



2023 AUSTRALIAN OPEN DAY 5 MEN'S NOTES Friday 20 January 3rd Round Top Half

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On court today...

- No. 3 seed Stefanos Tsitsipas is now the highest-ranked player remaining in the draw, following 2nd round defeats for Top 2 seeds Rafael Nadal and Casper Ruud in the last 2 days. The Greek 24-year-old will contest a 3rd round clash against Tallon Griekspoor on Rod Laver Arena today, with Griekspoor bidding to become the 8th Dutch player in the Open Era to reach the round of 16 here. Both Tsitsipas and Griekspoor are unbeaten so far in 2023, with Tsitsipas having gone 4-0 at the United Cup in his first event of the season, while Griekspoor won his first Tour-level title at Pune prior to arriving in Australia – but that perfect record will end for one of the duo this afternoon.

- Canada's Felix Auger-Aliassime was forced to dig deep to reach the 3rd round, with the No. 6 seed recovering from 0-2 down for the 2nd time in his career to defeat Alex Molcan on Wednesday. His reward for doing so is a match-up with No. 28 seed Francisco Cerundolo on John Cain Arena, who has recorded his first Grand Slam match-wins in the opening 2 rounds here. Auger-Aliassime is aiming to reach the last 16 at a Grand Slam for the 7th time, while Cerundolo, who is making his first appearance at Melbourne Park, is bidding to become the 4th man in the last decade to reach the round of 16 on his Australian Open debut. The Argentinian has won 2 of his previous 6 meetings with Top 10 opponents and will hope to add another victory today.

- Yoshihito Nishioka has made steady progress through the draw thus far, and he will hope to reach the round of 16 at a Grand Slam for the first time when he plays Mackenzie McDonald on Court 3 this afternoon. Victory for Nishioka today would also see him reach another important milestone – he will become the 3rd Japanese man in history to record 100 Tour-level victories if he is triumphant today, joining Kei Nishikori and Shuzo Matsuoka as the only players from Japan to reach a century of wins. Meanwhile, McDonald will be looking to continue the momentum from his career-best victory against world No. 2 Nadal on Wednesday – the American will advance to the round of 16 here for the 2nd time if he defeats Nishioka.

- McDonald is one of 8 American men who have reached the 3rd round at the Australian Open this year – the highest number to make it to this stage in Melbourne since 1996. Two other Americans are also in action today – Frances Tiafoe, who plays Karen Khachanov on JCA, and Sebastian Korda, who is up against Daniil Medvedev on RLA. With 2 all-American match-ups taking place tomorrow, a total of 6 Americans can reach the last 16 here this year – which would be the highest number to reach the last 16 at the Australian Open since 1995 (when there were 8) and the highest number to reach the last 16 at a Grand Slam since the 1995 US Open (when there were also 8).

NO. 3 STEFANOS TSITSIPAS (GRE) v TALLON GRIEKSPoor (NED)

Head-to-head: first meeting

Tsitsipas has never lost a match at the Australian Open to a player ranked as low as No. 63 Griekspoor. The lowest-ranked player to defeat Tsitsipas at the Australian Open is No. 50 Denis Shapovalov in the 1st round in 2018.

Tsitsipas and Griekspoor are both unbeaten in 2023, having both won all 6 matches they have contested. Prior to the Australian Open, Tsitsipas won all 4 matches he contested while representing Greece at the United Cup, while Griekspoor won 4 matches en route to his first Tour-level title at Pune.

- **TSITSIPAS** is bidding to reach the round of 16 here for the 4th time. This is his 6th Australian Open and his 22nd Grand Slam overall.
- Tsitsipas is also bidding to reach the **round of 16 at a Grand Slam for the 9th time**. He has reached the round of 16 or better at the Australian Open, Roland Garros and Wimbledon, but his best US Open results are 3rd round finishes in 2020 and 2021.
- Tsitsipas advanced to the 3rd round after defeating Quentin Halys 63 64 76(6) and wild card Rinky Hijikata 63 60 62 in the opening 2 rounds here.
- Last year here, Tsitsipas equalled his **best Australian Open result** by reaching the semifinals (l. Daniil Medvedev). He also reached the semifinals here in 2019 (l. Rafael Nadal) and 2021 (l. Medvedev).
- Tsitsipas' **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the final at 2021 Roland Garros, falling to Novak Djokovic in 5 sets in the final despite holding a 2-0 lead. He became the first Greek player in history to reach a Grand Slam final and, at 22 years 305 days, also became the youngest Grand Slam finalist since Andy Murray (22 years 261 days) at the 2010 Australian Open.
- At 24 years 170 days, Tsitsipas is bidding to become the **youngest Australian Open men's singles champion** since Djokovic won the title here in 2011 aged 23 years 253 days. (NB ages calculated at the end of the tournament).
- **Elsewhere at the Grand Slams in 2022**, Tsitsipas reached the round of 16 at Roland Garros (l. Holger Rune) and the 3rd round at Wimbledon (l. Nick Kyrgios) but fell in the 1st round at the US Open (l. Daniel Elahi Galan).
- Tsitsipas' **best results in 2022** were winning the titles at Monte Carlo-1000 (d. Alejandro Davidovich Fokina) and Mallorca (d. Roberto Bautista Agut). He also finished runner-up at Rotterdam (l. Felix Auger-Aliassime), Rome-1000 (l. Djokovic), Cincinnati-1000 (l. Borna Coric), Astana (l. Djokovic) and Stockholm (l. Rune). He reached the semifinals at Acapulco (l. Cameron Norrie), Madrid-1000 (l. Alexander Zverev) and Paris-1000 (l. Djokovic).
- Tsitsipas recorded **more Tour-level match-wins than any other player in 2022**. He ended the season with a 61-24 Tour-level win-loss record, ahead of Auger-Aliassime (60-27) and Carlos Alcaraz (57-13).
- **Prior to the Australian Open**, Tsitsipas represented Greece at the United Cup. He won all 4 singles matches he contested as the team reached the semifinals, defeating Bulgaria's Grigor Dimitrov, Belgium's David Goffin, Croatia's Borna Coric and Italy's Matteo Berrettini.

