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On court today...

- Novak Djokovic and Rafael Nadal meet for a record-extending 60th time on Court Philippe Chatrier today, with Djokovic hoping to extend his 30-29 lead in the pair's head-to-head. It is the pair's 2nd meeting at the Olympics, with Nadal having won in the semifinals at Beijing 2008. Nadal also leads the pair's head-to-head on clay and at Roland Garros – but Djokovic is the only player to have beaten Nadal at Roland Garros twice.
- The entire women's singles 2nd round takes place today, with Top 2 seeds Iga Swiatek and Coco Gauff hoping that they can book their places in the 3rd round when they face Diane Parry and Maria Lourdes Carle, respectively, today. Swiatek is bidding to improve upon a 2nd round finish at Tokyo 2020 while Gauff will hope to continue momentum from wins in singles and doubles over the opening weekend here.

COURT PHILIPPE CHATRIER – WOMEN'S SINGLES NO. 1 IGA SWIATEK (POL) v DIANE PARRY (FRA)

Head-to-head: first time

- **SWIATEK** is bidding to reach the 3rd round at the Olympics for the first time. This is her 2nd Olympics appearance.
- Swiatek advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Irina-Camelia Begu 62 75 in the 1st round on Saturday.
- Swiatek **made her Olympic debut at Tokyo 2020**, reaching the women's singles 2nd round (d. Mona Barthel, I. Paula Badosa). She also reached the mixed doubles quarterfinals alongside Hubert Hurkacz (I. Elena Vesnina/Aslan Karatsev)
- Swiatek is a **5-time Grand Slam champion**. She has won 4 titles at Roland Garros – in 2020 (d. Sofia Kenin), 2022 (d. Coco Gauff), 2023 (d. Karolina Muchova) and 2024 (d. Jasmine Paolini) – and also won the title at the 2022 US Open (d. Ons Jabeur).
- Swiatek is bidding to become the **2nd player to win the Roland Garros women's singles title and the Olympic women's singles gold medal in the same year** – after Steffi Graf, who won all 4 Grand Slam singles titles and Olympic singles gold in 1988.
- **Elsewhere at the Grand Slams this year**, Swiatek reached the 3rd round at both the Australian Open (I. Linda Noskova) and Wimbledon (I. Yulia Putintseva).
- Swiatek's **has won 5 Tour-level titles in 2024**. In addition to her title at Roland Garros, she also won the titles at Doha-1000 (d. Elena Rybakina), Indian Wells-1000 (d. Maria Sakkari), Madrid-1000 (d. Aryna Sabalenka) and Rome-1000 (d. Sabalenka). She also reached the semifinals at Dubai-1000 (I. Anna Kalinskaya) and Stuttgart (I. Rybakina), and the round of 16 at Miami-1000 (I. Ekaterina Alexandrova).
- Swiatek became the **first Polish player to reach the singles world No. 1 ranking** on 4 April 2022 and plays here at the same ranking. She has been ranked at No. 1 for 112 of the 120 weeks since 4 April 2022.
- Swiatek reached a **career-high junior ranking of No. 5** and won the girls' singles at 2018 Wimbledon (d. Leonie Kung). She won girls' doubles gold alongside Kaja Juvan at the Buenos Aires 2018 Youth Olympic Games (d. Yuki Naito/Naho Sato) and reached the girls' singles quarterfinals at the same event (I. Clara Burel).
- Swiatek **led Poland to their 2nd Junior Billie Jean King Cup title** at the 2016 Junior Billie Jean King Cup Finals in Budapest, defeating USA in the title match.
- Swiatek has played **Billie Jean King Cup** for Poland since 2018 and has an 11-3 win-loss record in the competition. Poland will play Spain in their opening tie at the 2024 Billie Jean King Cup Finals in Malaga in November.
- Swiatek is coached by Tomasz Wiktorowski.
- **PARRY** is making her Olympic debut at this event.
- Parry's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the 3rd round on 3 occasions – at 2022 Roland Garros (I. Sloane Stephens), 2022 Wimbledon (I. Jabeur) and the 2024 Australian Open (I. Mirra Andreeva).
- **Elsewhere at the Grand Slams this year**, Parry reached the 2nd round at Roland Garros (d. Fiona Ferro, I. Elina Svitolina) but fell in the 1st round at Wimbledon (I. Naomi Osaka).
- Parry's **best results in 2024** are reaching the semifinals at Birmingham (I. Karolina Pliskova) and Palermo (I. Zheng Qinwen). She also reached the quarterfinals at Auckland (I. Wang Xiyu) and Austin (I. Anhelina Kalinina) and the round of 16 at Indian Wells-1000 (I. Maria Sakkari).
- Parry is **facing a world No. 1 for the first time**. The highest-ranked players she has faced are No. 2 Barbora Krejčíková, who she defeated in the 1st round at 2022 Roland Garros, and No. 2 Ons Jabeur, to whom she lost in the 3rd round at 2022 Wimbledon.
- Parry reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 49 in April this year. She plays here at No. 59.

