Day session (from 1200 CET)

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On court today...

- Wimbledon champion Barbora Krejčíková begins the day on Court Philippe Chatrier, with the Czech No. 9 seed up against Spain's Sara Sorribes Tormo. Krejčíková, also a singles champion at Roland Garros in 2021, is looking to add to her medal collection this week, having won women's doubles gold at Tokyo 2020. The men's singles gold medallist from Tokyo is also set to begin his campaign against a Spanish player today, with Alexander Zverev up against Jaume Munar in the final match of the day on Chatrier.
- Andy Murray will be looking to match the achievement of Rafael Nadal and advance to the 2nd round of the men's doubles here, with Murray and Daniel Evans up against Taro Daniel and Kei Nishikori in the final match on Court Suzanne Lenglen. Nadal, meanwhile, faces Marton Fucsovics in a men's singles match on Court Philippe Chatrier – and a win for the Beijing 2008 singles gold medallist will set up a mouth-watering 2nd round clash with Novak Djokovic.

COURT PHILIPPE CHATRIER – WOMEN’S SINGLES NO. 9 BARBORA KREJCIKOVA (CZE) v SARA SORRIBES TORMO (ESP)

Tour-level head-to-head: Krejckikova leads 1-0

- **KREJCIKOVA** is bidding to reach the 2nd round at the Olympics for the 2nd time. This is her 2nd Olympics appearance.
- Krejckikova’s **made her Olympic debut at Tokyo 2020**, reaching the 3rd round in women’s singles – she defeated Zarina Diyas and Leylah Fernandez before falling to Belinda Bencic.
- Krejckikova **won women’s doubles gold at Tokyo 2020** alongside Katerina Siniakova, defeating Bencic/Viktorija Golubic in the final.
- Krejckikova **won her 2nd Grand Slam singles title** at Wimbledon this year, defeating Jasmine Paolini in the final. Her first Grand Slam title came at 2021 Roland Garros (d. Anastasia Pavlyuchenkova).
- **Elsewhere at the Grand Slams this year**, Krejckikova reached the quarterfinals at the Australian Open (l. Aryna Sabalenka) but fell in the 1st round at Roland Garros (l. Golubic).
- Krejckikova has **won 7 Grand Slam women’s doubles titles** alongside Siniakova – at Roland Garros in 2018 and 2021, at Wimbledon in 2018 and 2022, at the Australian Open in 2022 and 2023, and at the 2022 US Open. She has also won 3 Grand Slam mixed doubles titles – at the Australian Open in 2019-21.
- Krejckikova’s **other highlights in 2024** are reaching the quarterfinals at Abu Dhabi (l. Liudmila Samsonova) and Birmingham (l. Anastasia Potapova).
- Krejckikova achieved a **career-high singles ranking** of No. 2 in February 2022. She plays here at No. 10.
- Krejckikova reached a **career-high junior ranking of No. 3** and reached the girls’ singles quarterfinals at the Australian Open in 2012 (l. Yulia Putintseva) and 2013 (l. Ana Konjuh) and at 2013 Wimbledon (l. Taylor Townsend). She was part of the Czech team that finished 3rd at the 2011 Junior Billie Jean King Cup Finals.
- Krejckikova was **part of the Czech team that won the 2018 Billie Jean King Cup**, but did not contest a match that year. She made her Billie Jean King Cup debut for Czechia against Romania in the 2019 World Group quarterfinals and has a 5-5 win-loss record in the competition.
- Krejckikova is coached by Pavel Motl.
- **SORRIBES TORMO** is bidding to reach the 2nd round at the Olympics for the 2nd time. This is her 2nd Olympics appearance.
- Sorribes Tormo **made her Olympic debut at Tokyo 2020**, reaching the 3rd round in women’s singles – she defeated Ashleigh Barty and Fiona Ferro before falling to Anastasia Pavlyuchenkova. She also reached the 2nd round in women’s doubles alongside Paula Badosa (d. Giuilliana Olmos/Renata Zarazua, l. Krejckikova/Katerina Siniakova).
- Sorribes Tormo’s **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the round of 16 at 2023 Roland Garros (l. Beatriz Haddad Maia).
- Sorribes Tormo **lost in the 1st round at all 3 Grand Slam events this year** – at the Australian Open (l. Alina Korneeva), Roland Garros (l. Bianca Andreescu) and Wimbledon (l. Jasmine Paolini).
- Sorribes Tormo’s **best results in 2024** are reaching the quarterfinals at Rabat (l. Mayar Sherif) and the round of 16 at Madrid-1000 (l. Iga Swiatek).
- Sorribes Tormo is bidding to end an **8-match losing streak against Top 10 players**. She has not defeated a Top 10 player since defeating No. 1 Barty in the 1st round at the Tokyo Olympic Tennis Event in 2021. She has a 2-17 win-loss record against Top 10 players at Tour-level overall with her only other victory against a Top 10 player coming against No. 10 Naomi Osaka during Spain’s 2020 Billie Jean King Cup Qualifiers victory against Japan.

