A record 25th Grand Slam title for Djokovic...

Novak Djokovic is bidding to win his 25th Grand Slam title and claim sole ownership of the all-time record for most Grand Slam singles titles, ahead of Margaret Court. Victory for Djokovic today would also see him equal Roger Federer's all-time record of 8 Wimbledon men's singles titles (and just the 4th player in history to win 8 or more singles titles here, after Federer, Martina Navratilova and Helen Wills Moody) and see him become the first player in history to win 8 or more singles titles at 2 different Grand Slam events.

... or 4 Grand Slam finals without defeat for Alcaraz?

Carlos Alcaraz is bidding to win his 4th Grand Slam title in his 4th Grand Slam final and become just the 8th player in history to win his first 4 Grand Slam men's singles finals – and the 2nd in the Open Era after Federer, who won the first 7 Grand Slam finals he contested. Victory for Alcaraz today would also see him become the 9th man in the Open Era to retain the Wimbledon title, the 6th man in the Open Era to win Roland Garros and Wimbledon in the same year and the 2nd Spanish man in history to win multiple Wimbledon titles.

Prize money

Today's champion receives £2,700,000 in prize money, while the runner-up collects £1,400,000. In total, the prize fund for the men's singles event at 2024 Wimbledon is £17,942,000.

Top 5 unchanged after Wimbledon

Jannik Sinner is guaranteed to remain as world No. 1 when the new ATP rankings are published on Monday, regardless of the result of today's final. Djokovic and Alcaraz will remain at No. 2 and No. 3, respectively, ahead of Alexander Zverev and Daniil Medvedev. Alex de Minaur, who is projected to rise 3 places to a new career-high ranking of No. 6, will be the biggest mover in the Top 10.

No. 2 v No. 3

This is the 4th Wimbledon men's singles final in the Open Era between the No. 2 seed and the No. 3 seed – after 1989 (when No. 3 Boris Becker defeated No. 2 Stefan Edberg), 1990 (when No. 3 Edberg defeated No. 2 Becker) and 1995 (when No. 2 Pete Sampras defeated No. 3 Becker).

This is the 10th Grand Slam men's singles final in the Open Era between the No. 2 seed and the No. 3 seed. In the previous 9 meetings, the No. 2 seed has won on 5 occasions and the No. 3 seed has won on 4 occasions.

Repeat finals

With Djokovic and Alcaraz reaching the final here for the 2nd straight year, they have become the 9th pair of players in the Open Era to contest multiple Wimbledon men's singles finals. It is also the first time that the same pair of players have contested the Wimbledon men's singles final in consecutive years since 2014-15, when Djokovic defeated Federer in back-to-back finals here.

Decades apart

With Djokovic (37 years 53 days) and Alcaraz (21 years 70 days) contesting the final here for the 2nd straight year, this match represents the joint-3rd largest age gap between players in a Grand Slam men's singles final in the Open Era – behind the 2 Grand Slam finals between Jimmy Connors and Ken Rosewall at Wimbledon and the US Open in 1974.

Djokovic is bidding to become the oldest man in the Open Era to win the Wimbledon title and the first player in the Open Era to win multiple Wimbledon titles after turning 35. He has become the first man in the Open Era to reach 3 finals here after turning 35 and is one of 3 men in the Open Era to have reached the Wimbledon final aged 35 or older – alongside Federer and Rosewall, who both reached 2 finals here after turning 35.

Djokovic is also bidding to win his 5th Grand Slam title since turning 35 and extend his Open Era record for most Grand Slam singles titles won aged 35 or older. He claimed sole ownership of the record, ahead of Federer and Rosewall, by winning the title at the US Open last year.

By contrast, Alcaraz is bidding to become the 3rd player in the Open Era to win multiple Wimbledon men's singles titles aged 21 or under – after Becker and Bjorn Borg. He is also bidding to win his 4th Grand Slam title and equal the Open Era record for most Grand Slam men's singles titles won aged 21 or under, which is jointly held by Becker, Borg and Mats Wilander.

Wimbledon final appearances

By reaching the final here for the 10th time, Djokovic has closed the gap on Federer at the top of the all-time list for most Wimbledon men's singles final appearances.

By reaching his 2nd Wimbledon final, Alcaraz has become the 4th active player to reach the Wimbledon men's singles final on multiple occasions. Last year, Alcaraz became the 43rd man in the Open Era to reach the Wimbledon final.

