PARIS 2024 OLYMPIC TENNIS EVENT TUESDAY 30 JULY DAY FOUR MATCH NOTES

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On court today...

- Elina Svitolina was the last player to book her place in the women's singles 3rd round on Monday night and her reward for doing so is a clash with Barbora Krejckikova on Court Simonne Matthieu this afternoon. Victory for Svitolina would see her become the 2nd woman in the modern era to reach Olympic singles quarterfinals at 3 consecutive Games after Arantxa Sanchez Vicario in 1992-2000.
- Dan Evans and Andy Murray produced a sensational comeback victory to advance to the men's doubles 2nd round on Sunday, saving 5 match points to defeat Taro Daniel and Kei Nishikori. They face another challenging encounter today, taking on former Roland Garros men's doubles finalists Sander Gille and Joran Vliegen in the final match of the day on Court Suzanne Lenglen.

COURT PHILIPPE CHATRIER – WOMEN'S SINGLES NO. 2 COCO GAUFF (USA) v NO. 13 DONNA VEKIC (CRO)

Head-to-head: first meeting

- **GAUFF** is bidding to reach the quarterfinals on her Olympic debut.
- If Gauff, Danielle Collins and Emma Navarro win today, it will be the **3rd time that 3 players from the same nation have reached the women's singles quarterfinals** since tennis returned to the Olympics at Seoul 1988 – after Atlanta 1996 (when Americans Lindsay Davenport, Mary Joe Fernandez and Monica Seles all reached the quarterfinals) and Beijing 2008 (when Russians Elena Dementieva, Dinara Safina and Vera Zvonareva all reached the quarterfinals).
- If at least 2 of Gauff, Collins, Navarro win today, it will be the **first time that multiple American players have reached the women's singles quarterfinals at the Olympics since Beijing 2008**, when Venus Williams and Serena Williams both reached the quarterfinals.
- Gauff advanced to the 3rd round after defeating Ajla Tomljanovic 63 60 and Maria Lourdes Carle 61 61 for her **first Olympic singles match-wins** in the opening 2 rounds.
- Gauff won her **first Grand Slam title** at the 2023 US Open (d. Aryna Sabalenka). She has reached one other Grand Slam final – at 2022 Roland Garros, where she finished runner-up to Iga Swiatek.
- **At the Grand Slams this year**, Gauff reached the semifinals at both the Australian Open (l. Sabalenka) and Roland Garros (l. Swiatek) and reached the round of 16 Wimbledon (l. Emma Navarro)
- Gauff's **best Tour-level result in 2024** is winning the title at Auckland (d. Elina Svitolina). Her other highlights this season are reaching the semifinals at Indian Wells-1000 (l. Maria Sakkari), Rome-1000 (l. Iga Swiatek), and Berlin (l. Jessica Pegula) and the quarterfinals at Dubai-1000 (l. Anna Kalinskaya) and Stuttgart (l. Marta Kostyuk).
- Gauff recached a **career-high ranking** of No. 2 last month after reaching the semifinals at Roland Garros. She plays here at the same ranking.
- Gauff is a **former junior world No. 1**, achieving the top ranking in July 2018. She won the girls' singles title at 2018 Roland Garros (d. Caty McNally) and won the girls' doubles title alongside McNally at the 2018 US Open (d. Hailey Baptiste/Dalayna Hewitt). She also led USA to their 5th Junior Billie Jean King Cup title at the 2018 Junior Billie Jean King Cup Finals in Budapest, defeating Ukraine in the title match.
- Gauff made her **Billie Jean King Cup** debut for USA at the 2022 Finals and has a 3-1 win-loss record in the competition. USA defeated Belgium 3-0 in the Qualifiers in April and will face Slovakia in their opening tie at the 2024 Billie Jean King Cup Finals in Malaga in November.
- Gauff is coached by Jean Christophe Faurel and Brad Gilbert, who won men's singles bronze at Seoul 1988.
- **VEKIC** is bidding to become the 2nd Croatian player to reach the women's singles quarterfinals at the Olympic Tennis Event – after Iva Majoli, who reached the quarterfinals at Atlanta 1996.
- Vekic advanced to the 3rd round after defeating Lucia Bronzetti 62 75 and Bianca Andreescu 63 64 in the opening 2 rounds. This is her 2nd Olympics appearance.
- Vekic **made her Olympic debut at Tokyo 2020**, reaching the 3rd round in women's singles (l. Elena Rybakina).
- Vekic's **best Grand Slam result** is a semifinal finish at 2024 Wimbledon (l. Jasmine Paolini).
- **Elsewhere at the Grand Slams this year**, Vekic reached the 3rd round at Roland Garros (l. Olga Danilovic) but fell in the 1st round at the Australian Open (l. Anastasia Pavlyuchenkova).
- Vekic's **best Tour-level result in 2024** is a runner-up finish at Bad Homburg (l. Diana Shnaider). She also reached the semifinals at Linz (l. Ekaterina Alexandrova) and the quarterfinals at San Diego (l. Katie Boulter).
- Vekic reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 19 in November 2019. She plays here at No. 21.

