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On court today...

- Novak Djokovic contests his 4th semifinal at the Olympic Tennis Event this evening, with the No. 1 seed taking on Lorenzo Musetti in a rematch of the duo's Wimbledon semifinal clash last month. Djokovic has lost all 3 Olympic semifinals he has previously contested – and will hope for a victory tonight that will guarantee him an improvement on his bronze medal from Beijing 2008. For Musetti, a win against the 24-time Grand Slam champion will see him become the first Italian player to reach the singles final at the Olympics.
- In the first men's singles semifinal of the day, Carlos Alcaraz faces Felix Auger-Aliassime, with Alcaraz bidding to continue his quest for a gold medal to add to the Roland Garros and Wimbledon titles he has already won this summer. Alcaraz would become the 4th Spanish man to reach the Olympics singles final – and the first since his doubles partner Rafael Nadal won gold at Beijing 2008. Auger-Aliassime is aiming to secure 2 medals today, with the Canadian also contesting the mixed doubles bronze medal match alongside Gabriela Dabrowski.
- Iga Swiatek and Anna Karolina Schmiedlova must put their disappointment at losing in the women's singles semifinals to one side as they bid to for a bronze medal today. Victory for Swiatek would secure Poland's first medal at the Olympic Tennis Event, while Schmiedlova would become the 2nd Slovakian tennis player to win an Olympic medal, after Seoul 1988 men's singles gold medallist Miloslav Mecir.
- The mixed doubles final closes the day's action on Court Philippe Chatrier – and either Czechia and China, P.R. will claim their 2nd gold medal at the Olympic Tennis Event. Katerina Siniakova is bidding to add to her gold medal collection when she takes to court with Tomas Machac, with Siniakova also one half of the women's doubles team which won gold at Tokyo 2020. For Chinese stars Wang Xinyu and Zhang Zhizhen, a win today will see them emulate Athens 2004 women's doubles gold medallists Li Ting and Sun Tian-Tian.

A 7th meeting for Alcaraz and Auger-Aliassime, and their 2nd on clay. Their only previous meeting on clay came in the round of 16 at Roland Garros this year, which Alcaraz won in straight sets.

By defeating No. 5 Daniil Medvedev in the 3rd round here, Auger-Aliassime ended a 7-match losing streak against Top 5 players, having previously not defeated a Top 5 player since the 2022 ATP Finals, when he defeated No. 2 Rafael Nadal in the group stage. He has a 6-21 win-loss record against Top 5 players at Tour-level overall.

Alcaraz is bidding to extend an 8-match winning streak against Top 20 players. He has not lost to a Top 20 player since falling to No. 8 Andrey Rublev in the quarterfinals at Madrid-1000 this year. He has a 57-27 win-loss record against Top 20 players at Tour-level overall.

- **ALCARAZ** is bidding to become the 4th Spanish player to reach the men’s singles final since tennis returned to the Olympics at Seoul 1988 – after Jordi Arrese at Barcelona 1992, Sergi Bruguera at Atlanta 1996, and Rafael Nadal at Beijing 2008. He is making his Olympic debut at this event.
- At 21 years 91 days, Alcaraz is bidding to become the **youngest player to reach the men’s singles gold medal match since tennis returned to the Olympics at Seoul 1988**. Marc Rosset, who won the men’s singles gold medal at Barcelona 1992 aged 21 years 275 days, holds the record for youngest men’s singles finalist at the Olympics since 1988.
- By reaching the semifinals, Alcaraz has become the **5th Spanish player to reach the men’s singles semifinals since tennis returned to the Olympics at Seoul 1988** – after Arrese at Barcelona 1992, Bruguera at Atlanta 1996, Nadal at Beijing 2008 and Rio 2016 and Pablo Carreno Busta at Tokyo 2020.

