, becoming the first player other than the 'Big 4' (Djokovic, Roger Federer, Andy Murray and Rafael Nadal) to hold the top ranking since Andy Roddick in February 2004. He held the No. 1 ranking for 16 weeks during 2022 but is yet to return to the No. 1 ranking. He plays here at No. 5.
- Medvedev reached a career-high junior ranking of No. 13 in January 2014. His best performance in the boys' singles here was reaching the 2nd round in 2013 (d. Hong Seong Chan, I. Nikola Milojevic).
- Medvedev is coached by Gilles Cervara.
- **STRUFF** is bidding to reach the round of 16 here for the first time and equal his best Grand Slam result. This is his 10th Wimbledon appearance and 39th Grand Slam overall.
- Struff is bidding to become the **19th German player in the Open Era to reach the men's singles round of 16 at Wimbledon** – and the 2nd active German player to do so, after Alexander Zverev, who is bidding to reach the round of 16 here for the 3rd time this year.

- **Prior to Wimbledon this season**, Struff reached the quarterfinals at both Stuttgart, defeating Flavio Cobolli and Arthur Rinderknech before giving a walkover to Brandon Nakashima due to illness, and at Halle, defeating Luciano Darderi and Stefanos Tsitsipas before falling to Jannik Sinner.
- Struff's best result in 2024 is winning his **first Tour-level title** at Munich (d. Taylor Fritz), winning the title without dropping a set. By winning the title aged 33 years 362 days, he became the 3rd-oldest first-time Tour-level Tour titlist 1990. He also reached the quarterfinals at Stuttgart and Halle and the round of 16 at Madrid-1000 (l. Carlos Alcaraz).
- Struff is bidding to defeat a **Top 5 player at a Grand Slam for the first time on his 7th attempt**. He has lost all 6 of his previous meetings with Top 5 players at the Grand Slams, including both matches against Top 5 players at Wimbledon, falling to No. 2 Federer in the 2nd round in 2018 and to No. 2 Medvedev in the 1st round in 2021. The highest-ranked player he has defeated at a Grand Slam is No. 7 Andrey Rublev in the 1st round at 2021 Roland Garros
- Struff is bidding to end a **5-match losing streak against Top 5 players at Tour-level**. He has not defeated a Top 5 player since defeating No. 5 Tsitsipas in the quarterfinals at 2023 Madrid-1000. He has a 5-22 win-loss record against Top 5 players overall.
- Struff has won one of the last 5 **five-set matches** he has played, with his only victory in a 5-set match in that time coming against Hijikata in the 1st round at the Australian Open this. He has a 10-9 win-loss record in 5-set matches overall.
- Struff achieved a **career-high ranking of No. 21** in June last year. He plays here at No. 41.

- Struff made his **Davis Cup** debut for Germany in 2015 and has an 18-9 win-loss record in the competition overall. Germany defeated Hungary in the Qualifiers in February to advance to the 2024 Davis Cup Finals Group Stage. They will compete in Group C in Zhuhai alongside USA, Slovakia and Chile in September.
- Struff is coached by Carsten Arriens.

Dimitrov and Monfils are 2 of the 3 former Wimbledon boys' singles champions through to the 3rd round from the 5 who started in the men's main draw here – alongside 2016 champion Denis Shapovalov.

Dimitrov won the boys' singles titles here in 2008, defeating Henri Kontinen in the final, and at the US Open later that year, defeating Devin Britton in the final, and finished the year at No. 3 in the ITF Junior Rankings.

Monfils narrowly missed out on achieving the Junior Grand Slam in 2004 after winning the Australian Open, Roland Garros and Wimbledon. His preparation for the Junior US Open that year was hampered by a knee injury and he lost in the 3rd round to Viktor Troicki. He was also named 2004 ITF Junior World Champion.

