Men’s Tournament Preview

This is the 113th edition of the Australian Championships, which began in 1905, as well as being the 56th Australian Open and the 227th Grand Slam tournament of the Open Era.

Melbourne Park hosts the tournament for the 38th year. It was first played here in 1988, when the venue was known as Flinders Park.

2024 – A REVIEW

Jannik Sinner and Carlos Alcaraz each won 2 Grand Slam titles in 2024. Sinner claimed his first 2 major titles on the hard courts of the Australian Open and US Open, defeating Daniil Medvedev and Taylor Fritz, respectively in the finals. Alcaraz added his 3rd and 4th Grand Slam titles last season, defeating Alexander Zverev in the final at Roland Garros and successfully defending his Wimbledon title with victory over Novak Djokovic in the final for the 2nd straight year.

By triumphing in Melbourne and New York, Sinner became the first man since Guillermo Vilas in 1977 to win his first two Grand Slam titles in the same season, while Alcaraz became the 4th man in the Open Era to win 4 Grand Slam titles aged 21 or younger. 2024 was the first season that Djokovic failed to win a major title since 2017 and the first season since 2002 that none of Djokovic, Roger Federer or Rafael Nadal won a Grand Slam title.

Away from the Grand Slams, Djokovic became the 5th player to complete the Career Golden Slam in singles by defeating Alcaraz in the final to claim the men’s singles gold medal at the Paris 2024 Olympic Tennis Event – joining Andre Agassi, Steffi Graf, Nadal and Serena Williams in achieving the feat. By winning gold aged 37 years 74 days, he became the oldest singles gold medallist since tennis returned to the Olympics at Seoul 1988.

Elsewhere, Sinner won 3 titles at Masters-1000 level (Miami, Cincinnati and Shanghai), becoming the first player to do so in a season since Nadal in 2019, while Zverev claimed 2 Masters-1000 titles (Rome and Paris). The 4 other winners of Masters-1000 tournaments were Alcaraz (Indian Wells), Stefanos Tsitsipas (Monte Carlo), Andrey Rublev (Madrid) and Alexei Popyrin (Montreal).

Sinner ended his individual season by winning the ATP Finals without dropping a set, becoming the first player to do so since Ivan Lendl in 1986. The victory also saw him become the first player to win 8 titles in a season since Andy Murray in 2016. He then led Italy to their 3rd Davis Cup title (after 1976 and 2023), with the Italians defeating Netherlands in the final in Malaga to become the first nation to win back-to-back titles since Czechia in 2012-13.

SINNER SEEKS TO DEFEND MAIDEN MAJOR TRIUMPH

Sinner is defending a Grand Slam title for the first time after winning his first major here last year. If he wins the title again this year, he would become the first player to successfully defend his first men's singles Grand Slam title since Nadal won his first 2 Grand Slam titles at Roland Garros in 2005 and 2006. He would also become the 3rd player to achieve the feat at the Australian Open, after Johan Kriek (1981-82) and Stefan Edberg, who won his first major title at the Australian Open in December 1985 before successfully defending his title at the next edition held in January 1987.

SINNER AIMS TO MAKE MORE HISTORY FOR ITALY

After winning his first two Grand Slam titles at the Australian Open and US Open, No. 1 seed Sinner is bidding to win his 3rd Grand Slam title and become the first Italian player in history, man or woman, to do so. He is already one of only two Italian men to have reached multiple Grand Slam singles finals, after Nicola Pietrangeli, who won the title at Roland Garros in 1959 and 1960, and finished runner-up in 1961 and 1964.

Sinner became the first Italian player in history, man or woman, to reach an Australian Open singles final in 2024. At least one Italian player had previously reached a singles final at the other 3 Grand Slam tournaments.

SINNER LOOKS TO CONSOLIDATE HARD COURT DOMINANCE

Following titles at both Grand Slam tournaments played on hard courts in 2024, Sinner is seeking to become the 5th player in the Open Era to win 3 consecutive hard court Grand Slam men's singles titles – and the first since Djokovic in 2015-16.

ALCARAZ AIMS FOR CAREER GRAND SLAM

After winning the titles at the 2022 US Open, at Wimbledon in 2023 and 2024, and at 2024 Roland Garros, Alcaraz will bid to complete the career Grand Slam in men's singles at the Australian Open this year. Aged 21 years 266 days, he will become the youngest man to complete the career Grand Slam if he wins the title here. (NB ages calculated at end of tournament) (see table overleaf)

ALCARAZ BIDS TO BE YOUNGEST MAN TO WIN FIVE SLAM TITLES

Victory at the Australian Open this month would also see Alcaraz win his 5th Grand Slam title and claim sole ownership of the Open Era record for most Grand Slam men's singles titles won aged 21 or under. He equalled the record – held by Boris Becker, Bjorn Borg and Mats Wilander – by winning his 4th major title at 2024 Wimbledon.