- By reaching the semifinals here, Alcaraz has become the **youngest player to reach the men's singles semifinals at the Olympics since Beijing 2008**, when Novak Djokovic reached the semifinals aged 21 years 87 days. (NB ages calculated at the end of the tournament).
- Alcaraz is a **4-time Grand Slam singles champion**. He won his first Grand Slam title at the 2022 US Open (d. Casper Ruud) and won the titles at 2023 Wimbledon (d. Djokovic), 2024 Roland Garros (d. Alexander Zverev) and 2024 Wimbledon (d. Djokovic).
- Alcaraz is bidding to become the **2nd player to win the Roland Garros men's singles title and the Olympic men's singles gold medal in the same year** – after Nadal, who won his 4th title at Roland Garros and Olympic men's singles gold at Beijing in 2008.
- Alcaraz is bidding to become the **youngest player to win the Olympic men's singles gold medal**. Vincent Richards of the USA won men's singles gold 100 years ago, on clay, at Paris 1924, aged 21 years 123 days.
- **Elsewhere at the Grand Slams this year**, Alcaraz reached the quarterfinals at the Australian Open (l. Zverev).
- Alcaraz's **other highlights in 2024** are winning the title at Indian Wells-1000 (d. Daniil Medvedev), reaching the semifinals at Buenos Aires (l. Nicolas Jarry) and the quarterfinals at Miami-1000 (l. Grigor Dimitrov) and Madrid-1000 (l. Andrey Rublev).
- Aged 19 years 130 days, Alcaraz became the **youngest world No. 1 in history** after winning the title at the 2022 US Open. He has been ranked as world No. 1 for 36 weeks, most recently between June and September 2023. He plays here at No. 3.
- Alcaraz **led Spain to victory at the 2018 Junior Davis Cup Finals in Budapest**, defeating France in the title match. He reached a career-high junior ranking of No. 22 in January 2020 and his best performance in the junior events at the Grand Slams was his quarterfinal finish in the boys' singles here at 2019 Wimbledon.
- Alcaraz has played **Davis Cup** for Spain since 2022 and has won 2 of the 3 matches he has contested in the competition. Spain were awarded a wild card for the 2024 Davis Cup Finals Group Stage and will compete in Group B in Valencia alongside Australia, Czechia and France.
- Alcaraz is coached by former world No. 1 Juan Carlos Ferrero, who reached the men's singles quarterfinals at Sydney 2000.
- **AUGER-ALIASSIME** is bidding to become the first Canadian player, man or woman, to reach a singles final at the Olympics. By reaching the semifinals, he has become the first Canadian player, man or woman, to reach the singles semifinals at the Olympics.
- Auger-Aliassime is **one of 2 players competing for 2 medals at the Paris 2024 Olympic Tennis Event** – he and Gabriela Dabrowski will contest the mixed doubles bronze medal match against Demi Schuurs/Wesley Koolhof later today. Tomas Machac is also contesting multiple medal matches here.
- Auger-Aliassime is bidding to **win Canada's 2nd and 3rd medals at the Olympic Tennis Event** in the men's singles and mixed doubles events here. Canada's only medal at the Olympic Tennis Event came at Sydney 2000, when Sebastian Lareau/Daniel Nestor won the gold medal in men's doubles.
- Auger-Aliassime **made his Olympic debut at Tokyo 2020**. He fell to Max Purcell in the 1st round in men's singles and also fell in the 1st round in mixed doubles alongside Gabriela Dabrowski (l. Maria Sakkari/Stefanos Tsitsipas). This is his 2nd Olympics appearance.
- Auger-Aliassime's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the semifinals at the 2021 US Open (l. Daniil Medvedev). He became the first Canadian man to reach the semifinals at the US Open and the first man born in the 2000s to reach a Grand Slam semifinal.
- **At the Grand Slams this year**, Auger-Aliassime reached the round of 16 at Roland Garros (l. Alcaraz) and the 3rd round at the Australian Open (l. Daniil Medvedev) but fell in the 1st round at Wimbledon (l. Thanasi Kokkinakis).
- Auger-Aliassime's best result in 2024 is reaching his **first Masters-1000 final** at Madrid-1000 (l. Andrey Rublev). He has also reached the semifinals at Montpellier (l. Alexander Bublik) and the quarterfinals at Munich (l. Jan-Lennard Struff).

- Auger-Aliassime broke the Top 10 for the first time in November 2021 and reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 6 in November 2022. He plays here at No. 19.
- Auger-Aliassime was a **successful junior**. He won the boys' singles title at the 2016 US Open (d. Miomir Kecmanovic) and finished runner-up in the boys' singles at 2016 Roland Garros (l. Geoffrey Blancaneaux). He was also part of Canadian teams that reached back-to-back Junior Davis Cup Finals in 2015-16, defeating Germany to win the title in 2015 but finishing runner-up to Russia in 2016.
- Auger-Aliassime **led Canada to the Davis Cup title in 2022**, defeating Australia in the final. He won 8 of the 9 matches he contested in the competition that year. He was also a member of the Canadian team which finished runners-up to Spain in 2019 and has a 9-4 win-loss record in the competition overall. Canada defeated Korea, Rep. in the Qualifiers in February to advance to the 2024 Davis Cup Finals Group Stage. They will compete in Group D in Manchester alongside Argentina, Finland and Great Britain in September.
- Auger-Aliassime is coached by Frederic Fontang and Toni Nadal.

- **SWIATEK** is bidding to become the first Polish player to win a medal at the Olympic Tennis Event.
- Swiatek **made her Olympic debut at Tokyo 2020**, reaching the women’s singles 2nd round (d. Mona Barthel, l. Paula Badosa). She also reached the mixed doubles quarterfinals alongside Lukasz Kubot (l. Elena Vesnina/Aslan Karatsev).
- Swiatek is a **5-time Grand Slam champion**. She has won 4 titles at Roland Garros – in 2020 (d. Sofia Kenin), 2022 (d. Coco Gauff), 2023 (d. Karolina Muchova) and 2024 (d. Jasmine Paolini) – and also won the title at the 2022 US Open (d. Ons Jabeur).
- **Elsewhere at the Grand Slams this year**, Swiatek reached the 3rd round at both the Australian Open (l. Linda Noskova) and Wimbledon (l. Yulia Putintseva).
- Swiatek’s **has won 5 Tour-level titles in 2024**. In addition to her title at Roland Garros, she also won the titles at Doha-1000 (d. Elena Rybakina), Indian Wells-1000 (d. Maria Sakkari), Madrid-1000 (d. Aryna Sabalenka) and Rome-1000 (d. Sabalenka). She also reached the semifinals at Dubai-1000 (l. Anna Kalinskaya) and Stuttgart (l. Rybakina), and the round of 16 at Miami-1000 (l. Ekaterina Alexandrova).
- Swiatek became the **first Polish player to reach the singles world No. 1 ranking** on 4 April 2022 and plays here at the same ranking. She has been ranked at No. 1 for 112 of the 120 weeks since 4 April 2022.
- Swiatek reached a **career-high junior ranking** of No. 5 and won the girls’ singles at 2018 Wimbledon (d. Leonie Kung). She won girls’ doubles gold alongside Kaja Juvan at the Buenos Aires 2018 Youth Olympic Games (d. Yuki Naito/Naho Sato) and reached the girls’ singles quarterfinals at the same event (l. Clara Burel). She also led Poland to their 2nd Junior Billie Jean King Cup title at the 2016 Junior Billie Jean King Cup Finals in Budapest, defeating USA in the title match.
- Swiatek has played **Billie Jean King Cup** for Poland since 2018 and has an 11-3 win-loss record in the competition. Poland will play Spain in their opening tie at the 2024 Billie Jean King Cup Finals in Malaga in November.
- Swiatek is coached by Tomasz Wiktorowski.