- Parry is a **former junior world No. 1** – she reached the No. 1 ranking in October 2019. She competed at the Buenos 2018 Youth Olympic Games, reached the 2nd round in girls' singles and the quarterfinals in girls' doubles.
- Parry made her **Billie Jean King Cup** debut for France in 2022 and has a 2-2 win-loss record in the competition. France will play away against Colombia in the 2024 Billie Jean King Cup Play-offs in November.
- Parry is coached by Martin Vilar.

Head-to-head notes

This is Djokovic and Nadal's 2nd meeting at the Olympics. Nadal won the pair's only previous meeting at the Olympics, in the semifinals at Beijing 2008. Nadal is now one of 2 players that Djokovic has faced at the Olympics on multiple occasions – he has also contested 2 matches against Juan Martin del Potro, falling in the bronze medal match at London 2012 and in the 1st round at Rio 2016. Nadal has never previously faced a player at the Olympics on multiple occasions.

This is Djokovic and Nadal's 60th Tour-level meeting. They hold the record for most Tour-level men's singles match-ups in the Open Era.

With 18 meetings at the Grand Slams, Djokovic and Nadal hold the Open Era record for most men's singles matches at the Grand Slams. Nadal leads the head-to-head at the Grand Slams 11-7. They have contested 9 Grand Slam finals and jointly hold the Open Era record for most meetings in Grand Slam men's singles finals, alongside Nadal and Roger Federer.

With 10 meetings at Roland Garros, Djokovic and Nadal also hold the Open Era record for most men's singles matches contested at Roland Garros. Nadal leads the head-to-head at Roland Garros 8-2, with his only defeats to Djokovic coming in the quarterfinals in 2015 and in the semifinals in 2021. Djokovic is the only player to have won multiple matches against Nadal at Roland Garros.

This is the pair's 29th meeting on clay. Nadal leads their head-to-head on clay 20-8 – by comparison, Djokovic leads the head-to-head on hard court 20-7 and they are tied 2-2 on grass.

Aside from their meetings in the round robin stage at the 2007 Tennis Masters Cup and the ATP World Tour Finals in 2009 and 2010, and their meeting in Spain's 2009 Davis Cup World Group first round victory against Serbia, all of the pair's meetings prior to today's match have been at the quarterfinal stage of a tournament or later.

