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On court today...

- Men's singles top seed Novak Djokovic remains on track for a first Olympic gold medal here, with the Serb having cruised through his opening 2 matches here. Djokovic faces Germany's Dominik Koepfer today, whom he dropped a set against on their only previous meeting, on clay at 2022 Rome-1000. Another victory for Djokovic will see him will become the first player to reach 4 singles quarterfinals at the Olympics.
- Anna Karolina Schmiedlova has produced the biggest upset of either singles draw so far at Paris 2024, defeating Roland Garros and Wimbledon finalist Jasmine Paolini on Tuesday. Schmiedlova now takes on Barbora Krejcikova today – and she will become the first Slovakian player to reach the singles semifinals at the Olympics since Miloslav Mecir at Seoul 1988 if she records another upset win this afternoon.

COURT PHILIPPE CHATRIER – MEN’S SINGLES NO. 1 NOVAK DJOKOVIC (SRB) v DOMINIK KOEPFER (GER)

Head-to-head: Djokovic leads 1-0

- **DJOKOVIC** is bidding to become the first player, man or woman, to reach the singles quarterfinals on 4 occasions since tennis returned to the Olympics at Seoul 1988.

- At 37 years 74 days, Djokovic is bidding to become the **oldest player to reach the singles quarterfinals since tennis returned to the Olympics at Seoul 1988** – ahead of Angelique Kerber, who has reached the quarterfinals at Paris 2024 aged 36 years 198 days, and Jeremy Chardy, who reached the quarterfinals at Tokyo 2020 aged 34 years 170 days. (NB ages calculated at the end of the tournament)
- Djokovic advanced to the 3rd round after defeating Matthew Ebden 60 61 and Rafael Nadal 61 64 in the opening 2 rounds. This is his 5th Olympics appearance.
- Djokovic is bidding to record his 16th Olympic singles match-win and extend his record for **most Olympic singles matches won since Seoul 1988**. By recording his 14th Olympic match-win in the 1st round here, Djokovic claimed sole ownership of the record for most Olympic singles matches won since Seoul 1988, ahead of Roger Federer.
- Djokovic **won the bronze medal at Beijing 2008**, where he fell to Rafael Nadal in the semifinals before defeating James Blake in the bronze medal match. He also finished in 4th place at both London 2012, where he fell to Andy Murray in the semifinals and to Juan Martin del Potro in the bronze medal match, and Tokyo 2020, where he fell to Alexander Zverev in the semifinals and to Pablo Carreno Busta in the bronze medal match. He fell to Del Potro in the 1st round at Rio 2016.
- Djokovic holds the **all-time record for most Grand Slam men’s singles titles won** and jointly holds the record for most Grand Slam singles titles won among men and women, alongside Margaret Court. He has won 24 Grand Slam titles – 10 at the Australian Open, 7 at Wimbledon, 4 at the US Open and 3 at Roland Garros.
- Djokovic is bidding to become the **5th player in history to compete the career ‘Golden Slam’** (winning all 4 Grand Slam titles and the Olympic gold medal) in singles – after Andre Agassi, Steffi Graf, Nadal and Serena Williams.
- **At the Grand Slams this year**, Djokovic finished runner-up at Wimbledon (l. Carlos Alcaraz), reached the semifinals at the Australian Open (l. Jannik Sinner) and reached the quarterfinals at Roland Garros, where he gave a walkover to Casper Ruud due to a knee injury.
- Djokovic’s **other highlights in 2024** are reaching the semifinals at Monte-Carlo-1000 (l. Casper Ruud) and Geneva (l. Tomas Machac).
- Djokovic **holds the record for most weeks ranked No. 1**, having held the top ranking for a total of 428 weeks. His most-recent spell as world No. 1 ended in June, when he dropped to No. 3 following his withdrawal from Roland Garros. He rose to No. 2 on 24 June and plays here at the same ranking.
- Djokovic has played **Davis Cup** for Serbia since 2004, has a 44-16 win-loss record in the competition and led Serbia to their only title in the competition to date in 2010. Serbia will host Greece in a World Group I tie in September.
- Djokovic is currently without a permanent coach.

- **KOEPFER** is bidding to become the 4th German player to reach the men's singles quarterfinals since tennis returned to the Olympics at Seoul 1988 – after Carl-Uwe Steeb at Seoul 1988, Tommy Haas at Sydney 2000 and Alexander Zverev at Tokyo 2020. (NB Zverev is bidding to reach the Olympic singles quarterfinals for the 2nd time here)
- Koepfer advanced to the 3rd round after defeating Milos Raonic 67(2) 76(5) 76(1) and Matteo Arnaldi 36 62 61 in the opening 2 rounds. This is his 2nd Olympics appearance.
- Koepfer **made his Olympic debut at Tokyo 2020**, reaching the 3rd round in men's singles (l. Pablo Carreno Busta).
- Koepfer's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the round of 16 as a qualifier at the 2019 US Open (l. Daniil Medvedev).
- **At the Grand Slams this year**, Koepfer fell in the 1st round at both the Australian Open (l. Zverev) and Roland Garros (l. Medvedev). He did not compete at Wimbledon due to a left ankle injury.
- Koepfer's **best results in 2024** are reaching the quarterfinals at Dallas (l. Tommy Paul), Acapulco (l. Holger Rune) and Lyon (l. Tomas Martin Etcheverry). He also reached the round of 16 at Miami-1000 (l. Medvedev).
- Koepfer is bidding to **defeat a Top 5 player for the first time on his 10th attempt**. The highest-ranked player he has defeated is No. 9 Gael Monfils in the 2nd round at 2020 Rome-1000.
- Koepfer achieved a **career-high ranking** of No. 49 in March this year. He plays here at No. 70.
- Koepfer has played **Davis Cup** for Germany since 2020 and has a 3-2 win-loss record in the competition. Germany defeated Hungary in the Qualifiers in February to reach the 2024 Davis Cup Finals and will compete in Group C in Zhuhai alongside USA, Slovakia and Chile.
- Koepfer is coached by Billy Heiser and Rhyne Williams.

