On court today...

- On Centre Court, Alex de Minaur is aiming to upset 7-time Wimbledon champion Novak Djokovic and advance to his first Grand Slam semifinal. The Australian has reason to be hopeful – he recorded an impressive victory over Djokovic at the United Cup in the opening week of the 2024 season and has won 4 other matches against Top 10 players this season. Meanwhile, Djokovic is seeking a first victory against a fellow Top 10 player this year, having lost on both occasions that he has faced a Top 10 opponent this in 2024. For Djokovic, a victory today would see him become just the 5th man in the Open Era to reach the semifinals at a Grand Slam aged 37 or older – and would also see him equal Roger Federer's all-time record of 13 appearances in the Wimbledon men's singles semifinals.
- On No. 1 Court, a first Grand Slam semifinal appearance is the prize on offer to the winner of the match between American Taylor Fritz and Italian Lorenzo Musetti. The pair contested a 1st round match here in 2022, which Fritz won comfortably, but there is considerably more on the line in this encounter. This duo are 2 of the grass court season's in-form players – Fritz came into Wimbledon having won a 3rd title at Eastbourne, and has now won 8 consecutive Tour-level matches for the 2nd time in his career, while Musetti has won 11 of his last 13 matches, reaching the semifinals at Stuttgart before finishing runner-up at Queen's and winning four matches here to reach his first major quarterfinal. After defeats for Fritz and Musetti's compatriots Tommy Paul and Jannik Sinner, respectively, on Tuesday, they will be even more determined to keep their nation's flag flying in the men's singles semifinals at Wimbledon this year.

A 4th meeting for Djokovic and De Minaur, their 2nd at the Grand Slams but their first on grass. Of their 3 previous meetings, 2 have come this season, with De Minaur winning at the United Cup in January and Djokovic winning at Monte Carlo-1000 in April.

This is the 3rd meeting of Top 10 players in the men's singles at Wimbledon this year – after No. 5 Daniil Medvedev's victories against No. 10 Grigor Dimitrov and No. 1 Jannik Sinner.

Djokovic is bidding to end a 3-match losing streak against Top 10 players. Since defeating No. 4 Sinner in the final at the 2023 ATP Finals, he has lost all 3 matches he has contested against Top 10 players – against No. 4 Sinner at both the 2023 Davis Cup Finals and in the semifinals at the Australian Open this year, and against No. 10 Casper Ruud in the semifinals at Monte Carlo-1000 this year. He has a 257-114 win-loss record against Top 10 players at Tour-level overall.

Djokovic has won 9 of the last 10 matches he has contested against Top 10 players at Wimbledon. His defeat to No. 1 Carlos Alcaraz in the final here last year ended a 9-match winning streak against Top 10 players at Wimbledon – with his previous defeat to a Top 10 player here coming against No. 2 Andy Murray in the final in 2013. He has a 13-5 win-loss record against Top 10 players at Wimbledon and a 69-32 win-loss record against Top 10 players at the Grand Slams overall.

De Minaur is facing a Top 10 player at Wimbledon for the 2nd time. He lost his only previous match against a Top 10 player here – to No. 1 Rafael Nadal in the 3rd round in 2018. The highest-ranked player he has defeated at Wimbledon is No. 29 Marco Cecchinato in the 1st round in 2018. He has a 2-10 win-loss record against Top 10 players at the Grand Slams, with his 2 victories coming against No. 7 Kei Nishikori in the 3rd round at the 2019 US Open and against No. 5 Medvedev in the round of 16 at Roland Garros this year.

De Minaur has a 5-6 win-loss record against Top 10 players in 2024. He defeated No. 10 Taylor Fritz, No. 1 Djokovic and No. 7 Alexander Zverev at the United Cup before recording victories against No. 5 Andrey Rublev in the quarterfinals at Rotterdam and No. 5 Medvedev at Roland Garros. He has an 18-45 win-loss record against Top 10 players at Tour-level overall.

De Minaur is bidding to defeat a player ranked No. 1 or No. 2 for the 3rd time. He has a 2-6 win-loss record against No. 1- and No. 2-ranked players, with both of his victories coming at the United Cup – against No. 2 Nadal in 2023 and against No. 1 Djokovic this year.