- Sorribes Tormo reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 32 in February 2022. She plays here at No. 71.
- Sorribes Tormo has played **Billie Jean King Cup** for Spain since 2015 and has a 10-6 overall win-loss record in the competition. Spain will play Poland in their opening tie at the 2024 Billie Jean King Cup Finals in Malaga in November.
- Sorribes Tormo is coached by Silvia Soler Espinosa.

COURT PHILIPPE CHATRIER – MEN’S SINGLES MARTON FUCSOVICS (HUN) v RAFAEL NADAL (ESP)

Head-to-head: first meeting

- **FUCSOVICS** is making his Olympic debut today.
- Fucsovics’ **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the quarterfinals at 2021 Wimbledon. He defeated Jannik Sinner, Jiri Vesely, Diego Schwartzman and Andrey Rublev before falling to eventual champion Novak Djokovic. He became the first Hungarian man to reach a Grand Slam quarterfinal since Balazs Taroczy at 1981 Roland Garros and the first to do so at Wimbledon since Jozsef Asboth in 1948.
- Fucsovics has **lost in the 1st round at all 3 Grand Slam events in 2024** – at the Australian Open (l. Grigor Dimitrov), Roland Garros (l. Stefanos Tsitsipas) and Wimbledon (l. Matteo Berrettini).
- Fucsovics’ best result in 2024 is winning his **2nd Tour-level title** at Bucharest (d. Mariano Navone). He also reached the quarterfinals at Estoril (l. Casper Ruud). His only other Tour-level title came at 2018 Geneva (d. Peter Gojowczyk), where he became the first Hungarian man to win a Tour-level title since Taroczy at 1982 Hilversum.
- Fucsovics reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 31 in March 2019. He plays here at No. 83.
- Fucsovics has played **Davis Cup** for Hungary since 2010 and has a 33-20 overall win-loss record in the competition. Hungary will play away against Egypt in a World Group I tie in September.
- Fucsovics is coached by Adam Kellner.
- **NADAL** is bidding to reach the 2nd round at the Olympics for the 3rd time. This is his 3rd Olympics appearance in singles and his 4th overall.
- Nadal has **won 2 Olympic gold medals**. He won the men’s singles gold medal at Beijing 2008 (d. Fernando Gonzalez) and won the men’s doubles gold medal alongside Marc Lopez at Rio 2016 (d. Florin Mergea/Horia Tecau). He also finished 4th in singles at Rio 2016, falling to Juan Martin del Potro in the semifinals and to Kei Nishikori in the bronze medal match.
- Nadal has **won 22 Grand Slams singles titles**. He has won 14 titles at Roland Garros, 4 titles at the US Open and 2 titles at both the Australian Open and Wimbledon.
- Nadal **missed the Australian Open and Wimbledon this season** and fell in the 1st round at Roland Garros (l. Alexander Zverev). It was the 3rd time he had lost in the 1st round at a Grand Slam – after 2013 Wimbledon (l. Steve Darcis) and the 2016 Australian Open (l. Fernando Verdasco).
- Nadal’s **best Tour-level result in 2024** is a runner-up finish at Bastad (l. Nuno Borges). He also reached the quarterfinals at Brisbane (l. Jordan Thompson) and the round of 16 at Madrid-1000 (l. Jiri Lehecka). He has contested 6 Tour-level events in 2024 prior to the Olympics.
- At 38 years 62 days, Nadal is the **2nd-oldest player to compete in singles since tennis returned to the Olympics at Seoul 1988** – after Stan Wawrinka, who is competing here this year aged 39 years 130 days. The oldest player to have competed in singles at the Olympic Tennis Event in the modern era prior to this year was Chinese Taipei’s Yen-Hsun Lu, who competed in men’s singles at Tokyo 2020 aged 37 years 352 days. (NB ages calculated at the end of the tournament)
- Nadal **became world No. 1** for the first time in August 2008 and has been ranked at No. 1 for a total of 209 weeks. He spent 912 consecutive weeks in the Top 10 between 25 April 2005 and 20 March 2023, a men’s record for most consecutive weeks spent in the world’s Top 10. He plays here at No. 161 and entered the Olympic Tennis Event using a protected ranking of No. 9.
- Nadal is a **4-time Davis Cup champion**. He made his debut in the competition in 2004, has a 37-5 Davis Cup win-loss record and was part of the Spanish teams which won the title in 2004, 2008, 2011 and 2019. He holds the record for most Davis Cup titles among active players. Spain were awarded a wild card for the 2024 Davis Cup Finals Group Stage and will compete in Group B in Valencia alongside Australia, Czechia and France.

- Nadal is coached by Carlos Moya, Marc Lopez and Gustavo Marcaccio. He competed in men's doubles at the Olympics alongside Moya at Athens 2004 and alongside Lopez at Rio 2016.

