### On court today...

- Alexander Zverev opens Centre Court play today against British No. 2 Cameron Norrie, a man fresh off ousting Jack Draper, who dethroned him as British men's No. 1 last month, in the 2nd round. Zverev has eased into the 3rd round here for the loss of just 15 games across 6 sets so far at The Championships. The German will be confident ahead of today's clash, having defeated Norrie in all 5 of their previous Tour-level meetings, including a 5-set victory when they met in the round of 16 at the Australian Open earlier this year. Zverev is looking to become the 4th German man in the Open Era to reach the round of 16 here on 3 or more occasions, while Norrie is bidding to become the 7th British man in the Open Era to reach the round of 16 here on multiple occasions.
  
- Seven-time Wimbledon champion Novak Djokovic is last up on Centre Court today – and, like Zverev, he also faces a man he last met at the 2024 Australian Open, Alexei Popyrin. Djokovic has defeated the Australian in both of their previous meetings, doing so in 4 sets in the 2nd round in Melbourne this year. The 24-time Grand Slam champion is bidding to reach the round of 16 here for a 16th time and equal Jimmy Connors in 2nd place on the Open Era list for most appearances in the men's singles round of 16 here, with only Roger Federer's tally of 18 round of 16 appearances here ahead of him. If he reaches the last 16, it would be his 65th appearance at that stage at the Grand Slams overall – with Federer's record of 69 now within sight. Meanwhile, Popyrin is bidding to reach the last 16 at a Grand Slam for the first time, and to join Alex de Minaur, Nick Kyrgios, Bernard Tomic, Rinky Hijikaya, Jason Kubler and Jordan Thompson as one of 7 active Australian players to reach the men's singles round of 16 at a major.
  
- On No. 2 Court today, Taylor Fritz faces Alejandro Tabilo in a battle of 2 men who won titles last week, with Fritz having won at Eastbourne and Tabilo triumphing in Mallorca. Something will have to give this afternoon – both Fritz and Tabilo are looking to extend a 6-match Tour-level winning streak, with neither man having lost since defeats at Queen's more than 2 weeks ago. This is the first Wimbledon men's singles meeting between the 2 players who won Tour-level titles the previous week since 2012 – when 's-Hertogenbosch champion David Ferrer defeated Eastbourne champion Andy Roddick in the 3rd round here. This is also the first meeting of a pair of Top 20 players in the men's singles at Wimbledon this year.

A 3rd Tour-level meeting for Djokovic and Popyrin, their 2nd at the Grand Slams but their first on grass. Djokovic won their only previous Grand Slam meeting in 4 sets in the 2nd round at the Australian Open this year.

- **DJOKOVIC** is bidding to reach the round of 16 here for the 16th time and equal Jimmy Connors in 3rd place on the Open Era list for most round of 16 appearances at Wimbledon. Roger Federer and Connors are the only men in the Open Era to have reached the round of 16 here more often than Djokovic.

- Djokovic is bidding to reach the round of 16 at a Grand Slam for the 65th time. He is in **2nd place on the Open Era list for most round of 16 appearances at the Grand Slams**, behind Federer.

- Djokovic is bidding to record his 373rd Grand Slam match-win. By defeating Francisco Cerundolo in the round of 16 at Roland Garros this year for his 370th Grand Slam match-win, he claimed sole ownership of the **all-time record for most Grand Slam singles matches won among men and women**, ahead of Federer.

- Djokovic is bidding to record his 95th Wimbledon match-win and equal Billie Jean King in **5th place on the all-time list for most Wimbledon singles matches won among men and women**.

- Aged 37 years 53 days, Djokovic is bidding to become the **4th man in the Open Era to reach the round of 16 at Wimbledon aged 37 or older** – after Pancho Gonzales (who reached the round of 16 here as a 41-year-old in 1969) and Roger Federer and Ken Rosewall, who both made 2 appearances in the last 16 here after turning 37. Fellow 37-year-old Fabio Fognini is also bidding to reach the round of 16 here this year. (NB ages calculated at end of the tournament)
- Djokovic advanced to the 3rd round here after defeating qualifier Vit Kopriva 61 62 62 and wild card Jacob Fearnley 63 64 57 75 in the opening 2 rounds.
- Last year here, Djokovic reached his **9th Wimbledon final**, falling to Carlos Alcaraz in 5 sets. On his 8 other appearances in Wimbledon finals, he won the title in 2011 (d. Rafael Nadal), 2014 (d. Federer), 2015 (d. Federer), 2018 (d. Kevin Anderson), 2019 (d. Federer), 2021 (d. Matteo Berrettini) and 2022 (d. Nick Kyrgios) and finished runner-up in 2013 (l. Andy Murray).
- Djokovic is bidding to win his **8th Wimbledon title** and equal Federer's all-time record for the most Wimbledon men's singles titles won. He is also bidding to equal Federer and Helen Wills Moody in 2nd place on the list for most Wimbledon singles titles won among men and women, behind 9-time Wimbledon champion Martina Navratilova.
- Djokovic won his **22nd, 23rd and 24th Grand Slam titles in 2024** – he equalled Nadal's all-time record for most Grand Slam men's singles titles at the Australian Open (d. Stefanos Tsitsipas), claimed sole ownership of the record at Roland Garros (d. Casper Ruud) and equalled Margaret Court's all-time record for most Grand Slam singles titles among men and women at the US Open (d. Daniil Medvedev).
- Djokovic is bidding to win his **25th Grand Slam title** and claim sole ownership of the all-time record for most Grand Slam singles titles won among men and women.
- At 37 years 53 days, Djokovic is bidding to become the **oldest man in the Open Era to win the Wimbledon title** and the first player in the Open Era to win multiple Wimbledon titles after turning 35. In 2022, aged 35 years 49 days, Djokovic became the 2nd player in the Open Era to win the Wimbledon aged 35 or older – after Federer, who won the title here in 2017 aged 35 years 342 days. (NB ages calculated at the end of the tournament)
- Djokovic is bidding to win his **5th Grand Slam title since turning 35** and extend his Open Era record for most Grand Slam singles titles won aged 35 or older. He is also bidding to win his 13th Grand Slam title since turning 30 and extend his record for most Grand Slam singles titles won after the age of 30 in the Open Era.
- Djokovic has **won 36 of his last 37 matches at Wimbledon and 36 of his last 37 Tour-level matches on grass**. His defeat to Alcaraz in the final last year ended a 34-match winning streak at Wimbledon – he had previously not lost here since retiring due to a right elbow injury in his quarterfinal match against Tomas Berdych in 2017. The defeat to Alcaraz also ended a 34-match Tour-level winning streak on grass – he had previously not lost a grass court match since falling to Marin Cilic in the final at 2018 Queen's.
- Djokovic is making his **19th consecutive Wimbledon appearance and contesting his 75th Grand Slam overall**. He is in joint-4th place on the Open Era list for most Wimbledon men's singles appearances alongside Fernando Verdasco – behind Federer (22 Wimbledon appearances) and Jimmy Connors and Feliciano Lopez (both 20). He is in 3rd place on the Open Era list for most Grand Slam men's singles appearances – behind Federer and Lopez (both 81).
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Djokovic reached the semifinals at the Australian Open (l. Jannik Sinner) and the quarterfinals at Roland Garros, where he gave a walkover to Casper Ruud due to a right knee injury.

- Djokovic's **other highlights in 2024** are reaching the semifinals at Monte Carlo-1000 (l. Ruud) and Geneva (l. Tomas Machac). He contested just 7 events prior to Wimbledon this season.
- Djokovic **did not contest a grass court tournament prior to Wimbledon this year**. He is one of just 7 men in the Open Era to have won the title here without playing a warm-up event on grass, achieving the feat in 2011, 2014, 2015, 2019, 2021 and 2022. He is one of 16 players who began the men's singles here who had not competed on grass this season prior to Wimbledon.
- Djokovic is bidding to win his **99th Tour-level title**. He is in 3rd place on the Open Era list for most Tour-level titles won – behind Jimmy Connors (109 Tour-level titles) and Federer (103). Of Djokovic's 98 Tour-level singles titles, 8 have come on grass – in addition to his 7 Wimbledon titles, he also won the title on grass at 2017 Eastbourne (d. Gael Monfils). He has won 71 titles on hard courts and 19 titles on clay.
- Djokovic has a 10-2 win-loss record in **5-set matches** at Wimbledon, with his only defeats in 5-set matches here coming against Mario Ancic in the round of 16 in 2006 and against Alcaraz in the final last year. He holds the record for most 5-set matches won at the Grand Slams (38-9) and has a 40-11 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Djokovic **holds the record for most weeks ranked No. 1**, having held the top ranking for a total of 428 weeks. His most-recent spell as world No. 1 ended last month, when he dropped to No. 3 following his withdrawal from Roland Garros. He rose to No. 2 last week and plays here at the same ranking.
- Djokovic has played **Davis Cup** for Serbia since 2004, has a 44-16 win-loss record in the competition and led Serbia to their only title in the competition to date in 2010. Serbia will host Greece in a World Group I tie in September.
- Djokovic is currently without a permanent coach.
- **POPYRIN** is bidding to reach the round of 16 at a Grand Slam for the first time. This is his 5th Wimbledon appearance and his 22nd Grand Slam overall.
- Popyrin is bidding to become the **39th Australian man in the Open Era to reach the round of 16 at Wimbledon** – and the 5th active Australian man to do so, after Alex de Minaur, Jason Kubler, Nick Kyrgios and Bernard Tomic.
- If Popyrin and De Minaur both reach the round of 16 here, it will be the **29th time in the Open Era that multiple Australian men have reached the round of 16 at Wimbledon** – but just the 4th time in the last 20 years, after 2004 (when Lleyton Hewitt and Mark Philippoussis reached the last 16 here), 2016 (Kyrgios and Bernard Tomic) and 2022 (De Minaur, Kubler and Kyrgios).
- Popyrin is bidding to become the **70th Australian man in the Open Era to reach the round of 16 at a Grand Slam** – and the 7th active Australian man to do so, after De Minaur (who is bidding to reach the round of 16 at the Grand Slams for the 9th time here), Kyrgios (8 Grand Slam round of 16 appearances), Tomic (6), and Rinky Hijikata, Kubler and Jordan Thompson (all one).
- Popyrin advanced to the 3rd round after defeating Thiago Monteiro 64 67(8) 63 64 and No. 30 seed Tomas Martin Etcheverry 36 64 46 64 63 in the opening 2 rounds. His victory against Etcheverry was his **first victory in a 5-set match at Wimbledon**, having previously lost 5-set matches here to Hugo Gaston in the 1st round 2022 and to Dominic Stricker in the 1st round last year. He has a 4-7 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- By reaching the 3rd round here, Popyrin has recorded his **best Wimbledon result**. His previous best result here was reaching the 2nd round as a qualifier on his Wimbledon debut in 2019 (d. Pablo Carreno Busta, l. Daniil Medvedev). He lost in the 1st round on his 3 most-recent appearances here – in 2021 (l. Kei Nishikori), 2022 (l. Gaston) and 2023 (l. Stricker).
- By reaching the 3rd round here, Popyrin has equalled his **best Grand Slam result**. He also reached the 3rd round at the Australian Open as a wild card in 2019 (l. Lucas Pouille) and as a direct acceptance in both 2020 (l. Medvedev) and 2023 (l. Ben Shelton), and as a direct acceptance at the US Open in both 2019 (l. Matteo Berrettini) and 2021 (l. Daniel Evans).
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Popyrin reached the 2nd round at the Australian Open (d. Marc Polmans, l. Djokovic) but lost in the 1st round at Roland Garros (l. Thanasi Kokkinakis).
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Popyrin reached the 2nd round at 's-Hertogenbosch (d. Rinky Hijikata, l. Tommy Paul) but fell in the 1st round as a qualifier at Queen's (l. Andy Murray).

- Popyrin's **best results in 2024** are reaching the semifinals at Doha (l. Karen Khachanov) and the 3rd round at Miami-1000 (l. Fabian Marozsan) and Monte Carlo-1000 (l. Alex de Minaur).
- Popyrin reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 38 in February this year. He plays here at No. 47.
- Popyrin was a **successful junior**. He won the boys' singles title at 2017 Roland Garros (d. Nicola Pietrangeli) and reached a career-high junior ranking of No. 2 following his title there. He lost in the 1st round on his only appearance in the boys' singles here in 2016 (l. Wu Tung-lin).
- Popyrin made his **Davis Cup** debut in 2019 and has a 2-2 win-loss record in the competition. He won one of the 2 matches he played as Australia finished as runners-up for the 2nd straight year in 2023, defeating Finland's Otto Virtanen in the semifinal but falling to Italy's Matteo Arnaldi in the final. As runners-up last year, Australia qualified automatically for the 2024 Davis Cup Finals Group Stage in September. They will compete in Group B alongside Czechia, France and Spain in Valencia.
- Popyrin is coached by Neville Godwin and Xavier Malisse, who reached the semifinals here in 2002.

A 6th Tour-level meeting between Zverev and Norrie, their 2nd at a Grand Slam and their first on grass. Zverev has won all 5 of the pair's previous Tour-level meetings, including a 5-set victory in the round of 16 at the Australian Open this year. Norrie won both of their meetings below Tour-level in 2013-14.

Zverev has won one of the 2 matches he has contested against lefthanded players at Wimbledon. He fell to Jiri Vesely in the 1st round in 2019 but defeated Gijs Brouwer in the 1st round last year. He has a 10-5 win-loss against lefthanded players at the Grand Slams.