- Tsitsipas has won all 3 **five-set matches** he has contested at the Australian Open – against both Thanasi Kokkinakis and Nadal in 2021 and against Taylor Fritz in the round of 16 last year. His victory against Nadal in the 2021 quarterfinals, in which he recovered from 0-2 down to win in 5 sets, saw him become the 3rd player to record a successful comeback from 0-2 down against Nadal after Federer and Fabio Fognini. He has an 8-6 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Tsitsipas reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 3 in August in 2021. He plays here one place lower at No. 4.
- Tsitsipas is **one of 4 players in contention for the post-Australian Open No. 1 ranking**. He must win the title here to rise to No. 1 on Monday 30 January.
- Tsitsipas is a **former junior world No. 1**. He reached the quarterfinals of the boys' singles here in 2015 (l. Jurabek Karimov) and 2016 (l. De Minaur). His best result at a junior Grand Slam was reaching the semifinals of the boys' singles at 2016 Wimbledon (l. Shapovalov) and at the 2016 US Open (l. Felix Auger-Aliassime).
- Tsitsipas made his **Davis Cup** debut in September 2019 and has won all 8 singles matches he has contested in the competition since then. Greece will play at home to Ecuador in the 2023 World Group I Play-offs in February.
- Tsitsipas is coached by his father, Apostolos Tsitsipas.
- **GRIEKSPoor** is bidding to reach the round of 16 at a Grand Slam for the first time. This is his 3rd Australian Open appearance and his 8th Grand Slam overall.
- Griekspoor is bidding to become the **8th Dutchman to reach the round of 16 at the Australian Open in the Open Era** – after Tom Okker (1970-71), Michiel Schapers (1985, 1988-89), Menno Oosting (1988), Richard Krajicek (1991-92), Jan Siemerink (1991), Jacco Eltingh (1995) and Sjeng Schalken (2004).
- Griekspoor advanced to the 3rd round after defeating lucky loser Pavel Kotov 63 76(3) 63 and No.32 seed Botic van de Zandschulp 64 64 64 in the opening 2 rounds here. His match against Van de Zandschulp on Wednesday was the first 15th all-Dutch men's singles match at the Grand Slams in the Open Era – and the first since Siemerink defeated Schalken in the 1st round here in 2001.
- By reaching the 3rd round here, Griekspoor has recorded his **best Grand Slam result**. His previous best result was reaching the 2nd round on 4 occasions, including at the Australian Open last year (d. Fabio Fognini, l. Pablo Carreno Busta). He also reached the 2nd round at the 2021 US Open (d. Jan-Lennard Struff, l. Novak Djokovic), 2022 Roland Garros (d. Alejandro Davidovich Fokina, l. Brandon Nakashima) and 2022 Wimbledon (d. Fognini, l. Carlos Alcaraz).
- **Elsewhere at the Grand Slams in 2022**, Griekspoor fell to Federico Coria in the 1st round at the US Open.
- Griekspoor's **best results in 2022** were reaching the quarterfinals at 3 Tour-level events – at Melbourne, where he gave a walkover to Rafael Nadal due to a foot injury, and at Geneva (l. Reilly Opelka) and Mallorca (l. Antoine Bellier).
- **Also in 2022**, Griekspoor won his 11th career Challenger title at Amersfoort (NED) (d. Roberto Carballes Baena). It was his only appearance at Challenger-level during the season.
- Prior to the Australian Open, Griekspoor won his **first Tour-level title** at Pune (d. Benjamin Bonzi). His 4 victories at Pune ended a 6-match Tour-level losing streak – he had previously not recorded a match-win at Tour-level since defeating Tommy Paul during Netherlands Davis Cup Finals Group Stage victory over USA last September.
- Griekspoor is **bidding to defeat a Top 5 player for the first time** on his 2nd attempt. He lost his only previous match against a Top 5 player, falling to No. 1 Djokovic in the 2nd round at the 2021 US Open. The highest-ranked player he has defeated is No. 11 Karen Khachanov in the 1st round at 2019 Rotterdam.
- Griekspoor lost the only **5-set match** he has contested at the Australian Open – falling to Carreno Busta in 5 sets in the 2nd round last year. He won the only other 5-set match he has contested at Tour-level, defeating Jan-Lennard Struff in 5 sets in the 1st round at the 2021 US Open. He also won a 5-set match in the final round of qualifying at 2021 Wimbledon, recovering from 0-2 down to defeat Arthur Fery.
- Griekspoor broke the Top 50 for the first time in August 2022 and reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 44 the same month. He plays here at No. 63.