Djokovic is facing an Australian player here for the 2nd time this year, having defeated Alexei Popyrin in the 3rd round. He lost his first Grand Slam match against an Australian player – falling to Lleyton Hewitt in the 3rd round at the 2006 US Open – but has won all 15 Grand Slam matches he has contested against Australian players since then, including all 8 matches he has played against Australian players at Wimbledon.

Djokovic has won 13 of the last 14 matches he has contested against Australian players at Tour-level, with his only defeat to an Australian player in that time coming against De Minaur at the United Cup this year. He has a 31-5 win-loss record against Australian players at Tour-level overall.

- **DJOKOVIC** is bidding to reach his 13th Wimbledon semifinal and equal Roger Federer's all-time record for most Wimbledon men's singles semifinal appearances.

- Djokovic is bidding to reach his **49th Grand Slam semifinal** and extend his all-time record for most Grand Slam men's singles semifinal appearances.

- Djokovic is bidding to record his 375th Grand Slam match-win. By defeating Francisco Cerundolo in the round of 16 at Roland Garros this year for his 370th Grand Slam match-win, he claimed sole ownership of the **all-time record for most Grand Slam singles matches won among men and women**, ahead of Federer.

- Djokovic is bidding to record his 97th Wimbledon match-win and claim sole ownership of **4th place on the all-time list for most Wimbledon singles matches won among men and women**, ahead of Chris Evert.

- Aged 37 years 53 days, Djokovic is bidding to become the **3rd man in the Open Era to reach the semifinals at Wimbledon aged 37 or older** – after Ken Rosewall (who reached the semifinals here aged 39 years 246 days in 1974) and Federer (who reached the semifinals here aged 37 years 240 days in 2019). (NB ages calculated at end of the tournament)
- Djokovic is also bidding to become the **5th man in the Open Era to reach the semifinals at the Grand Slams aged 37 or older** – after Rosewall (6 Grand Slam semifinal appearances aged 37 or older), Federer (3) and Jimmy Connors and Pancho Gonzales (both one).
- Wimbledon is Djokovic's **joint-most successful Grand Slam event in terms of matches won**, and joint-2nd most successful Grand Slam event in terms of semifinals reached.

- By reaching his 15th Wimbledon quarterfinal, Djokovic has claimed sole ownership of **2nd place on the all-time list for most Wimbledon men's singles quarterfinal appearances**, ahead of Connors. Federer, who made 18 quarterfinal appearances here, is the only man in history to have reached the quarterfinals at Wimbledon more often than Djokovic.
- By reaching his 60th Grand Slam quarterfinal, Djokovic has extended his **all-time record for the most quarterfinal appearances at the Grand Slams**. He claimed sole ownership of the record, ahead of Federer, by reaching his 59th Grand Slam quarterfinal at Roland Garros this year.
- By reaching the quarterfinals here this year, Djokovic the **3rd man in the Open Era to reach the quarterfinals at Wimbledon aged 37 or older** – after Rosewall (who reached the quarterfinals here as a 39-year-old in 1974) and Federer (who reached the quarterfinals here in 2019 as a 37-year-old and again in 2021 as a 39-year-old).
- By reaching his 2nd Grand Slam quarterfinal since turning 37, Djokovic has become the **5th man in the Open Era to reach the quarterfinals at the Grand Slams aged 37 or older on multiple occasions** – after Rosewall (7 Grand Slam quarterfinal appearances aged 37 or older), Federer (5) and Connors and Gonzales (both 2).
- Last year here, Djokovic reached his **9th Wimbledon final**, falling to Carlos Alcaraz in 5 sets. On his 8 other appearances in Wimbledon finals, he won the title in 2011 (d. Rafael Nadal), 2014 (d. Federer), 2015 (d. Federer), 2018 (d. Kevin Anderson), 2019 (d. Federer), 2021 (d. Matteo Berrettini) and 2022 (d. Nick Kyrgios) and finished runner-up in 2013 (l. Andy Murray).
- Djokovic is bidding to win his **8th Wimbledon title** and equal Federer's all-time record for the most Wimbledon men's singles titles won. He is also bidding to equal Federer and Helen Wills Moody in 2nd place on the list for most Wimbledon singles titles won among men and women, behind 9-time Wimbledon champion Martina Navratilova.
- Djokovic won his **22nd, 23rd and 24th Grand Slam titles in 2024** – he equalled Nadal's all-time record for most Grand Slam men's singles titles at the Australian Open (d. Stefanos Tsitsipas), claimed sole ownership of the record at Roland Garros (d. Casper Ruud) and equalled Margaret Court's all-time record for most Grand Slam singles titles among men and women at the US Open (d. Daniil Medvedev).
- Djokovic is bidding to win his **25th Grand Slam title** and claim sole ownership of the all-time record for most Grand Slam singles titles won among men and women.
- Djokovic is bidding to become the **oldest man in the Open Era to win the Wimbledon title** and the first player in the Open Era to win multiple Wimbledon titles after turning 35. In 2022, aged 35 years 49 days, Djokovic became the 2nd player in the Open Era to win the Wimbledon aged 35 or older – after Federer, who won the title here in 2017 aged 35 years 342 days. (NB ages calculated at the end of the tournament)
- Djokovic is bidding to win his **5th Grand Slam title since turning 35** and extend his Open Era record for most Grand Slam singles titles won aged 35 or older. He is also bidding to win his 13th Grand Slam title since turning 30 and extend his record for most Grand Slam singles titles won after the age of 30 in the Open Era.