Zverev is bidding to extend a 20-match winning streak against lefthanded players. He has not lost to a lefthanded player at Tour-level since falling to Marc-Andrea Huesler during Germany's 2023 Davis Cup Qualifiers defeat to Switzerland. He has a 62-17 win-loss record against lefthanders at Tour-level overall.

- **ZVEREV** is bidding to reach the round of 16 here for the 3rd time and equal his best Wimbledon result. This is his 8th Wimbledon appearance and his 34th Grand Slam overall.

Zverev is bidding to become the **4th German man in the Open Era to reach the round of 16 at Wimbledon on 3 or more occasions** – after Boris Becker (12 Wimbledon round of 16 appearances), Michael Stich (5), and Tommy Haas and Alexander Popp (both 3).

- Zverev is bidding to reach the round of 16 at a Grand Slam for the 19th time. He is in **2nd place on the Open Era list for most Grand Slam round of 16 appearances by a German man** – behind Becker, who reached the round of 16 at the Grand Slams on 31 occasions.
- Zverev advanced to the 3rd round after defeating Roberto Carballes Baena 62 64 62 and Marcos Giron 62 61 64 in the opening 2 rounds.
- **Last year here**, as No. 19 seed, Zverev reached the 3rd round. He defeated Gijs Brouwer and Yosuke Watanuki before falling to Matteo Berrettini.
- Zverev's **best Wimbledon result** is reaching the round of 16 on 2 occasions – in 2017 (l. Milos Raonic) and in 2021 (l. Felix Auger-Aliassime).
- Zverev reached his **2nd Grand Slam final** at 2024 Roland Garros, falling to Carlos Alcaraz in 5 sets. He became the 2nd German man in the Open Era to reach the final at Roland Garros, after 1996 runner-up Stich. He also finished runner-up at the 2020 US Open, falling to Dominic Thiem in 5 sets despite holding a 2-0 lead.

- **Elsewhere in Grand Slam play this year**, Zverev reached the semifinals at the Australian Open, where he fell to Daniil Medvedev in 5 sets despite holding a 2-0 lead.
- Zverev is bidding to become the **3rd German man to win the Wimbledon title in the Open Era**, after Becker (1985-86, 1989) and Stich (1991).
- If Zverev wins his first title on his 34th appearance at the Grand Slams, he will go **joint-3rd on the Open Era list for most attempts before winning a first Grand Slam men's singles title** – alongside Petr Korda, who won his first Grand Slam title at the 1998 Australian Open on his 34th Grand Slam appearance. Goran Ivanisevic (who won his first Grand Slam title at 2001 Wimbledon on his 48th Grand Slam appearance) and Stan Wawrinka (who won his first Grand Slam title at the 2014 Australian Open on his 36th Grand Slam appearance) are the top 2 players on the list.
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Zverev reached the semifinals at Halle. He defeated Oscar Otte, Lorenzo Sonego and Arthur Fils before falling to Hubert Hurkacz.
- Zverev's **best result in 2024** is winning the title at Rome-1000 (d. Nicolas Jarry). His other highlights this season are reaching the semifinals at Los Cabos (l. Jordan Thompson) and Miami-1000 (l. Grigor Dimitrov) and the quarterfinals at Indian Wells-1000 (l. Alcaraz) and Munich (l. Cristian Garin).
- Zverev is bidding to record his 39th Tour-level match-win in 2024. He is **in 3rd place on the list for most Tour-level matches won this season** – behind Jannik Sinner (41-3) and Casper Ruud (40-11).
- Zverev's **best performance on grass** is finishing runner-up at Halle in 2016 (l. Florian Mayer) and 2017 (l. Roger Federer).
- Zverev has won 3 of the 6 **five-set matches** he has contested at Wimbledon. He has a 23-12 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Zverev rose to a **career-high ranking** of No. 2 after reaching the semifinals at 2022 Roland Garros. He re-entered the Top 5 for the first time since October 2022 in March this year and plays here at No. 4.
- Zverev **won Olympic singles gold for Germany** at the Tokyo 2020 Olympic Tennis Event in 2021, defeating Russian Olympic Committee's Karen Khachanov in the final. It was Germany's 3rd Olympic gold medal in tennis – after Steffi Graf in women's singles at Seoul 1988 and Boris Becker/Stich in men's doubles at Barcelona 1992.
- Zverev was a **successful junior**. He won the boys' singles title at the 2014 Australian Open, defeating Stefan Kozlov in the final. He also finished runner-up at 2013 Junior Roland Garros (l. Christian Garin) and was named 2013 ITF Junior World Champion. He reached the 3rd round on his only appearance in the boys' singles here in 2013 (l. Kozlov).
- Zverev has played **Davis Cup** for Germany since 2016 and has a 9-6 overall win-loss record in the competition. Germany defeated Hungary in the Qualifiers in February to reach the 2024 Davis Cup Finals and will compete in Group C in Zhuhai alongside USA, Slovakia and Chile.
- Zverev is coached by his father, Alexander Zverev Sr.
- **NORRIE** is bidding to reach the round of 16 here for the 2nd time. This is his 7th Wimbledon appearance and his 27th Grand Slam overall.
- Norrie is bidding to become the **7th British man in the Open Era to reach the round of 16 at Wimbledon on multiple occasions** – after Andy Murray (11 Wimbledon round of 16 appearances), Tim Henman (9), Greg Rusedski (5), Mark Cox (3), and Jeremy Bates and Roger Taylor (both 2).
- Norrie is bidding to reach the round of 16 at a Grand Slam for the 4th time and become the **7th British man in the Open Era to reach the round of 16 at the Grand Slams on 4 or more occasions** – after Murray (38 Grand Slam round of 16 appearances), Henman (16), Rusedski (9), Taylor (7), John Lloyd (5) and Cox (4).
- Norrie advanced to the 3rd round after defeating Facundo Diaz Acosta 75 75 63 and No. 28 seed Jack Draper 76(3) 64 76(6) in the opening 2 rounds.
- **Last year here**, Norrie reached the 2nd round (d. Tomas Machac, l. Christopher Eubanks).

- Norrie's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the semifinals here in 2022 (l. Novak Djokovic). He became the 4th British man in the Open Era to reach the semifinals at Wimbledon – after Murray (7 Wimbledon semifinal appearances), Henman (4) and Taylor (2). He also became the 7th British man in the Open Era to reach the semifinals at a Grand Slam – and the 3rd active British man to reach a Grand Slam semifinal, after Murray and Kyle Edmund.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Norrie reached the round of 16 at the Australian Open (l. Zverev) but fell in the 1st round at Roland Garros (l. Pavel Kotov).
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Norrie fell in the 1st round at both Queen's (l. Milos Raonic) and Eastbourne (l. Emil Ruusuvuori). He also competed at the Nottingham Challenger (GBR) where he reached the 2nd round (d. Sho Shimabukuro, l. Jack Pinnington Jones).
- Norrie's **best results in 2024** are reaching the semifinals at Rio de Janeiro (l. Mariano Navone), and the quarterfinals at Auckland, where he gave a walkover to Alejandro Tabilo due to a wrist injury, and at Barcelona (l. Tomas Martin Etcheverry).
- Norrie is bidding to **defeat a Top 5 player at a Grand Slam for the first time**. He has lost all of the 3 previous matches he has contested against Top 5 players at the Grand Slams – falling to No. 2 Rafael Nadal in the 3rd round at the 2021 Australian Open, to No. 2 Nadal in the 3rd round at 2021 Roland Garros and to No. 3 Djokovic in the semifinals here in 2022. The highest-ranked player he has defeated at the Grand Slams is No. 11 Casper Ruud in the 3rd round at the Australian Open this year. He has a 6-15 win-loss record against Top 5 players at Tour-level overall.
- Norrie has won both **5-set matches** he has contested at Wimbledon – recording 5-set victories against Jaume Munar in the 2nd round and David Goffin in the quarterfinals here in 2022. He has a 6-7 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Norrie broke the Top 10 for the first time in April 2022, becoming the **4th British man to break the Top 10** after Rusedski, Henman and Murray. He reached a career-high ranking of No. 8 in September 2022. He dropped to No. 44 last week – his lowest-ranking since June 2021, when he was ranked No. 45 – but plays here 2 places higher at No. 42.
- Norrie **played college tennis**. He represented Texas Christian University and finished his college career in 2017 as the NCAA's top-ranked male player. He compiled a 77-20 win-loss record in singles in college tennis from 2014 to 2017.
- Norrie was a **good junior**, reaching a career-high ranking of No. 10 in March 2013. He fell in the 1st round on his only appearance in the boys' singles event here in 2013 (l. Laslo Djere).
- Norrie has played **Davis Cup** for Great Britain since 2018 and has a 7-8 win-loss record in the competition. Great Britain received a wild card for the 2024 Davis Cup Finals Group Stage and will compete in Group D in Manchester alongside Canada, Finland and Argentina in September.
- Norrie is coached by Facundo Lugones.



# NO. 9 ALEX DE MINAUR (AUS) v (Q) LUCAS POUILLE (FRA)

## Head-to-head: first meeting

De Minaur has never lost to a Grand Slam match to a player ranked as low as No. 212 Pouille. The lowest-ranked player to defeat De Minaur at the Grand Slams is No. 110 Marco Cecchinato in the 1st round at 2020 Roland Garros. The lowest ranked player to have defeated De Minaur at Wimbledon is No. 71 Steve Johnson in the 2nd round in 2019.

De Minaur has lost a Tour-level match to a player ranked as low as 212 Pouille at Tour-level on 5 occasions – most recently to No. 512 Rafael Nadal in the 2nd round at Madrid-1000 this year.

De Minaur won the only match he has played against a qualifier at Wimbledon, against Kimmer Coppejans in the 1st round last year. He has a 5-1 win-loss record against qualifiers at the Grand Slams and a 26-13 win-loss record against qualifiers at Tour-level overall.

- **DE MINAUR** is bidding to reach the round of 16 here for the 2nd time and equal his best Wimbledon result. This is his 6th Wimbledon appearance and his 28th Grand Slam overall.
- De Minaur is bidding to become the **3rd active Australian man to reach the round of 16 at Wimbledon on multiple occasions** – after Nick Kyrgios (4 Wimbledon round of 16 appearances) and Bernard Tomic (3). He would become the 21st Australian man in the Open Era to reach the round of 16 at Wimbledon on multiple occasions.
- De Minaur is bidding to reach the round of 16 at a Grand Slam for the 9th time claim sole ownership of first place on the list for **most Grand Slam round of 16 appearances among active Australian men**, ahead of Kyrgios. Five active Australian men have reached the round of 16 at a Grand Slam at least once – De Minaur and Kyrgios (8 Grand Slam round of 16 appearances each prior to Wimbledon this year), Tomic (6) and Rinky Hijikata and Jason Kubler (one each). (NB fellow Australian Alexei Popyrin is bidding to reach the round of 16 at a Grand Slam for the first time here today)
- De Minaur advanced to the 3rd round after defeating lucky loser James Duckworth 76(1) 76(3) 76(4) and Jaume Munar 62 62 75 in the opening 2 rounds.
- **Last year here**, De Minaur reached the 2nd round (d. Kimmer Coppejans, I. Matteo Berrettini).
- De Minaur's **best Wimbledon result** is reaching the round of 16 in 2022, when he defeated Hugo Dellien, Jack Draper and Liam Broady before falling to Cristian Garin in 5 sets, despite leading 2-0 and having 2 match points.
- De Minaur's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the quarterfinals on 2 occasions – at the 2020 US Open (I. Dominic Thiem) and at Roland Garros this year (I. Alexander Zverev).
- **Elsewhere in Grand Slam play this year**, De Minaur reached the round of 16 at the Australian Open, falling to Andrey Rublev in 5 sets.