- **DJOKOVIC** is bidding to reach the 3rd round at the Olympics for the 4th time. This is his 5th Olympics appearance.
- Djokovic advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Matthew Ebden 60 61 on Saturday.
- Djokovic is bidding to record his 15th Olympic singles match-win. By recording his 14th Olympic match-win in the 1st round here, Djokovic claimed sole ownership of the **record for most Olympic men's singles matches won since Seoul 1988**, ahead of Roger Federer.
- Djokovic **won the bronze medal at Beijing 2008**, where he fell to Nadal in the semifinals before defeating James Blake in the bronze medal match. He also finished in 4th place at both London 2012, where he fell to Andy Murray in the semifinals and to Juan Martin del Potro in the bronze medal match, and Tokyo 2020, where he fell to Alexander Zverev in the semifinals and to Pablo Carreno Busta in the bronze medal match. He fell to Del Potro in the 1st round at Rio 2016.
- Djokovic holds the **all-time record for most Grand Slam men's singles titles won** and jointly holds the record for most Grand Slam singles titles won among men and women, alongside Margaret Court. He has won 24 Grand Slam titles – 10 at the Australian Open, 7 at Wimbledon, 4 at the US Open and 3 at Roland Garros.
- Djokovic is bidding to become the **5th player in history to compete the career 'Golden Slam'** (winning all 4 Grand Slam titles and the Olympic gold medal) in singles – after Andre Agassi, Steffi Graf, Nadal and Serena Williams.
- **At the Grand Slams this year**, Djokovic finished runner-up at Wimbledon (l. Carlos Alcaraz), reached the semifinals at the Australian Open (l. Jannik Sinner) and reached the quarterfinals at Roland Garros, where he gave a walkover to Casper Ruud due to a knee injury.

- Djokovic's **other highlights in 2024** are reaching the semifinals at Monte-Carlo-1000 (l. Casper Ruud) and Geneva (l. Tomas Machac).
- Djokovic **holds the record for most weeks ranked No. 1**, having held the top ranking for a total of 428 weeks. His most-recent spell as world No. 1 ended in June, when he dropped to No. 3 following his withdrawal from Roland Garros. He rose to No. 2 on 24 June and plays here at the same ranking.
- Djokovic has played **Davis Cup** for Serbia since 2004, has a 44-16 win-loss record in the competition and led Serbia to their only title in the competition to date in 2010. Serbia will host Greece in a World Group I tie in September.
- Djokovic is currently without a permanent coach.
- **NADAL** is bidding to reach the 3rd round at the Olympics for the 3rd time. This is his 3rd Olympics appearance in singles and his 4th overall.
- Nadal advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Marton Fucsovics 61 46 61 in the 1st round on Saturday.
- Nadal has **won 2 Olympic gold medals**. He won the men's singles gold medal at Beijing 2008 (d. Fernando Gonzalez) and won the men's doubles gold medal alongside Marc Lopez at Rio 2016 (d. Florin Mergea/Horia Tecau). He also finished 4th in singles at Rio 2016, falling to Juan Martin del Potro in the semifinals and to Kei Nishikori in the bronze medal match.
- Nadal has **won 22 Grand Slams singles titles**. He has won 14 titles at Roland Garros, 4 titles at the US Open and 2 titles at both the Australian Open and Wimbledon.
- Nadal **missed the Australian Open and Wimbledon this season** and fell in the 1st round at Roland Garros (l. Alexander Zverev). It was the 3rd time he had lost in the 1st round at a Grand Slam – after 2013 Wimbledon (l. Steve Darcis) and the 2016 Australian Open (l. Fernando Verdasco).
- Nadal's **best Tour-level result in 2024** is a runner-up finish at Bastad (l. Nuno Borges). He also reached the quarterfinals at Brisbane (l. Jordan Thompson) and the round of 16 at Madrid-1000 (l. Jiri Lehecka). He has contested 6 Tour-level events in 2024 prior to the Olympics.
- At 38 years 62 days, Nadal is the **2nd-oldest player to compete in singles since tennis returned to the Olympics at Seoul 1988** – after Stan Wawrinka, who is competing here this year aged 39 years 130 days. The oldest player to have competed in singles at the Olympic Tennis Event in the modern era prior to this year was Chinese Taipei's Yen-Hsun Lu, who competed in men's singles at Tokyo 2020 aged 37 years 352 days. (NB ages calculated at the end of the tournament)
- Nadal **became world No. 1** for the first time in August 2008 and has been ranked at No. 1 for a total of 209 weeks. He spent 912 consecutive weeks in the Top 10 between 25 April 2005 and 20 March 2023, a men's record for most consecutive weeks spent in the world's Top 10. He plays here at No. 161 and entered the Olympic Tennis Event using a protected ranking of No. 9.
- Nadal is a **4-time Davis Cup champion**. He made his debut in the competition in 2004, has a 37-5 Davis Cup win-loss record and was part of the Spanish teams which won the title in 2004, 2008, 2011 and 2019. He holds the record for most Davis Cup titles among active players. Spain were awarded a wild card for the 2024 Davis Cup Finals Group Stage and will compete in Group B in Valencia alongside Australia, Czechia and France.
- Nadal is coached by Carlos Moya, Marc Lopez and Gustavo Marcaccio. He competed in men's doubles at the Olympics alongside Moya at Athens 2004 and alongside Lopez at Rio 2016.