COURT PHILIPPE CHATRIER – WOMEN’S SINGLES NO. 6 ZHENG QINWEN (CHN) v ANGELIQUE KERBER (GER)

Head-to-head: Kerber leads 1-0

- **ZHENG** is bidding to become the 2nd Chinese player, woman or man, to reach the singles semifinals at the Olympic Tennis Event – after Li Na, who finished in 4th place at Beijing 2008. By reaching the quarterfinals here, she has become the 2nd Chinese player to reach the singles quarterfinals at the Olympic Tennis Event after Li.
- Zheng advanced to the quarterfinals after defeating Sara Errani 60 60, Arantxa Rus 62 64 and No. 11 seed Emma Navarro 57(6) 76(4) 61 for her **first Olympic match-wins** in the opening 3 rounds. She is making her Olympic debut at this event.
- Zheng reached her **first Grand Slam final** at the Australian Open this year (l. Aryna Sabalenka). She became the 2nd Chinese player to reach a Grand Slam singles final after Li Na.
- Zheng’s **other highlights in 2024** are winning the title at Palermo (d. Karolina Muchova). She also finished runner-up at the Australian Open (l. Aryna Sabalenka), and reached the quarterfinals at Dubai-1000 (l. Iga Swiatek) and Rome-1000 (l. Coco Gauff).
- Zheng reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 7 after her runner-up finish at the Australian Open. She plays here at the same ranking.
- Zheng reached a **career-high junior ranking** of No. 6 and reached the girls’ singles semifinals at both the 2019 Roland Garros (l. Emma Navarro) and the 2019 US Open (l. Alexandra Yepifanova).
- Zheng made her **Billie Jean King Cup** debut for China, P.R. in 2022 and has a 3-1 win-loss record in the competition. China, P.R. won promotion at the Asia/Oceania Group I event in Changsha in April and will face Belgium in the 2024 Billie Jean King Cup Play-offs in November.
- Zheng is coached by Pere Riba.
- **KERBER** is bidding to become the 5th player to reach multiple women’s singles semifinals since tennis returned to the Olympics at Seoul 1988.

- Kerber advanced to the quarterfinals after defeating Naomi Osaka 75 63, Jaqueline Adina Cristian 64 36 64 and No. 16 seed Leylah Fernandez 64 63 in the opening 3 rounds. This is her 3rd Olympics appearance.
- By reaching the quarterfinals at the Olympics for the 3rd time, Kerber has become the **5th player, man or woman, to reach the singles quarterfinals on 3 occasions since tennis returned to the Olympics at Seoul 1988** – after Novak Djokovic, who is bidding to reach his 4th Olympic quarterfinal here, and Roger Federer, Kei Nishikori and Arantxa Sanchez Vicario, all of whom made 3 Olympic singles quarterfinal appearances.
- Kerber **won the women’s singles silver medal at Rio 2016**, falling to Monica Puig in the gold medal match. She also reached the quarterfinals in women’s singles at London 2012 (l. Victoria Azarenka). She did not compete at Tokyo 2020.
- Kerber is a **3-time Grand Slam champion**. She won her first 2 Grand Slam titles in 2016, defeating Serena Williams in the final at the Australian Open and defeating Karolina Pliskova in the final at the US Open, and finished runner-up to Williams at Wimbledon the same year. She won her 3rd Grand Slam title at 2018 Wimbledon (d. Serena Williams).

- **At the Grand Slams this year**, Kerber lost in the 1st round at the Australian Open (l. Danielle Collins), Roland Garros (l. Arantxa Rus) and Wimbledon (l. Yulia Putintseva).
- Kerber's **best results in 2024** are reaching the round of 16 at Indian Wells-1000 (l. Caroline Wozniacki) and Rome-1000 (l. Iga Swiatek).
- Kerber **took maternity leave in 2022-23**, returning to the tour after an 18-month break at the United Cup in January this year.
- Kerber has announced that she will **retire from professional tennis after the Paris 2024 Olympic Tennis Event**.
- Kerber is a **former world No. 1**, reaching the top ranking for the first time in September 2016 after winning her 2nd Grand Slam title at the US Open. She plays here at No. 217 but entered the draw using a special ranking of No. 31.
- Kerber made her **Billie Jean King Cup** for Germany in 2007 and has a 14-15 overall win-loss record in the competition. She was a member of the team which finished as runners-up to Czechia in 2014.
- Kerber is coached by Torben Beltz.