ALCARAZ LOOKS TO PASS SANTANA ON LIST OF SPANISH GREATS

Alcaraz is bidding to win his 5th major title here and become the 2nd Spanish man to win 5 or more Grand Slam singles titles, after Nadal. He would become the 2nd Spanish man to win the Australian Open title after 2009 and 2022 champion Nadal.

WINNING FIRST FIVE GRAND SLAM FINALS

Alcaraz has won all 4 Grand Slam finals he has contested. Should he reach and win the final at the Australian Open this month, he would become the 6th player in history to win his first 5 Grand Slam men's singles finals – and the 2nd in the Open Era after Federer, who won the first 7 Grand Slam finals he contested.

DJOKOVIC BIDS FOR NEW GRAND SLAM RECORD

Ten-time Australian Open champion Djokovic is bidding to win his 25th Grand Slam singles title – and claim sole ownership of the all-time record for most Grand Slam singles titles, ahead of Margaret Court.

DJOKOVIC AIMS FOR ELEVENTH AUSSIE CROWN

Djokovic is bidding to win his 11th Australian Open title and extend his lead at the top of the list for most Australian Championships/Open men's singles titles.

By winning the title here in 2023, Djokovic also became the 2nd man in history to win at least 10 titles at any Grand Slam event. Nadal is the only other man to have won at least 10 titles at a single Grand Slam event, having won the title at Roland Garros on 14 occasions.

DJOKOVIC LOOKS TO BECOME OLDEST GRAND SLAM CHAMPION

Aged 37 years 249 days, Djokovic is bidding to become the oldest player in the Open Era to win a Grand Slam men's singles title – and the 2nd man in the Open Era to win a Grand Slam title aged 37 or older, after Ken Rosewall at the 1972 Australian Open. (NB ages calculated at the end of the tournament)

Should he reach the final here, Djokovic will become the 2nd man in the Open Era to reach multiple Grand Slam finals after turning 37 – after Rosewall, who contested 3 Grand Slam finals after his 37th birthday.

Djokovic is also bidding to win his 13th Grand Slam title since turning 30 and extend his record for most Grand Slam singles titles won after the age of 30 in the Open Era. He claimed sole ownership of the record by winning his 11th Grand Slam title since turning 30 at 2023 Roland Garros, moving ahead of Serena Williams.

Djokovic is bidding to win his 5th Australian Open title since turning 30. He is the only man in the Open Era to have won 3 or more Australian Open titles after turning 30 and one of just 4 men in the Open Era (alongside Federer, Rosewall and Andre Agassi) to have won multiple Australian Open titles after turning 30. In the Open Era, the Australian Open men's singles title has been won by players aged 30 or over on 14 occasions.

DECADES APART

Djokovic is bidding to win the title here 17 years after winning his first Grand Slam title here in 2008 and equal Nadal's Open Era record for longest gap between first and most-recent Grand Slam men's singles titles. Among men and women, he is in 3rd place on the Open Era list for largest gap between first and most-recent Grand Slam titles – behind Serena Williams and Nadal. (see table overleaf)

Djokovic is one of 4 players (men or women) to have won Grand Slam titles in 3 different decades in the Open Era – alongside Nadal (who also won at least one major title in the 2000s, 2010s and 2020s), Williams (1990s, 2000s and 2010s) and Martina Navratilova (1970s, 1980s and 1990s).

MOST AUSTRALIAN OPEN FINAL APPEARANCES

Djokovic surpassed Federer at the top of the Open Era list for most Australian Open men's singles final appearances by reaching his 8th final here in 2020 – and extended the record by reaching a 9th final in 2021 and 10th final in 2023.

A NEW NAME ON THE TROPHY?

Just 3 active players (Djokovic, Sinner and Wawrinka) have won an Australian Open title – together with Federer and Nadal, they have won the last 19 Australian Open men's singles titles between them.

Six active male players have reached the Australian Open final. In addition to Djokovic, Sinner and Wawrinka, 3 active male players have finished as runner-up here – Marin Cilic (2018), Daniil Medvedev (2021-22, 2024) and Stefanos Tsitsipas (2023).

By comparison, 6 active players have reached the men's singles final at Roland Garros (3 active champions), 6 active players have reached the men's singles final at Wimbledon (2 active champions) and 10 active players have reached the men's singles final at the US Open (6 active champions).