2024 Wimbledon breaks record for most five-set matches in the Open Era

This tournament has set a new Open Era record for most 5-set matches at a Grand Slam tournament, with 37 five-set matches being contested here so far this year. The previous Open Era record for most 5-set matches at a Grand Slam tournament was 35 – jointly held by the 1983 US Open and the 2024 Australian Open.

This tournament has also set the Open Era record for most comebacks from 0-2 down at Wimbledon, with 11 successful comebacks from 0-2 down here this year. The previous Open Era record for most 0-2 comebacks at Wimbledon was 9 – in 1974, 1990 and 1997. It is the 2nd-highest number of 0-2 comebacks at a Grand Slam in the Open Era – after the 2002 Australian Open, when there were 14.

A 6th meeting for Djokovic and Alcaraz, their 3rd at a Grand Slam and their 2nd at Wimbledon. The pair are level at 1-1 in their Grand Slam meetings. It is their 3rd meeting in a final, with Alcaraz winning in the final here last year before Djokovic defeated Alcaraz in the final at 2023 Cincinnati-1000 the following month.

This is the 3rd meeting between Top 5 players at Wimbledon this year, after No. 5 Medvedev's victory over No. 1 Sinner in the quarterfinals and No. 3 Alcaraz's victory over Medvedev in the semifinals.

Djokovic has won 4 of the last 5 matches he has contested against Top 5 players at Wimbledon with his only defeat to a Top 5 player here in that time coming against No. 1 Alcaraz in the final last year. Prior to that match, his last defeat to a Top 5 player at Wimbledon came against No. 2 Andy Murray in the 2013 final. He has a 5-4 win-loss record against Top 5 players at Wimbledon overall.

Djokovic has won 4 of the last 6 matches he has contested against Top 5 players at the Grand Slams, with his only defeats to Top 5 players at the Grand Slams in that time coming against No. 1 Alcaraz in the final here last year and No. 4 Jannik Sinner in the semifinals at the Australian Open this year. He has a 39-25 win-loss record against Top 5 players at the Grand Slams overall.

Djokovic has lost his last 2 matches against Top 5 players at Tour-level – to No. 4 Sinner at both the 2023 Davis Cup Finals and at the 2024 Australian Open. He has a 122-78 win-loss record against Top 5 players at Tour-level overall.

Alcaraz has won 3 of the 4 matches he has contested against Top 5 players at Wimbledon – he fell to No. 2 Medvedev here in 2021, but has since defeated No. 3 Medvedev and No. 2 Djokovic in the semifinals and final last year, and No. 5 Medvedev in the semifinals this year.

Alcaraz has won 5 of the last 6 matches he has contested against Top 5 players at the Grand Slams, with his only defeat to a Top 5 player at the Grand Slams in that time coming against No. 3 Medvedev in the semifinals at the 2023 US Open. He has a 7-4 win-loss record against Top 5 players at the Grand Slams overall.

Alcaraz is bidding to extend a 5-match Tour-level winning streak against Top 5 players. Since losing to No. 1 Djokovic in the semifinals at the 2023 ATP Finals, he has defeated No. 3 Sinner and No. 4 Medvedev in the semifinals and final at Indian Wells-1000 this year, No. 2 Sinner and No. 4 Zverev in the semifinals and final at Roland Garros last month, and No. 5 Medvedev in the semifinals here on Friday. He has a 17-9 win-loss record against Top 5 players at Tour-level overall.

- Djokovic is bidding to win his **99th Tour-level title**. He is in 3rd place on the Open Era list for most Tour-level titles won – behind Jimmy Connors (109 Tour-level titles) and Federer (103). Of Djokovic's 98 Tour-level singles titles, 8 have come on grass – in addition to his 7 Wimbledon titles, he also won the title on grass at 2017 Eastbourne (d. Gael Monfils). He has won 71 titles on hard courts and 19 titles on clay.
- Djokovic is bidding to record his 376th Grand Slam match-win. By defeating Francisco Cerundolo in the round of 16 at Roland Garros this year for his 370th Grand Slam match-win, he claimed sole ownership of the **all-time record for most Grand Slam singles matches won among men and women**, ahead of Federer.