- **SCHMIEDLOVA** is bidding to become the 2nd Slovakian player, woman or man, to win an Olympic medal – after Miloslav Mecir who won the men’s singles gold medal at Seoul 1988. By reaching the semifinals here, she became the 2nd Slovakian player to reach the singles semifinals at the Olympics, after Mecir.
- Schmiedlova **made her Olympic debut at Rio 2016**, reaching the 2nd round in the women’s singles (d. Roberta Vinci, l. Ekaterina Makarova). She did not compete at Tokyo 2020.
- Schmiedlova’s **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the round of 16 at 2023 Roland Garros (l. Coco Gauff).
- Schmiedlova has **lost in the 1st round at all 3 Grand Slam events this year** – at the Australian Open (l. Coco Gauff), Roland Garros (l. Sara Errani) and Wimbledon (l. Wang Yafan).
- Schmiedlova’s **best Tour-level results in 2024** are semifinal finishes at Austin (l. Yuan Yue) and Budapest (l. Aliaksandra Sasnovich).
- Schmiedlova reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 26 in October 2015. She plays here at No. 67.
- Schmiedlova has played **Billie Jean King Cup** for Slovakia since 2012 and has a 13-14 overall win-loss record in the competition. Slovakia will play USA in their opening tie at the 2024 Billie Jean King Cup Finals in Malaga in November.
- Schmiedlova is coached by Ladislav Simon.

An 8th meeting for Djokovic and Musetti and their 4th on clay. Musetti’s only victory against Djokovic came on clay at Monte Carlo-1000 last year – but Djokovic has won their other 3 meetings on clay.

This is Djokovic and Musetti’s 3rd meeting on Court Philippe Chatrier. The pair have met twice at Roland Garros, with Djokovic winning in 5 sets in both 2021 and this year. They have contested 3 Grand Slam meetings in total – with Djokovic also defeating Musetti in the semifinals at Wimbledon last month.

By defeating No. 4 Alexander Zverev in the quarterfinals here, Musetti ended an 11-match losing streak against Top 5 players – he had previously not defeated a Top 5 player since his victory against No. 1 Djokovic at 2023 Monte Carlo-1000. He is bidding to record multiple victories against Top 5 players at the same event for the first time. He has a 3-17 win-loss record against Top 5 players overall.

- **DJOKOVIC** is bidding to reach the final at the Olympic Tennis Event for the first time.
- Djokovic is bidding to become the **5th player to reach the men’s singles final at all 4 Grand Slam tournaments and the Olympic Tennis Event** – after Andre Agassi, Roger Federer, Andy Murray and Rafael Nadal.
- At 37 years 74 days, Djokovic is bidding to become the **oldest player to reach a singles final since tennis returned to the Olympics at Seoul 1988**. Just 2 players have reached an Olympic singles final aged 30 or older since 1988 – London 2012 women’s singles gold medallist Serena Williams (30 years 314 days) and London 2012 men’s singles silver medallist Federer (30 years 363 days). (NB ages calculated at the end of the tournament)

