





# PARIS 2024 OLYMPIC TENNIS EVENT TOURNAMENT PREVIEW

Tennis is featuring at the Summer Olympic Games for the 17th time as a full-medal sport. The sport was part of the inaugural Summer Olympics in 1896 and remained on the programme until 1924. It returned as a full-medal sport at Seoul 1988 (after being played as a demonstration event in both 1968 and 1984). Since then, the men's and women's singles and men's and women's doubles have been played at every Olympic Tennis Event, with the mixed doubles returning at London 2012.

Great Britain's Charlotte Cooper became the first individual woman to win a gold medal in any Olympic sport when she won the women's tennis singles at Paris 1900.

The Olympic Tennis Event is taking place on outdoor clay courts for the 7th time overall and the 2nd time in the modern era, after 1992 Barcelona. Both Court Philippe Chatrier and Court Suzanne Lenglen have retractable roofs – marking the 3rd time since tennis returned to the Olympics in 1988 that matches can be played indoors, after London 2012 and Tokyo 2020.

#### ALCARAZ AND KREJCIKOVA AIM TO CONTINUE MOMENTUM

Carlos Alcaraz and Barbora Krejcikova are both bidding to add an Olympic gold medal to the Wimbledon singles titles the pair won earlier in July.

Alcaraz is making his debut at the Olympics, and enters the Olympic Games as the world No. 3 – and the No. 2 seed following Jannik Sinner's withdrawal on Thursday. He will also team up with 2-time Olympic gold medallist Rafael Nadal, who won men's singles gold at Beijing 2008 and men's doubles gold alongside Marc Lopez at Rio 2016, in the men's doubles event.

Krejcikova is making her 2nd appearance at the Olympics, having made her debut at Tokyo 2020. She reached the 3rd round in the women's singles in Tokyo, and took the gold medal in women's doubles alongside Katerina Siniakova. She will play alongside Siniakova here as the No. 2 seeds in the women's doubles event.

## ROLAND GARROS CHAMPIONS BID FOR FURTHER SUCCESS IN PARIS

Alcaraz is bidding to become the 2nd player to win the Roland Garros men's singles title and the Olympic men's singles gold medal since tennis returned to the Games at Seoul 1988 – after Nadal, who won his 4th title at Roland Garros and Olympic men's singles gold at Beijing in 2008.

Iga Swiatek is bidding to become the 2nd player to win the Roland Garros women's singles title and the Olympic women's singles gold medal since tennis returned to the Games at Seoul 1988 – after Steffi Graf, who won the 'Golden Slam' (winning the title all 4 Grand Slam tournaments and the Olympic gold medal) in women's singles in 1988.

### THE CAREER GOLDEN SLAM

24-time Grand Slam singles champion Novak Djokovic is bidding to become the 5th player to win all 4 Grand Slam singles titles and an Olympic gold medal in singles during his career – after Graf, Nadal, Andre Agassi and and Serena Williams.

Four doubles teams have won the 'career Golden Slam' – Todd Woodbridge/Mark Woodforde and Bob Bryan/Mike Bryan in men's doubles, and Serena Williams/Venus Williams and defending Olympic champions Krejcikova/Siniakova in women's doubles.

In addition to those 3 doubles teams, 4 individual doubles players have won the 'career Golden Slam' – Gigi Fernandez, Daniel Nestor, defending Olympic men's doubles champion Mate Pavic, and Pam Shriver.

Italian Sara Errani is the only player across the men's and women's doubles draws who can complete the 'career Golden Slam' – the former doubles world No. 1 has won 5 Grand Slam doubles titles, all with compatriot Robert Vinci, who has since retired from professional tennis. Errani takes to the court alongside Roland Garros and Wimbledon women's singles runner-up Jasmine Paolini, with whom she reached the Roland Garros women's doubles final last month.

## WORLD NO. 1s AT THE OLYMPICS

With men's world No. 1 Sinner withdrawing due to illness on Thursday, Paris 2024 will extend the streak of no male No. 1-ranked player winning an Olympic singles gold medal since tennis returned to the Olympics at Seoul 1988. The highest-ranked male players to have won gold since then are No. 2 Nadal at Beijing 2008 and No. 2 Andy Murray at Rio 2016.

Swiatek would become the 3rd No. 1-ranked player to win the women's singles gold medal at the Olympics – after Graf at Seoul 1988 and Justine Henin at Athens 2004.

At Tokyo 2020, the top-seeded team won the gold medal in both men's and women's doubles in Mektic/Pavic and Krejcikova/Siniakova respectively. In the women's singles, No. 1 seed Ashleigh Barty lost in the 1st round, and in the mixed doubles, top seeds Kristina Mladenovic/Nicolas Mahut also fell in the 1st round. Men's singles No. 1 seed Djokovic finished 4th after reaching the semifinals, falling to eventual gold medallist Zverev and losing the bronze medal match to Pablo Carreno Busta.