- Vekic made her **Billie Jean King Cup debut for Croatia** in 2012 and has a 16-8 win-loss record in the competition. Croatia finished 1st in Europe/Africa Group II in April to secure promotion to compete in Europe/Africa Group I in 2025.
- Vekic is coached by Nikola Horvat and Pam Shriver. Shriver is one of 12 individual tennis players to have won the career 'Golden Slam' in doubles, having won the Olympic gold medal in women's doubles alongside Zina Garrison at Seoul 1988.

COURT PHILIPPE CHATRIER – MEN’S SINGLES NO. 4 ALEXANDER ZVEREV (GER) v TOMAS MACHAC (CZE)

Head-to-head: first meeting

- **ZVEREV** is bidding to reach the 3rd round at the Olympics for the 2nd time. This is his 2nd Olympics appearance.
- Zverev advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Jaume Munar 62 62 in the 1st round on Sunday.
- Zverev **won the gold medal in men’s singles at Tokyo 2020** (d. Karen Khachanov). It was Germany’s 3rd Olympic gold medal in tennis – after Steffi Graf in women’s singles at Seoul 1988 and Becker/Stich in men’s doubles at Barcelona 1992. He also reached the quarterfinals in the men’s doubles at Tokyo 2020 alongside Jan-Lennard Struff.
- Zverev is a **2-time Grand Slam finalist**. He finished runner-up at the 2020 US Open, falling to Dominic Thiem in 5 sets despite holding a 2-0 lead. He reached his 2nd Grand Slam final at 2024 Roland Garros, falling to Carlos Alcaraz in 5 sets.
- **Elsewhere at the Grand Slams this year**, Zverev reached the semifinals at the Australian Open (l. Daniil Medvedev) and the round of 16 at Wimbledon (l. Taylor Fritz).
- Zverev’s **best Tour-level result in 2024** is winning the title at Rome-1000 (d. Nicolas Jarry). He also finished runner-up at Hamburg (l. Arthur Fils) and reached the semifinals at Los Cabos (l. Jordan Thompson), Miami-1000 (l. Grigor Dimitrov) and Halle (l. Hubert Hurkacz) and the quarterfinals at Indian Wells-1000 (l. Alcaraz) and Munich (l. Cristian Garin).
- Zverev rose to a **career-high ranking** of No. 2 after reaching the semifinals at 2022 Roland Garros. He re-entered the Top 5 for the first time since October 2022 in March this year and plays here at No. 4.
- Zverev was a **successful junior**. He won the boys’ singles title at the 2014 Australian Open, defeating Stefan Kozlov in the final. He also finished runner-up at 2013 Junior Roland Garros (l. Christian Garin) and was named 2013 ITF Junior World Champion.
- Zverev has played **Davis Cup** for Germany since 2016 and has a 9-6 overall win-loss record in the competition. Germany defeated Hungary in the Qualifiers in February to reach the 2024 Davis Cup Finals and will compete in Group C in Zhuhai alongside USA, Slovakia and Chile.
- Zverev is coached by his father, Alexander Zverev Sr.
- **MACHAC** is bidding to reach the 3rd round at the Olympics for the first time. This is his 2nd Olympic appearance.
- Machac advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Zhang Zhizhen 62 46 62 in the 1st round on Sunday.
- Machac **made his Olympic debut at Tokyo 2020**, reaching the 2nd round in men’s singles (d. Joao Sousa, l. Diego Schwartzman).
- Machac’s **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the 3rd round at both the Australian Open (l. Karen Khachanov) and Roland Garros (l. Daniil Medvedev) this year.
- **Elsewhere at the Grand Slams this year**, Machac reached the 2nd round at Wimbledon (d. David Goffin, l. Roman Safiullin).
- Machac’s best result in 2024 is reaching his **first Tour-level final** at Geneva (l. Casper Ruud). He also reached the quarterfinals at Marseille (l. Hubert Hurkacz) and Miami-1000 (l. Jannik Sinner).
- Machac is bidding to **defeat a Top 5 player for the 2nd time**. He has a 1-5 win-loss record against Top 5 players, with his only victory against a Top 5 player coming against No. 1 Novak Djokovic in the semifinals at Geneva this year.
- Machac reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 33 in June this year. He plays here at No. 39.

- Machac has played **Davis Cup** for Czechia since 2021 and has a 9-6 overall win-loss record in the competition. Czechia defeated Israel in the Qualifiers in February to reach the 2024 Davis Cup Finals and will compete in Group B in Valencia alongside Australia, France and Spain.
- Machac is coached by Daniel Vacek, who reached the men's doubles quarterfinals alongside Jiri Novak at Atlanta 1996.