- By reaching the semifinals at the Olympics for the 4th time, Djokovic has extended his **record for most singles semifinal appearances at the Olympics**. No other player has reached the singles semifinals on more than 2 occasions since tennis returned to the Olympics at Seoul 1988.
- By reaching the semifinals here aged 37 years 74 days, Djokovic has become the **oldest player to reach the singles semifinals since tennis returned to the Olympics at Seoul 1988** – breaking the record he set by reaching the semifinals at Tokyo 2020 aged 34 years 71 days. (NB ages calculated at the end of the tournament)
- Djokovic advanced to the quarterfinals after defeating Matthew Ebden 60 61, Rafael Nadal 61 64 and Dominik Koepfer 75 63 in the opening 3 rounds.
- Djokovic is bidding to record his 18th Olympic singles match-win and extend his record for **most Olympic singles matches won since Seoul 1988**. By recording his 14th Olympic match-win in the 1st round here, Djokovic claimed sole ownership of the record for most Olympic singles matches won since Seoul 1988, ahead of Federer.
- Djokovic **won the bronze medal at Beijing 2008**, where he fell to Nadal in the semifinals before defeating James Blake in the bronze medal match. It remains the only medal Serbia has won at the Olympic Tennis Event.
- Djokovic is making his **5th Olympics appearance**. In addition to winning the bronze medal on his Olympic debut at Beijing 2008, also finished in 4th place at both London 2012, where he fell to Andy Murray in the semifinals and to Juan Martin del Potro in the bronze medal match, and Tokyo 2020, where he fell to Alexander Zverev in the semifinals and to Pablo Carreno Busta in the bronze medal match. He fell to Del Potro in the 1st round at Rio 2016.
- Djokovic holds the **all-time record for most Grand Slam men's singles titles won** and jointly holds the record for most Grand Slam singles titles won among men and women, alongside Margaret Court. He has won 24 Grand Slam titles – 10 at the Australian Open, 7 at Wimbledon, 4 at the US Open and 3 at Roland Garros.
- Djokovic is bidding to become the **5th player in history to compete the career 'Golden Slam'** (winning all 4 Grand Slam titles and the Olympic gold medal) in singles – after Andre Agassi, Steffi Graf, Nadal and Serena Williams.
- **At the Grand Slams this year**, Djokovic finished runner-up at Wimbledon (l. Carlos Alcaraz), reached the semifinals at the Australian Open (l. Jannik Sinner) and reached the quarterfinals at Roland Garros, where he gave a walkover to Casper Ruud due to a knee injury.
- Djokovic's **other highlights in 2024** are reaching the semifinals at Monte-Carlo-1000 (l. Casper Ruud) and Geneva (l. Tomas Machac).
- Djokovic **holds the record for most weeks ranked No. 1**, having held the top ranking for a total of 428 weeks. His most-recent spell as world No. 1 ended in June, when he dropped to No. 3 following his withdrawal from Roland Garros. He rose to No. 2 on 24 June and plays here at the same ranking.
- Djokovic has played **Davis Cup** for Serbia since 2004, has a 44-16 win-loss record in the competition and led Serbia to their only title in the competition to date in 2010. Serbia will host Greece in a World Group I tie in September.
- Djokovic is currently without a permanent coach.
- **MUSETTI** is bidding to become the first Italian player to reach a singles final at the Olympic Tennis Event. By reaching the semifinals here, Musetti has become
- Musetti and Sara Errani/Jasmine Paolini, who are contesting the women's doubles semifinals here, are bidding to win **Italy's 2nd and 3rd medals at the Olympic Tennis Event** – after De Morpurgo's bronze medal in men's singles at Paris 1924.
- By reaching the semifinals, Musetti has **become the first Italian player, man or woman, to reach the singles semifinals since tennis returned to the Olympics at Seoul 1988**. The only Italian player to reach the singles semifinals at the Olympic Tennis Event is Uberto de Morpurgo, who won the bronze medal in men's singles at Paris 1924.
- Musetti **made his Olympic debut at Tokyo 2020**. He fell in the 1st round in men's singles (l. John Millman) and reached the 2nd round in men's doubles alongside Lorenzo Sonego (d. Pablo Andujar/Roberto Carballes Baena, l. Nikola Mektic/Mate Pavic).
- Musetti recorded his **best Grand Slam result** at Wimbledon this year, where he reached the semifinals (l. Djokovic).

- **Elsewhere at the Grand Slams this year**, Musetti reached the 3rd round at Roland Garros, where he defeated Daniel Elahi Galan and Monfils before falling to Djokovic, and the 2nd round at the Australian Open (d. Benjamin Bonzi, l. Luca van Assche).
- Musetti's **other highlights in 2024** are finishing runner-up at Queen's (l. Tommy Paul) and Umag (l. Francisco Cerundolo), with the final at Umag taking place on Saturday evening. He also reached the semifinals at Stuttgart (l. Matteo Berrettini), the quarterfinals at Adelaide (l. Alexander Bublik) and the quarterfinals at Miami-1000 (l. Carlos Alcaraz).
- Musetti reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 15 in June and plays here one place lower an No. 16.
- Musetti is a **former junior world No. 1**, reaching the top ranking in June 2019. He won the boys' singles title at the 2019 Australian Open (d. Emilio Nava) and finished runner-up in the boys' singles at the 2018 US Open (l. Thiago Seyboth Wild).
- Musetti made his **Davis Cup** debut for Italy in 2021 and has a 3-6 overall win-loss record in the competition. He was a member of the Italian team which won their 2nd Davis Cup title in 2023. As defending champions, Italy qualified automatically for the 2024 Davis Cup Finals Group Stage and will compete in Group A in Bologna alongside Netherlands, Belgium and Brazil in September.
- Musetti is coached by Simone Tartarini.