COURT PHILIPPE CHATRIER – MEN’S DOUBLES NO. 4 KRAJICEK/RAM (USA) v ALCARAZ/NADAL (ESP)

Head-to-head: first meeting

- **KRAJICEK/RAM** are bidding to become the 5th American team to reach the men’s doubles semifinals since tennis returned to the Olympics at Seoul 1988. An American team has reached the men’s doubles semifinals at every Olympic Tennis Event since Beijing 2008.
- Krajicek is bidding to become the **3rd American man since 1988 to reach the men’s doubles semifinals at the Olympics on multiple occasions** – after Bob Bryan and Mike Bryan, who won the bronze medal at Beijing 2008 and the gold medal at London 2012. Krajicek finished in 4th place in men’s doubles alongside Tennys Sandgren at Tokyo 2020.
- Krajicek/Ram advanced to the quarterfinals after defeating Alex de Minaur/Alexei Popyrin 62 63 and Thiago Monteiro/Thiago Seyboth Wild 64 76(3) in the opening 2 rounds. They are contesting the Olympics as a team for the first time. This is Krajicek’s 2nd Olympics appearance and Ram’s 3rd Olympics appearance.
- Krajicek **made his Olympic debut at Tokyo 2020**, finishing in 4th place in men’s doubles alongside Sandgren. The pair fell to Nikola Mektic/Ivan Dodig in the semifinals and to Marcus Daniell/Michael Venus in the bronze medal match.
- Ram is **won the silver medal in mixed doubles at Rio 2016** alongside Venus Williams, falling to Bethanie Mattek-Sands/Jack Sock. He fell in the 2nd round on both of his appearances in men’s doubles at the Olympics – alongside Brian Baker at Rio 2016 (d. Gael Monfils/Jo-Wilfried Tsonga, I. Oliver Marach/Alexander Peya) and alongside Frances Tiafoe at Tokyo 2020 (d. Karen Khachanov/Andrey Rublev, I. Marin Cilic/Ivan Dodig).
- Krajicek/Ram have **competed as a team at 4 Tour-level tournaments**, as well as representing USA together in Davis Cup and at the ATP Cup. Their best result as a team is winning the title at 2018 Moscow (d. Max Mirnyi/Philipp Oswald). They have contested 2 events together this season, reaching the semifinals at Hamburg (I. Fabien Reboul/Edouard Roger-Vasselin) but falling in the 1st round at Houston (I. N Siriam Balaji/Andre Begemann).
- Krajicek won his **first Grand Slam men’s doubles title** alongside Ivan Dodig at 2023 Roland Garros (d. Sander Gille/Joran Vliegen).
- Ram has won **4 Grand Slam men’s doubles titles** alongside Joe Salisbury – at the 2020 Australian Open (d. Max Purcell/Luke Saville) and at the US Open in 2021 (d. Jamie Murray/Bruno Soares), 2022 (d. Wesley Koolhof/Neal Skupski) and 2023 (d. Rohan Bopanna/Matthew Ebden). He has also won the mixed doubles title alongside Barbora Krejčíková at the Australian Open in 2019 and 2021.
- Krajicek and Ram have both reached the **doubles world No. 1 ranking**. Ram reached the top ranking for the first time in October 2022 and is currently ranked at No. 5. Krajicek reached the top ranking for the first time in June 2023 and is currently ranked at No. 18.
- Krajicek and Ram are **Davis Cup** teammates and have won 4 of the 5 matches they have contested together in the competition. All of Krajicek’s Davis Cup appearances have come alongside Ram, while Ram has an 8-2 overall win-loss record in the competition. USA will compete in Group C in Zhuhai alongside Germany, Slovakia and Chile at the 2024 Davis Cup Finals Group Stage in September.
- Krajicek is coached by Philip Farmer. Ram is coached by Bryan Smith.
- **ALCARAZ/NADAL** are bidding to become the 5th Spanish team to reach the men’s doubles semifinals since tennis returned to the Olympics at Seoul 1988 – and the first since Nadal/Marc Lopez, who won the gold medal in men’s doubles at Rio 2016.
- Nadal is bidding to become the **first Spanish player since 1988 to reach the men’s doubles semifinals on multiple occasions**.
- Alcaraz/Nadal advanced to the quarterfinals after defeating No. 6 seeds Maximo Gonzalez/Andres Molteni 76(4) 64 and Tallon Griekspoor/Wesley Koolhof 64 67(2) [10-2] in the opening 2 rounds. are competing as a doubles team for the first time at any level at this event.

- Nadal is bidding to reach the **men's doubles 3rd round at the Olympics for the 2nd time** – after Rio 2016, when he won the men's doubles gold medal alongside Marc Lopez. This is his 4th Olympics appearance overall. Alcaraz is making his Olympic debut at this event.
- Nadal is contesting his **4th Olympic men's doubles event with his 4th different partner**. He made his Olympic debut alongside Carlos Moya at Athens 2004.
- Nadal has **won 2 Olympic gold medals**. He won the men's singles gold medal at Beijing 2008 (d. Fernando Gonzalez) and won the men's doubles gold medal alongside Marc Lopez at Rio 2016 (d. Florin Mergea/Horia Tecau). He also finished 4th in singles at Rio 2016 (l. Kei Nishikori).
- Alcaraz is a **4-time Grand Slam singles champion**. He won his first Grand Slam title at the 2022 US Open (d. Casper Ruud), and won the titles at 2023 Wimbledon (d. Novak Djokovic), 2024 Roland Garros (d. Alexander Zverev) and 2024 Wimbledon (d. Djokovic).
- Nadal has **won 22 Grand Slams singles titles**. He has won 14 titles at Roland Garros, 4 titles at the US Open and 2 titles at both the Australian Open and Wimbledon.
- Alcaraz has **not contested a doubles event in 2024**. He has contested 5 Tour-level doubles events in his career, most recently at 2022 Madrid-1000, when he reached the 2nd round alongside Marc Lopez (d. Lukasz Kubot/Edouard Roger-Vasselin, l. Wesley Koolhof/Neal Skupski).
- Nadal's **best Tour-level doubles result in 2024** is reaching the semifinals at Bastad alongside Ruud, where they gave a walkover to Orlando Luz and Rafael Matos after Nadal withdrew with fatigue.
- Nadal has won **11 Tour-level men's doubles titles**, including his gold medal at Rio 2016 – most recently partnering Pablo Carreno Busta at Beijing in 2016 (d. Jack Sock/Bernard Tomic).
- Aged 19 years 130 days, Alcaraz became the **youngest world No. 1 in history** after winning the title at the 2022 US Open. He has been ranked as singles world No. 1 for 36 weeks, most recently between June and September 2023.
- Nadal became **singles world No. 1** for the first time in August 2008 and has been ranked at No. 1 for a total of 209 weeks. He spent 912 consecutive weeks in the Top 10 between 25 April 2005 and 20 March 2023, a men's record for most consecutive weeks spent in the world's Top 10. He plays here at No. 161 and entered the Olympic Tennis Event using a protected ranking of No. 9.
- Alcaraz has played **Davis Cup** for Spain since 2022 and has won 2 of the 3 matches he has contested in the competition.
- Nadal is a **4-time Davis Cup champion**. He made his debut in the competition in 2004, has a 37-5 Davis Cup win-loss record and was part of the Spanish teams which won the title in 2004, 2008, 2011 and 2019. He holds the record for most Davis Cup titles among active players. Spain were awarded a wild card for the 2024 Davis Cup Finals Group Stage and will compete in Group B in Valencia alongside Australia, Czechia and France.
- Alcaraz is coached by former world No. 1 Juan Carlos Ferrero. Nadal is coached by Carlos Moya, Marc Lopez and Gustavo Marcaccio. He competed in men's doubles at the Olympics alongside Moya at Athens 2004 and alongside Lopez at Rio 2016.