- Griekspoor made his **Davis Cup** debut for Netherlands in 2019 and was a member of the team which reached the quarterfinals in 2022, falling to Australia at the Final 8 Knockout Stage in Malaga. He has a 4-5 overall win-loss record in the competition. Netherlands host Slovakia in the 2023 Qualifiers in February.
- Griekspoor is coached by Dennis Schenk.

NO. 6 FELIX AUGER-ALIASSIME (CAN) v NO. 28 FRANCISCO CERUNDOLO (ARG)

- **AUGER-ALIASSIME** is bidding to reach the round of 16 here for the 3rd straight year. This is his 4th Australian Open appearance and his 15th Grand Slam overall.
- Auger-Aliassime is **bidding to reach the round of 16 at a Grand Slam for the 7th time**. He is one of 4 Canadian players to have reached the round of 16 or better at all 4 Grand Slam tournaments – alongside Carling Bassett-Seguso, Eugenie Bouchard and Milos Raonic. He is in 2nd place on the all-time list for most Grand Slam round of 16 appearances by a Canadian man, behind Raonic (20 Grand Slam round of 16 appearances).
- Auger-Aliassime advanced to the 3rd round after defeating Vasek Pospisil 16 76(2) 76(3) 63 and Alex Molcan 36 36 63 62 62 in the opening 2 rounds here. His victory against Molcan in the 2nd round on Wednesday was his **2nd successful comeback from 0-2 down**, having also recovered from 0-2 down to defeat Juan Pablo Varillas in the 1st round at Roland Garros last year.
- Last year here, Auger-Aliassime recorded his best **Australian Open result** by reaching the quarterfinals, where he fell to Daniil Medvedev in 5 sets.
- Auger-Aliassime's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the semifinals at the 2021 US Open (l. Medvedev). He became the 3rd Canadian man to reach the semifinals at a Grand Slam after Milos Raonic and Denis Shapovalov.
- **Elsewhere at the Grand Slams in 2022**, Auger-Aliassime reached the round of 16 at Roland Garros, where he fell to Rafael Nadal in 5 sets, and the 2nd round at the US Open (d. Alexander Ritschard, l. Jack Draper) but fell in the 1st round at Wimbledon (l. Maxime Cressy).
- At 22 years 174 days, Auger-Aliassime is bidding to become the **youngest Australian Open men's singles champion** since Novak Djokovic won the title here in 2008 aged 20 years 250 days (NB ages calculated at the end of the tournament).
- Auger-Aliassime's **best results in 2022** were winning his first 4 Tour-level titles. He won his first title at Rotterdam in February (d. Stefanos Tsitsipas), ending a streak of 8 appearances in Tour-level finals without winning a title. He won 3 titles in 3 consecutive weeks in October – at Florence (d. JJ Wolf), Antwerp (d. Holger Rune) and Basel (d. Sebastian Korda). He was one of 5 players to win 4 or more events in 2022 – alongside Carlos Alcaraz, Djokovic, Nadal and Andrey Rublev.
- Auger-Aliassime's **other highlights in 2022** were finishing runner-up at Marseille (l. Rublev) and reaching the semifinals at 's-Hertogenbosch (l. Tim van Rijthoven), Los Cabos (l. Cameron Norrie) and Paris-1000 (l. Rune). He reached the quarterfinals at a further 8 Tour-level events) and was also a member of the Canadian teams which won the ATP Cup in January and the David Cup in November.
- **Prior to the Australian Open**, Auger-Aliassime competed at Adelaide I, but fell to qualifier Alexei Popyrin in the 1st round.