- Djokovic has **won 38 of his last 39 matches at Wimbledon and 38 of his last 39 Tour-level matches on grass**. His defeat to Alcaraz in the final last year ended a 34-match winning streak at Wimbledon – he had previously not lost here since retiring due to a right elbow injury in his quarterfinal match against Tomas Berdych in 2017. The defeat to Alcaraz also ended a 34-match Tour-level winning streak on grass – he had previously not lost a grass court match since falling to Marin Cilic in the final at 2018 Queen’s.
- Djokovic is making his **19th consecutive Wimbledon appearance and contesting his 75th Grand Slam overall**. He is in joint-4th place on the Open Era list for most Wimbledon men’s singles appearances alongside Fernando Verdasco – behind Federer (22 Wimbledon appearances) and Connors and Feliciano Lopez (both 20). He is in 3rd place on the Open Era list for most Grand Slam men’s singles appearances – behind Federer and Lopez (both 81).
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Djokovic reached the semifinals at the Australian Open (l. Jannik Sinner) and the quarterfinals at Roland Garros, where he gave a walkover to Casper Ruud due to a right knee injury.
- Djokovic’s **other highlights in 2024** are reaching the semifinals at Monte Carlo-1000 (l. Ruud) and Geneva (l. Tomas Machac). He contested just 7 events prior to Wimbledon this season.
- Djokovic **did not contest a grass court tournament prior to Wimbledon this year**. He is one of just 7 men in the Open Era to have won the title here without playing a warm-up event on grass, achieving the feat in 2011, 2014, 2015, 2019, 2021 and 2022. He is one of 16 players who began the men’s singles here who had not competed on grass this season prior to Wimbledon.
- Djokovic is bidding to win his **99th Tour-level title**. He is in 3rd place on the Open Era list for most Tour-level titles won – behind Connors (109 Tour-level titles) and Federer (103). Of Djokovic’s 98 Tour-level singles titles, 8 have come on grass – in addition to his 7 Wimbledon titles, he also won the title on grass at 2017 Eastbourne (d. Gael Monfils). He has won 71 titles on hard courts and 19 titles on clay.
- Djokovic has a 10-2 win-loss record in **5-set matches** at Wimbledon, with his only defeats in 5-set matches here coming against Mario Ancic in the round of 16 in 2006 and against Alcaraz in the final last year. He holds the record for most 5-set matches won at the Grand Slams (38-9) and has a 40-11 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Djokovic **holds the record for most weeks ranked No. 1**, having held the top ranking for a total of 428 weeks. His most-recent spell as world No. 1 ended last month, when he dropped to No. 3 following his withdrawal from Roland Garros. He rose to No. 2 on 24 June and plays here at the same ranking.
- Djokovic has played **Davis Cup** for Serbia since 2004, has a 44-16 win-loss record in the competition and led Serbia to their only title in the competition to date in 2010. Serbia will host Greece in a World Group I tie in September.
- Djokovic is currently without a permanent coach.
- **DE MINAUR** is bidding to reach his first Grand Slam semifinal. This is his 6th Wimbledon appearance and his 28th Grand Slam overall.
- De Minaur is bidding to become the **14th Australian man in the Open Era to reach the semifinals at Wimbledon**. He would become the 3rd Australian man to reach the semifinals here in the last 20 years – after Lleyton Hewitt in 2005 and Nick Kyrgios in 2022. (NB Hewitt also reached the semifinals here in 2002)
- De Minaur is bidding to become the **30th Australian man in the Open Era to reach the semifinals at a Grand Slam**. He would become the 2nd Australian man to reach the semifinals at a Grand Slam since Hewitt made his 8th and final appearance in a Grand Slam semifinal at the 2005 US Open – after Kyrgios at 2022 Wimbledon.
- Wimbledon is De Minaur’s **3rd-most successful Grand Slam** event in terms of matches won, after the Australian Open and the US Open.