- Prior to Wimbledon this year, De Minaur won his **9th Tour-level title** – and 2nd on grass – at 's-Hertogenbosch (d. Sebastian Korda). He also competed at Queen's but fell to Lorenzo Musetti in the 1st round. His other grass court title came at 2021 Eastbourne (d. Lorenzo Sonego). He is one of 6 players competing here this year to have won multiple Tour-level titles on grass.
- De Minaur's **other highlights in 2024** are winning the title at Acapulco (d. Casper Ruud), finishing runner-up at Rotterdam (l. Jannik Sinner) and reaching the quarterfinals at Monte Carlo-1000 (l. Djokovic). He is one of 10 players to have won multiple Tour-level titles in 2024.
- De Minaur has lost both **5-set matches** he has contested at Wimbledon – falling to Steve Johnson in 5 sets in the 2nd round in 2019 and to Garin in the round of 16 in 2022. He has a 3-6 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- De Minaur **broke the Top 10 for the first time** in January this year and reached a career-high ranking of No. 7 last month. He plays here 2 places lower at No. 9.
- De Minaur is a **former Wimbledon boys' singles finalist**. He reached the boys' singles final here in 2016 (l. Denis Shapovalov). He reached a career-high junior ranking of No. 2 in February 2016 and also reached the semifinals of the boys' singles at the 2015 US Open (l. Tommy Paul) and the 2016 Australian Open (l. Jurabek Karimov).
- De Minaur is coached by Adolfo Gutierrez.
- Qualifier **POUILLE** is bidding to reach the round of 16 here for the 2nd time – and the first time since 2016. This is his 7th Wimbledon appearance and his 30th Grand Slam overall.
- Pouille is bidding to become the **30th qualifier to reach the men's singles round of 16 at Wimbledon**. In the last 20 years, 6 qualifiers have reached the round of 16 here – Irakli Labadze (2006), Lukasz Kubot and Bernard Tomic (2011), Brian Baker (2012), Ernests Gulbis (2018) and Jason Kubler (2022). (NB fellow qualifier Quentin Halys is also bidding to reach the round of 16 here today)
- If both Pouille and Halys win today and reach the round of 16, it will be the **first time that multiple qualifiers have reached the round of 16 at Wimbledon since 2011**, when Kubot and Tomic both reached the round of 16 here.
- At No. 212, Pouille is the 2nd-lowest ranked man to reach the 3rd round here, after No. 220 Halys. If Pouille and Halys both reach the round of 16 here, it will be the **2nd time in the Open Era that multiple players ranked outside the Top 200 have reached the men's singles round of 16 at a Grand Slam** – after 2020 Roland Garros, when No. 239 Hugo Gaston and No. 213 Sebastian Korda both reached the round of 16.
- Pouille is one of 5 Frenchmen bidding to reach the 3rd round here today. The **Open Era record for most French players to reach the men's singles round of 16 at Wimbledon** is 4 – in 2016, when Richard Gasquet, Nicolas Mahut, Lucas Pouille and Jo-Wilfried Tsonga all reached the last 16 here. The Open Era record for most French players to reach the men's singles round of 16 at a Grand Slam is 5 – at Roland Garros in 1971, 2008 and 2015.
- Pouille is bidding to become the **12th Frenchman in the Open Era to reach the round of 16 at Wimbledon on multiple occasions** – after Richard Gasquet (7 round of 16 appearances here), Jo-Wilfried Tsonga (6), Guy Forget, Henri Leconte and Cedric Pioline (all 5), Sebastian Grosjean (4), Arnaud Clement, Adrian Mannarino and Gilles Simon (all 3) and Paul-Henri Mathieu and Benoit Paire (both 2). (NB Ugo Humbert is also bidding to reach the round of 16 here for the 2nd time this year)
- Pouille advanced to the 3rd round after defeating Laslo Djere 36 76(4) 36 63 61 in the 1st round and after Thanasi Kokkinakis retired due to a left knee injury with Pouille leading 26 75 5-2 in the 2nd round. His 5-set victory against Djere in the 1st round improved his win-loss record in **5-set matches at Wimbledon** to 2-1. He has a 10-5 record in 5-set matches overall.
- Pouille defeated wild card Jack Pinnington Jones (GBR) 60 63, Jiri Vesely (CZE) 76(6) 62 and No. 6 seed Luca Van Assche 76(4) 75 62 in the 3 rounds of **Wimbledon qualifying last week**. It was the first time he has successfully qualified at Wimbledon on his 3rd attempt and the 2nd time he has successfully qualified at a Grand Slam on his 7th attempt.
- Pouille is one of 6 Frenchmen to reach the 3rd round here this year, the **2nd-most Frenchmen to reach the 3rd round at Wimbledon in the Open Era** – after 2010, when 7 Frenchmen reached the 3rd round here. (NB in addition to the 6 Frenchmen competing here today, Gael Monfils fell in the 3rd round on Friday)

- Pouille's **best Wimbledon result** is reaching the quarterfinals in 2016. He defeated Marius Copil, Donald Young, Juan Martin del Potro and Bernard Tomic before falling to Tomas Berdych.
- Pouille's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the semifinals at the 2019 Australian Open (l. Novak Djokovic). He became the 7th Frenchman to reach the semifinals at the Australian Open in the Open Era and the 14th to reach a Grand Slam semifinal in the Open Era. He remains the most-recent Frenchman to reach a Grand Slam semifinal.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Pouille fell in the 1st round of qualifying at Roland Garros (l. Hamad Medjedovic). He was ranked too low to enter qualifying at the Australian Open and began his year with a runner-up finish as a qualifier at the Nonthaburi 1 Challenger (THA) (l. Valentin Vacherot).
- **Last year here**, Pouille reached the final round of qualifying. He defeated Zdenek Kolar and Giulio Zeppieri before retiring in the 2nd set of his match against Tomas Machac.
- Pouille has **competed mainly at Challenger-level in 2024**. His best result at Challenger-level this year is winning his 2nd Challenger title at the Mauthausen Challenger (AUT) (d. Jozef Kovalik). He also finished runner-up at the Nonthaburi 1 Challenger (THA). did not contest any events on grass in 2024, at any level, prior to Wimbledon qualifying last week.
- Pouille is bidding to record his **4th Tour-level match-win in 2024**. Prior to his victories in the opening 2 rounds here, his only match-win at Tour-level this year came in a 2nd round finish as a qualifier at Indian-Wells-1000 (d. Daniel Altmaier, l. Stefanos Tsitsipas). He fell in the 1st round on his 2 other Tour-level appearances this year – as a wild card at Montpellier (l. Harold Mayot) and as a qualifier at Estoril (l. Nuno Borges).
- Pouille **best grass court performance** is winning the title at 2017 Stuttgart (d. Feliciano Lopez). He is one of 23 players who began the men's singles here this year to have won a Tour-level title on grass. He is also one of 17 active players to have won Tour-level titles on three different surfaces.
- Pouille is bidding to **defeat a Top 10 player at Wimbledon for the first time on his 3rd attempt**. He has lost both matches he has played against Top 10 players at Wimbledon – to No. 9 Berdych in the quarterfinals in 2016 and to No. 3 Roger Federer in the 3rd round in 2019. He has a 1-3 win-loss record against Top 10 players at the Grand Slams overall, with his only victory coming against No. 5 Rafael Nadal in the round of 16 at the 2016 US Open
- Pouille has **won one of his last 14 Tour-level matches against Top 10 players at Tour-level**. His only victory against a Top 10 player in that time came against No. 9 Karen Khachanov in the 3rd round at 2019 Cincinnati-1000. He is facing a Top 10 player for the first time since 2022 Madrid-1000, when he fell to Stefanos Tsitsipas in the 2nd round. He has a 6-19 win-loss record against Top 10 players at Tour-level overall.
- Pouille has **struggled with injury since 2020**. He missed more than 4 months due to a right elbow injury between October 2019 and March 2020, playing just one match in the 2020 season, and undergoing surgery on his right elbow in July 2020. He fell as low as No. 678 in the world in May 2023, before returning to the Top 200 for the first time since June 2022 in May this year.
- Pouille is a **former Top 10 player**, having achieved a career-high ranking of No. 10 in March 2018. He plays here at No. 212.
- Pouille was a **good junior**. He achieved a career-high junior ranking of No. 23 in January 2012 and reached the boys' singles quarterfinals at the 2011 Australian Open (l. Luke Saville). He never competed in the boys' singles here.
- Pouille made his **Davis Cup** debut for France in 2016 and was part of the team that won France's 10th Davis Cup title in 2017. He won 2 of the 4 matches he played that season, including defeating Steve Darcis in the deciding match of the final. He has a 7-4 win-loss record in the competition overall but has not competed in Davis Cup since 2018. France defeated Chinese Taipei in the Qualifiers in February to advance to the 2024 Davis Cup Finals Group Stage. They will compete in Group B in Valencia alongside Australia, Czechia and Spain.
- Pouille is coached by Eric Winogradsky and Nicolas Copin.

## NO. 13 TAYLOR FRITZ (USA) v NO. 24 ALEJANDRO TABILO (CHI)

### Head-to-head: Fritz leads 2-0

A 3rd meeting for Fritz and Tabilo, but their first at a Grand Slam or on grass. It is their 2nd meeting in 2024, after Fritz won in straight sets when they contested a 2nd round match at Indian Wells-1000 in March.

Fritz and Tabilo won the titles at Eastbourne and Mallorca, respectively, last week. It was the 2nd Tour-level title in 2024 for both players, with Fritz having won the title at Delray Beach and Tabilo having won the title at Auckland. They are 2 of the 10 players to have won multiple Tour-level men's singles titles this season. They are also 2 of the 23 players competing at Wimbledon this year to have won at least one Tour-level title on grass – 14 of whom have reached the 3rd round.

This is the first Wimbledon men's singles meeting between the 2 players who won Tour-level titles the previous week since 2012 – when 's-Hertogenbosch champion David Ferrer defeated Eastbourne champion Andy Roddick in the 3rd round here.

Fritz and Tabilo are both bidding to record their 7th consecutive Tour-level match-wins. Tabilo is currently on the longest Tour-level winning streak of his career. His previous longest Tour-level winning streak was winning 4 consecutive Tour-level matches, which he achieved on 3 occasions – winning 4 consecutive matches in a runner-up finish at 2022 Cordoba, in his title-victory at Auckland this year and in his semifinal finish at Rome-1000 this year.

Fritz is bidding to record a streak of 7 consecutive Tour-level match-wins for the 5th time. His longest Tour-level winning streak is 9 consecutive victories in 2022, when he won a match during USA's Davis Cup Qualifiers victory over Colombia, won 6 matches en route to the title at Indian Wells-1000 and won 2 matches en route to a round of 16 finish at Miami-1000. His longest Tour-level winning streak on grass is 8 consecutive victories in 2022, when he won 4 matches en route to the title at Eastbourne before winning 4 matches en route to a quarterfinal finish here.

This is the first meeting between a pair of Top 20 players in the men's singles at Wimbledon this year. Fritz plays here at No. 12 – 7 places below his career-high ranking of No. 5 – while Tabilo broke the Top 20 for the first time on Monday after winning the title at Mallorca and plays here at a career-high ranking of No. 19.

Fritz is bidding to defeat a Top 20 player at a Grand Slam for the 4th time. He has a 3-14 win-loss record against Top 20 players at the Grand Slams and has lost all 4 matches he has contested against Top 20 players at Wimbledon. The highest-ranked player he has defeated at Wimbledon is No. 45 Yannick Hanfmann in the 1st round last year. He has a 43-57 win-loss record against Top 20 players at Tour-level overall.

Tabilo lost his only previous match against a Top 20 player at a Grand Slam, falling to No. 19 John Isner in the 2nd round at the 2020 Australian Open on his Grand Slam debut. The highest-ranked player he has defeated at the Grand Slams is No. 48 Flavio Cobolli in the 2nd round here this year. He has a 3-10 win-loss record against Top 20 players at Tour-level overall.

Fritz has won one of the 2 previous matches he has contested against lefthanded players at Wimbledon, both of which came in 2022 – he defeated Alex Molcan in the 3rd round but fell to Rafael Nadal in the quarterfinals. He has a 9-5 win-loss record against lefthanded players at the Grand Slams and a 42-31 win-loss record against lefthanded players at Tour-level overall.

- **FRITZ** is bidding to reach the round of 16 here for the 2nd time. This is his 8th Wimbledon appearance and his 32nd Grand Slam overall.
- Fritz is bidding to become the **39th American man in the Open Era to reach the round of 16 at Wimbledon on multiple occasions** – and the 2nd active American man to do so after Tommy Paul, who has reached the round of 16 here for the 2nd time this year. (NB Brandon Nakashima is also bidding to reach the round of 16 here for the 2nd time this year)
- If Fritz, Nakashima and Ben Shelton all win today and reach the round of 16 here, it will be the **joint-most American men to reach the round of 16 at Wimbledon since 2000** – alongside 2022, when Fritz, Nakashima, Paul and Frances Tiafoe all reached the last 16 here.
- Fritz advanced to the 3rd round here after defeating Christopher O’Connell 61 62 64 and Arthur Rinderknech 63 64 36 64 in the opening 2 rounds.
- **Last year here**, Fritz reached the 2nd round, defeating Yannick Hanfmann in 5 sets before falling to Mikael Ymer in 5 sets despite holding a 2-0 lead. He has a 2-3 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Wimbledon and a 10-10 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Fritz’s **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the quarterfinals on 3 occasions – including at 2022 Wimbledon, when he fell to Rafael Nadal in 5 sets. He also reached back-to-back Grand Slam quarterfinals at the 2023 US Open and 2024 Australian Open, falling to Novak Djokovic on both occasions.
- **Elsewhere in Grand Slam play this year**, Fritz reached the round of 16 at Roland Garros (l. Casper Ruud).
- **Prior to Wimbledon this season**, Fritz won his 3rd title at Eastbourne, defeating Max Purcell in the final to become the first 3-time champion in the tournament’s history. He also reached the quarterfinals at Queen’s (l. Jordan Thompson). He is one of 7 players competing here this year to have won multiple Tour-level titles on grass.
- Fritz is bidding to become **the first American man to win multiple Tour-level titles on grass in the same year since 1999**, when Sampras won the titles at both Queen’s and Wimbledon.
- Fritz’s **other highlights in 2024** are winning the title at Delray Beach (d. Tommy Paul), finishing runner-up at Munich (l. Jan-Lennard Struff), reaching the semifinals at Madrid-1000 (l. Andrey Rublev) and reaching the quarterfinals at Rome-1000 (l. Alexander Zverev). He is one of 10 players to have won multiple Tour-level titles this season.
- Fritz is one of **4 seeded American men** to reach the 3rd round here from the 5 who began the main draw. USA has more seeded players in the draw than any other nation.
- Fritz reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 5 in February 2023. He plays here at No. 12.
- Fritz is a **former junior world No. 1**. He was named 2015 ITF Junior World Champion after winning the boys’ singles title at the 2015 US Open (d. Paul). He also finished as runner-up in the boys’ singles at 2015 Roland Garros (l. Paul). His best result in the boys’ singles here was reaching the semifinals in 2015 (l. Reilly Opelka).