- **DIMITROV** is bidding to reach the round of 16 here for the 4th time. This is his 14th Wimbledon appearance and his 55th Grand Slam appearance overall.
- Dimitrov is bidding to record his 22nd Wimbledon singles match-win and claim sole ownership of the **all-time record for most Wimbledon match-wins by a Bulgarian player**, ahead of Magdalena Maleeva.
- Dimitrov advanced to the 3rd round after defeating Dusan Lajovic 63 64 75 and Shang Juncheng 57 67(4) 64 62 64 in the opening 2 rounds. His 5-set victory against Shang was his **2nd successful comeback from 0-2 down**, having also recovered from 0-2 down to defeat Alex Molcan in the 1st round at the US Open last year.
- **Last year here**, Dimitrov reached the round of 16 (l. Holger Rune) – his best result at Wimbledon since reaching the round of 16 in 2017 (l. Roger Federer).
- Dimitrov's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the semifinals on 3 occasions – including once at Wimbledon, in 2014 (l. Novak Djokovic). He also reached the semifinals at the 2017 Australian Open (l. Rafael Nadal) and the 2019 US Open (l. Daniil Medvedev).
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Dimitrov reached the quarterfinals at Roland Garros (l. Jannik Sinner) but fell in the 3rd round at the Australian Open (l. Nuno Borges). - Dimitrov is coached by Daniel Vallverdu and Jamie Delgado.
- **MONFILS** is bidding to reach the round of 16 here for the 2nd time and equal his best Wimbledon result. This is his 13th Wimbledon appearance and his 63rd Grand Slam overall.
- Aged 37 years 221 days, Monfils is bidding to become the **4th man in the Open Era to reach the round of 16 at Wimbledon aged 37 or older** – after Pancho Gonzales (who reached the round of 16 here as a 41-year-old in 1969) and Roger Federer and Ken Rosewall, who both made 2 appearances in the last 16 here after turning 37. Fellow 37-year-olds Novak Djokovic and Fabio Fognini are also bidding to reach the round of 16 here this year. (NB ages calculated at end of the tournament)
- Monfils is also bidding to become the **oldest Frenchman in the Open Era to reach the round of 16 at Wimbledon**. Nicolas Mahut, who reached the round of 16 here in 2016 aged 34 years 171 days, is the oldest French player to reach the men's singles round of 16 here.
- Monfils advanced to the 3rd round here after defeating No. 22 seed Adrian Mannarino 64 36 75 64 on Monday and Stan Wawrinka 76(5) 64 76(3) in the 2nd round in a match that started on Wednesday and was completed on Thursday.
- Monfils is one of 6 Frenchmen to reach the 3rd round here this year, the **2nd-most Frenchmen to reach the 3rd round at Wimbledon in the Open Era** – after 2010, when 7 Frenchmen reached the 3rd round here.
- By reaching the 3rd round here, Monfils has become **one of 14 men in the Open Era to reach the 3rd round at Wimbledon aged 37 or older**.
- By reaching the 3rd round here, Monfils has become the **oldest Frenchman in the Open Era to reach the 3rd round here** – breaking the record held by Richard Gasquet, who reached the 3rd round here in 2022 aged 36 years 22 days.
- Monfils' **best Wimbledon result** is reaching the round of 16 in 2018, when he defeated Gasquet, Paolo Lorenzi and Sam Querrey before falling to Kevin Anderson.
- Monfils is making **his first appearance here since 2021**, when he reached the 2nd round (d. Christopher O'Connell, I. Pedro Martinez). He withdrew from the 2022 event with a foot injury and from the 2023 event with a wrist injury.
- Monfils' **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the semifinals on 2 occasions. He reached the last 4 at 2008 Roland Garros (I. Federer) and at the 2016 US Open (I. Djokovic).
- Monfils is bidding to record his 125th Grand Slam match-win and extend his **all-time record for most Grand Slam match-wins by a Frenchman**. He claimed sole ownership of the record, ahead of Jo-Wilfried Tsonga (121 Grand Slam match-wins), by defeating Thiago Seyboth Wild in the 1st round at Roland Garros this year.

- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Monfils reached the 2nd round at both the Australian Open (d. Yannick Hanfmann, I. Tomas Martin Etcheverry) and Roland Garros (d. Seyboth Wild, I. Lorenzo Musetti).
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Monfils reached the semifinals at Mallorca, defeating Dominic Thiem, Roberto Carballes Baena and Roberto Bautista Agut before falling to Alejandro Tabilo. It was his first grass court appearance, at any level, since 2021 Wimbledon.
- Monfils' **other highlights in 2024** are reaching the semifinals at Doha (I. Jakub Mensik) and the round of 16 at Indian Wells-1000 (I. Casper Ruud).
- Monfils has **reached one Tour-level final on grass** – finishing runner-up at 2017 Eastbourne (I. Novak Djokovic).
- Monfils has won one of the 6 **five-set matches** he has contested at Wimbledon. After losing the first 5 five-set matches he contested here, he defeated O'Connell in 5 sets in the 1st round in 2021. He has a 19-19 win-loss record in 5-set matches overall.
- Wimbledon is Monfils' **weakest Grand Slam event** in terms of matches won. He has a 19-12 win-loss record here, compared to 39-16 at Roland Garros, 34-18 at the Australian Open and 32-15 at the US Open.
- Monfils reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 6 in November 2016. He dropped out of the Top 100 for the first time since May 2013 in January 2023, before returning to the Top 100 in October last year, and then returned to the Top 50 in March this year. He plays here at No. 33.

- Bublik advanced to the 3rd round after defeating Jakub Mensik 46 67(2) 64 64 62 and Arthur Cazaux 64 76(1) 64 in the opening 2 rounds.
- Last year here, Bublik recorded his **best Grand Slam result** by reaching the round of 16. He defeated Mackenzie McDonald, JJ Wolf and Maximilian Marterer before falling to Andrey Rublev. He became the 2nd Kazakhstani player to reach the men's singles round of 16 at a Grand Slam – after Kukushkin, who reached the round of 16 at both the 2012 Australian Open and 2019 Wimbledon.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Bublik reached the 2nd round at Roland Garros (d. Gregoire Barrere, l. Jan-Lennard Struff) but fell in the 1st round at the Australian Open (l. Sumit Nagal).
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Bublik reached the quarterfinals at Stuttgart, where he received a bye through the 1st round and defeated Hamad Medjedovic in the 2nd before retiring against Lorenzo Musetti due to a left leg injury. He reached the 2nd round at Halle (d. Max Purcell, l. Christopher Eubanks) and fell in the 2nd round at Eastbourne (l. Aleksandar Vukic) after receiving a bye through the 1st round.
- Bublik's best result in 2024 is winning his **4th Tour-level title** at Montpellier (d. Borna Coric). He also reached finished runner-up at Dubai (l. Ugo Humbert), reached the semifinals at Adelaide (l. Jack Draper) and Lyon (l. Giovanni Mpetshi Perricard) and the quarterfinals at Doha (l. Alexei Popyrin).
- Bublik is bidding to **defeat a Top 20 player at Wimbledon for the first time on his 3rd attempt**. He has lost both of his previous matches against Top 20 players here, falling to No. 1 Andy Murray in the 1st round in 2017 and to No. 7 Rublev in the round of 16 last year. The highest-ranked player he has defeated at Wimbledon is No. 21 Grigor Dimitrov in the 2nd round in 2021.

- Bublik is bidding to **defeat a Top 20 player at a Grand Slam for the 3rd time**. He has a 2-7 win-loss record against Top 20 players at the Grand Slams, having recorded victories against No. 16 Lucas Pouille in the 1st round at the 2017 Australian Open and against No. 9 Monfils in the 1st round at 2020 Roland Garros – but has lost his 5 most-recent matches against Top 20 players at The Grand Slams.
- Bublik is bidding to **defeat a Top 20 player for the 20th time**. He has a 19-40 win-loss record against Top 20 players at Tour-level and has won 2 of the 5 matches he has contested against Top 20 players so far this season, defeating No. 5 Rublev in the semifinals at Dubai and No. 15 Ben Shelton in the 3rd round at Madrid-1000.
- Bublik's 5-set victory against Mensik in the 1st round was his **2nd successful comeback from 0-2 down** – he also recovered from 0-2 down to defeat Thomas Fabbiano in the 2nd round at the 2019 US Open.
- Bublik's 5-set victory against Mensik in the 1st round was his **first victory in a 5-set match in the main draw at Wimbledon**. He lost his only previous main draw 5-set match here, against Rublev in the round of 16 last year. He also lost a 5-set match to Daniel Brands in the final round of Wimbledon qualifying in 2017. He has a 3-4 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Bublik **broke the Top 20 for the first time** reached a career-high ranking of No. 17 in May this year. He plays here at No. 23.
- Bublik made his **Davis Cup** debut for Kazakhstan in 2019 and has a 14-9 overall win-loss record in the competition. Kazakhstan will host Denmark in a World Group I tie in September.
- Bublik is coached by Artem Suprunov.