- By reaching the quarterfinals here, De Minaur has become the **20th Australian man in the Open Era to reach the quarterfinals at Wimbledon**. He is the 3rd active Australian male player to reach the quarterfinals here – after Bernard Tomic in 2011 and Kyrgios in 2014 and 2022.
- By reaching his 3rd Grand Slam quarterfinal, De Minaur has become the **22nd Australian man in the Open Era to reach the quarterfinals at the Grand Slams on 3 or more occasions**. He is the 2nd active Australian male player to reach 3 or more Grand Slam quarterfinals – after Kyrgios, who reached the quarterfinals at the 2015 Australian Open and the 2022 US Open in addition to his 2 quarterfinal appearances here.
- By reaching the quarterfinals here, De Minaur has recorded his **best Wimbledon result**. His previous best result here was reaching the round of 16 in 2022, when he defeated Hugo Dellien, Jack Draper and Liam Broady before falling to Cristian Garin in 5 sets, despite leading 2-0 and having 2 match points.
- By reaching his 3rd Grand Slam quarterfinal, De Minaur has equalled his **best Grand Slam result**. He also reached the quarterfinals at the 2020 US Open (l. Dominic Thiem) and at Roland Garros this year (l. Alexander Zverev).
- **Last year here**, De Minaur reached the 2nd round (d. Kimmer Coppejans, l. Matteo Berrettini).
- **Elsewhere in Grand Slam play this year**, De Minaur reached the round of 16 at the Australian Open, falling to Andrey Rublev in 5 sets.
- Prior to Wimbledon this year, De Minaur won his **9th Tour-level title** – and 2nd on grass – at 's-Hertogenbosch (d. Sebastian Korda). He also competed at Queen's but fell to Lorenzo Musetti in the 1st round. His other grass court title came at 2021 Eastbourne (d. Lorenzo Sonego). He is one of 6 players competing here this year to have won multiple Tour-level titles on grass.
- De Minaur's **other highlights in 2024** are winning the title at Acapulco (d. Casper Ruud), finishing runner-up at Rotterdam (l. Jannik Sinner) and reaching the quarterfinals at Monte Carlo-1000 (l. Djokovic). He is one of 10 players to have won multiple Tour-level titles in 2024.
- De Minaur has lost both **5-set matches** he has contested at Wimbledon – falling to Steve Johnson in 5 sets in the 2nd round in 2019 and to Garin in the round of 16 in 2022. He has a 3-6 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- De Minaur **broke the Top 10 for the first time** in January this year and reached a career-high ranking of No. 7 last month. He plays here 2 places lower at No. 9.
- De Minaur is a **former Wimbledon boys' singles finalist**. He reached the boys' singles final here in 2016 (l. Denis Shapovalov). He reached a career-high junior ranking of No. 2 in February 2016 and also reached the semifinals of the boys' singles at the 2015 US Open (l. Tommy Paul) and the 2016 Australian Open (l. Jurabek Karimov).
- De Minaur made his **Davis Cup** debut in 2018 and was a member of the team which finished runners-up to Canada in 2022 and to Italy last year. He has a 15-8 win-loss record in the competition. As runners-up last year, Australia qualified automatically for the 2024 Davis Cup Finals Group Stage in September and will compete in Group B in Valencia alongside Czechia, France and Spain.
- De Minaur is coached by Adolfo Gutierrez.