MEDVEDEV AIMS FOR SECOND GRAND SLAM TITLE

No. 5 seed Medvedev, a runner-up here in 2021, 2022 and 2024, is bidding to win his 2nd Grand Slam title, having won his first by defeating Djokovic in the final at the 2021 US Open. If he wins his 2nd title here on his 12th Grand Slam appearance since winning his first, he will go joint-2nd on the Open Era list for most attempts before winning a 2nd Grand Slam men's singles title, alongside Gustavo Kuerten and Djokovic.

Medvedev would also become the 9th man in the Open Era to reach the Australian Open final on 4 or more occasions should he reach the final here again this year – and the 2nd active player to do so, after Djokovic (10 Australian Open finals).

ZVEREV, FRITZ AND RUUD LOOK FOR MAJOR BREAKTHROUGH

No. 2 seed Zverev, No. 4 seed Fritz and No. 6 seed Casper Ruud have all reached at least one Grand Slam final – with Zverev and Fritz both reaching a major final in 2024 – but all 3 are still seeking a first Grand Slam title.

Zverev became the 2nd German player to reach the men's singles final at Roland Garros in 2024 – after Michael Stich finished runner-up in 1996 – but fell to Alcaraz in 5 sets. He is bidding to become the first German man to win a Grand Slam title since Boris Becker at the 1996 Australian Open. If he reaches the final here, he will become the 3rd German man in the Open Era to reach the final at the Australian Open – after Becker (1991 and 1996) and Rainer Schuettler (2003).

Fritz reached his first Grand Slam final at the 2024 US Open, falling to Sinner in straight sets. He became the first American man to reach a Grand Slam final since Andy Roddick finished runner-up at 2009 Wimbledon. If he reaches the final here, he will become the first American man to reach the final at the Australian Open since Andre Agassi won the title here in 2003.

Ruud did not reach a Grand Slam final in 2024 – but, having finished runner-up at 3 Grand Slam tournaments, is the active player to have reached the most Grand Slam finals without winning a title. He is the only Norwegian player in history, man or woman, to have reached a Grand Slam singles final.

SO NEAR YET SO FAR

Eight active players have reached at least one Grand Slam final during their careers but are still bidding for their first major titles – 7 of whom are competing at the Australian Open this year, all except Milos Raonic.

DE MINAUR LEADS AUSTRALIAN CONTENDERS

No. 8 seed Alex de Minaur leads the Australian men competing at this year's Australian Open, while Popyrin (No. 25) and Jordan Thompson (No. 27) are also among the seeded players. It is the first time that there have been 3 Australian seeds in the men's singles at a Grand Slam since 2000 Wimbledon (when Lleyton Hewitt, Mark Philippoussis and Patrick Rafter were all seeded), and the first time there have been 3 Australian seeds in the men's singles at the Australian Open since 1982 (Mark Edmondson, John Alexander, Phil Dent and Paul McNamee)

The 14 Australians in the draw are all bidding to become the first Australian men's singles champion here since Edmondson in 1976. Edmondson is also the only recorded unseeded player to win here. Of the 4 Grand Slam tournaments, the Australian Open has gone longest without a home champion.

In 2005, Hewitt became the first Australian to reach the men's singles final here since Pat Cash reached back-to-back finals in 1987-88. An Australian man has reached the final at a Grand Slam event only 11 times in the 146 Grand Slam tournaments since Cash's 1988 final appearance, and only once at the Australian Open. Hewitt's 2002 Wimbledon title marked the last time an Australian man won a Grand Slam title.

Australia's only active player to have reached a Grand Slam men's singles final, Nick Kyrgios, is making his Grand Slam return at this event, having not competed at a major since reaching the quarterfinals at the 2022 US Open. Kyrgios played just one match in 2023-24 (falling to Wu Yibing in the 1st round at 2023 Stuttgart) due to knee, foot and wrist injuries. He fell to Giovanni Mpetshi Perricard in the 1st round at Brisbane this year.

CONTINUING THE MOMENTUM

Sinner topped the list for most Tour-level match-wins in 2024 with 73 victories. Zverev was the only other player to reach 60 victories last season, while Sinner had the best win percentage of the Top 10, having won 92% of the matches he played.

THE LEAD UP

Since 2015, winners of pre-Australian Open tournaments have gone on to win the title here on 3 occasions – Djokovic in 2016 and 2023, and Nadal in 2022.

In the opening week of this season, Jiri Lehecka won the title at Brisbane when Reilly Opelka retired in the final, while Alexandre Muller defeated Kei Nishikori to win his first Tour-level title at Hong Kong. The 3rd edition of the United Cup was also played in the first week of the season, with USA winning the title for a 2nd time, defeating Poland in the final.