NO. 14 BEN SHELTON (USA) v DENIS SHAPOVALOV (CAN)

Head-to-head: first meeting

This is the 28th men's singles match between an American and a Canadian at Wimbledon in the Open Era – American players lead Canadian players 17-10 here. It is the 79th men's singles match between an American and a Canadian at the Grand Slams in the Open Era. American players lead Canadian players 49-29 at the Grand Slams.

Shelton has never lost a Grand Slam match to a player ranked as low as No. 121 Shapovalov. The lowest-ranked player to defeat Shelton at the Grand Slams is No. 104 Nuno Borges in the 1st round at the 2022 US Open.

Shelton and Shapovalov are 2 of the 5 lefthanders to reach the 3rd round here from the 17 who began the men's main draw this year. The last lefthander to win the title here was Rafael Nadal in 2010.

Shelton is facing a lefthander here this year for the 2nd time, having defeated Mattia Bellucci in the 1st round. He lost his first 5 Tour-level matches against lefthanders – but has since won 2 most-recent matches against lefthanders, against Hugo Gaston in the 1st round at Roland Garros this year and against Bellucci in the 1st round here this year.

Shapovalov won his only previous match against a lefthander at Wimbledon, defeating Liam Broady in the 3rd round here last year. He has a 3-2 win-loss record against lefthanders at the Grand Slams and a 22-21 win-loss record against lefthanders at Tour-level.

- Lefthander **SHELTON** is bidding to reach the round of 16 here for the first time. This is his 2nd Wimbledon appearance and his 8th Grand Slam overall.
- Shelton is bidding to become **88th American player in the Open Era to reach the men's singles round of 16 at Wimbledon** – and the 9th active American player to do so, after Christopher Eubanks, Taylor Fritz, Sebastian Korda, Denis Kudla, Mackenzie McDonald, Brandon Nakashima, Tommy Paul and Frances Tiafoe. He would also become the first lefthanded American man to reach the round of 16 at Wimbledon since John McEnroe in 1992.
- If Shelton, Fritz, Nakashima, Paul and Tiafoe all reach the round of 16 here, it will be the **most American men to reach the round of 16 at Wimbledon since 1995** – when Andre Agassi, Michael Joyce, Aaron Krickstein, Todd Martin and Pete Sampras all reached the last 16 here. If 4 American men reach the round of 16 here, it will be the most American men to reach the round of 16 at Wimbledon since 2000 – alongside 2022, when Tiafoe, Fritz, Nakashima and Paul all reached the last 16 here.
- Shelton advanced to the 3rd round after defeating qualifier Mattia Bellucci 46 63 36 63 64 and qualifier Lloyd Harris 46 76(5) 67(5) 63 76(7) in the opening 2 rounds.
- By reaching the 3rd round here, Shelton has **recorded his best Wimbledon result**. Last year here, on his Wimbledon debut, he reached the 2nd round (d. Taro Daniel, I. Laslo Djere).
- By reaching the 3rd round here, Shelton has become the **44th man in the Open Era to reach the 3rd round at all 4 Grand Slam tournaments aged 21 or under** – and the 7th American man to do so in the Open Era, after Michael Chang, Jimmy Connors, Jim Courier, Krickstein, Andry Roddick and Sampras.

