# Djokovic bids for 21st Grand Slam title

Novak Djokovic is bidding to win his 21st Grand Slam title and move ahead of Roger Federer in 2nd place on the all-time list for most Grand Slam men's singles titles – and close the gap on Rafael Nadal at the top of the list. The 'Big 3' (Djokovic, Federer and Nadal) all began the year on 20 Grand Slam titles, but victories for Nadal at the Australian Open and Roland Garros have propelled the Spaniard into the lead. A win for Djokovic today would also see him claim his 7th Wimbledon title and equal William Renshaw and Pete Sampras in 2nd place on the all-time list for most titles here – meaning that only 8-time Wimbledon champion Federer would be ahead of him.

#### Kyrgios aims to become first Australian man to win a Grand Slam title in 20 years

Two decades have passed since an Australian man last won a Grand Slam title – but Nick Kyrgios will bid to end that title-drought when he contests his first Grand Slam final today. A victory for Kyrgios would see him become the first male Grand Slam champion from Australia since Lleyton Hewitt won the title here in 2002. As world No. 40, he would also become the lowest-ranked and first unseeded Wimbledon men's singles champion since No. 125 Goran Ivanisevic won the title here in 2001. Kyrgios has not won a singles title in nearly 3 years – but he leads the Tour in grass-court match-wins this season, having put in a series of strong performances over the last 5 weeks.

#### Head-to-head in Kyrgios' favour

Djokovic and Kyrgios have played just 2 matches, both of which came at North American hard court tournaments in a 2-week period in March 2017. Kyrgios emerged the victor on both occasions, in the quarterfinals at Acapulco and in the round of 16 at Indian Wells-1000 – and the Australian did not drop a set in either match. There are just 2 other players against whom Djokovic has played multiple matches but failed to record a victory – Jiri Vesely and Marat Safin who, like Kyrgios, boast a 2-0 head-to-head lead against the 20-time Grand Slam champion.

# Wimbledon final appearances

By reaching the final here for the 8th time, Djokovic has claimed sole ownership of 2nd place on the all-time list for most Wimbledon men's singles final appearances, ahead of Boris Becker, Arthur Gore and Pete Sampras.

By reaching his first Wimbledon final, Kyrgios has become the 8th active player to reach the Wimbledon men's singles final. Kyrgios is the 42nd man in the Open Era to reach the final here.

# **Grand Slam final appearances**

By reaching his 32nd Grand Slam final, Djokovic has claimed sole ownership of the all-time record for most Grand Slam men's singles finals reached, moving ahead of Roger Federer. Among both men and women, he is in 3rd place on the list for most Grand Slam singles finals reached, alongside Martina Navratilova.

# 2022 grass court leaders

Kyrgios is bidding to record his 13th Tour-level match-win on grass this season. By defeating Stefanos Tsitsipas in the 3rd round here for his 10th grass court match-win of the season, he claimed sole ownership of first place on the list for most Tour-level match-wins on grass in 2022, ahead of Matteo Berrettini. Djokovic is bidding to record his 7th Tour-level match-win on grass this season and equal Alex de Minaur, Tommy Paul and Oscar Otte in joint-7th place on the list.

Djokovic is bidding to win his 2nd Tour-level title this season (having won the title at Rome-1000 in May) and become the 9th player to win multiple Tour-level titles in 2022. Kyrgios is bidding to win his first Tour-level title since August 2019, when he won the title at Washington.

A 3rd Tour-level meeting for Djokovic and Kyrgios – but their first at a Grand Slam or on grass. Kyrgios has won their 2 previous meetings, which came within a 2-week period in March 2017.

Kyrgios is one of just 3 players against whom Djokovic has played multiple matches but never defeated – alongside Marat Safin and Jiri Vesely, who also have 2-0 win-loss records against Djokovic.

Kyrgios is bidding to defeat a Top 5 player at a Grand Slam for the 3rd time – and for the 2nd time here this year, having defeated No. 5 Stefanos Tsitsipas in the 3rd round. He has a 2-10 win-loss record against Top 5 players at the Grand Slams, with his only other victory coming against No. 1 Nadal in the round of 16 here in 2014. His victory against Tsitsipas ended a 9-match losing streak against Top 5 players at the Grand Slams.