COURT PHILIPPE CHATRIER – WOMEN’S SINGLES NO. 12 MARTA KOSTYUK (UKR) v NO. 13 DONNA VEKIC (CRO)

Head-to-head: Vekic leads 1-0

- **KOSTYUK** is bidding to become the 2nd Ukrainian player, woman or man, to reach the singles semifinals at the Olympics – after Elina Svitolina, who won the women’s singles bronze medal at Tokyo 2020.
- Kostyuk advanced to the quarterfinals after defeating Lulu Sun 64 63, Clara Burel 76(3) 62 and No. 7 seed Maria Sakkari 46 76(5) 64 for her **first Olympic match-wins** in the opening 2 rounds. She is making her Olympic debut at this event
- By reaching the quarterfinals here, Kostyuk has become the **2nd Ukrainian player to reach the quarterfinals at the Olympics** – after Svitolina, who reached the quarterfinals at Rio 2016 in addition to winning the bronze medal at Tokyo 2020.
- Kostyuk’s **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the quarterfinals at the 2024 Australian Open (l. Coco Gauff).
- **Elsewhere at the Grand Slams this year**, Kostyuk reached the 3rd round at Wimbledon (l. Madison Keys) and reached the 2nd round at Roland Garros (l. Donna Vekic).
- Kostyuk’s **best results in 2024** are runner-up finishes at San Diego (l. Katie Boulter) and Stuttgart (l. Elena Rybakina). She also reached the semifinals at Indian Wells-1000 (l. Iga Swiatek) and the quarterfinals at Adelaide (l. Jelena Ostapenko) and the Australian Open.
- Kostyuk reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 16 in June this year. She plays here 3 places lower at No. 19.
- Kostyuk made her **Billie Jean King Cup** debut for Ukraine in 2018 and has a 10-4 win-loss record in the competition. Ukraine will face Austria in the 2024 Billie Jean King Cup Play-offs in November.
- Kostyuk is coached by Sandra Zaniewska.
- **VEKIC** is bidding to become the 2nd Croatian player to reach the singles semifinals at the Olympic Tennis Event – after Goran Ivanisevic, who reached the men’s singles semifinals at Barcelona 1992.
- Vekic advanced to the quarterfinals after defeating Lucia Bronzetti 62 75, Bianca Andreescu 63 64 and No. 2 seed Coco Gauff 76(7) 62 in the opening 3 rounds. This is her 2nd Olympics appearance.
- By reaching the quarterfinals, Vekic become the **3rd Croatian player to reach the singles quarterfinals at the Olympic Tennis Event** – after Ivanisevic at Barcelona 1992 and Iva Majoli at Atlanta 1996.
- Vekic **made her Olympic debut at Tokyo 2020**, reaching the 3rd round in women’s singles (l. Elena Rybakina).
- Vekic’s **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the semifinals at 2024 Wimbledon (l. Jasmine Paolini).
- **Elsewhere at the Grand Slams this year**, Vekic reached the 3rd round at Roland Garros (l. Olga Danilovic) but fell in the 1st round at the Australian Open (l. Anastasia Pavlyuchenkova).
- Vekic’s **best Tour-level result in 2024** is a runner-up finish at Bad Homburg (l. Diana Shnaider). She also reached the semifinals at Linz (l. Ekaterina Alexandrova) and the quarterfinals at San Diego (l. Katie Boulter).
- Vekic reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 19 in November 2019. She plays here at No. 21.
- Vekic made her **Billie Jean King Cup debut for Croatia** in 2012 and has a 16-8 win-loss record in the competition. Croatia finished 1st in Europe/Africa Group II in April to secure promotion to compete in Europe/Africa Group I in 2025.
- Vekic is coached by Nikola Horvat and Pam Shriver. Shriver is one of 12 individual tennis players to have won the career ‘Golden Slam’ in doubles, having won the Olympic gold medal in women’s doubles alongside Zina Garrison at Seoul 1988.