- By reaching his 37th Grand Slam final, Djokovic has extended his **all-time record for most Grand Slam men's singles finals reached**. He claimed sole ownership of the record, ahead of Federer, by reaching his 32nd Grand Slam final at 2022 Wimbledon.
- By reaching his 37th Grand Slam final, Djokovic has extended his **all-time record for most Grand Slam singles finals reached among men and women**. He claimed sole ownership of the record, ahead of Chris Evert, by reaching his 35th Grand Slam final at Wimbledon last year.
- By reaching his 6th Grand Slam final since turning 35, Djokovic has equalled Rosewall's **Open Era record for most Grand Slam men's singles final appearances aged 35 or older**.
- Djokovic won his **22nd, 23rd and 24th Grand Slam titles in 2024** – he equalled Rafael Nadal's all-time record for most Grand Slam men's singles titles at the Australian Open (d. Stefanos Tsitsipas), claimed sole ownership of the record at Roland Garros (d. Casper Ruud) and equalled Margaret Court's all-time record for most Grand Slam singles titles among men and women at the US Open (d. Daniil Medvedev).
- Djokovic has **won 39 of his last 40 matches at Wimbledon and 39 of his last 40 Tour-level matches on grass**. His defeat to Alcaraz in the final last year ended a 34-match winning streak at Wimbledon – he had previously not lost here since retiring due to a right elbow injury in his quarterfinal match against Tomas Berdych in 2017. The defeat to Alcaraz also ended a 34-match Tour-level winning streak on grass – he had previously not lost a grass court match since falling to Marin Cilic in the final at 2018 Queen's.
- Djokovic is making his **19th consecutive Wimbledon appearance and contesting his 75th Grand Slam overall**. He is in joint-4th place on the Open Era list for most Wimbledon men's singles appearances alongside Fernando Verdasco – behind Federer (22 Wimbledon appearances) and Connors and Feliciano Lopez (both 20). He is in 3rd place on the Open Era list for most Grand Slam men's singles appearances – behind Federer and Lopez (both 81).
- In Grand Slam play this year**, Djokovic reached the semifinals at the Australian Open (l. Sinner) and the quarterfinals at Roland Garros, where he gave a walkover to Ruud due to a right knee injury.
- Djokovic's **other highlights in 2024** are reaching the semifinals at Monte Carlo-1000 (l. Ruud) and Geneva (l. Tomas Machac). He contested just 7 events prior to Wimbledon this season.
- Djokovic **did not contest a grass court tournament prior to Wimbledon this year**. He is one of just 7 men in the Open Era to have won the title here without playing a warm-up event on grass, achieving the feat in 2011, 2014, 2015, 2019, 2021 and 2022.

- Djokovic has a 10-2 win-loss record in **5-set matches** at Wimbledon, with his only defeats in 5-set matches here coming against Mario Ancic in the round of 16 in 2006 and against Alcaraz in the final last year. He holds the record for most 5-set matches won at the Grand Slams (38-9) and has a 40-11 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Djokovic **holds the record for most weeks ranked No. 1**, having held the top ranking for a total of 428 weeks. His most-recent spell as world No. 1 ended last month, when he dropped to No. 3 following his withdrawal from Roland Garros. He rose to No. 2 on 24 June and plays here at the same ranking.
- Djokovic has played **Davis Cup** for Serbia since 2004, has a 44-16 win-loss record in the competition and led Serbia to their only title in the competition to date in 2010. Serbia will host Greece in a World Group I tie in September.
- Djokovic is currently without a permanent coach.
- **ALCARAZ** is bidding to become the 9th man in the Open Era to retain the Wimbledon title. This is his 4th Wimbledon appearance and his 14th Grand Slam overall.

- Alcaraz is bidding to become the **2nd Spanish player in history to win multiple Wimbledon titles** – after Rafael Nadal, who won the title here in 2008 and 2010. Manuel Santana, who won the title here in 1966, is the only other Spanish player to have won the men's singles title here. Conchita Martinez (1994) and Garbine Muguruza (2017) are the only other Spanish players to win singles titles at Wimbledon.
- Alcaraz is bidding to win his 4th Grand Slam title and equal Manuel Santana in **2nd place on the all-time list for most Grand Slam men's singles titles won by a Spanish player**.

- Alcaraz is bidding to become the **8th player in history to win his first 4 Grand Slam men's singles finals** – and the 2nd in the Open Era after Roger Federer, who won the first 7 Grand Slam finals he contested.

- Alcaraz has **won all 3 Grand Slam finals he has contested**. By winning his 3rd Grand Slam title at 2024 Roland Garros, he became the first man in the Open Era to win his first 3 Grand Slam titles on different surfaces and, aged 21 years 36 days, became the youngest man in the Open Era to win 3 Grand Slam titles on different surfaces.