COURT PHILIPPE CHATRIER – WOMEN’S SINGLES NO. 2 COCO GAUFF (USA) v AJLA TOMLJANOVIC (AUS)

Head-to-head: first meeting

- **GAUFF** is making her Olympic debut today.
- Gauff won her **first Grand Slam title** at the 2023 US Open (d. Aryna Sabalenka). She has reached one other Grand Slam final – at 2022 Roland Garros, where she finished runner-up to Iga Swiatek.
- **At the Grand Slams this year**, Gauff reached the semifinals at both the Australian Open (l. Sabalenka) and Roland Garros (l. Swiatek) and reached the round of 16 Wimbledon (l. Emma Navarro)
- Gauff's **best Tour-level result in 2024** is winning the title at Auckland (d. Elina Svitolina). Her other highlights this season are reaching the semifinals at Indian Wells-1000 (l. Maria Sakkari), Rome-1000 (l. Iga Swiatek), and Berlin (l. Jessica Pegula) and the quarterfinals at Dubai-1000 (l. Anna Kalinskaya) and Stuttgart (l. Marta Kostyuk).
- Gauff recached a **career-high ranking** of No. 2 last month after reaching the semifinals at Roland Garros. She plays here at the same ranking.
- Gauff is a **former junior world No. 1**, achieving the top ranking in July 2018. She won the girls' singles title at 2018 Roland Garros (d. Caty McNally) and won the girls' doubles title alongside McNally at the 2018 US Open (d. Hailey Baptiste/Dalayna Hewitt). She never contested a Youth Olympic Games.
- Gauff **led USA to their 5th Junior Billie Jean King Cup title at the 2018 Junior Billie Jean King Cup Finals in Budapest**, defeating Ukraine in the title match.
- Gauff made her **Billie Jean King Cup** debut for USA at the 2022 Finals and has a 3-1 win-loss record in the competition. USA defeated Belgium 3-0 in the Qualifiers in April and will face Slovakia in their opening tie at the 2024 Billie Jean King Cup Finals in Malaga in November.
- Gauff is coached by Jean Christophe Faurel and Brad Gilbert, who won men's singles bronze at Seoul 1988.
- **TOMLJANOVIC** is bidding to reach the 2nd round at the Olympics for the 2nd time. This is her 2nd Olympics appearance.
- Tomljanovic **made her Olympic debut at Tokyo 2020**, reaching the 2nd round in women's singles (d. Yaroslava Shvedova, l. Elina Svitolina).
- Tomljanovic's **best Grand Slam results** are reaching back-to-back quarterfinals in 2022 – at Wimbledon (l. Elena Rybakina) and the US Open (l. Ons Jabeur).
- **At the Grand Slams this year**, Tomljanovic reached the 2nd round at the Australian Open (d. Petra Martic, l. Jelena Ostapenko) but fell in the 1st round at Roland Garros (l. Dayana Yastremska) and Wimbledon (l. Ostapenko).
- Tomljanovic's **best Tour-level result in 2024** is a runner-up finish at Birmingham (l. Yulia Putintseva).
- Tomljanovic is bidding to record her **8th Tour-level match-win in 2024**. Besides the 4 wins in her runner-up finish at Birmingham, her only other Tour-level match-wins this year have come in 2nd round finishes at the the Australian Open and Palermo (d. Mayar Sherif, l. Astra Shamra), and a win at the United Cup (d. Natalija Stevanovic).
- Tomljanovic is **facing a Top 5 player for the first time since 2022 Ostrava**, when she retired against No. 1 Iga Swiatek in the 2nd round. She has a 3-15 win-loss record against Top 5 players at Tour-level, with 2 of her victories coming at Roland Garros – against No. 3 Agnieszka Radwanska in the 3rd round in 2014 and against No. 5 Anett Kontaveit in the 1st round in 2022.
- Tomljanovic achieved a **career-high ranking** of No. 32 in April 2023. She plays here at No. 123.

- Tomljanovic was **part of the Australian teams that finished runner-up in the Billie Jean King Cup in 2019 and 2022**. She has played Billie Jean King Cup since 2010, representing Croatia from 2010 until 2011, and representing Australia since 2019. She has an 8-12 win-loss record in the competition. Australia defeated Mexico in the Qualifiers in April and will face the winner of Slovakia and USA in the quarterfinals at the 2024 Billie Jean King Cup Finals in Malaga in November.
- Tomljanovic is coached by Alessandro Bega.

COURT PHILIPPE CHATRIER – MEN’S SINGLES NO. 4 ALEXANDER ZVEREV (GER) v JAUME MUNAR (ESP)