COURT PHILIPPE CHATRIER – WOMEN’S SINGLES NO. 1 IGA SWIATEK (POL) v WANG XIYU (CHN)

Head-to-head: Swiatek leads 1-0

2024 Madrid-1000 Clay (O) R64 Swiatek 61 64

- **SWIATEK** is bidding to become the first Polish player, woman or man, to reach the singles quarterfinals at the Olympic Tennis Event.
- Swiatek advanced to the 3rd round after defeating Irina-Camelia Begu 62 75 and Diane Parry 61 61 in the opening 2 rounds. This is her 2nd Olympics appearance.
- Swiatek **made her Olympic debut at Tokyo 2020**, reaching the women’s singles 2nd round (d. Mona Barthel, I. Paula Badosa). She also reached the mixed doubles quarterfinals alongside Hubert Hurkacz (I. Elena Vesnina/Aslan Karatsev)
- Swiatek is a **5-time Grand Slam champion**. She has won 4 titles at Roland Garros – in 2020 (d. Sofia Kenin), 2022 (d. Coco Gauff), 2023 (d. Karolina Muchova) and 2024 (d. Jasmine Paolini) – and also won the title at the 2022 US Open (d. Ons Jabeur).
- Swiatek is bidding to become the **2nd player to win the Roland Garros women’s singles title and the Olympic women’s singles gold medal in the same year** – after Steffi Graf, who won all 4 Grand Slam singles titles and Olympic singles gold in 1988.
- **Elsewhere at the Grand Slams this year**, Swiatek reached the 3rd round at both the Australian Open (I. Linda Noskova) and Wimbledon (I. Yulia Putintseva).
- Swiatek’s **has won 5 Tour-level titles in 2024**. In addition to her title at Roland Garros, she also won the titles at Doha-1000 (d. Elena Rybakina), Indian Wells-1000 (d. Maria Sakkari), Madrid-1000 (d. Aryna Sabalenka) and Rome-1000 (d. Sabalenka). She also reached the semifinals at Dubai-1000 (I. Anna Kalinskaya) and Stuttgart (I. Rybakina), and the round of 16 at Miami-1000 (I. Ekaterina Alexandrova).
- Swiatek became the **first Polish player to reach the singles world No. 1 ranking** on 4 April 2022 and plays here at the same ranking. She has been ranked at No. 1 for 112 of the 120 weeks since 4 April 2022.
- Swiatek reached a **career-high junior ranking** of No. 5 and won the girls’ singles at 2018 Wimbledon (d. Leonie Kung). She won girls’ doubles gold alongside Kaja Juvan at the Buenos Aires 2018 Youth Olympic Games (d. Yuki Naito/Naho Sato) and reached the girls’ singles quarterfinals at the same event (I. Clara Burel). She also led Poland to their 2nd Junior Billie Jean King Cup title at the 2016 Junior Billie Jean King Cup Finals in Budapest, defeating USA in the title match.
- Swiatek has played **Billie Jean King Cup** for Poland since 2018 and has an 11-3 win-loss record in the competition. Poland will play Spain in their opening tie at the 2024 Billie Jean King Cup Finals in Malaga in November.
- Swiatek is coached by Tomasz Wiktorowski.
- **WANG** is bidding to become the 2nd Chinese player to reach the women’s singles quarterfinals at the Olympic Tennis Event – after Li Na, who finished in 4th place at Beijing 2008. (NB Zheng Qinwen is also bidding to reach the quarterfinals here today)
- Wang advanced to the 3rd round after defeating Linda Noskova 63 63 and Diana Shnaider 63 61 for her **first Olympic match-wins** in the opening 2 rounds. She is making her Olympic debut at this event.
- Wang’s **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the 3rd round at the 2022 US Open (I. Alison Riske).
- **At the Grand Slams this year**, Wang reached the 2nd round at Roland Garros (d. d. Bai Zhuoxuan, I. Leylah Fernandez) but fell in the 1st round at the Australian Open (I. Emma Navarro) and Wimbledon (I. Donna Vekic).
- Wang’s **best result in 2024** is a runner-up finish at Austin (I. Yuan Yue). She also reached the semifinals at Auckland (I. Elina Svitolina).

- Wang **lost the only match she has played against a world No. 1**, falling to Swiatek in the 2nd round at Madrid-1000 this year. The highest-ranked player she has defeated is world No. 5 Maria Sakkari in the 2nd round at the 2022 US Open.
- Wang reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 49 in January 2023. She plays here 3 places lower at No. 52.
- Wang is a **former junior world No. 1**. She reached the No. 1 ranking in September 2018 after winning the girls' singles title at the 2018 US Open (d. Clara Burel). She competed at the Buenos Aires 2018 Youth Olympic Games, winning the bronze medal in the girls doubles alongside Wang Xinyu, reaching the 2nd round in the mixed doubles alongside Dostanbek Tashbulatov, and falling in the 1st round of the girls' singles.
- Wang made her **Billie Jean King Cup** debut for China, P.R. in 2021 and has a 4-2 win-loss record in the competition. China, P.R. will host Belgium in Guangzhou in the 2024 Billie Jean King Cup Play-offs in November.
- Wang is currently without a permanent coach.

COURT PHILIPPE CHATRIER – MEN’S SINGLES NO. 5 DANIIL MEDVEDEV (AIN) v SEBASTIAN OFNER (AUT)