A 4th meeting for Fritz and Musetti and their 2nd at a Grand Slam. Their only previous meeting at a Grand Slam came in the 1st round here in 2022, when Fritz won in straight sets.

Fritz and Musetti are both former junior world No. 1s and junior Grand Slam winners. Fritz reached the junior No. 1 ranking in June 2015, won the boys' singles title at the 2015 US Open, finished runner-up in the boys' singles at 2015 Roland Garros, and was named ITF Junior World Champion for 2015. Musetti reached the junior No. 1 ranking in June 2019, won the boys' singles title at the 2019 Australian Open and finished runner-up in the boys' singles at the 2018 US Open. Fritz reached the boys' singles semifinal here in 2014 and 2015, while Musetti reached the boys' singles quarterfinals on his only appearance in the junior event here in 2018.

- **FRITZ** is bidding to reach the semifinals at a Grand Slam for the first time. This is his 8th Wimbledon appearance and his 32nd Grand Slam overall.
- Fritz is bidding to become the **24th American man in the Open Era to reach the semifinals at Wimbledon**. He would become the 3rd American man to reach the semifinals here since Andy Roddick made his 4th and final appearance in the semifinals here in 2009 – after Sam Querrey (2017) and John Isner (2018).
- Fritz is bidding to reach his first Grand Slam semifinal and become the **47th American man in the Open Era to reach the semifinals at a Grand Slam**. He would become the 4th active American player to reach the men's singles semifinals at a Grand Slam – after Frances Tiafoe (2022 US Open), Tommy Paul (2023 Australian Open) and Ben Shelton (2023 US Open).
- Wimbledon is Fritz's 2nd-most successful Grand Slam event in terms of matches won, after the Australian Open. (see table overleaf)