- **ALCARAZ** is contesting the Olympics for the first time here.
- Alcaraz advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Hady Habib 63 61 for his **first Olympic match-win** on Saturday.
- Alcaraz is a **4-time Grand Slam singles champion**. He won his first Grand Slam title at the 2022 US Open (d. Casper Ruud), and won the titles at 2023 Wimbledon (d. Novak Djokovic), 2024 Roland Garros (d. Alexander Zverev) and 2024 Wimbledon (d. Djokovic).
- Alcaraz is bidding to become the **2nd player to win the Roland Garros men’s singles title and the Olympic men’s singles gold medal in the same year** – after Rafael Nadal, who won his 4th title at Roland Garros and Olympic men’s singles gold at Beijing in 2008.
- Aged 21 years 94 days, Alcaraz is bidding to become the **youngest player ever to win the Olympic men’s singles gold medal**. Vincent Richards of the USA won men’s singles gold 100 years ago, on clay, at Paris 1924, aged 21 years 123 days. (NB ages calculated at the end of the tournament).
- **Elsewhere at the Grand Slams this year**, Alcaraz reached the quarterfinals at the Australian Open (l. Zverev).
- Alcaraz’s **other highlights in 2024** are winning the title at Indian Wells-1000 (d. Daniil Medvedev), reaching the semifinals at Buenos Aires (l. Nicolas Jarry) and the quarterfinals at Miami-1000 (l. Grigor Dimitrov) and Madrid-1000 (l. Andrey Rublev).
- Aged 19 years 130 days, Alcaraz became the **youngest world No. 1 in history** after winning the title at the 2022 US Open. He has been ranked as world No. 1 for 36 weeks, most recently between June and September 2023. He plays here at No. 3.
- Alcaraz **led Spain to victory at the 2018 Junior Davis Cup Finals in Budapest**, defeating France in the title match. He reached a career-high junior ranking of No. 22 in January 2020 and his best performance in the junior events at the Grand Slams was his quarterfinal finish in the boys’ singles here at 2019 Wimbledon.
- Alcaraz has played **Davis Cup** for Spain since 2022 and has won 2 of the 3 matches he has contested in the competition. Spain were awarded a wild card for the 2024 Davis Cup Finals Group Stage and will compete in Group B in Valencia alongside Australia, Czechia and France.
- Alcaraz is coached by former world No. 1 Juan Carlos Ferrero, who reached the men’s singles quarterfinals at Sydney 2000.
- **GRIEKSPoor** is making his Olympic debut at this event.
- Griekspoor advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Petros Tsitsipas 62 63 for his **first Olympic match-win** in the 1st round on Sunday.
- Griekspoor’s **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the 3rd round on 3 occasions – at the Australian Open in 2023 (l. Stefanos Tsitsipas) and 2024 (l. Arthur Cazaux) and at 2024 Roland Garros (l. Alexander Zverev).
- Elsewhere at the Grand Slams this year, Griekspoor reached the 2nd round at Wimbledon (d. Daniel Elahi Galan, l. Miomir Kecmanovic).
- Griekspoor’s **best results in 2024** are reaching the semifinals at Rotterdam (l. Jannik Sinner) and ’s-Hertogenbosch (l. Sebastian Korda) and the quarterfinals at Geneva (l. Novak Djokovic).
- Griekspoor is bidding to **defeat a Top 5 player for the first time on his 13th attempt**. The highest-ranked player he has defeated is No. 8 Hubert Hurkacz in the 2nd round at Rotterdam this year.