- Auger-Aliassime has won 2 of the 4 **five-set matches** he has contested at the Australian Open – including his 5-set victory against Molcan in the 2nd round here this year, He has a 5-3 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Auger-Aliassime reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 6 in November last year and plays here one place lower at No. 7. He is one of 3 Canadian men to have reached the Top 10, alongside Raonic and Shapovalov.
- Auger-Aliassime was a **successful junior**. He won the boys' singles title at the 2016 US Open (d. Miomir Kecmanovic) and finished runner-up in the boys' singles at 2016 Roland Garros (l. Geoffrey Blancaneaux). He reached the 3rd round on his only appearance in the boys' singles here in 2016, falling to Kenneth Raisma in straight sets. He was also part of Canadian teams that reached back-to-back Junior Davis Cup Finals in 2015-16, defeating Germany to win the title in 2015 but finishing runner-up to Russia in 2016.
- Auger-Aliassime was a member of the **Canadian team which won the Davis Cup title for the first time in 2022**. He won 5 of the 6 Davis Cup singles matches he contested in 2022, including all 3 of his singles matches at the Final 8 Knockout Stage in Malaga. He has a 9-4 overall win-loss record in the competition and was also a member of the Canadian team which reached the final for the first time in 2019 (l. Spain). As defending champions, Canada have qualified automatically for the 2023 Finals Group Stage in September.
- Auger-Aliassime is coached by Frederic Fontang and Toni Nadal.
- **CERUNDOLO** is bidding to reach the round of 16 round at a Grand Slam for the first time on his Australian Open debut. This is his 5th Grand Slam appearance overall.
- Cerundolo is bidding to become the **4th man to reach the round of 16 on his Australian Open debut in the last 10 years** – after Marton Fucsovics and Tennys Sandgren in 2018 and Aslan Karatsev last year.
- Cerundolo advanced to the 3rd round after defeating Guido Pella 64 64 63 and Corentin Moutet 36 64 62 75 for his **first Grand Slam match-wins** in the opening 2 rounds here.
- Prior to the Australian Open this year, Cerundolo had **lost in the 1st round on 4 of his previous Grand Slam appearances** – as a lucky loser on his Grand Slam debut at 2021 Roland Garros (l. Thiago Monteiro), and as a direct acceptance at Roland Garros (l. Daniel Evans), Wimbledon (l. Rafael Nadal) and the US Open (l. Andy Murray) in 2022.
- **Last year here**, Cerundolo fell to Pedro Cachin in the 1st round of qualifying. He also fell in Australian Open qualifying in 2021 on his first appearance in the qualifying draw at a Grand Slam.
- Cerundolo's best result in 2022 was winning his **first Tour-level title** at Bastad (d. Sebastian Baez). He also reached the semifinals at Rio de Janeiro (l. Diego Schwartzman), Miami-1000 (l. Casper Ruud) and Hamburg (l. Lorenzo Musetti) and the quarterfinals at Buenos Aires (l. Schwartzman) and Gijon (l. Dominic Thiem). His semifinal finish at Miami-1000 saw him become, at No. 103, the lowest-ranked semifinalist in the tournament's history and the first player to reach the semifinals on his Masters-1000 debut since Jerzy Janowicz at 2012 Paris-1000.
- **Also in 2022**, Cerundolo won his 5th career Challenger title at Santa Cruz (BOL) (d. Camilo Ugo Carabelli). He did not compete at Challenger-level after reaching the semifinals at Miami-1000 last year.
- **Prior to the Australian Open**, Cerundolo represented Argentina at the United Cup losing both matches he contested, falling to Croatia's Borna Coric and France's Arthur Rinderknech.
- Cerundolo is bidding to **defeat at Top 10 player for the 3rd time**. He has a 2-4 win-loss record against Top 10 players, with his both of his victories coming in 2022 – against No. 5 Ruud in the 2nd round at Bastad and No. 8 Andrey Rublev in the 2nd round at Hamburg.
- Cerundolo broke the Top 50 for the first time after reaching the semifinals at Miami-1000 last year and reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 24 in July. He plays here at No. 29.
- Cerundolo made his **Davis Cup** debut in 2022. He lost both matches he has contested in the competition, falling to Croatia's Coric and Italy's Jannik Sinner at the 2022 Finals Group Stage in Bologna. Argentina play away against Finland in the 2023 Qualifiers in February.

- Cerundolo's younger brother, Juan Manuel, is also a professional tennis player and is currently ranked at No. 126. He did not compete in Australian Open qualifying this year, but has won 2 Challenger-level titles at Tigre (ARG) this month.
- Cerundolo is coached by Kevin Konfederak.

NO. 7 DANIL MEDVEDEV v NO. 29 SEBASTIAN KORDA (USA)

Head-to-head: Medvedev leads 1-0

Medvedev is facing an American player for the 2nd time here this week, having defeating Marcos Giron in the 1st round on Monday. He is bidding to extend a 15-match Tour-level winning streak against American players, with his last defeat to an American coming against Reilly Opelka in the 2nd round at 2020 St Petersburg. He has a 36-3 win-loss record against American players at Tour-level overall.

- Two-time Australian Open runner-up **MEDVEDEV** is bidding to reach the round of 16 here for the 5th consecutive year. This is his 7th Australian Open appearance and his 23rd Grand Slam overall.
- Medvedev is also bidding to reach the **round of 16 at a Grand Slam for the 12th time**. He has reached the round of 16 or better at all 4 Grand Slam events.
- Medvedev advanced to the 3rd round after defeating Marcos Giron 60 61 62 and wild card John Millman 75 62 62 in the opening 2 rounds here.
- Last year here, Medvedev reached his **2nd consecutive Australian Open final**, where he fell to Rafael Nadal in 5 sets, despite holding a 2-0 lead. He also reached the final here in 2021 (l. Novak Djokovic).
- Medvedev is bidding to become the **4th man in the Open Era to reach 3 consecutive Australian Open finals** – after Djokovic (who has reached 3 consecutive finals here twice, in 2011-13 and 2019-21), Mats Wilander (1983-85) and Ivan Lendl (1989-91).
- Medvedev won his first **Grand Slam title** at the 2021 US Open, defeating Djokovic in straight sets and ending Djokovic's bid for the Grand Slam and his 27-match Grand Slam winning streak.
- **Elsewhere at the Grand Slams in 2022**, Medvedev reached the round of 16 at both Roland Garros (l. Marin Cilic) and the US Open (l. Nick Kyrgios). He was unable to compete at Wimbledon.
- Medvedev's **best results in 2022** were winning the titles at Los Cabos (d. Cameron Norrie) and Vienna (d. Denis Shapovalov). He also finished runner-up at 's-Hertogenbosch (l. Tim van Rijthoven) and Halle (l. Hubert Hurkacz) and reached the semifinals at Acapulco (l. Nadal), Cincinnati-1000 (l. Stefanos Tsitsipas) and Astana, where he retired due to a left adductor injury during his match against Djokovic.
- **Prior to the Australian Open**, Medvedev competed at Adelaide I, where he reached the semifinals (l. Djokovic).
- Medvedev has won 2 of the 4 **five-set matches** he has contested at the Australian Open – he won 5-set matches against Filip Krajinovic in the 3rd round in 2021 and Felix Auger-Aliassime in the quarterfinals last year, but lost in 5 sets to Stan Wawrinka in the round of 16 in 2020 and to Nadal in the final last year. He has a 3-8 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Medvedev **became world No. 1** on 28 February 2022, becoming the first player other than the 'Big 4' (comprising Djokovic, Nadal, Roger Federer and Andy Murray) to hold the top ranking since Andy Roddick in February 2004. He

held the No. 1 ranking for 16 weeks during 2022 but ended the season at No. 7 and plays here at No. 8 – his lowest ranking since August 2019, when he was also ranked No. 8.