- By reaching the quarterfinals here for the 2nd time, Fritz has become the **20th American man in the Open Era to reach the quarterfinals at Wimbledon on multiple occasions** – and the first since Querrey, who reached the quarterfinals here in 2016, 2017 and 2019. He is the only active American player to reach the men’s singles quarterfinals here on multiple occasions.
- By reaching his 4th Grand Slam quarterfinal, Fritz has also become the **26th American man in the Open Era to reach the quarterfinals at the Grand Slams on 4 or more occasions** – and the first since Querrey, who reached the quarterfinals at the 2017 US Open in addition to his 3 quarterfinal appearances at Wimbledon. He has also become the first active American player to reach the men’s singles quarterfinals at the Grand Slams on 4 or more occasions.
- By joining Paul in the quarterfinals here, it is the **first time that multiple American men have reached the quarterfinals at Wimbledon since 2000** – when Andre Agassi, Jan-Michael Gambill and Pete Sampras all reached the quarterfinals here. Multiple American men have now reached the quarterfinals at 3 of the last 7 Grand Slam tournaments – at the 2023 Australian Open (Paul, Sebastian Korda and Ben Shelton), the 2023 US Open (Fritz, Shelton and Frances Tiafoe), and here this year.
- By reaching the quarterfinals here, Fritz has equalled his **best Grand Slam result**. He also reached the quarterfinals here in 2022, when he fell to Rafael Nadal in 5 sets, and at back-to-back Grand Slams at the 2023 US Open and 2024 Australian Open, falling to Novak Djokovic on both occasions.
- **Last year here**, Fritz reached the 2nd round, defeating Yannick Hanfmann in 5 sets before falling to Mikael Ymer in 5 sets despite holding a 2-0 lead.
- **Elsewhere in Grand Slam play this year**, Fritz reached the round of 16 at Roland Garros (l. Casper Ruud).
- Prior to Wimbledon this season, Fritz **won his 3rd title at Eastbourne**, defeating Max Purcell in the final to become the first 3-time champion in the tournament’s history. He also reached the quarterfinals at Queen’s (l. Jordan Thompson). He is one of 7 players competing here this year to have won multiple Tour-level titles on grass.
- Fritz is bidding to become **the first American man to win multiple Tour-level titles on grass in the same year since 1999**, when Sampras won the titles at both Queen’s and Wimbledon.
- Fritz’s **other highlights in 2024** are winning the title at Delray Beach (d. Tommy Paul), finishing runner-up at Munich (l. Jan-Lennard Struff), reaching the semifinals at Madrid-1000 (l. Andrey Rublev) and reaching the quarterfinals at Rome-1000 (l. Alexander Zverev). He is one of 10 players to have won multiple Tour-level titles this season.
- Fritz is bidding to record his 9th consecutive match-win and **equal the longest Tour-level winning streak of his career**. His longest Tour-level winning streak is 9 consecutive victories in 2022, when he won a match during USA’s Davis Cup Qualifiers victory over Colombia, won 6 matches en route to the title at Indian Wells-1000 and won 2 matches en route to a round of 16 finish at Miami-1000. By winning 8 consecutive matches from the 1st round at Eastbourne through the round of 16 here, he has equalled his longest Tour-level winning streak on grass, having also won the title at Eastbourne and won his opening 4 matches here before falling in the quarterfinals in 2022.
- By defeating Zverev in the round of 16, Fritz recorded his **3rd successful comeback from 0-2 down**. He also recovered from 0-2 down to defeat Zverev’s older brother, Mischa Zverev, in the 1st round at the 2018 US Open, and recovered from 0-2 down to defeat Kevin Anderson in the 2nd round at the 2020 Australian Open. He has a 3-3 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Wimbledon and an 11-10 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Fritz reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 5 in February 2023. He plays here at No. 12.
- Fritz is a **former junior world No. 1**. He was named 2015 ITF Junior World Champion after winning the boys’ singles title at the 2015 US Open (d. Paul). He also finished as runner-up in the boys’ singles at 2015 Roland Garros (l. Paul). His best result in the boys’ singles here was reaching the semifinals in 2015 (l. Reilly Opelka).

- Fritz made his **Davis Cup** debut in 2019 and has a 6-3 win-loss record in the competition. USA defeated Ukraine in the Qualifiers in February to reach the 2024 Davis Cup Finals and will compete in Group C in Zhuhai alongside Germany, Slovakia and Chile.
- Both of Fritz's parents were professional tennis players. His mother, Kathy May, is a former Top 10 player.
- Fritz is coached by Michael Russell and Paul Annacone.
- **MUSETTI** is bidding to reach the semifinals at a Grand Slam for the first time. This is his 4th Wimbledon appearance and his 14th Grand Slam overall.
- Musetti is bidding to become the **4th Italian man in history to reach the semifinals at Wimbledon** – after Nicola Pietrangeli (1960), Matteo Berrettini (2021) and Jannik Sinner (2023).
- Sinner is bidding to become the **11th Italian man in history to reach the semifinals at a Grand Slam**. He would become the 4th active Italian man to reach a Grand Slam semifinal, after Berrettini, Sinner and Marco Cecchinato.