Kyrgios' victory against Tsitsipas here also ended a 7-match losing streak against Top 5 players at Tour-level. He had not previously defeated a Top 5 player at Tour-level since defeating No. 3 Alexander Zverev in the final at 2019 Acapulco. He has a 12-24 win-loss record against Top 5 players at Tour-level overall.

• Djokovic is also bidding to become the **4th man in the Open Era to record a streak of 4 consecutive Wimbledon titles** – after Roger Federer, Sampras and Bjorn Borg. It would be the first time in his career that he has recorded a streak of 4 consecutive titles at a Grand Slam event. In addition to his 3 consecutive titles here since 2018, he has also won 3 consecutive Australian Open titles on 2 occasions, in 2011-13 and 2019-21.

- Djokovic is also bidding to become the **5th man in the Open Era to record a streak of 4 or more titles at a Grand Slam tournament** after Federer (who also recorded a streak of 5 consecutive US Open titles in 2004-08), Borg, Sampras and Rafael Nadal (who has recorded 3 streaks of at least 4 Roland Garros titles in 2005-08, 2010-14 and 2017-20).
- Djokovic is bidding to win his 21st Grand Slam title and claim sole ownership of **2nd place on the all-time list for most Grand Slam men's singles titles**, ahead of Federer. This is his 68th Grand Slam appearance.

At 35 years 49 days, Djokovic is bidding to become the 2nd-oldest man in the Open Era to win the Wimbledon singles title – after Federer, who won the title here in 2017 aged 35 years 342 days. By reaching the final here, he has become the 3rd man in the Open Era to reach the Wimbledon final aged 35 or older, after Federer and Ken Rosewall.

• Djokovic is bidding to record his 28th consecutive match-win at Wimbledon. His current streak is the **4th-longest** men's singles winning streak at Wimbledon in the Open Era. He has not lost a match at Wimbledon since retiring due to a right elbow injury against Tomas Berdych in the quarterfinals in 2017.

- By reaching his 8th Wimbledon final, Djokovic has claimed sole ownership of 2nd place on the all-time list for
  most Wimbledon men's singles finals reached. Federer, who has reached 12 finals here, is the only man in history
  to have reached more Wimbledon finals than Djokovic.
- By reaching his **32nd Grand Slam final**, Djokovic has claimed sole ownership of the all-time record for most Grand Slam men's singles finals reached, ahead of Federer.

- By reaching his 32nd Grand Slam final, Djokovic has also become the 4th player, man or woman, to reach 32 Grand Slam singles finals after Chris Evert (34 Grand Slam final appearances), Serena Williams (33) and Martina Navratilova (32).
- By reaching the final here 49 days after his 35th birthday, Djokovic has also become the **6th player in the Open Era to reach a Grand Slam men's singles final aged 35 or older** after Rosewall (6 Grand Slam final appearances after turning 35), Federer (4), Nadal (2), and Andre Agassi and Mal Anderson (both one).
- Last year here, Djokovic won his 6th Wimbledon title, defeating Matteo Berrettini 67(4) 64 64 63 in the final. He also won the title here in 2011 (d. Nadal), 2014 (d. Federer), 2015 (d. Federer), 2018 (d. Kevin Anderson) and 2019 (d. Federer).
- In Grand Slam play this year, Djokovic reached the quarterfinals at Roland Garros, falling to Nadal in 4 sets. He did not compete at the Australian Open.
- Djokovic's **best result in 2022** is winning the title at Rome-1000 (d. Stefanos Tsitsipas). He also finished runner-up at Belgrade (l. Andrey Rublev), reached the semifinals at Madrid-1000 (l. Carlos Alcaraz) and the quarterfinals at Dubai (l. Jiri Vesely) and Roland Garros.
- Djokovic did not contest a grass court tournament prior to Wimbledon this year. He is one of just 7 men in the Open Era to have won the title here without playing a warm-up event on grass, achieving the feat in 2011, 2014-15, 2019 and 2021.
- Djokovic has won 10 of the 11 **five-set matches** he has contested at Wimbledon including his 5-set victory against Jannik Sinner in the quarterfinals here. His only defeat in a 5-set match at Wimbledon came against Mario Ancic in the round of 16 in 2006. He holds the record for most 5-set matches won at the Grand Slams (35-9) and has a 38-10 win-loss record in 5-set matches overall.
- Djokovic is bidding to win his **88th Tour-level singles title**. Of his 87 Tour-level singles titles, 7 have come on grass in addition to his 6 Wimbledon titles, he also won the title on grass at 2017 Eastbourne (d. Gael Monfils). He has won 61 titles on hard courts and 17 titles on clay.
- Djokovic **holds the record for most weeks ranked No. 1**, having held the top ranking for a total of 373 weeks. He dropped to No. 3 in the rankings his lowest position since October 2018 on 13 June and plays here at the same ranking.
- Djokovic has played Davis Cup for Serbia since 2004, has a 42-13 win-loss record in the competition and led Serbia to their only title in the competition to date in 2010. He won all 4 singles matches he contested as Serbia reached the semifinals last year (I. Croatia). Serbia will compete in Valencia alongside Spain, Canada and Korea Republic in Group B at the 2022 Davis Cup Finals.
- Djokovic is coached by 2001 Wimbledon champion Goran Ivanisevic.
- **KYRGIOS** is bidding to become the 5th Australian man in the Open Era to win the Wimbledon title and the first since Lleyton Hewitt in 2002. He would become the 13th Australian man in history to win the singles title here.