- Medvedev reached a **career-high junior ranking** of No. 13 in January 2014. His best performance in the boys' singles here was reaching the 2nd round in 2013 (d. Hong Seong Chan, I. Nikola Milojevic).
- Medvedev is coached by Gilles Cervara.
- **KORDA** is bidding to reach the round of 16 here for the first time and equal his best Grand Slam result. This is his 2nd Australian Open appearance and his 9th Grand Slam overall.
- Korda is **one of 8 American men to reach the 3rd round at the Australian Open this year** – the most American men in the 3rd round here since 1996, when there were also 8. It is the 2nd time in 3 Grand Slam events that 8 Americans have reached the 3rd round of the men's singles, with 8 Americans also having reached the 3rd round at Wimbledon last year. With 2 all-American 3rd round match-ups, a total of 6 American men can reach the round of 16 here – which would be the most at the Australian Open since 1995 and the most at a Grand Slam since the 1995 US Open.

- **Last year here**, on his Australian Open debut, Korda reached the 3rd round. He defeated No. 12 seed Cameron Norrie and Corentin Moutet before falling to Pablo Carreno Busta.
- Korda's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the round of 16 on 2 occasions – on his Grand Slam debut at 2020 Roland Garros where, ranked at No. 213, he qualified for the main draw and defeated Andreas Seppi, John Isner and Pedro Martinez before falling to Rafael Nadal. He also reached the round of 16 at 2021 Wimbledon, falling to Karen Khachanov in 5 sets.

- Korda reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 30 in May 2022. He plays here at one place lower at No. 31.

- Korda has **won one Tour-level title** – on clay at 2021 Parma (d. Marco Cecchinato). He has a 1-4 win-loss record in Tour-level finals.
- Korda is the only **former Australian Open boys' singles champions through to the 3rd round** from the 4 who started in this year's main draw. He won the title here in 2018 (d. - Korda is coached by Radek Stepanek, who reached the 3rd round here on 5 occasions, and Martin Stepanek.

- Hurkacz advanced to the 3rd round after defeating Pedro Martinez 76(1) 62 62 and Lorenzo Sonego 36 76(3) 26 63 63 in the opening 2 rounds here. His 5-set victory against Sonego in the 2nd round here improved his win-loss record in **5-set matches** at the Australian Open to 2-1 and his win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall to 3-5.
- By reaching the 3rd round here, Hurkacz has recorded his **best Australian Open result**. His previous best result here was reaching the 2nd round on 2 occasions – in 2020 (d. Dennis Novak, I. John Millman) and last year (d. Egor Gerasimov, I. Adrian Mannarino).
- Hurkacz's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the semifinals at 2021 Wimbledon, where he defeated Roger Federer in the quarterfinals before falling to Matteo Berrettini in the last 4. He became the 2nd Polish man to reach a Grand Slam semifinal after Jerzy Janowicz at 2013 Wimbledon.

- Shapovalov advanced to the 3rd round after defeating Dusan Lajovic 64 46 64 61 and Taro Daniel 63 76(3) 75 in the opening 2 rounds here.
- Last year here, Shapovalov recorded his **best Australian Open result** by reaching the quarterfinals, where he fell to Rafael Nadal in 5 sets. He has a 2-2 win-loss record in 5-set matches at the Australian Open and a 10-7 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Shapovalov's **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the semifinals at 2021 Wimbledon last year (l. Novak Djokovic). He is one of the 8 Canadian players in history, men or women, to reach the semifinals at a Grand Slam.

- Norrie advanced to the 3rd round after defeating wild card Luca van Assche 76(3) 60 63 and Constant Lestienne 63 36 76(2) 63 in the opening 2 rounds here.
- By reaching the 3rd round here, Norrie has equalled his **best Australian Open result**. He also reached the 3rd round here in 2021, when he defeated Daniel Evans and Roman Safiullin before falling to Rafael Nadal.
- Norrie recorded his **best Grand Slam result** by reaching the semifinals at Wimbledon last year, falling to eventual champion Novak Djokovic. He became the 4th British man in the Open Era to reach the semifinals at Wimbledon after Roger Taylor, Tim Henman and Andy Murray.
- **Elsewhere at the Grand Slams in 2022**, Norrie reached the round of 16 at the US Open (l. Andrey Rublev) and the 3rd round at Roland Garros (l. Karen Khachanov).

- Aged 21 years 166 days, Sinner is bidding become the **first man to reach the round of 16 at a Grand Slam on 8 occasions aged 21 or under** since Novak Djokovic, who made 10 Grand Slam round of 16 appearances aged 21 and under in 2006-09. (NB age calculated at the end of the tournament).
- Sinner advanced to the 3rd round after defeating Kyle Edmund 64 60 62 and Tomas Martin Etcheverry 63 62 62 in the opening 2 rounds here.
- Last year here, Sinner recorded his **best Australian Open result** by reaching the quarterfinals. He defeated Joao Sousa, Steve Johnson, Taro Daniel and Alex de Minaur before falling to Stefanos Tsitsipas.