- **SINIAKOVA/MACHAC** are bidding to become the first Czech team to win the mixed doubles gold medal at the Olympic Tennis Event.
- Siniakova/Machac are bidding to **win Czechia's 2nd gold medal at the Olympic Tennis Event**. Siniakova won Czechia's only gold medal at the Olympic Tennis Event to date by winning the women's doubles title alongside Barbora Krejčíková at Tokyo 2020 (d. Belinda Bencic/Viktorija Golubic).
- By reaching the final here, Siniakova have ensured they will become the **3rd Czech team to win medal in mixed doubles at the Olympic Tennis Event** – after Milada Skrbkova/Ladislav Zemla, who won the bronze medal at Antwerp 1920, and Lucie Hradecka/Radek Stepanek, who won the bronze medal at Rio 2016.
- Siniakova/Machac are **one of 3 Czech teams competing for medals at Paris 2024**. Machac will also contest the men's doubles bronze medal match alongside Adam Pavlasek on Saturday, while Karolina Muchova/Linda Noskova have reached the women's doubles semifinals here. (see table overleaf)

- Machac is **one of 2 players competing for 2 medals at the Paris 2024 Olympic Tennis Event** – alongside Felix Auger-Aliassime, who is contesting the men's singles semifinals and the mixed doubles bronze medal match alongside Gabriela Dabrowski.
- Siniakova is making her **first appearance in mixed doubles** at the Olympics and her 2nd Olympics appearance overall, having won the women's doubles gold medal on her Olympic debut at Tokyo 2020.
- Machac **made his Olympic debut at Tokyo 2020**, reaching the 2nd round in men's singles (d. Joao Sousa, l. Diego Schwartzman). He is making her first appearance in mixed doubles at the Olympics and his 2nd Olympics appearance overall.
- Siniakova is a **9-time Grand Slam women's doubles champion**. She won her first 7 titles alongside Krejckikova - at Roland Garros in 2018 and 2021, at Wimbledon in 2018 and 2022, at the Australian Open in 2022 and 2023, and at the 2022 US Open. She also won the women's doubles titles at 2024 Roland Garros alongside Coco Gauff (d. Sara Errani/Jasmine Paolini) and 2024 Wimbledon alongside Taylor Townsend (d. Gabriela Dabrowski/Erin Routliffe).
- Machac's **best Grand Slam men's doubles results** both came alongside Zhang in 2024 – reaching the semifinals at the Australian Open (l. Rohan Bopanna/Matthew Ebden) and the quarterfinals at Roland Garros (l. Marcel Granollers/Horacio Zeballos).
- Siniakova/Machac are making their **3rd appearance as a mixed doubles team**. They have lost in the 1st round on both of their previous appearances as a team – at the 2022 Australian Open (l. Nadiia Kichenok/Santiago Gonzalez) and 2024 Roland Garros (l. Hsieh Su-Wei/Jan Zielinski).
- Siniakova jointly reached the **doubles world No. 1 ranking** with Krejckikova for the first time in October 2018 and has spent a total of 115 weeks at world No. 1. She is currently ranked at No. 2. She reached a career-high singles ranking of No. 27 in June this year and is currently ranked at No. 39.
- Machac reached a **career-high doubles ranking** of No. 51 earlier this month and plays here at No. 53. He reached a career-high singles ranking of No. 33 in June this year and is currently ranked at No. 39.
- Siniakova was **part of the Czech team that won the 2018 Billie Jean King Cup**. She won both singles matches she contested in the 2018 final as Czechia defeated USA 3-0 to win the competition. She has a 10-8 win-loss record in the competition. Czechia received a wild card to the 2024 Billie Jean King Cup Finals in Malaga in November and will face the winner of Spain and Poland in the quarterfinals at the Finals in Malaga in November.
- Machac has played **Davis Cup** for Czechia since 2021 and has a 9-6 overall win-loss record in the competition. Czechia defeated Israel in the Qualifiers in February to reach the 2024 Davis Cup Finals and will compete in Group B in Valencia alongside Australia, France and Spain.
- Siniakova is coached by Peter Huber. Machac is coached by Daniel Vacek, who reached the men's doubles quarterfinals alongside Jiri Novak at Atlanta 1996.

- **WANG/ZHANG** are bidding to become the 2nd Chinese doubles team to win a gold medal at the Olympic Tennis Event – after Li Ting/Sun Tian-Tian, who won the gold medal in women’s doubles at Athens 2004.
- By reaching the gold medal match here, Wang/Zhang have guaranteed they will become the **3rd Chinese doubles team to win a medal at the Olympic Tennis Event**.

- Wang is **contesting a mixed doubles event for the first time in her career**. Zhang is contesting a mixed doubles event for the 3rd time – he fell in the 1st round alongside Han Xinyun at the 2023 Australian Open (l. Luisa Stefani/Rafael Matos) and won one of the 2 mixed doubles matches he contested alongside Zheng Qinwen at the 2024 United Cup.
- Wang is a **Grand Slam doubles champion**. She won the women’s doubles title alongside Hsieh Su-Wei at 2023 Roland Garros (d. Leylah Fernandez/Taylor Townsend).
- Zhang’s **best Grand Slam men’s doubles results** both came alongside Machac in 2024 – reaching the semifinals at the Australian Open (l. Rohan Bopanna/Matthew Ebden) and the quarterfinals at Roland Garros (l. Marcel Granollers/Horacio Zeballos).