• Kyrgios is bidding to become the **8th Australian man in the Open Era to win a Grand Slam title** – and the first since Hewitt won his 2nd Grand Slam title here in 2002. He would become the 35th Australian man in history to win a Grand Slam singles title. (see table overleaf)

- Kyrgios is bidding to become the 57th Grand Slam men's singles champion in the Open Era and the 152nd Grand Slam men's singles champion in history. He would also become the 22nd Wimbledon men's singles champion in the Open Era and the first new Wimbledon men's singles champion since Andy Murray won his first title here in 2013.
- Kyrgios is bidding to become the first man to win the title on his Grand Slam final debut since the 2014 US
   Open when Marin Cilic won the title on his first Grand Slam final appearance. In the Open Era, 37 men have
   won the title on their debut appearances in a Grand Slam final. (NB not including Arthur Ashe, Rod Laver, John
   Newcombe or Ken Rosewall, who appeared in pre-Open Era finals prior to winning their first Grand Slam titles in
   the Open Era).
- Kyrgios is bidding to become the 8th man in the Open Era to win his first Grand Slam title at Wimbledon after Boris Becker (1985), Pat Cash (1987), Michael Stich (1991), Andre Agassi (1992), Richard Krajicek (1996), Goran Ivanisevic (2001) and Roger Federer (2003). (NB not including Laver or Newcombe, who had won pre-Open Era Grand Slam titles prior to their first Wimbledon titles in the Open Era)
- If he wins his first Wimbledon title on his 8th appearance here, Kyrgios will go joint-2nd on the Open Era list for most attempts before winning a first Wimbledon men's singles title, alongside Jan Kodes and Andy Murray.

• If he wins his first Grand Slam title on his 30th Grand Slam appearance, Kyrgios will go 4th on the Open Era list for most attempts before winning a first Grand Slam men's singles title.

- At No. 40, Kyrgios is bidding to become the **lowest-ranked man to win the Wimbledon title since 2001**, when No. 125 Goran Ivanisevic won the title here. By reaching the final here, he has become the lowest-ranked man to reach the Wimbledon final since 2003, when No. 48 Mark Philippoussis finished runner-up.
- Kyrgios is bidding to become the lowest-ranked man to win a Grand Slam title since 2004 Roland Garros, when No. 44 Gaston Gaudio won the title. By reaching the final here, he has become the lowest-ranked man to reach a Grand Slam final since the 2006 Australian Open, when No. 54 Marcos Baghdatis finished runner-up.

- Kyrgios is bidding to become the **3rd unseeded player in the Open Era to win the Wimbledon men's singles title** after Becker (1985) and Ivanisevic (2001). By reaching the final here, he has become the first unseeded player to reach the Wimbledon men's singles final since Philippoussis in 2003.
- Kyrgios is bidding to become the 8th unseeded man in the Open Era to win a Grand Slam title after Mark Edmondson (1976 Australian Open), Mats Wilander (1982 Roland Garros), Becker (1985 Wimbledon), Andre Agassi (1994 US Open), Gustavo Kuerten (1997 Roland Garros), Ivanisevic (2001 Wimbledon) and Gaudio (2004 Roland Garros). By reaching the final here, he has become the first unseeded player to reach a Grand Slam men's singles final since Jo-Wilfried Tsonga finished runner-up at the 2008 Australian Open.
- Wimbledon is Kyrgios' **most successful Grand Slam event** in terms of matches won and finals reached. His victory against Cristian Garin in the quarterfinals here was his 50th Grand Slam match-win.