#### **DEFENDING THE GOLD MEDAL**

By winning the men's singles gold medal at Tokyo 2020, Alexander Zverev became the first Olympic tennis gold medallist for Germany since Boris Becker and Michael Stich won men's doubles gold at Barcelona 1992, and the first German gold medallist in singles since Graf won women's singles gold at Seoul 1988.

Zverev is bidding to become the 2nd player ever to defend an Olympic singles title at Paris 2024 – after Murray, who won singles gold at both London 2012 and Rio 2016.

Both the men's and women's doubles gold medallists from Tokyo 2020 will defend their titles at Paris 2024. Nikola Mektic/Mate Pavic won Croatia's first gold medal in Olympic tennis at Tokyo 2020 and will bid to become the first team to successfully defend an Olympic men's doubles title since tennis returned to the Games at Seoul 1988.

Krejcikova/Siniakova won Czechia's first gold medal in Olympic tennis at Tokyo 2020 (NB Miloslav Mecir, a Slovak player, represented Czechoslovakia when he won men's singles gold at Seoul 1988). The pair will bid to become the 3rd team to successfully defend an Olympic women's doubles title since 1988 – after Fernandez/Fernandez, who won gold at both Barcelona 1992 and Atlanta 1996, and Williams/Williams, who won gold at both Beijing 2008 and London 2012 (in addition to their gold medal at Sydney 2000).

The Tokyo 2020 women's singles gold medallist, Belinda Bencic, is not competing at Paris 2024, nor are Tokyo 2020 mixed doubles gold medallists Anastasia Pavlyuchenkova/Andrey Rublev.

## FRENCH CONTENDERS

Six French players have won medals at the Olympic Tennis Event since tennis returned to the Games in 1988 – most recently at London 2012, when Michael Llodra and Jo-Wilfried Tsonga won men's doubles silver and Julien Benneteau and Richard Gasquet won men's doubles bronze.

France is fielding 10 players across the men's and women's singles and doubles events here – Clara Burel, Arthur Fils, Caroline Garcia, Varvara Gracheva, Ugo Humbert, Gael Monfils, Corentin Moutet, Diane Parry, Fabien Reboul and Edouard Roger-Vasselin.

Should any of the 10 French players across singles and doubles win a gold medal here, it would be France's first gold medal at the Olympic Tennis Event since Antwerp 1920, when Suzanne Lenglen and Max Decugis won gold in the mixed doubles together and Lenglen won gold in the women's singles.

Since tennis' return to the Olympics in 1988, just 3 players have won Olympic singles gold on home soil – USA's Agassi and Lindsay Davenport, who both won gold at Atlanta 1966, and Great Britain's Murray, who won his first Olympic gold at London 2012.

## **CARRYING THE FLAG**

Four tennis players have been named as their nation's flagbearers at the Paris 2024 Opening Ceremony on Friday 26 July: Coco Gauff (USA), Nicolas Jarry (Chile), Danka Kovinic (Montenegro) and Elina Svitolina (Ukraine).

#### THE LAST DANCE

Three-time Olympic medallist Murray and Rio 2016 women's singles silver medallist Angelique Kerber have both announced that the Paris 2024 Olympic Tennis Event will be the final events of their tennis career before retirement.

## MOST OLYMPIC MEDALS IN TENNIS

Murray and Nadal are both bidding to become the 4th man – and the first since tennis returned to the Olympics at Seoul 1988 – to win 4 Olympic medals in tennis. Both men will compete in both singles and doubles, Murray alongside Dan Evans, and Nadal alongside Alcaraz.

#### WINNING SINGLES AND DOUBLES TITLES

Since tennis returned to the Olympics at Seoul 1988, just 3 players have won the singles and doubles titles at the same Olympic Tennis Event – Venus Williams (Sydney 2000), Nicolas Massu (Athens 2004) and Serena Williams (London 2012). No player has ever won gold in singles, doubles and mixed doubles at the same Olympic Tennis Event.

# WINNING SINGLES, DOUBLES AND MIXED MEDALS

No player in the modern era has won medals in singles, doubles and mixed doubles at the same Olympic Tennis Event. Seven players achieved the feat between 1900 and 1924. (NB Mixed doubles was reintroduced at the Olympic Tennis Event at London 2012)

## GRAND SLAM CHAMPIONS BID FOR OLYMPIC GOLD

A total of 14 Grand Slam singles champions are competing at Tokyo 2020, including 3 of the 5 players who have won Grand Slam singles titles in 2024 – Roland Garros and Wimbledon men's singles champion Alcaraz, Roland Garros women's singles champion Swiatek and Wimbledon women's singles champion Krejcikova.

#### **OLYMPIC DEBUTANTS**

In the women's singles draw, Gauff and Zheng Qinwen are the only 2 players from the Top 8 seeds who are making their Olympic debut. In the men's singles draw, 4 of the Top 8 seeds are making their Olympic debuts at Paris 2024 – Alcaraz, Alex de Minaur, Taylor Fritz, Casper Ruud.