- Wimbledon is Alcaraz's **most successful Grand Slam event in terms of finals reached** and 2nd-most successful Grand Slam event in terms of matches won, behind Roland Garros.

- By reaching his 2nd final here, Alcaraz has become the **2nd Spanish man in history to reach the final at Wimbledon on multiple occasions** – after Nadal, who won the title here in 2008 and 2010 and finished runner-up in 2006, 2007 and 2011. He is one of 3 Spanish men in history to have reached a Wimbledon final, alongside Nadal and Santana, whose only appearance in the final here was his title-victory in 1966. (NB Manuel Alonso-Areyzaga fell in the Wimbledon all-comers' final in 1921)
- By reaching his 4th Grand Slam final, Alcaraz has equalled Santana in **2nd place on the all-time list for most Grand Slam singles final appearances by a Spanish man**. Nadal, who has reached 30 Grand Slam finals, is the only Spanish man in history to have reached more Grand Slam finals than Alcaraz.
- By reaching his 2nd final here, Alcaraz has become the **4th man in the Open Era to reach multiple Wimbledon finals aged 21 or under** – after Becker (4 Wimbledon final appearances aged 21 or under) and Borg and Nadal (both 2). (NB ages calculated at the end of the tournament)
- By reaching his 4th Grand Slam final, Alcaraz has equalled Jim Courier in **joint-5th place on the Open Era list for most Grand Slam men's singles finals reached aged 21 or under**. Mats Wilander (6 Grand Slam final appearances aged 21 or under) and Becker, Borg and Nadal (all 5) are the only men in the Open Era to have reached more Grand Slam finals aged 21 or under than Alcaraz.
- Last year here, Alcaraz won his **first Wimbledon title**, defeating Djokovic in the final. He became the 3rd-youngest player in the Open Era to win the men's singles title here, after Becker (who won his first 2 Wimbledon titles aged 17 years 227 days in 1985 and aged 18 years 226 days in 1986) and Borg (who won his first Wimbledon title aged 20 years 27 days in 1976).
- Elsewhere in Grand Slam play this year**, Alcaraz reached the quarterfinals at the Australian Open (l. Alexander Zverev).
- Prior to Wimbledon this year**, Alcaraz reached the 2nd round as defending champion at Queen's (d. Francisco Cerundolo, l. Jack Draper). The defeat to Draper ended Alcaraz's 13-match winning streak on grass, with his last defeat on grass having come in the round of 16 at 2022 Wimbledon, when he fell to Jannik Sinner.
- Alcaraz's **other highlights in 2024** are winning the title at Indian Wells-1000 (d. Daniil Medvedev) and reaching the semifinals at Buenos Aires (l. Nicolas Jarry) and the quarterfinals at Miami-1000 (l. Grigor Dimitrov) and Madrid-1000 (l. Andrey Rublev). He is one of 10 players to have won multiple Tour-level titles prior to Wimbledon this season.
- Alcaraz has won 12 of the 13 **five-set matches** he has contested, including his 5-set victory against Frances Tiafoe in the 3rd round here this year. His only defeat in a 5-set match came against Matteo Berrettini in the 3rd round at the 2022 Australian Open. He became the first man in the Open Era to win the Roland Garros title after winning 5-set matches in both the semifinals and the final, defeating Sinner in the semifinals before defeating Zverev in the final. He has won all 3 five-set matches he has contested at Wimbledon.

- Aged 19 years 130 days, Alcaraz became the **youngest world No. 1 in history** after winning the title at the 2022 US Open. He has been ranked as world No. 1 for 36 weeks, most recently between June and September 2023. He plays here at No. 3.
- Alcaraz **led Spain to victory at the 2018 Junior Davis Cup Finals in Budapest**, defeating France in the title match. He reached a career-high junior ranking of No. 22 in January 2020 and his best performance in the junior events at the Grand Slams was his quarterfinal finish in the boys' singles here in 2019.
- Alcaraz has played **Davis Cup** for Spain since 2022 and has won 2 of the 3 matches he has contested in the competition. Spain were awarded a wild card for the 2024 Davis Cup Finals Group Stage and will compete in Group B in Valencia alongside Australia, Czechia and France.
- Alcaraz is coached by former world No. 1 Juan Carlos Ferrero, who reached the quarterfinals here in 2007 and 2009.