- Fritz made his **Davis Cup** debut in 2019 and has a 6-3 win-loss record in the competition. USA defeated Ukraine in the Qualifiers in February to reach the 2024 Davis Cup Finals and will compete in Group C in Zhuhai alongside Germany, Slovakia and Chile.
- Both of Fritz's parents were professional tennis players. His mother, Kathy May, is a former Top 10 player.
- Fritz is coached by Michael Russell and Paul Annacone.
- Lefthander **TABILO** is bidding to reach the round of 16 at a Grand Slam for the first time. This is his 2nd Wimbledon main draw appearance and his 7th Grand Slam overall.
- Tabilo is bidding to become the **7th Chilean man in history to reach the round of 16 at Wimbledon** – after Luis Ayala (5 Wimbledon round of 16 appearances), Cristian Garin (2) and Ricardo Acuna, Jaime Fillol, Fernando Gonzalez and Marcelo Rios (all one).
- Tabilo is bidding to become the **12th Chilean man in history to reach the round of 16 at the Grand Slams** – after Ayala (12 Grand Slam round of 16 appearances), Gonzalez (11), Rios (10), Fillol (7), Hans Gildemeister (4), Garin (3) and Acuna, Ricard Balbiers, Patricio Cornejo Seckel, Nicolas Jarry and Nicolas Massu (all one).
- Tabilo advanced to the 3rd round after defeating Daniel Evans 62 75 63 and Flavio Cobolli 76(4) 76(4) 46 46 64 in the opening 2 rounds. He has **won both 5-set matches he has contested at Wimbledon** – in addition to his 5-set victory against Cobolli in the 2nd round this year, he also defeated Laslo Djere in 5 sets in the 1st round here in 2022. He has a 3-1 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall. .
- By reaching the 3rd round here, Tabilo has become the **10th Chilean man in the Open Era to reach the 3rd round at Wimbledon** – alongside Ayala, Fillol and Gonzalez (6 Wimbledon 3rd round appearances each), Acuna (4), Balbiers and Garin (2) and Jarry, Massu and Rios (all one).
- By reaching the 3rd round here, Tabilo has recorded his **best Grand Slam result**. His previous best results at the Grand Slams were reaching the 2nd round at a Grand Slam on 3 occasions – including at Wimbledon in 2022 (d. Djere, I. Miomir Kecmanovic). He also reached the 2nd round as a qualifier on his Grand Slam debut at the 2020 Australian Open (d. Daniel Galan, I. John Isner) and as a direct acceptance and at the 2022 US Open (d. Kamil Majchrzak, I. JJ Wolf).
- **Last year here**, Tabilo fell to Pierre-Hugues Herbert in the 1st round of qualifying.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Tabilo fell in the 1st round at both the Australian Open (I. Aleksandar Kovacevic) and Roland Garros (I. Zizou Bergs).
- Prior to Wimbledon this season, Tabilo **won his 2nd Tour-level title**, and first on grass, at Mallorca (d. Sebastian Ofner). He became the first Chilean man to win a Tour-level title on grass. He also reached the 2nd round at Queen's (d. Alejandro Davidovich Fokina, I. Tommy Paul). He is one of 23 players competing in the men's singles here this year to have won a Tour-level title on grass.
- Tabilo's other highlights in 2024 are winning his **first Tour-level title** at Auckland (d. Taro Daniel), finishing runner-up at Santiago (I. Sebastian Baez) and reaching the semifinals at Bucharest (I. Marton Fucsovics) and Rome-1000 (I. Alexander Zverev). He is one of 10 players to have won multiple Tour-level titles prior to Wimbledon this season.
- Tabilo is one of the **5 lefthanders** who have reached the 3rd round from the 17 who began this year's Wimbledon men's singles main draw. In the Open Era, 5 lefthanded players have won the men's singles title here, most recently Rafael Nadal in 2010.
- Tabilo **broke the Top 20 for the first time** this week and plays here at a new career-high ranking of No. 19.
- Tabilo was a **good junior**. He represented Canada, the country of his birth, throughout his junior career. He reached a career-high junior ranking of No. 29 in 2015, and fell in the 1st round in his only appearance in the boys' singles here that year (I. Marc Polmans).
- Tabilo has played **Davis Cup** for Chile since 2019 and has a 9-9 overall win-loss record in the competition. After defeating Peru in the Qualifiers in February, Chile will compete in Zhuhai alongside Germany, Slovakia and USA in Group C at the 2024 Davis Cup Finals.
- Tabilo is coached by Horacio Matta.

# NO. 15 HOLGER RUNE (DEN) v (Q) QUENTIN HALYS (FRA)

## Head-to-head: first meeting

Rune has never lost a Grand Slam match to a player ranked as low as No. 220 Halys. The lowest-ranked player has lost to at the Grand Slams is 122 Arthur Cazaux in the 2nd round at the Australian Open this year. The lowest-ranked player to have defeated Rune at Wimbledon is No. 65 Marcos Giron in the 1st round in 2022.

Rune has lost Tour-level matches to players ranked as low as Halys on 2 occasions – to No. 338 Altug Celikbilek in Davis Cup in 2019 when he was ranked No. 1125 and to No. 264 Matheus De Almeida at 2022 Santiago when he was ranked No. 88.

Rune won the only Grand Slam match he has contested against a qualifier, defeating Genaro Alberto Olivieri in the 3rd round at 2023 Roland Garros and Jozef Kovalik in the 3rd round at Roland Garros this year. He has a 17-5 win-loss record against qualifiers at Tour-level overall.

- **RUNE** is bidding to reach the round of 16 here for the 2nd time. This is his 3rd Wimbledon appearance and his 12th Grand Slam overall.
- Rune is bidding to become the **3rd Danish man in history to reach the round of 16 at Wimbledon on multiple occasions** – after Kurt Nielsen (who reached the last 16 here in 1953-55 and 1958) and Jurgen Ulrich (1959-60 and 1964).
- Rune is also bidding to reach the round of 16 at a Grand Slam for the 6th time and equal Torben Ulrich in **2nd place on the all-time list for most Grand Slam round of 16 appearances by a Danish man**. Nielsen, who reached the round of 16 at the Grand Slams on 11 occasions, and Torben Ulrich are the only Danish men to have reached the round of 16 at the Grand Slams more often than Rune.
- Rune advanced to the 3rd round by defeating Kwon Soonwoo 61 64 64 and Thiago Seyboth Wild 36 63 62 62 in the opening 2 rounds.
- Last year here, Rune equalled his **best Grand Slam result** by reaching the quarterfinals. He defeated George Loffhagen, Roberto Carballes Baena, Alejandro Davidovich Fokina and Grigor Dimitrov before falling to Carlos Alcaraz. He became the first Danish man to record a match-win at Wimbledon since Carlsen in 2004. He also reached the quarterfinals at Roland Garros in both 2022 and 2023, losing to Casper Ruud on both occasions.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Rune reached the round of 16 at Roland Garros, falling to Alexander Zverev in 5 sets, but fell in the 2nd round at the Australian Open (d. Yoshihito Nishioka, l. Arthur Cazaux).
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Rune fell in the 1st round at Queen's (l. Jordan Thompson).
- Rune's **best result in 2024** is finishing runner-up at Brisbane (l. Grigor Dimitrov). He also reached the semifinals at Montpellier, where he retired due to a right arm injury against Borna Coric, Acapulco (l. Casper Ruud) and Munich (l. Jan-Lennard Struff) and reached the quarterfinals at Indian Wells-1000 (l. Daniil Medvedev) and Monte Carlo-1000 (l. Jannik Sinner).

- Rune won the only **5-set match** he has contested at Wimbledon, against Davidovich Fokina in the 3rd round last year. He has a 2-3 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Rune **broke the Top 10 for the first time** in November 2022 after winning the title at Paris-1000. He reached a career-high ranking of No. 4 in August 2023 and plays here at No. 15 – his lowest ranking since October 2022.
- Rune is a **former junior world No. 1**. He won the boys' singles title at 2019 Roland Garros (d. Toby Kodat) and reached the top ranking in October that year. He reached the 3rd round on his only appearance in the boys' singles here in 2019 (l. Anton Matusevich).
- Rune made his **Davis Cup** debut for Denmark in 2018 and has a 7-2 win-loss record in the competition. Denmark play away against Kazakhstan in a World Group I tie in September.
- Rune is coached by Kenneth Carlsen and Patrick Mouratoglou.
- Qualifier **HALYS** is bidding to reach the round of 16 at a Grand Slam for the first time. This is his 3rd Wimbledon appearance and his 20th Grand Slam overall.
- At No. 220, Halys is bidding to become **the lowest-ranked man to reach the round of 16 at Wimbledon since 2002**, when Richard Krajicek reached the round of 16 here ranked No. 1093.
- If Halys and No. 212 Pouille both reach the round of 16 here, it will be the **2nd time in the Open Era that multiple players ranked outside the Top 200 have reached the men's singles round of 16 at a Grand Slam** – after 2020 Roland Garros, when No. 239 Hugo Gaston and No. 213 Sebastian Korda both reached the round of 16.
- Halys is bidding to become the **30th qualifier to reach the men's singles round of 16 at Wimbledon**. In the last 20 years, 6 qualifiers have reached the round of 16 here – Irakli Labadze (2006), Lukasz Kubot and Bernard Tomic (2011), Brian Baker (2012), Ernests Gulbis (2018) and Jason Kubler (2022). (NB fellow qualifier Pouille is also bidding to reach the round of 16 here today)
- If both Halys and Pouille both reach the round of 16 here, it will be the **first time that multiple qualifiers have reached the round of 16 at Wimbledon since 2011**, when Kubot and Tomic both reached the round of 16 here.
- Halys is one of 5 Frenchmen bidding to reach the 3rd round here today. The **Open Era record for most French players to reach the men's singles round of 16 at Wimbledon** is 4 – in 2016, when Richard Gasquet, Nicolas Mahut, Lucas Pouille and Jo-Wilfried Tsonga all reached the last 16 here. The Open Era record for most French players to reach the men's singles round of 16 at a Grand Slam is 5 – at Roland Garros in 1971, 2008 and 2015.
- Of the 5 Frenchmen competing in the 3rd round here today, Halys, Arthur Fils and Giovanni Mpetshi Perricard are all bidding to reach the round of 16 at a Grand Slam for the first time. If they all reach the round of 16 here, they become the **49th, 50th and 51st Frenchmen in the Open Era to reach the round of 16 at the Grand Slams** – and the 26th, 27th and 28th Frenchmen in the Open Era to reach the round of 16 at Wimbledon.
- Halys advanced to the 3rd round after defeating Christopher Eubanks 64 64 62 and No. 21 seed Karen Khachanov 46 63 36 63 64 in the opening 2 rounds. His victory against Khachanov was his **first victory in a 5-set match** and the first 5-set match he has contested at Wimbledon. He had lost his previous 6 five-set matches.
- Halys defeated No. 7 seed Gregoire Barrere (FRA) 63 64, wild card Jay Clarke (GBR) 63 36 63 and Beibit Zhukayev (KAZ) 63 64 64 in the 3 rounds of **Wimbledon qualifying last week**. It was the first time he has successfully qualified at Wimbledon on his 6th attempt and the 5th time he has successfully qualified at a Grand Slam on his 21st attempt.
- Halys is one of 6 Frenchmen to reach the 3rd round here this year, the **2nd-most Frenchmen to reach the 3rd round at Wimbledon in the Open Era** – after 2010, when 7 Frenchmen reached the 3rd round here. (NB in addition to the 6 Frenchmen competing here today, Gael Monfils fell in the 3rd round on Friday)
- By reaching the 3rd round here, Halys has equalled his **best Grand Slam result**. He also reached the 3rd round here last year, when he defeated Daniel Evans and Aleksandar Vukic before falling to Jannik Sinner.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Halys reached the 2nd round at the Australian Open (d. Lloyd Harris, l. Sebastian Korda) but fell in the final round of qualifying at Roland Garros (l. Filip Misolic).



- Halys is bidding to record his **7th Tour-level match-win on grass**. His only previous Tour-level victories on grass prior to Wimbledon this year came in 2nd round finishes here in 2022 (d. Benoit Paire, I. Nikoloz Basilashvili) and at 2022 Newport (d. Alexei Popyrin, I. James Duckworth) and in his 3rd round finish here last year. He did not compete on grass this season prior to Wimbledon qualifying.
- Halys is bidding to record his **5th Tour-level match-win of 2024**. His only Tour-level match-wins prior to Wimbledon this year came in his 2nd round finish at the Australian Open and during France's victory over Chinese Taipei in the Davis Cup Qualifiers, when he defeated Tseng Chun Hsin. He lost in the 1st round on his only other Tour-level appearance this season – as a wild card at Marseille (I. Felix Auger-Aliassime).
- Halys' **best results at Challenger-level this year** are reaching the semifinals as a wild card at the Cherbourg Challenger (FRA) (I. Zsombor Piros) and reaching the quarterfinals at the Phoenix Challenger (USA) (I. Vukic) and the Lyon Challenger (FRA), where he retired due to a left knee injury during his match against Kyrian Jacquet.
- Halys is bidding to **defeat a Top 20 player at the Grand Slams for the first time**. He has lost all 5 previous 5 matches he has contested against Top 20 players at the Grand Slams, including his only previous match against a Top 20 player at Wimbledon – against No. 8 Sinner at in the 3rd round here last year. The highest ranked player he has defeated at the Grand Slams is No. 22 Khachanov in the 2nd round here this year.
- Halys is bidding to **defeat a Top 20 player for the 2nd time**. He has a 1-10 record against Top 20 players at Tour-level, with his only victory against a Top 20 player at Tour-level coming against No. 18 Alex de Minaur at Miami-1000 last year.
- Halys reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 61 in January 2023. He dropped outside the Top 100 in January this year and plays here at No. 220.
- Halys had a **good junior career**, reaching a career-high junior ranking of No. 3 in March 2014. He finished runner-up in the boys' singles at the 2014 US Open (I. Omar Jasika) and won the boys' doubles title at 2014 Roland Garros alongside Benjamin Bonzi. His best result in the boys' singles here was reaching the 2nd round in 2013 (d. Jorge Brian Panta, I. Borna Coric).
- Halys made his **Davis Cup** debut for France during the victory over Chinese Taipei in the Qualifiers this year, defeating Tseng in the only match he contested. France will compete in Group B in Valencia alongside Australia, Czechia and Spain at the 2024 Davis Cup Finals Group Stage in September.
- Halys is coached by Nicolas Devilder.