- **Elsewhere at the Grand Slams in 2022**, Sinner reached the round of 16 at Roland Garros but retired due to a left knee injury while trailing Andrey Rublev 16 64 2-0.
- Sinner's **best result in 2022** was winning his 6th Tour-level title at Umag (d. Alcaraz). He also reached the semifinals at Sofia, where he retired due to a right ankle injury while trailing Holger Rune 57 64 5-2, and reached a total of 8 quarterfinals at Tour-level events.
- **Prior to the Australian Open**, Sinner reached the quarterfinals at Adelaide I, defeating Kyle Edmund and Thanasi Kokkinakis before falling to Sebastian Korda.
- Sinner lost the only **5-set match** he has contested at the Australian Open, falling to Denis Shapovalov in 5 sets in the 1st round here in 2021. He has a 4-4 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Sinner **broke the Top 10 for the first time** in November 2021, reaching a career-high ranking of No. 9. He plays here at No. 16.
- Sinner reached a **career-high junior ranking of No. 133** and did not contest the boys' singles events at any of the Grand Slam tournaments. His best result as a junior was reaching the quarterfinals as a wild card at the Grade A Trofeo Bonfiglio event in Milan in 2018 (I. Naoki Tajima).
- Sinner made his **Davis Cup** debut at the 2021 Finals and has a 6-4 overall win-loss record in the competition. He won one of the 2 matches he played at the 2022 Finals Group Stage last September, but missed the Final 8 Knockout Stage in Malaga in November due to injury. Italy have been awarded a wild card for the 2023 Davis Cup Finals Group Stage in September.
- Sinner is coached by Simone Vagnozzi and Darren Cahill.
- **FUCSOVICS** is bidding to reach the round of 16 here for the 3rd time and equal his best Australian Open result. This is his 6th Australian Open and his 23rd Grand Slam overall.
- Fucsovics is bidding to reach the round of 16 at a Grand Slam for the 5th time and equal Balazs Taroczy in **3rd place on the all-time list for most Grand Slam round of 16 appearances by a Hungarian man**.

- Fucsovics advanced to the 3rd round after defeating Federico Coria 46 75 26 76(6) 62 and Lloyd Harris 62 63 57 64 in the opening 2 rounds here.
- Fucsovics' **best Australian Open result** is reaching the round of 16 on 2 occasions – losing to Roger Federer on both occasions, in 2018 and 2020.
- Fucsovics' **best Grand Slam result** is reaching the quarterfinals at 2021 Wimbledon. He became the first Hungarian man to reach a Grand Slam quarterfinal since Taroczy at 1981 Roland Garros and the first to do so at Wimbledon since Jozsef Asboth in 1948.
- **Last year here**, Fucsovics was defeated by Dusan Lajovic in the 1st round.
- **Elsewhere at the Grand Slams in 2022**, Fucsovics reached the 2nd round at both Roland Garros (d. Geoffrey Blancaneaux, I. Marin Cilic) and the US Open (d. Maxime Cressy, I. Alejandro Davidovich Fokina) but fell in the 1st round at Wimbledon (I. Alexander Bublik)

- Fucsovics reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 31 in March 2019. He plays here at No. 78.
- Fucsovics was a **successful junior**. He won the boys' singles title at 2010 Wimbledon, defeating Benjamin Mitchell in the final. He also reached the semifinals of the boys' singles here in 2010 (l. Sean Berman) and at the 2010 US Open (l. Jack Sock).
- Fucsovics has played **Davis Cup** for Hungary since 2010 and has a 32-18 overall win-loss record in the competition. Hungary host France in the 2023 Qualifiers in February.
- Fucsovics is coached by Peter Nagy

- **TIAFOE** is bidding to reach the round of 16 here for the 2nd time. This his 7th Australian Open appearance and his 27th Grand Slam overall.
- Tiafoe is **one of 8 American men to reach the 3rd round at the Australian Open this year** – the most American men in the 3rd round here since 1996, when there were also 8. It is the 2nd time in 3 Grand Slam events that 8 Americans have reached the 3rd round of the men's singles, with 8 Americans also having reached the 3rd round at Wimbledon last year. With 2 all-American 3rd round match-ups, a total of 6 American men can reach the round of 16 here – which would be the most at the Australian Open since 1995 and the most at a Grand Slam since the 1995 US Open.

- Tiafoe advanced to the 3rd round after defeating Daniel Altmaier 63 63 67(5) 76(6) and qualifier Shang Juncheng 64 64 61 in the opening 2 rounds here.
- **Last year here**, Tiafoe reached the 2nd round, defeating Marco Trungelliti in 5 sets before falling to Taylor Fritz. He has a 4-12 win-loss record in 5-set matches, but 2 of his 4 victories have come at the Australian Open – in addition

to his victory against Trungelliti here last year, he also defeated Andreas Seppi in 5 sets in the 3rd round here in 2019.