Head-to-head: Munar leads 1-0

- **ZVEREV** is bidding to reach the 2nd round at the Olympics for the 2nd time. This is his 2nd Olympics appearance.
- Zverev **won the gold medal in men’s singles at Tokyo 2020** (d. Karen Khachanov). It was Germany’s 3rd Olympic gold medal in tennis – after Steffi Graf in women’s singles at Seoul 1988 and Becker/Stich in men’s doubles at Barcelona 1992. He also reached the quarterfinals in the men’s doubles at Tokyo 2020 alongside Jan-Lennard Struff.
- Zverev is a **2-time Grand Slam finalist**. He finished runner-up at the 2020 US Open, falling to Dominic Thiem in 5 sets despite holding a 2-0 lead. He reached his 2nd Grand Slam final at 2024 Roland Garros, falling to Carlos Alcaraz in 5 sets.
- **Elsewhere at the Grand Slams this year**, Zverev reached the semifinals at the Australian Open (l. Daniil Medvedev) and the round of 16 at Wimbledon (l. Taylor Fritz).
- Zverev’s **best Tour-level result in 2024** is winning the title at Rome-1000 (d. Nicolas Jarry). He also finished runner-up at Hamburg (l. Arthur Fils) and reached the semifinals at Los Cabos (l. Jordan Thompson), Miami-1000 (l. Grigor Dimitrov) and Halle (l. Hubert Hurkacz) and the quarterfinals at Indian Wells-1000 (l. Alcaraz) and Munich (l. Cristian Garin).
- Zverev rose to a **career-high ranking** of No. 2 after reaching the semifinals at 2022 Roland Garros. He re-entered the Top 5 for the first time since October 2022 in March this year and plays here at No. 4.
- Zverev was a **successful junior**. He won the boys’ singles title at the 2014 Australian Open, defeating Stefan Kozlov in the final. He also finished runner-up at 2013 Junior Roland Garros (l. Christian Garin) and was named 2013 ITF Junior World Champion.
- Zverev has played **Davis Cup** for Germany since 2016 and has a 9-6 overall win-loss record in the competition. Germany defeated Hungary in the Qualifiers in February to reach the 2024 Davis Cup Finals and will compete in Group C in Zhuhai alongside USA, Slovakia and Chile.
- Zverev is coached by his father, Alexander Zverev Sr.
- **MUNAR** is making his Olympic debut today.
- Munar’s **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the 2nd round on 10 occasions, including at all 3 Grand Slam tournaments in 2024 – at the Australian Open (d. Alexander Shevchenko, l. Adrian Mannarino), Roland Garros (d. Roberto Bautista Agut, l. Alex de Minaur) and Wimbledon (d. Billy Harris, l. De Minaur).
- Munar’s **best Tour-level results in 2024** are quarterfinal finishes at Cordoba (l. Facundo Bagnis) and Santiago (l. Sebastian Baez).
- Munar is bidding to **defeat a Top 5 player for the 3rd time**. He has a 2-5 win-loss record against Top 5 players, with his 2 victories coming against No. 3 Zverev in the 2nd round at 2019 Marrakech and against No. 3 Casper Ruud in the 1st round at 2022 Tokyo. He has not contested a match against a Top 5 player since defeating Ruud at 2022 Tokyo.
- Munar reached a **career-high ranking of No. 52** in May 2019. He plays here at No. 65.
- Munar **led Spain to victory at the 2013 Junior Davis Cup Finals in San Luis Potosi**, defeating Korea, Republic in the title match. He reached a career-high junior ranking of No. 3 in January 2015 and finished runner-up in the boys’ singles quarterfinals at 2014 Roland Garros (l. Andrey Rublev).
- Munar made his **Davis Cup** debut for Spain in 2017 and lost the only match he has contested to date (l. Dusan Lajovic). Spain were awarded a wild card for the 2024 Davis Cup Finals Group Stage and will compete in Group B in Valencia alongside Australia, Czechia and France.
- Munar is coached by Javier Fernandez and Miguel Sanchez.

COURT SUZANNE LENGLEN – WOMEN’S SINGLES NO. 7 MARIA SAKKARI (GRE) v DANKA KOVINIC (MNE)

- **SAKKARI** is bidding to reach the 2nd round at the Olympics for the 2nd time. This is her 2nd Olympics appearance.
- Sakkari’s **made her Olympic debut at Tokyo 2020**, reaching the 3rd round in women’s singles (l. Elina Svitolina). She also reached the mixed doubles quarterfinals alongside Stefanos Tsitsipas (l. Ashleigh Barty/John Peers).
- Sakkari’s **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the semifinals on 2 occasions in 2021 – at Roland Garros (l. Barbora Krejčíková) and the US Open (l. Emma Raducanu).
- **At the Grand Slams in 2024**, Sakkari reached the 3rd round at Wimbledon (l. Raducanu) and the 2nd round at the Australian Open (l. Elina Avanesyan) but fell in the 1st round at Roland Garros (l. Varvara Gracheva).
- Sakkari’s **best Tour-level result in 2024** is finishing runner-up at Indian Wells-1000 (l. Iga Swiatek). She also reached the semifinals at Charleston (l. Danielle Collins), the quarterfinals at Miami-1000 (l. Elena Rybakina), and the round of 16 at Madrid-1000 (l. Beatriz Haddad Maia) and Rome-1000 (l. Victoria Azarenka).
- Sakkari achieved a **career-high ranking** of No. 3 in March 2022. She and Tsitsipas are the highest-ranked Greek players in history, having peaked at No. 3 in the WTA and ATP rankings respectively. She plays here at No. 8.
- Sakkari made her **Billie Jean King Cup** debut for Greece in 2012 and has a 16-20 win-loss record in the competition. Greece will next compete in Europe/Africa Group I in April next year.
- Sakkari is coached by David Witt.
- **KOVINIC** is bidding to record her first Olympics match-win. This is her 2nd Olympics appearance.
- Kovinic **made her Olympic debut at Rio 2016**, where she fell in the 1st round in women’s singles (l. Madison Keys). She did not compete at Tokyo 2020.
- Kovinic’s **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the 3rd round on 2 occasions – at both the Australian Open (l. Simona Halep) and Roland Garros (l. Iga Swiatek) in 2022.
- Kovinic is making her **first appearance at any tournament since the 2023 US Open**. She ended her 2023 season after the US Open due to a back injury and has not competed at any level since then.
- Kovinic reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 46 in February 2016. She is currently ranked at No. 668 and received the Universality place to enter the draw here.
- Kovinic has played **Billie Jean King Cup** for Montenegro since 2011 and has a 21-7 overall win-loss record in the competition. Montenegro will next compete in Europe/Africa Group III in 2025.
- Kovinic is coached by Nemanja Plavšić.