- Shelton's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the semifinals at the 2023 US Open (l. Novak Djokovic). Aged 20 years 336 days, he became the youngest American man to reach the semifinals at the US Open since Michael Chang (20 years 204 days) in 1992.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Shelton reached the 3rd round at both the Australian Open (l. Adrian Mannarino) and Roland Garros (l. Felix Auger-Aliassime).
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Shelton reached the quarterfinals at Mallorca, where he received a bye through the 1st round and defeated Rinky Hijikata before falling to Paul Jubb. He lost his opening match at both Stuttgart (l. James Duckworth) and Queen's (l. Giovanni Mpetshi Perricard).
- Shelton's best result in 2024 is winning his **2nd Tour-level title** at Houston (d. Frances Tiafoe). He also reached the semifinals at Auckland (l. Taro Daniel) and Dallas (l. Tommy Paul) and the quarterfinals at Acapulco (l. Casper Ruud).
- Shelton is bidding to record his **6th match-win on grass, at any level**. In addition to his 2 victories here this year, his 2nd round finish here last year, and his victory against Hijikata at Mallorca last week, his only other match-win on grass came in a 2nd round finish at 2023 Queen's (d. JJ Wolf, l. Lorenzo Musetti).
- Shelton reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 14 in April this year after winning his 2nd Tour-level title at Houston. He plays here at the same ranking.
- Shelton has won all three **5-set matches** he has contested at Wimbledon, against Daniel in the 1st round last year and against Bellucci and Harris in the opening 2 rounds this year. He has a 5-2 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Shelton is one of **4 seeded American men** to reach the 3rd round here from the 5 who began the main draw. USA has more seeded players in the draw than any other nation.
- Shelton **played college tennis**. He represented the University of Florida for 2 seasons, compiling a 65-10 win-loss record in singles and winning the 2021 NCAA team title and the 2022 NCAA singles title.
- Shelton **contested just 4 tournaments as a junior player**, all of which came in his home country. His best result was reaching the 3rd round as a wild card at 2020 JA Plantation (USA) (also known as the Orange Bowl), falling to Jack Pinnington Jones.
- Shelton's father, Bryan Shelton, reached a career-high ranking of No. 55 in March 1992. He made 6 appearances at Wimbledon, reaching the round of 16 in 1994.
- Shelton is coached by his father, Bryan Shelton, and Dean Goldfine.
- Lefthander **SHAPOVALOV** is bidding to reach the round of 16 here for the 3rd time. This is his 7th Wimbledon appearance and his 26th Grand Slam overall.
- Shapovalov is bidding to become **the 3rd Canadian player to reach the round of 16 at Wimbledon on 3 or more occasions** – after Milos Raonic (5 Wimbledon round of 16 appearances) and Robert Powell (4). He is one of 5 Canadian players to have reached the round of 16 here on multiple occasions, alongside Raonic and Powell and Carling Bassett-Seguso and Patricia Hy-Boulais, who both reached the women's singles round of 16 here on 2 occasions.
- Shapovalov is bidding to reach the round of 16 at a Grand Slam for the 6th time and equal Eugenie Bouchard in **5th place on the all-time list for most Grand Slam round of 16 appearances by a Canadian player**. Raonic (20 Grand Slam round of 16 appearances), Bassett-Seguso (9), Felix Auger-Aliassime (8) and Bouchard (6) are the only Canadian players to have reached the last 16 at the Grand Slams more often than Shapovalov.
- Shapovalov advanced to the 3rd round after defeating No. 19 seed Nicolas Jarry 61 75 64 and Daniel Altmaier 76(3) 63 16 67(3) 64 in the opening 2 rounds. By defeating Altmaier in 5 sets in the 2nd round here, he maintained his **perfect record in 5-set matches here**, having won all 4 five-set matches he has contested at Wimbledon. He has a 12-8 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- **Last year here**, Shapovalov reached the round of 16. He defeated Radu Albot, Gregoire Barrere and Liam Broady before falling to Roman Safiullin.

- Shapovalov's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the semifinals here in 2021. He defeated 2-time champion Andy Murray and recorded 5-set victories against both Philipp Kohlschreiber and Karen Khachanov before falling to Novak Djokovic in the last 4.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Shapovalov reached the 3rd round at Roland Garros (l. Hubert Hurkacz) but fell in the 1st round at the Australian Open (l. Jakub Mensik).
- **Prior to Wimbledon this season**, Shapovalov reached the 2nd round at Stuttgart (d. Matteo Martineau, l. Matteo Berrettini). He also competed at the Surbiton Challenger (GBR), falling in the 1st round (l. Aleksandar Vukic).
- Shapovalov's **best Tour-level results in 2024** are reaching the 3rd round at Miami-1000 (l. Matteo Arnaldi), Madrid-1000 (l. Alexander Zverev) and Roland Garros.
- By defeating Jarry in the 1st round, Shapovalov ended a **5-match losing streak against Top 20 players at the Grand Slams**. He had previously not defeated a Top 20 player at a Grand Slam since defeating No. 3 Zverev in the round of 16 at the 2022 Australian Open. He has a 6-12 win-loss record against Top 20 players at the Grand Slams and a 28-51 win-loss record against Top 20 players at Tour-level overall.
- Shapovalov has **won one Tour-level title** – on hard courts at 2019 Stockholm (d. Filip Krajinovic).
- Shapovalov reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 10 in September 2020. He plays here at No. 121 but entered using a protected ranking of No. 28.
- Shapovalov is **one of 3 former Wimbledon boys' singles champions** to reach the 3rd round from the 5 who began the men's main draw here this year. He won the boys' singles title here in 2016, defeating Alex de Minaur in the final. He reached a career-high junior ranking of No. 2 in July 2016 and was also a member of the Canadian team that defeated Germany to win the 2015 Junior Davis Cup title.
- Shapovalov was a member of the **Canadian team which won the Davis Cup title for the first time in 2022**. He won 2 of the 4 Davis Cup singles matches he contested in 2022, including a victory against Australia's Thanasi Kokkinakis in the final. He has a 14-9 overall win-loss record in the competition and was also a member of the Canadian team which reached the final for the first time in 2019 (l. Spain). Canada defeated Korea, Rep. in the Qualifiers in February to advance to the 2024 Davis Cup Finals and will compete in Group D in Manchester alongside Argentina, Finland and Great Britain in September.
- Shapovalov is coached by Matt Daly.