- Tiafoe's **best Australian Open result** is reaching the quarterfinals here in 2019. He defeated 2 seeded players – No. 5 seed Kevin Anderson and No. 20 seed Grigor Dimitrov – before falling to Rafael Nadal in the last 8.
- Tiafoe recorded his **best Grand Slam result** at the US Open last year, where he defeated Nadal in the round of 16 and Andrey Rublev in the quarterfinals before falling to Carlos Alcaraz in 5 sets in the last 4. He became the first American man to reach the semifinals at the US Open since Andy Roddick in 2006.
- **Elsewhere at the Grand Slams in 2022**, Tiafoe reached the round of 16 at Wimbledon and the 2nd round at Roland Garros, falling to David Goffin at both events.
- Tiafoe's **other highlights in 2022** were finishing runner-up at Estoril (l. Sebastian Baez) and Tokyo (l. Taylor Fritz) and reaching the semifinals at Atlanta (l. Jenson Brooksby). He also reached the quarterfinals at Houston (l. John Isner), Washington (l. Nick Kyrgios), Stockholm (l. Emil Ruusuvuori) and Paris-1000 (l. Felix Auger-Aliassime).
- Prior to the Australian Open, Tiafoe was a member of the **American team which won the inaugural United Cup title** in Sydney. He won all 5 singles matches he contested – defeating Czech Republic's Tomas Machac, Germany's Oscar Otte, Great Britain's Daniel Evans, Poland's Kacper Zuk and Italy's Lorenzo Musetti.
- Tiafoe **broke the Top 20 for the first time** after reaching the semifinals at the US Open last year and reached a career-high ranking of No. 17 in October. He plays here at the same ranking.
- Tiafoe had a **successful junior career**. Aged just 15, he won the 2013 Orange Bowl (d. Stefan Kozlov), becoming the youngest boys' singles winner in the event's history. He also reached the boys' singles semifinals at the 2014 US Open (l. Quentin Halys) and achieved a career-high junior ranking of No. 2. He never competed in the junior event here.
- Tiafoe made his **Davis Cup** debut in USA's 2018 semifinal defeat to Croatia and has a 1-3 overall win-loss record in the competition. He lost the only Davis Cup match he contested in 2022, falling to Italy's Lorenzo Sonego in the quarterfinals. USA play away against Uzbekistan in the 2023 Davis Cup Qualifiers in February.
- Tiafoe is coached by Wayne Ferreira, who reached the semifinals here in 1992 and 2003.
- **KHACHANOV** is bidding to reach the round of 16 here for the first time. This is his 7th Australian Open appearance and his 24th Grand Slam overall.
- Khachanov is bidding to **reach the round of 16 at the Grand Slams for the 9th time**. The Australian Open is the only Grand Slam tournament where he has failed to reach the round of 16.
- Khachanov advanced to the 3rd round after defeating Bernabe Zapata Miralles 76(0) 62 60 and wild card Jason Kubler 64 57 64 62 in the opening 2 rounds here. His victory against Kubler in the 2nd round was his **50th Grand Slam match-win**.
- By reaching the 3rd round here, Khachanov has equalled his **best Australian Open result**. He has also reached the 3rd round for the last 4 years – in 2019 (l. Roberto Bautista Agut), 2020 (l. Nick Kyrgios), 2021 (l. Matteo Berrettini) and last year, when he defeated Denis Kudla and Benjamin Bonzi before falling to Rafael Nadal.
- Khachanov recorded his **best Grand Slam result** by reaching the semifinals at the US Open last year, when he defeated Kudla, Thiago Monteiro, Jack Draper, Pablo Carreno Busta and Nick Kyrgios before falling to Casper Ruud.
- **Elsewhere at the Grand Slams in 2022**, Khachanov reached the round of 16 at Roland Garros (l. Carlos Alcaraz). He was unable to compete at Wimbledon.
- Khachanov's **best result in 2022** was finishing runner-up at Adelaide I (l. Gael Monfils in final). He also reached the semifinals at Doha (l. Bautista Agut), Belgrade (l. Novak Djokovic) and the US Open, and reached the quarterfinals at 5 other Tour-level events.
- **Prior to the Australian Open**, Khachanov reached the quarterfinals at both Adelaide I, where he defeated Pedro Cachin and Draper before falling to Daniil Medvedev, and Adelaide II, where he received a bye through the 1st round and defeated Marc-Andrea Huesler before falling to Draper.

- Khachanov has won **4 Tour-level titles**, all of which have come on hard courts. He won his first title at 2016 Chengdu (d. Albert Ramos-Vinolas) and won 3 titles in 2018 – at Marseille (d. Lucas Pouille), Moscow (d. Adrian Mannarino) and Paris-1000 (d. Djokovic).
- Khachanov **won the men’s singles silver medal at the Tokyo 2020 Olympic Tennis Event** in 2021, falling to Alexander Zverev in the gold medal match. Along with Andrey Rublev, who won mixed doubles gold, he became the first tennis player to win medals at both the Youth Olympic Games and the Olympic Games.
- Khachanov won the **boys’ doubles silver medal** alongside Rublev at the 2014 Youth Olympic Tennis Event in Nanjing, China. The pair fell to Orlando Luz/Marcelo Zormann in the gold medal match. He fell to Nishioka in the 1st round on his only appearance in the boys’ singles here in 2013.
- Khachanov is coached by Jose Clavet and Vedran Martic.