- By reaching the semifinals here, Errani/Paolini and Musetti have become the **first Italian players to reach a semifinal in singles or doubles since tennis returned to the Olympics at Seoul 1988**.
- Errani/Paolini and Musetti, who is contesting the men’s singles semifinals here, are bidding to win **Italy’s 2nd and 3rd medals at the Olympic Tennis Event**. Italy’s only previous medal at the Olympic Tennis Event came at Paris 1924, when Uberto de Morpurgo won the bronze medal in men’s singles.
- Errani/Paolini are **competing together at the Olympics for the 2nd time**. They reached the women’s doubles 2nd round at Tokyo 2020 (I. Lyudmyla Kichenok/Nadiia Kichenok). This is Errani’s 5th Olympics appearance overall and Paolini’s 2nd Olympics appearance.
- Errani is **contesting the women’s doubles event at the Olympic Tennis Event for the 4th time**. In addition to her 2nd round finish alongside Paolini, she reached the quarterfinals alongside Roberta Vinci at both London 2012 (I. Serena Williams/Venus Williams) and Rio 2016 (I. Lucie Safarova/Barbora Strycova).
- Errani/Paolini reached their **first Grand Slam doubles final together** at Roland Garros this year (I. Gauff/Katerina Siniakova).

- Errani/Paolini **won their first titles as a team in 2024** – at Linz (d. Nicola Pietrangeli/Maria Sakkari) and Rome-1000 (d. Coco Gauff/Erin Routliffe).
- Errani/Paolini have won **3 Tour-level women's doubles titles as a team**. In addition to their titles at Linz and Rome-1000 this year, they also won the title at Monastir last year (d. Mai Hontama/Natalija Stevanovic).
- Errani is bidding to win the women's doubles gold medal here and **complete the career 'Golden Slam' in women's doubles**. She would become the 7th player to complete the 'career Golden Slam' in women's doubles if she wins the gold medal here – after Gigi Fernandez, Barbora Krejčíková, Katerina Siniakova, Pam Shriver, Serena Williams and Venus Williams.
- Errani is a **5-time Grand Slam women's doubles champion**. She won all 5 of her titles alongside Roberta Vinci – at 2012 Roland Garros (d. Maria Kirilenko/Nadia Petrova), at the 2012 US Open (d. Andrea Hlaváčková/Lucie Hradecká), at the Australian Open in 2013 (d. Ashleigh Barty/Casey Dellacqua) and 2014 (d. Ekaterina Makarova/Elena Vesnina) and at 2014 Wimbledon (d. Timea Babos/Kristina Mladenovic).
- Errani is a **Grand Slam singles finalist**. She reached the singles final at 2012 Roland Garros (l. Maria Sharapova).
- Paolini reached her **first 2 Grand Slam singles finals in 2024**, finishing runner-up to Iga Świątek at Roland Garros and to Barbora Krejčíková at Wimbledon. She is the 2nd Italian woman to reach multiple Grand Slam singles finals, after Francesca Schiavone, who won the title at 2010 Roland Garros and finished runner-up at 2011 Roland Garros.
- Errani is a **former doubles world No. 1**. She reached the top ranking for the first time in September 2012 after winning the women's doubles at the US Open alongside Vinci. She has spent a total of 87 weeks at world No. 1. She plays here at No. 16. She reached a career-high singles ranking of No. 5 in March 2013 and is currently ranked at No. 91.
- Paolini reached a **career-high doubles ranking** of No. 13 in July this year and plays here 2 places lower at No. 15. She rose to a career-high singles ranking of No. 5 after finishing runner-up at Wimbledon this month, becoming the 3rd Italian woman to be ranked in the Top 5 in singles, after Schiavone and Errani, and remains at No. 5.
- Errani is a **3-time Billie Jean King Cup champion**. She made her debut in the competition in 2008, has a 26-21 Billie Jean King Cup win-loss record and was part of the Italian teams which won the title in 2009, 2010 and 2013. Paolini was part of the Italian team which finished as runners-up at the 2023 Billie Jean King Cup Finals (l. Canada). She has competed in Billie Jean King Cup for Italy since 2017 and has an 8-13 win-loss record in the competition. As 2023 runners-up, Italy automatically qualified for the 2024 Billie Jean King Cup Finals and will face the winner of the tie between Japan and Romania in the quarterfinals at the Finals in Malaga in November.

- **MUCHOVA/NOSKOVA** are bidding to become the 4th Czech women's doubles team to reach the final since tennis returned to the Olympics at Seoul 1988 – after Jana Novotná/Helena Suková at Seoul 1988 and Atlanta 1996, Andrea Hlaváčková/Lucie Hradecká at London 2012 and Barbora Krejčíková/Katerina Siniakova at Tokyo 2020.
- By reaching the semifinals here, Muchova/Noskova have become the **5th Czech women's doubles team to reach the semifinals since tennis returned to the Olympics at Seoul 1988** – after Novotná/Suková at Seoul 1988 and Atlanta 1996, Hlaváčková/Hradecká at London 2012 and Rio 2016, Lucie Šafářová/Barbora Strýcová at Rio 2016 and Krejčíková/Siniakova at Tokyo 2020.
- Muchova/Noskova are **contesting their first event as a team**. They are both making their Olympic debuts at this event.
- Muchova reached her **first Grand Slam singles final** at 2023 Roland Garros (l. Iga Świątek).
- Noskova's **best Grand Slam singles result** is reaching the quarterfinals at the Australian Open this year (l. Dayana Yastremska).