- Griekspoor reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 21 in November last year. He plays here at No. 28.
- Griekspoor made his **Davis Cup** debut for Netherlands in 2019 and has led the team to quarterfinal finishes in both 2022 and 2023. He has a 9-8 overall win-loss record in the competition. Netherlands will compete in Group in Bologna alongside Italy, Belgium and Brazil at the 2024 Davis Cup Finals Group Stage in September.
- Griekspoor is coached by Kristof Vliegen.

- **PEGULA** is bidding to reach the 3rd round at the Olympics for the first time. This is her 2nd Olympics appearance.
- Pegula advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Viktorija Golubic 63 64 for her **first Olympic singles match-win** in the 1st round on Sunday.
- Pegula **made her Olympic debut at Tokyo 2020**, falling in the 1st round in women’s singles (l. Belinda Bencic). She also reached the women’s doubles quarterfinals alongside Bethanie Mattek-Sands (l. Laura Pigossi/Luisa Stefani).
- Pegula’s **best Grand Slam results** are reaching the quarterfinals on 6 occasions – including once at Roland Garros, in 2022 (l. Iga Swiatek).
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Pegula reached the 2nd round at the Australian Open (d. Rebecca Marino, l. Clara Burel) and Wimbledon (d. Ashlyn Krueger, l. Wang Xinyu). She did not compete at Roland Garros due to neck and back injuries.
- Pegula’s **best Tour-level result in 2024** is winning the title at Berlin (d. Anna Kalinskaya). She also reached the semifinals at Adelaide (l. Daria Kasatkina), San Diego (l. Marta Kostyuk) and Charleston (l. Kasatkina), and reached the quarterfinals at Miami-1000 (l. Ekaterina Alexandrova).
- Pegula reached a **career-high ranking of No. 3** in October 2022. She plays here at No. 6.
- Pegula made her **Billie Jean King Cup** debut for USA in 2019 and has a 6-2 win-loss record in the competition. USA defeated Belgium in the Qualifiers in April and will face Slovakia in their opening tie at the 2024 Billie Jean King Cup Finals in Malaga in November.

- Errani/Vavassori are contesting their **2nd mixed doubles event as a team**. They fell in the 1st round on their only previous appearance together at Wimbledon this year (l. Aldila Sutjiadi/Jackson Withrow).

- Medvedev **made his Olympic debut at Tokyo 2020**, reaching the men's singles quarterfinals at Tokyo 2020 (l. Pablo Carreno Busta)
- Medvedev won his **first Grand Slam singles title** at the 2021 US Open (d. Novak Djokovic). He has reached 5 other Grand Slam finals – finishing runner-up at the US Open in 2019 (l. Rafael Nadal) and 2023 (l. Djokovic), and at the Australian Open in 2021 (l. Djokovic), 2022 (l. Nadal) and 2024 (l. Jannik Sinner).