- **NISHIOKA** is bidding to record his 100th Tour-level match-win and become the 3rd Japanese man in history to record 100 Tour-level match-wins – after Kei Nishikori (431 Tour-level match-wins) and Shuzo Matsuoka (148).
- Nishioka is also bidding to reach the round of 16 at a Grand Slam for the first time and become the **3rd Japanese man in the Open Era to reach the round of 16 at a Grand Slam** – after Nishikori (who has made 22 round of 16 appearances at the Grand Slams, including 7 at the Australian Open) and Matsuoka (who reached the round of 16 at 1995 Wimbledon).
- Nishioka advanced to the 3rd round after defeating Mikael Ymer 64 62 75 and qualifier Dalibor Svrčina 63 64 62 in the opening 2 rounds here. This is his 8th Australian Open appearance and his 27th Grand Slam overall.
- By reaching the 3rd round here, Nishioka has equalled his **best Grand Slam result**. He also reached the 3rd round here in 2020, when he defeated Laslo Djere and Daniel Evans before falling to Novak Djokovic.
- By winning his opening 2 matches here, Nishioka ended a **6-match Grand Slam losing streak**. He had previously not recorded a Grand Slam match-win since reaching the 2nd round at 2021 Wimbledon (d. John Isner, l. Aljaz Bedene).
- **Last year here**, Nishioka fell to Radu Albot in 4 sets in the 1st round. He also fell in the 1st round at the 3 other Grand Slam events – at Roland Garros (l. Djokovic), Wimbledon (l. Emil Ruusuvuori) and the US Open (l. Alejandro Davidovich Fokina).
- Nishioka's best result in 2022 is winning his **2nd Tour-level title** at Seoul (d. Denis Shapovalov). He also finished runner-up at Washington (l. Nick Kyrgios) and reached the quarterfinals as a qualifier at Acapulco (l. Daniil Medvedev) and as No. 8 seed at Antwerp (l. Sebastian Korda).
- **Prior to the Australian Open**, Nishioka reached the semifinals at Adelaide I, retiring due to a right hip injury during his match against Korda. He withdrew from Auckland due to the same injury.

- Nishioka is one of **17 lefthanders** who started in the men's main draw at the Australian Open this year. Just 6 lefthanded players have won the Australian Open men's singles title in the Open Era, most recently Rafael Nadal in 2009 and 2022.
- Nishioka reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 33 earlier this month. He plays here at the same ranking.
- Nishioka won the only **5-set match** he has contested at the Australian Open, defeating Philipp Kohlschreiber in 5 sets in the 1st round in 2018. He has a 4-4 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- Nishioka had a **good junior career**. He reached a career-high junior ranking of No. 12 and reached the semifinals of the boys' singles at the 2012 US Open (l. Filip Peliwo). He never competed in the junior event here.
- Nishioka has played **Davis Cup** since 2015 and has a 5-6 win-loss record in the competition. Japan host Poland in the 2023 World Group I Play-offs in February.
- Nishioka is coached by his brother, Yasuo Nishioka.
- **MCDONALD** is bidding to reach the round of 16 here for the 2nd time and equal his best Grand Slam result. This is his 6th Australian Open appearance and his 18th Grand Slam overall.
- McDonald is **one of 8 American men to reach the 3rd round at the Australian Open this year** – the most American men in the 3rd round here since 1996, when there were also 8. - McDonald's best **Grand Slam result** is reaching the round of 16 on 2 occasions – including once at the Australian Open. He reached the last 16 here in 2021, when he defeated Marco Cecchinato, Borna Coric and Lloyd Harris before falling to Daniil Medvedev. At No. 192 he became the lowest-ranked man to reach the round of 16 at the Australian Open since No. 248 Guillermo Canas in 2004. He also reached the round of 16 at 2018 Wimbledon (l. Milos Raonic).
- **Elsewhere at the Grand Slams in 2022**, McDonald reached the 3rd round at Roland Garros, where he defeated Franco Agamenone and Nikoloz Basilashvili before falling to Jannik Sinner, and the 2nd round at Wimbledon (d. Nuno Borges, l. Richard Gasquet) but fell in the 1st round at the US Open (l. Joao Sousa).
- McDonald's **best results in 2022** were reaching the semifinals at Naples (l. Matteo Berrettini) and the quarterfinals at Dubai (l. Andrey Rublev), Seoul (l. Aleksandar Kovacevic) and Florence (l. Lorenzo Musetti).
- **Prior to the Australian Open**, McDonald reached the 2nd round at both Adelaide I (d. Daniel Elahi Galan, l. Yoshitomo Nishioka) and at Adelaide II (d. Evans, l. Mikael Ymer).

- McDonald's 5-set victory against Nakashima in the 1st round here was his 2nd victory in a **5-set match** at Tour-level and his first at the Australian Open. He lost both of the 5-set matches he had previously contested here, against Grigor Dimitrov in the 2nd round and against Daniel Evans in the 1st round in 2020. He has a 2-8 win-loss record in 5-set matches at Tour-level overall.
- McDonald broke the Top 50 for the first time in February last year and reached a **career-high ranking** of No. 48 in August 2022. He plays here at No. 65.
- McDonald had a **good junior career**. He reached a career-high junior ranking of No. 12 in April 2012 and reached the semifinals of the boys' singles here as a qualifier in 2012 (l. Filip Peliwo).
- McDonald played **college tennis** at UCLA in 2014-16, winning the 2016 NCAA singles and doubles titles before turning professional.