COURT SUZANNE LENGLEN – MEN’S SINGLES NO. 6 CASPER RUUD (NOR) v TARO DANIEL (JPN)

Tour-level head-to-head: Daniel leads 1-0

- **RUUD** is making his Olympic debut today.
- Ruud is a **3-time Grand Slam finalist**. He finished runner-up at Roland Garros in 2022 (l. Rafael Nadal) and 2023 (l. Novak Djokovic), and at the 2022 US Open (l. Carlos Alcaraz).
- **At the Grand Slams this year**, Ruud reached the semifinals at Roland Garros (l. Alexander Zverev), the 3rd round at the Australian Open (l. Cameron Norrie) and reached the 2nd round at Wimbledon (l. Fabio Fognini).
- Ruud’s **best results in 2024** are winning the titles at Barcelona (d. Stefanos Tsitsipas) and Geneva (d. Tomas Machac). He also finished runner-up at Los Cabos (l. Jordan Thompson), Acapulco (l. Alex de Minaur) and Monte Carlo-1000 (l. Tsitsipas) and reached the semifinals at Estoril (l. Pedro Martinez) and the quarterfinals at Indian Wells-1000 (l. Tommy Paul).
- Ruud reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 2 after his runner-up finish at the 2022 US Open. He plays here at No. 8.
- Ruud is a **former junior No. 1**. He reached the No. 1 ranking in January 2016 and was the first Norwegian player to hold the top junior ranking.
- Ruud has played **Davis Cup** for Norway since 2015 and has a 25-9 overall win-loss record in the competition. Norway will host Portugal in a World Group I tie in September.
- Ruud is coached by his father, Christian Ruud, who competed at Barcelona 1992, Atlanta 1996 and Sydney 2000. His best singles result was a 3rd round finish at Atlanta 1996.
- **DANIEL** is bidding to reach the 2nd round at the Olympics for the 2nd time. This is his 3rd Olympics appearance.
- Daniel’s **best Olympic singles result** is reaching the 3rd round at Rio 2016, when he defeated Jack Sock and Kyle Edmund before falling to Juan Martin del Potro. He fell in the 1st round at Tokyo 2020 (l. Lorenzo Sonego).
- Daniel’s **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the 3rd round at the 2022 Australian Open, when he defeated Tomas Barrios Vera and Andy Murray before falling to Jannik Sinner.
- **At the Grand Slams this year**, Daniel fell in the 1st round at the Australian Open (l. Christopher Eubanks), Roland Garros (l. Andrey Rublev) and Wimbledon (l. Stefanos Tsitsipas).
- Daniel’s **best Tour-level result in 2024** is finishing runner-up at Auckland (l. Alejandro Tabilo). It was his first appearance in a Tour-level final since 2018.
- Daniel is bidding to end a **7-match Tour-level losing streak**. Since reaching the 2nd round at Madrid-1000 (d. Aleksandar Vukic, l. Tallon Griekspoor), he has fallen in the 1st round at Lyon (l. Ruud) and Gstaad (l. Matteo Berrettini), and the quarterfinals at Acapulco (l. Alex de Minaur) and Rome-1000 (l. Nicolas Jarry).
- Tsitsipas reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 3 in August 2021. He plays here at No. 12.
- Tsitsipas is a **former junior world No. 1**. His best Grand Slam singles results as a junior were reaching the semifinals at both Wimbledon (l. Denis Shapovalov) and the US Open (l. Felix Auger-Aliassime) in 2016.
- Tsitsipas made his **Davis Cup** debut for Greece at the 2019 Europe Group III event in Athens and has a 13-3 overall win-loss record in the competition. Greece will play away against Serbia in a World Group I tie in September.
- Tsitsipas is coached by his father, Apostolos Tsitsipas.
- **BERGS** is making his Olympic debut today.
- Bergs recorded his **best Grand Slam result** at Roland Garros this year, reaching the 3rd round as a qualifier (l. Grigor Dimitrov). He has lost in the 1st round on his 4 other Grand Slam main draw appearances – including his 2 other Grand Slam appearances in 2024, as a lucky loser at the Australian Open (l. Tsitsipas) and as a qualifier at Wimbledon (l. Arthur Cazaux).
- Bergs is bidding to record his **7th Tour-level match-win of 2024**. His only Tour-level match-wins this season have come at Roland Garros, where he defeated Alejandro Tabilo and Maximilian Marterer before falling to Dimitrov, during Belgium’s Davis Cup Qualifiers victory against Croatia, where he defeated Marin Cilic and Duje Ajdukovic, and in 2nd round finishes at Houston (d. Patrick Kypson, l. Ben Shelton) and as a lucky loser at ’s-Hertogenbosch (d. Tim van Rijthoven, l. Alex de Minaur).
- Bergs’ **best result at Challenger-level in 2024** is winning the title at the Tallahassee Challenger (USA) (d. Mitchell Krueger). He also finished runner-up at the Sarasota Challenger (USA) (l. Thanasi Kokkinakis) and reached the semifinals at the Lugano Challenger (SUI) (l. Daniel Masur).
- Bergs is bidding to **defeat a Top 20 player for the first time on his 7th attempt**. The highest-ranked player he has defeated is No. 24 Tabilo in the 1st round at Roland Garros this year.
- Bergs reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 73 last week, but dropped to No. 87 on Monday and plays here at the same ranking.
- Bergs has contested **Davis Cup** debut for Belgium in 2021 and has a 4-5 win-loss record in the competition. Belgium will compete in Group A in Bologna alongside Italy, Netherlands and Brazil at the 2024 Davis Cup Finals Group Stage in September.
- Bergs is coached by Ruben Bemelmans.