Head-to-head: Medvedev leads 1-0

- **MEDVEDEV** is bidding to reach the 3rd round at the Olympics for the 2nd time. This is his 2nd Olympics appearance.
- Medvedev advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Rinky Hijikata 62 61 in the 1st round on Saturday.
- Medvedev **made his Olympic debut at Tokyo 2020**, reaching the men’s singles quarterfinals (l. Pablo Carreno Busta). He fell in the 1st round alongside Aslan Karatsev in men’s doubles (l. Lukas Klein/Filip Polasek).
- Medvedev won his **first Grand Slam title** at the 2021 US Open (d. Novak Djokovic). He has reached 5 other Grand Slam finals – finishing runner-up at the US Open in 2019 (l. Rafael Nadal) and 2023 (l. Djokovic), and at the Australian Open in 2021 (l. Djokovic), 2022 (l. Nadal) and 2024 (l. Jannik Sinner).
- **Elsewhere at the Grand Slams this year**, Medvedev reached the semifinals at Wimbledon (l. Carlos Alcaraz) and the round of 16 at Roland Garros (l. Alex de Minaur).
- Medvedev’s **other highlights in 2024** are reaching the final at Indian Wells-1000 (l. Carlos Alcaraz), the semifinals at Dubai (l. Ugo Humbert) and Miami-1000 (l. Sinner) and the quarterfinals at Madrid-1000, where he retired against Jiri Lehecka due to a right hip injury.
- Medvedev **became world No. 1** on 28 February 2022, becoming the first player other than the ‘Big 4’ (Djokovic, Roger Federer, Andy Murray and Nadal) to hold the top ranking since Andy Roddick in February 2004. He held the No. 1 ranking for 16 weeks during 2022 but is yet to return to the No. 1 ranking. He plays here at No. 5.
- Medvedev is coached by Gilles Cervara.
- **OFNER** is making his Olympic debut at this event.
- Ofner advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Robin Haase 75 62 for his **first Olympic match-win** in the 1st round on Sunday.
- Ofner’s **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the round of 16 as a qualifier at 2023 Roland Garros (l. Stefanos Tsitsipas).
- **At the Grand Slams this year**, Ofner reached the 3rd round at Roland Garros, where he defeated Terence Atmane and Sebastian Baez before falling to Corentin Moutet, but fell in the 1st round at the Australian Open (l. Thanasi Kokkinakis) and Wimbledon (l. Aleksandar Vukic).
- Ofner’s best result in 2024 is reaching his **first Tour-level final** at Mallorca, where he finished runner-up to Alejandro Tabilo. He also reached the semifinals at Hong Kong (l. Emil Ruusuvuori).
- Ofner is bidding to **defeat a Top 5 player for the first time on the 6th attempt**. The highest-ranked player he has defeated at Tour-level is No. 18 Jack Sock in the 2nd round at 2017 Wimbledon. The highest-ranked player he has defeated on clay is No. 20 Baez in the 2nd round at Roland Garros this year.
- Ofner reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 37 in January this year. He plays here at No. 56.
- Ofner made his **Davis Cup** debut for Austria in 2018 and has won one of the 4 matches he has contested in the competition. Austria will play at home against Turkiye in a World Group I tie in September.
- Ofner is coached by Stefan Retzl and Wolfgang Thiem

COURT SUZANNE LENGLEN – MEN’S SINGLES NO. 7 TAYLOR FRITZ (USA) v JACK DRAPER (GBR)

- **FRITZ** is making his Olympic debut at this event.
- Fritz advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Alexander Bublik 64 64 for his **first Olympic match-win** in the 1st round on Saturday.
- Fritz's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the quarterfinals on 4 occasions – at Wimbledon in 2022 (l. Rafael Nadal) and 2024 (l. Lorenzo Musetti) and at the 2023 US Open (l. Novak Djokovic) and 2024 Australian Open (l. Djokovic).
- **Elsewhere at the Grand Slams this year**, Fritz reached the round of 16 at Roland Garros (l. Casper Ruud).
- Fritz's other highlights in 2024 are winning his **7th and 8th Tour-level titles** at Delray Beach (d. Tommy Paul) and Eastbourne (l. Max Purcell). He also finished runner-up at Munich (l. Jan-Lennard Struff) and reached the semifinals at Madrid-1000 (l. Andrey Rublev) and the quarterfinals at Rome-1000 (l. Alexander Zverev) and Queen's (l. Jordan Thompson).
- Fritz reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 5 in February 2023. He plays here at No. 12.
- Fritz is a **former junior world No. 1**. He was named 2015 ITF Junior World Champion after winning the boys' singles title at the 2015 US Open (d. Paul). He also finished as runner-up in the boys' singles at 2015 Roland Garros (l. Paul).
- Fritz made his **Davis Cup** debut for USA in 2019 and has a 6-3 win-loss record in the competition. USA defeated Ukraine in the Qualifiers in February to reach the 2024 Davis Cup Finals and will compete in Group C in Zhuhai alongside Germany, Slovakia and Chile.
- Both of Fritz's parents were professional tennis players. His mother, Kathy May, is a former Top 10 player.
- Fritz is coached by Michael Russell and Paul Annacone.
- **DRAPER** is making his Olympic debut at this event.
- Draper advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Kei Nishikori 61 64 for his **first Olympic match-win** in the 1st round on Saturday.
- Draper's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the round of 16 at the 2023 US Open. He defeated Radu Albot, Hubert Hurkacz and Michael Mmoh before falling to Andrey Rublev.
- **At the Grand Slams this year**, Draper reached the 2nd round at the Australian Open (d. Giron, l. Tommy Paul) and Wimbledon (d. Elias Ymer, l. Cameron Norrie) but fell in the 1st round at Roland Garros (l. Jesper De Jong).
- Draper's best result in 2024 is winning his **first Tour-level title** at Stuttgart (d. Matteo Berrettini). He also finished runner-up at Adelaide (l. Jiri Lehecka) and reached the semifinals at Acapulco (l. De Minaur) and the quarterfinals at Munich (l. Taylor Fritz) and Queen's (l. Tommy Paul).
- Draper has **won one of the last 7 matches he has contested against Top 20 players**. His only victory against a Top 20 player in that time came against No. 2 Carlos Alcaraz in the 2nd round at Queen's this year. He has a 10-19 win-loss record against Top 20 players at Tour-level overall.
- Draper reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 26 this month and plays here at the same ranking.
- Draper was a **good junior**. He reached a career-high junior ranking of No. 7 in December 2018 and finished runner-up in the boys' singles at 2018 Wimbledon (l. Tseng Chun-Hsin).