- Humbert is bidding to become the **12th Frenchman in the Open Era to reach the round of 16 at Wimbledon on multiple occasions** – after Richard Gasquet (7 round of 16 appearances here), Jo-Wilfried Tsonga (6), Guy Forget, Henri Leconte and Cedric Pioline (all 5), Sebastian Grosjean (4), Arnaud Clement, Adrian Mannarino and Gilles Simon (all 3) and Paul-Henri Mathieu and Benoit Paire (both 2). - Humbert advanced to the 3rd round after defeating Alexander Shevchenko 61 46 76(2) 67(3) 61 and Botic van de Zandschulp 76(9) 61 63 in the opening 2 rounds. His 5-set victory against Shevchenko in the 1st round was his **3rd victory in a 5-set match** – he has a 3-8 win-loss record in 5-set matches overall, with all 3 of his victories coming at Wimbledon. He has a 3-2 win-loss record in 5-set matches here.

If 4 American men reach the round of 16 here, it will be the most American men to reach the round of 16 at Wimbledon since 2000 – alongside 2022, when Tiafoe, Fritz, Nakashima and Paul all reached the last 16 here.
- Nakashima advanced to the 3rd round after defeating No. 18 seed Sebastian Baez 62 63 64 and Jordan Thompson 63 62 62 in the opening 2 rounds.
- Nakashima's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the round of 16 here in 2022. He defeated Nicola Pietrangeli, Denis Shapovalov and Daniel Elahi Galan before falling to Nick Kyrgios in 5 sets.
- **Last year here**, Nakashima fell to Thompson in 5 sets in the 1st round despite holding a 2-0 lead. He has lost both 5-set matches he has contested at Wimbledon and has a 1-5 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall, with his only victory in a 5-set match coming against Kamil Majchrzak in the 1st round at 2022 Roland Garros.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Nakashima reached the 2nd round at Roland Garros (d. Nicolas Moreno de Alboran, l. Hubert Hurkacz) but fell in the 1st round of qualifying at the Australian Open (l. Jakub Mensik).
- Nakashima has **won both of his previous matches against Top 20 players at Wimbledon** – against No. 16 Shapovalov in the 2nd round here in 2022 and against No. 18 Baez in the 1st round here this year. He has a 3-5 win-loss record against Top 20 players at the Grand Slams and a 6-14 win-loss record against Top 20 players at Tour-level overall.
- Nakashima reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 43 in October 2022. He dropped outside the Top 100 in September 2023, falling to No. 151 – his lowest-ranking since February 2021 – but re-entered the Top 100 in January this year and plays here at No. 65.