- Zheng reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 7 after her runner-up finish at the Australian Open. She plays here at the same ranking.
- Zheng reached a **career-high junior ranking** of No. 6 and reached the girls' singles semifinals at both the 2019 Roland Garros (l. Emma Navarro) and the 2019 US Open (l. Alexandra Yepifanova).
- Zheng made her **Billie Jean King Cup** debut for China, P.R. in 2022 and has a 3-1 win-loss record in the competition. China, P.R. won promotion at the Asia/Oceania Group I event in Changsha in April and will face Belgium in the 2024 Billie Jean King Cup Play-offs in November.
- Zheng is coached by Pere Riba.
- **RUS** is making her Olympic debut at this event.
- Rus advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Olivia Gadecki 64 61 for her **first Olympic match-win** in the 1st round on Sunday.
- Rus' **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the round of 16 at 2012 Roland Garros (l. Kaia Kanepi).
- **At the Grand Slams this year**, Rus reached the 2nd round at the Australian Open (d. Anhelina Kalinia, l. Anna Kalinskaya), Roland Garros (d. Angelique Kerber, l. Elena Rybakina) and Wimbledon (d. Yuan Yue, l. Maria Sakkari).
- Rus' **best Tour-level results in 2024** are reaching the quarterfinals at Hobart (l. Elise Martens), Cluj-Napoca (l. Ana Bogdan) and Rouen (l. Magda Linette). She also won a title on the ITF World Tennis Tour at W75 Den Haag (NED) (d. Gina Feistel).
- Rus is bidding to end a **12-match losing streak against Top 5 players**. She has not defeated a Top 10 player since defeated No. 5 Samantha Stosur in the 2nd round at 2012 Wimbledon. She has a 2-15 win-loss record against Top 10 players, with her only other victory coming against No. 2 Kim Clijsters in the 2nd round at 2011 Roland Garros.
- Rus reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 41 in August 2023. She plays here at No. 103.
- Rus is a **former junior world No. 1**. She reached the top ranking in July 2008 after winning the girls' singles title at the Australian Open (d. Jessica Moore) and reaching the girls' singles semifinals at Roland Garros (l. Simona Halep) that year.
- Rus has played **Billie Jean King Cup** for Netherlands since 2008 and has an 18-21 overall win-loss record in the competition. Netherlands won promotion at the Europe/Africa Group I event in April and will play away against Slovenia in the 2024 Billie Jean King Cup Play-offs in November.
- Rus is coached by Julian Alonso.

- **CRISTIAN** is making her Olympic debut at this event.
- Cristian advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Caroline Garcia 57 63 64 for her **first Olympic match-win** in the 1st round on Saturday.
- Cristian’s **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the 2nd round on 2 occasions – at the 2022 Australian Open (d. Greet Minnen, l. Madison Keys) and 2023 Wimbledon (d. Lucia Bronzetti, l. Beatriz Haddad Maia).
- **At the Grand Slams this year**, Cristian fell in the 1st round at the Australian Open (l. Katerina Siniakova), Roland Garros (l. Jelena Ostapenko), and Wimbledon (l. Bianca Andreescu).
- Cristian’s **best Tour-level result in 2024** is a semifinal finish at Cluj-Napoca (l. Ana Bogdan). She also reached the quarterfinals at Charleston (l. Daria Kasatkina) and Palermo (l. Zheng Qinwen).
- Cristian has risen to a new **career-high ranking** of No. 57 today.
- Cristian has played **Billie Jean King Cup** for Romania since 2021 and has an 8-3 win-loss record in the competition. Romania will face Japan in their opening tie at the 2024 Billie Jean King Cup Finals in Malaga in November.
- Cristian is coached by Javier Marti.
- **KERBER** is bidding to reach the 3rd round at the Olympics for the 3rd time. This is her 3rd Olympics appearance.
- Kerber advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Naomi Osaka 75 63 in the 1st round on Saturday.
- Kerber **won the women’s singles silver medal at Rio 2016**, falling to Monica Puig in the gold medal match. She also reached the quarterfinals in women’s singles at London 2012 (l. Victoria Azarenka). She did not compete at Tokyo 2020.
- Kerber is a **3-time Grand Slam champion**. She won her first 2 Grand Slam titles in 2016, defeating Serena Williams in the final at the Australian Open and defeating Karolina Pliskova in the final at the US Open, and finished runner-up to Williams at Wimbledon the same year. She won her 3rd Grand Slam title at 2018 Wimbledon (d. Serena Williams).
- **At the Grand Slams this year**, Kerber lost in the 1st round at the Australian Open (l. Danielle Collins), Roland Garros (l. Arantxa Rus) and Wimbledon (l. Yulia Putintseva).
- Kerber’s **best results in 2024** are reaching the round of 16 at Indian Wells-1000 (l. Caroline Wozniacki) and Rome-1000 (l. Iga Swiatek).
- Kerber **took maternity leave in 2022-23**, returning to the tour after an 18-month break at the United Cup in January this year.
- Kerber has announced that she will **retire from professional tennis after the Paris 2024 Olympic Tennis Event**.
- Kerber is a **former world No. 1**, reaching the top ranking for the first time in September 2016 after winning her 2nd Grand Slam title at the US Open. She plays here at No. 212 but entered the draw using a special ranking of No. 31.
- Kerber made her **Billie Jean King Cup** for Germany in 2007 and has a 14-15 overall win-loss record in the competition. She was a member of the team which finished as runners-up to Czechia in 2014.
- Kerber is coached by Torben Beltz.