COURT SUZANNE LENGLEN – MEN’S SINGLES NO. 9 TOMMY PAUL (USA) v CORENTIN MOUTET (FRA)

Head-to-head: first meeting

- **PAUL** is bidding to become the 10th American player to reach the men’s singles quarterfinals since tennis returned to the Olympics at Seoul 1988 – and the since Steve Johnson at Rio 2016. (NB Taylor Fritz is also bidding to reach the quarterfinals here)
- If Fritz and Paul both reach the quarterfinals here, it will be the **4th time since 1988 that multiple American players have reached the men’s singles quarterfinals at the Olympic Tennis Event** – after Seoul 1988 (Brad Gilbert and Tim Mayotte), Atlanta 1996 (Andre Agassi and MaliVai Washington) and Athens 2004 (Taylor Dent and Mardy Fish).
- Paul advanced to the 3rd round after defeating Luciano Darderi 63 64 and Jakub Mensik 63 61 for his first **Olympic singles match-wins** in the opening 2 rounds. He is making his 2nd Olympic appearance here.
- Paul **made his Olympic debut at Tokyo 2020**. He fell in the 1st round in men’s singles (l. Aslan Karatsev).
- Paul’s **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the semifinals at the 2023 Australian Open (l. Novak Djokovic).
- **In Grand Slam play this year**, Paul reached the quarterfinals at Wimbledon (l. Carlos Alcaraz) and the 3rd round at both the Australian Open (l. Miomir Kecmanovic) and Roland Garros (l. Francisco Cerundolo).

- Paul reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 12 in October 2023. He plays here one place lower at No. 13.
- Paul had a **successful junior career**. He won the 2015 Roland Garros boys’ singles title (d. Fritz), finished runner-up in the boys’ singles at the 2015 US Open (l. Fritz) and reached a career-high junior ranking of No. 3 in September 2015.
- Paul made his **Davis Cup** debut in 2020 for USA and has a 5-4 win-loss record in the competition. USA defeated Ukraine in the Qualifiers in February to reach the 2024 Davis Cup Finals and will compete in Group C in Zhuhai alongside Germany, Slovakia and Chile.
- Paul is coached by Brad Stine.

- At 21 years 91 days, Alcaraz is bidding to become the **youngest player to reach the Olympic men’s singles quarterfinals since Beijing 2008** – when Novak Djokovic reached the quarterfinals aged 21 years 87 days. (NB ages calculated at the end of the tournament).
- Alcaraz advanced to the 3rd round after defeating Hady Habib 63 61 and Tallon Griekspoor 61 76(3) for his **first Olympic singles match-wins** in the opening 2 rounds. He is making his Olympic debut at this event.
- Alcaraz is a **4-time Grand Slam singles champion**. He won his first Grand Slam title at the 2022 US Open (d. Casper Ruud) and won the titles at 2023 Wimbledon (d. Novak Djokovic), 2024 Roland Garros (d. Alexander Zverev) and 2024 Wimbledon (d. Djokovic).
- Alcaraz is bidding to become the **2nd player to win the Roland Garros men’s singles title and the Olympic men’s singles gold medal in the same year** – after Rafael Nadal, who won his 4th title at Roland Garros and Olympic men’s singles gold at Beijing in 2008.
- Alcaraz is bidding to become the **youngest player to win the Olympic men’s singles gold medal**. Vincent Richards of the USA won men’s singles gold 100 years ago, on clay, at Paris 1924, aged 21 years 123 days. (NB ages calculated at the end of the tournament).
- **Elsewhere at the Grand Slams this year**, Alcaraz reached the quarterfinals at the Australian Open (l. Zverev).
- Alcaraz’s **other highlights in 2024** are winning the title at Indian Wells-1000 (d. Daniil Medvedev), reaching the semifinals at Buenos Aires (l. Nicolas Jarry) and the quarterfinals at Miami-1000 (l. Grigor Dimitrov) and Madrid-1000 (l. Andrey Rublev).
- Aged 19 years 130 days, Alcaraz became the **youngest world No. 1 in history** after winning the title at the 2022 US Open. He has been ranked as world No. 1 for 36 weeks, most recently between June and September 2023. He plays here at No. 3.

- Alcaraz is coached by former world No. 1 Juan Carlos Ferrero, who reached the men’s singles quarterfinals at Sydney 2000.
- **SAFIULLIN** is bidding to reach the quarterfinals on his Olympic debut.
- Safiullin advanced to the 3rd round after defeating Alejandro Tabilo 64 64 and Tomas Martin Etcheverry 60 76(1) for his **first Olympic match-wins** in the opening 2 rounds.
- Safiullin’s **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the quarterfinals on his Wimbledon debut in 2023 (l. Jannik Sinner).

- Tsitsipas advanced to the 3rd round after defeating Zizou Bergs 76(6) 16 61 and Daniel Evans 61 62 in the opening 2 rounds. This is his 2nd Olympics appearance.
- Tsitsipas **made his Olympic debut at Tokyo 2020**, reaching the 3rd round in men’s singles (l. Ugo Humbert). He also reached the quarterfinals in mixed doubles alongside Maria Sakkari (l. Ashleigh Barty/John Peers).
- Tsitsipas is a **2-time Grand Slam singles finalist**. He became the first Greek player to reach a Grand Slam final at 2021 Roland Garros, where he fell to Novak Djokovic in 5 sets despite holding a 2-0 lead. He also fell to Djokovic in the final at the 2023 Australian Open.
- **At the Grand Slams in 2024**, Tsitsipas reached the quarterfinals at Roland Garros (l. Carlos Alcaraz), the round of 16 at the Australian Open (l. Taylor Fritz) and the 2nd round at Wimbledon (l. Emil Ruusuvuori).
- Tsitsipas’ **best result in 2024** is winning the title at Monte Carlo-1000 (d. Casper Ruud). He also finished runner-up at Barcelona (l. Ruud), reached the semifinals at Los Cabos (l. Ruud) and Gstaad (l. Matteo Berrettini), and the quarterfinals at Acapulco (l. Alex de Minaur) and Rome-1000 (l. Nicolas Jarry).
- Tsitsipas reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 3 in August 2021. He plays here at No. 11.
- Tsitsipas is a **former junior world No. 1**. His best Grand Slam singles results as a junior were reaching the semifinals at both Wimbledon (l. Denis Shapovalov) and the US Open (l. Felix Auger-Aliassime) in 2016.
- Tsitsipas made his **Davis Cup** debut for Greece at the 2019 Europe Group III event in Athens and has a 13-3 overall win-loss record in the competition. Greece will play away against Serbia in a World Group I tie in September.