- Draper made his **Davis Cup** debut for Great Britain at the 2023 Finals Group Stage and has won one of the 2 matches he has contested in the competition. Great Britain received a wild card for the 2024 Davis Cup Finals Group Stage and will compete in Group D in Manchester alongside Canada, Finland and Argentina in September.
- Draper is coached by James Trotman and Wayne Ferreira, who won an Olympic silver medal in men's doubles alongside Pieter Norval at Barcelona 1992 and reached the men's singles quarterfinal at Sydney 2000.

- **PAOLINI** is bidding to become the 3rd Italian player to reach the women’s singles quarterfinals since tennis returned to the Olympics at Seoul 1988 – after Raffaella Reggi at Seoul 1988 and Francesca Schiavone at Athens 2004.
- Paolini advanced to the 3rd round after defeating Ana Bogdan 75 63 and Magda Linette 64 61 for her **first Olympic singles match-wins** in the opening 2 rounds. This is her 2nd Olympics appearance.
- Paolini **made her Olympic debut at Tokyo 2020**, falling in the women’s singles 1st round (l. Petra Kvitova). She reached the women’s doubles 2nd round alongside Sara Errani (d. Nicole Melichar/Aison Riske, l. Lyudmyla Kichenok/Nadiia Kichenok).
- Paolini reached her **first 2 Grand Slam singles finals in 2024**, finishing runner-up to Iga Swiatek at Roland Garros and to Barbora Krejckova at Wimbledon. She is the 2nd Italian woman to reach multiple Grand Slam singles finals, after Francesca Schiavone, who won the title at 2010 Roland Garros and finished runner-up at 2011 Roland Garros.
- **Elsewhere at the Grand Slams this year**, Paolini reached the round of 16 at the Australian Open (l. Anna Kalinskaya).
- Paolini’s **other highlights in 2024** are winning her first title at WTA-1000 level at Dubai-1000 (d. Kalinskaya), reaching the semifinals at Eastbourne (l. - Nadal has **won 2 Olympic gold medals**. He won the men’s singles gold medal at Beijing 2008 (d. Fernando Gonzalez) and won the men’s doubles gold medal alongside Marc Lopez at Rio 2016 (d. Florin Mergea/Horia Tecau). He also finished 4th in singles at Rio 2016 (l. Kei Nishikori).
- Alcaraz is a **4-time Grand Slam singles champion**. He won his first Grand Slam title at the 2022 US Open (d. Casper Ruud), and won the titles at 2023 Wimbledon (d. Novak Djokovic), 2024 Roland Garros (d. Alexander Zverev) and 2024 Wimbledon (d. Djokovic).
- Nadal has **won 22 Grand Slams singles titles**. He has won 14 titles at Roland Garros, 4 titles at the US Open and 2 titles at both the Australian Open and Wimbledon.
- Alcaraz has **not contested a doubles event in 2024**. He has contested 5 Tour-level doubles events in his career, most recently at 2022 Madrid-1000, when he reached the 2nd round alongside Marc Lopez (d. Lukasz Kubot/Edouard Roger-Vasselin, l. Wesley Koolhof/Neal Skupski).
- Nadal’s **best Tour-level doubles result in 2024** is reaching the semifinals at Bastad alongside Ruud, where they gave a walkover to Orlando Luz and Rafael Matos after Nadal withdrew with fatigue.
- Nadal has won **11 Tour-level men’s doubles titles**, including his gold medal at Rio 2016 – most recently partnering Pablo Carreno Busta at Beijing in 2016 (d. Jack Sock/Bernard Tomic).
- Aged 19 years 130 days, Alcaraz became the **youngest world No. 1 in history** after winning the title at the 2022 US Open. He has been ranked as singles world No. 1 for 36 weeks, most recently between June and September 2023.
- Nadal became **singles world No. 1** for the first time in August 2008 and has been ranked at No. 1 for a total of 209 weeks. He spent 912 consecutive weeks in the Top 10 between 25 April 2005 and 20 March 2023, a men’s record for most consecutive weeks spent in the world’s Top 10. He plays here at No. 161 and entered the Olympic Tennis Event using a protected ranking of No. 9.
- Alcaraz has played **Davis Cup** for Spain since 2022 and has won 2 of the 3 matches he has contested in the competition.
- Nadal is a **4-time Davis Cup champion**. He made his debut in the competition in 2004, has a 37-5 Davis Cup win-loss record and was part of the Spanish teams which won the title in 2004, 2008, 2011 and 2019. He holds the record for most Davis Cup titles among active players. Spain were awarded a wild card for the 2024 Davis Cup Finals Group Stage and will compete in Group B in Valencia alongside Australia, Czechia and France.
- Alcaraz is coached by former world No. 1 Juan Carlos Ferrero. Nadal is coached by Carlos Moya, Marc Lopez and Gustavo Marcaccio. He competed in men’s doubles at the Olympics alongside Moya at Athens 2004 and alongside Lopez at Rio 2016.