- **SAKKARI** is bidding to reach the 3rd round at the Olympics for the 2nd time. This is her 2nd Olympics appearance.
- Sakkari advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Danka Kovinic 60 61 in the 1st round on Sunday.
- Sakkari’s **made her Olympic debut at Tokyo 2020**, reaching the 3rd round in women’s singles (l. Elina Svitolina). She also reached the mixed doubles quarterfinals alongside Stefanos Tsitsipas (l. Ashleigh Barty/John Peers).
- Sakkari’s **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the semifinals on 2 occasions in 2021 – at Roland Garros (l. Barbora Krejickova) and the US Open (l. Emma Raducanu).
- **At the Grand Slams in 2024**, Sakkari reached the 3rd round at Wimbledon (l. Raducanu) and the 2nd round at the Australian Open (l. Elina Avanesyan) but fell in the 1st round at Roland Garros (l. Varvara Gracheva).
- Sakkari’s **best Tour-level result in 2024** is finishing runner-up at Indian Wells-1000 (l. Iga Swiatek). She also reached the semifinals at Charleston (l. Danielle Collins), the quarterfinals at Miami-1000 (l. Elena Rybakina), and the round of 16 at Madrid-1000 (l. Beatriz Haddad Maia) and Rome-1000 (l. Victoria Azarenka).
- Sakkari achieved a **career-high ranking** of No. 3 in March 2022. She and Tsitsipas are the highest-ranked Greek players in history, having peaked at No. 3 in the WTA and ATP rankings respectively. She plays here at No. 8.
- Sakkari made her **Billie Jean King Cup** debut for Greece in 2012 and has a 16-20 win-loss record in the competition. Greece will next compete in Europe/Africa Group I in April next year.
- Sakkari is coached by David Witt.
- **YUAN** is making her Olympic debut at this event.
- Yuan advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Ekaterina Alexandrova 75 67(0) 62 for her **first Olympic match-win** in the 1st round on Sunday.
- Yuan’s **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the 3rd round as a qualifier at the 2022 US Open (l. Jessica Pegula).
- Yuan has **lost in the 1st round on her 6 other Grand Slam main draw appearances**, including at all 3 Grand Slam events in 2024 – at the Australian Open (l. Katie Boulter), Roland Garros (l. Mayar Sherif) and Wimbledon (l. Arantxa Rus).
- Yuan’s best result in 2024 is winning her **first Tour-level title** at Austin (d. Wang Xiyu). She also reached the semifinals at Hobart (l. Emma Navarro) and the quarterfinals at Indian Wells-1000 (l. Coco Gauff) and Rouen (l. Sloane Stephens).
- Yuan reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 36 in May this year. She plays here 4 places lower at No. 40.
- Yuan made her **Billie Jean King Cup** debut for China, P.R. in 2022 and has won all 7 matches she has contested in the competition to date. China, P.R. won promotion at the Asia/Oceania Group I event this year and will play at home against Belgium in the 2024 Billie Jean King Cup Play-offs in November.
- Yuan is coached by Nan Yang.