- By reaching the final here, Kyrgios has become the 9th Australian man in the Open Era to reach the Wimbledon final after Newcombe (3 Wimbledon final appearances in the Open Era), Laver, Patrick Rafter and Rosewall (all 2), and Pat Cash, Hewitt, Philippoussis and Tony Roche (all one). (NB Laver, Newcombe and Rosewall all made pre-Open Era appearances in the final here)
- By reaching his first Grand Slam final, Kyrgios has also become the 15th Australian man in the Open Era to reach a Grand Slam final – and the first since Hewitt finished runner-up at the 2005 Australian Open.
- By reaching his first Wimbledon final on his 8th appearance here, Kyrgios has gone joint-3rd on the Open Era list for most attempts before reaching a first Wimbledon men's singles final, alongside Rafter. Cilic (11 attempts before his first Wimbledon final) and Kevin Anderson (10) are the only men in the Open Era to have taken more attempts to reach their first Wimbledon finals than Kyrgios.
- By reaching his first Grand Slam final on his 30th Grand Slam appearance, Kyrgios has gone **5th on the Open Era list for most attempts before reaching a first Grand Slam final** behind David Ferrer (42 attempts before his first Grand Slam final), Stan Wawrinka (36), Anderson (34) and Kim Warwick (32).
- By reaching the final here, Kyrgios has recorded his best Grand Slam result. His previous best Grand Slam result was reaching the quarterfinals on 2 occasions at 2014 Wimbledon (I. Milos Raonic) and the 2015 Australian Open (I. Murray).
- In Grand Slam play this year, Kyrgios reached the 2nd round at the Australian Open (d. Liam Broady, I. Daniil Medvedev) but did not compete at Roland Garros.
- **Prior to Wimbledon**, Kyrgios reached the semifinals at Stuttgart (I. Murray) and as a wild card at Halle (I. Hubert Hurkacz). He also reached the 2nd round at Mallorca, where he defeated Laslo Djere in the 1st round before giving a walkover to Roberto Bautista Agut due to an abdominal injury.
- Kyrgios' other highlights in 2022 are reaching the semifinals as a wild card at Houston (I. Reilly Opelka), the
  quarterfinals as a wild card at Indian Wells-1000 (I. Nadal) and the round of 16 as a wild card at Miami-1000
  (I. Jannik Sinner). He missed the remainder of the clay court season after his semifinal finish at Houston in April,
  returning to action at Stuttgart last month. He is contesting his 8th tournament of the season here.
- Kyrgios has won all 6 five-set matches he has contested at Wimbledon including his 5-set victories against Paul Jubb and Brandon Nakashima here this year. He has an 11-3 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Kyrgios is bidding to win his 7th Tour-level singles title and his first since he won the title at 2019 Washington (d. Medvedev). All 6 of his titles have come on hard courts.
- Kyrgios reached a career-high ranking of No. 13 in October 2016. He re-entered the Top 50 following his semifinal finish at Halle last month and plays here at No. 40 – his highest-ranking since August 2020.

- Kyrgios won the 2022 Australian Open men's doubles title as a wild card team alongside Thanasi Kokkinakis, with the pair defeating fellow Australians Matthew Ebden/Max Purcell in the final. They became the first all-Australian team to win a Grand Slam men's doubles title since Todd Woodbridge/Mark Woodforde at 2000 Wimbledon and the first wild card team in history to win the Australian Open men's doubles title.
- Kyrgios is a 2-time Wimbledon junior doubles champion, winning the title in both 2012 (with Andrew Harris) and 2013 (with Kokkinakis). His best performance in the boys' singles here was reaching the quarterfinals in 2012 (I. Gianluigi Quinzi). He also won the 2012 Roland Garros boys' doubles title (with Harris) and the 2013 Australian Open boys' singles title (d. Kokkinakis) and reached the junior No. 1 ranking in January 2013.
- Kyrgios has played **Davis Cup** for Australia since 2013 and has an 11-6 win-loss record in the competition. Australia will compete in Hamburg alongside France, Germany and Belgium in Group C at the 2022 Davis Cup Finals.
- Kyrgios is currently without a permanent coach.