COURT SIMONNE MATTHIEU – MEN’S SINGLES STAN WAWRINKA (SUI) v PAVEL KOTOV (AIN)

Head-to-head: Kotov leads 1-0

- **WAWRINKA** is bidding to reach the 2nd round at the Olympics for the 2nd time. This is his 3rd Olympics appearance and first since London 2012.
- Wawrinka's **best Olympic singles result** is reaching the 2nd round at Beijing 2008 (d. Frank Dancevic, I. Jurgen Melzer). He fell in the 1st round on his only other Olympic singles appearance, at London 2012 (l. Andy Murray).
- Wawrinka **won the Olympic men’s doubles gold medal at Beijing 2008** alongside Roger Federer defeating Sweden’s Simon Aspelin/Thomas Johansson in the final.
- At 39 years 130 days, Wawrinka is the **oldest player to compete in singles since tennis returned to the Olympics at Seoul 1988**. The oldest player to have competed in singles at the Olympic Tennis Event in the modern era prior to this year was Chinese Taipei’s Yen-Hsun Lu, who competed in men’s singles at Tokyo 2020 aged 37 years 352 days. (NB ages calculated at the end of the tournament)
- Wawrinka is a **3-time Grand Slam singles champion**. He won his first major title at the 2014 Australian Open (d. Rafael Nadal) and also won the titles at 2015 Roland Garros and the 2016 US Open, defeating Novak Djokovic in both finals. He also finished runner-up at 2017 Roland Garros (l. Nadal).
- **At the Grand Slams in 2024**, Wawrinka reached the 2nd round at Roland Garros (d. Murray, l. Kotov) and Wimbledon (d. Charles Broom, l. Gael Monfils) but fell in the 1st round at the Australian Open (l. Adrian Mannarino).
- Wawrinka is bidding to record his **5th Tour-level match-win of 2024**. His only match-wins this season have come in 2nd round finishes at Buenos Aires (d. Pedro Cachin, l. Nicolas Jarry), Marrakech (d. Albert Ramos-Vinolas, l. Mariano Navone), Roland Garros and Wimbledon.
- Wawrinka reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 3 in January 2014 after winning his first Grand Slam title at the Australian Open. He plays here at No. 109.
- Wawrinka received one of the **ITF places reserved for Olympic gold medallists or Grand Slam champions** to enter the singles draw here.
- Wawrinka was the 2003 **Roland Garros junior champion** (d. Brian Baker) – the only junior Grand Slam event he contested.
- Wawrinka was part of the **Switzerland team that won the Davis Cup title in 2014**, defeating France in the final. He won 5 of the 7 matches he contested in the competition that year. He returned to the Swiss Davis Cup team for the first time since 2015 in the 2023 Qualifiers and competed at the 2023 Finals Group Stage. He has a 28-30 win-loss record in the competition overall. Switzerland will face Peru in a World Group I tie in Switzerland in September.
- Wawrinka is coached by former world No. 2 Magnus Norman, who reached the 3rd round in men’s singles at Sydney 2000.
- **KOTOV** is making his Olympic debut today.
- Kotov recorded his **best Grand Slam result** at Roland Garros this year where he reached the 3rd round. He defeated Cameron Norrie and Wawrinka before falling to Jannik Sinner.
- **Elsewhere at the Grand Slams this year**, Kotov reached the 2nd round at the Australian Open (d. Arthur Rinderknech, l. Flavio Cobolli) but fell in the 1st round at Wimbledon (l. Jordan Thompson).
- Kotov's **best result in 2024** is reaching the semifinals at Marrakech (l. Roberto Carballes Baena). He also reached the quarterfinals at Hong Kong (l. Emil Ruusuvuori) and Lyon (l. Alexander Bublik).

- Kotov **broke the Top 50 for the first time** this year by reaching a career-high ranking of No. 50 in June. He plays here at No. 62.
- Kotov is coached by Liliya Kotova and Mikhail Bril.