- Musetti is bidding become the **16th Italian man in history to reach the round of 16 at Wimbledon**. He would become the 4th active Italian man to reach the last 16 here – after Matteo Berrettini, Jannik Sinner and Lorenzo Sonego.
- If Musetti wins today and joins Sinner in the round of 16 here, it will be the **4th time in history that multiple Italian men have reached the last 16 at Wimbledon** – after 1949 (Rolando del Bello and Giovanni Cucelli), 1955 (Giuseppe Merlo and Nicola Pietrangeli) and 2021 (Berrettini and Sonego). (NB Fabio Fognini is also competing in the 3rd round here today)
- If Musetti and Fognini both win today and join Sinner in the round of 16 here, it will be the **first time in history that 3 Italian men have reached the round of 16 at Wimbledon**.
- Musetti advanced to the 3rd round after defeating Constant Lestienne 46 76(4) 62 62 and Luciano Darderi 64 46 67(5) 64 64 in the opening 2 rounds. His 5-set victory against Darderi was the **first 5-set match he has contested at Wimbledon**. He has a 3-6 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- By reaching the 3rd round here, Musetti has equalled his **best Wimbledon result**. He also reached the 3rd round here last year, defeating Juan Pablo Varillas and Jaume Munar to record his first Wimbledon match-wins before falling to Hubert Hurkacz.
- Musetti's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the round of 16 at Roland Garros on 2 occasions – on his Grand Slam debut in 2021, when he led Djokovic 2-0 before retiring due to a lower back injury in the 5th set, and in 2023 (l. Carlos Alcaraz). At Roland 2021 Garros he became the 7th player since 2000 to reach the round of 16 on his Grand Slam debut.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Musetti reached the 3rd round at Roland Garros, where he defeated Daniel Elahi Galan and Gael Monfils before falling to Djokovic, and the 2nd round at Roland Garros (d. Benjamin Bonzi, l. Luca van Assche)
- Prior to Wimbledon this year, Musetti reached his **first Tour-level final on grass** at Queen's (l. Tommy Paul). He also reached the semifinals at Stuttgart (l. Berrettini).
- Musetti's **other Tour-level highlights this season** are reaching the quarterfinals at Adelaide (l. Alexander Bublik) and the round of 16 at Miami-1000 (l. Carlos Alcaraz). He has contested 2 events at Challenger-level this season, finishing runner-up at both the Cagliari Challenger (ITA) (l. Mariano Navone) and the Turin Challenger (ITA) (l. Francesco Passaro).
- Musetti **broke the Top 20 for the first time** in January 2023 and reached a career-high ranking of No. 15 in June last year. He plays here at No. 25.

- Musetti is a **former junior world No. 1**, reaching the top ranking in June 2019. He won the boys' singles title at the 2019 Australian Open (d. Emilio Nava) and finished runner-up in the boys' singles at the 2018 US Open (l. Thiago Seyboth Wild). He reached the quarterfinals of the boys' singles here in 2018 (l. Jack Draper).
- Musetti made his **Davis Cup** debut for Italy in 2021 and has a 2-3 win-loss record in the competition. Italy will compete in Bologna alongside Canada, Sweden and Chile in Group A at the 2023 Davis Cup Finals.
- Musetti is coached by Simone Tartarini.
- **COMESANA** is bidding to become the 7th man in the last 20 years to reach the round of 16 on his Grand Slam debut – after David Goffin (2012 Roland Garros), Juan Ignacio Londero (2019 Roland Garros), Daniel Altmaier (2020 Roland Garros), Aslan Karatsev (2021 Australian Open), Musetti (2021 Roland Garros) and Tim van Rijthoven (2022 Wimbledon).
- Comesana is bidding to become the **2nd Argentinian man in the Open Era to reach the round of 16 on his Wimbledon debut** – after David Nalbandian, who finished runner-up on his debut here in 2002.
- If Comesana and Giovanni Mpetshi Perricard both reach the round of 16 here, it will be the **4th consecutive year that multiple Wimbledon debutants have reached the men's singles round of 16** – after Ilya Ivashka and Sebastian Korda in 2021, Tommy Paul and Van Rijthoven in 2022, and Christopher Eubanks and Roman Safiullin in 2023. Mpetshi Perricard and Comesana are bidding to become the 50th and 51st men in the Open Era to reach the round of 16 on their Wimbledon debuts.
- Comesana is bidding to become the **12th Argentinian man in history to reach the round of 16 at Wimbledon**. He would become the 2nd active Argentinian man to reach the last 16 here – after Guido Pella, who reached the round of 16 here in 2019.
- Comesana advanced to the 3rd round by defeating No. 6 seed Andrey Rublev 64 57 62 76(5) and Adam Walton 75 16 67(12) 61 76(8) for his **first Tour-level match-wins** in the opening 2 rounds. His 5-set victory against Walton in the 2nd round was the first 5-set match of his career.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Comesana reached the 2nd round of qualifying at the Australian Open (d. Yuta Shimizu, l. Mate Valkusz). He missed qualifying at Roland Garros this year due to a left calf injury. He has contested qualifying at 2 other Grand Slam tournaments – at the US Open in 2022, when he fell in the 1st round of qualifying (l. Franco Agamenone), and 2023, when he defeated Jozef Kovalik and Federico Gaio before falling to Taro Daniel in the final round of qualifying.
- Prior to Wimbledon, Comesana had **lost in the 1st round at all 3 Tour-level events he has contested**, all of which have come this season – as a wild card at Cordoba (l. Thiago Tirante), as a qualifier at Rio de Janeiro (l. Francisco Cerundolo) and as a lucky loser at Santiago (l. Juan Pablo Varillas).
- Comesana **plays mainly on the Challenger Tour**. His best result in 2024 is winning his 5th title at Challenger-level at the Oeiras 3 Challenger (POR) (d. Ugo Blanchet). He also reached the semifinals at the Mauthausen Challenger (AUT), where he retired against Lucas Pouille due to a left calf injury.
- Comesana is contesting his **4th grass court match, at any level, professional or junior**. Before Wimbledon, his only previous appearance on grass came in qualifying at Eastbourne last month, when he fell to Charles Broom in the 1st round of qualifying.
- Comesana **broke the Top 100 for the first time** in April this year, reaching a career-high ranking of No. 87 in May. He plays here at No. 122.
- Comesana is coached by Sebastian Gutierrez.

- Mpetshi Perricard advanced to the 3rd round after defeating No. 20 seed Sebastian Korda 76(5) 67(4) 76(6) 67(4) 63 and Yoshihito Nishioka 64 61 62 for his **first Grand Slam match-wins** in the opening 2 rounds.
- Mpetshi Perricard is one of 6 Frenchmen to reach the 3rd round here this year, the **2nd-most Frenchmen to reach the 3rd round at Wimbledon in the Open Era** – after 2010, when 7 Frenchmen reached the 3rd round here. (NB in addition to the 6 Frenchmen competing here today, Gael Monfils fell in the 3rd round on Friday)

- As No. 1 seed in **Wimbledon qualifying last week**, Mpetshi Perricard defeated Ugo Blanchet (FRA) 62 75 and Antoine Escoffier (FRA) 76(5) 62 before falling to falling to Maxime Janvier (FRA) 67(10) 75 76(4) 76(5) in the final round of qualifying. - Mpetshi Perricard's best result in 2024 is winning his **first Tour-level title** on his 4th Tour-level appearance as a wild card at Lyon (d. Tomas Martin Etcheverry). His only other Tour-level appearances prior to Wimbledon this season came at Roland Garros, Stuttgart and Queen's.
- Also in 2024, Mpetshi Perricard won his **2nd, 3rd and 4th Challenger-level titles** – at Nottingham 1 (GBR) (d. Matteo Martineau), Morelos (MEX) (d. Nicolas Mejia), and Acapulco (MEX) (d. Adam Walton). He also reached the semifinals at the San Luis Potosi Challenger (MEX) (l. Matias Soto) and the quarterfinals at the Lille Challenger (FRA) (l. Pierre-Hugues Herbert).
- Mpetshi Perricard's 5-set victory against Korda in the 1st round here was his **first victory in a 5-set match**. He lost the 2 other 5-set matches he has contested – to Olivieri in the 1st round at Roland Garros last year and to Goffin in the 1st round at Roland Garros this year.
- Mpetshi Perricard **broke the Top 100 for the first time** after winning the title at Lyon in May. He reached a career-high ranking of No. 58 this week.
- Mpetshi Perricard was a **successful junior**, reaching a career-high junior ranking of No. 4 in July 2021. He reached the semifinals of the boys' singles at 2021 Roland Garros (l. Arthur Fils) and won the boys' doubles title at Roland Garros alongside Fils the same year. He never contested the boys' singles event at Wimbledon.
- Mpetshi Perricard is coached by Emmanuel Planque.
- **RUUSUVUORI** is bidding to reach the round of 16 at a Grand Slam for the first time. This is his 4th Wimbledon appearance and his 16th Grand Slam overall.
- Ruusuvuori is bidding to become the **2nd Finnish player, man or woman, to reach the round of 16 at Wimbledon** – after Jarkko Nieminen, who reached the round of 16 here in 2006.
- Ruusuvuori is bidding to become the **4th Finnish player, man or woman, to reach the round of 16 at a Grand Slam** – after Nieminen (4 Grand Slam round of 16 appearances) and Reino Nyysönen and Veli Paloheimo (both one).
- Ruusuvuori advanced to the 3rd round after defeating Mackenzie McDonald 76(6) 46 57 76(6) 63 and No. 11 seed Stefanos Tsitsipas 76(6) 76(10) 36 63 in the opening 2 rounds. His 5-set victory against McDonald in the 1st round was his **first victory in a 5-set match at Wimbledon** – he lost the only previous 5-set match he has contested here, against Marcos Giron in the 1st round in 2021. He has a 5-3 win-loss record in 5-set matches overall.
- By reaching the 3rd round here, Ruusuvuori has become **3rd Finnish player to reach the 3rd round at Wimbledon** – after Pekka Salla, who reached the 3rd round here in 1967, and Nieminen, who reached the 3rd round here in 2003, 2006 and 2007.
- By reaching the 3rd round here, Ruusuvuori has become the **8th Finnish player to reach the 3rd round at a Grand Slam** – Nieminen (14 Grand Slam 3rd round appearances), Nanne Dahlman (3), Nyysönen (2) and Paloheimo, Aki Rahunen, Salla and Petra Thoren (all one).
- By reaching the 3rd round here, Ruusuvuori has recorded his **best Grand Slam result**. His previous best result at the Grand Slams was reaching the 2nd round on 8 occasions – including at 2022 Wimbledon (d. Yoshihito Nishioka, l. Botic van de Zandschulp).

- **Last year here**, Ruusuvuori fell to Stan Wawrinka in the 1st round.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Ruusuvuori reached the 2nd round at the Australian Open (d. Patrick Kypson, I. Medvedev) but fell in the 1st round at Roland Garros (I. Kwon Soonwoo).
- **Prior to Wimbledon**, Ruusuvuori reached the 2nd round at Eastbourne (d. Cameron Norrie, I. Shang Juncheng). He also competed at the Surbiton Challenger (GBR), falling in the 1st round (I. Sho Shimabukuro).
- Ruusuvuori's best result in 2024 is reaching his **2nd Tour-level final** at Hong Kong (I. Andrey Rublev). He also reached the quarterfinals at Rotterdam (I. Tallon Griekspoor) and Doha, where he retired with a lower back injury against Karen Khachanov.
- Ruusuvuori reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 37 in April 2023. He plays here at No. 87.
- Ruusuvuori was a **successful junior**, reaching a career-high junior ranking of No. 4 in November 2017. He reached the semifinals of the boys' singles at the 2017 US Open (I. Wu Yibing) and the quarterfinals of the boys' singles at the 2017 Australian Open (I. Corentin Moutet), and defeated Wu to win the title at the 2017 ITF Junior Masters in Chengdu. He fell in the 1st round in his only appearance in the boys' singles here in 2017 (I. Rudolf Molleker).
- Ruusuvuori made his **Davis Cup** debut for Finland in 2017 and has a 18-8 win-loss record in the competition overall. He won 5 of the 7 Davis Cup matches he contested in 2023 as Finland reached the semifinals for the first time. Finland defeated Portugal in the Qualifiers in February to advance to the 2024 Davis Cup Finals Group Stage. They will compete in Group D in Manchester alongside Canada, Great Britain and Argentina in September.
- Ruusuvuori is coached by Federico Ricci.

