



2024 WIMBLEDON THE CHAMPIONSHIPS

Junior Tournament Preview

In 1947, the first junior singles events were held at Wimbledon, with Denmark’s Kurt Nielsen and Belgium’s Geniveve Domken winning the inaugural tournaments. The boys’ doubles and girls’ doubles events were introduced in 1982. This is the 77th edition of the boys’ singles and girls’ singles tournaments here, and the 41st editions of both the boys’ doubles and girls’ doubles tournaments. 2024 Wimbledon is the 137th staging of The Championships overall.

JAMRICOVA SEEKS SECOND SLAM

Slovakia’s Renata Jamrichova won the 2024 Australian Open girls’ singles title, defeating home talent Emerson Jones in the final. She became the second player from her nation to win a junior singles title in Melbourne, after Tereza Mihalikova won the girls’ singles in 2015. She is bidding to become the first Slovakian player to win multiple junior Grand Slam singles titles.

Jamrichova is bidding to become the second player in consecutive years to win 2 Grand Slam girls’ singles titles, after Alina Korneeva won the Australian Open and Roland Garros girls’ singles last year.

BIGUN BATTLES FOR PARIS-LONDON DOUBLE

Roland Garros boys’ singles champion Kaylan Bigun enters the boys’ singles here as the No. 1 seed, and he will be fighting to become the 10th player to win the boys’ singles at Roland Garros and Wimbledon in the same year. The last player to do it in the boys’ singles is Tseng Chun-hsin, who won Roland Garros and Wimbledon in 2018.

Roland Garros girls’ singles champion Tereza Valentova is not competing in the girls’ event here.

AT THE DOUBLE

The last player to win both junior singles and doubles titles at Wimbledon in the same year was Eugenie Bouchard, who won the girls’ singles title and girls’ doubles title (alongside Taylor Townsend) in 2012. The last player to win both boys’ singles and boys’ doubles titles at Wimbledon is Florin Mergea, who won the singles title and the doubles title (alongside Horia Tecau) in 2003.

HOME CHAMPIONS

Prior to last year, Wimbledon had seen the longest wait for a home player to win the boys' singles title of the 4 Grand Slams – since 1962 when Stanley Matthews won the title. Henry Searle ended the drought by winning the 2023 boys' singles title.

Wimbledon has seen the 2nd-longest wait for a home player to win the girls' singles title of the 4 Grand Slams – Laura Robson was the most-recent British girls' singles champion at Wimbledon, winning the title here in 2008.

In total, there have been 7 British boys' singles champions and 7 British girls' singles champions (including 2-time champion Lorna Cornell) at Wimbledon since the competitions were established in 1947.

2023 CHAMPIONS CONTINUE DEVELOPMENT

The 2023 Wimbledon junior champions, Great Britain's Searle and USA's Clervie Ngounoue, have both enjoyed success at professional level since winning the boys' and girls' titles here last year.

After winning Wimbledon, Searle played the US Open, ending his junior career after falling in the 2nd round there. He reached his first professional final on the ITF World Tennis Tour at M25 Nottingham (GBR) in May and has played on both the ATP Challenger Tour and the ITF World Tennis Tour this season. He broke the Top 600 of the ATP rankings for the first time last month and competed as a wild card in the men's singles here, falling to Marcos Giron in the 1st round.

Ngounoue has one professional title on the ITF World Tennis Tour since her victory in the girls' singles here in 2023, at W35 Naples, FL (USA) in January. She has also reached her first quarterfinals at W50 and W75 level this year, at W75+H Vero Beach, FL (USA) in January, and at W50 Pretoria (RSA) in February. She made her WTA Tour debut in San Diego in September last year after entering qualifying as a wild card and reaching the main draw, falling in the 1st round. She competed in qualifying at Indian Wells in March, and made her second Tour-level appearance at Charleston in April as a wild card. She competed as a wild card at Wimbledon qualifying, falling to Simona Waltert in the 1st round.

YOUNGEST AND OLDEST

The youngest players in the boys' singles and girls' singles tournaments here this year are Great Britain's Mark Ceban (15 years 124 days) and American twins Annika and Kristina Penickova (14 years 307 days), respectively.

The oldest players in the boys' singles and girls' singles tournaments here this year are France's Nathan Trouve (18 years 193 days) and Great Britain's Gabia Paskauskas (18 years 193 days), respectively.

In the boys' draw there is one fifteen-year-old, 8 sixteen-year-olds, 17 seventeen-year-olds and 28 eighteen-year-olds. (NB all ages calculated on the last day of the tournament)

In the girls' draw there are 2 fourteen-year-olds, 6 fifteen-year-olds, 23 sixteen-year-olds, 20 seventeen-year-olds and 13 eighteen-year-olds. (NB all ages calculated on the last day of the tournament)

WILD CARDS

British players received all of the 8 available wild cards in the boys' singles draw: Conor Brady, Maximilian Carrier, Mark Ceban, Jamie Diack, Luke Hooper, Henry Jefferson, Zach Stephens and Charlie Swaine.

In the girls' singles draw, all of the 8 available wild cards also went to British players: Brooke Black, Allegra Korpanec Davies, Flora Johnson, Isabelle Lacy, Hephzibah Oluwadare, Gabia Paskauskas, Daniela Piani and Hollie Smart.

GRAND SLAM PREPARATION

The Grand Slams are the pinnacle of the ITF World Tennis Tour Juniors, with J500 events representing the next-most prestigious level of tournament. There have been 4 events at J500-level in 2024 so far with 8 different players winning the titles.

GRASS COURT CHAMPIONS

The J300 tournament at Roehampton is the only junior grass court event to have taken place prior to Wimbledon this year. Serbia's Teodora Kostovic won the girls' event by defeating USA's Iva Jovic in the final on Friday. In the boys' singles, Spain's Rafael Jodar defeated Great Britain's Charlie Robertson in the title match.

PROFESSIONAL TITLE WINNERS

No. 1 seed and Australian Open girls' singles champion Renata Jamrichova has been forging ahead in her early professional career. The 16-year-old has won 2 singles titles on the women's ITF World Tennis Tour – at W15 Sharm El Sheikh in Egypt on hard courts in March, and on the clay at W15 Telde in Spain in April.

Four of the Top 10 seeds in the girls' singles have won at least one professional title in 2024: (in order of seeding) Jamrichova (2 titles), Laura Samson (3), Tyra Caterina Grant and Iva Jovic (one each). Jamrichova and Samson have won multiple professional titles this year.

Norway's Nicolai Budkov Kjaer won his first pro title at M15 Antalya in Turkey in March, following it up with another in May. The Australian Open boys' singles semifinalist is seeded No. 2 here.

2024 LEADERS

J300 Roehampton champion Kostovic leads the Tour for most girls' singles matches won at J300-level and above, ahead of Jeline Vandromme and Iva Jovic.

Norway's Nicolai Budkov Kjaer, the No. 2, and Australia's Hayden Jones, the No. 7 seed, jointly lead the Tour for most boys' singles matches won at J300-level and above, with 24 wins each. No. 1 seed and Roland Garros boys' singles champion Bigun is 5th with 20 wins.

FUTURE GREATNESS

2011 girls' singles champion Ashleigh Barty became the 4th player to win both the junior singles title and the women's singles titles at Wimbledon, with her victory here in 2021. There have also been 4 players who have won the boys' singles title and the men's singles title here – most recently 1998 boys' singles champion Roger Federer, who went on to win 8 men's singles titles here.