No player has won a title the week before winning the Australian Open since Pete Sampras won Sydney immediately before winning his first title here in 1994. In the last 10 years, no champion of a tournament the week before the Australian Open has reached the quarterfinals here.

FIRST-TIMERS

There are 23 men making their Australian Open debuts this year. Of the 23 debutants, 11 are direct acceptances (including one seed and one player who used a protected ranking to gain direct entry), 9 are qualifiers and 3 are wild cards.

In the Open Era, 5 men have won the title on their Australian Open debut – Jimmy Connors (1973), Roscoe Tanner (January 1977), Vitas Gerulaitis (December 1977), Johan Kriek (1981) and Andre Agassi (1995). The last Grand Slam men's singles champion to win the title on his first appearance at that major was Nadal at 2005 Roland Garros.

YOUNGEST AND OLDEST

At 39 years 304 days, Wawrinka is the oldest player to begin the main draw here this year. There are 26 players aged 30 or older competing in the Australian Open men's singles main draw this year. The record for the most players aged 30 or over in a Grand Slam men's singles draw is 51, which was set at 2016 Roland Garros.

At 18 years 158 days, Joao Fonseca is the youngest man to start the main draw here this year. He is one of 6 teenagers in the men's draw this year, alongside Nishesh Basavareddy (19 years 269 days), Martin Landaluce (19 years 18 days), Jakub Mensik (19 years 147 days), Shang Juncheng (19 years 359 days) and Learner Tien (19 years 55 days). (NB ages calculated at the end of the tournament)

With Fonseca, Landaluce and Tien all successfully qualifying here, it is the first time that 3 teenagers have qualified for the men's singles main draw at a Grand Slam since 2017 Wimbledon – when 19-year-olds Fritz and Rublev and 18-year-old Tsitsipas all qualified for the main draw. It is the first time that 3 teenagers have qualified for the men's singles main draw at the Australian Open since 2017 – when 19-year-olds Alexander Bublik, Reilly Opelka, Rublev and Frances Tiafoe all qualified for the main draw.

Five players in the main draw will celebrate their birthdays during the tournament: Bu Yunchaokete (turns 23 on Sunday 19 January), James Duckworth (turns 33 on Tuesday 21 January), Kamil Majchrzak (turns 29 on Monday 13 January), Kasidit Samrej (turns 24 on Sunday 26 January) and Frances Tiafoe (turns 27 on Monday 20 January).

FROM BOYS TO MEN

There are 6 former Australian Open junior singles champions playing in this year's main draw: Gael Monfils (2004), Nick Kyrgios (2013), Alexander Zverev (2014), Roman Safiullin (2015), Sebastian Korda (2018) and Lorenzo Musetti (2019).

Four other players in the men's draw this year have reached the boys' singles final here: Thanasi Kokkinakis (2013), Arthur Cazaux (2020), Jakub Mensik (2022) and Learner Tien (2023).

Edberg is the only player to have won both the junior and senior title here in the Open Era. He won the boys' singles title in 1983, before winning the men's singles in 1985 and 1987.

WILD CARDS

Former champion Wawrinka received a wild card for the main draw, as did 4 Australian players: Omar Jasika, James McCabe, Li Tu and Tristan Schoolkate. Thailand's Kasidit Samrej won the Asia-Pacific Wildcard Playoff, while France's Lucas Pouille and USA's Nishesh Basavareddy were granted wild cards as part of Tennis Australia's reciprocal wild card arrangements with the FFT and USTA.

MISSING OUT

Players who appeared on the original entry list but withdrew before qualifying began are: Sebastian Ofner and Emil Ruusuvuori.

GOOD PR STRATEGY

Six players have entered the Australian Open men's singles main draw using protected rankings: Pablo Carreno Busta (protected ranking of 18), Nick Kyrgios (21), Reilly Opelka (33), Kei Nishikori (48), Jenson Brooksby (52) and Dominic Stricker (94).

LEFTHANDERS

There are 19 lefthanders starting in this year's men's singles. Just 6 lefthanded players have won the Australian Open men's singles title in the Open Era.

COUNTRY COUNTDOWN

There are 35 nations represented in the men's singles draw at the 2025 Australian Open. Australia and USA have the joint-most players in the draw with 14 each, while USA has the most seeded players with 5 seeds. (NB 5 players are competing without a nationality at this year's event)

By qualifying for the main draw here, Hady Habib becomes the first Lebanese player (man or woman) to compete at a Grand Slam singles event since 1962, when Karim Fawaz competed at the US Championships. Wild card Kasidit Samrej becomes the first Thai player to contest the men's singles at a Grand Slam since 2012, when Danai Udomchoke competed at the Australian Open.