- **FILS** is bidding to reach the round of 16 at a Grand Slam for the first time. This is his 2nd Wimbledon appearance and his 6th Grand Slam overall.
- At 20 years and 32 days, Fils is bidding to become the **youngest Frenchman to reach the round of 16 at Wimbledon since 2005**, when Richard Gasquet (19 years 15 days) reached the round of 16 here. (NB ages calculated at the end of the tournament)
- Fils is one of 5 Frenchmen bidding to reach the 3rd round here today. The **Open Era record for most French players to reach the men's singles round of 16 at Wimbledon** is 4 – in 2016, when Richard Gasquet, Nicolas Mahut, Lucas Pouille and Jo-Wilfried Tsonga all reached the last 16 here. The Open Era record for most French players to reach the men's singles round of 16 at a Grand Slam is 5 – at Roland Garros in 1971, 2008 and 2015.
- Of the 5 Frenchmen competing in the 3rd round here today, Fils, Giovanni Mpetshi Perricard and Quentin Halys are all bidding to reach the round of 16 at a Grand Slam for the first time. If they all reach the round of 16 here, they become the **49th, 50th and 51st Frenchmen in the Open Era to reach the round of 16 at the Grand Slams** – and the 26th, 27th and 28th Frenchmen in the Open Era to reach the round of 16 at Wimbledon.
- Fils advanced to the 3rd round after defeating Dominic Stricker 63 62 36 64 in the 1st round and after No. 7 seed Hubert Hurkacz retired with a right knee injury on match point with Fils leading at 76(2) 64 26 6-6 in the 2nd round.
- Fils is one of 6 Frenchmen to reach the 3rd round here this year, the **2nd-most Frenchmen to reach the 3rd round at Wimbledon in the Open Era** – after 2010, when 7 Frenchmen reached the 3rd round here. (NB in addition to the 6 Frenchmen competing here today, Gael Monfils fell in the 3rd round on Friday)
- By reaching the 3rd round here, Fils has become the **youngest Frenchman to reach the 3rd round at Wimbledon since 2005**, when Gasquet (19 years 15 days) and Gael Monfils (18 years 305 days) both reached the 3rd round here. (NB ages calculated at the end of the tournament)
- By reaching the 3rd round here, Fils has recorded his **best Grand Slam result**. His previous best Grand Slam result was reaching the 2nd round at a Grand Slam on 2 occasions – at the 2023 US Open (d. Tallon Griekspoor, I. Matteo Arnaldi) and the Australian Open this year (d. Jiri Vesely, I. Griekspoor).
- **Last year here**, as a wild card on his Wimbledon debut, Fils lost to Alejandro Davidovich Fokina in the 1st round.
- **Elsewhere in Grand Slam play this year**, Fils lost in the 1st round at Roland Garros (I. Arnaldi).
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Fils reached the quarterfinals at Halle, where he defeated Tomas Machac and Dominik Koepfer before falling to Alexander Zverev, and the 2nd round at 's-Hertogenbosch (d. Arthur Cazaux, I. Ugo Humbert).

- Fils' **best Tour-level result in 2024** is reaching the semifinals at Auckland (l. Alejandro Tabilo). He has also reached 4 Tour-level quarterfinals this season – at Hong Kong (l. Andrey Rublev), Santiago (l. Pedro Martinez), Barcelona (l. Dusan Lajovic) and Halle. He also won the title at Bordeaux Challenger (FRA) (d. Martinez).
- Fils has won one of the 2 **five-set matches** he has contested, both of which came at the US Open last year. He defeated Griekspoor in the 1st round in 5 sets before falling to Arnaldi in the 2nd round, also in 5 sets.
- Fils reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 30 in May. He plays here at No. 34.
- Fils was a **successful junior**. He reached a career-high ranking of No. 3 in July 2021, a month after finishing runner-up in the boys' singles at 2021 Roland Garros (l. Luca van Assche). He also won the 2021 Roland Garros boys' doubles title alongside Giovanni Mpetshi Perricard. He reached the 2nd round on his only appearance in the boys' singles at Wimbledon in 2021 (d. Kokoro Isomura, l. Victor Lilov).
- Fils made his **Davis Cup** debut for France at the 2023 Davis Cup Finals Group Stage, falling to Daniel Evans in the only match he has contested in the competition to date. France defeated Chinese Taipei in the Qualifiers in February to advance to the 2024 Davis Cup Finals Group Stage. They will compete in Group B in Valencia alongside Australia, Czechia and Spain.
- Fils is coached by 2-time Roland Garros champion Sergi Bruguera and Sebastien Grosjean, who reached the semifinals here in 2003 and 2004.
- **SAFIULLIN** is bidding to reach the round of 16 here for the 2nd time. This is his 2nd Wimbledon appearance and 9th Grand Slam overall.
- Safiullin advanced to the 3rd round here after defeating No. 26 seed Francisco Cerundolo 67(5) 36 75 63 64 and Tomas Machac 62 64 57 63 in the opening 2 rounds. His 5-set victory against Cerundolo in the 1st round was his **first successful comeback from 0-2 down**. He has a 2-3 win-loss record in 5-set matches overall, with both wins coming at Wimbledon, having also defeated Roberto Bautista Agut in 5 sets in the 1st round here last year.
- Last year here, Safiullin recorded his **best Grand Slam result** by reaching the quarterfinals on his Wimbledon debut. He defeated Bautista Agut, Corentin Moutet, Guido Pella and Denis Shapovalov before falling to Jannik Sinner. Ranked No. 92, he became the lowest-ranked man to reach the quarterfinals at Wimbledon since No. 144 Nick Kyrgios in 2014.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Safiullin fell in the 1st round at both the Australian Open (l. Tallon Griekspoor) and Roland Garros (l. Dusan Lajovic).
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Safiullin fell in the 1st round at both Stuttgart (l. Matteo Berrettini) and Halle (l. Fabian Marozsan).
- Safiullin's **best Tour-level result in 2024** is reaching the semifinals at Brisbane (l. Holger Rune). His best result at Challenger-level is reaching the semifinals at the Aix En Provence Challenger (FRA) (l. Jaume Munar)
- Safiullin's is bidding to record his **9th Tour-level match-win in 2024**. After winning 3 matches to reach the semifinals at Brisbane, he lost 15 of his next 18 Tour-level matches prior to Wimbledon. His victory in the 1st round here ended a 7-match Tour-level losing streak. He had previously not won a Tour-level match since defeating Munar in the 1st round at Monte-Carlo-1000.
- Safiullin is bidding to record his **8th Tour-level grass court match-win**. Of his 7 Tour-level match-wins on grass, 6 have come at Wimbledon – he won 4 matches en route to the quarterfinals last year and has recorded 2 match-wins in the opening 2 rounds here this year. His only other Tour-level match-win on grass came in a 2nd round finish at Mallorca last year (d. Abedallah Shelbayh, l. Lloyd Harris).
- Safiullin broke the Top 50 for the first time in July last year after reaching the quarterfinals here and reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 36 in January this year. He plays here at No. 44.
- Safiullin was a **successful junior**. He achieved a career-high junior ranking of No. 2 in May 2014, and won the boys' singles title at the 2015 Australian Open (d. Hong Seong-chan). He never contested the boys' singles here.
- Safiullin is coached by former world No. 39 Andrey Kuznetsov.

- **MEDVEDEV** is bidding to reach the round of 16 here for the 3rd time. This is his 6th Wimbledon appearance and his 29th Grand Slam appearance overall.
- Medvedev advanced to the 3rd round after defeating Aleksandar Kovacevic 63 64 62 and Alexandre Muller 67(3) 76(4) 64 75 in the opening 2 rounds.
- Last year here, Medvedev recorded his **best Wimbledon result** by reaching the semifinals (l. Carlos Alcaraz).
- Medvedev won his **first Grand Slam title** at the 2021 US Open, defeating Novak Djokovic in straight sets and ending both Djokovic's bid for the Grand Slam and his 27-match Grand Slam winning streak.
- Medvedev reached his **6th Grand Slam final** at the Australian Open this year, falling to Jannik Sinner in 5 sets despite holding a 2-0 lead. He has a 1-5 win-loss record in Grand Slam finals, having also finished runner-up at the US Open in 2019 (l. Rafael Nadal) and 2023 (l. Djokovic) and at the Australian Open in 2021 (l. Djokovic) and 2022 (l. Nadal).
- If Medvedev wins his 2nd major title here on his 10th Grand Slam appearance since winning his first, he will go **4th on the Open Era list for most attempts before winning a 2nd Grand Slam men's singles title** – behind Marat Safin (14 attempts before winning a 2nd Grand Slam title) and Djokovic and Gustavo Kuerten (both 12).
- **Elsewhere in Grand Slam play this year**, Medvedev reached the round of 16 at Roland Garros (l. Alex de Minaur).
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Medvedev reached the 2nd round at Halle (d. Nuno Borges, l. Zhang Zhizhen).
- Medvedev's **best results in 2024** are runner-up finishes at the Australian Open and Indian Wells-1000 (l. Alcaraz). He also reached the semifinals at Dubai (l. Ugo Humbert) and Miami-1000 (l. Sinner) and the quarterfinals at Madrid-1000, where he retired against Jiri Lehecka due to a right hip injury.

- Medvedev has **won one Tour-level grass court title** – at 2021 Mallorca (d. Sam Querrey). Of his 19 other Tour-level titles, 18 have come on hard courts, with his only clay court title to date coming at Rome-1000 this year. His 20 titles have been won at 20 different events, which is a Tour-level record.
- Medvedev has won 4 of the last 5 **five-set matches** he has contested, with his only defeat in a 5-set match in that time coming in his most-recent 5-set match, against Sinner in the final at the Australian Open. Having won 3 five-set matches en route to the final at the Australian Open this year, he became the 12th man in the Open Era to contest 4 five-set matches at a single Grand Slam tournament. He has a 2-4 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Wimbledon and a 7-10 win-loss record in 5-set matches overall.
- Medvedev **became world No. 1** on 28 February 2022, becoming the first player other than the 'Big 4' (Djokovic, Roger Federer, Andy Murray and Rafael Nadal) to hold the top ranking since Andy Roddick in February 2004. He held the No. 1 ranking for 16 weeks during 2022 but is yet to return to the No. 1 ranking. He plays here at No. 5.
- Medvedev reached a career-high junior ranking of No. 13 in January 2014. His best performance in the boys' singles here was reaching the 2nd round in 2013 (d. Hong Seong Chan, I. Nikola Milojevic).
- Medvedev is coached by Gilles Cervara.
- **STRUFF** is bidding to reach the round of 16 here for the first time and equal his best Grand Slam result. This is his 10th Wimbledon appearance and 39th Grand Slam overall.
- Struff is bidding to become the **19th German player in the Open Era to reach the men's singles round of 16 at Wimbledon** – and the 2nd active German player to do so, after Alexander Zverev, who is bidding to reach the round of 16 here for the 3rd time this year.
- Struff advanced to the 3rd round after defeating Fabian Marozsan 64 67(4) 62 63 and Zhang Zhizhen 57 63 76(1) 76(8) in the opening 2 rounds.
- By reaching the 3rd round here, Struff has equalled his **best Wimbledon result**. He also reached the 3rd round here in 2018 (l. Roger Federer) and 2019 (l. Mikhail Kukushkin). He did not play here last year due to a hip injury.
- Struff's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the round of 16 at Roland Garros on 2 occasions – in 2019 (l. Novak Djokovic) and 2021 (l. Diego Schwartzman).
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Struff reached the 3rd round at Roland Garros, where he defeated Roman Andres Burrachaga and Alexander Bublik before falling to Alex de Minaur, but fell in the 2nd round at the Australian Open (d. Rinky Hijikata, I. Miomir Kecmanovic).
- **Prior to Wimbledon this season**, Struff reached the quarterfinals at both Stuttgart, defeating Flavio Cobolli and Arthur Rinderknech before giving a walkover to Brandon Nakashima due to illness, and at Halle, defeating Luciano Darderi and Stefanos Tsitsipas before falling to Jannik Sinner.
- Struff's best result in 2024 is winning his **first Tour-level title** at Munich (d. Taylor Fritz), winning the title without dropping a set. By winning the title aged 33 years 362 days, he became the 3rd-oldest first-time Tour-level Tour titlist 1990. He also reached the quarterfinals at Stuttgart and Halle and the round of 16 at Madrid-1000 (l. Carlos Alcaraz).
- Struff is bidding to defeat a **Top 5 player at a Grand Slam for the first time on his 7th attempt**. He has lost all 6 of his previous meetings with Top 5 players at the Grand Slams, including both matches against Top 5 players at Wimbledon, falling to No. 2 Federer in the 2nd round in 2018 and to No. 2 Medvedev in the 1st round in 2021. The highest-ranked player he has defeated at a Grand Slam is No. 7 Andrey Rublev in the 1st round at 2021 Roland Garros
- Struff is bidding to end a **5-match losing streak against Top 5 players at Tour-level**. He has not defeated a Top 5 player since defeating No. 5 Tsitsipas in the quarterfinals at 2023 Madrid-1000. He has a 5-22 win-loss record against Top 5 players overall.
- Struff has won one of the last 5 **five-set matches** he has played, with his only victory in a 5-set match in that time coming against Hijikata in the 1st round at the Australian Open this. He has a 10-9 win-loss record in 5-set matches overall.
- Struff reached a **career-high ranking of No. 21** in June last year. He plays here at No. 41.