- If Musetti wins today and equals the achievement of Jasmine Paolini, who has reached the women's singles semifinals here, it will be **the 2nd time in history that an Italian man and woman have reached the semifinals at a Grand Slam** – after Roland Garros this year, when Sinner and Paolini both reached the semifinals.
- By reaching the quarterfinals here for the first time, Musetti has become the **7th Italian man in history to reach the quarterfinals at Wimbledon** – after Uberto de Morpurgo (1928), Pietrangeli (1955 and 1960), Adriano Panatta (1979), Davide Sanguinetti (1998), Berrettini (2021) and Sinner (2022, 2023 and 2024).
- With Sinner, Musetti and Paolini all reaching the quarterfinals here, it is the **first time in history that 3 Italian players have reached the quarterfinals at a Grand Slam**. It is the 4th time in history that at least one Italian man and one Italian woman have reached the quarterfinals at a Grand Slam – after Roland Garros in 2011 (Fabio Fognini and Francesca Schiavone), 2020 (Sinner and Martina Trevisan) and 2024 Roland Garros (Sinner and Paolini).
- With Musetti and Sinner both reaching the quarterfinals here, it is the **first time in history that multiple Italian men have reached the quarterfinals at Wimbledon**. It is the 7th time that multiple Italian men have reached the quarterfinals at a Grand Slam – after Roland Garros in 1948 (Giovanni Cucelli and Marcello del Bello), 1956 (Giuseppe Merlo and Pietrangeli), 1960 (Pietrangeli and Orlando Sirola) and 1973 (Paolo Bertolucci and Panatta), and the 2022 Australian Open (Berrettini and Sinner) and 2022 US Open (Berrettini and Sinner).
- By reaching the quarterfinals at a Grand Slam for the first time, Musetti has become the **19th Italian man in history to reach the quarterfinals at a Grand Slam**. He is the 5th active Italian male player to reach the quarterfinals at a Grand Slam – after Sinner (who has reached his 8th Grand Slam quarterfinal here), Berrettini (6 Grand Slam quarterfinal appearances) and Cecchinato and Fognini (both one).
- By reaching the quarterfinals here, Musetti has recorded his **best Grand Slam result**. His previous best Grand Slam result was reaching the round of 16 at Roland Garros on 2 occasions – on his Grand Slam debut in 2021, when he led Djokovic 2-0 before retiring due to a lower back injury in the 5th set, and in 2023 (l. Carlos Alcaraz).
- **Last year here**, Musetti reached the 3rd round. He defeated Juan Pablo Varillas and Jaume Munar to record his first Wimbledon match-wins before falling to Hubert Hurkacz.

- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Musetti reached the 3rd round at Roland Garros, where he defeated Daniel Elahi Galan and Gael Monfils before falling to Djokovic, and the 2nd round at the Australian Open (d. Benjamin Bonzi, l. Luca van Assche).
- Prior to Wimbledon this year, Musetti reached his **first Tour-level final on grass** at Queen's (l. Tommy Paul). He also reached the semifinals at Stuttgart (l. Berrettini).
- Musetti's **other Tour-level highlights this season** are reaching the quarterfinals at Adelaide (l. Alexander Bublik) and the round of 16 at Miami-1000 (l. Alcaraz). He has contested 2 events at Challenger-level this season, finishing runner-up at both the Cagliari Challenger (ITA) (l. Mariano Navone) and the Turin Challenger (ITA) (l. Francesco Passaro).
- Musetti is bidding to **defeat a Top 20 player at Wimbledon for the first time**. He has lost all 3 of his previous matches to Top 20 players here – to No. 18 Hurkacz in the 1st round in 2021, to No. 14 Fritz in the 1st round in 2022 and to No. 18 Hurkacz in the 3rd round last year. The highest-ranked player he has defeated at Wimbledon is No. 37 Luciano Darderi in the 2nd round this year.
- Musetti is bidding to **defeat a Top 20 player at a Grand Slam for the 3rd time**. He has a 2-9 win-loss record against Top 20 players at the Grand Slams overall, with both of his wins coming at Roland Garros – against No. 13 David Goffin in the 1st round in 2021 and against No. 13 Cameron Norrie in the 3rd round in 2023. He has a 21-37 win-loss record against Top 20 players at Tour-level overall.
- Musetti's 5-set victory over Darderi in the 2nd round here this year was the **first 5-set match he has contested at Wimbledon**. He has a 3-6 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Musetti **broke the Top 20 for the first time** in January 2023 and reached a career-high ranking of No. 15 in June last year. He plays here at No. 25.
- Musetti is a **former junior world No. 1**, reaching the top ranking in June 2019. He won the boys' singles title at the 2019 Australian Open (d. Emilio Nava) and finished runner-up in the boys' singles at the 2018 US Open (l. Thiago Seyboth Wild). He reached the quarterfinals of the boys' singles here in 2018 (l. Jack Draper).
- Musetti made his **Davis Cup** debut for Italy in 2021 and has a 2-3 win-loss record in the competition. Italy will compete in Bologna alongside Canada, Sweden and Chile in Group A at the 2023 Davis Cup Finals.
- Musetti is coached by Simone Tartarini.