COURT SIMONNE MATTHIEU – WOMEN’S SINGLES MAYAR SHERIF (EGY) v CAROLINE WOZNIACKI (DEN)

Head-to-head: first meeting

- **SHERIF** is bidding to reach the 2nd round at the Olympics for the first time. This is her 2nd Olympics appearance.
- Sherif **made her Olympic debut at Tokyo 2020**. She fell in the 1st round in women’s singles (l. Rebecca Peterson).
- Sherif’s **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the 2nd round on 4 occasions – at the 2021 Australian Open (d. Chloe Paquet, l. Kaja Juvan) and at Roland Garros in 2022 (d. Marta Kostyuk, l. Tamara Zidansek), 2023 (d. Madison Brengle, l. Anastasia Potapova) and 2024 (d. Yuan Yue, l. Madison Keys).
- **Elsewhere at the Grand Slams this year**, Sherif fell in the 1st round at both the Australian Open (l. Elise Mertens) and Wimbledon (l. Dalma Galfi).
- Sherif’s **best Tour-level result in 2024** is reaching the final at Rabat (l. Peyton Stearns). She has also reached 4 finals at WTA-125 level – at Lleida (ESP) (l. Katerina Siniakova), Parma (ITA) (l. Anna Karolina Schmiedlova), Makarska (CRO) (l. Katie Volynets) and Contrexeville (FRA) (l. Lucia Bronzetti).
- Sherif reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 31 in June 2023. She plays here at No. 87.
- Sherif **won a women’s singles bronze medal at the 2023 African Games**, which took place in March this year. She entered the draw here using the ITF place reserved for the African Games after neither gold medallist Angella Okutoyi nor silver medallist Lamis Alhussein Abdel Aziz were ranked within the ranking limit.
- Sherif **played college tennis** at Pepperdine University, graduating in 2018. She was named an All-American in both 2017 and 2018.
- Sherif has played **Billie Jean King Cup** for Egypt since 2011 and has a 25-13 win-loss record in the competition. Egypt finished in 3rd place at the Europe/Africa Group II event this season and will compete at the same level in 2025.
- Sherif is coached by Justo Gonzalez Martinez.
- **WOZNIACKI** is bidding to reach the 2nd round at the Olympics for the 4th time. This is her 4th Olympics appearance.
- Wozniacki’s **best Olympic result** is reaching the quarterfinals at London 2012 (l. Serena Williams). She also reached the 3rd round at Beijing 2008 (l. Elena Dementieva) and the 2nd round at Rio 2016 (l. Petra Kvitova).
- Wozniacki won her **first Grand Slam singles title** at the 2018 Australian Open (d. Simona Halep). She also finished runner-up at the US Open in both 2009 (l. Kim Clijsters) and 2014 (l. Serena Williams).
- **At the Grand Slams this year**, Wozniacki reached the 3rd round at Wimbledon (l. Elena Rybakina) and the 2nd round at the Australian Open (l. Maria Timofeeva). She did not compete at Roland Garros.
- Wozniacki’s **best Tour-level results this season** are reaching the quarterfinals at Indian Wells-1000, where she retired against Iga Swiatek, and Bad Homburg, where she retired against Emma Navarro.
- Wozniacki retired from professional tennis in January 2020 before **returning from retirement in August 2023**.
- Wozniacki is a **former world No. 1**. She reached the top ranking for the first time in October 2010 and has spent a total of 71 weeks as world No. 1. She plays here at No. 73.
- Wozniacki has been coached by her father, Piotr, throughout her career.

COURT 6 – WOMEN'S SINGLES NO. 10 JELENA OSTAPENKO (LAT) v CAMILA OSORIO (COL)