- Struff made his **Davis Cup** debut for Germany in 2015 and has an 18-9 win-loss record in the competition overall. Germany defeated Hungary in the Qualifiers in February to advance to the 2024 Davis Cup Finals Group Stage. They will compete in Group C in Zhuhai alongside USA, Slovakia and Chile in September.
- Struff is coached by Carsten Arriens.

# NO. 14 BEN SHELTON (USA) v DENIS SHAPOVALOV (CAN)

## Head-to-head: first meeting

This is the 28th men's singles match between an American and a Canadian at Wimbledon in the Open Era – American players lead Canadian players 17-10 here. It is the 79th men's singles match between an American and a Canadian at the Grand Slams in the Open Era. American players lead Canadian players 49-29 at the Grand Slams.

Shelton has never lost a Grand Slam match to a player ranked as low as No. 121 Shapovalov. The lowest-ranked player to defeat Shelton at the Grand Slams is No. 104 Nuno Borges in the 1st round at the 2022 US Open.

Shelton and Shapovalov are 2 of the 5 lefthanders to reach the 3rd round here from the 17 who began the men's main draw this year. The last lefthander to win the title here was Rafael Nadal in 2010.

Shelton is facing a lefthander here this year for the 2nd time, having defeated Mattia Bellucci in the 1st round. He lost his first 5 Tour-level matches against lefthanders – but has since won 2 most-recent matches against lefthanders, against Hugo Gaston in the 1st round at Roland Garros this year and against Bellucci in the 1st round here this year.

Shapovalov won his only previous match against a lefthander at Wimbledon, defeating Liam Broady in the 3rd round here last year. He has a 3-2 win-loss record against lefthanders at the Grand Slams and a 22-21 win-loss record against lefthanders at Tour-level.

- Lefthander **SHELTON** is bidding to reach the round of 16 here for the first time. This is his 2nd Wimbledon appearance and his 8th Grand Slam overall.
- Shelton is bidding to become **88th American player in the Open Era to reach the men's singles round of 16 at Wimbledon** – and the 9th active American player to do so, after Christopher Eubanks, Taylor Fritz, Sebastian Korda, Denis Kudla, Mackenzie McDonald, Brandon Nakashima, Tommy Paul and Frances Tiafoe. He would also become the first lefthanded American man to reach the round of 16 at Wimbledon since John McEnroe in 1992.
- If Shelton, Taylor Fritz and Brandon Nakashima all win today and reach the round of 16 here, it will be the **joint-most American men to reach the round of 16 at Wimbledon since 2000** – alongside 2022, when Fritz, Nakashima, Tommy Paul and Frances Tiafoe all reached the last 16 here.
- Shelton advanced to the 3rd round after defeating qualifier Mattia Bellucci 46 63 36 63 64 and qualifier Lloyd Harris 46 76(5) 67(5) 63 76(7) in the opening 2 rounds.
- By reaching the 3rd round here, Shelton has **recorded his best Wimbledon result**. Last year here, on his Wimbledon debut, he reached the 2nd round (d. Taro Daniel, I. Laslo Djere).
- By reaching the 3rd round here, Shelton has become the **44th man in the Open Era to reach the 3rd round at all 4 Grand Slam tournaments aged 21 or under** – and the 7th American man to do so in the Open Era, after Michael Chang, Jimmy Connors, Jim Courier, Krickstein, Andry Roddick and Sampras.

- Shelton's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the semifinals at the 2023 US Open (l. Novak Djokovic). Aged 20 years 336 days, he became the youngest American man to reach the semifinals at the US Open since Michael Chang (20 years 204 days) in 1992.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Shelton reached the 3rd round at both the Australian Open (l. Adrian Mannarino) and Roland Garros (l. Felix Auger-Aliassime).
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Shelton reached the quarterfinals at Mallorca, where he received a bye through the 1st round and defeated Rinky Hijikata before falling to Paul Jubb. He lost his opening match at both Stuttgart (l. James Duckworth) and Queen's (l. Giovanni Mpetshi Perricard).
- Shelton's best result in 2024 is winning his **2nd Tour-level title** at Houston (d. Frances Tiafoe). He also reached the semifinals at Auckland (l. Taro Daniel) and Dallas (l. Tommy Paul) and the quarterfinals at Acapulco (l. Casper Ruud).
- Shelton is bidding to record his **6th match-win on grass, at any level**. In addition to his 2 victories here this year, his 2nd round finish here last year, and his victory against Hijikata at Mallorca last week, his only other match-win on grass came in a 2nd round finish at 2023 Queen's (d. JJ Wolf, l. Lorenzo Musetti).
- Shelton reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 14 in April this year after winning his 2nd Tour-level title at Houston. He plays here at the same ranking.
- Shelton has won all three **5-set matches** he has contested at Wimbledon, against Daniel in the 1st round last year and against Bellucci and Harris in the opening 2 rounds this year. He has a 5-2 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Shelton is one of **4 seeded American men** to reach the 3rd round here from the 5 who began the main draw. USA has more seeded players in the draw than any other nation.
- Shelton **played college tennis**. He represented the University of Florida for 2 seasons, compiling a 65-10 win-loss record in singles and winning the 2021 NCAA team title and the 2022 NCAA singles title.
- Shelton **contested just 4 tournaments as a junior player**, all of which came in his home country. His best result was reaching the 3rd round as a wild card at 2020 JA Plantation (USA) (also known as the Orange Bowl), falling to Jack Pinnington Jones.
- Shelton's father, Bryan Shelton, reached a career-high ranking of No. 55 in March 1992. He made 6 appearances at Wimbledon, reaching the round of 16 in 1994.
- Shelton is coached by his father, Bryan Shelton, and Dean Goldfine.
- Lefthander **SHAPOVALOV** is bidding to reach the round of 16 here for the 3rd time. This is his 7th Wimbledon appearance and his 26th Grand Slam overall.
- Shapovalov is bidding to become **the 3rd Canadian player to reach the round of 16 at Wimbledon on 3 or more occasions** – after Milos Raonic (5 Wimbledon round of 16 appearances) and Robert Powell (4). He is one of 5 Canadian players to have reached the round of 16 here on multiple occasions, alongside Raonic and Powell and Carling Bassett-Seguso and Patricia Hy-Boulais, who both reached the women's singles round of 16 here on 2 occasions.
- Shapovalov is bidding to reach the round of 16 at a Grand Slam for the 6th time and equal Eugenie Bouchard in **5th place on the all-time list for most Grand Slam round of 16 appearances by a Canadian player**. Raonic (20 Grand Slam round of 16 appearances), Bassett-Seguso (9), Felix Auger-Aliassime (8) and Bouchard (6) are the only Canadian players to have reached the last 16 at the Grand Slams more often than Shapovalov.
- Shapovalov advanced to the 3rd round after defeating No. 19 seed Nicolas Jarry 61 75 64 and Daniel Altmaier 76(3) 63 16 67(3) 64 in the opening 2 rounds. By defeating Altmaier in 5 sets in the 2nd round here, he maintained his **perfect record in 5-set matches here**, having won all 4 five-set matches he has contested at Wimbledon. He has a 12-8 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- **Last year here**, Shapovalov reached the round of 16. He defeated Radu Albot, Gregoire Barrere and Liam Broady before falling to Roman Safiullin.

- Shapovalov's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the semifinals here in 2021. He defeated 2-time champion Andy Murray and recorded 5-set victories against both Philipp Kohlschreiber and Karen Khachanov before falling to Novak Djokovic in the last 4.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Shapovalov reached the 3rd round at Roland Garros (l. Hubert Hurkacz) but fell in the 1st round at the Australian Open (l. Jakub Mensik).
- **Prior to Wimbledon this season**, Shapovalov reached the 2nd round at Stuttgart (d. Matteo Martineau, l. Matteo Berrettini). He also competed at the Surbiton Challenger (GBR), falling in the 1st round (l. Aleksandar Vukic).
- Shapovalov's **best Tour-level results in 2024** are reaching the 3rd round at Miami-1000 (l. Matteo Arnaldi), Madrid-1000 (l. Alexander Zverev) and Roland Garros.
- By defeating Jarry in the 1st round, Shapovalov ended a **5-match losing streak against Top 20 players at the Grand Slams**. He had previously not defeated a Top 20 player at a Grand Slam since defeating No. 3 Zverev in the round of 16 at the 2022 Australian Open. He has a 6-12 win-loss record against Top 20 players at the Grand Slams and a 28-51 win-loss record against Top 20 players at Tour-level overall.
- Shapovalov has **won one Tour-level title** – on hard courts at 2019 Stockholm (d. Filip Krajinovic).
- Shapovalov reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 10 in September 2020. He plays here at No. 121 but entered using a protected ranking of No. 28.
- Shapovalov is **one of 3 former Wimbledon boys' singles champions** to reach the 3rd round from the 5 who began the men's main draw here this year. He won the boys' singles title here in 2016, defeating Alex de Minaur in the final. He reached a career-high junior ranking of No. 2 in July 2016 and was also a member of the Canadian team that defeated Germany to win the 2015 Junior Davis Cup title.
- Shapovalov was a member of the **Canadian team which won the Davis Cup title for the first time in 2022**. He won 2 of the 4 Davis Cup singles matches he contested in 2022, including a victory against Australia's Thanasi Kokkinakis in the final. He has a 14-9 overall win-loss record in the competition and was also a member of the Canadian team which reached the final for the first time in 2019 (l. Spain). Canada defeated Korea, Rep. in the Qualifiers in February to advance to the 2024 Davis Cup Finals and will compete in Group D in Manchester alongside Argentina, Finland and Great Britain in September.
- Shapovalov is coached by Matt Daly.

A first Tour-level meeting for Humbert and Nakashima. The pair have won one match each in their 2 meetings below Tour-level, in qualifying at the 2018 US Open and at 2022 Rome-1000.

Nakashima won his only previous match against a lefthander at Wimbledon, defeating Denis Shapovalov in the 2nd round here in 2022. He has lost his other 2 matches against lefthanded players at the Grand Slams, falling to Alex Molcan in the 2nd round at the 2021 US Open and to Shapovalov in the 1st round at 2023 Roland Garros.

Nakashima is bidding to end a 6-match losing streak against lefthanded players at Tour-level, having not recorded a Tour-level victory against a lefthander since defeating Shapovalov here in 2022. He has a 5-12 win-loss record against lefthanded players at Tour-level overall.

- Lefthander **HUMBERT** is bidding to reach the round of 16 here for the 2nd time and equal his best Grand Slam result. This is his 5th Wimbledon appearance and his 23rd Grand Slam appearance overall.
- Humbert is bidding to become the **12th Frenchman in the Open Era to reach the round of 16 at Wimbledon on multiple occasions** – after Richard Gasquet (7 round of 16 appearances here), Jo-Wilfried Tsonga (6), Guy Forget, Henri Leconte and Cedric Pioline (all 5), Sebastian Grosjean (4), Arnaud Clement, Adrian Mannarino and Gilles Simon (all 3) and Paul-Henri Mathieu and Benoit Paire (both 2). (NB fellow Frenchmen Lucas Pouille is also bidding to reach the round of 16 here for the 2nd time this year)
- Humbert is one of 5 Frenchmen bidding to reach the 3rd round here today. The **Open Era record for most French players to reach the men's singles round of 16 at Wimbledon** is 4 – in 2016, when Richard Gasquet, Nicolas Mahut, Lucas Pouille and Jo-Wilfried Tsonga all reached the last 16 here. The Open Era record for most French players to reach the men's singles round of 16 at a Grand Slam is 5 – at Roland Garros in 1971, 2008 and 2015.
- Humbert is bidding to become the **12th Frenchman in the Open Era to reach the round of 16 at Wimbledon on multiple occasions** – after Richard Gasquet (7 round of 16 appearances here), Jo-Wilfried Tsonga (6), Guy Forget, Henri Leconte and Cedric Pioline (all 5), Sebastian Grosjean (4), Arnaud Clement, Adrian Mannarino and Gilles Simon (all 3) and Paul-Henri Mathieu and Benoit Paire (both 2). (NB Lucas Pouille is also bidding to reach the round of 16 here for the 2nd time this year)
- Humbert advanced to the 3rd round after defeating Alexander Shevchenko 61 46 76(2) 67(3) 61 and Botić van de Zandschulp 76(9) 61 63 in the opening 2 rounds. His 5-set victory against Shevchenko in the 1st round was his **3rd victory in a 5-set match** – he has a 3-8 win-loss record in 5-set matches overall, with all 3 of his victories coming at Wimbledon. He has a 3-2 win-loss record in 5-set matches here.
- Humbert is one of 6 Frenchmen to reach the 3rd round here this year, the **2nd-most Frenchmen to reach the 3rd round at Wimbledon in the Open Era** – after 2010, when 7 Frenchmen reached the 3rd round here. (NB in addition to the 6 Frenchmen competing here today, Gael Monfils fell in the 3rd round on Friday)