- Baez advanced to the 3rd round after defeating Thiago Monteiro 64 63 and Benjamin Hassan 62 36 76(3) for his **first Olympic match-wins** in the opening 2 rounds. He is making his Olympic debut at this event.
- Baez’s **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the 3rd round on 2 occasions – at the 2023 US Open (l. Daniil Medvedev) and the 2024 Australian Open (l. Jannik Sinner).
- **Elsewhere at the Grand Slams this year**, Baez reached the 2nd round at Roland Garros (d. Gustavo Heide, l. Sebastian Ofner), but fell in the 1st round at Wimbledon (l. Brandon Nakashima).
- Baez’s best results in 2024 are winning his **5th and 6th Tour-level titles** at Rio de Janeiro (d. Mariano Navone), and Santiago (d. Alejandro Tabilo). He has a 3-26 win-loss record against Top 20 players overall.

- Baez is a **former junior world No. 1**. He reached the top ranking in March 2018. His best Grand Slam singles results as a junior was a runner-up finish at 2018 Roland Garros (l. Tseng Chun-Hsin). He competed at the 2018

- By reaching the quarterfinals, Krejcikova has become the **4th Czech player to reach the women's singles quarterfinals since tennis returned to the Olympics at Seoul 1988** – after Novtona at Atlanta 1996, Kvitova at London 2012 and Rio 2016, and Vondrousova at Tokyo 2020.
- Krejcikova's **made her Olympic debut at Tokyo 2020**, reaching the 3rd round in women's singles – she defeated Zarina Diyas and Leylah Fernandez before falling to Belinda Bencic.
- Krejcikova **won women's doubles gold at Tokyo 2020** alongside Katerina Siniakova, defeating Bencic/Viktorija Golubic in the final.
- Krejcikova **won her 2nd Grand Slam singles title** at Wimbledon this year, defeating Jasmine Paolini in the final. Her first Grand Slam title came at 2021 Roland Garros (d. Anastasia Pavlyuchenkova).
- **Elsewhere at the Grand Slams this year**, Krejcikova reached the quarterfinals at the Australian Open (l. Aryna Sabalenka) but fell in the 1st round at Roland Garros (l. Golubic).
- Krejcikova has **won 7 Grand Slam women's doubles titles** alongside Siniakova – at Roland Garros in 2018 and 2021, at Wimbledon in 2018 and 2022, at the Australian Open in 2022 and 2023, and at the 2022 US Open. She has also won 3 Grand Slam mixed doubles titles – at the Australian Open in 2019-21.
- Krejcikova's **other highlights in 2024** are reaching the quarterfinals at Abu Dhabi (l. Liudmila Samsonova) and Birmingham (l. Anastasia Potapova).
- Krejcikova reached a **career-high singles ranking** of No. 2 in February 2022. She plays here at No. 10.
- Krejcikova reached a **career-high junior ranking** of No. 3 and reached the girls' singles quarterfinals at the Australian Open in 2012 (l. Yulia Putintseva) and 2013 (l. Ana Konjuh) and at 2013 Wimbledon (l. Taylor Townsend). She was part of the Czech team that finished in 3rd place at the 2011 Junior Billie Jean King Cup Finals.
- Krejcikova was **part of the Czech team that won the 2018 Billie Jean King Cup**, but did not contest a match that year. She made her Billie Jean King Cup debut for Czechia against Romania in the 2019 World Group quarterfinals and has a 5-5 win-loss record in the competition.
- Krejcikova is coached by Pavel Motl.
- **SCHMIEDLOVA** is bidding to become the 2nd Slovakian player, woman or man, to reach the singles semifinals since tennis returned to the Olympics at Seoul 1988 – after Miloslav Mecir who won the men's singles gold medal at Seoul 1988. By reaching the quarterfinals here, she has become the 2nd Slovakian player to reach the singles semifinals at the Olympics, after Mecir.
- Schmiedlova advanced to the quarterfinals after defeating Katie Boulter 64 62, No. 14 seed Beatriz Haddad Maia 64 64 and No. 4 seed Jasmine Paolini 75 36 75 in the opening 3 rounds. This is her 2nd Olympics appearance.
- Schmiedlova **made her Olympic debut at Rio 2016**, reaching the 2nd round in the women's singles (d. Roberta Vinci, l. Ekaterina Makarova). She did not compete at Tokyo 2020.
- Schmiedlova's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the round of 16 at 2023 Roland Garros (l. Coco Gauff).
- Schmiedlova has **lost in the 1st round at all 3 Grand Slam events this year** – at the Australian Open (l. Coco Gauff), Roland Garros (l. Sara Errani) and Wimbledon (l. Wang Yafan).

- Schmiedlova's **best Tour-level results in 2024** are semifinal finishes at Austin (I. Yuan Yue) and Budapest (I. Aliaksandra Sasnovich).