- Collins advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Laura Siegemund for her **first Olympic match-win** in the 1st round on Sunday. Collins led 63 2-0 when Siegemund retired due to a left ankle injury.
- Collins reached her **only Grand Slam final to date** at the 2022 Australian Open (l. Ashleigh Barty).
- **At the Grand Slams this year**, Collins reached the round of 16 at Wimbledon (l. Barbora Krejckova) but fell in the 2nd round at both the Australian Open (l. Iga Swiatek) and Roland Garros (l. Olga Danilovic).
- Collins' best Tour-level results in 2024 are **winning back-to-back titles** at Miami-1000 (d. Elena Rybakina) and Charleston (d. Daria Kasatkina). She also finished runner-up at Strasbourg (l. Madison Keys), reached the semifinals at Rome-1000 (l. Aryna Sabalenka), the quarterfinals at Doha-1000 (l. Anastasia Pavlyuchenkova) and Austin (l. Wang Xiyu) and the round of 16 at Madrid-1000 (l. Sabalenka)
- Collins achieved a **career-high ranking** of No. 7 in July 2022. She plays here at No. 9.
- Collins made her **Billie Jean King Cup** debut for USA in 2019 and has a 7-3 win-loss record in the competition. USA defeated Belgium 3-0 in the Qualifiers in April and will face Slovakia in their opening tie at the 2024 Billie Jean King Cup Finals in Malaga in November.
- Collins **played collegiate tennis** at the University of Virginia, graduating in 2016. She won the NCAA singles title twice, during her sophomore and senior years in 2014 and 2016.
- Collins has announced that she will **retire from professional tennis at the end of the 2024 season**.
- Collins is coached by Jared Jacobs and Ryan Harrison.
- **WOZNIACKI** is bidding to reach the 3rd round at the Olympics for the 3rd time. This is her 4th Olympics appearance.
- Wozniacki advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Mayar Sherif 26 75 61 in the 1st round on Sunday.
- Wozniacki's **best Olympic result** is reaching the quarterfinals at London 2012 (l. Serena Williams). She also reached the 3rd round at Beijing 2008 (l. Elena Dementieva) and the 2nd round at Rio 2016 (l. Petra Kvitova).
- Wozniacki won her **first Grand Slam singles title** at the 2018 Australian Open (d. Simona Halep). She also finished runner-up at the US Open in both 2009 (l. Kim Clijsters) and 2014 (l. Serena Williams).
- **At the Grand Slams this year**, Wozniacki reached the 3rd round at Wimbledon (l. Elena Rybakina) and the 2nd round at the Australian Open (l. Maria Timofeeva). She did not compete at Roland Garros.
- Wozniacki's **best Tour-level results this season** are reaching the quarterfinals at Indian Wells-1000, where she retired against Iga Swiatek, and Bad Homburg, where she retired against Emma Navarro.
- Wozniacki is bidding to end a **6-match losing streak against Top 10 players**. She has not defeated a Top 10 player since defeating No. 5 Petra Kvitova in the group stage at the 2018 WTA Finals. She has a 61-73 win-loss record against Top 10 players at Tour-level overall.
- Wozniacki retired from professional tennis in January 2020 before **returning from retirement in August 2023**.
- Wozniacki is a **former world No. 1**. She reached the top ranking for the first time in October 2010 and has spent a total of 71 weeks as world No. 1. She plays here at No. 70.
- Wozniacki has been coached by her father, Piotr, throughout her career.