### MOST OLYMPIC APPEARANCES

Leander Paes holds the record for most Olympic appearances since Seoul 1988, having played at 7 consecutive Olympic Tennis Events between 1992 and 2016. Djokovic, Murray and Kei Nishikori are all competing at their 5th Olympic Tennis Event, equalling Mahesh Bhupathi, Mark Knowles and Max Mirnyi in 3rd place on the list for most Olympics contested by a male tennis player. Nadal, Gael Monfils and Jean-Julien Rojer are all making their 4th Olympic appearances here.

## YOUTH OLYMPIANS GRADUATE TO THE BIG TIME

A total of 24 players (6 men, 18 women) who competed at one of the 3 Youth Olympic Games are competing at Paris 2024.

At Tokyo 2020, Andrey Rublev and Karen Khachanov became the first tennis players to win medals at both the Youth Olympic Games and the Olympic Games. Rublev won boys' singles bronze and boys' doubles silver with Khachanov at Nanjing 2014. Rublev then won mixed doubles gold with Anastasia Pavlyuchenkova at Tokyo 2020, while Khachanov won men's singles silver.

Of the 24 former Youth Olympians competing here, 11 won medals at the Youth Olympic Games. China, P.R.'s Zheng Saisai, Argentina's Sebastian Baez, Poland's Iga Swiatek, Ukraine's Anhelina Kalinina and Australia's Daria Saville all have the chance to become the first tennis player to win gold medals at both the Youth Olympic Games and the Olympic Games.

#### **BOPANNA SETS NEW AGE RECORD**

Aged 44 years 123 days, Rohan Bopanna is bidding to become the oldest Olympic medallist in any tennis category for 116 years. If he wins a medal in the men's doubles alongside N. Siram Balaji, he will become the oldest player to win an Olympic medal since Great Britain's George Hillyard won the gold medal in the indoor men's doubles at 1908 London aged 44 years 159 days.

By competing at Paris 2024, Bopanna has become the oldest male tennis player since tennis returned to the Olympics at Seoul 1988 – ahead of 43-year-olds Daniel Nestor (43 years 345 days) and Leander Paes (43 years 58 days) at Rio 2016. Since Seoul 1988, Martina Navratilova is only player to have contested the Olympic Tennis Event aged older than Bopanna is now – Navratilova contested the women's doubles at Athens 2004 aged 47 years 309 days.

Four other doubles players here are bidding to enter the list for the Top 5 oldest men to win an Olympic medal – Netherlands' Jean-Julien Rojer (aged 42 years 346 days), Argentina's Maximo Gonzalez (41 years 16 days), France's Edouard Roger-Vasselin (40 years 250 days), and USA's Rajeev Ram (40 years 140 days).

## **ALCARAZ AIMS TO BREAK 100-YEAR RECORD**

Aged 21 years 94 days, 2024 Roland Garros champion Alcaraz is bidding to become the youngest player ever to win an Olympic gold medal in men's singles. Vincent Richards of the USA won men's singles gold 100 years ago, on clay, at Paris 1924, aged 21 years 123 days. (NB ages calculated at the end of the tournament).

Since tennis returned to the Olympics as a full-medal sport at Seoul 1988, the youngest player to win gold in Olympic men's singles is Marc Rosset. Aged 21 years 275 days, he won gold at Barcelona 1992, the last time Olympic tennis was contested on clay.

Two other players aged younger than 21 years 123 days are also vying to break the record, the youngest being Czechia's Jakub Mensik, aged 18 years 338 days.

## YOUNGEST AND OLDEST

The oldest player competing at the Olympic Tennis Event this year is India's Rohan Bopanna (44 years 123 days), who is competing in men's doubles alongside N. Sriram Balaji. The youngest player here is Mirra Andreeva (17 years 98 days), who is competing in women's singles and doubles alongside Diana Shnaider.

Barcelona 1992 women's singles champion Jennifer Capriati is the youngest player in history to win a gold medal at the Olympic Tennis Event. The youngest man in history to win gold is Friedrich Traun in men's doubles at Athens 1896 and the youngest man in the modern era to win gold is Marc Rosset (21 years 275 days) in men's singles at Barecelona 1992.

In the modern era, the oldest man to win gold is Max Mirnyi (35 years 31 days) in mixed doubles at London 2012 and the oldest woman to win gold is Gigi Fernandez (32 years 163 days) in women's doubles at Atlanta 1996.

# **MODERN-ERA MEDAL TABLE**

USA also tops the modern-era Olympic Tennis Event medal table. Since tennis returned to the Olympics at Seoul 1988, American singles players and doubles teams have won 14 of the 39 available gold medals. USA have also won the most total medals of any nation at the Olympic Tennis Event since 1988, with 24 Olympic medals in tennis in total in that time.