- Paul **made his Olympic debut at Tokyo 2020**, where he fell in the 1st round in men's singles (I. Aslan Karatsev). Fritz is making his Olympic debut at Paris 2024.
- Fritz/Paul are **contesting their 14th Tour-level event as a doubles team** – and their 2nd event of the 2024 season. They fell in the 1st round at Rome-1000 (I. Francisco Cerundolo/Tomas Martin Etcheverry) in their only previous appearance together this year.
- Fritz/Paul's **best results as a doubles team** are reaching the semifinals at 2022 Queen's (I. Nikola Mektic/Mate Pavic) and the quarterfinals at 2022 Indian Wells-1000 (I. Andrey Golubev/Alexander Zverev).

Woodbridge and Woodforde are the only players to have reached an Olympic final in singles or doubles since 1988.
- Peers **won the mixed doubles bronze medal at Tokyo 2020** alongside Ashleigh Barty. The pair fell to Andrey Rublev/Anastasia Pavlyuchenkova in the semifinals and received a walkover against Nina Stojanovic/Novak Djokovic in the bronze medal match.
- Peers is making his **3rd Olympic appearance**. He made his Olympic debut at Rio 2016, falling in the 1st round alongside Chris Guccione in men's doubles (I. Juan Martin del Potro/Maximo Gonzalez) and alongside Samantha Stosur in mixed doubles (I. Sania Mirza/Rohan Bopanna). - Auger-Aliassime is **one of 2 players competing for 2 medals at the Paris 2024 Olympic Tennis Event** – he faces Carlos Alcaraz in the men's singles semifinals today. Tomas Machac is also contesting multiple medal matches here. (NB written prior to the men's singles semifinals on Friday)
- By contesting the bronze medal match here, Dabrowski/Auger-Aliassime have become the **3rd Canadian team to reach a medal match at the Olympics** – after Sydney 2000 men's doubles gold medallists Lareau/Nestor and Nestor/Vasek Pospisil, who finished in 4th place in men's doubles at Rio 2016.
- Dabrowski/Auger-Aliassime's **only previous appearance together as a team came at Tokyo 2020**. They fell in the 1st round to Maria Sakkari/Stefanos Tsitsipas. Dabrowski is making her 3rd Olympic appearance and Auger-Aliassime is making his 2nd Olympic appearance.

Lucie Safarova/Barbora Strycova) but fell in the 1st round in women's doubles alongside Sharon Fichman at Tokyo 2020 (I. Laura Pigossi/Luisa Stefani).

- Auger-Aliassime **made his Olympic debut at Tokyo 2020**, where he fell in the 1st round in men's singles (l. Max Purcell).
- Dabrowski **won her first Grand Slam women's doubles title** alongside Erin Routliffe at the 2023 US Open (d. Laura Siegemund/Vera Zvonareva). He was also a member of the Canadian team which finished runners-up to Spain in 2019 and has a 9-4 win-loss record in the competition overall. Canada defeated Korea, Rep. in the Qualifiers in February to advance to the 2024 Davis Cup Finals Group Stage. They have contested 3 other Grand Slam events they have played as a team, losing their opening match at all 3 – at Wimbledon in 2017 and 2021 and at the 2021 Australian Open.
- Schuurs/Koolhof are contesting their **6th event as a team**. In addition to their 4 Grand Slam events together, they also competed for Netherlands at the 2024 United Cup, winning both matches they contested – against Croatia's Donna Vekic/Ivan Dodig and Norway's Ulrikke Eikeri/Casper Ruud.
- Schuurs' **best Grand Slam women's doubles result** is reaching the semifinals alongside Nicole Melichar at the 2021 Australian Open (I. Elise Mertens/Aryna Sabalenka). Her best Grand Slam mixed doubles result is reaching the semifinals alongside Koolhof at 2021 Roland Garros.
- Koolhof has **won one Grand Slam men's doubles title and one Grand Slam mixed doubles title**. He won the men's doubles title alongside Neal Skupski at 2023 Wimbledon (d. Marcel Granollers/Horacio Zeballos) and won the mixed doubles title alongside Ena Shibahara at 2022 Roland Garros (d. Eikeri/Vliegen).
- Schuurs has **won 18 Tour-level doubles titles** – most recently alongside Luisa Stefani at 2024 Doha (d. Caroline Dolehide/Desirae Krawczyk).
- Koolhof has **won 19 Tour-level doubles titles**, including 3 this year – alongside Nikola Pietrangeli at Auckland (d. Granollers/Zeballos), Rotterdam (d. Robin Haase/Botic van de Zandschulp) and Indian Wells-1000 (d. Granollers/Zeballos).
- Schuurs reached a **career-high doubles ranking** of No. 7 in October 2018. She is currently ranked at No. 22.
- Koolhof reached the **doubles world No. 1 ranking** for the first time in November 2022. He is currently ranked at No. 7.
- Schuurs has played **Billie Jean King Cup** for Netherlands since 2012 and has an 11-5 win-loss record in the competition. Netherlands won promotion at the Europe/Africa Group I event in April and will play away against Slovenia in the 2024 Billie Jean King Cup Play-offs in November.
- Koolhof has played **Davis Cup** for Netherlands since 2019 and has a 5-7 win-loss record in the competition. Netherlands will compete in Group A in Bologna alongside Italy, Belgium and Brazil at the 2024 Davis Cup Finals Group Stage in September.
- Schuurs is coached by Philippe Goijens and Torsten Peschke. Koolhof is coached by Mariusz Fyrstenberg.