- **Last year here**, Humbert fell to Jason Kubler in 5 sets in the 1st round.
- Humbert's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the round of 16 on his Wimbledon debut in 2019. He defeated Gael Monfils, Marcel Granollers and Felix Auger-Aliassime before falling to Novak Djokovic in the last 16.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Humbert reached the 3rd round at the Australian Open (l. Hubert Hurkacz) but lost in the 1st round at Roland Garros (l. Lorenzo Sonego).
- **Prior to Wimbledon this season**, Humbert reached the semifinals at 's-Hertogenbosch, defeating Arthur Fils and Gijs Brouwer before falling to Alex de Minaur. He fell in the 1st round at Queen's (l. Matteo Arnaldi) and also lost his opening match at Mallorca (l. Roberto Bautista Agut).
- Humbert's best results in 2024 are winning his **5th and 6th Tour-level titles** – at Marseille (d. Grigor Dimitrov) and Dubai (d. Alexander Bublik). He is one of 10 players to have won multiple Tour-level titles in 2024. He also reached quarterfinals at Doha (l. Monfils) and Monte-Carlo-1000 (l. Casper Ruud).
- Humbert has **won one Tour-level title on grass** – at Halle in 2021 (d. Andrey Rublev). He is one of 24 players competing here this year to have won at least one Tour-level title on grass. His 5 other Tour-level titles have all come on hard courts.
- Humbert has **won all 6 Tour-level finals he has contested**. By winning the titles at Marseille and Dubai this season, he became the 3rd player to win his first 6 Tour-level finals, alongside Ernests Gulbis and Martin Klizan.
- Humbert is one of the **5 lefthanders** to reach the 3rd round here from the 17 who began this year's Wimbledon men's singles main draw. In the Open Era, 5 lefthanded players have won the men's singles title here, most recently Rafael Nadal in 2010.
- Humbert reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 13 in April this year. He plays here 3 places lower at No. 16.
- Humbert reached a **career-high junior ranking of No. 18** in January 2016 but never competed in the boys' singles event at Wimbledon.
- Humbert made his **Davis Cup** debut for France against Hungary in the 2023 Qualifiers, and has a 4-1 win-loss record in the competition. France will compete in Valencia alongside Australia, Czechia and Spain in Group B at the 2024 Davis Cup Finals.
- Humbert is coached by Jeremy Chardy, who reached the round of 16 at Wimbledon in 2014.
- **NAKASHIMA** is bidding to reach the round of 16 here for the 2nd time and equal his best Grand Slam result. This is his 4th Wimbledon appearance and his 13th Grand Slam overall.
- Nakashima is bidding to become the **39th American man in the Open Era to reach the round of 16 at Wimbledon on multiple occasions** – and the 2nd active American man to do so after Tommy Paul, who has reached the round of 16 here for the 2nd time this year. (NB Taylor Fritz is also bidding to reach the round of 16 here for the 2nd time this year)
- If Nakashima, Fritz and Ben Shelton all win today and reach the round of 16 here, it will be the **joint-most American men to reach the round of 16 at Wimbledon since 2000** – alongside 2022, when Fritz, Nakashima, Paul and Frances Tiafoe all reached the last 16 here.
- Nakashima advanced to the 3rd round after defeating No. 18 seed Sebastian Baez 62 63 64 and Jordan Thompson 63 62 62 in the opening 2 rounds.
- Nakashima's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the round of 16 here in 2022. He defeated Nicola Pietrangeli, Denis Shapovalov and Daniel Elahi Galan before falling to Nick Kyrgios in 5 sets.
- **Last year here**, Nakashima fell to Thompson in 5 sets in the 1st round despite holding a 2-0 lead. He has lost both 5-set matches he has contested at Wimbledon and has a 1-5 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall, with his only victory in a 5-set match coming against Kamil Majchrzak in the 1st round at 2022 Roland Garros.
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Nakashima reached the 2nd round at Roland Garros (d. Nicolas Moreno de Alboran, l. Hubert Hurkacz) but fell in the 1st round of qualifying at the Australian Open (l. Jakub Mensik).



- Nakashima has **won both of his previous matches against Top 20 players at Wimbledon** – against No. 16 Shapovalov in the 2nd round here in 2022 and against No. 18 Baez in the 1st round here this year. He has a 3-5 win-loss record against Top 20 players at the Grand Slams and a 6-14 win-loss record against Top 20 players at Tour-level overall.
- Nakashima reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 43 in October 2022. He dropped outside the Top 100 in September 2023, falling to No. 151 – his lowest-ranking since February 2021 – but re-entered the Top 100 in January this year and plays here at No. 65.
- Nakashima has a **successful junior career** and reached a career-high junior ranking of No. 3 in December 2018. His best result at a Grand Slam junior event was reaching the semifinals of the boys' singles at the 2019 US Open (l. Jonas Forejtek). His best result in the boys' singles at Wimbledon was reaching the 3rd round in 2019 (l. Harold Mayot).
- Nakashima is coached by Davide Sanguinetti, who reached the quarterfinals here in 1998.

The winner of today's match will become the 9th man in the Open Era to reach the round of 16 at Wimbledon aged 36 or older, while Fognini could also become the 4th man in the Open Era to reach the last 16 here aged 37 or older. - **BAUTISTA AGUT** is bidding to record his 50th Tour-level match-win on grass and become the 10th active male player to win 50 Tour-level matches on grass. This is his 10th Wimbledon appearance and his 44th Grand Slam overall.
- Bautista Agut is bidding to become the **5th Spanish man in the Open Era to reach the round of 16 at Wimbledon on 3 or more occasions** – after Rafael Nadal (10 Wimbledon round of 16 appearances), Feliciano Lopez (6) and David Ferrer and Fernando Verdasco (both 5).
- Bautista Agut is bidding to reach the round of 16 at a Grand Slam for the 14th time and claim sole ownership of **5th place on the Open Era list for most Grand Slam round of 16 appearances by a Spanish man**, ahead of Carlos Moya and Manuel Orantes. Nadal (54 Grand Slam round of 16 appearances), Ferrer (27), Tommy Robredo (23), Verdasco (18) and Juan Carlos Ferrero (15) are the only Spanish men in the Open Era to have reached the round of 16 at the Grand Slams more often than Bautista Agut.
- Aged 36 years 91 days, Bautista Agut is bidding to become the **9th man in the Open Era to reach the round of 16 here aged 36 or older**. (NB ages calculated at end of the tournament)
- Bautista Agut is also bidding to become the **oldest Spanish man in the Open Era to reach the round of 16 here** – ahead of Nadal, who reached the round of 16 here in 2022 aged 36 years 37 days.

- Bautista Agut advanced to the 3rd round after defeating Maximilian Marterer 63 61 64 and Lorenzo Sonego 63 36 63 64 in the opening 2 rounds.
- By reaching the 3rd round here, Bautista Agut is the **24th man in the Open Era to reach the 3rd round here aged 36 or older**. 37-year-olds Gael Monfils and Fognini have also reached the 3rd round here, as has 37-year-old Novak Djokovic, who has reached the 3rd round here for the 2nd time since turning 36. (NB ages calculated at end of the tournament)
- Bautista Agut's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the semifinals here in 2019, when he fell to N Djokovic in 4 sets.
- **Last year here**, Bautista Agut fell in the 1st round here last year (l. Roman Safiullin).
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Bautista Agut fell in the 1st round at both the Australian Open (l. Ben Shelton) and Roland Garros (l. Jaume Munar). His victories in the opening 2 rounds here ended a 4-match losing streak at the Grand Slams – he had previously not recorded a Grand Slam match-win since reaching the 2nd round at 2023 Roland Garros (d. Wu Yibing, l. Juan Pablo Varillas).
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Bautista Agut reached the quarterfinals at Mallorca, where he defeated Taro Daniel and Ugo Humbert before falling to Monfils. He also reached the 2nd round at 's-Hertogenbosch (d. Marc-Andrea Huesler, l. Milos Raonic) but lost in the 2nd round of qualifying at Halle (d. Pierre-Hugues Herbert, l. Max Purcell).
- Bautista Agut's **best Tour-level results in 2024** are reaching the quarterfinals at Hong Kong (l. Sebastian Ofner) and Mallorca and reaching the 3rd round as a wild card at Barcelona (l. Cameron Norrie). He also reached the quarterfinals at the Bordeaux Challenger (FRA) (l. Pedro Martinez).
- Bautista Agut has **won one Tour-level title on grass** – at 2014 's-Hertogenbosch (d. Benjamin Becker). He has won 8 other titles on hard courts and 2 on clay.
- Bautista Agut has won 2 of the 3 **five-set matches** he has contested at Wimbledon, defeating Benoit Paire in the 2nd round in 2015 and Miomir Kecmanovic in the 2nd round in 2021, but falling to Safiullin in the 1st round last year. He has a 13-12 record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Bautista Agut is a **former Top 10 player**. He reached a career-high ranking of No. 9 in November 2019. He plays here at No. 112.
- Bautista Agut has played **Davis Cup** since 2014 and has a 13-7 win-loss record in the competition. He was part of the Spain team that won the competition for the 6th time in 2019, winning 2 of the 3 singles matches he played at the Finals. Spain received a wild card to compete at the 2024 Davis Cup Finals Group Stage in September and will compete in Group B in Valencia alongside Australia, Czechia and France.
- Bautista Agut is coached by Daniel Gimeno-Traver and Jose Luis Vendrell Bru.
- **FOGNINI** is bidding to reach the round of 16 here for the first time. This is his 14th Wimbledon appearance and his 61st Grand Slam overall.
- If Fognini reaches the round of 16 here for the first time on his 14th appearance at Wimbledon, he will set the **Open Era record for most attempts before reaching the round of 16 in the men's singles at Wimbledon** – moving ahead of Tommy Robredo, who reached the round of 16 here for the first time on his 13th Wimbledon appearance in 2014.
- Aged 37 years 51 days, Fognini is bidding to become the **4th man in the Open Era to reach the round of 16 at Wimbledon aged 37 or older** – after Pancho Gonzales (who reached the round of 16 here as a 41-year-old in 1969) and Roger Federer and Ken Rosewall, who both made 2 appearances in the last 16 here after turning 37. Fellow 37-year-old Novak Djokovic is also bidding to reach the round of 16 here this year. (NB ages calculated at end of the tournament)
- If Fognini wins today and joins Jannik Sinner in the round of 16 here, it will be the **4th time in history that multiple Italian men have reached the last 16 at Wimbledon** – after 1949 (Rolando del Bello and Giovanni Cucelli), 1955 (Giuseppe Merlo and Nicola Pietrangeli) and 2021 (Berrettini and Sonego). (NB Lorenzo Musetti is also competing in the 3rd round here today)

- If Fognini and Musetti both win today and join Sinner in the round of 16 here, it will be the **first time in history that 3 Italian men have reached the round of 16 at Wimbledon.**
- Fognini is also bidding to become the **oldest Italian man in the Open Era to reach the round of 16 here** – ahead of Gianluca Pozzi, reached the round of 16 here in 2000 aged 35 years 22 days.
- Fognini advanced to the 3rd round after defeating lucky loser Luca Van Assche 61 63 75 and No. 8 seed Casper Ruud 64 75 67(1) 63 in the opening 2 rounds.
- By reaching the 3rd round here, Fognini has equalled his **best Wimbledon result.** He has reached the 3rd round here on 6 other occasions – in 2010 (l. Julien Benneteau), 2014 (l. Kevin Anderson), 2017 (l. Andy Murray), 2018 (l. Jiri Vesely), 2019 (l. Tennys Sandgren) and 2021 (l. Andrey Rublev).
- By reaching the 3rd round here, Monfils has become **one of 14 men in the Open Era to reach the 3rd round at Wimbledon aged 37 or older.**
- Fognini **did not compete at Wimbledon last year.** On his last appearance here, in 2022, he fell to Tallon Griekspoor in the 1st round.
- Fognini's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the quarterfinals at Roland Garros in 2011, where he became the first Italian man to reach the quarterfinals at a Grand Slam since Davide Sanguinetti reached the last 8 at 1998 Wimbledon. He gave a walkover to Novak Djokovic in his quarterfinal match due to a thigh strain – the first time a player had given a walkover in the quarterfinals of the men's singles at a Grand Slam since Stefan Edberg pulled out of his quarterfinal match with Thomas Muster at the 1989 Australian Open.
- **In Grand Slam play this year** Fognini reached the 2nd round at Roland Garros (d. Botić van de Zandschulp, l. Tommy Paul). He did not compete at the Australian Open, beginning his season with a 2nd round finish at the Tenerife 1 Challenger (ESP) in January.
- **Prior to Wimbledon this year,** Fognini reached the 2nd round as a wild card at Mallorca (d. Gijs Brouwer, l. Jakub Mensik).
- Fognini's **best Tour-level result in 2024** is reaching the quarterfinals as a qualifier at Marrakech, where he defeated Hugo Gaston and Laslo Djere before falling to Pavel Kotov. His only other Tour-level match-wins prior to Wimbledon this season came in 2nd round finishes as a wild card at Indian Wells-1000 (d. Bernabe Zapata Miralles, l. Sebastian Baez), as a wild card at Rome-1000 (d. Daniel Evans, l. Taylor Fritz) and at Roland Garros and Mallorca.
- Fognini has won 5 of the 7 **five-set matches** he has contested at Wimbledon. He has a 24-15 record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Fognini has **won 9 Tour-level singles titles** – most-recently at 2019 Monte Carlo-1000 (d. Dusan Lajovic). Eight of his 9 titles have come on clay, with the one other title coming on hard courts.
- Fognini is a **former Top 10 player.** He reached a career-high ranking of No. 9 in July 2019, becoming the first Italian man to be ranked in the Top 10 since Corrado Barazzutti in January 1979. He plays here at No. 94.
- Fognini has played **Davis Cup** since 2008 and has a 35-20 win-loss record in the competition. He did not appear in the competition during Italy's title-winning season in 2023, with his most-recent appearances coming at the 2022 Finals. As defending champions, Italy qualified automatically for the 2024 Davis Cup Finals Group Stage in September and will compete in Group A in Bologna alongside Netherlands, Belgium and Brazil.
- Fognini is coached by Filippo Baldi.