- **GRIEKSPoor/KOOLHOF** are competing as a doubles team for the 3rd time at this event.
- Griekspoor/Koolhof advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Marton Fucsovics/Fabian Marozsan 62 63 for their **first victory as a doubles team** in the 1st round on Sunday.
- Griekspoor/Koolhof **lost both matches they contested as a team prior to this event**. They fell to Jannik Sinner/Lorenzo Sonego in the decisive 3rd match of Netherlands defeat to Italy in the 2023 Davis Cup quarterfinals and fell in the 1st round at Madrid-1000 this year (l. - Murray is contesting his **5th Olympic men’s doubles event with his 3rd different partner**. He made his Olympic men’s doubles debut alongside Jamie Murray at Beijing 2008, reaching the 2nd round (d. Daniel Nestor/Frederic Niemeyer, I. Arnaud Clement/Michael Llodra).
- Murray’s **best Olympic doubles result** is reaching the quarterfinals alongside Joe Salisbury at Tokyo 2020 (I. Marin Cilic/Ivan Dodig).
- Murray became the first player in history to successfully defend an **Olympic singles gold medal** after defeating Juan Martin del Potro in the final at the Rio 2016. He defeated Federer in the final at London 2012. He also won a silver medal in mixed doubles at London alongside Laura Robson, falling to Victoria Azarenka/Max Mirnyi in the final.
- Evans/Murray **competed as wild cards in the men’s doubles at Roland Garros** in their only event together in 2024. They fell in the 1st round (I. Sebastian Baez/Thiago Seyboth Wild).
- Evans has reached **3 Tour-level men’s doubles finals**, all at Masters-1000 level. He partnered Neal Skupski to runner-up finishes at 2021 Miami-1000 (I. Nikola Mektic/Mate Pavic) and 2021 Monte Carlo-1000 (I. Mektic/Pavic) and partnered John Peers in a runner-up finish at 2022 Montreal-1000 (I. Wesley Koolhof/Neal Skupski).
- Murray has won **3 Tour-level men’s doubles titles**. He partnered Jamie Murray to win the title at 2010 Valencia (d. Mahesh Bhupathi/Max Mirnyi) and 2011 Tokyo (d. Frantisek Cermak/Filip Polasek), and partnered Feliciano Lopez to win the title at 2019 Queen’s (d. Rajeev Ram/Joe Salisbury).

- Murray is a **former singles world No. 1**. In November 2016, he became the first British man to be ranked No. 1 since ATP rankings were introduced. He reached a career-high doubles ranking of No. 51 in 2011. He is currently ranked at No. 121 in singles and No. 344 in doubles.
- Evans reached **career-high rankings** of No. 21 in singles in August 2023 and No. 52 in doubles in April 2021. He is currently ranked at No. 59 in singles and No. 422 in doubles.
- Evans and Murray are British **Davis Cup** teammates. Murray has played Davis Cup since 2005 and has a 42-10 win-loss record in the competition. He led Great Britain to their first title since 1936 in 2015, defeating Belgium in the final. Evans has played Davis Cup since 2009 and has a 16-21 win-loss record in the competition. Great Britain received a wild card to the group stage at the 2024 Davis Cup Finals and will compete in Manchester alongside Canada, Finland and Argentina in Group D.
- Murray has announced that he will **retire from professional tennis after the Olympic Tennis Event**.
- Evans is currently without a permanent coach. Murray is coached by Mark Hilton and Jonny O’Mara.
- **GILLE/VLIEGEN** are bidding to reach the quarterfinals at the Olympics for the first time. This is their 2nd Olympic appearance.
- Gille/Vliegen advanced to the 2nd round after defeating No. 8 seeds Arthur Fils/Ugo Humbert 75 64 in the 1st round on Monday.

- Gille/Vliegen **made their Olympic debut at Tokyo 2020**. They fell in the 1st round in men's doubles (l. Wesley Koolhof/Jean-Julien Rojer).
- Gille/Vliegen reached their **first Grand Slam final** at 2023 Roland Garros (l. Ivan Dodig/Austin Krajicek). Their GS
- Vliegen has reached **2 Grand Slam mixed doubles finals** – he finished runner-up alongside Ulrikke Eikeri at 2022 Roland Garros (l. Ena Shibahara/Wesley Koolhof) and alongside Xu Yifan at 2023 Wimbledon (l. Lyudmyla Kichenok/Mate Pavic).