- Gauff reached the **doubles world No. 1 ranking** alongside Pegula in August 2022. She is currently ranked at No. 13. She reached a new career-high singles ranking of No. 2 and plays here at the same ranking.
- Fritz reached a **career-high doubles ranking** of No. 104 in July 2021 and is currently ranked at No. 160. He reached a career-high singles ranking of No. 5 in February 2023 and plays here at No. 12.
- Gauff is a **former junior world No. 1**, achieving the top ranking in July 2018. She won the girls’ singles title at 2018 Roland Garros (d. Caty McNally) and won the girls’ doubles title alongside McNally at the 2018 US Open (d. Hailey Baptiste/Dalayna Hewitt). She also led USA to their 5th Junior Billie Jean King Cup title at the 2018 Junior Billie Jean King Cup Finals in Budapest, defeating Ukraine in the title match.
- Fritz is also a **former junior world No. 1**. He was named 2015 ITF Junior World Champion after winning the boys’ singles title at the 2015 US Open (d. Paul). He also finished as runner-up in the boys’ singles at 2015 Roland Garros (l. Paul).
- Gauff made her **Billie Jean King Cup** debut for USA at the 2022 Finals and has a 3-1 win-loss record in the competition. USA defeated Belgium 3-0 in the Qualifiers in April and will face Slovakia in their opening tie at the 2024 Billie Jean King Cup Finals in Malaga in November.
- Fritz made his **Davis Cup** debut for USA in 2019 and has a 6-3 win-loss record in the competition. USA defeated Ukraine in the Qualifiers in February to reach the 2024 Davis Cup Finals and will compete in Group C in Zhuhai alongside Germany, Slovakia and Chile.
- Gauff is coached by Jean Christophe Faurel and Brad Gilbert, who won men’s singles bronze at Seoul 1988. Fritz is coached by Michael Russell and Paul Annacone.
- **DABROWSKI/AUGER-ALIASIME** are bidding to become the 3rd Canadian doubles team to reach a semifinal since tennis returned to the Olympics at Seoul 1988 – after Sebastian Lareau/Daniel Nestor, who won the men’s doubles gold medal at Sydney 2000, and Nestor/Vasek Pospisil, who finished in 4th place in men’s doubles at Rio 2016. Lareau, Nestor and Pospisil are the only Canadian players to reach a semifinal at the Olympic Tennis Event in singles or doubles.

- Dabrowski/Auger-Aliassime's **only previous appearance together as a team came at Tokyo 2020**. They fell in the 1st round to Maria Sakkari/Stefanos Tsitsipas. Dabrowski is making her 3rd Olympic appearance and Auger-Aliassime is making his 2nd Olympic appearance.
- Dabrowski **made her Olympic debut at Rio 2016**. She reached the 2nd round in women's doubles alongside Eugenie Bouchard at Rio 2016 (d. Klaudia Jans-Ignacik/Paula Kania, I. Lucie Safarova/Barbora Strycova) but fell in the 1st round in women's doubles alongside Sharon Fichman at Tokyo 2020 (I. Laura Pigossi/Luisa Stefani).
- Auger-Aliassime **made his Olympic debut at Tokyo 2020**. He fell in the 1st round in men's singles (I. Max Purcell).
- Dabrowski **won her first Grand Slam women's doubles title** alongside Erin Routliffe at the 2023 US Open (d. Laura Siegemund/Vera Zvonareva). She and Routliffe also finished runner-up at 2024 Wimbledon (I. Katerina Siniakova/Taylor Townsend) and reached the semifinals at the 2024 Australian Open (I. Lyudmyla Kichenok/Jelena Ostapenko).
- Dabrowski has **won 2 Grand Slam mixed doubles titles** – alongside Rohan Bopanna at 2017 Roland Garros (d. Anna-Lena Groenefeld/Robert Farah) and alongside Mate Pavic at the 2018 Australian Open (d. Timea Babos/Bopanna). She also finished runner-up in mixed doubles alongside Pavic at Roland Garros in 2018 and 2019, falling to Latisha Chan/Ivan Dodig on both occasions.
- Auger-Aliassime's **best Grand Slam singles result** is reaching the semifinals at the 2021 US Open (I. Daniil Medvedev). He became the first Canadian man to reach the semifinals at the US Open and the first man born in the 2000s to reach a Grand Slam semifinal.
- Auger-Aliassime is making his **3rd appearance in a mixed doubles event**. In addition to his appearance alongside Dabrowski at Tokyo 2020, he lost the only match he contested at the 2024 United Cup, falling alongside Stacey Fung to Despina Papamichail/Petros Tsitsipas.
- Dabrowski reached a **career-high doubles ranking** of No. 3 after reaching the final at Wimbledon this year. She plays here at the same ranking.
- Auger-Aliassime broke the singles Top 10 for the first time in November 2021 and reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 6 in November 2022 and is currently ranked at No. 19. He reached a career-high doubles ranking of No. 60 in November 2021 and is currently ranked at No. 573.
- Dabrowski reached a **career-high junior ranking** of No. 5 and won the title at the 2009 Orange Bowl (d. Kristina Mladenovic).
- Auger-Aliassime was a **successful junior**. He won the boys' singles title at the 2016 US Open (d. Miomir Kecmanovic) and finished runner-up in the boys' singles at 2016 Roland Garros (I. Geoffrey Blancaneaux). He was also part of Canadian teams that reached back-to-back Junior Davis Cup Finals in 2015-16, defeating Germany to win the title in 2015 but finishing runner-up to Russia in 2016.
- Dabrowski was a member of the **Canadian team which won the nation's first Billie Jean King Cup title in 2023**, winning all 4 matches she contested in the competition last year. She made her Billie Jean King debut in 2013 and has a 15-12 win-loss record in the competition overall. Canada will play either Germany or Great Britain in the quarterfinals at the 2024 Billie Jean King Cup Finals in Malaga in November.
- Auger-Aliassime **led Canada to the Davis Cup title in 2022**, defeating Australia in the final. He won 8 of the 9 matches he contested in the competition that year. He was also a member of the Canadian team which finished runners-up to Spain in 2019 and has a 9-4 win-loss record in the competition overall. Canada defeated Korea, Rep. in the Qualifiers in February to advance to the 2024 Davis Cup Finals Group Stage. They will compete in Group D in Manchester alongside Argentina, Finland and Great Britain in September.
- Auger-Aliassime is coached by Frederic Fontang and Toni Nadal.