Head-to-head: first meeting

- **OSTAPENKO** is bidding to record her first Olympic match-win. This is her 3rd Olympics appearance.
- Ostapenko **lost in the 1st round on her 2 previous Olympic singles appearances** – at Rio 2016 (l. Samantha Stosur) and Tokyo 2020 (l. Elena Vesnina). She also fell in the 1st round in women's doubles alongside Anastasija Sevastova at Tokyo 2020 (l. Ellen Perez/Stosur).
- Ostapenko won her **first Grand Slam singles title** at 2017 Roland Garros (d. Simona Halep), becoming the first Latvian player to win a Grand Slam title.
- **At the Grand Slams this year**, Ostapenko reached the quarterfinals at Wimbledon (l. Barbora Krejčíková), the 3rd round at the Australian Open (l. Victoria Azarenka) and the 2nd round at Roland Garros (l. Clara Tauson). Apart from her title-victory in 2017, she has never advanced beyond the 3rd round at Roland Garros.
- Ostapenko's best results in 2024 are **winning her 7th and 8th Tour-level singles titles** – at Adelaide (d. Daria Kasatkina) and Linz (d. Ekaterina Alexandrova). She also reached the quarterfinals at Brisbane (l. Azarenka) and Rome-1000 (l. Aryna Sabalenka).
- Ostapenko reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 5 in March 2018. She plays here at No. 11.
- Ostapenko is a **former Youth Olympic Games medallist**. She won the girls' doubles bronze medal alongside Lithuania's Akvile Parazinskaitė at the Nanjing 2014 Youth Olympic Games. She reached a career-high junior ranking of No. 2 in September 2014 and won the girls' singles title at 2014 Wimbledon (d. Kristina Schmiedlova).
- Ostapenko has played **Billie Jean King Cup** for Latvia since 2013 and has a 37-21 overall win-loss record in the competition. She holds the records for most Billie Jean King Cup matches won by a Latvian player. Latvia finished in 6th place at the Billie Jean King Cup Europe/Africa Group I event this year and will compete at the same level in 2025.
- Ostapenko is coached by Stas Khmarsky and Jelena Jakovleva
- **OSORIO** is bidding to record her first Olympic match-win. This is his 2nd Olympics appearance.
- Osorio **made her Olympic debut at Tokyo 2020**, falling to Viktorija Golubic in the 1st round in women's singles.
- Osorio's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the 3rd round as a qualifier at 2021 Wimbledon (l. Aryna Sabalenka).
- **At the Grand Slams this year**, Osorio reached the 2nd round at Roland Garros (d. Anhelina Kalinina, l. Ons Jabeur) and Wimbledon (d. Lauren Davis, l. Beatriz Haddad Maia) but fell in the 1st round at the Australian Open (l. Tatjana Maria).
- Osorio's best result in 2024 is **winning her 2nd Tour-level title** at Bogota (d. Marie Bouzkova). She also won the title at Bogota in 2021 (d. Tamara Zidansek). Her best result below Tour-level this season is reaching the semifinals at Lleida-125 (l. Katerina Siniakova).
- Osorio is bidding to end an **8-match losing streak against Top 20 players**. She has not defeated a Top 20 player since defeating No. 4 Caroline Garcia in the 2nd round at 2023 Rome-1000. She has a 4-16 win-loss record against Top 20 players at Tour-level overall.
- Osorio reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 33 in April 2022. She plays here at No. 89.
- Osorio **won 2 medals at the 2018 Youth Olympic Games**. She won the bronze medal in girls' singles, falling to Clara Burel in the semifinals before defeating Wang Xinyu in the bronze medal match. She also won the silver medal in mixed doubles alongside Nicolas Mejia, falling to Yuki Naito/Naoki Tajima in the final.
- Osorio is a **former junior world No. 1**. She won the girls' singles title at the 2019 US Open (d. Alexandra Yepifanova) and reached the semifinals of the girls' singles at 2019 Roland Garros (l. Leylah Fernandez).

- Osorio has played **Billie Jean King Cup** for Colombia since 2016 and has a 14-8 overall win-loss record in the competition. Colombia play at home against France in the 2024 Billie Jean King Cup Play-offs in November.
- Osorio is coached by Beatriz Garcia Vidagany and Ricardo Sanchez.

- **At the Grand Slams this year**, Haddad Maia reached the 3rd round at both the Australian Open (l. Maria Timofeeva) and Wimbledon (l. Danielle Collins) but fell in the 1st round at Roland Garros (l. Elisabetta Cocciaretto).
- Haddad Maia's **best result in 2024** is reaching the semifinals at Abu Dhabi (l. Daria Kasatkina). She also reached the quarterfinals at Madrid-1000 (l. Swiatek) and Strasbourg (l. Liudmila Samsonova).
- Haddad Maia reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 10 in June 2023. She plays here at No. 22.
- Haddad Maia made her **Billie Jean King Cup** debut for Brazil in 2012 and has a 29-12 overall win-loss record in the competition. Brazil play at home against Argentina in the 2024 Billie Jean King Cup Play-offs in November.
- Haddad Maia is coached by Rafael Paciaroni.
- **GRACHEVA** is making her Olympic debut today.
- Gracheva recorded her **best Grand Slam result** at Roland Garros this year, where she reached the round of 16. She defeated Maria Sakkari, Bernard Pera and Irina-Camelia Begu before falling to Mirra Andreeva.
- **Elsewhere at the Grand Slams this year**, Gracheva reached the 2nd round at both the Australian Open (d. Yanina Wickmayer, l. Dayana Yastremska) and Wimbledon (d. Lesia Tsurenko, l. Yastremska).
- Gracheva's **best Tour-level result in 2024** is reaching the quarterfinals at Auckland (l. Coco Gauff). She also reached the semifinals at Paris-125 (l. Diana Shnaider).
- Gracheva reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 39 in January this year. She plays here at No. 68.
- Gracheva has **won one of the 5 matches she has contested against Top 30 players in 2024**, with her only victory against a Top 30 player this season coming against No. 7 Sakkari in the 1st round at Roland Garros. She has an 8-25 win-loss record against Top 30 players at Tour-level overall.
- Gracheva made her **Billie Jean King Cup** debut for France at the 2023 Finals, defeating Germany's Tatjana Maria in the only match she has contested in the competition to date. France play away against Colombia in the 2024 Billie Jean King Cup Play-offs in November.
- Gracheva has **represented France since June 2023**. She represented Russia until February 2022 and competed on tour as a neutral athlete between February 2022 and June 2023.
- Gracheva is coached by Gerard Solves.