- Fernandez **made her Olympic debut at Tokyo 2020**. She reached the 2nd round in women's singles (d. Dayana Yastremska, I. Barbora Krejčíková).
- Fernandez reached her **first Grand Slam final** at the 2021 US Open (I. Emma Raducanu).
- **At the Grand Slams this year**, Fernandez reached the 3rd round at Roland Garros (I. Ons Jabeur) and the 2nd round at both the Australian Open (d. Sara Bejlek, I. Alycia Parks) and Wimbledon (d. Lucia Bronzetti, I. Caroline Wozniacki).
- Fernandez's **best result in 2024** is a runner-up finish at Eastbourne (I. Daria Kasatkina). She also reached the quarterfinals at Doha-1000 (I. Elena Rybakina) and Birmingham (I. Ajla Tomljanovic).
- Fernandez reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 13 in August 2022. She plays here at No. 25.
- Fernandez led Canada to their **first Billie Jean King Cup title in 2023**, winning all 8 matches she played in the competition in 2023. She has a 16-3 win-loss record in the competition. As 2023 champions, Canada automatically qualified for the 2024 Billie Jean King Cup Finals and will face the winner of the tie between Germany and Great Britain in the quarterfinals at the Finals in Malaga in November.
- Fernandez is coached by her father, Jorge Fernandez.
- **KERBER** is bidding to reach the quarterfinals at the Olympics for the 3rd time and become the first German player, woman or man, to reach the singles quarterfinals at the Olympics on 3 occasions. - Kerber **won the women's singles silver medal at Rio 2016**, falling to Monica Puig in the gold medal match. She also reached the quarterfinals in women's singles at London 2012 (I. Victoria Azarenka). She did not compete at Tokyo 2020.
- Kerber is a **3-time Grand Slam champion**. She won her first 2 Grand Slam titles in 2016, defeating Serena Williams in the final at the Australian Open and defeating Karolina Pliskova in the final at the US Open, and finished runner-up to Williams at Wimbledon the same year. She won her 3rd Grand Slam title at 2018 Wimbledon (d. Serena Williams).
- **At the Grand Slams this year**, Kerber lost in the 1st round at the Australian Open (I. Danielle Collins), Roland Garros (I. Arantxa Rus) and Wimbledon (I. Yulia Putintseva).
- Kerber's **best results in 2024** are reaching the round of 16 at Indian Wells-1000 (I. Caroline Wozniacki) and Rome-1000 (I. Iga Swiatek).
- Kerber **took maternity leave in 2022-23**, returning to the tour after an 18-month break at the United Cup in January this year.
- Kerber has announced that she will **retire from professional tennis after the Paris 2024 Olympic Tennis Event**.

- Kerber is a **former world No. 1**, reaching the top ranking for the first time in September 2016 after winning her 2nd Grand Slam title at the US Open. She plays here at No. 217 but entered the draw using a special ranking of No. 31.
- Kerber made her **Billie Jean King Cup** for Germany in 2007 and has a 14-15 overall win-loss record in the competition. She was a member of the team which finished as runners-up to Czechia in 2014.
- Kerber is coached by Torben Beltz.

- **AUGER-ALIASSIME** is bidding to reach the 3rd round at the Olympics for the first time. This is his 2nd Olympics appearance.
- Auger-Aliassime advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Marcos Giron 61 64 for his **first Olympic match-win** in the 1st round on Sunday.
- Auger-Aliassime **made his Olympic debut at Tokyo 2020**. He fell to Max Purcell in the 1st round in men’s singles and also fell in the 1st round in mixed doubles alongside Gabriela Dabrowski (l. Maria Sakkari/Stefanos Tsitsipas).

- Krejckikova advanced to the 3rd round after defeating Sara Sorribes Tormo 46 60 76(3) and Wang Xinyu 63 62 in the opening 2 rounds. This is her 2nd Olympics appearance.
- Krejckikova's **made her Olympic debut at Tokyo 2020**, reaching the 3rd round in women's singles – she defeated Zarina Diyas and Leylah Fernandez before falling to Belinda Bencic.
- Krejckikova **won women's doubles gold at Tokyo 2020** alongside Katerina Siniakova, defeating Bencic/Viktorija Golubic in the final.

- Osorio **made her Olympic debut at Tokyo 2020**, falling to Viktorija Golubic in the 1st round in women’s singles.
- Osorio’s **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the 3rd round as a qualifier at 2021 Wimbledon (l. Aryna Sabalenka).
- **At the Grand Slams this year**, Osorio reached the 2nd round at Roland Garros (d. Anhelina Kalinina, l. Ons Jabeur) and Wimbledon (d. Lauren Davis, l. Beatriz Haddad Maia) but fell in the 1st round at the Australian Open (l. Tatjana Maria).
- Osorio’s best result in 2024 is **winning her 2nd Tour-level title** at Bogota (d. Marie Bouzkova). She also won the title at Bogota in 2021 (d. Tamara Zidansek). Her best result below Tour-level this season is reaching the semifinals at Lleida-125 (l. Katerina Siniakova).