- Nakashima has a **successful junior career** and reached a career-high junior ranking of No. 3 in December 2018. - Bautista Agut is bidding to become the **5th Spanish man in the Open Era to reach the round of 16 at Wimbledon on 3 or more occasions** – after Rafael Nadal (10 Wimbledon round of 16 appearances), Feliciano Lopez (6) and David Ferrer and Fernando Verdasco (both 5).
- Bautista Agut is bidding to reach the round of 16 at a Grand Slam for the 14th time and claim sole ownership of **5th place on the Open Era list for most Grand Slam round of 16 appearances by a Spanish man**, ahead of Carlos Moya and Manuel Orantes. Nadal (54 Grand Slam round of 16 appearances), Ferrer (27), Tommy Robredo (23), Verdasco (18) and Juan Carlos Ferrero (15) are the only Spanish men in the Open Era to have reached the round of 16 at the Grand Slams more often than Bautista Agut.
- Aged 36 years 91 days, Bautista Agut is bidding to become the **9th man in the Open Era to reach the round of 16 here aged 36 or older**. Gael Monfils is also bidding to reach the round of 16 here for the first time since turning 36. (NB ages calculated at end of the tournament)
- Bautista Agut is also bidding to become the **oldest Spanish man in the Open Era to reach the round of 16 here** – ahead of Nadal, who reached the round of 16 here in 2022 aged 36 years 37 days.

- Bautista Agut advanced to the 3rd round after defeating Maximilian Marterer 63 61 64 and Lorenzo Sonego 63 36 63 64 in the opening 2 rounds.
- By reaching the 3rd round here, Bautista Agut is the **24th man in the Open Era to reach the 3rd round here aged 36 or older**. 37-year-olds Gael Monfils and Fognini have also reached the 3rd round here, as has 37-year-old Novak Djokovic, who has reached the 3rd round here for the 2nd time since turning 36. (NB ages calculated at end of the tournament)
- Bautista Agut's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the semifinals here in 2019, when he fell to N Djokovic in 4 sets.
- **Last year here**, Bautista Agut fell in the 1st round here last year (l. Roman Safiullin).
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Bautista Agut fell in the 1st round at both the Australian Open (l. Ben Shelton) and Roland Garros (l. Jaume Munar). His victories in the opening 2 rounds here ended a 4-match losing streak at the Grand Slams – he had previously not recorded a Grand Slam match-win since reaching the 2nd round at 2023 Roland Garros (d. Wu Yibing, l. Juan Pablo Varillas).
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Bautista Agut reached the quarterfinals at Mallorca, where he defeated Taro Daniel and Ugo Humbert before falling to Monfils. He also reached the 2nd round at 's-Hertogenbosch (d. Marc-Andrea Huesler, l. Milos Raonic) but lost in the 2nd round of qualifying at Halle (d. Pierre-Hugues Herbert, l. Max Purcell).
- Bautista Agut's **best Tour-level results in 2024** are reaching the quarterfinals at Hong Kong (l. Sebastian Ofner) and Mallorca and reaching the 3rd round as a wild card at Barcelona (l. Cameron Norrie). He also reached the quarterfinals at the Bordeaux Challenger (FRA) (l. Pedro Martinez).
- Bautista Agut has **won one Tour-level title on grass** – at 2014 's-Hertogenbosch (d. Benjamin Becker). He has won 8 other titles on hard courts and 2 on clay.
- Bautista Agut has won 2 of the 3 **five-set matches** he has contested at Wimbledon, defeating Benoit Paire in the 2nd round in 2015 and Miomir Kecmanovic in the 2nd round in 2021, but falling to Safiullin in the 1st round last year. He has a 13-12 record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Bautista Agut is a **former Top 10 player**. He reached a career-high ranking of No. 9 in November 2019. He plays here at No. 112.
- Bautista Agut has played **Davis Cup** since 2014 and has a 13-7 win-loss record in the competition. He was part of the Spain team that won the competition for the 6th time in 2019, winning 2 of the 3 singles matches he played at the Finals. Spain received a wild card to compete at the 2024 Davis Cup Finals Group Stage in September and will compete in Group B in Valencia alongside Australia, Czechia and France.
- Bautista Agut is coached by Daniel Gimeno-Traver and Jose Luis Vendrell Bru.
- **FOGNINI** is bidding to reach the round of 16 here for the first time. This is his 14th Wimbledon appearance and his 61st Grand Slam overall.
- If Fognini reaches the round of 16 here for the first time on his 14th appearance at Wimbledon, he will set the **Open Era record for most attempts before reaching the round of 16 in the men's singles at Wimbledon** – moving ahead of Tommy Robredo, who reached the round of 16 here for the first time on his 13th Wimbledon appearance in 2014.
- Aged 37 years 51 days, Fognini is bidding to become the **4th man in the Open Era to reach the round of 16 at Wimbledon aged 37 or older** – after Pancho Gonzales (who reached the round of 16 here as a 41-year-old in 1969) and Roger Federer and Ken Rosewall, who both made 2 appearances in the last 16 here after turning 37. Fellow 37-year-olds Novak Djokovic and Gael Monfils are also bidding to reach the round of 16 here this year. (NB ages calculated at end of the tournament)
- If Fognini and Jannik Sinner both win today and reach the round of 16, it will be the **4th time in history that multiple Italian men have reached the last 16 at Wimbledon** – after 1949 (Rolando del Bello and Giovanni Cucelli), 1955 (Giuseppe Merlo and Pietrangeli) and 2021 (Berrettini and Lorenzo Sonego). (NB if Lorenzo Musetti also reaches the round of 16 here this year it will be the first time in history that 3 Italian men have reached the last 16 at Wimbledon.)