- **FRITZ** is bidding to become the 10th American player to reach the men’s singles quarterfinals since tennis returned to the Olympics at Seoul 1988 – and the since Steve Johnson at Rio 2016. (NB Tommy Paul is also bidding to reach the quarterfinals here)
- If Fritz and Paul both reach the quarterfinals here, it will be the **4th time since 1988 that multiple American players have reached the men’s singles quarterfinals at the Olympic Tennis Event** – after Seoul 1988 (Brad Gilbert and Tim Mayotte), Atlanta 1996 (Andre Agassi and MaliVai Washington) and Athens 2004 (Taylor Dent and Mardy Fish).
- Fritz advanced to the 3rd round after defeating Alexander Bublik 64 64 and Jack Draper 67(3) 63 62 for his **first Olympic singles match-wins** in the opening 2 rounds. He also partnered Tommy Paul to defeat Felix Auger-Aliassime/Milos Raonic 76(14) 64 in the 1st round of the men’s doubles on Monday. Fritz is making his Olympic debut at this event.
- Fritz’s **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the quarterfinals on 4 occasions – at Wimbledon in 2022 (l. Rafael Nadal) and 2024 (l. Lorenzo Musetti) and at the 2023 US Open (l. Novak Djokovic) and 2024 Australian Open (l. Djokovic).
- **Elsewhere at the Grand Slams this year**, Fritz reached the round of 16 at Roland Garros (l. Casper Ruud).
- Fritz’s other highlights in 2024 are winning his **7th and 8th Tour-level titles** at Delray Beach (d. Tommy Paul) and Eastbourne (l. Max Purcell). He also finished runner-up at Munich (l. Jan-Lennard Struff) and reached the semifinals at Madrid-1000 (l. Andrey Rublev) and the quarterfinals at Rome-1000 (l. Alexander Zverev) and Queen’s (l. Jordan Thompson).
- Fritz reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 5 in February 2023. He plays here at No. 12.
- Fritz is a **former junior world No. 1**. He was named 2015 ITF Junior World Champion after winning the boys’ singles title at the 2015 US Open (d. Paul). He also finished as runner-up in the boys’ singles at 2015 Roland Garros (l. Paul).
- Fritz made his **Davis Cup** debut for USA in 2019 and has a 6-3 win-loss record in the competition. USA defeated Ukraine in the Qualifiers in February to reach the 2024 Davis Cup Finals and will compete in Group C in Zhuhai alongside Germany, Slovakia and Chile.
- Both of Fritz’s parents were professional tennis players. His mother, Kathy May, is a former Top 10 player.
- Fritz is coached by Michael Russell and Paul Annacone.
- **MUSETTI** is bidding to become the 3rd Italian player to reach the men’s singles quarterfinals since tennis returned to the Olympics at Seoul 1988 – after Paolo Cane at Seoul 1988 and Renzo Furlan at Atlanta 1996.
- Musetti advanced to the 3rd round after defeating Gael Monfils 61 64 and Mariano Navone 76(2) 63 for his **first Olympic singles match-wins** in the opening 2 rounds. This is his 2nd Olympic appearance.
- Musetti **made his Olympic debut at Tokyo 2020**. He fell in the 1st round in men’s singles (l. John Millman) and reached the 2nd round in men’s doubles alongside Lorenzo Sonego (d. Pablo Andujar/Roberto Carballes Baena, l. Nikola Mektic/Mate Pavic).
- Musetti recorded his **best Grand Slam result** at Wimbledon this year, where he reached the semifinals (l. Novak Djokovic).
- **Elsewhere at the Grand Slams this year**, Musetti reached the 3rd round at Roland Garros, where he defeated Daniel Elahi Galan and Monfils before falling to Djokovic, and the 2nd round at the Australian Open (d. Benjamin Bonzi, l. Luca van Assche).

- Musetti's **other highlights in 2024** are finishing runner-up at Queen's (l. Tommy Paul) and Umag (l. Francisco Cerundolo), with the final at Umag taking place on Saturday evening. He also reached the semifinals at Stuttgart (l. Matteo Berrettini), the quarterfinals at Adelaide (l. Alexander Bublik) and the quarterfinals at Miami-1000 (l. Carlos Alcaraz).
- Musetti reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 15 last month and plays here one place lower an No. 16.
- Musetti is a **former junior world No. 1**, reaching the top ranking in June 2019. He won the boys' singles title at the 2019 Australian Open (d. Emilio Nava) and finished runner-up in the boys' singles at the 2018 US Open (l. Thiago Seyboth Wild).
- Musetti made his **Davis Cup** debut for Italy in 2021 and has a 3-6 overall win-loss record in the competition. He was a member of the Italian team which won their 2nd Davis Cup title in 2023. As defending champions, Italy qualified automatically for the 2024 Davis Cup Finals Group Stage and will compete in Group A in Bologna alongside Netherlands, Belgium and Brazil in September.
- Musetti is coached by Simone Tartarini.