- Osorio is bidding to end an **8-match losing streak against Top 20 players**. She has not defeated a Top 20 player since defeating No. 4 Caroline Garcia in the 2nd round at 2023 Rome-1000. She has a 4-16 win-loss record against Top 20 players at Tour-level overall.
- Osorio reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 33 in April 2022. She plays here at No. 89.
- Osorio **won 2 medals at the 2018 Youth Olympic Games**. She won the bronze medal in girls' singles, falling to Clara Burel in the semifinals before defeating Wang Xinyu in the bronze medal match. She also won the silver medal in mixed doubles alongside Nicolas Mejia, falling to Yuki Naito/Naoki Tajima in the final.
- Osorio is a **former junior world No. 1**. She won the girls' singles title at the 2019 US Open (d. Alexandra Yepifanova) and reached the semifinals of the girls' singles at 2019 Roland Garros (l. Leylah Fernandez).
- Osorio has played **Billie Jean King Cup** for Colombia since 2016 and has a 14-8 overall win-loss record in the competition. Colombia play at home against France in the 2024 Billie Jean King Cup Play-offs in November.
- Osorio is coached by Beatriz Garcia Vidagany and Ricardo Sanchez.

COURT 14 – MEN’S SINGLES

STAN WAWRINKA (SUI) v ALEXEI POPYRIN (AUS)

Head-to-head: Popyrin leads 1-0

- **WAWRINKA** is bidding to reach the 3rd round at the Olympics for the first time. This is his 3rd Olympics appearance and first since London 2012.
- Wawrinka advanced to the 2nd round after defeating Pavel Kotov 61 61 in the 1st round on Sunday.
- Wawrinka's **best Olympic singles result** is reaching the 2nd round at Beijing 2008 (d. Frank Dancevic, I. Jurgen Melzer). He fell in the 1st round on his only other Olympic singles appearance, at London 2012 (l. Andy Murray).
- Wawrinka **won the Olympic men's doubles gold medal at Beijing 2008** alongside Roger Federer defeating Sweden's Simon Aspelin/Thomas Johansson in the final.
- At 39 years 130 days, Wawrinka is the **oldest player to compete in singles since tennis returned to the Olympics at Seoul 1988**. The oldest player to have competed in singles at the Olympic Tennis Event in the modern era prior to this year was Chinese Taipei's Yen-Hsun Lu, who competed in men's singles at Tokyo 2020 aged 37 years 352 days. (NB ages calculated at the end of the tournament)
- Wawrinka is a **3-time Grand Slam singles champion**. He won his first major title at the 2014 Australian Open (d. Rafael Nadal) and also won the titles at 2015 Roland Garros and the 2016 US Open, defeating Novak Djokovic in both finals. He also finished runner-up at 2017 Roland Garros (l. Nadal).
- **At the Grand Slams in 2024**, Wawrinka reached the 2nd round at Roland Garros (d. Murray, I. Kotov) and Wimbledon (d. Charles Broom, I. Gael Monfils) but fell in the 1st round at the Australian Open (l. Adrian Mannarino).
- Wawrinka is bidding to record his **5th Tour-level match-win of 2024**. His only match-wins this season have come in 2nd round finishes at Buenos Aires (d. Pedro Cachin, I. Nicolas Jarry), Marrakech (d. Albert Ramos-Vinolas, I. Mariano Navone), Roland Garros and Wimbledon.
- Wawrinka reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 3 in January 2014 after winning his first Grand Slam title at the Australian Open. He plays here at No. 109.
- Wawrinka received one of the **ITF places reserved for Olympic gold medallists or Grand Slam champions** to enter the singles draw here.
- Wawrinka was the 2003 **Roland Garros junior champion** (d. Brian Baker) – the only junior Grand Slam event he contested.
- Wawrinka was part of the **Switzerland team that won the Davis Cup title in 2014**, defeating France in the final. He won 5 of the 7 matches he contested in the competition that year. He returned to the Swiss Davis Cup team for the first time since 2015 in the 2023 Qualifiers and competed at the 2023 Finals Group Stage. He has a 28-30 win-loss record in the competition overall. Switzerland will face Peru in a World Group I tie in Switzerland in September.
- Wawrinka is coached by former world No. 2 Magnus Norman, who reached the 3rd round in men's singles at Sydney 2000.
- **POPYRIN** is making his Olympic debut at this event.
- Popyrin advanced to the 2nd round after defeating No. 16 seed Nicolas Jarry 63 76(5) for his **first Olympic match-win** in the 1st round on Sunday.
- Popyrin's **best Grand Slam singles result** is reaching the 3rd round on 6 occasions – including at Wimbledon this year (l. Novak Djokovic).
- **Elsewhere at the Grand Slams this year**, Popyrin reached the 2nd round at the Australian Open (d. Marc Polmans, I. Djokovic) but fell in the 1st round at Roland Garros (l. Thanasi Kokkinakis).

- Popyrin's **best result in 2024** is reaching the semifinals at Doha (l. Karen Khachanov). He also reached the 3rd round at both Miami-1000 (l. Fabian Marozsan) and Madrid-1000 (l. Alex de Minaur).
- Popyrin reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 38 in February this year. He plays here at No. 63.
- Popyrin was a **successful junior**. He won the boys' singles title at 2017 Roland Garros (d. Nicola Pietrangeli) and reached a career-high junior ranking of No. 2 following his title there.
- Popyrin made his **Davis Cup** debut for Australia in 2019, was a member of the team which finished as runners-up to Italy in 2023. He has a 2-2 overall win-loss record in the competition. As runners-up last year, Australia qualified automatically for the 2024 Davis Cup Finals Group Stage in September and will compete in Group B in Valencia alongside Czechia, France and Spain.
- Popyrin is coached by Neville Godwin and Xavier Malisse.