- Fognini is also bidding to become the **oldest Italian man in the Open Era to reach the round of 16 here** – ahead of Gianluca Pozzi, reached the round of 16 here in 2000 aged 35 years 22 days.
- Fognini advanced to the 3rd round after defeating lucky loser Luca Van Assche 61 63 75 and No. 8 seed Casper Ruud 64 75 67(1) 63 in the opening 2 rounds.
- By reaching the 3rd round here, Fognini has equalled his **best Wimbledon result**. He has reached the 3rd round here on 6 other occasions – in 2010 (l. Julien Benneteau), 2014 (l. Kevin Anderson), 2017 (l. Andy Murray), 2018 (l. Jiri Vesely), 2019 (l. Tennys Sandgren) and 2021 (l. Andrey Rublev).
- By reaching the 3rd round here, Monfils has become **one of 14 men in the Open Era to reach the 3rd round at Wimbledon aged 37 or older**.
- Fognini **did not compete at Wimbledon last year**. On his last appearance here, in 2022, he fell to Tallon Griekspoor in the 1st round.
- Fognini's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the quarterfinals at Roland Garros in 2011, where he became the first Italian man to reach the quarterfinals at a Grand Slam since Davide Sanguinetti reached the last 8 at 1998 Wimbledon. He gave a walkover to Novak Djokovic in his quarterfinal match due to a thigh strain – the first time a player had given a walkover in the quarterfinals of the men's singles at a Grand Slam since Stefan Edberg pulled out of his quarterfinal match with Thomas Muster at the 1989 Australian Open.
- **In Grand Slam play this year** Fognini reached the 2nd round at Roland Garros (d. Botic van de Zandschulp, l. Tommy Paul). He did not compete at the Australian Open, beginning his season with a 2nd round finish at the Tenerife 1 Challenger (ESP) in January.
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Fognini reached the 2nd round as a wild card at Mallorca (d. Gijs Brouwer, l. Jakub Mensik).
- Fognini's **best Tour-level result in 2024** is reaching the quarterfinals as a qualifier at Marrakech, where he defeated Hugo Gaston and Laslo Djere before falling to Pavel Kotov. His only other Tour-level match-wins prior to Wimbledon this season came in 2nd round finishes as a wild card at Indian Wells-1000 (d. Bernabe Zapata Miralles, l. Sebastian Baez), as a wild card at Rome-1000 (d. Daniel Evans, l. Taylor Fritz) and at Roland Garros and Mallorca.
- Fognini has won 5 of the 7 **five-set matches** he has contested at Wimbledon. He has a 24-15 record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Fognini has **won 9 Tour-level singles titles** – most-recently at 2019 Monte Carlo-1000 (d. Dusan Lajovic). Eight of his 9 titles have come on clay.
- Fognini is a **former Top 10 player**. He reached a career-high ranking of No. 9 in July 2019, becoming the first Italian man to be ranked in the Top 10 since Corrado Barazzutti in January 1979. He plays here at No. 94.
- Fognini has played **Davis Cup** since 2008 and has a 35-20 win-loss record in the competition. He did not appear in the competition during Italy's title-winning season in 2023, with his most-recent appearances coming at the 2022 Finals. As defending champions, Italy qualified automatically for the 2024 Davis Cup Finals Group Stage in September and will compete in Group A in Bologna alongside Netherlands, Belgium and Brazil.
- Fognini is coached by Filippo Baldi.