- **BUCSA/SORRIBES TORMO** are bidding to become the 4th Spanish women’s doubles team to reach the final since tennis returned to the Olympics at Seoul 1988 – after Conchita Martinez/Arantxa Sanchez Vicario at Barcelona 1992, Martinez/Virginia Ruano Pascual at Athens 2004 and Anabel Medina Garrigues/Ruano Pascual at Beijing 2008.
- By reaching the semifinals, Bucsa/Sorribes Tormo have become the **4th Spanish women’s doubles team to reach the semifinals since tennis returned to the Olympics at Seoul 1988** – after Martinez/Sanchez Vicario at Barcelona 1992 and Atlanta 1996, Martinez/Ruano Pascual at Athens 2004 and Medina Garrigues/Ruano Pascual at Beijing 2008.
- Sorribes Tormo **made her Olympic debut at Tokyo 2020**, reaching the 3rd round in the women’s singles (l. Anastasia Pavlyuchenkova) and the 2nd round in the women’s doubles alongside Paula Badosa (l. Barbora Krejcikova/Katerina Siniakova). Bucsa is making her Olympic debut at this event.
- Bucsa/Sorribes Tormo are contesting their 2nd event as a team. They **won the title in their only previous event as a team** – at 2024 Madrid-1000 (d. Krejcikova/Laura Siegemund).
- Bucsa’s **best Grand Slam doubles result** is reaching the quarterfinals alongside Alexandra Panova at the 2024 Australian Open (l. Gabriela Dabrowski/Erin Routliffe).

- Sorribes Tormo's **best Grand Slam doubles result** is reaching the semifinals alongside Marie Bouzkova at 2023 Wimbledon (l. Hsieh Su-Wei/Barbora Strýcova).
- Bucsa has won **4 Tour-level doubles titles**, 3 of which have come in 2024. In addition to her title alongside Sorribes Tormo at Madrid-1000, she won the titles alongside Kamilla Rakhimova at Bogota (d. Anna Bondar/Irina Khromacheva) and alongside Monica Niculescu at Strasbourg (d. Asia Muhammad/Aldila Sutjiadi).
- Sorribes Tormo has won **5 Tour-level doubles titles** – most recently alongside Bucsa at Madrid-1000 this year.
- Bucsa reached a **career-high doubles ranking** of No. 19 in June this year and is currently ranked at No. 20. She reached a career-high singles ranking of No. 56 in January this year and is currently ranked at No. 60.
- Sorribes Tormo reached a **career-high doubles ranking** of No. 17 in May this year and is currently ranked at No. 27. She reached a career-high singles ranking of No. 32 in February 2022 and is currently ranked at No. 71.

- Aged 17 years 98 days, Andreeva is bidding to become the **youngest player to reach the women's doubles final at the Olympic Tennis Event**. She would also become the 2nd youngest player in Olympic history, man or woman, to reach a final in singles or doubles at the Olympic Tennis Event – after Jennifer Capriati, who won the women's singles gold medal at 1992 Barcelona aged 16 years 132 days. (NB all ages calculated at the end of the tournament)
- Aged 20 years 125 days, Shnaider is bidding to become the **youngest player (other than Andreeva) to reach the women's doubles final at the Olympic Tennis Event since Sydney 2000** – when Serena Williams (aged 19 years 5 days) and Venus Williams (aged 20 years 106 days) won the gold medal in women's doubles.
- Andreeva's **best Grand Slam doubles result** is reaching the quarterfinals at 2024 Roland Garros alongside Vera Zvonareva, with the pair giving a walkover to Marta Kostyuk/Elena-Gabriela Ruse.
- Shnaider's **best Grand Slam doubles result** is also reaching the quarterfinals at 2024 Roland Garros alongside Emma Navarro (l. Sara Errani/Jasmine Paolini).
- Andreeva's **best Grand Slam singles result** is reaching the semifinals at Roland Garros this year (l. Jasmine Paolini).
- Shnaider's **best Grand Slam singles result** is reaching the 3rd round at Wimbledon this year (l. Navarro).
- Andreeva won her **first Tour-level singles title** at Iasi last week (d. Elina Avanesyan).
- Shnaider won her **first 3 Tour-level singles titles in 2024** – at Hua Hin (d. Lin Zhu), Bad Homburg (d. Donna Vekic) and Budapest (d. Aliaksandra Sasnovich).
- Andreeva plays here at a new **career-high doubles ranking** of No. 95. She also reached a career-high singles ranking of No. 23 in June after reaching her first Grand Slam singles semifinal at Roland Garros and remains at the same ranking.
- Shnaider reached a **career-high doubles ranking** of No. 65 last week and plays here at the same ranking. She also reached a career-high singles ranking of No. 23 last week and is currently ranked at No. 24.
- Andreeva had a **good junior career**. She reached the girls' singles final at the 2023 Australian Open (l. Alina Korneeva) and became junior world No. 1 in May last year.
- Shnaider was also a **successful junior**. She reached a career-high junior ranking of No. 2 in January 2022, reached the girls' singles semifinals at 2021 Roland Garros (l. Linda Noskova) and the 2022 US Open (l. Lucie Havlickova) and won 3 Grand Slam girls' doubles titles.

- Andreeva is coached by Conchita Martinez, who is one of only 3 players to win medals at 3 different Olympic Games. Shnaider is coached by Igor Andreev.
